Texas Tech Budget For Next Biennium Approved Testimony Bares Huge Oklahoma Liquor Conspiracy

Expect 500 Students For Older Boys Meet Friday

Three-Day Conference Here Will Be One of Largest in History of Hi-Y of Section

NEARLY 500 student leaders in Hi-Y activities throughout Northwest Texas are expected to attend the fifth annual district Older Boys conference which will open here Friday and continue through Saturday. A dozen local committees today will complete arrangements for the influx of boys. Grover C. Good, associate secretary of the state Y. M. C. A. of Dallas, Wednesday night said that each committee had functioned well but that some preliminary work remained to be done before the conference began.

Registrations already received and communications assuring others indicated that the three-day meeting would be the largest in the annals of the Hi-Y in northwest Texas, Mr. Good said.

Hoover Tells Congress That Deficit Faced

President Says Government's
Finances in Sound Condition
Although Tax Rates Must
Be Increased

(By The Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—A deficit lies ahead and tax rates must be increased, but still, President Hoover today told congress, the government's finances are in a thoroughly sound condition.

The deficit he estimated at \$180,000,000 and he said, in his annual message, transmitting the budget, the one per cent income tax reduction granted a year ago could not be continued.

Economy Urged
But he submitted a balanced budget for the fiscal year 1932 and a statement that rigid economy in legislation would give the nation a surplus of \$300,000,000 for that period.

A "heavy decrease in probable income and the necessity to increase public works" and aid employment, he said, do not warrant continuation of the tax reduction.

The chief executive found no cause for concern in the impending deficit. It amounts, he said, to less than five per cent of the total government expenditure.

Confidence Sound
"When we stop to consider that we are progressively amortizing our public debt, and that a balanced budget is being presented for 1932, even after drastic cutting down of expenditures," his message ran, "I believe it will be agreed that our government's finances are in a sound condition."

Although asserting appropriations to relieve unemployment and help farmers of the drought area would tend to increase the deficit, he estimated, he expressed the opinion these needs could be met without undue danger.

The president was emphatic in warning congress against extravagant appropriations.
A total of \$2,922,942,900 was requested to finance the government through the next fiscal year. He recommended increases over current appropriations of \$109,628,000 for veterans, \$81,500,000 for federal aid roads, \$10,330,000 for public buildings, \$2,600,000 for prohibition enforcement, and \$25,000,000 for the shipping board's construction loan fund.

Seven Tillman Citizens Face Booze Charges

Four Witnesses Unfold Tale of
Alleged Official Convinced
Which Ended When Law De-
manded Reckoning

Try Cases Jointly

Seven Other Citizens of Same
County Plead Guilty to Federal
Charges; County Attorney
Center of Attack

(By The Associated Press)
OKLAHOMA CITY, Dec. 3.—A tale of alleged official conviction which ended in split friendships as the law closed in to demand a reckoning was unfolded by four witnesses who testified today in the case of seven Tillman county citizens charged by the government with conspiracy to violate the prohibition laws.

A total of 548 boys, 396 of whom were from out of town, attended the annual Northwest Texas Older Boys conference last year at Amarillo. Towns which have not notified conference officials of their delegations should do so today and make arrangements for registration to eliminate confusion in obtaining homes for the boys when they arrive, Mr. Good said.

The reception committee, of which Mrs. E. L. Robertson is chairman, is obtaining homes for the visiting boys. Church women's organizations have aided in this connection. Additional rooms are needed, however, and Mrs. Robertson is anxious that persons who can care for one or more delegates during the three-day session telephone her at No. 271, or the chamber of commerce at No. 268.

Automobiles Obtained
A group of 18 automobiles has been obtained by the welcoming committee, headed by Tom A. White, to transport the visiting boys through the town. Thirty cars as well as additional drivers are needed, however. Citizens willing to furnish cars and boys as drivers for this purpose are asked to call R. W. Matthews at telephone No. 1033.

Jailer Tells Of Beer Party

Defense Springs a Surprise
Witness in Trial of John
Alsup for Murder of Negro
in Alleged "Frameup"

(By The Associated Press)
DALLAS, Dec. 3.—Toi Johnson, Tarrant county jailer, related details of a midnight beer party in the Tarrant county jail at Fort Worth when R. A. Stuart, district attorney, was here and A. P. (Gus) Boy was prisoner-guest, in his testimony today in the murder trial of John Alsup, former Fort Worth policeman.

Alsup was charged in the slaying of George Terrell, negro, April 10, in an alleged "frame-up" holdup attempt upon the First State bank of Polk county. Another negro, Will Tate, lost his life in the holdup, which the state contends was "framed" for a reward.

Surprise Witness
Johnson was a surprise witness for the defense and offered testimony for the first time in a case being tried for the third time.

Frequent objections by the state interrupted Johnson's testimony and before he left the stand he told the court, in response to a question of state counsel, that he had not testified in previous trials of Alsup because he "didn't wish to humiliate Mr. Stuart and I kept my mouth shut."

During the morning session of the trial, Fort Worth barber, had testified that he, John Alsup, and Earl Wilson, former street car motorman, had framed the bank robbery and planned the shooting of the two negroes in order to reap a reward offered by the Texas Bankers Association for "dead bank bandits."

BANKERS TREASON FELT
ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Dec. 3. (P)—Two distinct earth tremors were felt here at 3:34 this afternoon. Buildings throughout the city were shaken and many people fled from their homes. In the downtown district buildings were shaken and in one building it was reported telephones were knocked from desks.

FRANFORT, Ind., Dec. 3. (P)—Five men who held up the Farmers State bank here shortly before 11:00 a. m. today, escaped with \$15,000, in currency and Liberty bonds.

**Wets are Against
Poisoned Alcohol**
WASHINGTON, Dec. 3. (P)—A drive against the use of government funds to put poison in industrial alcohol was planned today by the executive committee of the house wet bloc.

All parliamentary means are to be resorted to by the group to amend the treasury supply bill to prohibit use of any appropriation for poisoning purposes or for chemists who repair formulas used by commercial concerns in alcohol.

The committee also decided to petition the house judiciary committee to approve a bill to authorize manufacture and sale of beer.

A third step in the program is to invite every member of the house to join the committee in its efforts toward modification of the Volstead act.

Father of Child Victim Testifies Against Wife

Lee O'Loughlin Tells of Suspicions His
Spouse in Murder of 10-Year-Old Girl

(By The Associated Press)
DENVER, Dec. 3.—The father of 10-year-old Leona O'Loughlin today told a jury of his first suspicions that the child's stepmother, on trial for murder, might be concerned in the slaying of the girl.

Leona's body was found October 16 in Berkeley lake, two days before Leo O'Loughlin, the father, a city detective, had asked a fellow officer, Clarence Jones to search the pool. O'Loughlin, reportedly suffering from pulverized glass he had swallowed, was ill in a hospital and had not been told of his daughter's death.

Tells of Feelings
Today at the trial of Mrs. O'Loughlin, the stepmother arrested after the child's body was found, the father told how he felt his daughter had been slain.

"Why did you suggest Detective Jones search Berkeley lake?" John Keathing, chief of defense counsel, asked the witness.

"Because it was nearest the home—in a direct line from our home," O'Loughlin shouted the answer and pounded his clenched fist on the witness chair.

Then, in a whisper:
"It was the first time I had ever suspected her."

Frank O'Loughlin, brother of the detective, and a roomer at the O'Loughlin home, also is charged with murder in connection with the child's death.

Previous to the father's testimony the court room was darkened and microscopic photographs were shown in a projection machine in an attempt by the state to show that pulverized glass also was found in Leona's viscera.

Newspaper Man Crushed Under Wagon, Farmer Is Badly Hurt

Arthur Charters, of Meadow,
Suffers Seven Fractures to
Face and Head as Team
Runs Away; Brought Here

(By The Associated Press)
MADRID, Dec. 3.—A newspaper reporter resigned his job today and then, armed with a pistol, went to the office of Premier Berenguer and fired a shot over the premier's head.

The reporter, Joaquin Liso, denied he had intended to shoot the premier, declaring he wanted only to shoot at him as a protest against conditions in Spain.

Reporter Seized
However, his pistol jammed after the first shot and he was promptly seized by the premier's brother, Luis, who acts as his private secretary and was standing beside the premier when the shot was fired.

Berenguer, who had been about to hold a conference with assistant newspapermen, walked up to Liso with perfect coolness and said: "Well, why did you do that?"

"I came here," replied Liso, "to make a bloodless but energetic protest against the social regime represented by your government."

Berenguer then turned to the other newspapermen and said: "I am all right. Don't make much out of this, boys. It isn't anything. I am unhurt and he is only a poor, foolish fellow."

The premier then proceeding upstairs where he presided at a meeting of his cabinet as if nothing had happened.

Nervous and trembling and at times talking vaguely and incoherently, Liso was examined an hour and a half at police headquarters and then was looked up. He is about 40 years old, speaks several languages and is regarded as a student of foreign politics.

SEEK LOWER RATES Southwestern Railway State Business Loss Threatens

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3. (P)—Declaring they were threatened with complete loss of cotton hauling business on account of motor truck competition, southwestern railroads today filed application with the interstate commerce commission for permission to reduce rates on cotton transported from interior points to Texas seaports.

36 KILLED RIO DE JANEIRO, Dec. 3.— Thirty-six persons were killed and three buildings destroyed when a freight car loaded with dynamite exploded today at the railroad station at Porto Novo Du Cunha, state of Minas Geraes.

Among those killed was Major Manuel Lora, who was commander of the Porto Novo sector for the revolutionists during the movement which deposed the Washington Luis administration. His wife and three children also were killed.

The car of dynamite had been side-tracked at the station, since the revolutionary movement broke out. The cause of the explosion was not determined.

Amarillo Man Shot to Death By Hijackers

Operator of Small Grocery
Store Riddled by Bullets
After Apparently Resisting
Holdup by Two Men

Assassins Escape

Four Shots Fired Into Body
of H. A. McCarrick; Police
and Sheriff Departments
Join in Search for Slaying

(By The Associated Press)
AMARILLO, Dec. 3.—H. A. McCarrick, 45, operator of a small grocery store here was riddled with bullets by two hijackers near his home a few blocks from the store when he apparently resisted a hold-up at 9:35 p. m., according to an eye-witness. A bag of money, the day's receipts was not taken from him.

Earlier in the evening McCarrick had told a customer in the store that he suspected the actions of two men in the rear of his place of business. He was armed when he left the store. He was shot four times the bullets striking in his head, right lung and two in the abdomen. He died on the way to the hospital.

He is survived by a widow and one daughter, 3 years old.

He was carrying a basket of groceries home with him.

The two men fled on foot after firing without taking the money. It is not known if they later used a car. No definite description was available. The entire police and sheriff's forces immediately began a search of the surrounding territory.

Officer Slain in Student Rioting

HAVANA, Dec. 3. (P)—One policeman was killed and another wounded at noon here today as students protesting the reopening of the national university by presidential decree this morning, clashed with police during a downtown demonstration.

No students were reported wounded but fifty were arrested after rioting among them four girls who had led the parade from the university campus to the business district, carrying a Cuban flag.

The rioting began at the university this morning when classes were to have resumed after a shutdown of the institution during the November elections and the 15-day period of martial law which prevailed in Havana and suburbs until 48 hours ago.

TO ELECT OFFICERS Grand Lodge of Texas Masons In Session at Waco

WACO, Dec. 3. (P)—Officers for 1931 will be elected here tomorrow by the Grand Lodge of Texas Masons, and the installation ceremonies which follow are expected to end the order's ninety fifth annual communication. It began today with the annual address of Elmer F. Lively of Dallas, grand master of the Grand Lodge.

The girls orchestra from the Masonic home and school at Fort Worth gave a musical program for the reports of several committees and others took all day. The finance committee, whose chairman is L. E. Tension of Clifton, reported receipts from all sources during the year of \$421,858.77, of which \$170,000 was placed in the widows' and orphans fund for the home at Fort Worth and \$63,000 in endowment for the school. The 1931 budget will be \$12,000 less than for this year, it was said.

REHEARING REFUSED
Original Opinion Upheld in
Clyde Thompson Case
AUSTIN, Dec. 3. (P)—Refusing to disturb its original opinion, the state court of criminal appeals today overruled an application for rehearing for Clyde Thompson, Eastland county youth, sentenced to execution for the murder of A. L. Shock.

The record disclosed evidence that Thompson, with Lucian and Leon Shock and another boy on a hunting party, shot them in the back and then beat in their skulls with the butt of his gun. Woodrow Davis, the witness who told of the slaying, could assign no reason for his actions.

RELEASED ON BOND Joe Gonzales Is Charged with Theft of Merchandise

Joe Gonzales, Mexican facing a theft charge, was released from the county jail Wednesday on bond of \$25,000 fixed by G. R. Scott, justice of the peace.

Gonzales and Joe Herrera, another Mexican, were arrested November 10 and charged with theft of merchandise from Caprock Embroidery company, 815 Broadway. Herrera was convicted and is serving sentence in the county jail.

State Board of Control Gives
Formal Approval to Total;
to Be Submitted to Legisla-
ture in January

Library Included

Figures Face Battles Before
Money Made Available, Dr.
Paul W. Horn Says; Item
for New Building \$250,000

(By The Associated Press)
DALLAS, Dec. 3.—The state board of control today gave formal approval to the proposed budget for Texas Technological college for the next biennium beginning September 1, 1931.

The budget has a number of battles yet to go through before the money is actually available," Dr. Paul W. Horn, president said in commenting on the budget. "The legislature must act upon the figures and approve them and then they must go to the governor for his signature."

Building Included
Included in the second year's budget is an item of \$250,000 for the erection of a library building. This is the only building item in the budget, Dr. Horn said.

"Our appropriations, if the legislature approves them will not be available until next year, September 1, 1931," Dr. Horn said. "I hope that the library fund can be made available then."

"In the event that it is, we can have our plans for the library building ready and when the money becomes available, start work at once." Location of the proposed building will be immediately west of the administration building and south of the chemistry building, Dr. Horn said. The building will be designed to conform with the rest of the structures on the campus.

For the first year, the state board of control recommended \$556,750 and for the second year \$603,150. Deducting the library figure from the second year gives the total appropriation for operating of the school at \$1,109,900.

This is the second time that an appropriation for the library was submitted to the state legislature. Two years ago the appropriation was appropriated but the governor vetoed it.

Increase for the two years is approximately 18 per cent greater than for the current period, Dr. Horn said. The two years just closing had approximately \$970,000.

KIDNAPING CHARGED Robert Atkins Arrested Here For Fort Worth Officers

Arrested by Lubbock county officers on a warrant charging kidnapping, Robert Atkins, a baker, was taken into custody here Wednesday night by Tarrant county officers to be returned to Fort Worth by automobile.

Atkins was arrested Wednesday at a bakery at which he was employed on a warrant issued by a justice court at Fort Worth. The baker was accused of kidnapping his four-year-old son. The mother is divorced from Atkins and has remarried. The child was not found here, county officers reported.

WASHINGTON, N. Dec. 3.—Congress hoisted a heavy legislative burden to its shoulder today and started resolutely down the rough, rocky road of the short session.

For the first time since the legislators convened they put in a full day at work and when night fell they had several concrete accomplishments to show.

Bus Bill Debated
The senate applied itself so vigorously to debating the Couzens bus bill that a vote was near as the day drew to a close.

The house tackled the first annual appropriation bill, a measure carrying \$1,083,000,000 to meet expenses of the treasury and post office departments for the next fiscal year.

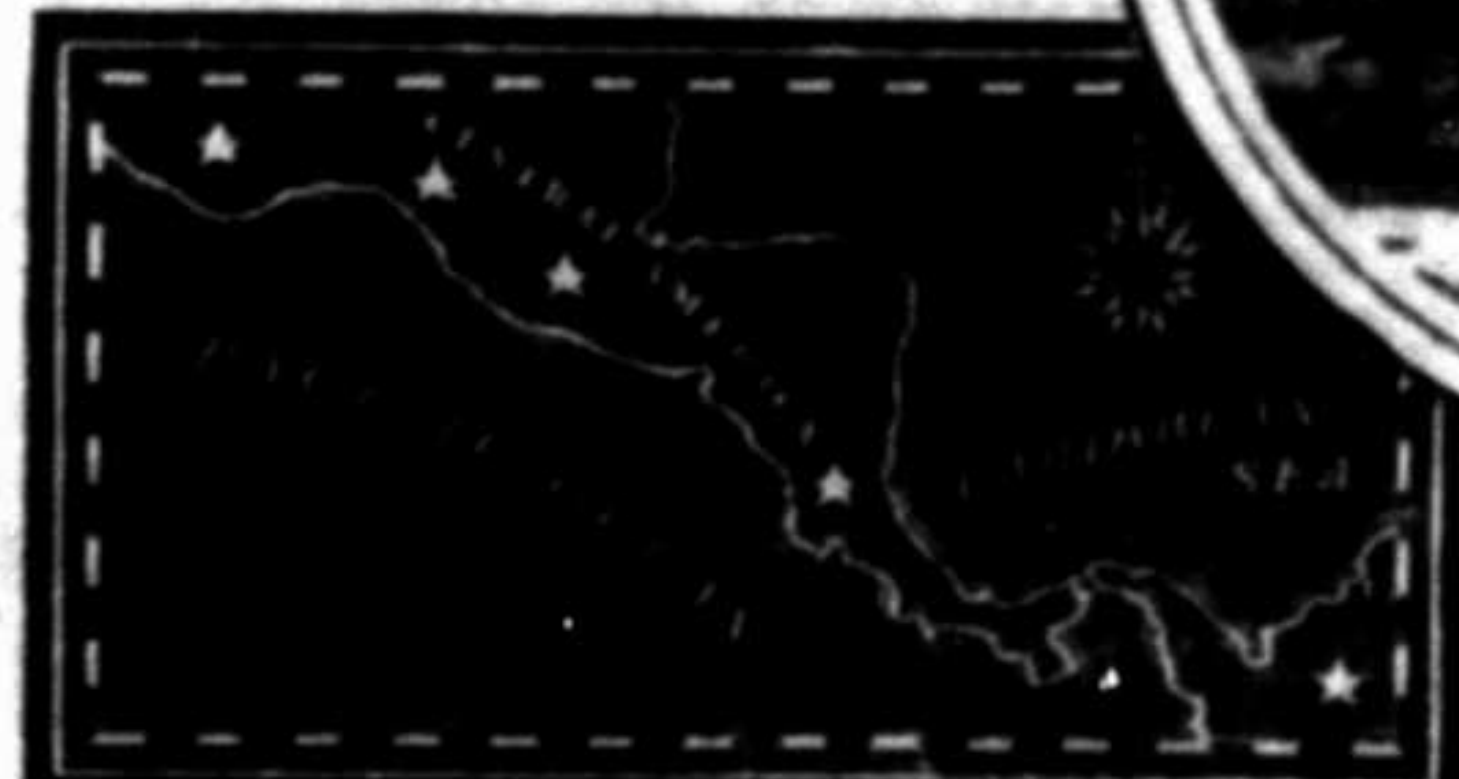

Armageddon, The Meeting Place Of Ancient Nations And Battleground Of Untold Centuries, Tells Story

CHICAGO, Dec. 3. (P.)—Armageddon, the meeting place of ancient nations, and battleground of untold centuries, is unfolding its secrets to the modern world.

From halfway round the globe, men have come to Palestine to extract new detail in the mosaic of civilization from the crumbling ruins of a mountain past.

Right Purchased
For a few thousand dollars, when once no money would suffice, the oriental institute of the University of Chicago has purchased the right to excavate on the site of the storied city. Dr. James H. Breasted, head of the institute, revealed today how a cross-section of human works in bygone centuries is slowly showing itself on the little hill near Mt. Calvary.

Stone age to Solomon to Palestine of 1890, with only the mountain peaks enduring—Armageddon is yielding visual history to the chipping knives of the Chicago expeditions.

It was Armageddon of which St. John the Divine wrote in Revelations: Armageddon, the site of the last great war, when the nations are gathered to "the battle of that great day of God Almighty."

Of the city which guarded the plains-dwelling Canaanites from attack he said:

"And I saw three unclean spirits like frogs come out of the mouth of the dragon and out of the mouth of the beast, and out of the mouth of the false prophet. For they are the spirits of devils, working miracles, which go forth unto the kings of the earth and of the whole world, to gather them to the battle of that great day of God Almighty."

"Behold, I come as a thief. Blessed is he that watcheth, and keepeth his garments, lest he walk naked, and they see his shame."

"And he gathered them together

into a place called in the Hebrew tongue Armageddon."

Scene of Fight
It was Armageddon where, 15 centuries before the Saviour, Canaanites and Egyptians under Thutmose III, fought under the fortified hills in the first known conflict on that site.

It was Armageddon where, 20 centuries after the Saviour, Lord Allenby led a British army forth to meet the Turks on a world war salient, and sent them flying back over the trail the hosts of Egypt once had taken.

But when Allenby fought, and when the expedition from the western world started its work in 1925, there were only mounds and well-tilled fields in the place of a city which looked toward the sea and the inland peaks.

Foot by foot these mounds have disclosed the presence of a dozen cities, each on the ruins of its predecessor. The stables which Solomon constructed were unearthed in 1927. The streets along which the citizens of his day traveled, the work they did, a few of the homes in which they lived,

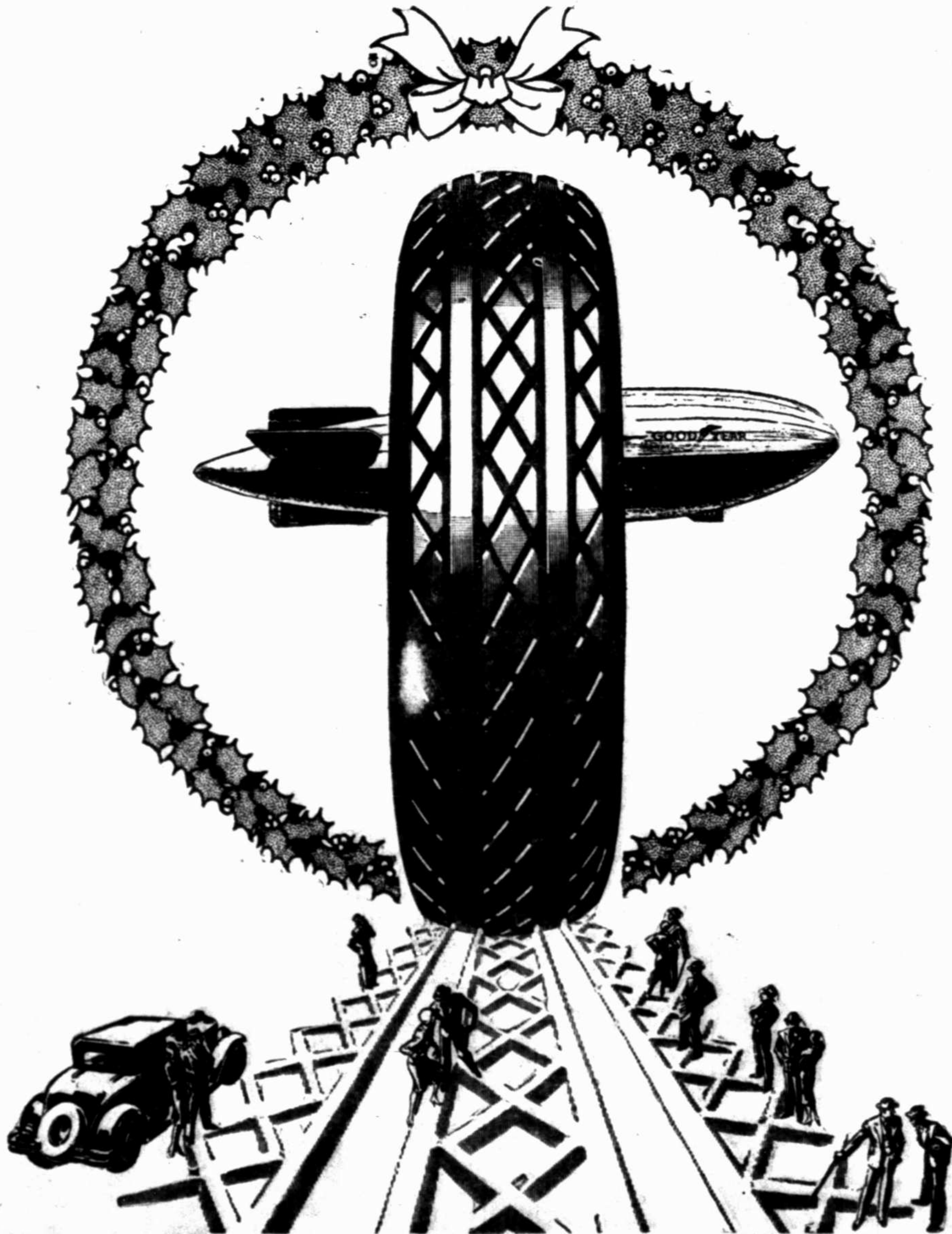

The Woman's Angle

IF A MAJORITY of the club women in Texas do not get out to Lubbock next year, it won't be because they are lacking in invitations.

Recently the Texas Federation of Women's clubs, which represents most of the progressive societies among women in the state, was given an invitation to meet in Lubbock next November in annual convention. That question is to be decided in January.

This week the United Daughters of the Confederacy, who are gathered in Austin for an annual session, are to be invited to meet next year in Lubbock. Miss Della Wilkinson is in Austin and will present the invitation for this event. She is backed by the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce and many citizens of the town in presenting the bid.

If Lubbock is chosen by the U. D. C. as a meeting place next year, between 150 and 300 women probably will visit in the city for approximately four days. Miss Wilkinson said before she left here Sunday. These women will be delegates from the chapters of the United Daughters in Texas and other visitors.

"We feel that Lubbock has a pretty good chance to get this convention, although I am the only representative to the Austin meeting," Miss Wilkinson said, but she requested that those who are interested should help by sending telegrams and other word to the women.

IS THIS TYPICAL? This morning I saw a list of men's favorite dishes that some household service is publishing. Pies were prevailing predominantly in the list and one dinner menu even carried two pies—a meat pie and a coconut chocolate pie.

I wonder if this is typical at all. To satisfy my curiosity to some extent, I conducted a short survey of the men in the office at this hour. There were 11 in the front office—editors, reporters, advertising men, a bookkeeper, a circulation assistant and a newsboy. Six of them expressed indifference concerning pies and five expressed fondness for the pastries. Five men from the back office—linotype operators and printers—were sought for opinions. Two are fond of pies, three not.

These men range in age from 15 years to the middle thirties. The oldest and youngest expressed a liking for the pies; two who said they are fond of the food are unusually slight, another stout, so that size has little to do with the appetite in this office. One man smacked his lips over fruit pies, another mentioned coconut pie as a favorite. Several said they eat pies occasionally, one launched into a lengthy discourse about the inadvisability of eating too much pastry because it is hard to digest, another gave me a long lecture on "Why Eat Pies"—actually this became somewhat of an educational project.

One was emphatic in expressing a distaste for pies. Two delayed their answers while their eyes lit up and their mouths watered and they asked, "Why, are you about to offer me one?"

There are five women in this office, three like pie, two do not care for them. One of the group expressed a particular preference for pumpkin pie with whipped cream on it.

Judging by the amount of pie and whipped cream that are served at parties in Lubbock, I am of the opinion that women are very fond of pastries, particularly rich ones. Date nut and pecan pies with whipped cream lead the list at winter parties, I believe.

WHAT MEN LIKE YESTERDAY, as I was passing through a crowded entrance to a downtown store, I met two young women in conversation and a phrase, "and men never get a drift to me today. I saw a list of 12 rules for women to follow if they wish to hold their husbands at home."

These rules were those given by the winner of a city-wide letter writing contest recently conducted in Memphis, Tenn. Leading this list was, "Fill the bathtub for him and give him a hand with the scrubbing of his back." Others included, keeping his clothes handy, complimenting him, learning his likes and dislikes, manifesting an interest in all he says and discussing current news and topics with him. The man is to be allowed certain hours for undisturbed reading, is to be overwhelmed with surprise, frequently reminded by his wife of the love she bears him, while the wife and children are to be kept apart and span and the list ends with an admonition to keep him so interested in you that he can't find time for another woman.

Nicely done, don't you think? I'd like to see all of my married friends make a note of these and, in lieu of a hope chest, I'll hang the clipping beside my dressing table, to be memorized!

The uniforms, black with red inserts, were purchased by the band and used for the first time when the Tech team went to Fort Worth to play the Texas Christian university football team. At that time the band played in several downtown Fort Worth hotels and attracted wide attention.

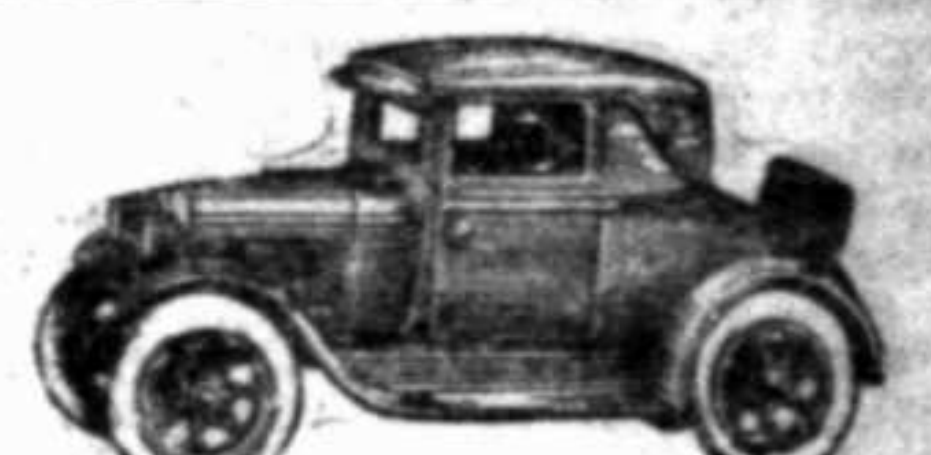

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The Time to Spend Money

DOCTRINES change with time and conditions. Things we all say and believe in today may be tenable tomorrow.

Thrifty offers a timely example. When times are prosperous and people are making more than they are accustomed to spend, thrifty requires that a part of the surplus earnings be saved for that inevitable rainy day. Wise, systematic saving—even frugality—hurts nobody and benefits all at a time like that, because there is enough business to keep everybody working without these extra dollars.

But times like the present follow, when we must revise our thrifty doctrines. Now it is more imperative that those property savings be spent extravagantly if necessary, than it was to save them in the first place. Placed in circulation now that will bring back prosperity and new opportunities to save.

While there is much to be said for saving, there is almost as much to be said against it. Consideration of the subject leads to the conclusion that saving is not so much a virtue as knowing when and when not to save. There are occasions when saving is so expensive that its achievement leads to a disproportionate extravagance in time, health and general well-being.

The extent of a nation's savings is an indication of its prosperity.

THE LEAGUE

Though there has been criticism of the League of Nations, it still stands secure and seems necessary, in the judgment of the most influential statesmen. Some who were originally cynical about it and who were notorious scoffers, now are frank to admit that they can not see how the world could get along without it.

Besides the concrete questions which are put before it from time to time, and most of which it has satisfactorily disposed of, its great utility is as a kind of open court—almost a court of justice—to which the nations of the world may resort with their complaints and demands, sure that they will get at least an equitable hearing and an impartial discussion.

The League of Nations, as the great clearing house of the world's public opinion, demonstrates its power to meet a great need. It is the one large organization through which the collective judgment and aspirations of all the civilized nations can be expressed and followed up by appropriate action.

Almost to a man the early critics of Woodrow Wilson's brain child now concede that the League of Nations will one day accomplish everything that its authors claimed for it. Its success has been beyond the expectations of those who were hopeful but did not discount the many obstacles to be overcome.

Practical Health Problems

INFANT SHOULD RECEIVE FOOD EVERY THREE OR FOUR HOURS

The baby is usually given its first feeding about 12 hours after birth and then every three hours during the next 24. After the third day the infant should nurse from both breasts every four hours.

Various physicians differ as to their beliefs regarding the technique of nursing, some suggesting that the infant nurse from each breast every three hours, others that the infant nurse from both breasts every four hours.

In case the infant is unable to empty the breast completely because of any deformity of the breast or because of weakness of the infant, it is usually desirable to empty the breast by hand massage or by the use of a device, and to feed the milk to the baby until the nursing of a sufficient amount becomes possible.

If the child cries because of hunger at the end of two and one-half or three hours, it may be hungry because it is not being fed enough or because its stomach is acting quickly. It may be desirable to try a three-hour schedule, but it is seldom, if ever, necessary to nurse an infant at a more frequent interval.

Among the reasons cited by Dr. W. McKim Marriott as advantages in favor of the four-hour interval are the following: The infant is hungry at the end of the four hours; nurses vigorously and more completely empties the breasts. This helps to stimulate the production of milk. The stomach and the intestines have a chance for a rest between feedings. The infant takes more food at a feeding and sleeps longer following the feeding. It is less likely to vomit than the infant fed at two or three-hour intervals. Finally, the long interval gives the mother a chance for rest and makes it unnecessary for her to spend all of her time with the baby.

Once a schedule is adopted, it should be followed closely. Sometimes the infant who is fed every four hours gets very hungry at the end of three or three and one-half hours, especially when the infant has been active or when the previous feeding has been small.

In such cases, the infant should not be allowed to cry for a half hour, but should be fed a little ahead of time. The next feeding should, however, be given at the regular period.

Some infants obtain all they need in 10 minutes, some require 15, or even 20. Little milk is obtained, however, after the first 10 minutes. Healthy babies nursing from both breasts should certainly not nurse longer than 10 minutes at each. The child who nurses a long time at the breast allows a lot of air which is regurgitated and which is sometimes associated with vomiting and colic.

It is usually best for the mother to sit up while the baby is nursing, and the infant may be held in a semi-erect position. Before nursing, it should be held upright over the mother's shoulder and patted on the back until any swallowed air is belched up and the same procedure must be undertaken after the nursing.

Some babies swallow air much more than do others. In such a case the infant may be held over the shoulder at occasional intervals during the feeding in order to permit it to get rid of the swallowed air.

Trade Report Stirs British

ASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—David Lloyd George, England's former prime minister, and his fellow Liberal, Lord Lothian, recently explained America's export trade in a fashion that is certain to stir up a first-class rumpus in congress.

She practically pays for the goods she sells, said the two eminent Britons, of this country.

Some of our own domestic critics of the American tariff system have been trying for quite awhile to express substantially the same idea but none has succeeded in doing it quite so bithly. With all due respect to Lord Lothian, it must have been ex-Premier Lloyd George who hit on the exact, compact little sentence employed. He always did have a positive genius for the epigrammatic.

ANYWAY, it was too clever a scrap of comment for our advocates of tariff reduction not to borrow—meantime wishing mightily that they themselves had thought of it, enabling them to use it without quotation marks.

Of course it may not be true. Still, it represents the candid opinion of a couple of Englishmen with considerable claims to be regarded as experts in the science of political economy, in conversation with other Englishmen—and pointing out our kind of economics to them as a horrible example to be steered as clear of as possible.

ENGLAND, as we know, is suffering from decidedly worse times and unemployment than have been afflicting the United States lately. A fortunate group of her public men have been insisting that her only hope of salvation lies in the abandonment of her free trade policy of nearly a century and the adoption of tariff protection in one form or another.

The Liberals, however, are free trade standpatters. Finally the tariff-ites asked them point blank: "Well, what would YOU do?"

THEREUPON ex-Premier Lloyd George, as Liberal leader, helped by his political chief lieutenant, Lord Lothian, drafted what London cables describe as a "memorandum" telling Prime Minister Ramsey MacDonald's government or "administration," as we say here, what the Liberals WOULD do.

The scheme hinges on a "back to the land" program, for the relief of unemployment, into which it is unnecessary to enter. But the nub of the "memo" from the standpoint of American interest, is to be found in the warning it contained that—

Under no circumstances must free trade be sacrificed for England essentially is a manufacturing country, dependent for her welfare on foreign markets for her industrial products, and free trade, in turn, is absolutely essential to a big national export business.

THE FORMER British prime minister and his lordship Lothian obviously intend to say that an exporter's production costs must be low to permit to underbid rival countries' exporters in foreign trade fields.

Just as obviously the ex-premier and his lordship anticipated a reminder from British tariff-ites that American manufacturers, despite their high production costs, have been getting a lot of customers away from English manufacturers in great many parts of the world—for, without waiting for any reminder, they add:

"Statistics show that the United States can only secure an export trade at all, at her present costs of production, as she lends abroad."

"She practically pays for the goods she sells."

THIS IS a new way of looking at it, anyway. It is true, too, that we do lend barrels of money.

Possibly the answer to the puzzle is concealed somewhere in the statistics referred to by ex-Premier Lloyd George and Lord Lothian—statistics which may differ from our own commerce department's trade statistics.

Tariff revisionists are digging into them for all they are worth now—before congress gets under way.

GULIBLE EUROPE

At the moment the scheme for an economic union of European states seems to provide only for a league of debtors to the United States. But in liberal circles on the continent the hope persists that a political confederation would ultimately result.

"The United States of Europe" is the label plastered on this hope. That's natural. Many Europeans regard the United States of America as a model union of independent states. And Europeans would insist, upon entering a confederation, that the participating governments would not lose their sovereignty.

Apparently the people of Europe have more theoretical than practical knowledge of the government of the United States. They have read all about the high intentions of the founders of our republic to preserve the sovereignty of the states, but seem to have overlooked the extent to which the federal government has swallowed state sovereignty.

Those turbulent and belligerent countries of Europe would seek peace and comity in centralization. We would seek the same thing in a little decentralization. If Europe attempts centralization, it should first guard against too much of the good thing and guard against better than we did. Otherwise it will substitute for boundary disputes battles over state's rights and attempts by minorities and the smaller states to inflict their will upon the majority and the larger states.

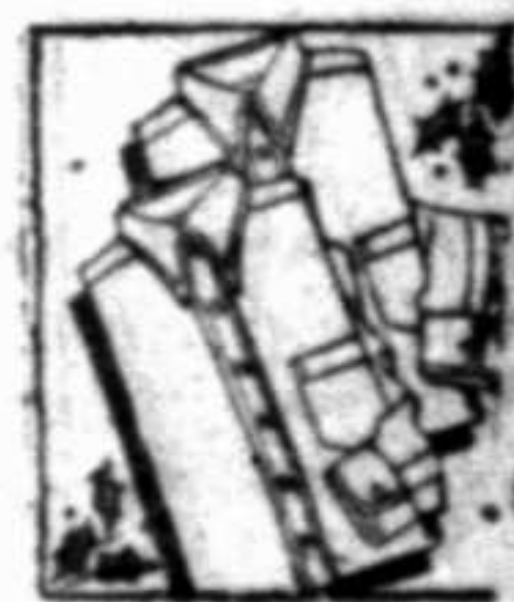

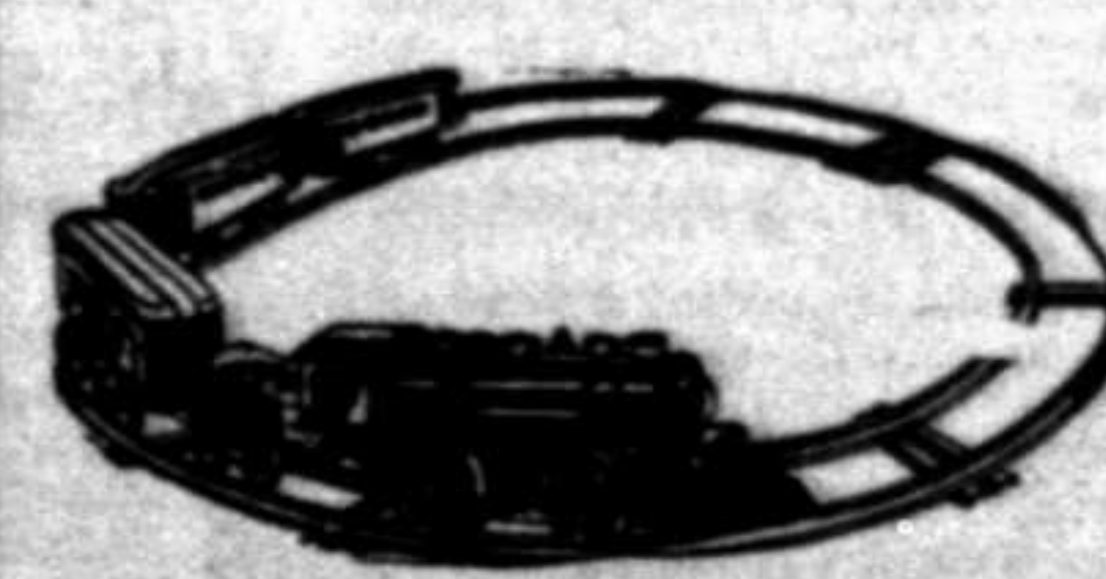

SUPPORT PLEDGED

Chambers of Commerce Behind Proposed Extension

LOVINGTON, Dec. 3. (Special.)—The chamber of commerce of Lovington, Artesia and Carlsbad, New Mexico; Lubbock, Floydada, Brownfield and Levelland, Texas, have pledged their support to the proposed extension of the Frisco railroad from Floydada to either Artesia or Carlsbad. A recent survey was made by the Quanah-Acme and Pacific along this route and railroad officials talked favorably of the survey. This route would serve a large virgin territory.

Caverns Shaft Costs \$95,000

Installation of Elevator to Big Room of Famous Carlsbad Cave to Be Made; Contracts Are Awarded

CARLSBAD, N. M., Dec. 3. (Spe.)—Sinking of a 750-foot shaft and installation of an elevator to the big room of Carlsbad caverns here will require an expenditure of nearly \$95,000 by the United States government, Thomas Boles, superintendent, revealed today in announcing the winner of the shaft contract.

Charles H. Dunning, of Phoenix, Ariz., was the low bidder on the shaft work. His figures were \$61,491 for the work. Highest bid for the shaft was \$96,376, Mr. Boles said.

Elevator Costs \$18,829

Installation of the elevator will cost \$18,829. Name of the successful bidder was not given out. Miscellaneous equipment to be installed will add another sum to the total, \$12,798, making the cost \$93,118.

While this figure is larger than the appropriation by congress, \$85,000, yet it is thought by Mr. Boles that it will be possible to transfer \$10,000 remaining in the extra flood light fund to the elevator fund to take care of the cost. Additional appropriations for flood lights was made but the present system is said to be enough to take care of the needs for some time to come.

Highest bid for the elevator and shaft was \$128,003. There were 40 firms bidding on the entire job, Mr. Boles was told. Only six were complete bids, however.

A charge of illegal sale of liquor was filed against James McLemon, negro porter at a local hotel, before G. R. Scott, justice of the peace, Wednesday.

SCHOOLS CROWDED

Conditions at Lovington Are Considered Acute

LOVINGTON, Dec. 3. (Special.)—Crowded school conditions have become acute in Lovington, according to R. H. Pyburn, superintendent of the local public schools. Two years ago a modern high school building was erected to accommodate 450 pupils, and at present there are near 600 children enrolled. According to the present rate of increase there would be near 1,000 pupils by the end of the school year Pyburn said.

The school board recently made arrangements for additional rooms in the gymnasium building and Methodist church, yet ample room is lacking. A committee from the chamber of commerce and the school board are working out a plan to finance a \$40,000 building for emergency until additional bonds can be voted for new buildings in 1931.

Miss Clark said she found the class records, plans and reports thoroughly planned and filed, Mr. Duncan reported. The library and equipment are adequate, the pottery, textile and flowers are arranged attractively, the bulletin boards of illustrated articles have artistic qualities and the department reflects very high standards.

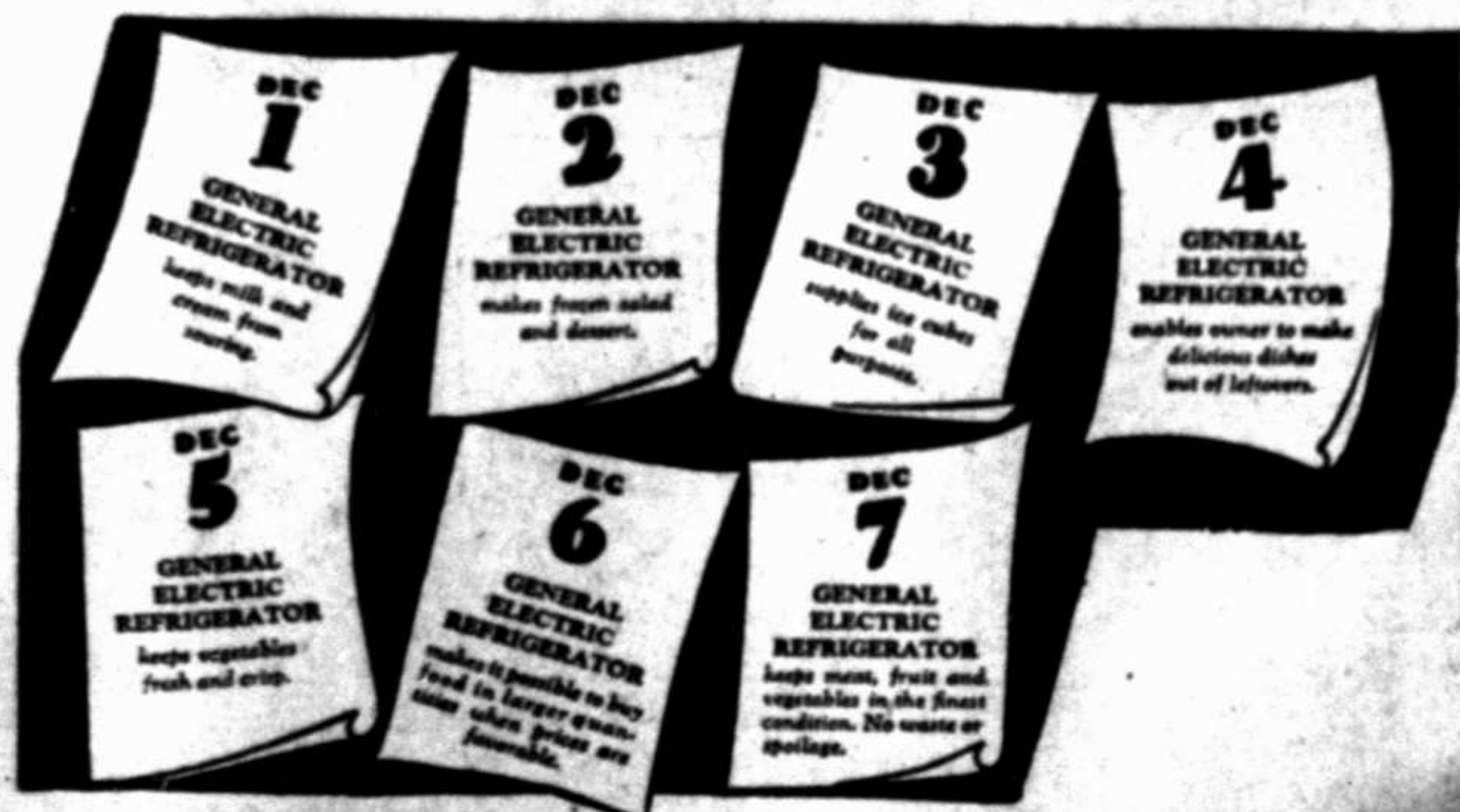
