## Census Questionnaires To Be Distributed Saturday

Questionnaires for the 1970 Census of Population and Housing will be distributed by the Post Office beginning March 28 to all households in this area, District Manager R. L. Butler, announced today.

Distribution of this form before the start of the house-to-house canvass gives the family a chance to assemble information about each member and about the house in advance of the census taker's visit. The District Manager urges all residents to fill out the forms and have them ready for the census takers when they start their rounds on April 1.

The form contains seven questions about every person in the household and 13 questions about the dwelling. The personal information asked for is: name, address, sex, color or race, month and year of birth, whether married or single, and relationship to head of the household. The information required about the dwelling is: number of rooms, cooking facilities, plumbing, if rented or owned.

Most of the questions are answered by filling in the proper tiny circle with a common lead pencil, making a tiny black dot which can be "read" by Census Bureau machines. Residents should read the instruction sheet which will come with the questionnaire before filling it out.

The census taker will check the questionnaire to see that all questions have been answered and will give any assistance needed in filling out a questionnaire that is incomplete. At every fifth household, the census taker will seek answers to additional questions covering population and housing characteristics that are being asked of a 20 percent sample of the Nation's population. The sample questions include inquiries on country of birth, schooling, employment, income, and related items. The additional housing questions relate to rent or value of dwelling, heating equipment, water supply, and other facilities and equipment.

The District Manager pointed out that information about individuals and their homes furnished to the Census Bureau is kept confidential under Federal law. Only statistical totals and averages are published. No individual person can be identified in published reports and census information cannot be given to any other Government agency, local officials, tax collectors, police, health, welfare, or school officers, nor to anyone else.

**SOIL**  
The natural wealth of Texas is enormous. The soils of Texas are the most important economic resource of the state. With proper care, they will continue to produce crops and support livestock production long after mineral resources have been depleted. Texas has over 500 types of soil ranging from the alluvial soils of the river bottoms to the loams of the Staked Plains.

"Texas has a total area of approximately 170 million acres (254 counties). The state is divided into 14 land resource areas based on similarity of soils, topography, climate and vegetation. These 14 land resource areas are East Texas Timberlands, Coast Marsh, Coast Prairie, Blackland Prairies, East Cross Timbers, Grand Prairie, West Cross Timbers, North Central Prairies, Central Basin, Rio Grande Plain, Edward Plateau, Rolling Plains, High Plains and Trans-Pecos.

**WATER**  
One of the largest artesian-water belts in the world is found in the central and north-central sections and the Coastal Plains. Such cities as Galveston and San Antonio get their entire water supply from this water belt,

and thousands of acres are irrigated with artesian-well water. In the High Plains, irrigation farming is well-known because of a great supply of water.

One of the most important rivers of Texas is the Brazos. The Rio Grande is one of the longest and most historic rivers of North America.

**MINERALS**  
Since 1935 Texas has ranked first among the 48 states in the value of minerals produced, and mineral production is of plain importance to the economy of the state. Texas developed into the leading petroleum state in 1928. It is also the leading state in the production of natural gas and in natural gas liquids. Other minerals of which Texas is the chief United States producer are native asphalt, fuller's earth, crystalline graphite, bromine, helium, magnesium, and sulphur.

Next to oil, natural gas, and natural gasoline, sulphur is the most important mineral produced in Texas. There are

## County Library Offers Services

A small library, as Castro County Library, with limited budget and limited shelf space for storing books, can not have books with the variety of information the reading public of Castro County need. Citizens of Castro County need many kinds of information not to be found in the local library. Recent requests range from the request for the complete works of Samuel Taylor Coleridge for the preparation of a Hart High School senior's research theme in English to the request for a book of Officer Installation Services for the installation of officers of a local county organization; and a request for a biography of Otto Von Bismark by a World History student in Dimmitt to the request for a book on electroplating by an adult. Numerous other examples of the wide range of information requested by Castro County citizens can be cited.

Castro County Library is able to supply such requests through Texas Library Systems. Established by the Texas Legislature in March 1969, the Library System provides for small libraries to borrow books from any of the Major Resource Centers designated by the law. The resource centers are Mary E. Bivins Memorial Library in Amarillo, Lubbock City-County Library, El Paso Public Library, Abilene Public Library, Ft. Worth Public Library, Dallas Public Library, Houston Public Library, Austin Public Library, San Antonio Public Library, Corpus Christi Public Library and Texas State Library.

The first step in borrowing is a request by letter or a collect telephone call, depending

on the urgency of the request, to a Major Resource Center. In the case of Castro County Library the request is made to Mary E. Bivins Memorial Library in Amarillo for specific books or materials not available in the local library. Materials not allowed to be taken from a resource library can be Xeroxed at a cost of ten cents per page. Books and materials, which can be loaned, are loaned for a limited time, usually 12 days to one month - depending on the frequency the item is on loan, to Castro County Library, which then loans them to you the requesting citizen.

After Bivins Library receives the request, their librarians first ascertain if the books or book requested are available at Bivins Library. If Bivins Library has the items or item requested, they are mailed at special library rates, which is five cents for the first pound and two cents for each additional pound, to Castro

County Library. If the things requested are not available at Bivins Library, the request is relayed by teletype to the other resource centers. The nearest resource library having them, then mails them to Castro County Library.

Most telephoned requests arrive at Castro County Library two to three days after the call was placed. Requests made by letter arrive in three to seven days after the letter was posted in Dimmitt. One needs to allow for slower mail service over weekends and for the fact that Castro County Library is not open on Monday. Books borrowed from Major Resource Centers are returned to Castro County Library by the user.

## Financial Facts

Do you know what the entire world hoard of gold amounts to? Today there are about 40,000 tons of monetary gold in existence.

Those interested in arithmetic may figure the dollar value of 40,000 tons of gold. Gold is still pegged at \$32.00 per ounce.

Who determines the amount of currency in circulation? Actually it is the public.

When people want to use more currency, the amount in circulation goes up. This is particularly true around Christmas.

When the Treasury buys gold from a gold mining company, it comes in bricks. The bricks are small—about half the height of a building brick. Each brick weighs around 30 pounds. Such bricks bring \$14,000 each to the mining

company. Then they join the rest of the hoard at Fort Knox.

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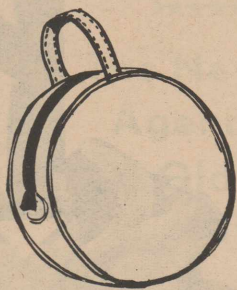

also large unexploited deposits of bituminous coal and lignite which will assume greater importance as the world demand for fuels and chemicals continues to increase. There are also large deposits of iron ore. As of 1957, Texas was the only producer of helium in the world.

#### PLANT LIFE

The native plant life of Texas is characterized by variety. The wide range of rainfall and temperature not within the state

are mainly accountable for the diverse character of the natural cover. Texas plant life can, rather arbitrarily, be divided into forest resources, grass resources, and arid-land vegetation.

THERE ARE more than 225 different tree species native to Texas. However, only a few of these species are of any commercial value. More than half of the forested area of the state is in East Texas, which is the center of commercial forest operation.

Almost three-fourths of Texas' 170 million acres of land are forests and grasslands. Range and stock farming are virtually dependent upon continuing grassland cover.

Arid-land vegetation may be said to include the mesquite woodlands, the Texas brushlands, and the Trans-Pecos cover of yucca, ocotillo, lechuguilla, guayule, maguey, creosote brush, and cacti.

#### ANIMAL LIFE

Deer, pronghorn antelope, elk, bighorn sheep, bear, pec-

cary or javelina, and tree squirrels are considered game animals in Texas. White-tailed deer and tree squirrels are the most important game animals.

Principal game birds of Texas include ducks, woodcock, brant, geese, snipe, plover, many species of shore birds, wild pigeons, prairie chickens wild turkey, quail and doves.

In the High Plains, cattle industry is becoming well-known because of the plentiful amount of grain sorghum.

THE NATURAL resources are a vital and important factor of any state. Demands upon natural resources are growing at a tremendous pace. More people and higher standards of living require more food, water, space for outdoor recreation, and more of the many other products and services provided by our resource base.

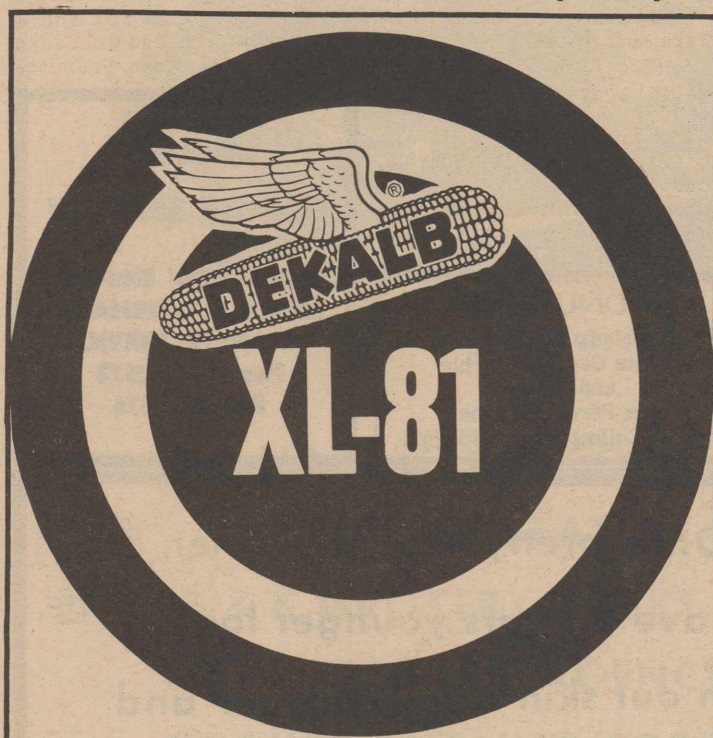

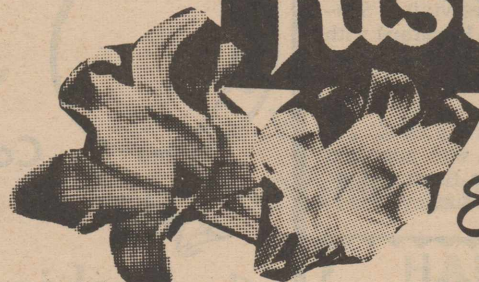

## Program On Drug Abuse Presented To Xi Mu Iota

An informational program on drug abuse was given Thursday evening to the Xi Mu Iota Chapter of Beta Sigma Phi. Detective Sergeant Jerry Austin of the Plainview Police Department was guest speaker.

Sgt. Austin displayed samples of marijuana, amphetamines, barbituates and LSD. He explained the effects each drug has on an individual and told of the growing use and abuse of each.

Amphetamines are stimulants which cause nervousness, tremors, visual distortions and unconsciousness, he explained.

Barbituates, he pointed out, are depressants. They cause sedation, intoxication, impaired reflexes and emotion instability.

Austin explained how hallucinogenic drugs, such as LSD, can cause permanent brain damage.

Use of marijuana and some of the other non-habit forming drugs can and do frequently lead a person to use or experiment with dangerous narcotics, Austin said, thus becoming addicts.

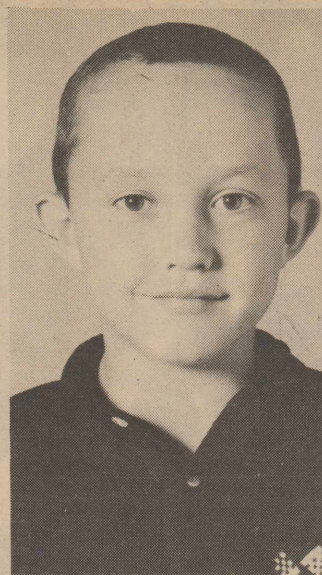

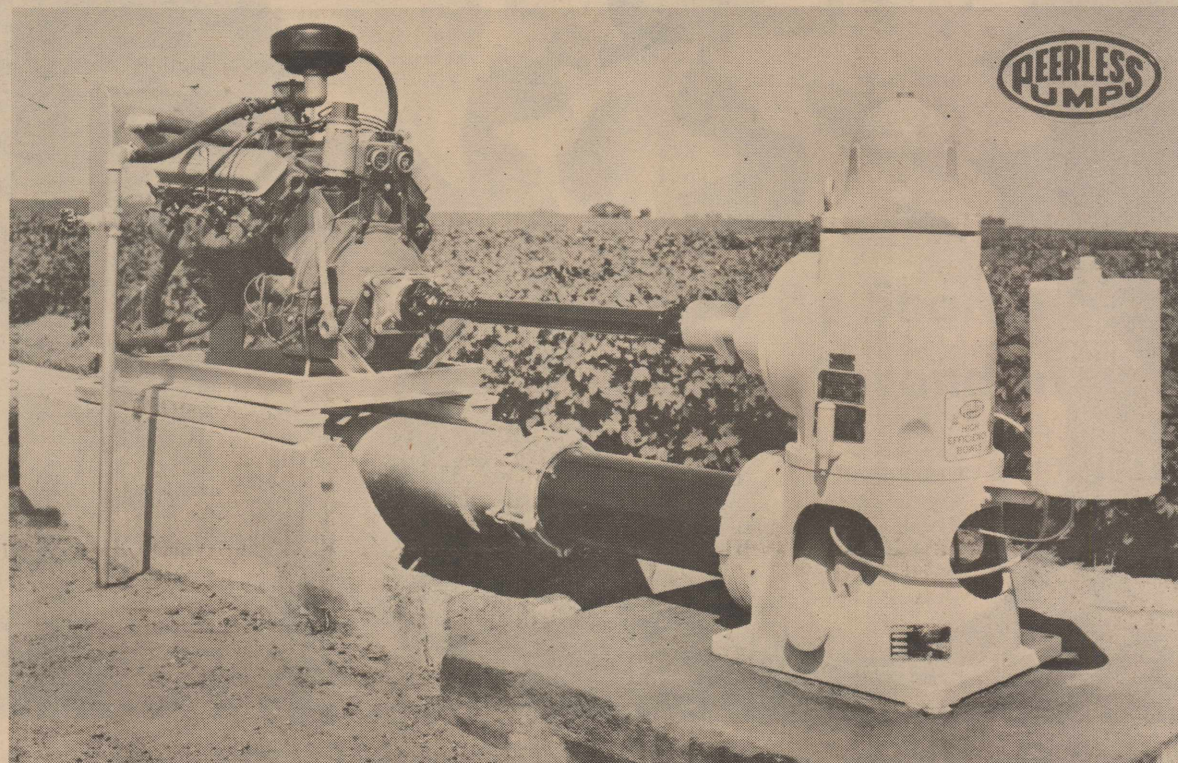

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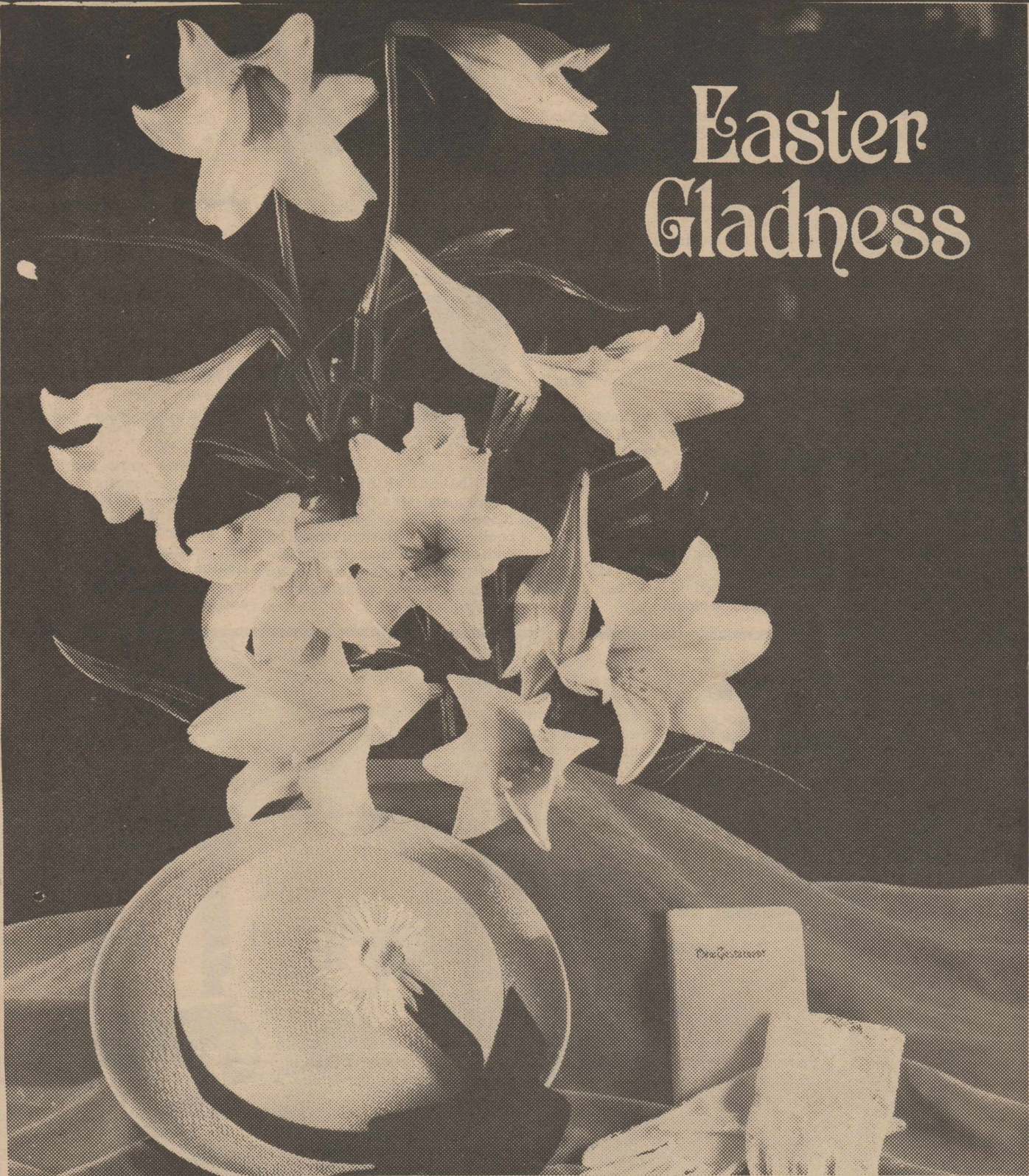


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# Easter Gladness

but she does enjoy the Bible stories she hears in Sunday School.

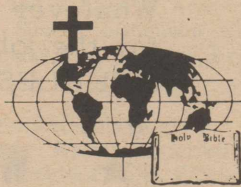
