HARDIN HEARD IN TEXAS VOTE WAR

MOODY RAPS ELECTIVE ROAD BOARD

GROUP MEETS
TO CONSIDER
HIGHWAY LAWSCONFERENCE CALLED BY
MOODY FOR TALKING
OVER PROBLEMS

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Nov. 27.—Firm opposition to any plan to divide the state into districts and elect members of the highway commission was voiced here today by Governor Moody in addressing the committee of 31, organized at his suggestion to consider and recommend highway legislation to the 41st legislature.

D. K. Martin, of San Antonio, member of the highway commission during the Neff administration, was appointed by the governor as temporary chairman of the committee. He assumed the prerogative to name at least temporary chairmen.

As long as I am governor the legislature would have to pass a law proposing an elective highway commission at least twice, because I would most certainly veto it the first time," Governor Moody said. His remarks were greeted with general applause by the committee members.

Explains Conference Call
He explained that his idea in asking the representatives and senators of the respective senatorial districts to select members of the committee, was to have them work out some constructive legislation for obtaining a connected system of highways and providing for adequate maintenance.

He suggested that the committee be divided into three sub-committees. One to consider highway finance, including methods of obtaining revenue for construction and maintenance; registration, to work out a plan for licensing and fixing weight fees, and one to restrict use of the roads to certain kinds of traffic.

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JUDGE ELY TO
SPEAK IN CITYHIGHWAY MEMBER TO
FAVOR PAVING BOND
ISSUE HERE

Coming to Lubbock county in the interest of better roads in this section of the state, Judge W. R. Ely, Abilene, member of the Texas Highway Commission will arrive here tomorrow to make a series of three speeches in the county, favoring the \$2,000,000 paving bond issue which is to be settled by the vote of the county at the polls next Saturday.

Judge Ely is the former district judge at Abilene, having given that up for his present post. A great advocate of good roads, he is well known throughout this section.

He will speak at a joint meeting of the Rotary and Kiwanis clubs at a joint meeting tomorrow at noon at the Hotel Lubbock. Tomorrow afternoon, he will address a citizens mass meeting at Idalou in the interest of the proposed road bonds. His final address in this county will be given tomorrow night at Slaton at a similar mass meeting.

CARPENTERS BACK
PAVING BONDS

Unanimously endorsing the \$2,000,000 county-wide paving bond issue which is to be voted upon next Saturday, members of the local carpenters' union, last night pledged support of the project as outlined by the Lubbock County Good Roads association.

The local union, No. 1884 of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America, went on record as favoring the good roads policy of the county. A resolution to this effect was drawn up, and signed by R. N. Lambert, president of the local organization, and C. M. Barnes, recording secretary.

DRY WEATHER
MAIN NEED OF
HARVEST NOWPICKING EXPECTED TO
BE HALF FINISHED
BY END OF WEEK

Should warm, dry weather prevail for the remainder of the week, cotton harvesting of this county should be half completed by next Sunday, County Agent D. F. Eaton said this morning.

Mr. Eaton stated that the inclement weather had brought a halt to cotton picking activities of this section. He said that the South Plains was losing a few laborers because of the undesirable weather, which was preventing them from working but a few days each week. The ginnings total of the county at the present time is something almost the 20,000 mark by the end of the week in the event that the county is visited by desirable weather. Mr. Eaton said this morning that his previous estimate of from 35,000 to 40,000 as the year's total cotton yield still held good, and that the total would be more than 40,000 bales.

"There is a better outlook for grain and sorghums in Lubbock this year than we have had for years," according to Mr. Eaton. "There is a splendid market for grain and even the bundle stuff is demanding a good price at the Fort Worth market. And with a surplus feed supply, this good market is about the best thing that could happen to us."

Mr. Eaton estimates that the wheat acreage of the county this year is less than last year. It is his opinion that not more than 12,000 acres of wheat was planted in the entire county this year as compared to probably more than 15,000 acres sown in the grain last year.

HOOVER MAKES
PEACE GESTURE
TO NICARAGUACONGRATULATES HEADS
OF LITTLE NATION
ON SETTLEMENT

(By Associated Press)

U.S.S. MARYLAND, OFF CORINTO, Nic., Nov. 27.—Congratulations upon Nicaragua's settlement of its internal disorders were extended today by Herbert Hoover to the retiring President Diaz of Nicaragua, President-Elect Moncada and former President Chamorro, who were luncheon guests aboard the battleship Maryland.

The three political leaders of the republic came aboard the good ship soon after it arrived off this port early this morning and to them President-elect Hoover delivered a brief extemporaneous address in lieu of making a speech ashore.

"I feel greatly honored," Mr. Hoover said, "that I should have on this occasion been welcomed not only by the President of Nicaragua but by the President-elect and the former president."

"Representing the political parties of Nicaragua who have been lately in conflict this occasion becomes one significant in that it represents the growing unity of the Nicaraguan people. It represents the consolidation of the forces of domestic peace. It demonstrates that the difficult national crisis into which my own country has been drawn has now reached a basis of solution which merits the deepest

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Banditry Flares In
Chicago—And How!

CHICAGO, Nov. 27 (P).—Banditry on a grand scale was executed last night at the Lambrecht Creamery, and about 7,000 was taken.

How many men participated in the robbery none of the 30 creamery employees could say. "It looked like about 50 of them," to one of the victims.

The robbers poured into the place through doors and windows, "whooping like college boys," as W. E. Heidemann, superintendent, described it. Twenty-four drivers found together in the room were forced to lie on the floor. In the main office the robbers found six more employees, and made them, too, sprawl on the linoleum.

Everywhere in the national forests, the forest service pointed out today, the number of deer is increasing.

At present, the forest service said the most acute situation in any national forest is in the Rainbow Forest in northern Arizona. The deer herd in this forest, numbering of 38,000, has outrun its food supply so that fawns born the previous year died.

Oliver, who gave his address as Norfolk, Va., was hungry when he reached Fayetteville. He approached a man and murmured something about money, coffee and doughnuts.

"Do you know who I am?" asked the citizen.

"I don't think I have had the honor. Mr. 'Er-ah'" began Oliver.

"I am the city judge." The city judge told Oliver about the begging laws of Fayetteville.

"My error, pardon," said Oliver and he went his way. He singled out another man as a kind hearted individual and repeated the dime, coffee and doughnuts speech.

"Do you know who I am?" "The mayor," hazarded Oliver. "No the prosecuting attorney?"

"I know all about the begging laws," laughed Oliver. "Just a little joke. Good bye. Oliver tried once more."

"Do you know who I am?" was the question.

"I am not sure," said Oliver. "but I'm afraid you are the chief of police."

"Wrong," said the citizen. "I am the mayor. Come along with me."

With the city judge on the bench and the mayor as a witness, the prosecuting attorney was not needed. Oliver got sixty days for vagrancy.

HUGE LIQUOR
CATCH MADE800 GALLONS WHISKEY,
AND INCIDENTALS
ARE SEIZED

Already it looks as if the Texas rangers were determined to make Lubbock's Christmas as dry as the proverbial Sahara.

Wholesale liquor raids, in which 800 gallons of whiskey, among other things, were seized, have been conducted in Motley county, it was related here yesterday by Judge J. F. Jordan of that county.

Sergeant M. T. Gonzales, famous "Lone Wolf" of the Texas rangers, assisted by Special Ranger J. E. Russell, former sheriff of Motley county, conducted the raids.

In addition to the big confiscation, two men, Bill Hogland and Homer Seales, are out under bonds of \$1,000 and \$2,000 respectively. The men were arrested on their premises the latter part of last week.

Besides the 800 gallons of whiskey, the two Texas rangers confiscated about 4,000 gallons of mash, 3,000 pounds of sugar, 1,800 half gallon fruit jars, 400 whiskey bottles, 300 pounds of yeast, 300 pints of beer, one complete 300 gallon copper still, and numerous other whiskey making paraphernalia.

Seale was arrested Thursday evening about sundown when Gonzales and Russell raided a filling station on Lee Highway, about nine miles east of Matador, capturing about 500 gallons of liquor. The next raid about two hours later, was on a still on U. L. Wille's ranch. The still, about 300 gallons of whiskey, and 5,000 gallons of mash were taken. No arrests were made at this place, a half finished meal indicated that the operators made a hasty retreat with the arrival of the officers.

Hogland was arrested the following day east of Roaring Springs. Officers captured 300 pints of beer and 4,000 gallons of mash, but no whiskey was found.

RUMOR PRINCE
IS CALLED TO
FATHER'S SIDENON-COMMITAL REPORT
ON CONDITION DOES
NOT LIFT ANXIETY

LONDON, Nov. 27 (P).—An Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Cape Town says a cable received from Dordans, Tanganyika, states a code message reached the provincial commissioner there shortly after 10 a. m. today and a fast motor car was sent immediately to meet the Prince of Wales who is coming in from his camp. The dispatch said it was believed the message contained instructions for the Prince to return to London.

CONDITION SAID
TO BE UNCHANGED

LONDON, Nov. 27 (P).—Anxiety over King George's illness was not greatly relieved this morning when his physicians issued what might be characterized as a non-committal bulletin.

The physicians, Sir Stanley Hewett and Lord Dawson of Penn, informed the public their royal patient had passed the night more restfully and his feverish condition had abated somewhat. The bulletin did not actually give the king's temperature and summed up everything else by stating conditions otherwise were unchanged.

On top of the disturbing bulletins, the past few days which have indicated the king is very sick, today's report did not tend greatly to relieve anxiety among his subjects over the eventual outcome of the attack.

It was realized that the king's stamina was undergoing a severe strain owing to constant pain from pleurisy and the lack of rest and sleep that attended it.

The text of the official medical bulletin was:

"His Majesty the King has had a more restful night and the temperature is somewhat lower. The condition is unchanged."

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Endurance Attempt
Closes In Failure

FRESNO, Calif., Nov. 27 (P).—The endurance flight of Lee Schoenhaid and John Gugliemetti ended in failure at 1:40 a. m. today when the plane landed at the Helm Airport 40 miles west of here. It had 90 gallons of gasoline left, not enough to carry them to a new record. They had been in the air 42 hours and 59 minutes, and would have needed to stay up another 24 hours to have set a new endurance flight record.

France Refuses To
Release Blackmer

PARIS, Nov. 27 (P).—France, on the advice of the court of indictment, today decided not to honor the extradition request of the United States for H. M. Blackmer, missing from the American consulate in London, having been working for the local post office authorities for a number of months, is expected to greatly relieve the expected mail congestion of Christmas.

TAMPA, Fla., Nov. 27 (P).—Leonard Flo, attempting a non-stop flight from Walkerville, Ont. to Cuba, passed over this city at 12:41 p. m. today.

WALKERVILLE, Ont., Nov. 27 (P).—Leonard Flo of Ann Arbor, Mich., 26 year old former army and air mail pilot, today was making his second attempt at a non-stop solo flight from Canada to Cuba.

He took off from the airport here at 11:07 last night in a Spartan biplane and hoped to reach Havana in 18 to 20 hours. It is approximately 1,800 miles to the Cuban capital.

His route was via Dayton and Cincinnati, O., Atlanta, Ga., Tampa and Key West, Fla., thence across the 90 miles of water to Camp Columbia, Havana.

LINDBERGH OFF
ON NEW YORK HOP

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Nov. 27 (P).—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh landed at McConnell Field at 11:33 today having flown here from Memphis. Lindbergh remained here only 15 minutes, refueling his plane and departing on his flight to New York.

Fire Does Heavy

HOUSTON, Nov. 27 (P).—Fire which shortly after midnight threatened a wide area in the business district was brought under control early this morning after causing an estimated damage of \$125,000.

Half a dozen firemen, including Assistant Chief George Richardson, were trapped on the roof of a building but were rescued.

DEFEATED CANDIDATE SAYS
THREAT OF LIBEL SUIT WAS
MADE IF CHARGES PRESSED

(By The Associated Press)

MCALLEN, Texas, Nov. 27.—Sid Hardin, square jawed young politician from Mission, Texas, testified before the congressional house election campaign committee today that he was forced by threats of indictment for libel to withdraw his charges of excessive expenditures and illegal voting in the campaign of Congressman John Garner for re-election from the fifteenth Texas district.

Garner won the nomination in the democratic primary over Hardin, and the latter filed a contest which he later withdrew. He also asked a congressional investigation, and attempted to withdraw this request, but Chairman Lehlbach said it was continued at Garner's request.

FLOOD PERILS
FOLLOW STORM
ON CONTINENT

Hardin said he was given to understand by members of the "ring" supporting Garner that he could choose between being indicted or withdrawing his charges to clear Garner's name. He chose the latter, and decided on the "easiest way out."

Hardin declared he believed there was a conspiracy to have him indicted, and named Assistant District Attorney Milton West of Cameron county, Brownsville; John Valls, district attorney of Webb county, and A. M. Brunt, of Webb county, as being involved either directly or indirectly in the alleged efforts against him.

Brunt had been "running Webb county for 50 years," Hardin said. He added that F. W. Seabury, Brownsville lawyer, prepared a letter to Chairman Lehlbach withdrawing Hardin's request for an investigation of the fifteenth congressional district, and that West prepared a public retraction of charges against Garner.

He signed both of them, Hardin said.

DEPUTY OPENING
BOX SUMMONED

MCALLEN, Nov. 27 (P).—An unidentified deputy of County Clerk Cam Hill, Hidalgo county, where a congressional committee is inquiring into alleged election frauds along the Texas-Mexican border, was summoned to appear before the hearing in the Baptist church today and tell what he knows about the Weslaco box returns.

The box was thrown out by the county commissioners court because of the alleged fraud.

SUIT ECHOES
GRADE CRASH\$25,000 DAMAGES ARE
SOUGHT FOR DEATH
OF J. F. WENDEL

Damages of \$25,000 are asked in a suit filed today in the 72nd district court by Mrs. Barbara Wendel and nine other plaintiffs against the Colorado, Gulf and Santa Fe Railway company.

The damage suit is an outgrowth of the accidental death last September 15 of Jacob Frank Wendel, relative of the plaintiffs, when the train struck the car in which he was riding at Ballinger.

It is charged in the petition filed today that the railway company was negligent, that the employees of the company did not blow a whistle as the train approached the crossing, and that no signs were placed by the company to designate the crossing. It is further alleged that the light car in which Mr. Wendel was riding, valued at about \$500,

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LABOR URGES CLOSE BAN ON IMMIGRATION

RESTRICTION ASSERTS BUREAU MUST BE MORE RIGID

(By Associated Press)
NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 27 (AP)—Increased restriction of immigration was urged here today by the annual convention of the American Federation of Labor. This action was taken by endorsing the report of the resolutions committee to which several resolutions bearing on immigration had been introduced. All were approved by the convention.

The committee, in addition to reporting favorably on the immigration resolutions calling for placing under the quota provisions Mexico and Latin American countries and islands adjacent to the United States, declared "restrictions of entry of aliens into the United States should be more rigid in character though tempered with human considerations and applicable to all aliens."

John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers of America, proposed in a brief address that a "large endowment fund be created for use in long drawn out strikes such as that of the mine workers."

In its report, the resolutions committee declared that "there is no more vexing problem confronting the American Trade Union movement than that which is involved in the injunction question," and added that "it would seem that the time is here when the congress of the United States can be prevailed upon to provide a really adequate remedy for the injunction evil."

MCCLUNG SCHOOL IS AFTER CHANGE

Ninety per cent of the qualified tax-paying voters residing in the McClung school district have signed petitions to the Lubbock County School Board, requesting that a special independent school district be created in that community so they can thereby raise more money on taxes to support the school in better fashion. County Commissioner W. M. Pevehouse announced today.

"As common school districts are limited by the county commissioners' court as to the value land may be assessed for taxes at, and with this value at the maximum tax rate of \$1 being insufficient to maintain the kind of school the progressive community of McClung demands," said Mr. Pevehouse, "the petition to create this independent district is necessary."

Mr. Pevehouse further stated that it is his belief that no county in Texas has kept pace with Lubbock county in creating independent districts in order to raise funds for increasing school facilities during the past few years.

"In the past eight months," he said, "this makes the sixth independent district in the county to be changed from a common school district, which gives Lubbock county a total of 18 independent districts and only six common school districts."

Broken Contract Suit Being Tried

Echoing what is charged to be a broken contract, the suit of the Mueller Brothers Art and Manufacturing company against O. W. McLeod, local laundry operator, went to trial in the Lubbock county court this morning.

According to the original petition filed in the case, it is an outgrowth of an alleged contract between the laundry and the manufacturing company for a number of art calendars to be used for advertising purposes. It is charged that the defendant cancelled the contract. The suit involved several hundred dollars.

NEW YORK, Nov. 27 (AP)—George McManus, widely known by police as the man who "coughed" three more light on the slaying of Arnold Rothstein, gambler, than any one else, was arrested today.

AUSTIN, Nov. 27 (AP)—Funeral arrangements for Dr. William S. Sutton, dean of the department of education of the University of Texas and once president, who died suddenly at his home here yesterday, are waiting arrival of his son, Herbert H. Sutton, of Dallas.

Sutton was talking with members of his family when stricken.

Chicago Schools Face Big Deficit

CHICAGO, Nov. 27 (AP)—Chicago newspapers today said the city schools faced a deficit approximating \$12,000,000, caused by financial troubles "inherited from previous administrations, coupled with tremendous loss in revenue this year from uncollectable taxes."

Some extra legal means of maintaining current expenses must be found, it was pointed out, until more tax money becomes available about February 15. Both the Tribune and the Herald and Examiner said the schools would not be closed.

Private funds from public spirited citizens will be called upon, if necessary, the Examiner said.

TRAGIC STORY

Broken Romance Of Young Jap Is Revealed

VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 27 (AP)—The frustrated romance of a young Japanese was disclosed today as the story behind the discovery of an embalmed body of a man in a trunk purchased at an unclaimed baggage sale here.

A local Japanese told T. Fukuma, Japanese consul general, that the body was that of Matsuzaki Zaa, who committed Hari Kari in 1921. The body was embalmed by Zaa's elder brother who left it in the baggage room when he returned to Japan in 1927.

The younger Zaa, according to the story told the consul, had fallen in love with a girl in his native village but owing to family objections had been unable to marry her. His desolation prompted him to leave the country and his brother, Hiamatsu, accompanied him.

The two men worked in the coal mines at Lethbridge for several years.

CROSBY PLANS POULTRY SHOW

ANNUAL EVENT TO BE HELD AT LORENZO OPENING DEC. 20

The fourth annual Crosby County Poultry Show will be held at Lorenzo for three days, beginning December 20. It was announced in Lubbock this morning by the Rev. Aubrey Ashley, who is in charge of the annual event.

Rev. Ashley said that the show had grown bigger each year, with the paid entries always ranging from 300 to 500 and it is estimated that the poultry exposition this year will be the greatest ever to be held on the South Plains.

Cup winners to be presented to the winners at the show are being furnished by the Lubbock fair association. Rev. Ashley stated that this organization, the local Chamber of Commerce, Lubbock County Agent D. P. Eaton, the Avalanche-Journal and many other Lubbock firms and individuals had always cooperated to make the annual show a success.

This farm is one of the ones under the supervision of the Lubbock county agent in producing pure seed. A certificate that the seed was pure, containing no smut or foreign seed, was given by the county to Mr. Burroughs.

The 40,000 pounds of pure seed was of the finest ever produced here, according to Mr. Eaton. The other 20,000 pounds was good and virtually pure seed, he said, although it had been rogued.

KELLOGG PACT APPROVAL IS THOUGHT SURE

BOTH PARTY CHIEFS IN SENATE ANNOUNCE FAVOR TO PACT

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—Senate ratification of the Kellogg anti-war pact seems assured, barring unforeseen developments, with the only question to be settled, that of procedure.

Senator Swanson of Virginia, ranking democrat on the senate foreign relations committee, has announced his support of the treaty. He has Senator Borah of Idaho, chairman of the senate foreign relations committee, Senator Norris of Nebraska, leader of the republican independents, and other senators, both democrats and republicans.

Norris has declared he would try to have the treaty brought up for ratification ahead of the administration's \$274,000,000 naval bill. He said there seemed to be an agreement among administrative leaders to have the senate vote on the naval bill first.

Chairman Hale of the senate naval committee and Senator Borah have agreed to attempt to avoid a wrangle over the position of the treaty and the naval bill on the senate calendar. The naval bill is already on the calendar, since it passed the house at the last session and has had committee approval in the senate.

President Coolidge is expected to send the Kellogg treaty to the senate immediately when congress convenes next week, but it will first go to the foreign relations committee for consideration.

TURKEYS SHIPPED FROM PLAINVIEW

Plainview, Nov. 27.—In excess of \$80,000 worth of dressed turkeys were shipped from Plainview by freight and express for the Thanksgiving market, which has now closed. The Christmas market will open locally about the first of December.

The shipments aggregating 243,000 pounds. The prevailing price on the Thanksgiving market was 32 cents per pound and the dressed birds run about ten per cent less than the live weight.

One car of turkeys was shipped from the Staked Plains Turkey Growers Association, the Plainview Poultry and Egg Company who bought, repacked. This firm also shipped six other cars of dressed turkeys.

Four cars of dressed turkeys were shipped by L. D. Rucker and Pat Connolly, who pooled their turkeys for shipment. They billed out a total of \$2,800 pounds.

Maniu Government Seeks Better Loan

BUCHAREST, Rumania, Nov. 27 (AP)—The Maniu government was understood today to have decided to inform the Bankers' Trust company of America that it would interrupt negotiations unless terms were modified and the amount of the loan increased. Otherwise, Rumania would seek a loan through the League of Nations. The government's decision caused a sensation in political and financial circles.

Summon Venire In Adams Case, Dallas

DALLAS, Nov. 27 (AP)—Notices were in the mails today summoning 300 veniremen to the trial of V. Ray Adams of Bartlett, charged with the murder of Orville Matthews here September 1, to begin next Monday.

Matthews was slain as the outgrowth of an argument over a \$2,000 bet on the Mayfield-Connally senatorial race.

Dam Will Divert Devil River Water

AUSTIN, Nov. 27 (AP)—Application of James C. Kennedy for the Central Power and Light company for authority to build a dam and divert water from Devil's River in Val Verde county, was granted by the board of water engineers today. The diversion of 300 second feet will be for power purposes and the dam will have a capacity of 47,700 acre feet.

The West Texas Utilities company of Abilene was authorized to divert 2,500 acre feet annually from Lytle Creek in Taylor county for water supply and industrial purposes. Permission was given to construct a storage dam of 6,500 acre feet capacity. Lytle creek is a tributary of Cedar Creek, which is a tributary of the Brazos River. Permission was given the Phillips Petroleum company of Bartlesville, Oklahoma, to divert 1,884 acre feet annually from Big Creek, in Hutchinson county, for mining purposes.

Two Barely Escape Injuries In Crash

A man opposed to the proposed Lubbock County Road Bond Issue admitted the other day that these roads would increase the immediate sales value of a certain section of land adjoining the paved roads at least \$10.00 an acre. He didn't estimate how much the sales value of land further away from the roads would be increased. 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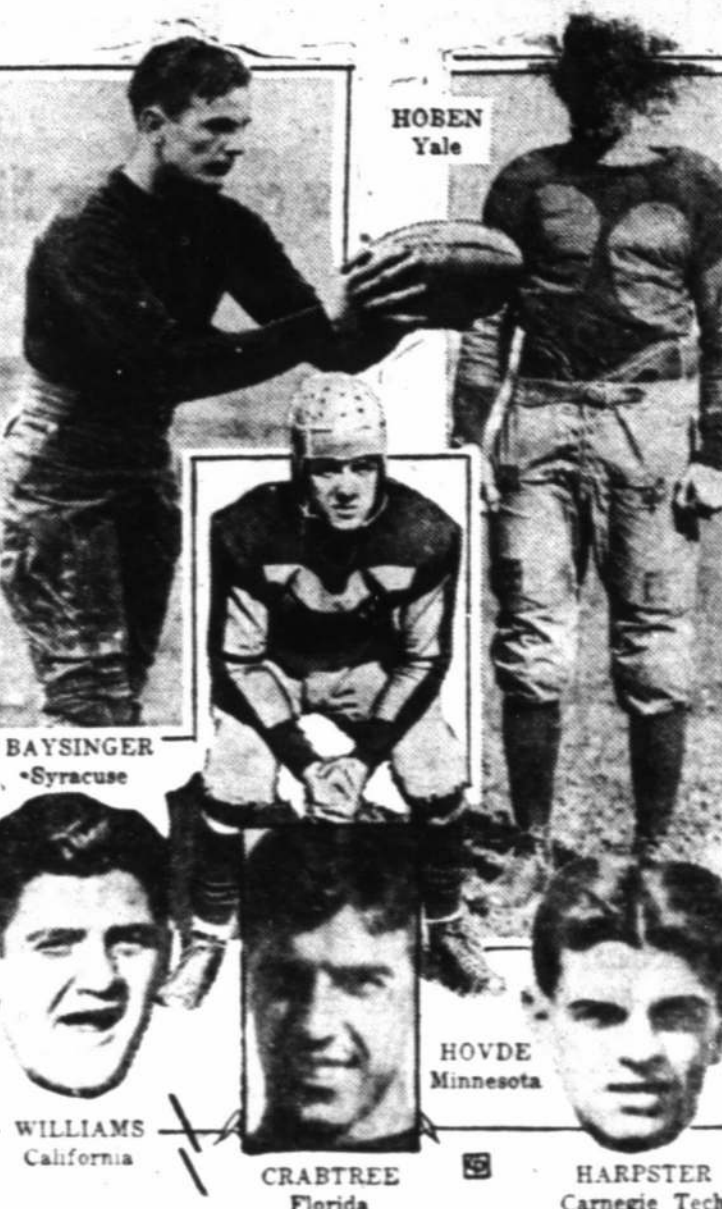

MASS PRODUCTION FOR

ANNOUNCEMENTS

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—Entrance of automobile interests into the airplane field with the idea of putting plane production on a quantity basis was disclosed today when it was learned that Durant and Fisher backing is behind a plan to build a manufacturing unit around the American Eagle Aircraft company, of Kansas City, Mo.

Clifford Durant and his father, William C. Durant, financier, are understood to head the group behind the project. The Durants already have acquired a substantial interest in the American Eagle company and are negotiating for control of companies making airplane accessories and motors to complete the organization.

Larry Fisher, one of the Fisher Brothers of Detroit, and Barney Oldfield, veteran racing driver, are among the automobile men interested. It is understood more than 75 retail automobile dealers have signed contracts for distribution of the planes, which will be manufactured at the rate of five daily in a new Kansas City plant incorporating a "production line" similar to those now used by the larger automobile companies.

LUFKIN, Tex., Nov. 27 (AP)—Trial of Lloyd Carter for the slaying of John Laine, Houston painter and paperhanger, was continued here today until next April because of the absence of several witnesses, including the sheriff, who is ill. BYRD PARTY READY FOR ICE

COMMANDER WILL SAIL
IN WHALING SHIP
FOR ICE PLATEAU

WELLINGTON, New Zealand, Nov. 27 (AP)—Commander Richard E. Byrd and fifty members of his Antarctic expedition are planning to leave Dunedin on Friday directly for the Bay of Whales if ice reports from whalers now in Ross Sea are favorable. They will sail in the City of New York.

The Eleanor Bolling, the commander's other vessel, will make two trips to the south carrying supplies and will remain at Dunedin for the winter. Early next summer she will leave with fresh provisions. When the expedition was first planned Commander Byrd intended, if conditions on the ice plateau were favorable, to do all his scheduled flying in a few months, returning to civilization before the "long darkness" settled over the Antarctic. This plan has now been abandoned.

"We shall be on the ice for a year and six months," said Commander Byrd in an interview. "The expedition is not going to make a dash or attempt any stunt exploit. It is out for scientific exploration."

MEXICO LAUDS MORROW WORK

HOOVER AND MORROW
ATTACK BRINGS A
SHARP DEFENSE

(By Associated Press)

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 27.—The wrath of the Chamber of Deputies was aroused last night when Herman Laborde, labor member, quoting the British press, launched a bitter attack against Herbert Hoover's good will tour and Ambassador Morrow's work in Mexico. Leaders of the Chamber leaped to the forefront and warmly defended both Americans.

Senator Laborde, claiming he spoke in behalf of labor unions belonging to the "Hands off Nicaragua Committee" said the American President-elect's trip was a new phase of the Anglo-American trade war.

He asserted it was intended to destroy the benefits that England derived from the visit of the Prince of Wales to South America.

As turmoil broke, Laborde, unable to continue his speech, left the floor.

Deputy Melchor Ortega said that Ambassador Morrow had won the sympathy of the country for his splendid work. He added: "I hope Hoover visits Mexico and all American executives do likewise because a real understanding would be reached."

Seek Increase In Root Rot Funds

AUSTIN, Nov. 27 (AP)—A delegation of large cotton planters from Central and North Texas was here yesterday enlisting the aid of state officials in an effort to be made to get the forty-first legislature to increase its biennial appropriation for treatment of root rot, a disease of cotton plants which has cut the crop materially in some counties.

Arthur Schnitzler, famous Vien-
nese dramatist, tells an interviewer
that he is very well satisfied with
the existing universe except for the
fact that man's span of life is al-
together too short.

The interviewer then asks him
if he would be content with a
life the length of Methuselah; and
Schnitzler tells him that he would
not.

"What," he asks, "are a thou-
sand years compared with eternity?"
Probably not, says Schnitzler, and
this can hardly be encouraging to
the medical specialists who are us-
ing every resource of science to add
a mere 10 years or so to our life
expectancy. They can expect scant
thanks for that. Nothing less than
an eternity of living will ever sat-
isfy us. We call ourselves religious
and profess an abiding faith, but
death remains a mystery which we
are not willing to solve.

This of course makes for unhap-

reconciled to the fact that life is
short and its joys fleeting, we could
get along with a great deal less mis-
ery. That would seem to be the
reasonable thing to do. We cannot

about making ourselves and our
fellows miserable by trying to cram
the earth and all the heavens into
a few short decades?

Unfortunately, if otherwise, we
are not reasonable creatures. There
is in us somewhere a wholly irra-
tional spark of divinity that refuses
to concede that we are made of clay.
Our imagination gives us a glimpse
of things that might be possible for
us if we were only given the time
to accomplish them, and we never
can be satisfied with anything less
than immortal life, universal brother-

that we have built to plague our-
selves.

The quick years pass and genera-

South American Good Will Jaunt Gives an Insight To
The Kind of President Hoover Will Make, Dutcher Says

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—Hoover
may turn out to be a better or worse
president than Coolidge, but it is
pretty certain that he is going to
be different. His South American
visit encourages those who believe
he will make a new type of chief
executive and that the change will
be all to the good.

Few things could do more to
strengthen our interests in this
hemisphere than Hoover's trip. It
is a master stroke.

Latin America is
prop to our prosperity, and the
least resistant field in our war for
world trade. Hoover now appears
to have meant what he said when
he insisted during the campaign
that there were some things a pre-
sident could do about prosperity.

Some time between now and in-
auguration a brief checkup on the
sort of president Hoover is likely
to make, based on past performance.
His background of achievement goes
far outside that of Harding or Cool-
idge. It transcends that of the
cloistered, scholarly Wilson. It af-
fords high hope that Hoover will
always put the interests of the na-
tion above that of party.

2. There have been innumerable
instances of a personal humanity
about Hoover which suggest that
he isn't going to forget all about the
underdog; that although he may not
antagonize big business he will at
least attempt to see that the
"smallness" don't get all the bad
breaks.

3. Hoover has initiative. His ad-
ministration promises progress in
what direction one cannot predict,
but we are not in for a period of
standstill. He ought to be able to
guide and guard America through
the most difficult times, and per-
haps more so, than any other man
mentioned for the presidency in
1928 could have done.

4. He is well equipped to put the
machinery of government on a more
efficient basis than it ever has op-
erated on.

So much for Hoover the engineer.
Hoover the administrator, Hoover
the organizer and Hoover the hu-
manitarian. On the other side of
the picture here are his visible
flaws.

1. Politically speaking, he is not
entirely scrupulous. That does not
mean that his personal character is
not spotless or that any other suc-
cessful politician has such things
as scruples. The charge is made
that he has been a cunning manipu-
lator of public opinion, and that he
has used his political machine to
circulate religious propaganda during
the recent campaign.

2. Hoover has seldom been bold
except when there was everything
to gain by boldness and nothing to
lose. He has been a burning crus-
ader against such unpopular in-
stitutions as bolshevism and in fa-
vor of prosperity and the American
home. He has seldom engaged in
any fight until victory was as good
as won. His campaign seemed to
be typical of him, although they
were also undeniably good politics.
He has been even more silent than
Coolidge on republican scandals.

3. He has often been accused of
timidity. So much for that. There is no
reason to suppose that these defects
as shown by Hoover's history are
bound to handicap him now. As
president, with a favorable congress,
his power will be almost limitless.

The caution which he has hereto-
fore exhibited may become one of
his virtues. It seems extremely
likely that he will act most vigor-
ously when and if he is assured of
the support of the American peo-
ple.

No man can rise to high political
office except under almost incon-
ceivable circumstances, without sac-
rificing much of his self-respect.
Men of lower rank nearly always
continue to sacrifice self-respect in
realization that it is necessary if
they are to rise. But Hoover is
now sitting on top of the world. He
can be himself. He need not fear
anyone. He can afford to tell any-
one, at any time, just where to
get off.

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Diet and Health

INGREDIENT OF MYRTLE
LEAVES USED IN DIABETIS
EXPERIMENT

Myrtillin for Diabetis
Among the Alpine peasantry (and
in some of the rural districts of the
United States), a tea made of the
blueberry leaf is be-
lieved to be good for diabe-
tis.

In 1925 Professor Durig, of the
University of Vienna, impressed
upon the idea that there might
be some value in the use of the
blueberry leaf for diabetis, de-
cided to test it. It was found that
there were two anta-
gonistic ingredients in the leaves—
one which seemed to raise the blood
sugar and the other to lower it.
This lowering factor was particu-
larly purified and given the name
myrtillin, because it was obtained
from the myrtle family of plants.
(This myrtillin probably occurs in
all green plants, but it is higher
in the blueberry and various myr-
tles.)

The results from the use of myr-
tillin were very variable.
Dr. Frederick M. Allen has been
trying out myrtillin in his labora-
tory on diabetic dogs, and has been
successful in the body, and that
it can be taken by mouth and is
harmless under all conditions. But
his conclusions are that while in
some cases it seems to have good
effect, and in mild cases may be
of benefit, the product is feeble and
uncertain, as compared with insulin.

Dr. Allen believes it is best to go
rigid of the excess sugar in the blood
by the diet—and insulin, if neces-
sary—and then to give myrtillin to
help the patient to tolerate starches
and sugars. He thinks that myr-
tillin plays some part in the use of
carbohydrates in the body, and that
it will prove valuable as an addi-
tional treatment in diabetis.

The work on myrtillin is still in
the experiment stage.

K-Acid fruits and some vegetables
do give an acid reaction to litmus
paper, and they are acid after eat-
ing, until they are digested. Then
the acid is burned, leaving an alkali
ash with which it was com-
bined. Those who have inflamma-
tory conditions of the stomach and
intestinal tract sometimes have to
omit these acid-tasting foods for a
while until their condition is im-
proved. The normal diet should
contain a pound and a half or two
pounds of fruit and vegetables daily
for their vitamins, mineral elements
and bulk.

Mrs. E.—The prevention of appen-
dicitis is similar to the prevention
of any disease, and that is: a
balanced diet, fresh air, sufficient
sleep and rest, and some vigorous
exercise every day, especially some
exercise of the trunk muscles. It
is found in most cases of appen-
dicitis that there is a long history of
constipation. This usually means
a history of diet looking in suffi-
cient vegetables and fruit and lack of
exercise of the trunk muscles.

If you are interested, we have an
article on Constipation, also one on
Acute Abdominal Pain, which gives
some splendid exercises for the
trunk muscles.

A.—Until you can have a physi-
cian give you a thorough examina-
tion and advise, get an alarm clock.
Empty your bladder before retiring
and set an alarm clock to call you
four or five hours after you retire.
No, enuresis is not necessarily due
to inflammation of the kidneys or
bladder. It may be a nervous
habit; there may be some trouble
with the sphincter muscles at the
neck of the bladder; the urine may
be irritating, etc. (This, in time,
may cause inflammation of the
bladder and kidneys and other or-
gans.) Improper nourishment, re-
sulting in overweight or underweight
frequently is a factor.

NICARAGUA TO HEAR HOOVER

PRESIDENT-ELECT WILL VISIT THIRD NATION DURING TUESDAY

U. S. S. MARYLAND, Nov. 27 (AP)—Carrying Herbert Hoover to the Third country of his South American tour, the battleship Maryland anchored two miles off Corinto, Nicaragua, at 7 a. m. today. Preparations were made to land Mr. Hoover and his party within a few hours.

After winds and heavy seas which had threatened to hold Hoover at La Union, Salvador, all night had subsided, the party had returned to the Maryland at 1:30 a. m.

Hoover, in his first speeches on his present trip, told the people of Honduras and of San Salvador he was paying them a call of friendship in behalf of the United States. Both addresses, one at Amapala, the other at La Union, were brief and both emphasized the need for mutual understanding between the United States and other democracies of the American continent.

Given Warm Welcome

At both seaports yesterday he was given a warm welcome. The military were present in gorgeous uniforms. There were salutes and return salutes, the hoisting of flags and bands playing "The Star Spangled Banner."

The president-elect spoke first at Amapala.

"In our daily life good neighbors call upon each other as the evidence of solidarity for the common well-

fare," he said, "and to learn of the circumstances and point of view of each so that there may come both understanding and respect which are the elementary forces of all enduring society."

Common Tie Seen

He told his audience that the United States and Honduras were pledged through the blood of their forefathers to national independence.

"We in the United States have learned much from the experience of our Latin American neighbors and we in turn take pride in our contributions to the common pool of human advancement in these one hundred and fifty years. Therefore, I have felt that the larger personal acquaintance with both our neighboring countries and with their points of view and above all with the men who have been elected to responsibility in their governments, would be valuable in the task which lies before me."

"Those who know the United States," he declared, "know also that we have only one desire and that is to cooperate to a constantly improving understanding; to common progress and to common attainment."

La Union is but ten miles across the Gulf of Fonseca from Amapala in Honduras. Mr. Hoover made the trip in a motor launch and found the town enjoying a holiday while waiting for his coming.

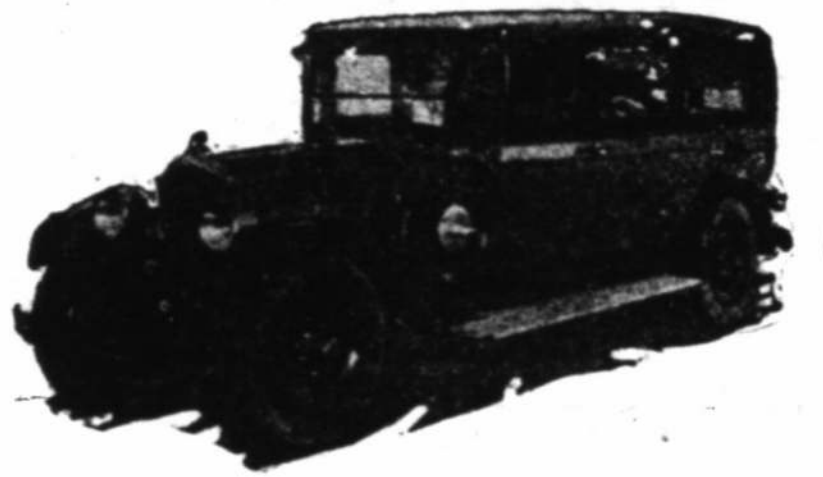

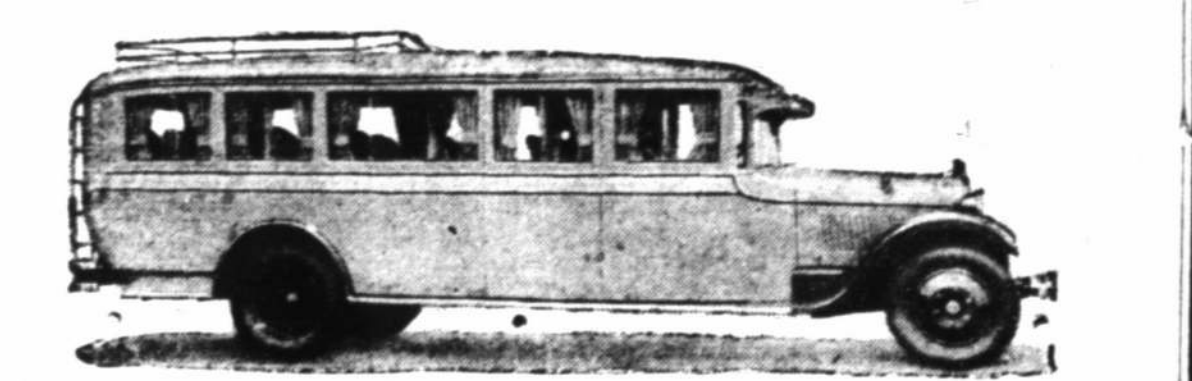

Rivers Rising Rivers in the Voages hills were rising with alarming rapidity. The Moselle was also rising and tributaries of the Rhine were raging torrents. Houses along the banks of the Ruhr at Mulheim were evacuated and the shipping on the Saar was at a standstill.

Cuxhaven Roads, Germany, was full of disabled shipping. One incoming vessel reported it had sighted 5 wrecks in the North Sea. The liner Carinthia arriving at Liverpool, England reported it had picked up sixteen S O S calls all of which were subsequently cancelled.

Many Ships Lost The French freighter Cesaree sunk off Algiers and 15 of her crew were drowned. An Italian steamer believed to be the Saletto was wrecked and all aboard were lost. The Norwegian steamer Michelsen was driven ashore and three members of the crew drowned while the rest were being rescued.

The British steamer Neath Abbey sank off San Sebastian, Spain, but her crew was rescued.

The German schooner Pommern, which was left a derelict after all aboard had been taken off, was taken in tow and removed as a danger to navigation.

The losses to Great Britain alone from the recent storms were estimated at more than a million pounds.

BELGIUM SUFFERS FROM WATERS BRUSSELS, Belgium, Nov. 27 (AP)—Floods resulting from the tremendous gale and heavy rains are proving to be the worst calamity that Belgium has suffered from nature in half a century. Fifty villages are wholly or partially under water.

The entire Antwerp garrison was today put to work repairing dikes of the Scheldt, Rupel, Dender and the divers which gave way at a dozen places under the pressure of tide water. Hundreds of hot houses are demolished and communications by road and rail were cut.
