Limit On Deep Plowing Is Removed; 12,000 Acres Worked

PMA offices at Amherst this week announced the lifting of the limit heretofore in effect on deep-plowing assistance. Since the plan was first put into effect, the amount of assistance for this operation has been limited to 50 per cent of the eligible cultivated land. Effective immediately, the limit is lifted, and farmers can go ahead and deep plow 100 per cent of their eligible land, if so desired. Since the plan first went into effect, about 12,000 acres of Lamb county and has been "deep plowed" under the program.

BREAD CRUMBS MAKE ONIONS STYLISH TREAT



According to the United States Department of Agriculture, the late onion crop has been a heavy one insuring a plentiful supply of big juicy onions — perfect for stuffing with seasoned bread crumbs.

BREAD-STUFFED ONIONS

4 large mild onions
1/4 cup butter or margarine
3 cups bread crumbs
1 teaspoon salt
1/8 teaspoon pepper
Dash paprika
1/4 teaspoon marjoram (optional)
2 tablespoons chopped parsley

Peel onions carefully. Cut a one to one-half inch slice from tops. Place onions in boiling water and cook about 20 minutes. Remove and drain well. While the onions are cooking, prepare the stuffing:

Melt butter in a frying pan or skillet. Stir in bread crumbs, salt, pepper and other seasonings. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until bread crumbs are lightly browned. When onions are cooked, remove centers leaving three layers of shells. The centers may be used as a base for creamed vegetables or in other dishes. Fill hollowed onions with bread-crumbs mixture. Place in shallow baking pan, add a little water to keep onions from burning on bottom. Bake at 400 F. (hot oven) 15 minutes. If desired, serve with tomato sauce.

Information For Veterans

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. I am a paralyzed veteran, and I received a \$10,000 grant from VA to build a "wheelchair home." I want to get a GI loan to finance the rest of the cost. Will my loan be subject to Regulation X, such as the limited period for repayment, and the like?

A. No. GI loans made to disabled veterans for the acquisition of specially-adapted housing are not subject to the terms of Regulation X.

Q. Both of my sons, on whom I was dependent, died recently as the result of injuries incurred during World War II. Is it possible for me to receive death compensation payments on behalf of both?

A. Yes. You must, of course, file a claim with the VA, establishing dependency, and VA must determine whether both deaths were service-connected.

Q. For some reason, I never received my addressed envelope this month for paying NSLI premiums to the VA. What should I do?

A. Make your premium payment as usual. And enclose enough information about yourself so that VA can readily identify your insurance account: your insurance number, full name and address, and date of birth.

Q. I'm planning to move, and I haven't yet received my NSLI dividend payment. Is VA permitted to forward my check to my new address?

A. Yes. But first you should take two steps: (1) notify the VA district office handling your insurance account of your new address, and (2) fill out a change of address form at your Post Office.

Special Services To Be Held At Emman. Lutheran

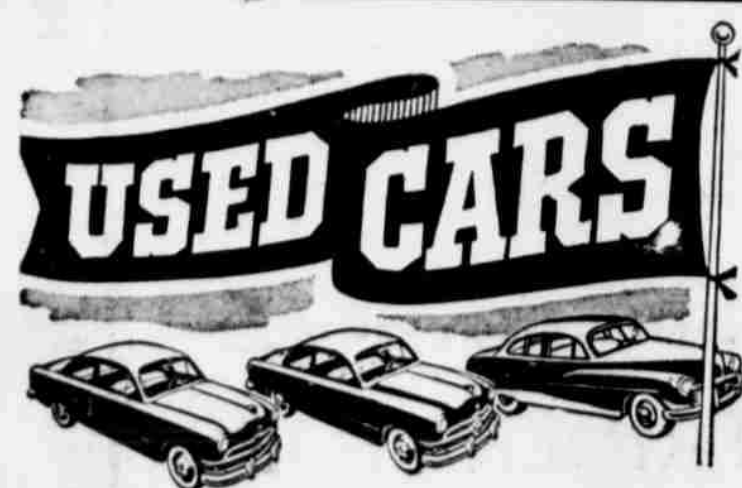

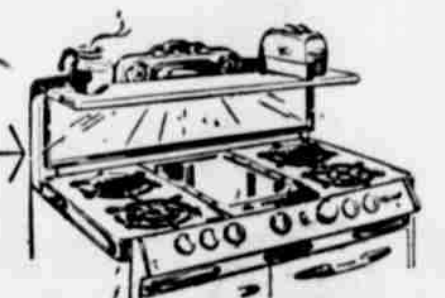

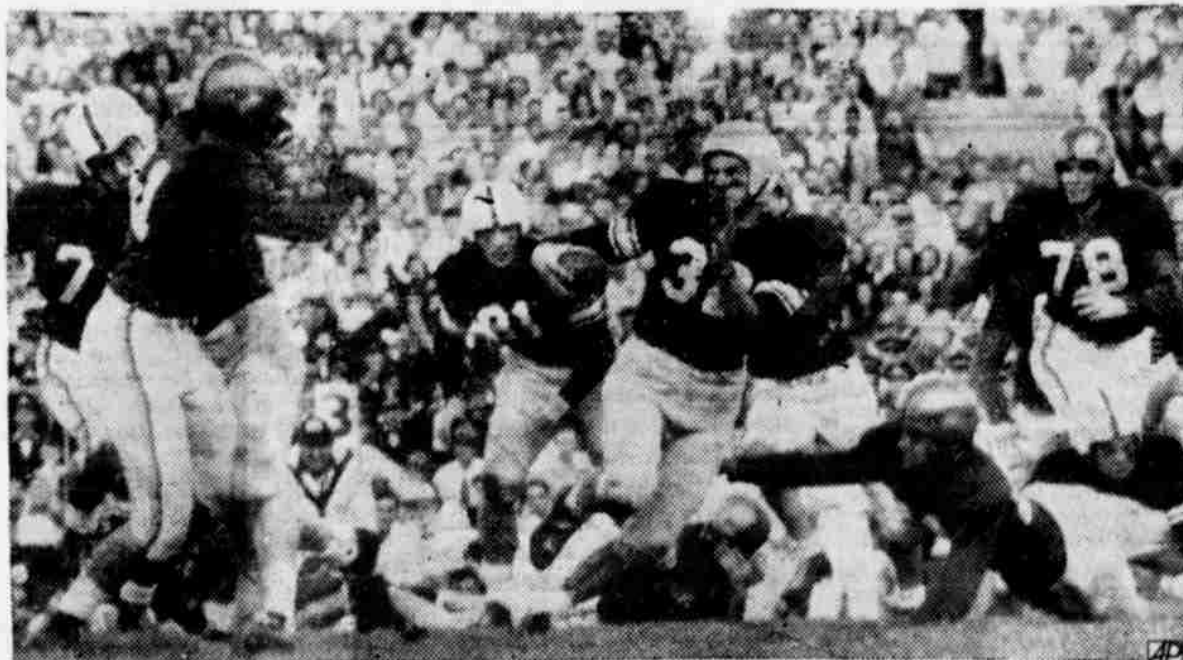
Whitharral Wins Third Conference Tilt To Tie For 4-B Second Place

March Of Dimes Must Be All-Out Effort

An eighteen day old baby girl—born in an iron lung herself—came down with bulbar polio.

A Livingston yell leader—cheered on a football game one night—died of polio three days later.

A prominent mother of three was attacked by the virus and lost the fight.

Although California led all other states in emergency equipment required during the year, the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis reported that Texas followed closely. By mid-October, the Lone Star State had received 62 life-giving respirators—shipped to hospitals by the March of Dimes organization.

As polio continued to take its toll in Texas, volunteer county officials of the NFIP—home from their regular pre-campaign planning meeting in Dal-

las—set gears in motion for the 1952 March of Dimes campaign.

"Commencing on January 2nd, 1952 instead of the traditional January 15th," Lloyd Gregory, state chairman, pointed out, "the March of Dimes must be an all-out, double-effort drive to assure funds for continuing care of patients from the epidemics of 1948, '49, and '50, and for new patients which we must expect during the remainder of 1951 and in 1952."

"Funds must be available," the MOD leader said, "to intensify research work carried on throughout the nation, seeking a preventative or cure. That's why we're organizing now throughout the State to conduct the most successful March of Dimes ever staged in Texas."

Destroy Enemies Of Cotton Quickly

Two arch enemies of the cotton farmer, boll weevils and pink bollworms, are utilizing the lush, tender growth that cotton plants have produced since the recent rains.

According to A. C. Gunter, extension entomologist of Texas A&M College, these insects are about the only beneficiaries from a late top-crop.

This new growth supplies the bugs with a bountiful supply of food which puts them in excellent condition for the winter hibernation period. In the case of pink bollworms, every late boll produced is a potential winter home for them. In the areas of the state where these two insect pests are found, Gunter urges every farmer to completely destroy all cotton stalks just as far ahead of the first killing frost as is possible.

This practice cuts off the food supply of the in-

sects, forces them into a starvation period and into a longer hibernation period which in turn decreases their possibilities of surviving the winter months ahead. The entomologist points out that the most successful stalk destruction programs are those which are conducted on a community and county-wide basis.

If the cotton stalks are destroyed at once, there is still time to plant a winter cover crop. By combining the insect control and winter legume planting programs, Gunter says cotton farmers will be following practices that can mean better crop yields next year and more profit. Production costs will be lower because less time and fewer pounds of insecticides will be needed for fighting bugs and cotton following fertilized legumes generally produces considerably more lint per acre.

Health Talks

Prepared by the State Medical Association of Texas

Many mental "breakdowns" are strictly mental, that is without any physical changes any place in the body. But there are other mental disorders which stem actually from physical changes that are reflected in the capacity of the mind to maintain the proper level of thought processes.

Some mental disorders result from faulty formation of the brain structure, some result from alterations in the brain structure, and some result from improper function of other parts of the body which in turn affect the function of the brain.

Mental deficients are those born without the proper "ingredients" for the full development of the mind. These persons, also called feeble-minded, remain "childish" all their lives, never achieving independence. There are three degrees of feeble-mindedness: idiocy, imbecility, and morosity. The idiot, often speechless and helpless, unable to guard himself against common physical dangers, remains an infant, capable of accomplishing only such things as a three-year-old child might achieve. The imbecile may grow mentally only as far as the pre-school child, from 3 to 7 years

of age, usually learning to talk and to perform very simple tasks such as the normal child of that age group can do. The moron, while still a "child," may be taught many of the things that a 7 to 12 year old child learns but fails to apply his learning in an intelligent way.

With mentally deficient individuals the mind just stops developing at the age levels mentioned above. Like children, they remain always in a "self-world," never replacing or adjusting that "self" in association with others or with life situations. When people and problems come in contact with them, they become confused and react in a number of different ways, nearly always extravagantly.

This can best be explained by the examples of emotions or general changes which affect the whole mind, in both normal and abnormal people. Excitement, depression, apathy, sleep walking, loss of memory, hallucinations, delusions of grandeur or persecution, obsessions of fear and suspicion are all "feelings" which affect all parts of the mind. In mental deficients or persons with mental disorders of many types these "feelings" are greatly exaggerated with excitement becoming a wild, abandoned excitement; with depression becoming an extreme of misery; with apathy becoming a complete blankness of feeling may be predominant characteristic of a mental deficient; he may swing rapidly from one to the other extreme but it will be an extreme of each feeling. The mental deficient has the instincts of the normal person but none of the restraints of mature mental attitudes.

Dementia is the name applied to those mental changes or deteriorations that occur during life. The best example, perhaps, is senile dementia, in which the structure of the brain undergoes changes that replace the world of other people and the world of situations with only that one world of self.

It is interesting to note that sometimes the aged person who actually shows the most extreme changes in the physical structure of the brain maintains the reality of the other worlds and his relation to them. On the other hand, some aged persons who show slight deterioration of the physical structure of the brain will retire completely into that "one world," the

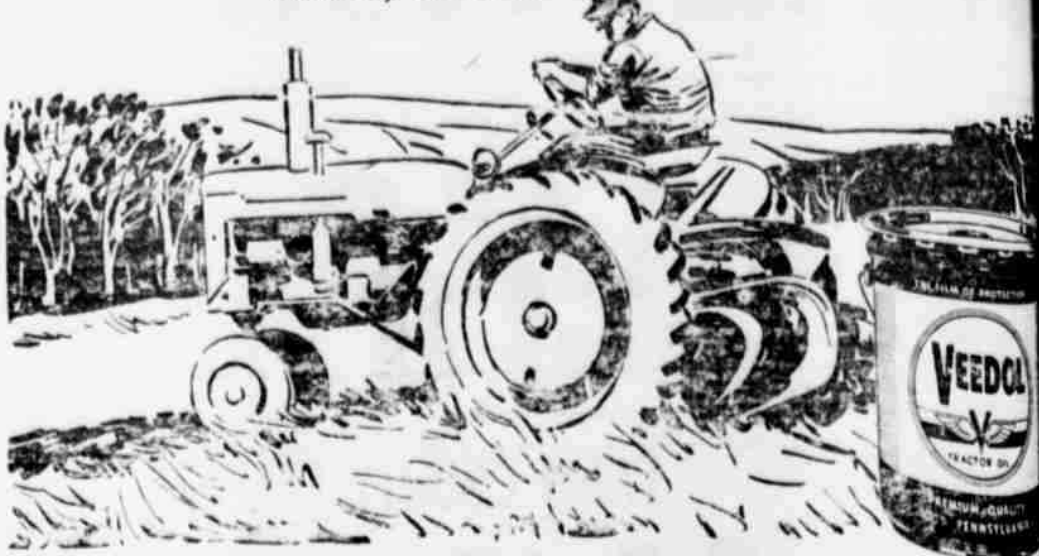

Soils can be protected against winter erosion losses by providing them with a blanket of green. The blanket can be made of adapted winter legumes or small grains and both can be used as supplemental grazing crops.

Loss To Livestock Producers From Cattle Grubs Amounts To \$65 Million

Cattle grubs are profit grabbers, when livestock producers fail to control them. The damage caused by these pests is charged back to the producer in the form of lower prices for beef animals and lower milk production from the dairy cows.

According to James A. Deer, associate extension entomologist of Texas A&M College, the annual loss to livestock producers from cattle grub damages amounts to about \$65 million. Most of it could be added to the national farm income if cattle producers would control grubs.

Deer recommends the use of a power sprayer—with a pressure of 200 to 400 pounds. Lower pressures decrease the effectiveness of the treatment, he says. Animals should be sprayed while being held in a chute and the spray nozzle should

be held no further than four inches from the backs of the animals. It is best, he adds, to use a full gallon of spray on each animal and from 10 to 15 seconds are required for making a thorough application.

The spray material should consist of 7½ pounds of 5 per cent rotenone dust for each 100 gallons of water. Mix it thoroughly and his is often a rather difficult job because the fine rotenone dust is hard to wet. This mixture, says Deer, is the cheapest and most effective treatment for controlling cattle grubs.

The first application should be made about 3 weeks after the first grubs begin to show up in the backs of animals. Treatment should be repeated at three week intervals for as long as needed. Grubs normally begin making their appearance about this time of the

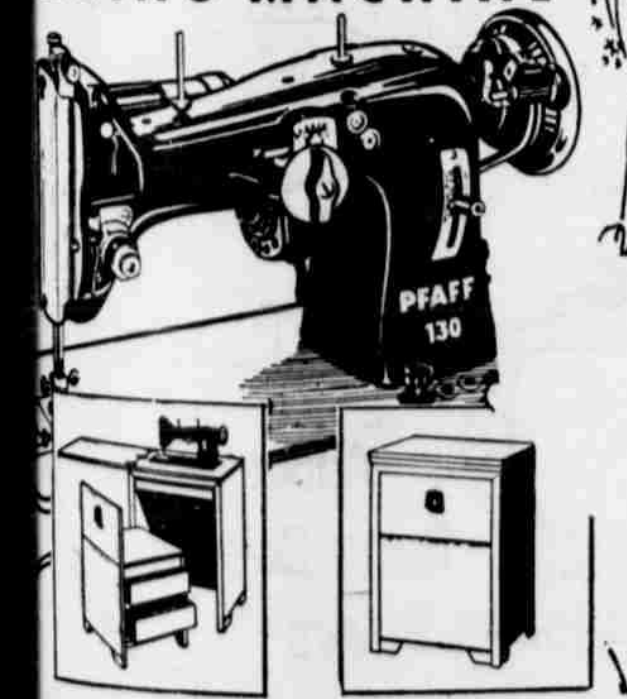

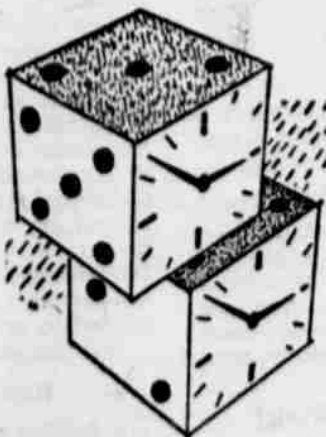

The football season is big-date season for most high school and college girls. Even the poorest freshman can manage to buy student tickets or wrangle duets to take his girl to the big game.

There are three types of football dates ... the local game, the out-of-town game and the week-end game.

If the game is in her home town, it gives a girl the opportunity to change her attire before she goes out to a party in the evening, either with the same boy or another; the out-of-town game means she must dress appropriately for game and dinner and possibly dancing; the week-end game means she must be prepared to dress for whatever entertainment her crowd suggests.

Type Of Soil
Determines When
To Plow Land

WOOSTER, O. (AP)—Whether farmers should plow their land in fall or spring depends largely upon soil types found on their farms, the Ohio State University agricultural experiment station says.

Tests over a 14-year period indicate that spring plowing is preferable on light soils. If plowed in the fall the ground has a tendency to become compacted by spring.

On heavier soils tests indicate that late fall plowing gives as good or better granulation of the soil than spring plowing.

Barbara Ann has toured Europe and recently played a successful run in London before signing with the Wirtz extravaganza which now is in its 15th season.

Railroad workers are represented by 23 standard unions. By mutual agreement, 20 of these unions—comprising about 1,200,000 men, or more than 90%—are working under wages and rules agreed to by them and the railroads. But leaders of three unions—with only about 130,000 men, or less than 10%—still refuse, after more than a year of negotiations, to accept similar wage and rules agreements. These are even more favorable than the terms recommended by the Emergency Board appointed by the President.

Time to settle.

Yes, it certainly seems to be finally about time that the leaders of the three unions stop the delaying tactics—their quibbling. But the leaders of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen, and the Order of Railway Conductors continue to refuse. They continue a course of dillying and dallying. It is definitely time to

END THIS QUIBBLING

On June 15, 1950, an Emergency Board appointed by the President under the terms of the Railway Labor Act—an Act largely fathered by the unions themselves—made its recommendations on certain wage and working conditions ("rules" in railroad language) which had been in dispute between employees and the railroads.

More Than 90% of Employees Accept
Since then, terms equal to or better than the Board recommendations have been accepted by about 1,200,000 railroad employees—more than 90% of the total of all workers. They are represented by 20 of the 23 standard railroad unions.

Less Than 10% Refuse
But three unions—with about 130,000 men, or less than 10% of the total—have refused to accept, even after months of negotiations. These three unions are the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen, and the Order of Railway Conductors. These are three of the so-called "operating" unions. Already the highest paid men in the industry, their leaders demand still further advantages over other workers.

In all, there are about 270,000 operating employees. But not all of them, by any means, are represented by BLE, BLF&E, or ORC. As a matter of fact, less than half—132,000 to be exact—are in these three unions. More than half—about 140,000—are in other unions, principally the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen. What makes the whole situation so hard to understand is that these 140,000 operating employees are working under wages and rules which the leaders of the other 130,000 say they cannot agree to.

What Do the Railroads Offer?
They offer these three unions the same settlement which was contained in a Memorandum of Agreement signed at the White House on December 21, 1950, by four brotherhoods and the railroads. Later these brotherhoods sought to repudiate this agreement. But on May 25, 1951, the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen signed a complete agreement carrying out the

principles of the Memorandum Agreement of December 21. They have been working under this agreement since May 25.

What About Wages?
Under the terms of the agreement, yard engineers, firemen and conductors would now be receiving a wage increase of \$.34 an hour (\$2.72 a day) and road engineers, firemen and conductors would now be receiving an increase of 19½ cents an hour (\$1.56 per day). Large sums of retroactive pay have already accrued and if the agreement is carried out, will be paid promptly.

What About "Cost of Living" Increases?
The White House Agreement includes an "escalator" clause under which wages will be geared to changes in the Government's cost-of-living index. Two such increases—April and July, 1951—have already been paid to the 90% of railroad employees covered by signed agreements.

What About the 40-Hour Week?
The White House Agreement calls for the establishment of the 40-hour week in principle, for employees in yard service. The employees can have it any time after January 1, 1952, provided the manpower situation is such that the railroads can get enough men to perform the work with reasonable regularity at straight time rates. If the parties do not agree on the question of availability of manpower, the White House Agreement provides arbitration by a referee appointed by the President.

What Else Do the Union Leaders Demand?
The continued quibbling of the leaders of the three unions has to do principally with

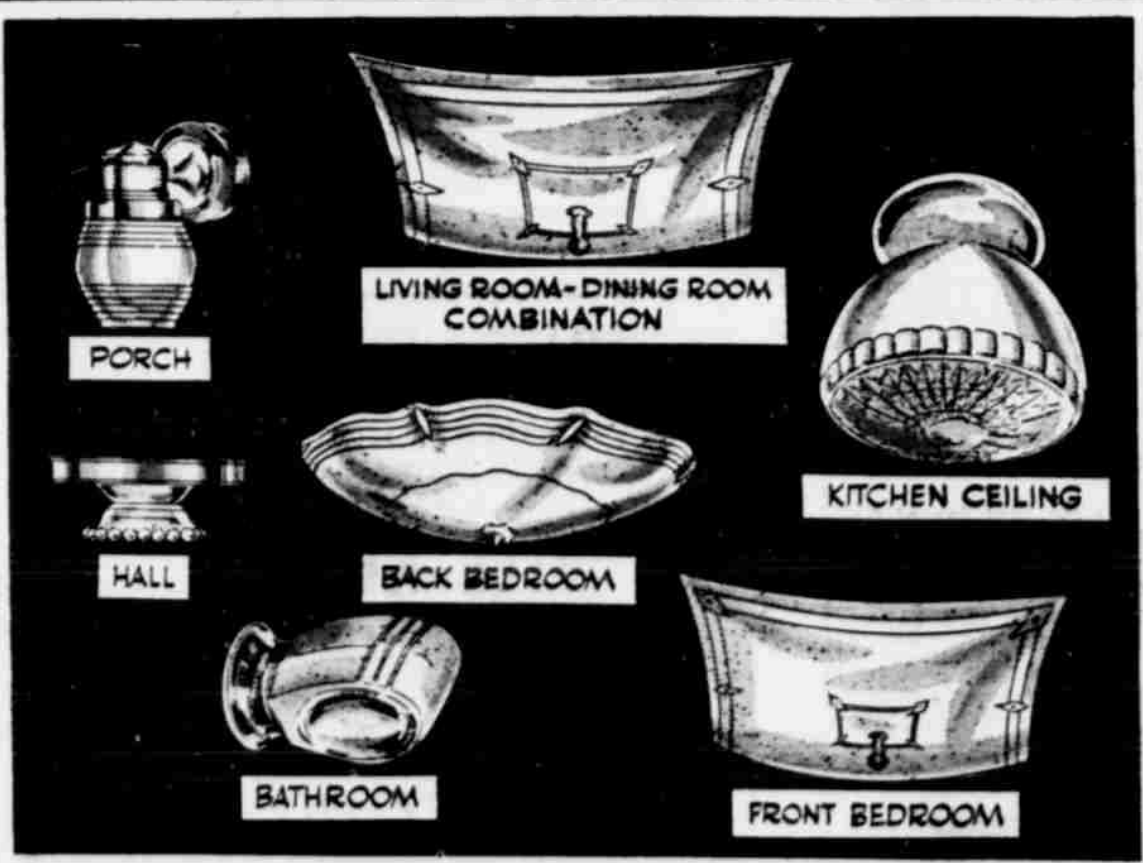
rules changes, which have already agreed to by the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen. Of these, the principles seem to be that having to do with "interdivisional service"—which take in two or more semiautonomous tracts.

The union leaders would bar progress and efficiency in the industry, and service to the public, by maintaining a situation where they can arbitrarily divide up the railroad from establishing such a divisional run. The carriers propose if a railroad wishes to set up an interdivisional run, the railroad and the union should try to agree on such run and conditions which should surround its establishment, and if the railroad and union can't agree, the matter will be submitted to arbitration.

But the three union leaders still insist on their own rules.

Rules Can Be Arbitrated
The railroads have not only offered the three unions the same rules agreed to by the BRT and covered by the White House Agreement, but have even agreed to submit such rules to arbitration.

The Industry Pattern Is Fixed
With the pattern so firmly established in the railroad industry, it seems fair to get that the leaders of BLE, BLF&E, and ORC stop their quibbling and action to make the railroad labor pattern 100% complete. Certainly today's economic and international situation call for a united front. And certainly no good son has been advanced why these unions should be preferred over all other railroad employees.

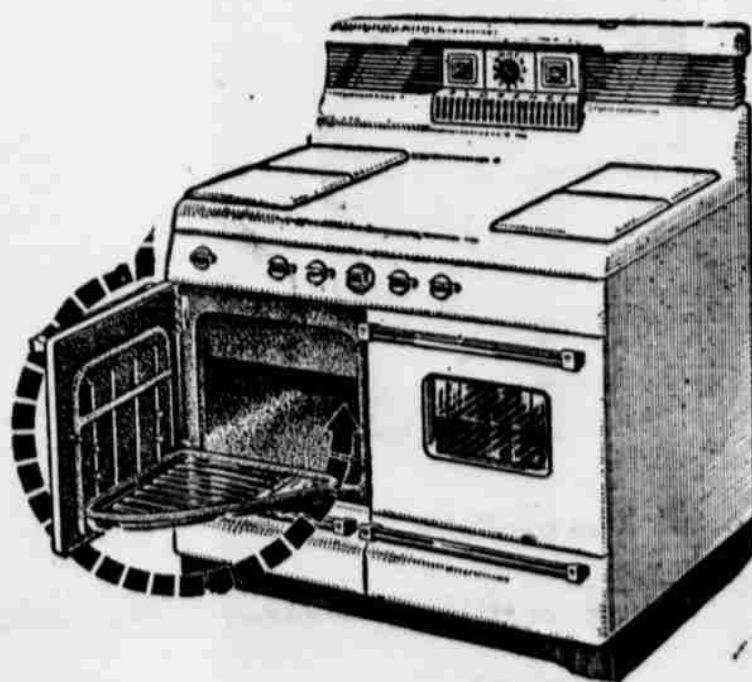

"A Man Called Peter"



NEW YORK—Just out on the nation's book shelves is "A Man Called Peter," the story of Peter Marshall and his marriage. An ex-newspaperman who received his bachelor of divinity degree at Columbia Theological Seminary in Decatur, Ga., Peter Marshall became one of the most forceful and remarkable Presbyterian ministers of recent years. Dr. Marshall was appointed Chaplain of the United States Senate in 1947 and he held this office until his death in 1949. He was widely known for the pungency of his prayers and the originality of his sermons. His colorful career included jobs as a steel mill worker, ditch digger and newspaper employee. As his wife, Catherine Marshall tells the story in the book just published by McGraw-Hill Book company here, she quotes significant excerpts from her husband's sermons during his 10 years as pastor of the New York Avenue church in Washington, D.C. 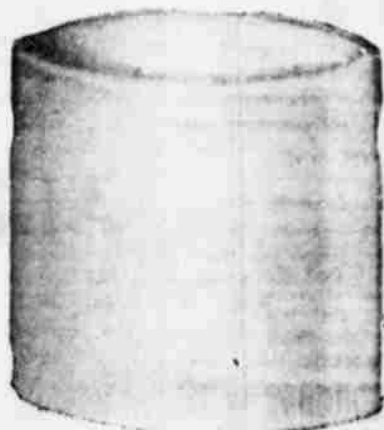
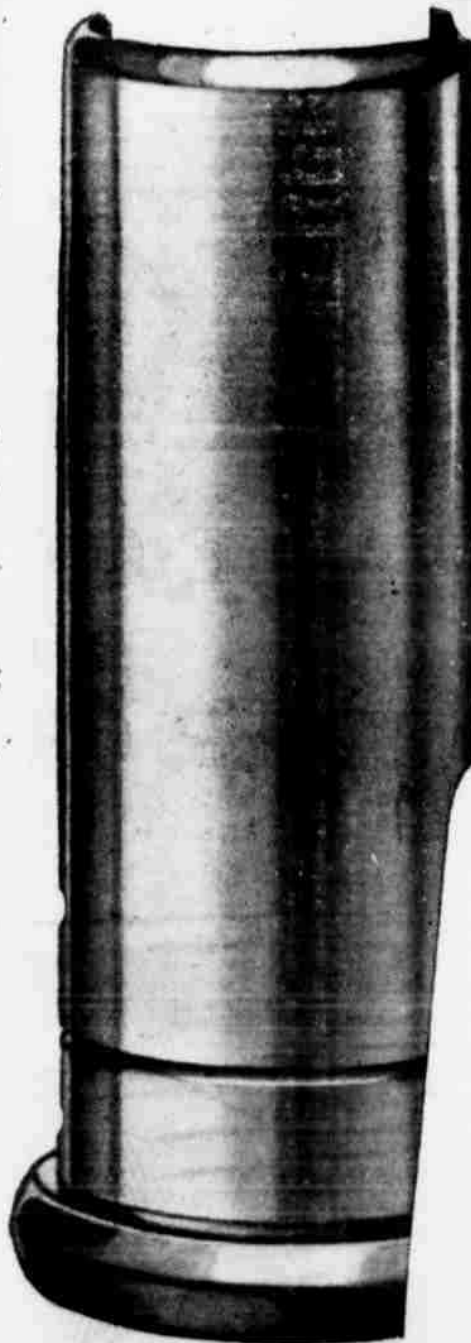
