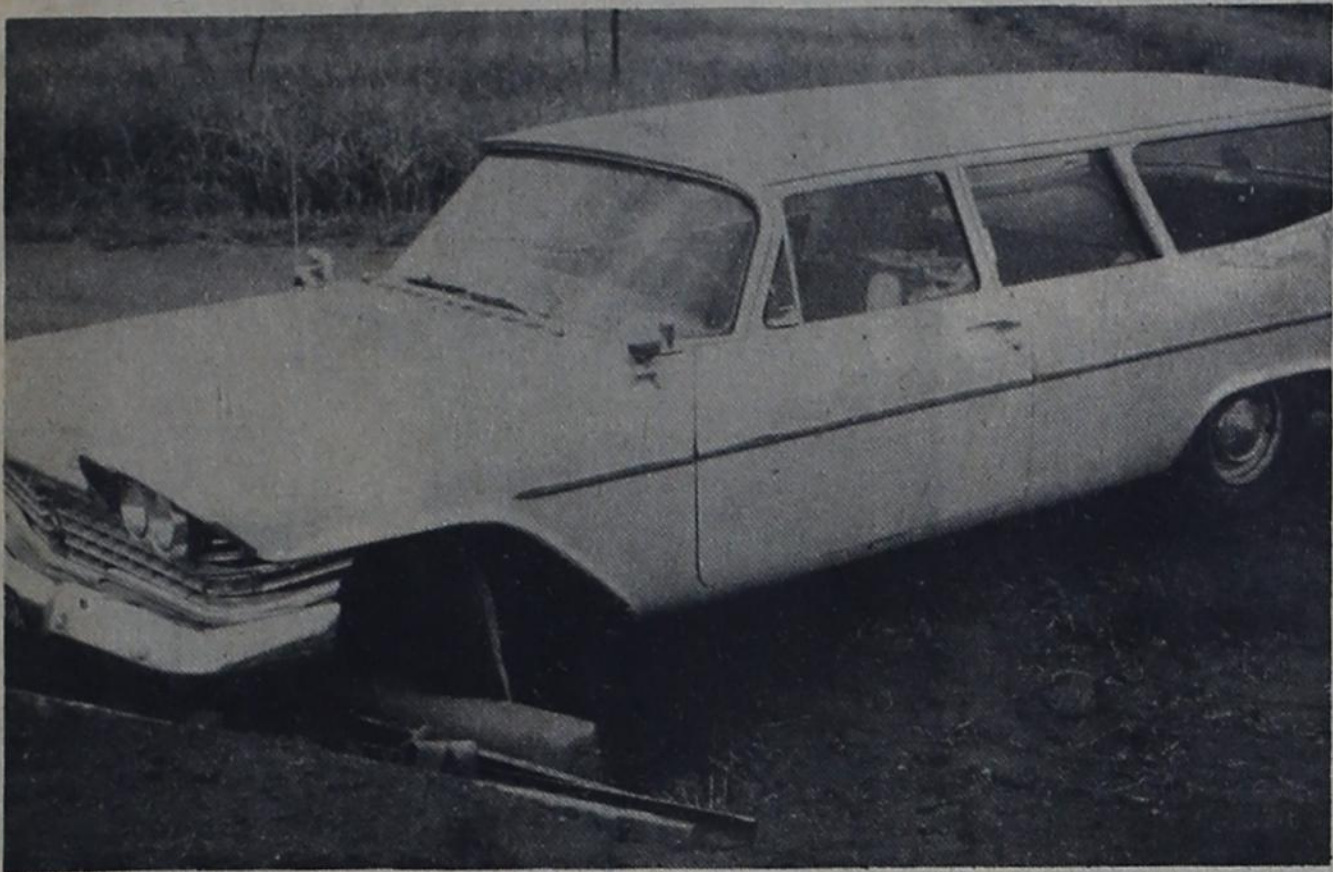


Burglary Attempt Foiled

Post Office, Variety Store Robbed



GETAWAY CAR -- Burglars who robbed Bovina Post Office and Bovina Variety Sunday morning abandoned this station wagon when they crashed into the curb as shown just off Oklahoma Lane Farm-to-Market Road in south part of town while being chased by Darrell and Billy Don Read. Part of the stolen variety store merchandise is visible in the back seat. The burglars escaped on foot following the wreck.

Burglars got only trouble for their efforts when they robbed Bovina Post Office and Bovina Variety early Sunday morning. Alertness of two Bovina men, Billy Don and Darrell Read, kept the burglars from getting away with five sacks and a pouch of incoming mail and several hundred dollars worth of variety store merchandise.

As it turned out, all the mail and all the merchandise was returned.

The burglars escaped on foot, however, after wrecking their car while being chased by the Read brothers.

Darrell Read noticed two men carrying "something" from behind the two buildings across the railroad tracks. In observing the strange goings on, he said he saw two men make three or four trips each across the tracks. He decided something was wrong when he saw one of the men duck down to

avoid being caught in the lights of a passing car.

About that time, Read says, a station wagon pulled up behind the stores and sped off down Highway 60 toward Farwell.

The Read brothers gave chase in an effort to get the license number of the fleeing car, which they think had three men in it.

Some three miles from Bovina, the station wagon turned around and came back to town and the chase continued in the opposite direction.

The station wagon turned on Highway 86 at the intersection west of town, sped into town and turned south on a dirt street, turning off its lights as it did so. Read was unable to turn at the same street the station wagon did and he thought momentarily that he had lost the suspected burglars.

However, he noticed the flash of tail-lights as the station wagon was braked. Taking after

the station wagon again in south-east part of town, the Reads were still trying to get close enough to read the license numbers.

Going at a high rate of speed on a dirt street, the station wagon missed a turn onto FM Road 1731 south and crashed into a recently-constructed, uncovered strip of curb, wrecking the car to the extent that it wouldn't run. Occupants of the station wagon then fled on foot as the Reads rushed to get Deputy Sheriff Henry Minter at his home here.

Minter called Amarillo police department for assistance with its dogs. Two Amarillo policemen rushed here with dogs and attempted to track the burglars. Their attempts were handicapped by rain which began falling a few minutes after the dogs were on the scene and this attempt proved futile though one of the patrolmen said his dog

followed a hot trail south through town and then west.

The Amarillo policemen who aided in the chase here were Sgt. Walter Head with a dog named "Warrior" and Glenn Farmer with a dog named "Tory." The dogs are German Shepherds, County law officers feel that the dogs would have probably caught the burglars if the rain hadn't washed away the scent left by the fleeing law-breakers.

The five mail sacks and the mail pouch which were taken from the post office were found in the station wagon with the variety store merchandise.

The mail had been deposited in the post office a short time before it was stolen by highway post office bus which runs between Amarillo and Roswell. The mail was returned and "put up" at regular time Sunday morning.

Evidently the burglars were

disturbed before they had completed loading all the variety store merchandise they wanted. A large box loaded with merchandise, mostly men's clothing, was left in the back of the store. A lot of merchandise was also found in the car.

Mrs. Alice Moore and Mrs. Opal Bowen, owners of the store, after putting the merchandise back on the shelves Monday that they couldn't discover anything missing except one billfold. None of the merchandise was even damaged, they reported, except for two stuffed dogs which were left in the alley behind the store during the early morning rain.

The station wagon used in the burglary belongs to Doyle Evans, 32, of Muleshoe, according to Minter. Questioned at Muleshoe Sunday afternoon,

We were fortunate enough to get invited to the festivities of looking, talking, waiting and what-have-you that went with the chase (?) following the break-ins.

Just what time we joined the party, we don't know, but we had time to drink three cups of coffee before daylight . . . at different times. And there was also time to tell and hear numerous good stories, but except for the situation which existed, there was absolutely no excitement, as such, were only slightly disappointed.

However, it seems there would be a little more excitement for a country newspaperman who may get a chance to get in on a deal like that only once in a lifetime.

We did feel a little brave, or maybe it was scared that we felt, when we left home and Sue instructed, "Don't get shot." Whatever pleasure we got from that was rubbed out, however, when we came home a few hours later, walked in the house doubled over like maybe we had been bullet-punctured in the mid-section, and she issued more instructions. This time, "Don't get blood on the carpet."

Mustangs Open With Springlake

Bovina Mustangs, with promises of a far-better-than-average team, kickoff 1962 season Friday night against the Springlake Wolverines. The game will be played on the host team's field. Gametime is 8 p. m.

This Mustangs, defending District 2-B champions, will be underdogs in the opening game . . . because they're Class B and their opponents are Class A for no other reason.

The charges of Coaches Hallie Gee and Malcolm Kennedy "looked pretty good" in a scrimmage against Kress Kangaroos last week, but the Wolverines reportedly plastered Friona in a scrimmage between those two schools.

Springlake has all starting linemen back from a year ago, Head Coach Gee says and if they have a weakness it'll have to be in the backfield where only

one letterman is returning.

In addition to being experienced, the Springlake line is big. The entire team hits hard, Gee says. "They're supposed to have one of the best teams in years," Gee points out. "I think we have a chance to win the game, but we'll be at a definite disadvantage." Springlake won last year's game, 14-0. Gee says that his reports on the Wolverines show that they possibly have a pass defense weakness. "We'll try to throw against them," he says, "but we'll try to throw some against everybody."

Mustangs continued their twice a day practice sessions through Monday. With beginning of school Tuesday, practice has been on a once-a-day basis and will continue that way remainder of the season. Bovina will be handicapped

by illness of senior letterman halfback, Pat O'Brien. There's a possibility that O'Brien won't get to play at all this season. However, even if he received a doctor's o. k. to play this week, he won't be up to par

City Water To Be Off

City water is slated to be turned off for one to two hours this week in most parts of Bovina, Mayor Boyd Gilreath announces.

The water will be turned off so that fireplugs may be repaired.

"We feel that this repair work has to be done and we'll try to do it with a minimum of inconvenience to the people," Gilreath says.

County's First '62 Milo Delivered Here Thursday

Parmer County's first 1962 loads of milo were delivered to Bovina Thursday of last week.

The August 30 delivery date was believed to be one of the earliest, if not the earliest, since irrigation came to the area.

"This is first time I ever cut any milo in August," said O. H. Jones, who delivered grain to two Bovina elevators.

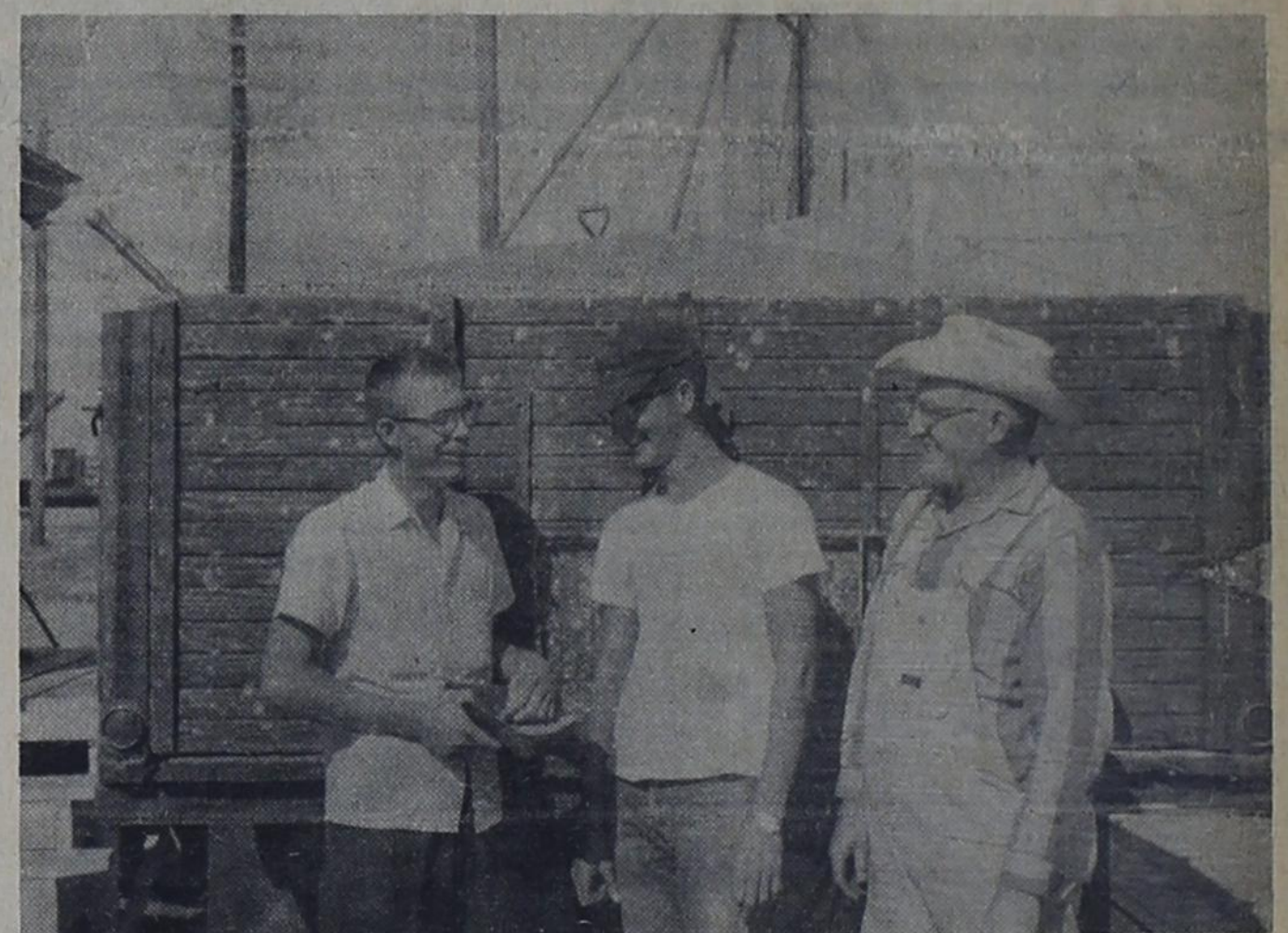
Almost as surprising as the early delivery date was fact that both loads cut that day had moisture contents low enough to be acceptable. First load tested 14 per cent moisture and second load was 13.2 per cent, according to elevator reports.

Jones, who farms 11 miles southeast of Bovina, has been farming 21 years--since 1941--and this is first time he's had a "first."

The loads were delivered to Bovina Wheat Growers, Inc. and to Sherley Grain Co.

Variety of the milo was Texas 608, produced by R. C. Mitchell at Lockney and sold here by Dean McCallum. It was planted April 5 and watered three times. Estimated yield of the 30 acre field from which the early grain was cut is 6000

Enrollment Over 500

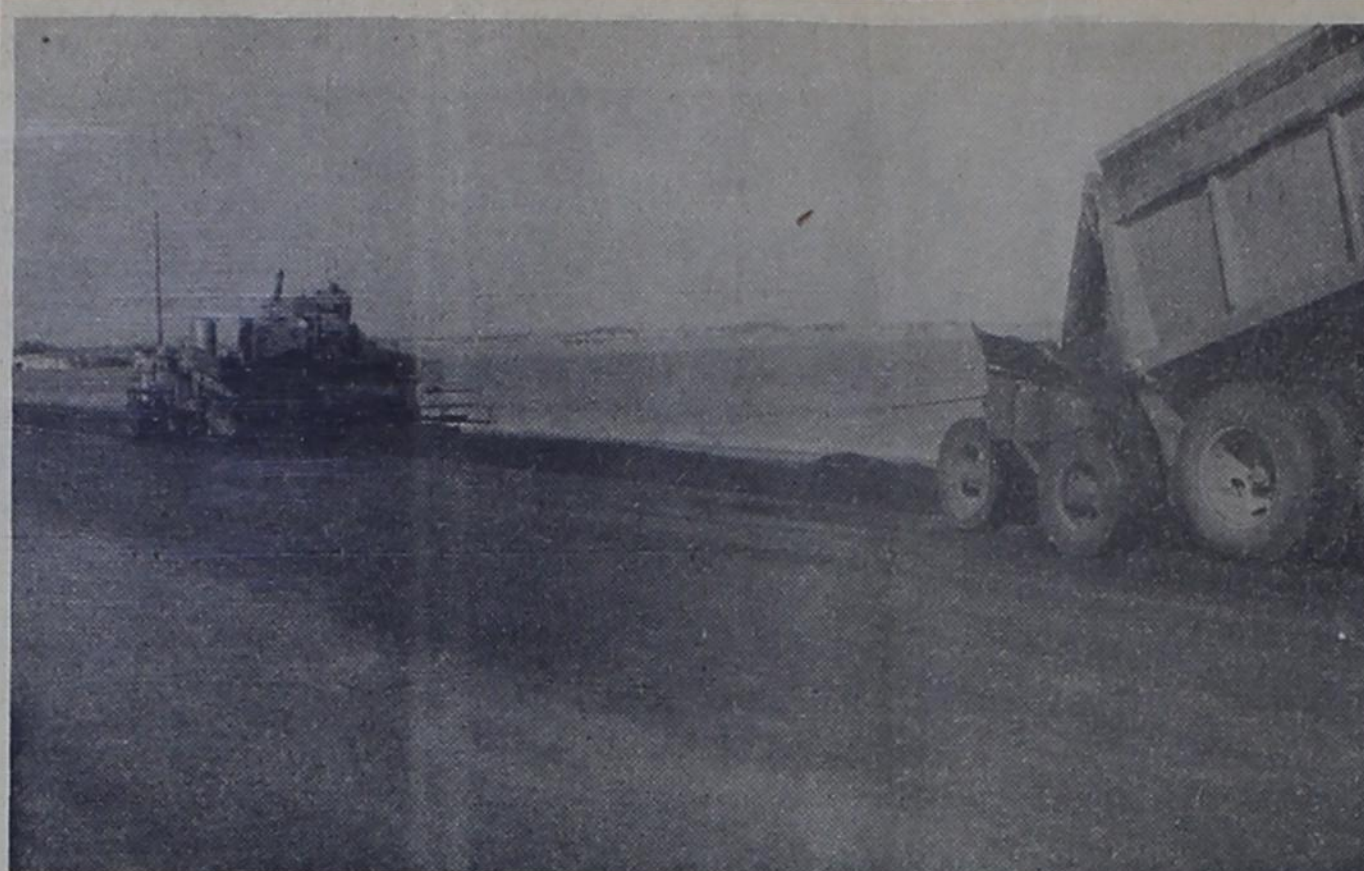

Contract For FM Road Construction

A contract for 7.9 miles of construction on FM 2298 in Deaf Smith and Parmer counties has been awarded to an Amarillo firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

Cooper & Woodruff Inc. submitted the low bid of \$109,699 on the project. Grading, structures, base and surfacing from FM 1058, six miles east of State 214 in Deaf Smith County south and west to State 214 in Parmer County six miles north of Friona is expected to take 120 working days, according to Charles W. Smith, District Highway Engineer at Amarillo.

W. V. York, Resident Engineer at Canyon will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction.

County Farmers Vote "Yes" In Close Wheat Balloting

Farmer County farmers, like those in the rest of the nation, voted in favor of the 1963 wheat quotas last Thursday, but also like the nationwide vote, the margin was a close one.

With a two-thirds majority required in order for the quotas to pass, the national election carried with a "squeaking" 68 per cent majority.

Farmer County voters, while giving the quotas a bit more of an edge with a 73 per cent majority, showed some degree of reversal to past elections, such

as last year when the measure carried by 87 per cent.

Several area counties failed to give the referendum the required 66 and two-thirds per cent majority, and in seven counties the vote failed to carry even a majority.

The seven counties where the issue did not carry were on the North Plains-- Dallam, Sherman, Ochiltree, Oldham, Gray, Hutchinson and Donley.

In ten counties, the referendum carried, but not by a two-thirds majority. These counties were Potter, Randall, Hansford, Lipscomb, Hartley, Armstrong, Floyd, Bailey, Hardeman and Wilbarger.

Since the North Plains counties are predominately dryland wheat-growing areas, the voting trend seemed to be against quotas in dryland areas, and for them in the irrigated counties.

Although Farmer County's vote was 150 short of last year's record 702, the county's wheat-growers maintained their record

as "most patriotic," as more voters turned out than in any other county in the state, for the second straight year.

The total vote in the county was 405 for the quotas, and 147 against. One county ballot box voted against the measures, the Rhea box, which voted 20-16 against quotas. Another box, at Oklahoma Lane, carried, but not by two-thirds majority, 27-15.

The vote on a statewide basis carried by approximately 70 per cent. The vote in Oklahoma dipped below the required majority, with only 61.4 per cent supporting the quotas. New Mexico voters approved the measure by 69.3 per cent.

By approving the quotas, Farmer County will lose 774 acres from its 1962 crop, a reduction of .7 of one per cent. The national average support price for 1963 wheat has been announced as \$1.82 per bushel, or 75 per cent of parity.

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Brief Is Filed In Water Test Case

The main brief in the groundwater depletion case, styled "Marvin Shurbet, et ux, v. The United States of America," was filed on August 6 with the U. S. District Court in Amarillo, Texas. The suit is being sponsored as a test case by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District.

On August 27, attorneys for the Water District filed with the Court what they term a "reply brief." This brief is a reply to the Government's main brief.

The suit seeks to establish groundwater in the Southern High Plains of Texas as a depletable natural resource within the definition of the term as used in the Federal Internal Revenue Service's tax code.

Should the Court rule in favor of Shurbet, and such ruling is upheld on appeal, then he and other ground water owners throughout the area will qualify for a federal income-tax deduction during those years when a decline in ground water levels is experienced. Only those who can show a cost in their water and who are using the water to produce income would be eligible.

The Water District will make public additional information concerning progress of the case as developments become known.

Kay Burleson In Contest

Kay Burleson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. T. I. Burleson of Route 1, Friona, is the Farmer County entrant in the "Miss Grain Sorghum of the Nation" contest Thursday night in Dimmitt.

Miss Burleson, who recently represented the county in the "Miss Texas Rural Electrification" contest, and reigned as Friona's "Maize Days Queen" last fall, is one of 32 entrants in the contest.

There are 10 entrants from Dimmitt and 22 from other counties, as opposed to only four out-of-town entries at last year's contest, which was the second annual event.

A \$500 scholarship is to be awarded to the winner. Trophies will be given to the top three finishers.

A total of 13 counties in the area are represented by the beauties, who range in age from 16 to 21.

Rural Telephone Coop Sets Meeting

The annual meeting of the membership of the West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative, Inc. is to be held September 11, 1962, in the Community Center, Hereford, Texas, at 7:30 p.m.

The Farmer County Weed Committee met last week to evaluate the work and action that Farmer County residents have taken toward the control of bindweed.

The ASCS reported that they had helped more farmers on the cost share basis than in years past. Mr. Ronald Mock, of Santa Fe Railroad was also present and reported that they were treating bindweed at the present time, and he further stated that the bindweed situation has and is improving on railroad right-of-way.

The Weed Committee, Santa Fe Railroad, Highway Department, County Commissioners Court, and the ASC office are to be congratulated for all the work and effort they have contributed in the control of bindweed.

Farmers and city folk alike should back these people and help in any way possible to rid Farmer County of bindweed.

If you should find some bindweed and it is still blooming, take time to treat it, for next year the spot will be bigger and harder to control.

I guess you think I have preached a lot about bindweed. Well, I have, for I know that this weed has the ability to ruin good farm land.

The Texas A&M College has a new service to aid farmers in irrigated sections of Texas. They have equipped and set up facilities for determining quality

of irrigation water and measuring salt accumulations in the soil.

Since all waters contain salt, a salinity threat exists to some degree in every area where irrigation is practiced.

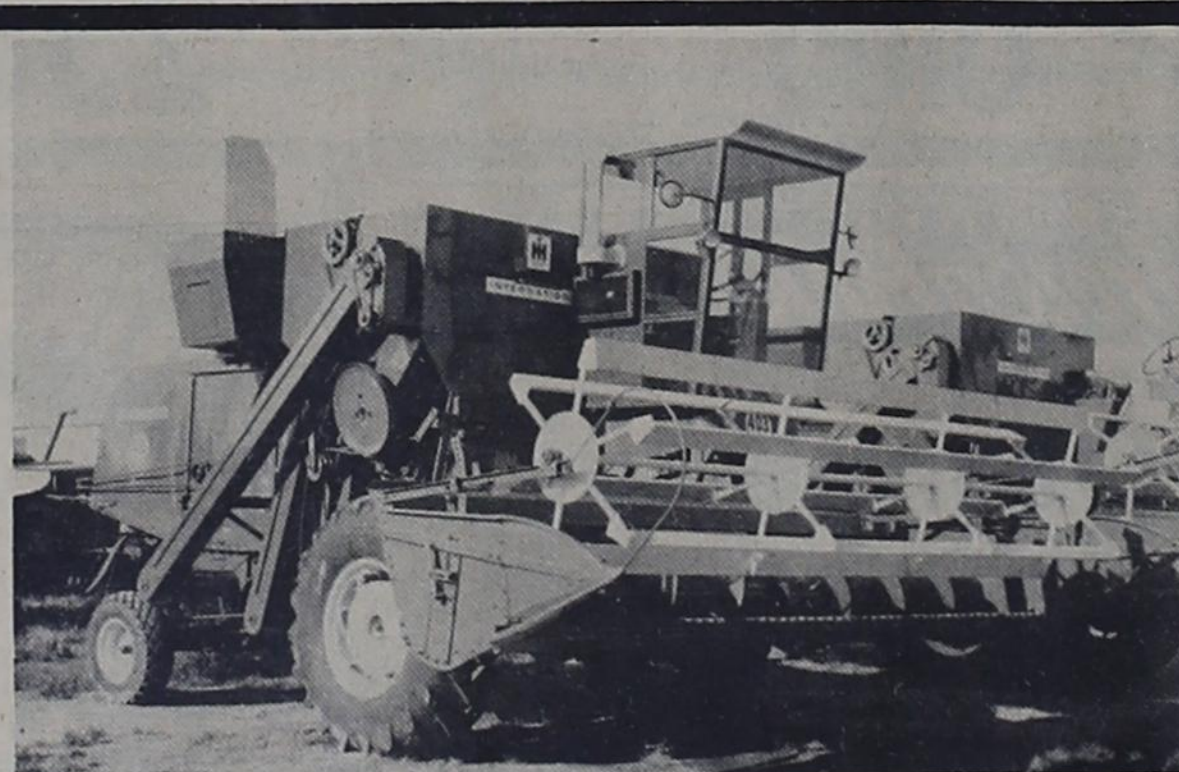
Salinity tests of water reveal whether it is safe to use for irrigation purposes and what management practices or soil amendments, if any, are needed for sustained production. Soil salinity tests are also important because soil types determine in many cases whether saline water is usable.

A charge of \$5.00 will be made for testing water samples and \$4.00 for soil salinity tests. Testing of soil samples for fertilizer and limestone requirements will continue to cost \$2.

A special set of forms has been developed for use of farmers in submitting water and soil samples for salinity testing. Farmer County farmers can obtain these forms along with additional information of salinity testing at my office.

HD Agent's Notes

Isn't research great? Long years ago our grandmothers thought they had all the modern conveniences of their day. Little did they know the conveniences their daughters would have just within the next generation. Now in their granddaughters' generation still more research has found better and quicker methods of homemaking.

For instance homemakers of today can find more attractive, and bruise-free products on the market just because of modern packaging of perishable fruits and vegetables. The very latest development is shrinkable film overwraps for tray-packed fruits and vegetables.

This film is applied at the time of harvest to hold the produce tightly on the tray so that it arrives at the supermarket field-fresh and virtually bruise-free.

Researchers find that tray packs with the shrinkable overwraps carry produce better than bulk shipments in crates and cartons. And there is no need for further packaging at the supermarket.

Shrinkable film wraps are now being used for apples, peaches, and pears. Wherever tested, fruit and vegetables wrapped in film and packed on the trays have proved popular with homemakers. They are able to readily see the condition of the produce.

Another product of research is for the packaging of foods for the home freezer. Foods can be packaged in heat-and-serve polyester pouches. Now the homemaker can package prepared foods in the pouches for freezing and heat the food in the same container ready for serving.

A new electric appliance is available to heat-seal the open-

ing of the package making it airtight and moisture-proof, so that original quality and flavor are retained. This packaging method is supposed to be well suited for all kinds of prepared foods, from soup to beef Stroganoff. Grandmother would never believe her eyes if she would see the improvements made in the latest type of can made of aluminum foil and paper. It is leak-proof, inexpensive, lightweight, and dent-resistant.

The body of the can is a spiral-wound combination of a solid, heavy-gauge, aluminum foil liner, a middle section of separate layers of paper-board, and a printed foil label. The thick, creaseless aluminum liner prevents leakage. The layers of material in tightly-sealed combination provide strength and seal out humidity and moisture.

Ends of the can are aluminum and come with two easy-opening tops. One end is opened by pulling a tearstrip and the other is lifted off with a hook opener. This can is designed only for items that do not involve heat processing or internal pressure. These include frozen juice concentrates, cooking fats and oils, spices and seasonings as well as a number of nonfood items.

Research has also found that cleanliness can go too far. Never wash eggs before storing them. Washing the eggs removes the natural protective coating which keeps air and foreign odors from entering the shell.

What's this about man-made fabrics stealing the show of fashions? According to U. S. Department of Agriculture's Economic Research Service cotton is still king with U. S. consumers. They report that 22 pounds of cotton per person was used last year. This was compared with 11 pounds of synthetic fibers and three pounds of wool used per person.

The USDA says that the label "imitation" need no longer be used on ham and other pork products that contain less than 10 percent excess water. However, they must be properly labeled as to the amount of water they contain and the label must be easily readable.

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The HAPPY HOMEMAKER

One thing too many of us overlook when buying new garments is the label on the garment. This label generally describes material in the garment and gives instructions about laundering or dry cleaning.

If these instructions are read and followed carefully, many times life of garments as well as their beauty can be preserved. Another thing that is very important is that ironing or pressing be done with irons that are the proper temperature for the particular garment.

Most of us enjoy eating roasting ears that have been cooked with shucks still on them when they've been cooked outdoors. But, did you ever try cooking them in the shuck in your oven?

The following recipe, a real old one, is being written exactly as it has been handed down from one generation to another. "Use good fresh corn. Strip the shucks on the ear, but do not remove them. Clean off all the silks and wash the corn. Dry it and wrap your best bacon sliced around each ear.

Put the shucks back over the ears, tying them at the ends. Put the corn into an extra thick baking pan, one that will not burn. Bake the corn slowly for about an hour. Serve it in the shucks."

If there's a beginning cook at your house or you want a "hurry up" tray of cookies, try making coconut macaroon treats, which can be made in ten minutes.

Mix together 2/3 cup condensed milk, 3 cups shredded coconut, 1 teaspoon vanilla extract and 3/4 teaspoon almond extract.

Drop by tablespoons, about 1 inch apart, onto a well-greased baking sheet.

Bake in 350 degree oven 8 to 10 minutes or until delicately browned around edges. Remove from baking sheet immediately.

This molasses cake recipe is one of the prize possessions of Mrs. Sam Lewis of Kendall County, Texas.

2/3 cup shortening
1 1/4 cups sugar
3 eggs
2 1/2 cups sifted flour
1/2 teaspoon soda
2 1/2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon cloves
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 teaspoon allspice
1/3 cup molasses
2/3 cup mashed bananas
1/2 cup milk

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Blend shortening and sugar and beat until fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Sift dry ingredients together and add alternately with molasses, bananas and milk.

Beat well. Pour into two nine inch layer cake pans which have been greased with melted shortening and lined with brown paper. Bake for about 40 minutes.

Cool cake in pans on cake rack for at least ten minutes. Remove from pans and let cool thoroughly before frosting.

FLUFFY FROSTING

2 egg whites
1 1/2 cups brown sugar, lightly packed
1/3 cup water
1/8 teaspoon cream of tartar
pinch of salt

Combine all ingredients in top of double boiler. Place over double boiler and beat with sturdy beater or mix at high speed of electric mixer until frosting "peaks." Remove from water and frost top and sides of cake.

Before the days of mechanical refrigerators and deep freezers, raisin pie was a stand by of most cooks and each one had her favorite recipe. Those of us who don't make raisin pie occasionally are missing a treat in good eating.

RAISIN, PIE

2 cups sugar
1/2 cup butter or margarine
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1 teaspoon ground allspice
3 or 4 eggs, well beaten
3 or 4 tablespoons vinegar
1 cup raisins
Unbaked pie shell.

Cream sugar, butter or margarine, cinnamon, and allspice. Add well beaten eggs, vinegar and raisins. Pour filling into an unbaked 8 or 9 inch pie shell. Bake at 400 degrees for 35 to 40 minutes.

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Citizens' Committee Commended For Its Work

As a result of waste notices and petitions for injunction being served in Farmer, Castro and Deaf Smith Counties by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District, a group of 50 to 60 irrigation farmers in Farmer County organized a Citizens' Committee to assist the District in finding solutions to problems of waste that plague some Southern High Plains farmers.

The Citizens' Committee is agreed that irrigation "tailwater" should be used to grow crops rather than run into bar-ditches or playa lakes and from there evaporate or be used by weeds.

T. I. Burleson of the Hub Community, an irrigation farmer, has been selected as chairman of the Citizens' Committee. Burleson states, "We want to work with the Water District. They realize that we're busy with our crops right now and recommend that after we're through harvesting this fall we decide what needs to be done on each farm to avoid having runoff water

and then do something about it."

Waste of irrigation water has long been the unwanted companion of many farmers. Solutions to this problem have not always been so apparent as have been the results of waste.

Tom McFarland, Water District Manager, has stated that the District is prepared to cooperate in every way possible in alleviating waste problems, and that the District's staff is ready and willing to work with anyone in finding an answer to his individual problem.

Management Course Scheduled

Latest range management practices will be discussed at the first annual Ranch Management Conference to be held on the Texas Tech campus September 7.

During the one-day conference expected to draw 200 people, range management problems will be discussed. This includes the latest methods in brush control, grazing systems, stocking rates, wildlife management, poisonous plant problems, and other problems which concern Texas ranchers.

There will be a special organizational meeting for the youngsters, so they are encouraged to attend.

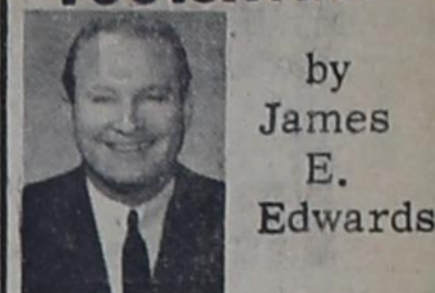
Naman will bring the organization up to date on activities of Farmers Union, legislation and so forth.

Did I Get A "Lemon?" (One pair of shoes from a manufacturer whose shoes she knows are good gave very poor service. Should she complain to the retailer?)

To keep your conscience clear, first consider the circumstances. If the child was learning to ride a bike or had just begun to ride the merry-go-round at the playground, maybe it was a case of unusually hard wear. I know from your letter that you are fair--you don't expect the shoe dealer to keep your child in shoes.

If the abuse of the shoes was just normal I would certainly show them to the dealer. The selection of leather in shoe manufacturing is a time-honored profession--handed down from father-to-son. I'll never know how they can tell from the look and feel of leather whether it will wear or not. Very, very rarely, a poor hide or a weak section of a hide slips by and is used. Drought-time animals, for instance, have an inferior hide. Shoe retailers and manufacturers know that some inferior leather is bound to slip through and they would much rather replace the shoes than have you change brands.

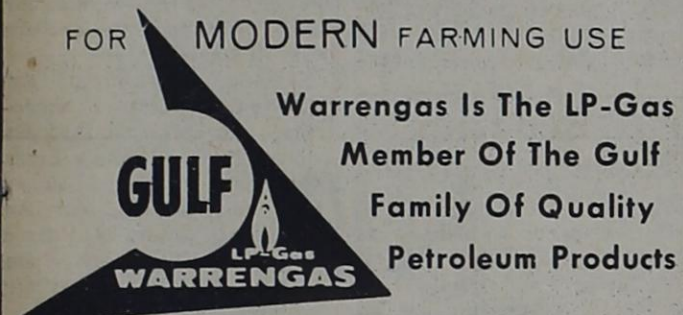

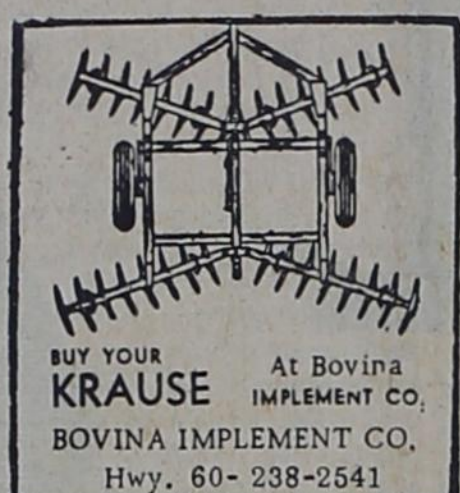
Game films will be used as coaches' aids and will also be shown at Quarterback Club meetings.
