Items Culled From the Leading Local Papers.

BROWNWOOD.
The Methodists are getting busy on their parsonage movement. The lots were purchased last week as stated for a consideration of \$3,500, on which to build a parsonage.

Max J. Thorpe has returned from an extended trip to New York and the eastern cities. Mr. Thorpe has formerly been with the Jackson-Hughes company and it is not yet announced what he intends to do. He will likely leave the city, however.

The stockholders of the Coggins & Ford Company bank met Wednesday afternoon for the purpose of electing a successor to Henry Ford, deceased, as cashier of the bank, and very promptly selected N. A. Perry for the place, and he has accepted and entered upon his duties as such.

The building committee of the Southern hotel company met Saturday for the purpose of awarding the contracts for the hotel building and that session was extended well into the night before a contract was finally let to Messrs. Hood & Staggs of this city at a price of \$50,000.00 for the brick work and wood work. The plumbing, which is quite expensive will add materially to the cost of the structure and the wiring will bring the price of the building up to about \$70,000.00. Mrs. Aurelia Cobb Kirkpatrick.

The subject of this sketch was born at Eddyville, Lyon county, Ky., Oct. 17th, 1819, was married to Dr. W. D. Kirkpatrick Jan. 29th, 1850, and departed this life at Mullin, Texas, March 10th, 1910, at the age of 90 years, 4 months and 23 days. She was the last member of a large family of boys and girls, all of whom stood high in the circles where they lived, and their impress for honor, honesty, liberality and acts of charity was left upon the minds of those with whom they mingled.

Those who knew "Grandma" Kirkpatrick until the weight of years forbade further activities, will bear me out in saying her equal in the sick-room was hard to find. Wherever the cry of sickness or distress was heard, like an angel of mercy she was there to administer to the wants of the suffering. She lived thru the most wonderful, inventive and thrilling years of American history, witnessing the coming in of all the ways of travel from the old-fashioned side saddle to the automobiles and the flying machines.

Only one member of her family survives her, M. C. Kirkpatrick of Mullin, who with his faithful and untiring companion and seven children administered to mother and grandma as lovingly and gently as if she had been a babe. It was a comfort to us to watch such a long and useful life gently close as a baby going to sleep on its mother's breast. Death was a welcome messenger whom she was glad to welcome, as she had frequently expressed a desire to depart and be with the loved ones gone before. Therefore, we do not mourn as those who have no hope. Peace to her memory, and may the family without the loss of one be reunited in the sweet bye-and-bye.

The automobile garage at Big Springs burned Monday night. Thirteen cars were burned and the total loss is placed at \$45,000.

The charter for the railroad to be built from Temple to Comanche, via Gateville and Hamilton, has been filed with the secretary of state and work is to begin on the road at once.

A bill appropriating \$500,000 to raise the wreck of the battleship Maine in the Havana harbor has been approved by the appropriation committee in the lower house of Congress.

On account of ill health Senator Culberson has been unable to attend the sessions of the senate this term and it is stated he will leave Washington in a few days for some southern health resort.

There came near being a race war at Falfurias the first of this week between the whites and Mexicans. The trouble grew out of a white man killing a Mexican with a gun he took from the "greaser."

The president of the Texas company, J. S. Cullinan, was shot by an oil gauger at Houston Tuesday. The weapon used was a .22 calibre pistol and the wound was not serious. The men refuse to give reason for the trouble.

The statement comes from St. Louis that H. Clay Pierce, head of the Water-Pierce Oil Co., has in view the incorporation of another company to conduct an oil business in Texas and that he plans a consultation with state officials to that end. S. W. Fordyce, who bought the assets of Water-Pierce Co., in this state is a close friend of Mr. Pierce and it has been thought by many that the ownership of the business has never changed.

Governor Campbell has issued a proclamation offering a certificate under the seal of the state to the boy 18 years old or under who raises as much as 100 bushels of corn to the acre this year, also to those of the same age who raise 75 and 50 bushels to the acre, the certificates to be in three classes. The boys corn clubs are attracting attention all over the state and various business organizations and private individuals are offering premiums for the boys who raise the most corn to the acre this year.

The State Department at Washington is entertaining a proposition from the Mexican government to cede to Mexico the San Elizario Island, containing several thousand acres of valuable land, on condition that Mexico will relinquish all claims to the Chamizal zone, which includes the southern part of El Paso city, with 5,000 inhabitants and valued at \$5,000,000. The news has created much excitement in El Paso and county officials and hundreds of citizens are signing vigorous protests. The San Elizario Island was decided by the commission in 1897 to be American territory, or to belong to Texas, while the Chamizal zone has been recognized as American territory for fifty years.
