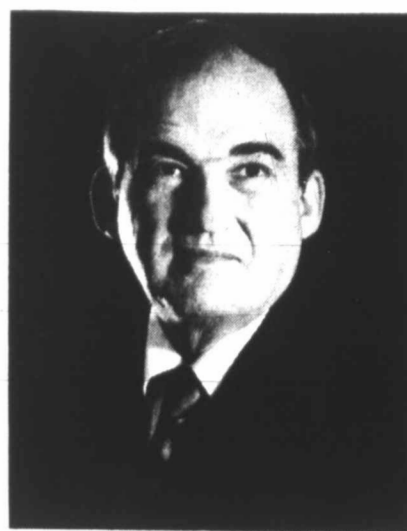

Halfway through the local football season, The Record's 10-man panel of football game prognosticators is still in a tight race for the best record. ## Judging today; horse, pet shows, bake-off slated

The doors of Mitchell County Fair opened at 7:30 this morning to accept entries in all departments, at the Ag Barns on West Highway 80.

A large number of entries are expected in each of the departments which include agriculture products, horticulture, women and youth foods and needlework, youth craft, art, adult crafts, men, and antique and grandparents' brags. Some requirements are that in the art department, no sawtooth brackets are to be used; all canned or preserved foods must be in Kerr or Bell jars; and

grandparents brag pictures must be 8x10 and unframed.

All entries must be in by 12 noon today to be ready for the judging to be conducted from 1 to 6 p.m. All out of town judges will be used.

After the judging is completed all the exhibits will be open to the public from 6 to 10 p.m.

The Fair will again be open to the public from 4 p.m. to 10 p.m. Friday and again from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. on Saturday.

Several special events are on tap for Saturday. A Mitchell

## County buys tractor; approves new pagers for Loraine firemen

Mitchell County Commissioners Court purchased a new tractor and agreed to furnish the Loraine firemen with communication pagers as the main actions of a special meeting Tuesday morning.

Three bids were received for the tractor requested by Commissioner Bill Preston for use in Precinct 4. Costin Implement of Colorado City had the low bid of \$37,998 for a new Ford diesel tractor; G&H Supply of Loraine offered a Deutz-Allis 7120 AWD Diesel tractor for \$39,750; and Key Bros. Implement of Colorado City offered a John Deere 4250 model diesel for \$44,978.42. Preston moved to accept the bid of G&H because of its immediate availability, a front-end deferral lock and some extra accessories. The Court approved the motion to accept the G&H Supply bid.

### LORAINE PAGERS

Donnie Phillips, representing the Loraine Volunteer Fire Department appeared before the Court to ask the County to supply 20 portable pagers for the Loraine firemen. Phillips explained they were having difficulty notifying firemen of fire calls. He said currently only one fireman lived in Loraine, who could hear the fire siren, others lived or worked outside the city and usually were not close by the old hand-me-down non-portable pagers now being used. He said Colorado City had agreed to activate the pager calls through the police dispatchers.

The Court agreed to furnish the pagers and will advertise or seek bids to be opened at 9 a.m. on October 18. Estimated cost of the pagers is \$380 each.

monthly rental fee rather than \$500 originally requested. The Health Department has only \$200 per month available, but Ware said the Family Planning Agency will probably be able to pay \$200 rather than \$100 per month, in order to use the larger clinic facilities. Arrangements and contracts were to be worked out between the agencies and the Hospital, if the Board approved.

Commissioner Roach reported that new revised plans for an addition to the jail for a kitchen had been completed. Architects are to appear at the October 10 meeting of the Court to discuss several options available before plans and specifications can be completed for bid letting. Original plans for remodeling and expanding the kitchen facilities in the present jail had proved to be much more costly than a new addition.

Commissioner Roach also received approval from the Court to establish speed limits on County Road 137, the Buford Road from I-20 to State Highway 208. The speed limit will be posted at 45 mph on that portion that lies within the City Limits, and 50 mph on the portion outside the City Limits. Roach pointed out that many complaints had been received about excessive speeds on the road.

While presenting \$59,040.61 in

bills for payment, County Auditor Georgia Griffith reported receiving a bill from a local doctor for \$825 for emergency treatment of a County Jail inmate, with a complaint that local doctors were not getting paid for their services in such cases.

The Court pointed out that by law with a county-wide hospital district, the county is prohibited from paying county indigent health care. The court indicated it should be determined whether or not the inmate was considered an indigent with residence in the county. If so, then it was the responsibility of the Hospital District. If the subject was a non-resident indigent it was the county's responsibility. If the subject was not an indigent then the doctors would have to use their own collection procedures.

County Commissioner Johnny Shackelford reported that audit of the Mitchell County Ambulance Service had been completed for the past fiscal year. The audit will be presented at the Court's regular meeting in October. However, Shackelford advised the Court that the ambulance service had shown a loss of about \$3,000 the past year.

All members of the Court were present. Representatives for the three companies offering the tractor bids were also present.

Continuing from last week, is the following list of conditions or defects constituting an "uninhabitable and dangerous building":

(6) All buildings, dwellings, or dwelling units which have become or are so dilapidated, or decayed, and unsafe, or unsanitary, or which so utterly fail to provide the amenities essential to decent living that they are unfit for human habitation, or are likely to cause sickness or disease, so as to work injury to the health, morals, safety, or general welfare of those living therein.

(7) All buildings, dwellings or dwelling units having inadequate light, air, and sanitation facilities as defined, to protect the health, morals, safety, or general welfare of human beings who live or may live therein.

(8) All buildings, dwellings, or dwelling units having inadequate facilities for egress in case of fire or panic, or those having insufficient stairways, elevators, fire escapes or other means of ingress or egress, as defined.

(9) All buildings, dwellings, or dwelling units which have parts thereof which are so attached that they may fall and injure members of the public or property.

(10) All buildings, dwellings, or dwelling units which, because of their condition are unsanitary, or dangerous to the health, safety, or general welfare of the people of this City."

We are asking permission from property owners to tear down and clear lots where these uninhabitable and dangerous buildings are located. Please help us. Call or come by the City Hall and sign permission forms.

buried there, I am willing to pay \$3.00 a year to that end.

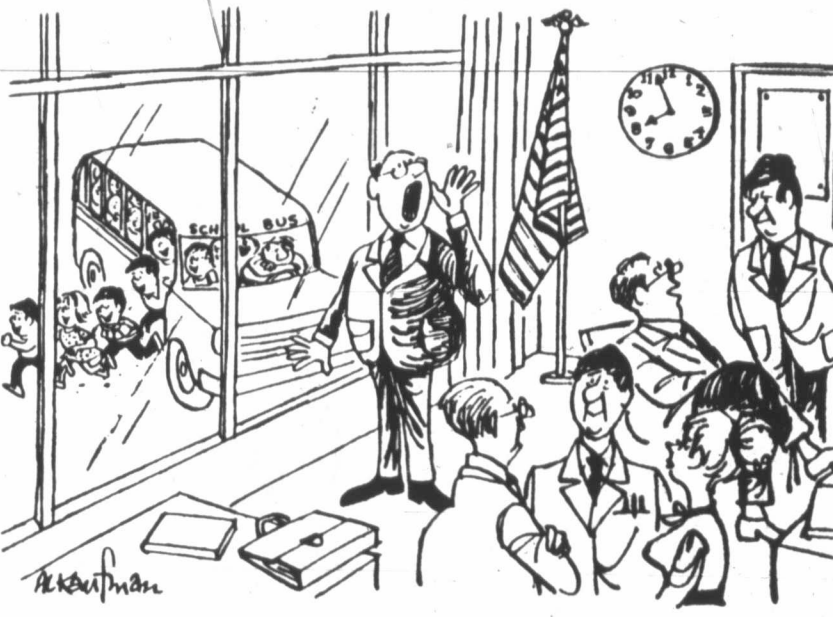

## President visits Waco, Space Center

AUSTIN—Playing to soft spots in the Texas economy, Dukakis Democrats pitched to the beleaguered oil industry, while Bush Republicans pushed new jobs in the Houston-area space program.

President Reagan, stumping at Bush's Houston fundraiser which raised more than \$3 million, visited the Johnson Space Center where he called the Discovery astronauts "space age pioneers" and said the U.S. space program is back on track.

"America is going to space again—and we are going there to stay," the President told more than 3,000 space center employees and their families.

Mr. Reagan stopped first in Waco to address Baylor University students and assist Beau Boulter, the Republican congressman who is opposing the Senate re-election of Lloyd Bentsen.

New space exploration means thousands more jobs to the Houston economy, while higher oil prices boost the entire state.

Dukakis scored points with some Texas oilmen by promising that Lloyd Bentsen will head a blue-ribbon panel to hammer out a U.S. energy policy, strongly implying that Texas needs will be addressed in the future program.

It was considered the smartest move of late by the Dukakis camp in Texas, and an obvious one considering Bush's publicized failure to address concerns of Texas oilmen.

But Bush has plenty of time to respond and Dukakis may have alienated other businessmen by saying private business, at a cost of about \$10 billion, should provide health insurance to employees who can't get it elsewhere.

Dukakis and Bentsen double-teamed on the health care issue, with Dukakis visiting urban hospitals and Bentsen talking rural medical needs in the Panhandle.

#### Magic Number 54

Polls have shown Bush leading, but the race is viewed by many as tightening up last week.

Despite grumblings among some Texas Democrats of the Dukakis organizational bumbblings here, the Massachusetts governor nearly put Bush on the spot in the petroleum sector.

Meanwhile, Gov. Bill Clements, speculating on the Texas Republican Party's bid to take over the Texas Supreme Court, said Bush must win Texas by 54 percent or more to carry GOP down-ballot candidates to victory on his coattails.

Frankly, many observers feel the margin may well rest on how well Reagan campaigns in Texas and whether his popularity is as strong in the end-game of his administration as it was at the outset.

#### Casino Gambling Issue

On winning percentages of a different sort, pro-casino gambling forces have failed three times to establish a Texas foothold in Galveston and now might have to tackle the state as a whole to pass their issue.

Galveston's anti-gambling voters, led by "Mr. Democrat" Shrub Kempner, want an end to costly local casino elections until Texas legalizes the industry.

They'll try to change the city

#### State Halts Radio Calls

After thousands of outgoing phone calls knocked the state Capitol phone system out of service earlier this year, officials have halted attempts by state employees to win cash from radio station call-in contests.

Carl Stringfellow, state director of telecommunications, said the change was made after phone service was disrupted several times by workers trying to reach a radio station offering a \$1,000 prize.

Officials reset the phone system to prevent any calls to telephone numbers beginning with 390, the exchange assigned by Southwestern Bell for radio call-in contests.

#### Other Highlights

- Gordon "Doc" Arnold resigned as executive assistant to House Speaker Gib Lewis and will be replaced by state Rep. Mike Millsap, D-Fort Worth, when his legislative term expires Jan. 10.

- Lauro Cavazos, president of Texas Tech University, became the first Hispanic to serve in the Cabinet when he was sworn in as U.S. Secretary of Education.

- A recent Texas Poll indicates 75 percent of Texans favor and 20 percent oppose increasing the minimum wage from \$3.35 an hour to \$4.45 over the next three years.

- Attorney General Jim Mattox and State Sen. John Whitmire led the media on a tour of the Harris County jail to underscore crowded conditions there.

- Mattox is reviewing the Texas Real Estate Commission's policy recommending that agents tell prospective buyers if the seller of a house has AIDS.

- The Texas Racing Commission intends to license Class 2 racetracks by Spring 1989 and asks all parties applying for a racetrack license to file a letter of intent by Oct. 31. The Class 2 license application period is Nov. 1 to Dec. 30.

- A survey two years ago that listed Texas 47th among states in treatment of the mentally ill has boosted the state this year to 31st.

- A Texas group backing English as the official U.S. language released a list of 51 candidates who support the amendment, including Randy Pennington, Talmadge Heflin, John Culberson, Keith Valigura and John Willy in the Texas House, state Sen. Brad Wright, congressmen Bill Archer, Jack Fields and Tom DeLay, and GOP U.S. Senate nominee Beau Boulter.

- Texas ranks 49th among states in per-person outstanding debt in 1987, bettered only by Kansas.

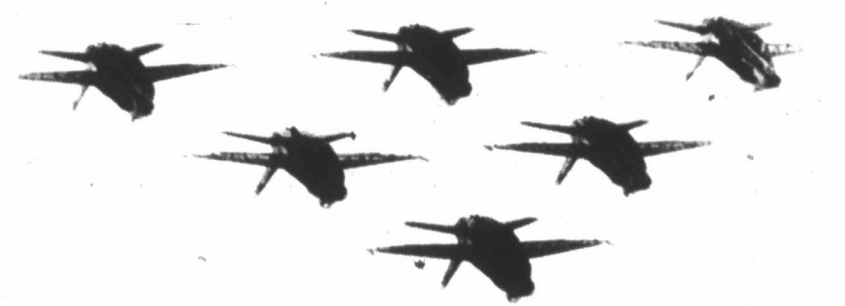

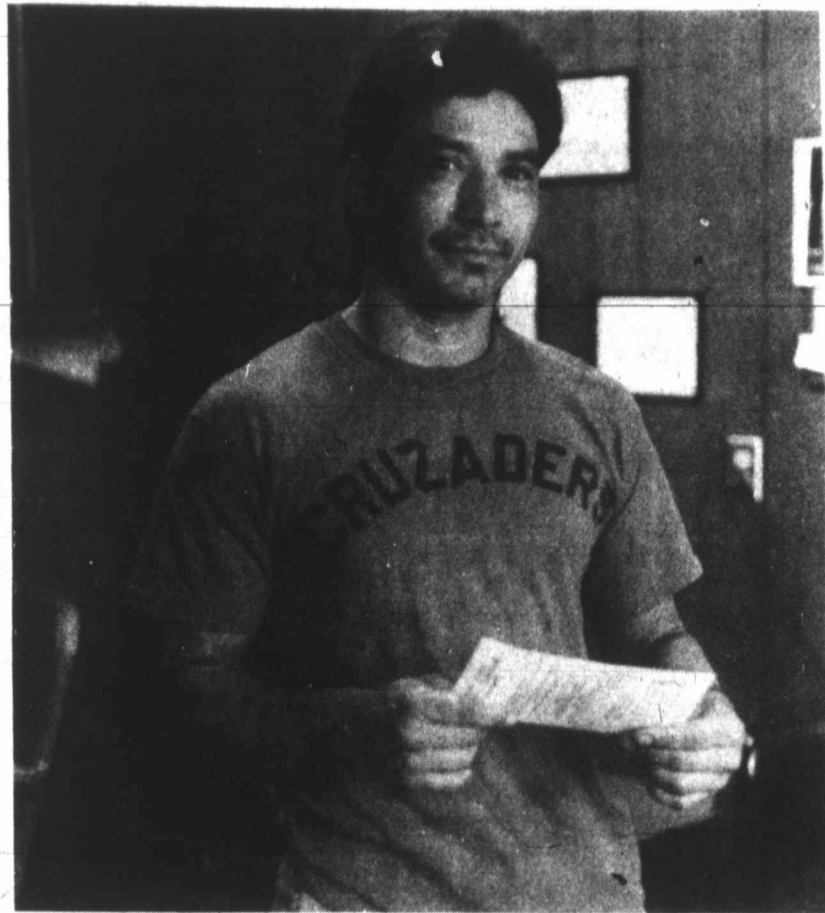

## County Oil and Gas Report

At a location five miles west of Cuthbert, Kohler Energy Corp. of Wichita Falls has finalized a new oil producer in Mitchell County's Westbrook Field.

The well is designated as the No. 4 Kohler-Brennard, flowing 441 barrels of oil per day, along with 264,000 CF casinghead gas and 108 barrels of water on a 12/64 in. choke. Flowing tubing pressure registered 550 PSI.

Location is in the H&TC Survey. Bottomed at 8,215 feet, the well will produce from perforations in the Ellenburger Formation, 8,205 to 8,212 feet into the wellbore.

Potential testing is underway at the No. 2 Nobles in the East Howard Iatan Field, Mitchell County, six miles southwest of Westbrook. The well was spudded early in March with Robert C. Walsh as the operator. It is bottomed at a depth of 3,200 feet.

Flowing 441 barrels of 46-gravity crude plus 264,000 CF casinghead gas and 108 barrels of

salt water, the No. 4 Kohler-Brennard has been completed in Mitchell County's Westbrook Field.

Kohler Energy Inc. is the operator.

The well probed to an 8,216-ft. bottom. It will produce from a set of perforations in the Ellenburger Formation, 8,205 to 8,212 feet into the wellbore.

Location is about five miles west of the Cuthbert community.

A pumping oiler has been brought on line in the Coleman Ranch Field, Mitchell County, two miles west of Cuthbert.

It is the No. 607 Coleman Ranch Unit pumping 10 barrels of oil with 131 barrels of waste water daily on an open choke. Oil tested at 24-gravity.

With Finca Oil as the operator, the well probed to total depth of 3,000 feet. It will produce from a perforated interval in the Upper Clear Fork Formation, 2,633 to 2,936 feet into the wellbore.

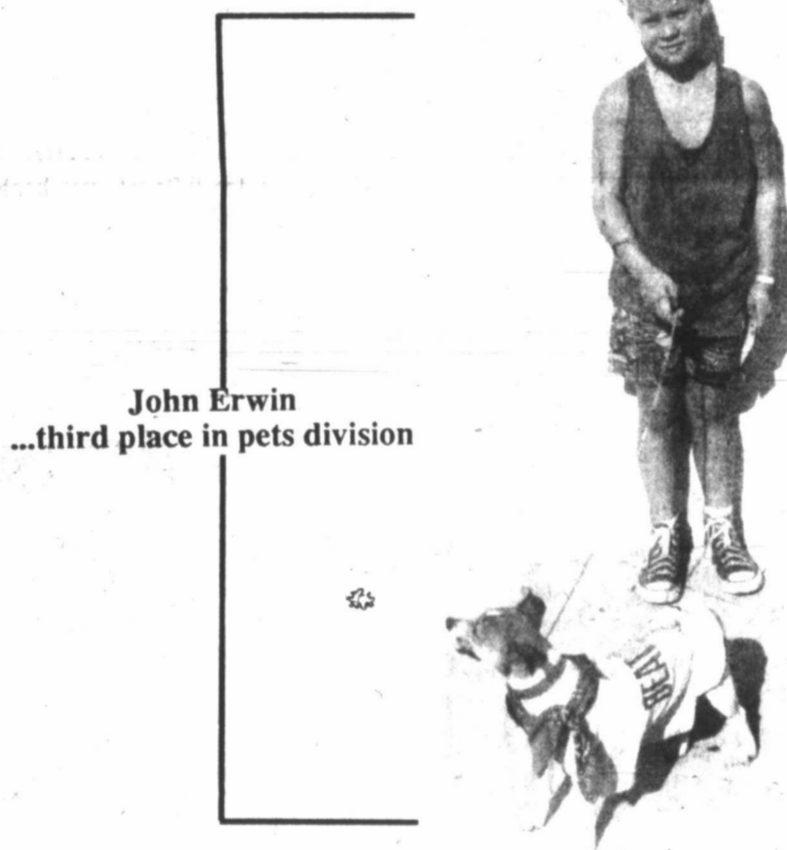

## Showdown at Christoval

For the Christoval Cougars it's another challenge to their stronghold as one of the premier Six-man football programs in Texas. For the Loraine Bulldogs it's a chance to join those same elitists.

The two unbeaten clash at Christoval's Cougar Field Friday at 7:30 p.m. Loraine enters the contest at 4-0 while the Cougars, who have already had an open date, are 3-0.

The Cougars were preseason picks as the #2 Sixman team in the state behind district rival and defending state champion Lohn. Four weeks into the season and their standings haven't changed.

Christoval, 10-3 last year, shared the district 8 title with Lohn then lost to Lohn in the semifinals. The Cougars had only two seniors on last year's team but they were both All-State performers who played both ways.

The Cougars do return 22 other players from last season.

This year the Cougars have beaten Midland Christian 42-21,

Harper 40-20 and Klondike 37-27.

"They have been (close)," said coach Billy Barnett who after 4 years as an assistant has taken over for Buddy Luce who became the third winningest coach in Six-man history while establishing the Cougar program. "Teams really get fired up for us. Klondike was a good team but they scored once on our second team. We're pretty well balanced but our offense carried us last week."

Barnett said the Cougars strength is in numbers. "We're two people deep at every position," said Barnett. "I have a sophomore quarterback that I can fill in and be comfortable with."

"We don't run the spread but teams that play us do," said Barnett. "They see our size and don't want to run with us. We're over 200 pounds on one side of the line, bigger than most Sixman teams."

Shorty Montalvo, who gained 144 yards last week, currently

leads a group of four backs that alternate in pairs for every play. Last year's leading rusher, Domingo Perez, has been moved to quarterback. "He's adjusted," said Barnett. "He's got an excellent arm and is quick and mobile. He passed for 185 yards last week."


Barnett said Perez and Montalvo also do a good job on defense.

"Loraine's an extremely good football team," said Barnett. "They've got lots of quickness and size to go with it. Shawn Finley is probably one of the best Sixman players in the state and he's just a junior. Maybe whoever has the ball last will win it. If you can make them (Bulldogs) have to drive the ball you can beat them."

It's not something that's happened. The Bulldogs are averaging over 50 points a game. "We're ready," said Loraine coach Tommy Meredith. "They don't look like number two to me. I think we can handle them. Our motto this week is It's Payback

Time". "We had the best Monday workout since I've been here," said Meredith. "They execute real well. If we contain them we'll be alright. If everybody does his job we can beat them."

Finley and Rudy Sanchez have been averaging 18.5 and 14.5 yards, respectively, for the Bulldogs' running game. It isn't a district game for the teams but it does mean recognition as a top team in the state. "I think we've got more overall quickness and speed," said Meredith. "If we go over there with the right frame of mind we'll come home a winner."


