Two Unmasked Bandits Raid Mullin, Texas, Bank McAdoo Sounds Rally Against Any Wet Candidate

Flings Challenge On Smith Attitude For Enforcement

Declare Liquor Interests
Have Captured Political
Power In Both New York
And Maryland.

ENFORCEMENT IN THE WHITE HOUSE NEEDED

Suggests Federal Govern-
ment Give Financial Aid
To States In Efforts to
Apply Pro Law.

(By Associated Press)
RICHMOND, Va., Feb. 1.—The
attitude of Governor Alfred E.
Smith toward prohibition enforce-
ment was directly challenged here
tonight by William G. McAdoo in
a speech sounding a rallying cry
against the election of any "wet"
to the presidency.

Making his first public utterance
on the subject since Governor
Smith's boom for the Democratic
presidential nomination assumed its
present proportions, Mr. McAdoo
contradicted some of his old rival's
recent statements, declared the
"liquor interests" had captured po-
litical power both in New York and
in Maryland and argued that to
expect prohibition enforcement from
a president hostile to prohibition
was "up to its face an absurdity."

He said the issue was one that
must be fought "to a conclusion"

in the campaign of 1928.
Enforcement in White House
The speaker's need to put law
enforcement in the "white house,"
said Mr. McAdoo, "attempts is be-
ing made to convince the country
that no matter if a wet is elected
president, the Constitution and by-
laws will be enforced. This is both
unsound and untrue. The White
house in the hands of liquor in-
terests would be a veritable Gibraltar
of offensive operations and the
doom of the Eighteenth amendment."

not guilty. Bond was returned, and
the case taken to the grand jury for
trial on February 14.
Moore was slain while standing
near a gate which he had closed
and refused to open.

LINDY MOVES ON

Due For 75-Mile Hop To
San Juan Today

ST. THOMAS, VIRGIN ISLANDS,
Feb. 1. (P)—The freedom of the
city today was conferred on Col.
Charles A. Lindbergh by his fellow
Americans of this little island in
the Caribbean after a day of innum-
erable honors and enthusiastic
fetes.
Col. Lindbergh tomorrow will
make one of the shortest hops of
his good will tour, taking off for
San Juan, Porto Rico, only 75 miles
away.
Dispatches from Havana said that
four o'clock in the afternoon of
February 8 is being tentatively con-
sidered as the time of Col. Lindbergh's
arrival there.

Chauncy Gets 25 Years In

Ark., were robbed in a Texarkana
rooming house.

NO ARRESTS MADE

Many Still Lack Auto
Licenses, However

While a large number of auto-
mobile owners have not yet taken
out their license plates for 1928,
they kept off the streets yesterday,
according to John Keller, state high-
way license inspector, who says that
no arrests of motorists using old
license plates were arrested yester-
day.
Owners may yet pay for their
licenses, but after midnight Tues-
day night a 25 per cent penalty was
automatically attached.

SOS From British Steamer, Aground Halts Broadcasts

Ship Dashes On Shoals At
Cape Off Delaware; Ot-
her Ships Steam to Rescue
Of Boat In Distress.

(By Associated Press)
LEWES, Del., Feb. 1.—The British
steamship Elswick Tower sent
out an S O S tonight after having
gone aground on the Hen and
Chicken shoals at Cape Henlopen.
Several vessels in the vicinity re-
plied that they would reach the
stranded ship "within an hour or
two." Among these was the steam-
er Edwidge, whose master notified
the Elswick Tower that he would
stand by until all danger had passed.

The S O S halted all broadcasting
by eastern radio stations until 10:55
p. m., at that time the coast guard
cutter was standing by the disabil-
ity of ship and another cutter from
Cape May base was on its way to
the scene.

GOERNER TRIAL LAGS

Only Eight Accepted Out of
Venire of 275

RASTROP, Feb. 1. (P)—Jury se-
lection for the trial of Ed Goerner,
farmer, charged with murdering
his wife with a buckshot charge,
dragged so Wednesday that only
eight jurors had been accepted,
with two venires totaling 275 men,
exhausted.
An additional panel of 100 men
was ordered, returnable to Thurs-
day's session.

REMUS APPEAL

Lawyers Still Seek to Open
Asylum Doors

LIMA, Ohio, Feb. 1. (P)—Attor-
neys for George Remus, Chin-
ese, former "bootleg king," today
filed a petition in the court of ap-
peals for leave to file a writ of
habeas corpus to bring about Remus'
release from the state hospital for
the criminal insane here. The
petition is returnable at 2:30 p. m.
February 3.

HARRINGTON REPLACED

Walshall New Head State
Board of Control

AUSTIN, Feb. 1. (P)—The majority
faction of the state board of
control displaced Dr. H. H. Har-
rington as chairman Wednesday
and elected R. B. Walshall, who
voted for himself, he said, to "re-
move discord, expedite business and
better serve the interests of the
people."

Wish For Straight Legs Threatens To Have Fatal Climax for Stenographer

Chicago Girl's Quest for More Perfect Limbs Leads To
Plastic Surgery Operation; Gangrene Sets In And
Already Legs Are Amputated; Life In Danger

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, Feb. 1.—A wish for
straight legs has cost Miss Sadie
Holland, 36, stenographer, the limbs
which were slightly bowed and to-
night her life was in danger.
Two weeks ago Dr. Henry J.
Schireson, plastic surgeon operated
on the young woman's legs. A week
ago Dr. William Van Doren, the
Holland family physician was called
by Miss Holland's parents. He
was said to have reported gangrene
had developed in both legs
and to have directed that she be
removed to another hospital. There
last Friday Dr. Paul Magnuson
amputated both legs above the
knees.

York today Dr. Schireson asserted
the operation would have been suc-
cessful but for complications

Oklahoma Mine Explosion Takes Toll of 3 Lives

Sparks From Drill Set Off
Gas, Is Belief Of Those
Making Probe In Hart-
shorne Tragedy.

SEVENTEEN OTHERS ENTOMBED, RESCUED

Blast Occurred 500 Feet
Below Surface; Bodies of
Three Victims Were Bad-
ly Burned.

(By Associated Press)
HARTSHORNE, Okla., Feb. 1.—
Three miners were killed by a gas
explosion in mine number 7 of the
Rock Island Coal and Mining com-
pany one mile northeast of here
tonight.
Seventeen others, imprisoned by
flames and fumes made their es-
cape through a side entry, with-
out injury.
The dead were Frank Russell
and Mike Russell, brothers, coal
cutters, and Frank Davis, pumper.
Miners expressed belief that the
explosion was caused by sparks from
a drill operated by the Rus-
sell brothers. The three bodies
were badly burned. The men died
a few minutes after they were
brought to the surface. The blast
occurred at one of the entries of
a tunnel 500 feet below the sur-
face.

A United States Bureau of Mines
safety car was sent from Hart-
shorne and sent crews immedi-
ately into the mine. P. N. Hagen who
was in charge of the mine, which
was due to work shortly after the
explosion, in clearing the mine of
gas. It was estimated that the
mine would be in operation again
Thursday afternoon.

Ritchie Attacks Hypocrisy, Sham

Says Religion Should Never
Be Factor In Right For
Office; Favors Placing
Pro Issue With States.

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Feb. 1.—The Amer-
ican voter will be stirred to rene-
wed interest in politics, only when
political leaders cease to regard
hypocrisy, cowardice, and buncombe
as political assets, Governor Al-
bert C. Ritchie, of Maryland said
tonight in an address to the Brook-
lyn Bar Association.
"America cannot afford to scrap
principles and institutions which
have been tried and tested," he con-
tinued. "The stability of our gov-
ernment and our national happiness
rests upon the spirit of tolerance,
but with law breeding more law,
power breeding more power, one be-
gins to wonder where the goddess
of liberty is to find an abiding
place."

"The growth of centralized gov-
ernmental power is an 'evil not
confined to America,' he said, but
has appeared in Europe, 'where
dictatorships rose as they have
risen after every great war in history.'"
"A man's religion ought never to
be a factor in his right to hold of-
fice, whether the lowest in the state
or the highest in the land," he said,
"but the old beliefs and the old is-
sues are fast passing. The things
which stir human emotions now are
prohibition, religious intolerance
and fundamentalism."

"This may be due to the grow-
ing industrialism of today, the
growing urbanism of America, or
the amazing change in the theory

ANOTHER PARIS HOP

Costes and LeBrix to Try
"Graveyard" Flight

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 1. (P)—
Dieudonne Costes and Joseph Le-
brix, the French fliers who were
first to make a non-stop flight
across the South Atlantic, have
definitely decided to attempt a
Paris to New York flight this com-
ing summer at a date yet to be de-
cided.
The aviators, on their way to
New York after touring South
America by air, announced the
plan at a dinner given them by
Dwight W. Morrow, American am-
bassador to Mexico.

Hickman Murder Details Given To Jury Wednesday

Slayer's Confessions For
First Time Become Part
Of Court Record; Delay
Trial for Hold-up.

OTHER TRAITS OF SLAYER REVEALED

Was Thorough Egoist In
Addition to Other Fail-
ings; Others Tell About
Characteristics.

(By Associated Press)
HALL OF JUSTICE, LOS AN-
GELES, Feb. 1.—The detailed evi-
dence of the kidnapping, killing and
murdering of Marian Parker re-
ceived its initial introduction into
the sanity trial of William Edward
Hickman late today. The crime, to
which the youth pleaded "not
guilty by reason of insanity" was
laid before the jury by the first
defense witness put on the stand,
and by reading of Hickman's writ-
ten confession.

Before court adjourned, the pris-
oner's second or so-called "motive
confession," also was submitted to
the jurors. Defense Attorney Walsh
read the personally written account
of the crime.

The confessions, the essence of
which previously had been publish-

place every aspirant to office defi-
nitely on record as friend or foe
of prohibition.

NEGRO MOVED

Fear Mob Violence for the
Slayer of Officers

JACKSON, Miss., Feb. 1. (P)—
Green Kirk, negro, was being held
in the county jail at Vicksburg to-
night pending the filing of charges
in Simpson county for the killing
of two Simpson county officers.
Sheriff J. E. Smith of Simpson
county said over long distance tele-
phone tonight.
There was a "rumor" of possible
mob violence, the sheriff said,
which he said also had something
to do with moving the negro to
Vicksburg.

TRAIN DERAILED

Eight Hurt As Illinois Cen-
tral Train Wrecks

UNION CITY, Tenn., Feb. 1. (P)—
Illinois Central train No. 4, bound
from New Orleans to Chicago, was
derailed at Gibbs, Tenn., late to-
night causing slight injuries to
Charles P. Gould, of New Orleans,
according to reports reaching here.
Every car except the first two were
reportedly turned over when the train
left the rails. Seven people suf-
fered bruises and minor injuries.

Franco-American Treaty Containing Declaration Against War Is Ready

Will Be Signed On Sesquicentennial of First Pact Be-
tween Two Republics; Marks Start of America's
New Policy Favoring Arbitration Treaties

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—The
new Franco-American arbitration
pact, embodying a declaration
against war as an instrument of
national policy, will be signed next
Monday, the sesquicentennial of
the first treaty entered into be-
tween the two republics.
Word of the final agreement on
terms of the new treaty reached
the state department from Paris
late today. It means fulfillment of
the original French desire for sig-
nature of the new peace pact on
the anniversary date although the
root arbitration treaty it will re-
place does not expire until Feb. 27.
It represents also a beginning on
the making over of all American
arbitration treaties in the light of
the pilot Franco-American pledge
of continuing friendship into what
the Washington administration be-

ASK ABOUT PARDON

Bradley Says Benton Death
Sentence Deserved

District Attorney Durwood Brad-
ley yesterday received from the
state board of pardons a telegram
asking his opinion as to whether
or not the trial of Robert Lee Ben-
ton, alias Robert Stanley, charged
with murder and sentenced to die
at the Crosbyton court, was fair.
Mr. Bradley telegraphed in re-
ply that in his opinion if the death
sentence was ever justified it was
justified in that case, and that the
trial was fair.

Time Lock Theft At Chicago Turns Out To Be Fraud

Bank Teller Who Told Po-
lice He Was Kidnaped
and Six Others Are In-
dicted In Case.

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, Feb. 1.—With most of
the loot recovered and seven persons
under indictment, Chicago police
tonight had "cleaned up" the \$20-
000 time lock robbery of the Indus-
trial State bank which three days
ago baffled authorities.

The seven persons, including
James Dillon, bank teller who po-
lice said confessed the plot to
"frame" the robbery, were indicted
under three counts by the grand
jury after only a half hour of hear-
ing evidence and shortly later were
arraigned in court, all of them
pleading not guilty. A hearing was
set for Friday.

The seven were indicted for rob-
bery, conspiracy to commit robbery
and conspiracy to commit grand
larceny, the bank teller implicating
the six others in his confession to
the police, the authorities said. Dil-
lon at first claimed he had been
kidnaped and held prisoner in the
bank until the time lock permitted
entrance to the vault.

BULLET MARKS SHOWN

Silent Wall Is Testimony In
Hill Trial

OTTAWA, Ill., Feb. 1. (P)—A
dramatic account of an elderly wo-
man, shot and dragged to a base-
ment grave, might have been told
by a bullet-scarred wall in the
Harry Hill murder trial today.
Its face only, however, betrayed
to the courtroom crowd the secrets
it held, and left to imaginations the
reconstruction of the scene the fa-
tal night early last August. It was
then, the state said, that the
20-year-old son killed his mother,
wealthy divorcee wife of Dr. H. C.
Hill, oculist.

IN PAUL'S DEATH CELL

Ratiff Spends Night Where
Partner Died

PORT WORTH, Feb. 1. (P)—
When Marshall Ratiff, "Santa
Claus" in the robbery of the First
National bank at Cisco, two days
before Christmas, spent last night
in Tarrant county jail, he was
within the walls where his pal,
Charles Davis, confederate in the
robbery, died. Davis, mortally
wounded in the flight from the
bank, was brought to Port Worth
for safe keeping. He died in his
cell here on Christmas Eve after
he asked, "is this Christmas day?"

Lock Cashier, Woman Bookkeeper and Four Customers In Vault, Seize Cash And Make Flight With Fast Roadster

Total Loss \$1765 At Bank
Located 25 Miles West of
Brownwood; Raid Was at
3 o'clock.

POSSE OF 100 MEN STARTED ON TRAIL

Well Groomed Bandits
Staged Hold-up Before
Bank Officials Were
Aware of Presence.

(By Associated Press)
MULLIN, Feb. 1.—Two unmask-
ed bandits robbed the Mullin State
bank of \$1,765 shortly before 3
o'clock this afternoon, locked R. H.
Patterson, cashier, Miss Birdie
Burkett, bookkeeper, and four
customers in a vault and escaped
in a speedy roadster.

The bandits exchanged cars
about eight miles out of town and
headed toward Comanche. Late
this afternoon a posse of a hun-
dred or more citizens were trailing
the fugitives.

The bandits, well groomed and
apparently about 25, came into the
bank together, according to Mr.
Patterson and before any one in
the bank was aware of their inten-
tion had the bank officials and the
customers covered. The leader, a
dark-complexioned man, held two
revolvers on Patterson and two
customers who were talking with
the banker while the second man
covered the two customers who
were standing beside a check table.

"Put 'em up," the leader told
Patterson and his associates. He
then commanded the customers
and bank employees to "get back in-
to the back end and keep quiet."
The second robber emptied the
cash drawer in the cashier's cage
while the leader backed the four
men and the woman into the vault.
After scooping up all cash in
the vault, the bandit slammed the
door of the vault and locked it. They
then strolled unhurriedly outside
and entered the awaiting automo-
bile.

Patterson procured a screw driver
from the vault and took the
lock off permitting their escape, he
said.

ANOTHER PRODUCER

Howard County Gets Sec-
ond Good Will

SAN ANGELO, Feb. 1. (P)—How-
ard county Wednesday registered its
second producer of consequences
from the lime when Owens
and Sloan's No. 2 Dora Roberts flowed
170 barrels the first hour from 2-
900 feet, after being agitated with
a swab. It is an offset to Magnolia
No. 1 Dora Roberts, which came
in last fall and is averaging around
3,000 barrels a day.

MEXICAN BATTLE

Report Fray Between Fed-
erals and Church

ASK CASE DISMISSED

Defense Seeks to Slide Out
Of Oil Probe

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1. (P)—Con-
tending the government had failed
to prove a single allegation in its
criminal contempt actions against
Harry F. Sinclair, William J. Burns
and their four associates, defense
counsel today asked Justice Fred-
erick L. Siddons in the supreme
court of the District of Columbia
to dismiss the case.
The defense move followed the
court's refusal to strike from the
records the testimony of William J.
McMullin, the government's star
witness.

Dempsey Has Retired, Says Rickard; Champion Will Meet Risko-Sharkey, Heene-Delaney Winner.

Billy Gibson, Tunney's manager, had conferred with Rickard during the day and the announcement came shortly after they had finished their discussion. Gibson said he and Tunney "had decided to string along with Rickard who has what seems to be a very plausible method of developing one or more contenders this year."

He expressed disappointment that a definite selection of an opponent was not made today.

Tunney received the announcement with little display of interest. "My chief concern right now is my golf game," he said.

"All Rickard has to do is to supply the boxers and I will do the boxing."

The question of Dempsey's retirement, he said, was of "more concern to Rickard than to me."

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AMENDMENTS TO THE PAN-AMERICAN AIR TREATY

The United States government seeks to encourage commercial aviation throughout this hemisphere, by promoting cooperation among all its countries. Last May, spokesmen for most of the nations belonging to the Pan-American Union concluded a convention on civil flying. It is now before the Havana conference's committee on international public law, for discussion and recommendations. Washington considers this convention unsatisfactory in one respect; it does not apply to private planes engaged in postal, customs, police or other governmental activities. Ambassador Fletcher therefore has offered an amendment providing that only such aircraft as are "owned, controlled and operated" by a contracting state would be exempt from the convention. That alteration would draw a clear line between official and private dirigibles and planes, and tend to eliminate causes of friction.

Washington has proposed another amendment permitting special agreements between nations, in regard to military zones over which commercial flying could be prohibited. This is designed to protect the Panama Canal particularly, so far as the United States is concerned. Washington does not intend to impede the development of Pan-American airways by blocking the Canal Zone to foreign dirigibles and planes. It merely desires to embody in the convention well recognized principles of national defense. Almost every country maintains fortified areas over which aircraft may not fly. Washington aims to be free to conclude with Panama, from time to time, arrangements regarding the passage of commercial aircraft over the Canal Zone, which the United States holds under a perpetual lease from that republic. It is willing to designate transit-lanes across the Zone, and a great airport open to civil aviators probably will be established near Panama. With the past few weeks American expeditions have moved southward, to stimulate interest in commercial flying throughout the lands between the Rio Grande and Cape Horn. Lieut. James H. Doolittle, army air corps, and C. W. Webster of the Curtiss Exporting company, are voyaging to Peru, where they will start upon a tour of five South American countries, exhibiting the Hawk and Falcon types. Another group, connected with Pan-American airways, is in Havana, preparing to survey a line from that city to Panama, via the principal population centers in Yucatan and Central America. Lieut. Leigh Wade, who four years ago took part in the army air service's flight around the world, will head an expedition to South America. It will join the Doolittle party there, and show the aviation authorities the Curtiss training plane now used in the army air corps. Americans thus do their share in promoting flying throughout the New World, cooperating with sister republics to the southward.

SEEING THINGS AT HOME

The people of Lubbock may be puzzled to guess who will be the next President of the United States, but whoever he is, there is a chance that his inauguration will be witnessed by all of the people here who have radio receiving sets provided engineers now working on the problem of television can improve their present equipment to a satisfactory degree. Understand that Dr. E. F. W. Alexanderson has already transmitted motion pictures by radio into space. The achievement is a fact. What the experts are doing now is in the attempt to improve and simplify the apparatus before selling them to the general public. Another thing to remember is that the new television does not make your radio receiver obsolete, but attaches to it just like a loud speaker.

Just as many "wise" citizens of this republic scoffed at radio when it was first noised abroad that man could hook up with an aerial and get music and talk from places thousands of miles away so there will be some people in Lubbock who will smile at the idea of the television. They won't smile quite as long as they chuckled over the "fool radio fans" because the development of radio has grown so fast that even the skeptics have to admit that it is wonderful and that its future possibilities are promising greater benefits to us all.

As an example of the speedy development of the radio you have only to recall that the federal government is just beginning to obtain even a decent control of broadcasting stations—and here they are talking about transmitting over the same route, to the same receivers, not sound, but pictures that move, and will, in time, talk as they move. If your imagination can beat this for progress you ought to begin inventing today.

FEED MILLS ARE MAKING CROPS MORE VALUABLE. Feed grinding mills appear to be working the greatest change in farming methods in Hale county noted in several years, or since the introduction of cotton brought about the present high state of diversification practiced here.

For feed mills signify a whole series of improvements not seen at a glance. It means elimination of waste in feeding first of all, but it also means that instead of selling feed to others for cash, and the others in turn feed it to stock and make a profit, the farmers of this county are beginning to see the light and are marketing their feed in the form of livestock or farm products, such as poultry, eggs and cream.

Implement and hardware dealers of Plainview report a noteworthy increase in the sales of feed mills during the present season.

The feed mill has brought many changes for the better in the vicinity of Finney Switch. It is said that L. J. Halbert has ground up so many bundles of feed to give to his three thousand head of sheep that there are now no spare bundles in the neighborhood. D. B. Bowman declared that nearly every farmer of that community has sold his extra bundles.

The feed is ground and fed to the animals in an appetizing form. In a form that will do them more good, and will be more economical. "If the farmers continue to see the advantage of feed mills," Mr. Bowman said, "by next year there will be a great number of cattle and sheep fed out in this county. It will cost more money to run this country in surprising amounts."

The point has been advanced that since those who eventually buy the feed make money by feeding it out to livestock why cannot the farmers of Hale county do the same, only with better net results.

This is a natural new crop country. In Hale county one can raise

corn and grain as cheaply as easily and with as great a yield as in any country on earth. It has been claimed.

Waste is eliminated by the feed mill because when grain is ground in it little entire stalk, it is all good eating, and the animal consumes every particle of the feed. One man told the writer that where as each of his animals consumed three bundles of feed daily before he began using a mill, now they can eat only two bundles and they are doing much better at that.

The feed so ground is not only better as a fattening food, but it has in many instances increased the milk yield of cows. S. W. Smith of Plainview stated that his cows appear to do better on this feed than they do on the manufactured dairy ration. The addition of a little cotton seed meal will make the ground food more tasty and more welcome to the animal.

Hale county can develop without limit in livestock production. For here cheap feed is raised. When properly used on the farm, instead of being sold at whatever the market happens to be, it will pay the raiser well. It is said that milk cows fed with ground feed are producing 25 per cent animal above the cost of the feed and in no other way can feed be sold at such a profit. —Plainview News.

The Little Red Schoolhouse

Time was and not so long ago, when it was the boast of every political orator that he had received his elementary education in the little red, one-room schoolhouse. But the orator kept me from thinking of my last day's school in the ink when I knew I could do it. I mean, one never went to school regularly. Furthermore, spring planting and fall harvesting always kept one out a couple of weeks. There was a lot of arbitrary discipline and in the regular curriculum little attention was paid to individuality. But to the good student was given every word of encouragement. Personally, I never believed my individuality was warped much in those seven years.

There were a number of high spots in those early school days. Every morning we sang songs. We showed our patriotism by regularly shouting "America"; we recalled Garfield's death by singing "My Name is Charles Garfield." We sang "The Boston Bungalow," but also others less morbid, like "Battle Hymn of the Republic." Now and then we had programs. One recited "Curfew Shall Not Ring Tomorrow" or sang, "When You and I Were Young, Maggie," or debated on the proposition: "Resolved: That the cow is a more useful animal than the horse." There were also the noon hour when lunches were eaten, and you shared a choice piece of cake with the best girl. Later on we had a music teacher come once every week. I learned a lot about certain composers. Already the forces of deterioration were beginning to set in; for, in one day there came a county health nurse. The next day the local drug and department stores had run out of a stock of toothbrushes which had been on the shelves for years.

It's almost all gone now, at least out in the Broad Valley of Democracy. Instead of walking one mile or two at the 6 o'clock bell of the little red schoolhouse, Mary and Johnie now board a bus which carries them to the country school. One grade, and only one, is in a room. The teachers have all studied "Methods of Elementary Education." Report cards have a rating for "Initiative," "Persistence," "Cooperation," and so on. And another American institution is passing. J. S. M., in New York City, New York University weekly.

The pupils in that one-room school were often more amusing than the teachers. Things had to be rounded through some of their heads. I think one chap I knew was in the fourth grade five years. When I passed through it he was 21. Every afternoon when we "spelled down," he invariably went to the foot. It didn't bother him. He is now a fairly successful farmer. If a student was apt or had an inclination towards "book learning," he could advance very rapidly in a one-room school. He naturally wasn't worked to death, and had time to hear the recitations of and pick up knowledge from the classes ahead of him. Every school, too, had a pretty good library, and spare moments could be very edifying. I don't remember much that was distinctive about the work except arithmetic. The outstanding emphasis there was put upon mental arithmetic. Their district school teachers and their better pupils could solve more problems in the head than they can be solved by a modern computer.

Social Problems

To Be Studied In Conference Meet

Social Problems To Be Studied In Conference Meet

Plenary Session Friday To Take Up Important Matters; Agree On Expenses of Convention.

(By Associated Press)
HAVANA, Feb. 1.—Social problems of the nations will come under the consideration of the Pan-American conference at a plenary session on Friday. The delegates will meet at three p. m. to take up the final report of the committee on social problems, which now is complete. The report includes recommendations for Pan-American action on the subjects of Public Health, Education and Homoculture, and the development of international Red Cross operations.

It is probably that this session will receive the final report of the intellectual cooperation committee, which wound up its affairs today. May Last Till March 1. Indications from the American delegations, which is endeavoring to speed up the sessions, point to the termination of the conference about the third week in February but some of the delegates are of the opinion that it will not end before March 1. A complicated and exceedingly technical discussion of the manner in which the Pan-American union should proceed with its problems took up completely today's session of that committee, to the exclusion of any positive action. Sufficient evidence was at hand, however, to show that a majority of the committee were favorable to avoid consideration at this time of the question of policies in the activities of the Pan-American union referring all projects of the kind to a sub-committee.

The committee approved one article—that the expenses of the Pan-American union should continue to be divided among the countries represented in the ratio of their populations, with the added provision that budgets may not be increased more than 25 per cent over those of preceding years without the unanimous approval of the governing board.

Another matter of interest before the delegates today was immigration. Considering that immigration problems of the Latin-Americans could not be definitely taken over by the Sixth conference, Hernandez

Carlaya of Cuba, asks in its report presented to the economics committee that the issue rest with the second international immigration conference which will meet at Havana in March of this year.

red, disclosed little that was new. One hitherto unrevealed fact was Hickman's own description of the dissection, which revealed that life, while probably devoid of consciousness, was in the girl at the time.

Police Detective Dick Lucas, one of the officers who returned Hickman from Oregon, was the first defense witness, who related in testimony the details of the prisoner's confession.

Full of Ego, Too
Lucas disclosed a sardonic, contented trait of the kidnaper. Referring to the cashing of the first \$20 ransom note in a Los Angeles cafeteria "the night of the murder," Hickman was quoted as saying: "I like to see that girl; I bet she got a thrill when she learned it was me."

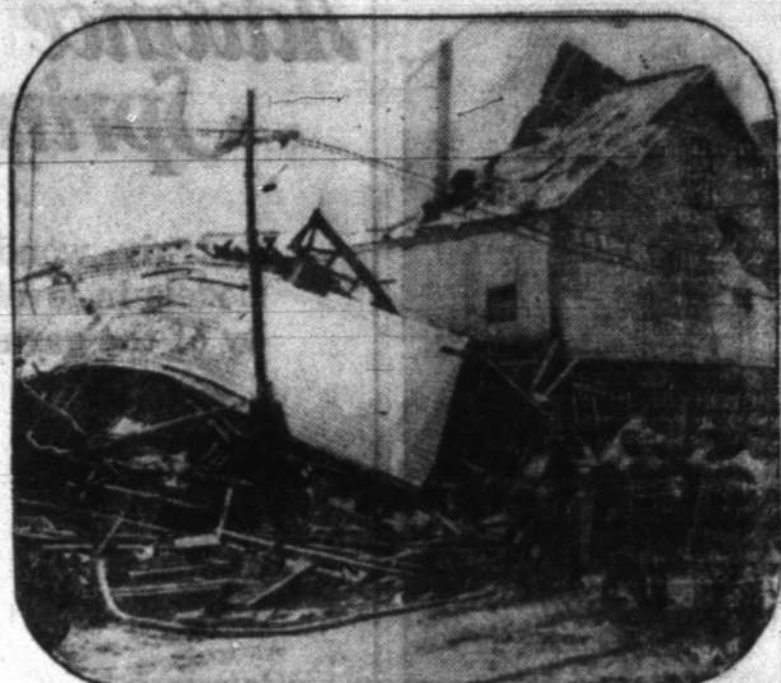
A one-time benefactor and friend of the Kansas City school-boy, Captain Charles Edwards, former Chief of Police of that mid-west city, was shown in a long deposition as "personally" believing the youth to have been insane at the time of the crime. He persisted in calling himself incompetent to pass legal judgment on the question, and admitted he had not considered the "restless" youth insane until he read the newspaper accounts of his crime and confession.

against him and Welby Hunt for the murder of C. Ivy Thoms, drugist, a year ago during a holdup, was continued until Feb. 15 and Hickman returned to the atmosphere of the insanity plea put up by his attorneys before Judge Trabue, to account for his confessed kidnapping, killing and dismembering of Marian Parker.

Rebecca Timlin, one of Hickman's Kansas City school teachers, deposed that she thought Hickman insane at the time of the killing, but admitted she had not considered doubting his sanity until after the murder.

Refused to Kill Chickens
Walsh contradicted the brutality of the Marian Parker killing with the deposition of a former Kansas City employer of the prisoner, James C. Parker, grocer, who said that Hickman had refused to kill chickens and explained that he did not like the job of cutting off their heads.

A break in the flow of the depositions came late in the day when the first witness in person was called, Dick Lucas, Los Angeles police detective and a member of the big squad of policemen and officials who went north to Pendleton, Ore. to bring Hickman back after his capture in the northern city.

Lucas testified that he had told Hickman that he was not "fooling any of the Los Angeles officers with the 'fifis he threw' in Pendleton." Lucas detailed Hickman's confession at length, concluding his explanation of the killing, "I was afraid she would tumble me up with the police."

Killed, Throat to Throat
In the confession, Hickman said he started to kill the girl at 9:30 o'clock in the morning of December 17, last, said, after dismembering the body, went to a theatre about one o'clock in the afternoon.

Defense Attorney Walsh read to the court Hickman's two confessions made on the train enroute from Pendleton, the first describing the crime and the second elaborating on the motive, his fear of being caught if he held the kidnapped girl alive longer and his sudden desire to kill after he had tied her to a chair in his apartment.

would be written boldly upon the face of the Constitution.

The former treasury secretary, twice a formidable candidate for the nomination of his party, made no reference to his own political fortunes or to his previous statement that he would "stand aside" in 1928. He made no personal allusions except to Governor Smith, although he did link the law enforcement in New York with that in Maryland, whose governor, Albert C. Ritchie, also is in the running for the Democratic nomination.

Meeting of "Dry"
Mr. McAdoo spoke at a law enforcement meeting at Richmond Auditorium, to an audience gathered from the borderland of the dry Democratic South. The meeting was held under the auspices of the Anti-Saloon League, the Women's Christian Temperance union, and other dry organizations. The speech was prepared beforehand, and included a painstaking examination of many aspects of the prohibition enforcement problem.

The speaker suggested, among other things, that the federal government give financial aid to the states in prohibition enforcement, somewhat after the manner of the federal-aid system by which states now are assisted in road-building and other enterprises of national concern. He denied the charge that in enforcing the Eighteenth amendment the federal government was infringing states rights, pointing out that forty-six of the states had themselves ratified the amendment, binding all the states by overwhelming consent.

He made direct reference to Governor Smith in recounting that neither New York nor Maryland had a state prohibition enforcement act, and declared that in both states the burden of enforcement had been left upon an insufficiently large staff of federal agents.

Considerable misunderstanding of the consequences of the repeal of the state enforcement act in New York has been created by recent utterances of the Governor of that state," Mr. McAdoo continued. "His effort is apparently to create the impression that no state

enforcement statute is necessary because even in the absence of such a statute the state officials are under an obligation to enforce the Volstead act. This position is entirely misleading and has no justification in law.

"Because the state courts are thus without jurisdiction to enforce the Volstead act, the police find themselves paralyzed in any efforts they may make to enforce prohibition in the state courts."

Mr. McAdoo declared it was the object of the organized liquor interests to destroy the prohibition amendment state by state with the hope of bringing the whole country in the category of New York and Maryland.

"This then," he said, "is the issue—shall disobedience of the supreme law of the land, as practiced by New York and Maryland, be permitted to establish a doctrine which, carried to its logical conclusions, make the destruction of Constitutional government and the disappearance of those guarantees of life, liberty and property which are essential to the security and well-being of the people and to the continuation of our form of government?"

The issue cannot be evaded. It must be fought to a conclusion in the forthcoming national campaign. The contest between the two great political parties for the control of the presidency and the congress of the United States affords the only national referendum for the decision of great questions of this kind, and we must have the courage and sincerity to present the issue squarely to the people so that their judgment may be rendered in the light of reason and with full knowledge of the facts."

New York's repeal of its state enforcement act, Mr. McAdoo continued, made unavailable for enforcement purposes some 32,000 state officials, including judges, prosecuting attorneys, and state police, and left the task to a federal force of only about 500 persons. He added that a similar situation obtained in Maryland.

State Injunction Against Pipe Line

Allege Port Industry Will Be "Strangled" If Humble Permitted to Run Line to Mustang Island.

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Feb. 1.—The port industry of Texas will be "strangled" if the Humble Pipe Line company is permitted to extend its line into the Gulf of Mexico from Corpus Christi port to load ships, Assistant Attorney General Paul Page, Jr., declared in district court Wednesday after a temporary injunction was granted the state against the \$2,000,000 project.

His declaration was provoked by a motion of Humble counsel to suspend the injunction pending appeal, so the work, now being rushed, can go on. Judge George Calhoun took the motion under advisement.

Mr. Page said that if the Humble is allowed to execute its project, its competitors will be forced to make the same arrangements, to the detriment of ports, which are basing appeals to congress for larger harbor facilities, "primarily on oil tonnage."

The state alleges trespass on its land below the bay, through which the pipe line concern, subsidiary of the Humble Oil company, is laying the line to Mustang Island, thence two miles out in the gulf. A loading rack is to be constructed there so ships too large to take a full load in the port's 25 foot depth can be loaded at a 50-foot depth.

Judge Calhoun granted the temporary writ because of the law giving the state game, fish and oyster department control over streams and gulf waters, and held that a special act of the legislature seemingly is necessary if the Humble project is allowed.

FARMINGDALE, N. Y., Feb. 1. (AP)—Suffering from an incurable ailment, Claude H. Priddy killed his wife and two sons, aged 10 and 3, with an ax today and then told police in a confession he wrote on his portable typewriter after his arrest, that they were better off dead.

Priddy, a former Methodist minister and said to have served pastorates in Portland, Maine, Stamford, Connecticut, and Brooklyn, was 51 years old. In his confession, he wrote he was suffering from an incurable disease and police said he imagined his sons were showing symptoms of it.

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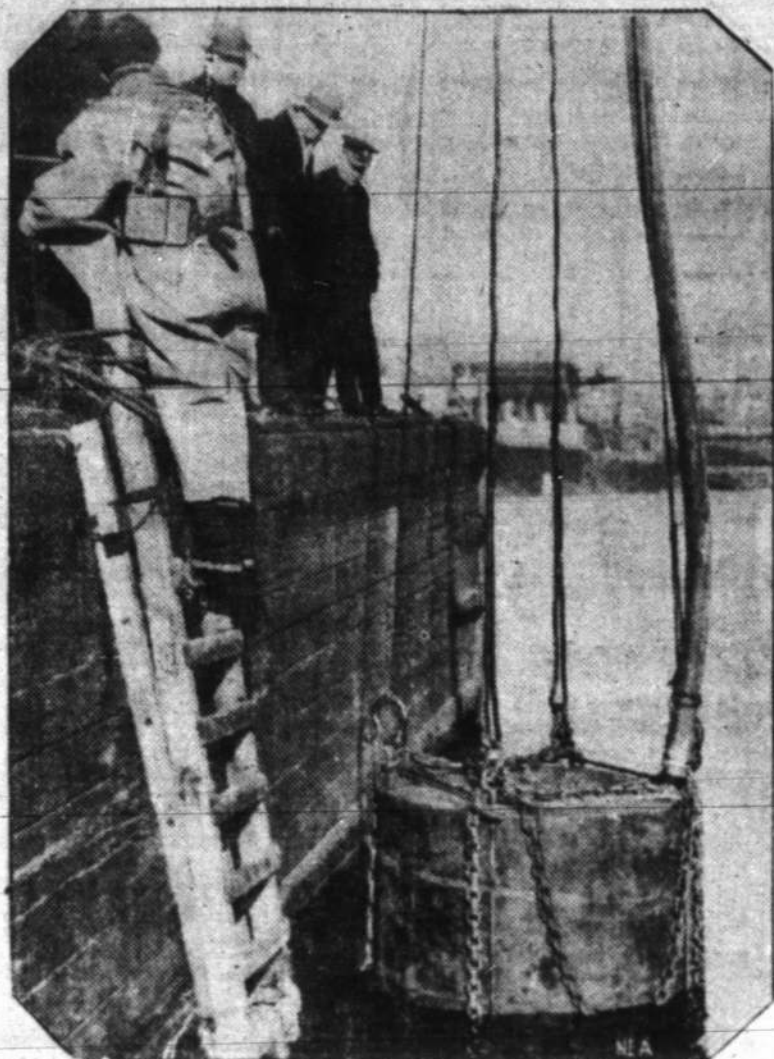

Boost Is Given To Coal Strike Probe

Johnson, of California, Is
Insistent On Early Action
Regarding Demand For
Quiz Into Conditions.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1. (AP)—Support for a thorough investigation into the suspension of mining in the bituminous coal fields of Pennsylvania, Ohio and West Virginia was promised from both sides of the senate today as Senator Johnson, Republican, California, demanded early action on his resolution proposing an inquiry.

In a two-hour speech, the California senator pictured conditions in the Pennsylvania fields as "bloody warfare." He charged a conspiracy by the coal operators and railroads to break the miner's union; read a letter from Secretary Davis of the Labor Department, blaming operators for the failure of government negotiations to end the strike; and finally read a letter from Gifford Pinchot, former Governor of Pennsylvania, in behalf of private interests.

As Johnson concluded, Senator Reed, Republican, Pennsylvania, promised support for his proposed inquiry. He asked for relief in the situation in the coal fields, but he urged that the senate "not jump at conclusions about causes."

VOTE \$300,000 BONDS

SAN ANGELO, Feb. 1.—The San Angelo city commission Tuesday morning in regular session, authorized bids on March 20 for bonds totaling the sum of \$300,000. These bonds include \$150,000 for completion of the city hall and auditorium. 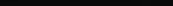
