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Long Delayed Ceremony

Governor Moody will join noted educators of Texas and several other states October 19 and 20 in the dedication of the new Education building at West Texas State Teachers college at Canyon.

No substantial addition to the administration facilities of West Texas' first state college has been made for more than a decade, and construction of this building should be looked upon as meeting a long necessary and deserved need. The college has grown rapidly during that decade, and the distribution of funds for higher education has not been equitable. It is not without a feeling that more building is deserved for the Panhandle that this structure will be dedicated.

The purpose to which the college plant addition will be dedicated is the training of teachers. Before the plans were completed, President J. A. Hill and the architect made many trips to other schools, and the Canyon building, for its size, will be recognized as one of the best in the country. The preparatory school, from kindergarten through high school, will offer prospective teachers a chance to work in an environment similar to that in which they will later preside.

With teaching as a profession worthy of the same type of training as other professional folk obtain, too much stress cannot be placed upon teacher training. The Canyon school in this regard ranks with the best in the nation.

Cause and Effect

Dispatches from other cities bolster the opinion that might be formed locally—that the cleaning up activities of Fire Prevention week are apt to cause more fires than usual.

From this standpoint, moreover, attempts to have fireless weeks and still remove fire hazards by burning rubbish are somewhat paradoxical. Grass fires, owing to the recent dry period in which vegetation died and became highly inflammable, are giving the most trouble.

Let's be careful, lest the remedy be more dangerous than the disease. However, clean-up drives should continue, lest carelessness later produce even more disastrous results than recklessness in burning rubbish.

Effect of Kellogg Note

Perhaps the most significant thing relative to the American note in answer to the Franco-British Naval accord is the way in which it has been received by British public sentiment. Instead of standing as an obstacle to a clearer and more amicable agreement for the limitation of armaments, it would appear that the rejection by the United States of the two-party compact between Great Britain and France will be in fact a decided step for the advancement of such an agreement. The British press, especially the more dignified and influential section of it, is almost a unit in deploring the circumstances attendant upon the agreement with

France, and in expression of gratification that the American note does not in any way close the door upon further steps for the limitation of naval armaments.

Some of the American headline writers seem to find a certain satisfaction in describing Mr. Kellogg's rejoinder as "sharp", "vigorous", or in otherwise making it appear that it was intended as a distinct rebuff to the British overtures. It is obviously not so taken abroad. On the contrary, British sentiment, which had already manifested a certain restiveness in the face of the mysterious secret pact, seems now to hail the American rejection of it as a real evidence of sympathy with the most intelligent British opinion.

Particularly is it interesting to observe that the English papers which are the most outspoken in condemnation of the agreement with France base their disapproval upon the proposition that it is likely to be offensive to the United States and make more difficult that Anglo-American accord in which the true hope of enduring world peace lies.

If this point of view could be emphasized continually, not merely in the British but in the American press as well, the abortive accord will have done good service even though it has failed of becoming effective along the lines originally designed. It has undoubtedly brought to the front and impressed anew upon the consciousness of the people of both English-speaking nations alike the necessity for and the possibility of such an understanding as will make the two nations one in insistence upon world peace and in defense of international harmony. It may be that more work is necessary on the American side of the Atlantic than on the English in order to make this conviction truly national. That work should be undertaken and pressed systematically. Only so can the widest measure of international harmony be attained.—Christian Science Monitor.

WASHINGTON LETTER

WASHINGTON — By the end of the campaign, Governor Alfred E. Smith ought to be one of the world's most important authorities on the feminine sex.

Herbert Hoover, too is learning about women from politics. But Smith, who, incidentally, has a wife and daughters, has been receiving the more intensive education. Two women especially have been taking an important part in his political life. One has devoted years to building him up; the other has recently undertaken to tear him down.

One is Mrs. Henry Moskowitz, the new York social worker, whose life's ambition is to make Smith president. The other is Mrs. Mabel Waller Willebrandt, who for eight years has been an assistant attorney general and whose chief interest lately has been to destroy Smith politically.

Mrs. Moskowitz is older. She has had more, perhaps, than anyone else to do with the remaking of Al Smith. The two first met when Smith was vice chairman of a legislative committee investigating sweat shop conditions such as existed before the horrible Triangle fire in New York. Up to that time Smith had been little more than a capable Tammany politician. With the aid of Mrs. Moskowitz his eyes were opened to a host of social injustices.

This Jewish woman became in time his most trusted adviser concerning affairs of New York state. Under her inspiration, Smith became the champion of humanitarian legislation. Meanwhile, she developed an intense admiration for the character and ability of Al Smith. When Smith developed presidential aspirations she fostered and guided them.

One of Smith's biographers, Henry F. Pringle, has suggested that if Smith were elected Mrs. Moskowitz might become the first woman cabinet member. But Mrs. Moskowitz, obviously by her own wish, holds no public office. She is chairman of publicity for the New York state Democratic organization and has taken an important part in the pre-convention and electoral campaigns. But she works quietly. One seldom finds her name in the newspapers.

Mrs. Willebrandt has had more publicity in the last few weeks than Mrs. Moskowitz has had in her whole life. She is not regarded as one of Hoover's closest advisers, and hence does not figure as a strategist like Mrs. Moskowitz. But she has set out to defeat Smith with all the courage and burning zeal with which the other woman has applied herself to the task of getting him elected. And both are able women.

There is no reason to suppose Mrs. Willebrandt is any great worry to Hoover. While some of his prominent supporters among politicians and newspapers were demanding that she be muzzled, Hoover kept hands off.

"Her beauty is just simple, natural, perfection," said Sir William Orpen, famed portrait painter and member of the Royal Academy, who judged the winners among 30,000 beauties entered in a contest sponsored by The Daily Mail, the great newspaper owned by Lord Rothermere. Prizes in the contest amounted to \$20,000.

A shy little Irish colleen, a decided contrast to the winning type, took second honors. She is Miss Clare Stritch and she lives with her parents in Dublin.

"Naturally, as an Irishman, I was delighted to find that the second prize winner is an Irish girl," said Sir William Orpen. "I didn't know this until after I had chosen her, but it is very fitting for there are many beautiful women in Ireland."

Commenting on his task of judging the photographs of 30,000 beautiful girls, Sir William said: "When I looked at my final selection of 50 photographs of the loveliest women competitors one calm and beautiful face caught and held my attention."

"That is the winner," I said. "What struck me was the beautiful symmetry of her features," he said.

Arriving in New York at 8 o'clock on the morning of Oct. 22, the Republican standard bearer will establish his headquarters at a Waldorf-Astoria hotel, where he will devote much of the day to conferences with New York leaders as well as those from Connecticut and New Jersey.

ry Will Have Murder Facts Soon in Memphis Trial

MEMPHIS, Oct. 10.—(AP)—With final arguments slated today, the trial of Clyde Miller, charged with the killing of Bruce Collier, 22, at Newlin last Christmas Eve, was expected to reach the jury before night.

Miller was charged with murder after Collier's body had been found in the wreckage of his automobile after it had been struck by a train on the outskirts of Newlin.

During the last two days the state attempted to prove that Miller and a companion, Jim Benight, charged as an accessory, placed the car containing Collier's body on the track.

Three witnesses yesterday testified that Collier has been hit over the head with a bottle in a cafe owned by Emmitt Miller, brother of the defendant, on the night of his death.

Strike of Express Men Is Mystery

NEW YORK, Oct. 10.—(AP)—The greater New York area was the scene today of an unannounced strike of members of the Brotherhood of Railroad and Express Clerks employed by the American Express company which went into effect at midnight and the cause of which was shrouded in some what of a mystery.

Union claims were that between 10,000 and 15,000 employees had quit their places on trucks, weighing machines and desks and asserted the strike would be extended throughout the country.

No official union statement on the reason for the strike could be obtained, but one delegate explained that the principal grievance is failure of the company to recognize the seniority rule whereby in slack seasons the most recent employees would be the first to be laid off.

Union pickets were on duty throughout the night at the various railroad yards and express company terminals. As drivers brought out their trucks for the day's work they were approached by the pickets and in cases where they were won over the trucks were taken back to the stables.

ARK, Oct. 10.—(AP)—The Frashier brothers, Cleveland real estate magnates, took control of their sixth railroad, the Buffalo, Rochester, and Albany, when they purchased approximately 600,000 shares of the 600-mile line.

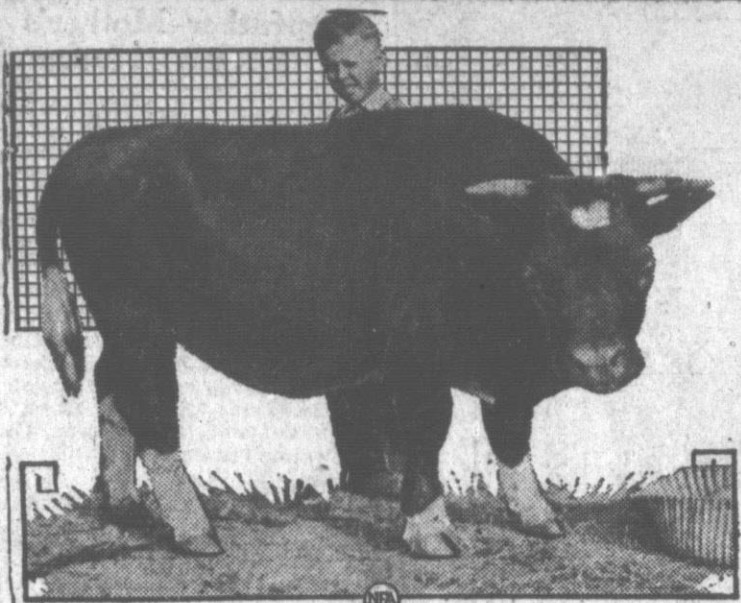

A NEW YORKER AT LARGE

NEW YORK.—The oldest inhabitant of New York is an immigrant from the South Seas. His dry and wrinkled flesh gives him the appearance of sinility, and he spends his winters in a room from which drafts are carefully shut out. But despite his 300 years he is in the prime of life, and unless he catches cold he should still be alive and active in 2228.

The city's patriarch is a turtle in the Bronx zoo. He has been a New Yorker since 1904, when he was brought from the Galapagos Islands. He has seen little of the city, but has met most of its citizens, for there are few who don't find time at least once a year for a trip to the zoological gardens in Bronx Park.

Vacation Is Over

The old tortoise has just concluded his annual two-month holiday in the open air. With the coming of September he has been transferred from his summer home, a fenced pen of sand to his winter quarters. There he will loaf in a heated room until another July, for his tropical constitution makes him particularly susceptible to pneumonia.

His zest for life is exceeded only by his appetite. Four or five dozen cabbages are just a fair meal for him, and he will devour two dozen watermelons for dessert. But such a feast satisfies him for two months. Between times he lurches on bananas, the offer of which brings his head and his two-foot neck from beneath the stony shelter of his shell. If such bait is held in front of him he will carry a 200-pound passenger on his back as he waddles to receive the fruit. Sleepy as he always is, he will rouse himself to let a visitor rub his leathery neck and his wheezy breathing seems like an effort to purr appreciation.

The age of this veteran is determined by the lines in his shell, and it is from such shells found in his native haunts that zoologists estimate his expectancy of life at a total of 600 or 700 years, if he keeps warm and avoids drafts.

The Clean-Up Squad

At all hours of the day or night, subway riders waiting for their trains see pick-up men, armed with sacks, and

spiked sticks, wandering along the tracks and spearing waste paper. On weekdays they confine their efforts to the vicinities of the stations. Once a week, on Sundays, they cover the stretches between stopping points. Gun and candy wrappers, old newspapers and all the debris the riders throw behind them is gleaned from the most travelled sections of the subway tracks every few hours.

When the pick-up man has a full sack he takes it to the nearest station and empties it into a bin. Each night a clean-up car collects the paper from the bins and takes it to be baled and sold to paper merchants. Revenue from this source amounts to about \$10,000 a year. It is small return for the expense of keeping the tracks clean, but a few weeks of neglect would leave the tubes too littered to be navigable.

Dividends Of Curiosity

If all the fans who telephone to studios asking for information about their favorite stars use pay-station telephones the telephone company must reap a considerable harvest from their curiosity. At First National it is estimated the fan calls would amount to \$100 a day if paid for at five cents a call, and that is only one studio.

Woman Arrested in Investigation of Strange Death

LUFKIN, Oct. 10.—(AP)—With the arrest yesterday of Lena Lane and her incarceration in the county jail on a charge of murder, three persons were awaiting action of the grand jury in its investigation of the mysterious death near here several weeks ago of Mrs. Daisy Kelley.

Paul Jones and Anderson Lovelady, also charged with murder in connection with Mrs. Kelley's death, are at liberty under bond. Mrs. Kelley's death is alleged to have occurred while she was on a motoring trip with the two men and the woman.

Officers have found the case difficult to fathom. Before dying Mrs. Kelley told members of her family she was ill with pneumonia. She told officers, however, that she had been shot accidentally. As a result of these conflicting statements an autopsy was ordered, revealing the woman had received two bullet wounds in the body and that her chest had been punctured twice by a sharp instrument, evidently an ice pick.

Veteran Aided By Buddies When His Alimony Lapses

WILLOWS, Cal., Oct. 10.—(AP)—More than three years incarceration in jail for refusal to pay \$20 a month for the support of his little daughter as ordered by the courts was at an end for Samuel W. Reid, World War veteran, today who was free as the result of action taken by his former buddies of the 363rd infantry.

Members of the infantry organization yesterday paid Reid's back alimony and a fine of \$250 assessed against Sheriff Roy Heard of Glenn county. The sheriff, recently took Reid from jail on his own responsibility in order that the "martyr" might attend a reunion of the service men.

Reid, who is said to be well to do, refused to pay the money to his wife on the ground that she was not a desirable person to have custody of his daughter.

LONGEST SEMI-RIGID DIRIGIBLE AT CONVENTION

SAN ANTONIO, Oct. 10.—(AP)—The RS-1, the largest semi-rigid dirigible in the United States, arrived over Brooks Field near here at 9 a. m. The trip from Scott Field, Ill., required a few minutes more than 24 hours.

"LOS ANGELES" PAUSES OVER COMMANDER'S HOME

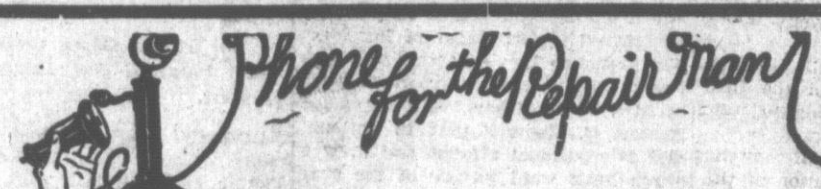

Smith Determined
To Make But One
Address This Week

NEW YORK, Oct. 10.—(P)—Governor Smith starts tonight on a trip to the Southland and its border states, ending with a speech Saturday night at Louisville.

Reports were prevalent that chairman Raskob wanted the Democratic presidential nominee to make at least one speech before reaching Kentucky Saturday morning, but it was doubtful whether he could persuade him to do so.

As the schedule now stands, the governor will make only rear platform appearances tomorrow night at Richmond, Va., and Raleigh, Greensboro, Salisbury, and Charlotte, N. C., and devote Friday to receptions and conferences with prominent Democrats at Chattanooga and Nashville, Tenn.

The Governor left intending to make only one address this week, and it is believed by those close to him that he will stick to that plan, although he may address a few informal words of greeting to well-wishers along the route to Tennessee.

Livestock Ranges
in Best Condition
of Several Years

AUSTIN, Oct. 10.—(P)—The condition of Texas livestock ranges on Oct. 1 was 89 per cent compared with 84 a month ago and also 86 percent, the average for the last five years, says the United States Department of Agriculture, in a statement today.

Although ranges deteriorated somewhat in the Northeast, Northwest and West-Center, they have shown improvement in other districts, the statement continues.

"In the west ranges are in better condition than for many years being recorded at 105 percent. Grass and weeds have grown up again in many areas, and if favored by a late frost date, will assure excellent winter range.

"Abundant rains in the South revived ranges in that district and with the exception of a few scattered sections, there will be adequate feed for local needs.

"Hay and other feed crops have made about average yields in those areas where rain has been adequate, and only a comparatively few sections will find it necessary to import feed.

"The October 1 condition of cattle is 89 percent remained the same as last month and two months ago but is one point better than the average for the last five years. Cattle have gone backward rapidly in the northeast and have lost flesh slightly in the Northwest and West-Center, but have shown improvement in other districts and are putting on flesh rapidly. Calves in some areas are not in as good flesh as a month ago, but with improved range conditions will be in good shape for delivery in November and December."

Massacres Reported
Still Under Way

SHANGHAI, Oct. 10.—(P)—Civil war in Kansu province, which was stated to have claimed more than 200,000 lives, was believed to be continued in the Western Chinese province.

In addition to the ravages of civil warfare the area was stated in advances from missions to be suffering from an intense famine. This had been aggravated by the fighting and the advice said that half the population of the province was liable to die during the coming winter.

(The latest estimate of the population of Kansu, compiled by the Chinese post office in 1923, is 5,927,997.)

65 Persons Buried
in Building Collapse

PRAGUE, CZECHOSLOVAKIA, Oct. 10.—(P)—Pitiful appeals for help coming today from the debris of an eight-story stone office building which collapsed yesterday spurred rescue workers on to dig out 65 persons estimated to be buried in the ruins. Eighteen bodies had been recovered and it was feared many of those entombed were dead. Two score were missing.

Pedestrians in the narrow street and passengers in a street car passing the building at the time of the collapse were injured.

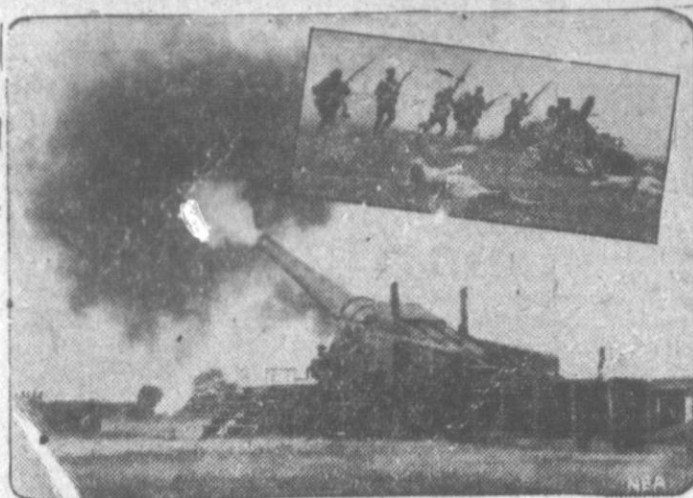
LOCAL NURSE MAKES

Assurance was given that no change will be made in the constitution at this session when the report of the committee or that subject, rejecting all proposed amendments, was unanimously adopted.

No Debate Develops

No debate was provoked by four minutes or resolutions which the resolution committee presented as a partial report and all of the proposals were unanimously endorsed. One urged that steps be taken to rebuke any person unauthorized to speak for the legion who attempts to represent the legion as taking a stand in partisan matters. As second declares it the policy of the Legion to take no stand on legislation not vital to the legion or its principles.

The convention also endorsed the report of the legislation committee which advocated passage of a universal law. This measure has had the approval of the Legion at several conventions.
