HIGHWAY NOW MARKED AT EVERY TURN FROM HIGGINS TO LIBERAL.

Geo. M. Perry and H. C. Coffee completed the marking of the Uncle Sam Highway from Perryton to Higgins the fore part of this week. The greater part of the credit for the establishment and marking of this very important road belongs to those gentlemen for they have given freely of their time, and this new road is already one of the best known in this part of the country. It is the fastest and shortest route from Oklahoma City to the mountains and it is expected that the greater part of the mountain travel from Oklahoma City and vicinity will traverse the Uncle Sam Highway thru Perryton next summer. The road from here to the Lipscomb County line is being put in best of shape and by spring it will be the equal of any dirt road in the southwest. Messrs. Perry and La-Master conferred with Oklahoma City road officials while in that city recently and they were informed that the Oklahoma City Chamber of Commerce routed four hundred cars daily and that many of these cars could be routed over the Uncle Sam Highway provided it was in good shape, and there is no doubt what this will be done.

ASSIST YOUR RURAL CARRIER IN HOG SURVEY

Since there is misunderstanding on the part of some farmers in this locality as to the usefulness of the information as to hog production and crop acreages, obtained from the cards distributed by the rural mail carriers. Postmaster Beever has requested the Herald to publish the following statement furnished him by the United States Department of Agriculture.

These surveys are made with the help of the rural carriers, who either distribute the cards to a certain number of farmers along their routes, with the request that these be filled out, or the carrier fills out the card himself by interviewing the farmer. The carrier is instructed to get information from farms which will give a good average picture or sample of farms on his route, preferably by taking all of the farms along a part of his route, big and little good and poor, owned and rented.

If a fair sample of all farms is returned in each State, figures for these farms should show the same changes as all farms. It is impossible to take an actual census enumeration of all farms each year, so changes in production and acreage each year must be estimated from samples. The nearer these samples are to being exact, the more correct will be the estimates.

The need and value of such information for individual farmers and agriculture in general hardly need be stressed. Without dependable in-

formation as to actual production and trends of production both of live stock and crops more balanced production and better market distribution are impossible.

The Department of Agriculture is the best qualified agency to undertake such work, but the accuracy of its estimates depends upon the accuracy of the returns made by farmers.

The beneficial effects that such information may have upon price is shown by the level of hog prices during the winter of 1924-25 compared to the previous winter. The pig surveys of June and December 1924 showed a decided decrease in hog production in 1924 compared to 1923. Marketings, however, during the winter from the 1924 crop were almost as large as the previous winter, and in December and January were the highest on record. In spite of these heavy marketings, hog prices were from \$2.00 to \$3.00 per hundred higher than during the winter before. The heavy marketings were rightly interpreted as being an early marketing of a smaller number of hogs caused by a short corn crop and not as indicating a correspondingly larger number of hogs.

But unless these estimates can be kept dependable the trade will disregard them and will be guided either by private estimates or by actual marketings as these take place. Therefore, every farmer should help to make these reports accurate by making the report for his own farm complete and accurate.

The aggregate prizes for the individual and county exhibits total \$1500. To take care of the fine birds the directors have \$1000. of up-to-date steel coops. Practical Instructions in HOME SEWING

SLOT SEAMS.

In the small plan at the right I have shown the process of making the slot seams that are used to trim many of the more tailored costumes. To make this kind of seam you will need a stay strip of the material as shown at A. This strip should be cut as long as the seam is to be and about an inch and a half wide. The edges of the seam should be turned back and basted to the stay strip so that there is a narrow opening or slot between them. The stitching as shown at B and C is usually made about three-eighths of an inch back from the edges.

It is always best to press a seam of this kind before and after it is stitched.

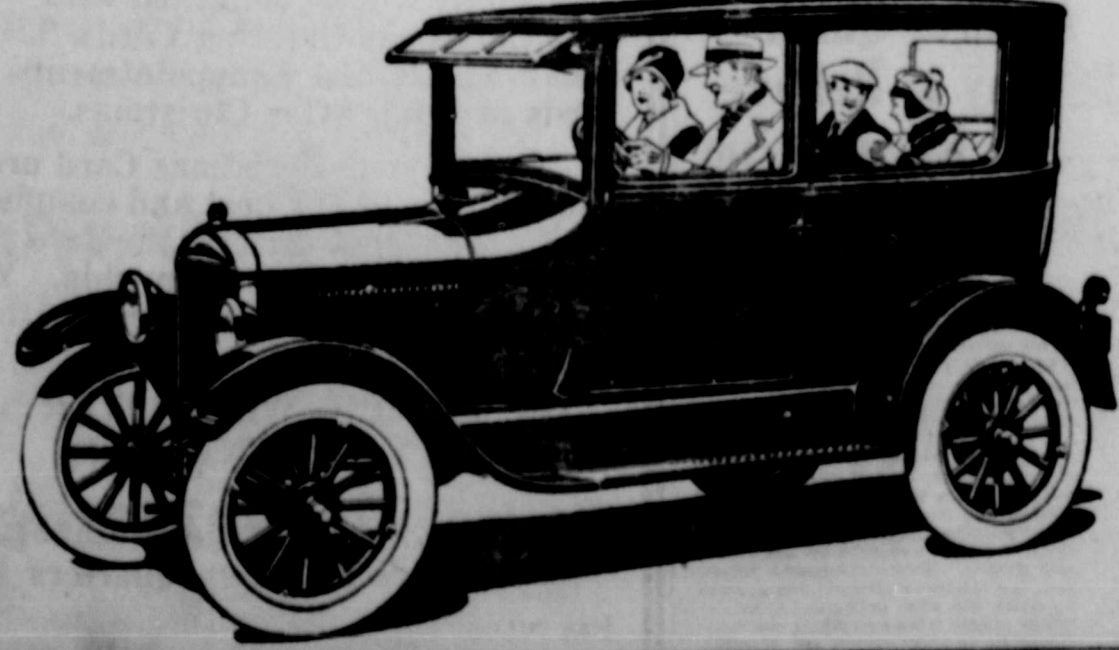

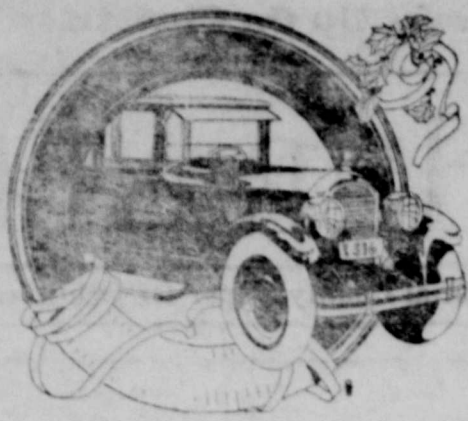

PROTECT YOUR BATTERY FOR WINTER WEATHER

Prepare the car now against the coming of cold weather and be protected against any sudden drops in temperature, is the text of the warning broadcast by the Ford Motor Company to Ford car drivers in cold climates. To eliminate as far as possible the annoyances of winter driving, the service department of the company has outlined a set of simple precautions against freezing.

They are in brief:
Add anti-freeze solution to radiator.

Be discreet in use of choke.
Conserve battery current.

Drivers are cautioned against patent solutions for radiators of unknown formulas. The safest to use is denatured or wood alcohol. The amount of alcohol necessary to prevent freezing is also given in a table which includes all winter temperatures.

Alcohol 20%, water 80%, Freezing point 13 above 0. Spec. Gravity .974.

Alcohol 30%, water 70%, Freezing point 3 above 0. Spec. Gravity .965.

Alcohol 40%, water 60%, Freezing point 30 below 0. Spec. Gravity .953.

Alcohol 50, water 50, Freezing point 34 below 0. Spec. Gravity .936.

Evaporation of the alcohol after the engine is warmed up may be considerably retarded by the addition of a small amount of glycerine, equal to about 10% of the total capacity of the radiator.

Present day gasoline does not vaporize readily in cold weather, starting necessitates use of the choke. Discretion should be used, however, because of the fact that the new fuel sucked into the combustion chamber condenses and passes the piston rings into the crankcase, making for oil dilution. Protect radiator with blanket or cover to minimize delay in the "warming up."

Care must be exercised to see that the battery is not discharged by long periods of cranking the engine. If the battery is allowed to stand idle in a discharged condition it will freeze. A table showing the freezing points follows:

Spec. Gravity.	Freezing Point
1300 (Fully Char.)	94 below 0.
1270	82 below 0.
1250	62 below 0.
1230	40 below 0.
1200	17 below 0.
1150	5 below 0.

In as much as winter driving exerts a greater drain upon the battery than summer driving, it is frequently the part of wisdom to have the charging rate of the generator set up to meet the added demand, especially if frequent stops and starts are made.

About Your Health



by John Joseph Gaines, M.D.

INFLUENZA

The onset of influenza is invariably sudden and intensive. There are no warnings of its approach. One point, of which we are reasonably certain is, that the infection enters the system thru the breathing passages. During epidemics, the gargle and nasal douch should be used freely after all exposure, as a possible preventive. Contact with suspected cases should be scrupulously avoided. If possible, large or small public gatherings, where a dozen or more are coughing, are very dangerous, and traveling in over-heated trains that are usually crowded, often scatters millions of influenza germs.

Weakness is the predominant symptom—indeed that may be the only diagnostic symptom. No other disease prostrates the victim so thoroughly from its moment of onset. There is nothing like this weakness. Sometimes there is fever—at other times none, or so little as to escape notice. Active delirium is common in febrile cases. It is this stage that pneumonia usually supervenes, if at all. Absolute rest in bed is imperative, and should be resorted to promptly.

Alcohol in diluted form, has proven of inestimable value in the treatment of influenza, if its use is carried on until free sweating occurs. It appears to be antagonistic to the poison, and is useful in combatting the terrible weakness. It should only be used with the advice and observation of the physician. Many doubt the efficacy of vaccines, though I have found them of great value in my cases, and am never without them. Strict quarantine is a wise measure that should not be neglected, in localities where influenza is prevalent. Good nursing is an essential upon which too much emphasis cannot be laid.
