Chain Of Thefts Hits Here

Almost it could be the plot of a TV screen play - the chain of events leading up to the theft of Ed Bennett's new red, four wheel drive pickup Thursday morning.

Law enforcement officers in Texas and New Mexico are hunting for two suspects believed to have stolen Bennett's pickup and others from Woodward, Okla. to Hart.

A pickup reported stolen from Woodward was left Wednesday night in exchange of a pickup belonging to Lupe Alviar of Kress. That theft occurred about 11 p.m., according to Swisher County Sheriff Gary Gerdes.

From Kress, the two suspects apparently headed for Hart where they left the Alviar vehicle at the home of

Orval Preston. They evidently intended to take the car of Doris Lacy. A futile search for a hidden key apparently caused them to attempt to hot wire the car. Unsuccessful, they stole a pickup belonging to Daryl McLain.

Next stop of the car thieves was the Green Frog where Bennett sat drinking coffee. When he came out of the cafe, his red pickup was missing but McLain's pickup had been left.

It was first believed the suspects might be the two men who are being hunted in the shooting deaths last Monday of the Rev. and Mrs. Richard B. Douglass of Putnam City, Okla. and their wounded sons. That theory has been discounted.

James McLain Wins Top Money

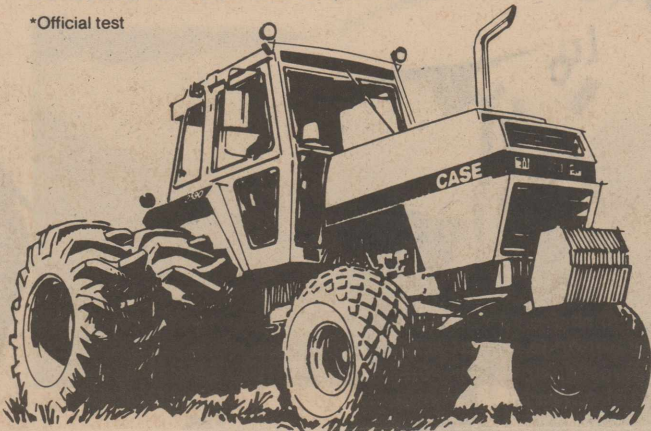

Mmes. Tom McLain and Black were program leaders, giving an interesting and informational review of tornadoes. The first tornado known of in North America occurred in Massachusetts in 1643. The first tornado in Texas was March 31, 1889 near Hamilton.

Worst months for tornadoes are May and June followed by March and

October. The worst tornado in loss of life occurred in Texas May 18, 1902 in Goliad; the next, May 11, 1953 in Waco.

Texas is the leading state for the frequency of tornadoes. From 1916 to 1968, there were 2,140 counted. Per square mile, more tornadoes occur in Oklahoma - one per 60 square miles.

The program leaders then showed slides of the Wichita Falls tornado this year which was rated as the most expensive financially.

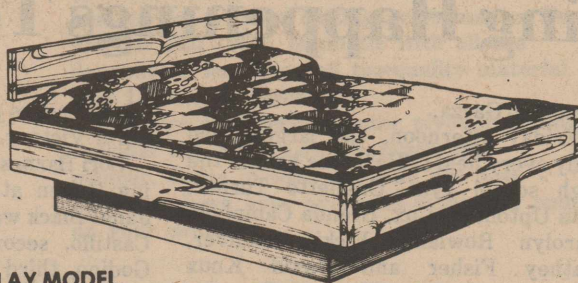

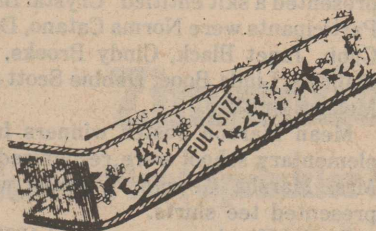
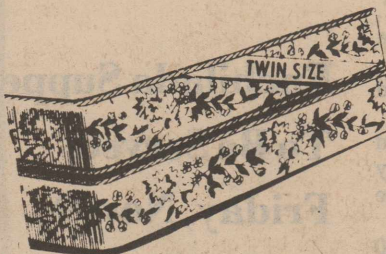

Cook Of The Week

LASAGNA CASSEROLE

1 lb ground beef
1 t salt
2 t salt
2 cloves garlic, crushed
1/2 t pepper
1 - 1 lb, 8 oz can tomatoes
1 - 8 oz can tomato sauce
1 pkg spaghetti sauce mix
1/2 lb lasagna noodles
1/2 lb mozzarella cheese, sliced
1/2 c parmesan cheese
1 carton cottage cheese
Brown meat. Add salt, garlic and pepper. Simmer 10 mins. Add canned tomatoes, tomato sauce and spaghetti mix. Stir thoroughly. Cover and

simmer 30 mins. Boil noodles in salted water until almost tender. Drain and rinse. Pour 1/4 meat sauce into 8x12x2 baking dish. Cover with 1/3 noodles. Arrange 1/3 mozzarella cheese over noodles. Repeat layers 2 times, ending with meat sauce. Top with parmesan cheese.

Bake 20 mins at 350°.

Yield: 6 to 8 servings.

CRANBERRY SALAD

2 c cranberries
1 c sugar
Juice of 1 orange and 1 lemon
Boil over slow heat for 10 mins. Then add 1 pkg plain gelatin which has been soaked in 1/2 c water. When cool, add pinch of salt.
1 c celery, cut fine
1 c apples, cut fine
1 c pecans, chopped
Stir together and pour into salad bowl. Place in refrigerator to congeal.

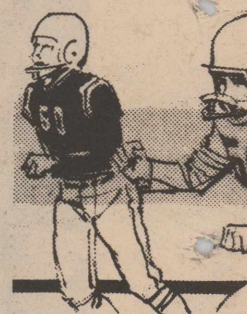

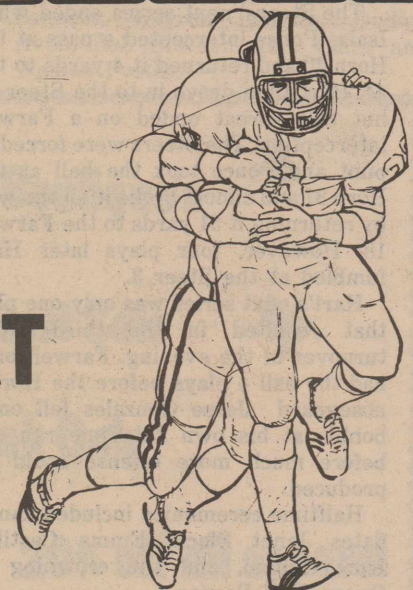
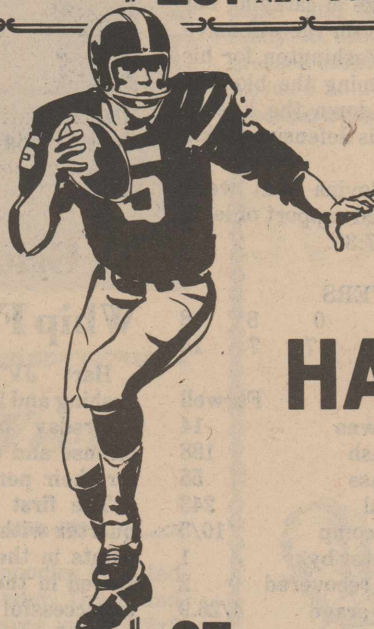

Longhorns Lose District Opener

Hart Longhorns dropped its Homecoming and district opener 14-8 to the Farwell Steers Friday night. Again, costing the victory was turnovers as Hart could only get points on the board one time out of four penetrations.

Neither the Horns nor the Steers generated much offense in the first quarter but Hart did start a drive at its own 49 that carried into the second stanza and down to the Farwell 13 before running out of steam, thanks to a penalty and a fumble that, although retained by the Horns, took away the threat.

The Steers' next series ended when Isaias Ponce intercepted a pass at the Horn 40 and returned it 4 yards to the 44. Hart then drove in to the Steer 19 but that threat ended on a Farwell interception. The Steers were forced to punt and Ponce took the ball at the Horn 31 and almost broke it all the way by returning it 51 yards to the Farwell 18. However, four plays later Hart fumbled at the Steer 3.

Hart's next series was only one play that resulted in the third Horn turnover of the evening. Farwell only had the ball 4 plays before the Horn's noseguard Jesse Gonzales fell on a bobble at his own 22. Time ran out before much more offense could be produced.

Halftime ceremonies included candidates Janet Black, Emma Castillo, Irma Godino, and the crowning of Queen Lori Barnes.

The third quarter brought the first score of the game following a Hart 15 yard penalty and 2 big breaking plays before the Steer's QB Mark Owen broke from 9 yards out for the score with 1:34 left. Mac Langford added the kick.

Farwell's first possession in the final period also used two long gainers on passes before Owen hit halfback James Castleberry for 20 yards and the score. Langford again added the kick.

The Horns, however, playing more like the team they are, never quit. The following series ended with a punt but the Steers fumbled 3 plays later and

the Horns, looking like Horns of old, went to work.

Using a key interference call and a 14 yard pass from Derek Rich to Melvin Washington, Hart drove to the eight. Rich then got to the half yard line on 2 keepers before halfback Keith Newsom got the score with 15 seconds left. Newsom then added the PAT run.

The ensuing on-side kickoff almost, but not quite, fell into Hart position. Farwell was then able to run out the clock.

Despite the loss, the Mean Maroon played better than they have all year, looking more like a team and less like individuals. For their team effort, special accolades go to Daniel Higgins for his high percentage of carrying out blocking assignments on the offensive line and to Melvin Washington for his excellent job of jamming the blocker, reading and sliding down the line to make the play from his defensive tackle position.

Hart travels to Bovina next week and need the continued support of loyal fans. Game time is 7:30.

beverage for consumption, sale or distribution while on the school grounds or in a building of a public elementary, junior high or senior high school or while entering or inside any enclosure, field or stadium where an athletic event sponsored or participated in by a public elementary, junior high or senior high school is unlawful.

If any officer of the state sees any person violating this rule, he shall immediately seize the intoxicating beverage and within a reasonable time, deliver it to the county or district attorney to be held as evidence until the trial of the accused possessor and then dispose of the same.

Any persons violating the provisions of this shall be guilty of a Class C misdemeanor with fine up to \$200.

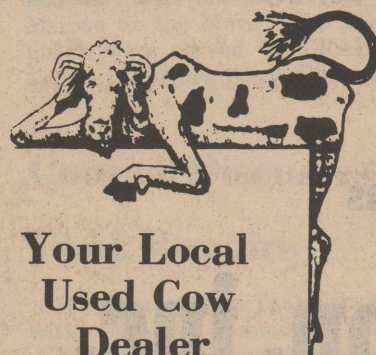

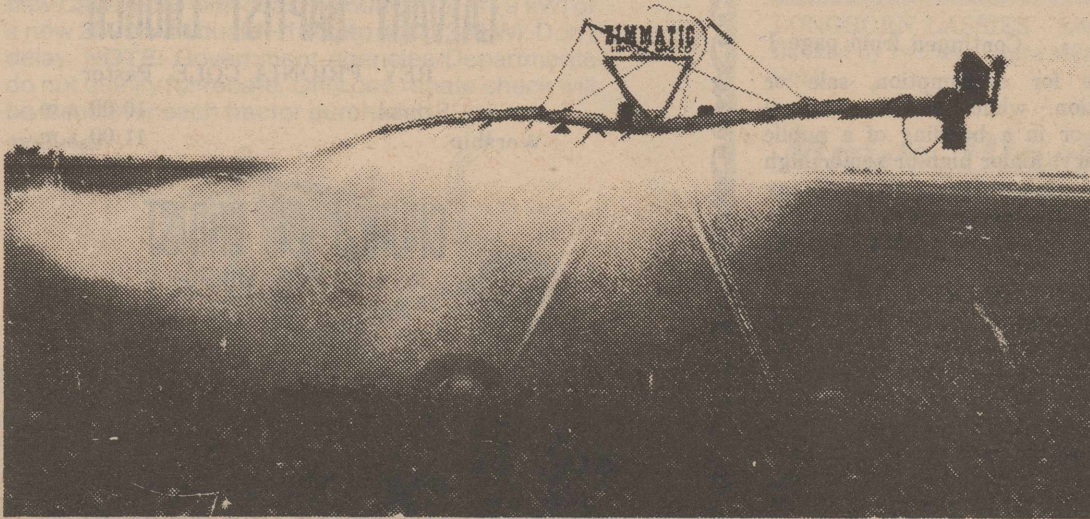
