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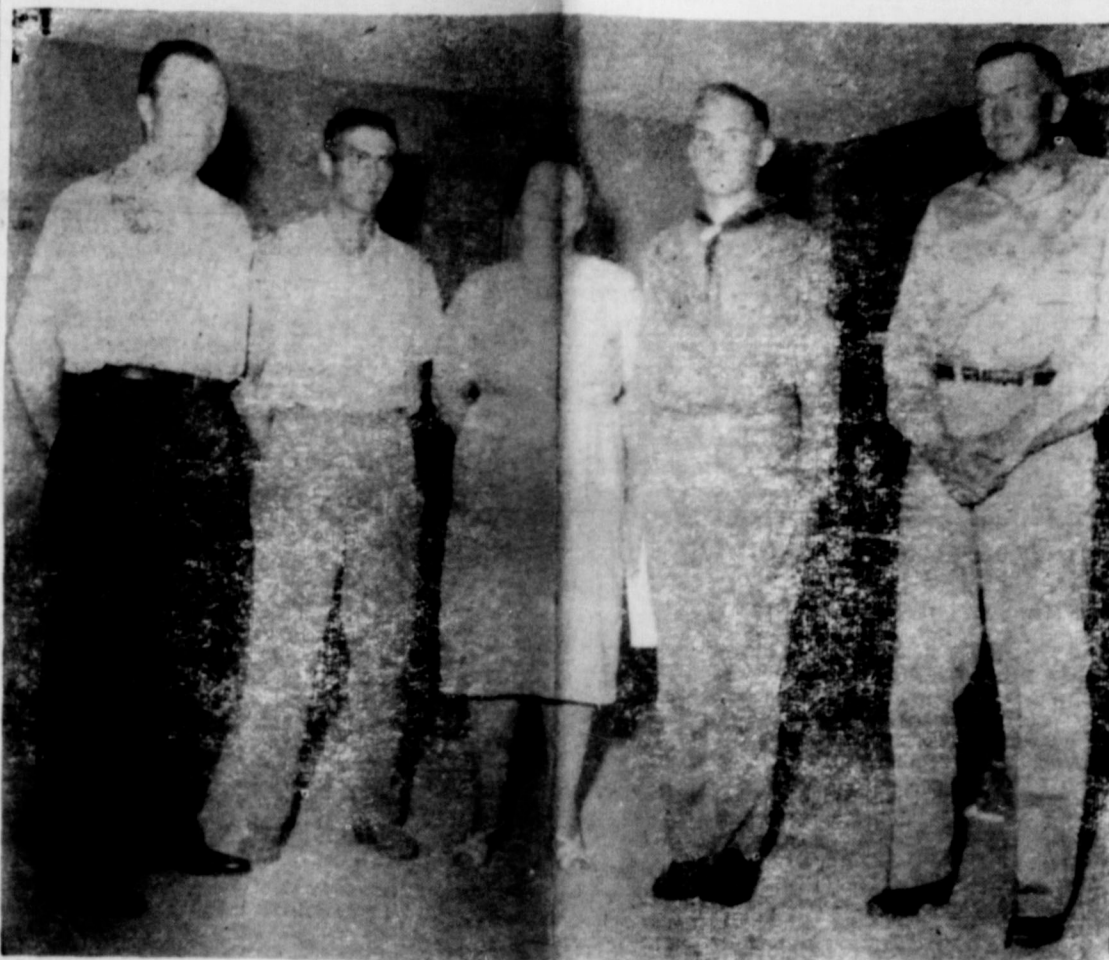

The resuscitator can be used in emergencies such as smoke suffocation, concussion, drowning, brain tumor, gas poisoning, alcoholic coma, electric shock, auto accident shock, drug poisoning, heart attack, carbon monoxide, etc.

After the heart stops beating, there is only a period of five or six minutes in which to start the flow of oxygen to the brain before it becomes damaged. There is a dire need in the community for this equipment. It can be in service 24 hours a day at the Fire department, ready for any emergency.

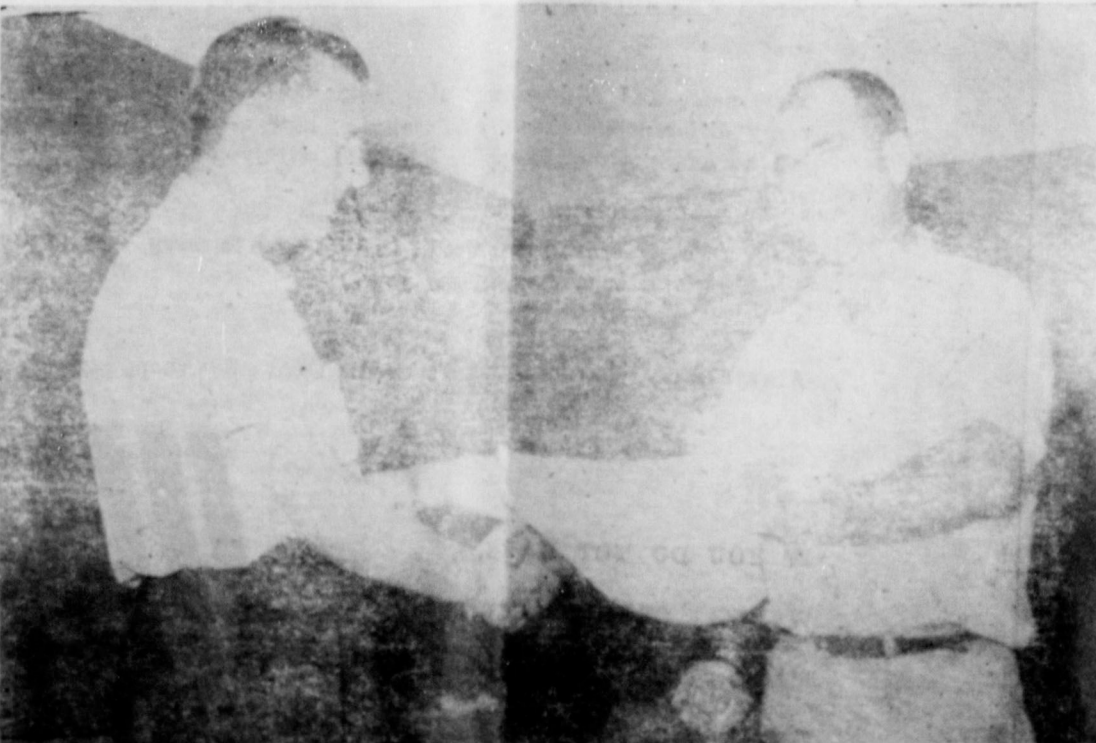
Everett Patterson Injures Finger

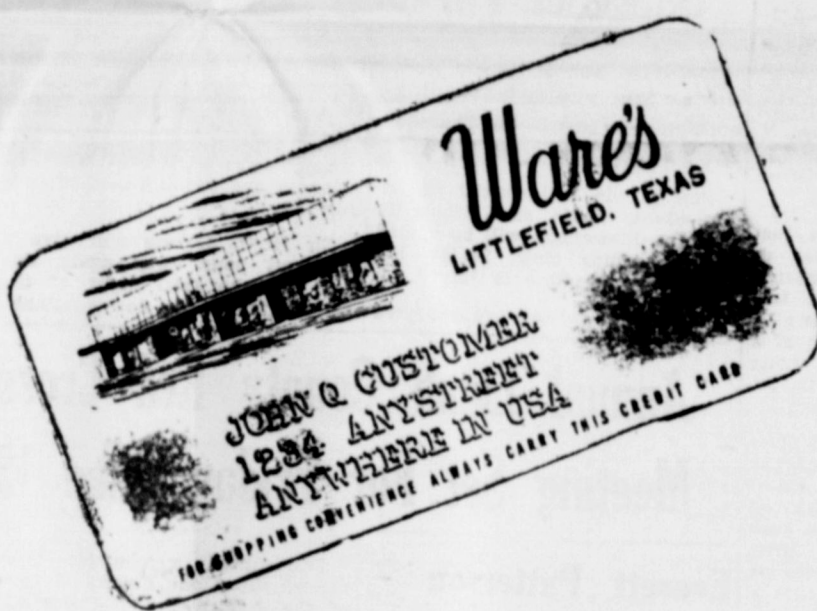

Farm Facts

Farmers have long relied on signs to forecast the weather, but today's operations demand more precise information. Bad weather may hinder application or nullify effectiveness of materials in which they have invested heavily.

The U. S. Weather Bureau, therefore, is providing forecasts tailored specifically to agricultural operations in key areas. News media, the U. S. Department of Agriculture, and other agencies are co-operating.

These services include an agricultural interpretation of the 30-day and 5-day outlook, as well as hourly reports and information at intervals throughout the day on the kind of weather to expect for the next 36 hours and for 24 additional hours.

Also issued are agricultural aviation weather forecasts and summaries during the spraying and dusting seasons. Forecasters are kept posted on "fire weather." Warnings also are issued of unusual disturbances or severe conditions as indicated by radar and other equipment.

Soil temperatures, wind speed and direction, dew, temperatures, and other factors are duly noted.

Texas School Will Be First In U. S. To Derive All Power From Natural Gas

Construction has started in McAllen, Texas, on the first school in the nation which will use natural gas for all its heating, cooling and electrical needs.

The American Gas Association said the use of a natural gas-fueled turbine to provide the total energy requirements of a school could usher in a whole new concept in educational building.

Park Plaza Shopping Center in Little Rock, Ark., is the only building in the country which has an installation similar to the one planned in McAllen, A. G. A. said. However, several new commercial buildings in various sections of the U. S. have been designed with such a system.

The 2400 pupil McAllen High School, on which construction was begun in March, combines the gas turbine-total energy concept with modern, compact school design. The most dramatic element of the design is the absence of windows. The school is scheduled to be completed in the summer of 1963.

A major consideration in planning the school was air conditioning. J. Lyle Hill, McAllen superintendent of schools, pointed out that the climate in south Texas often climbs above 100 degrees in late spring, summer and early fall. At these times, teaching sometimes comes almost to a halt in non-air conditioned schools, Mr. Hill said.

The Board of Trustees of the McAllen Independent School District, recognizing this problem, decided the gas turbine represents the most economical way to provide their \$2,859,000 school with air conditioning.

The new school will produce a cool, comfortable climate by using steam generated by the exhaust heat of the turbine — normally wasted in simple turbine operations — to power a 467-ton Carrier absorption chilled water generator. The school's power, heating and cooling plant was designed by D. Dana Price, Houston, consulting engineer.

The heart of the McAllen system will be 1100 hp Saturn turbine using natural gas supplied by Rio Grande Valley Gas Company. The school's power, heating and cooling plant was designed by D. Dana Price, Houston, consulting engineer.

Naturally gas will be used even for lighting. The turbine will drive both a 60-cycle generator for conventional power needs and a 840-cycle generator for the school's

high frequency fluorescent lighting system.

High frequency design will cut by 24 percent the number of lamps needed if conventional 60-cycle power were used. In addition, more light will be produced per watt input, and standard fluorescent lamps will have greater life. The heat gain from lighting will be lower, thus reducing air conditioning costs.

Zeb Rike of McAllen, the school's architect, said that since outside light and ventilation were eliminated, wall space will be greatly reduced. This will lower construction costs, Mr. Rike said.

The windowless school also will remove outside distractions, assuring better student-teacher concentration. Eye strain associated with adjusting the eye to differences in room lighting and sunlight intensities will be eliminated.

The school will contain 51 regular classrooms, 12 science laboratories, four homeroom rooms, a machine shop, two large study halls, a library and band and chorus rooms. It will have also a 1300 seat auditorium, gymnasium, 600-seat cafeteria and an all-gas kitchen.

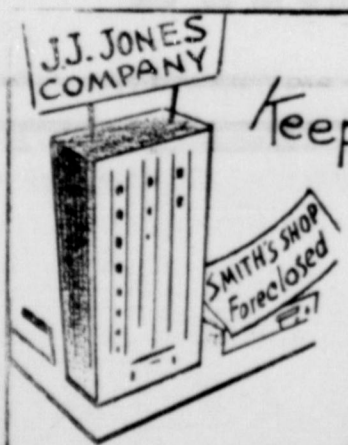

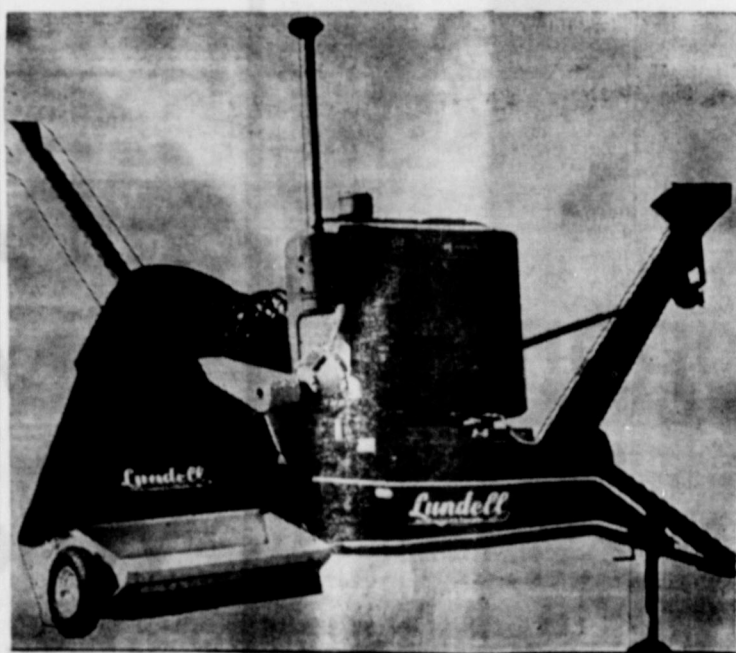

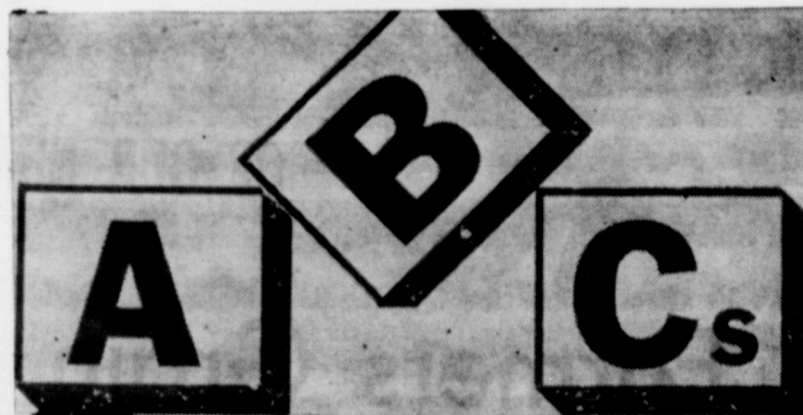

The sergeant attended Springlake High School.

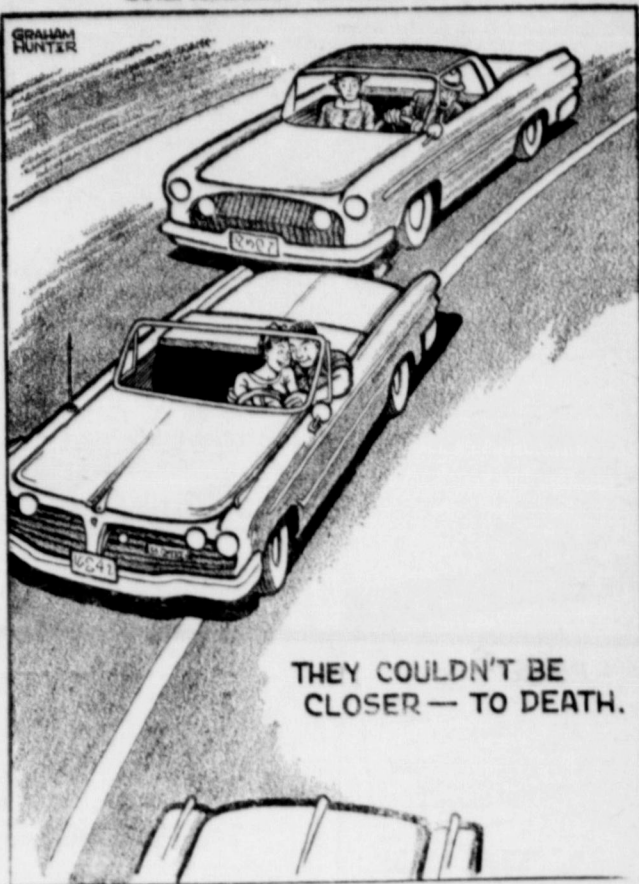

Important Farm Legislation Released By George Mahon

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Representative George Mahon reports that he is drafting a series of amendments which he proposes to offer to the farm bill which is scheduled for consideration by the House at an early date. The Senate, on May 25th, passed a farm bill which provides for a mandatory control program on feed grains in the event two-thirds of the feed producers voting in a referendum favor such mandatory controls. The bill provides for a multiple-price system on wheat and has other provisions, none of which affect cotton. The most significant provisions in both the Senate and House versions of the bill are those affecting feed grains.

Mahon's amendments provided that cotton farmers would have the option of planting feed grain on cotton allotment land in the event the cotton is destroyed so late in the season that replanting is impractical. The amount of feed grain planted could not exceed the total of the cotton and feed grain allotments on the farm.

Another proposed amendment provides that the feed grain allotment of cotton farmers, who chose the Choice "B" route during the 1959-1960 crop years, would not be reduced as a result of such action. Mahon proposes to offer an

amendment to raise the percentage of the national feed grain allotment set aside for new growers in order to provide more relief for farmers who have put new land to feed grain since 1960. The House version of the bill proposes to set aside a total of three percent of the national allotment for new growers, hardship cases, and other adjustments.

The House version of the bill provides that if two thirds of the feed grain growers in a referendum do not vote for mandatory controls there will be no support program on feed grain in 1963 and thereafter. Mahon will propose that if quotas are voted down, a 50 percent of party support loan shall be provided in order to give the producers a less drastic alternative to mandatory controls in the event farmers vote down the control program.

Under the pending bill feed grain allotments in 1963 would be based on planting during the 1959 and 1960 crop years.

Mahon stated that in his opinion West Texas feed grain farmers would prefer to continue in 1963 a feed grain program similar to the 1961 and 1962 programs. He believes the present program would be more acceptable to millers than the proposed new program.

Mahon pointed out however that there was mounting resentment against the payment of huge sums for storage of surplus grain and that Members of Congress from no-farm areas tend to support the position of Secretary Freeman that if meaningful support loans are to be provided on feed grain crops an effective control program must be adopted.

The proposed legislation would establish for feed grains a control program in some respects similar to the control program which has been in effect for cotton for a number of years. A principal difference would be that for the next three years feed grain producers would be paid for acres diverted from feed grain.

The proposed feed grain program differs from the cotton program in this further respect. Under the feed grain proposal the Secretary could sell each year at market prices up to 10 million tons of government-stored feed grain, the equivalent of roughly one fifth of currently held government grain. Under the cotton program the Secretary can sell government owned cotton on the domestic market at not less than 115 percent of the support level.

The present feed grain law which is the basis for the 1962 program expires this year and some kind of substitute legislation is anticipated.

Mahon stated that he needs and would welcome the advice and counsel of feed growers in regard to the proposed new farm legislation and in regard to the amendments which he proposes to offer. Copies of the proposed bill are available at offices of county agents and at the ASC offices.
