TWO GIRLS were injured in Lubbock Tuesday afternoon as result of auto accidents while crossing streets. One of the mishaps occurred in the heart of the business district while the other was on the outskirts of the city near the corner of 19th street and College avenue.

Miss Virginia Phipps, 20-year-old student of Texas Technological college, and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. I. Phipps of Plainview, suffered injuries Tuesday afternoon about 5 o'clock when she was run down by an automobile near the intersection of 19th street and College avenue.

Two men, Sheriff O'Bar and Martin Koonsman, a former Texas ranger, both of Abilene, were in the car which struck the student and they stopped and brought her to the Lubbock sanitarium. They, however, refused to divulge their names when questioned, stating that they "didn't want it to get out in the newspapers."

It was later learned that the two were officers from Abilene and had come to Lubbock to return a prisoner, Juan Alvarez, wanted in Abilene for murder in connection with the shooting of Pedro Herrera last February. He was arrested in Lubbock Monday.

Miss Phipps was returning to her boarding house, at 2708 Twentieth street, when the accident occurred. She was accompanied by two other girls.

James Young Will Run For Governor

Kaufman Attorney Throws Hat Into Ring For 1930 Democratic Primary In Texas; Makes Statement

(By Associated Press) KAUFMAN, Dec. 3. — In a statement to the democrats of Texas, James Young, attorney of Kaufman, today announced his intention of seeking the governorship of Texas.

His statement follows: "After receiving many letters, telegrams and telephone calls from democrats in all sections of Texas, and after being petitioned by a mass meeting of democrats held at Tyler, Tex., some weeks since, I have decided to enter the race for governor of Texas at the democratic primaries to be held July, 1930. I feel that it is due these good friends and democrats that I announce my decision."

"After mature consideration, I now announce my candidacy for governor at the democratic primary election to be held July, 1930. "At a later date I shall make a formal statement of my views covering public questions, which I deem most important to be determined by our people."

Ford Wage Boost To Help Business

DETROIT, Dec. 3. — (AP) — Henry Ford's proposed increase in wages to Ford Motor company employees "as a stimulus to industry and general business," will result in an increased wage distribution of more than \$10,500,000 annually in the plants throughout the United States and of \$1,000,000 a year in the Canadian plants.

This was made known today in statements by Edsel B. Ford, president of the Ford Motor company here, and by Wallace R. Campbell, president of the Ford Motor Company of Canada, Ltd., telling of new wage scales.

Witnesses Relate McManus Slaying Details Tuesday

Court Session Enlivened By Verbal Tilt Between State And Defense Attorneys Over Testimony

(By Associated Press) NEW YORK, Dec. 3. — A dull court session enlivened only by a verbal tilt between state and defense attorneys today saw George McManus, accused by a state witness in room 349 in the Park Central hotel, his face flushed and his hair disheveled, two hours before he is alleged to have lured Arnold Rothstein in there and shot him down a year ago November 4.

"A hell boy at the Park Central, William Morrison, the state witness, testified that 'about 8 o'clock' on the night of November 4, 1928, he went to room 349 and collected from a man he identified as McManus \$12 for the rent of the room. Earlier in the day, rather discounting the importance of Morrison's testimony, James D. C. Murray had conceded that his client had registered for the room under the name of 'George Richards' for four days in succession up to and including the night Rothstein was shot."

Solons Are Asked For Postoffices

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3. — (AP) — Congress was asked to authorize expenditure of \$215,000,000 for construction of postoffices and other federal buildings throughout the country in a bill introduced today by Chairman Elliott of the house public buildings committee.

This would bring the total authorized fund to be expended in the government's building program to \$643,000,000. Elliott estimated that to be sufficient to take care of a large portion of the proposed construction of department buildings in the District of Columbia, and to provide postoffices for all cities in the country having postal receipts of \$20,000 or more annually that are not at present equipped with suitable buildings.

Mexican Slain By Section Hand Near Floydada Tuesday

White Man Sought By Cops In Fatal Shooting For Alleged Attack On Wife; Overheard Conversation

Charges Are Filed

Husband Leaves Ft. Worth And Denver Box Car Home After Opening Fire On Companion Worker

(Special To The Avalanche) FLOYDADA, Dec. 3. — Miguel Huerta, 33, Mexican section hand, is dead and a formal charge of murder has been lodged against Claude Fisher, white another section hand following a disturbance that occurred on a railroad switch five miles east of South Plains at an early hour Tuesday morning.

Both men were employees of the Fort Worth and Denver and occupied the same box car with only a partition separating them. According to the story told County Attorney Robert A. Stone, the Mexican had attempted to assault the wife of the white man and upon hearing this, Fisher, who was sitting in the box car, opened fire with a shotgun at close range, the first shot proving fatal. Telling his wife that he was going to Floydada to report to the sheriff, Fisher left, taking his gun with him. At a late hour tonight he had not been located.

KRESS GIRL FAINTS Dean Burleson Overcome By Appendicitis Attack

Suffering an acute attack of appendicitis, Miss Dean Burleson, 17, of Kress, last night at 7 o'clock fainted in the Lubbock county courthouse and was rushed to the West Texas hospital for treatment. Physicians last night stated that her condition was not critical and that definite decision for an operation being held up pending the arrival of relatives who are expected in the city today.

Expect Decision Of Creager Suit

BROWNSVILLE, Tex., Dec. 3. — (AP) — Arguments on the motion by agents for Collier's weekly to quash citations in the million dollar libel suit brought against the magazine by R. B. Creager, republican national committeeman for Texas, were heard here tonight with no indication that a decision would be rendered before tomorrow.

Although he has disqualified himself to hear the libel suit proper, Judge J. G. Hutcheson, Jr., was on the bench for the hearing on the motion to quash. Creager tonight said that in the event the motion was upheld the legal battle would not end, as he had other "legal steps" to take to show that he had been libelled by publication of articles in Collier's dealing with an alleged system of patronage.

PATRONAGE PLAYED

Collection By Republicans In Texas Scored

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3. — (AP) — Collection by the republican party in Texas of campaign funds through promissory notes from Federal office holders was assailed today in a report to the senate by its patronage committee, which recommended legislation to forbid the practice. Holding that the methods used in Texas were "coercive," the report said the office-holder was put in the "seemingly apparent position, to say the least, of paying off a mortgage on his federal position."

NOT SANTA CLAUS

AUSTIN, Dec. 3. — (AP) — Declaring that he could not "play Santa Claus with the state's money," State Treasurer W. Gregory Hatcher today sent a letter to the reserve depository banks advising them that while vouchers for December salaries to state employees would be issued prior to Christmas eve, they would not be payable before December 31.

Community Chest Campaign To Continue In City Today

One-Third of Quota Raised in First Day of Drive

WITH the close of the first day's drive in Lubbock's Community Chest campaign showing a total of \$10,374, officials of the organization last night expressed confidence that with three days yet to go the final report will reveal figures sufficient to put the city over the top in the \$30,000 quota required.

The grand total for the first day's work represents only three hours work by the teams the report being made at a 12 o'clock meeting of the organization in Hotel Lubbock following start of the drive at 9 o'clock yesterday morning. With twenty-four hours intervening since that time officials estimate the amount to have grown in proportion.

Ballerger Team Highest In the men's territorial division the team of Captain C. M. Ballerger reported the highest subscription with a total of \$335. Major T. A. White, with his division, reported a total of \$778. Women's teams were led by that of Captain Mrs. W. O. Stevens, with a total of \$171 while the division winning high, under Major Mrs. Hub Jones, reported \$331.

Two establishments, represented in the employees' division have reported 100 per cent companies. They include: Hemphill-Weiss, Carter-Houston; West Texas Gas company; office and plant; Kuykendall Chevrolet company; Lubbock Auto company; Ragland Motor company; Citizens National bank; Lubbock sanitarium. While 56 companies are represented in this division only 15 of them had reported at the first meeting yesterday.

Railway Dispute Settlement Seen

Moscow Makes Own Peace With Mukden Over Manchurian Trouble; Nations Attempting Aid Refused

(By Associated Press) MOSCOW made its own peace with Mukden over the Chinese Eastern railway dispute in Manchuria Tuesday and also rebuffed the nations who had sought the same end by reminding both Russia and China of their obligations under the Kellogg anti-war pact.

Dispatches by way of London told the signing of a protocol at the Siberian town of Nikol'sky-Ussuriysky under the terms of which the joint control of the railway would be restored in accordance with the treaties of 1924. Russia withdrew from its insistence that the former Chinese manager and assistant manager of the road be reinstated but reserved the right to appoint them to other positions.

Note Not Friendly

The Soviet government, in a note handed the French Ambassador in Moscow, stated that it could not regard as a friendly act the American note with reference to the Kellogg pact. It was stated that the note constituted "an unjustified attempt" to influence Chinese-Russian negotiations and that it was in violation of the already in progress and surprise that the United States, which has refrained from official relations with the Soviet Union, should have undertaken to give "advice and directions."

DIFFERENCES SOLVED

Three States To Seek Pact Affecting Rio Grande

DENVER, Dec. 3. — (AP) — Their differences dissolved, the Interstate River commissioners of Colorado, New Mexico and Texas will present a united front in efforts to obtain the approval of congress on the Interstate pact affecting the Rio Grande, approved by the legislature of the three states. George M. Corlett, Colorado's lieutenant governor said here today.

Jealousy Blamed In Shooting

SHREVEPORT, La., Dec. 3. — (AP) — Jealousy over a woman guest at a dinner party last night at the residence of Marmaduke Ward, leading Shreveport business man was assigned by police today as the cause of the fatal shooting of Ward by Vernie Morgan, 30-year-old attorney, the sounding of Miss Ira Mae Miller, the guest, and the suicide of Morgan.

Morgan forced his way into the Ward residence while Ward, Miss Miller, a manicurist, Mrs. C. E. Poindexter and the latter's daughter, were at dinner. He fired one shot into the wall and then emptied his pistol at close quarters into the body of Ward, killing him almost instantly. One of the bullets caused a flesh wound in the leg of Miss Miller.

Unmasked Bandits Rob Comfort Bank Of \$1,500 In Loot

Two Robbers Fail In Effort To Open Safe But Scoop Up Bills From Counter And Make Escape

(By Associated Press) COMFORT, Dec. 3. — Two unmasked bandits held up the Comfort State bank shortly after noon today and escaped with about \$1,500 in bills of various denominations.

Albert Saltin, cashier, was waiting on a customer, Otto Meyer, when two men walked into the building. One of them forced Saltin to get into the vault and lie down on the floor, while his companion took the money on the counter.

The bandits tried to force Saltin to open the bank safe in the vault which contained several thousand dollars, but were foiled by the time lock which had been set.

Suspended Prison Term Given Mims

LAREDO, Dec. 3. — (AP) — A two year suspended prison sentence was assessed Royle K. Mims, former president of the First State Bank and Trust company of Laredo, by a jury here today after Mims had entered a plea of guilty to a charge of misapplication of the bank's funds by distributing a larger Christmas bonus than authorized.

Today's trial was Mims' second, he having been given a two year penitentiary sentence in the initial trial on the charge. The court of criminal appeals, however, remanded the case.

Three other officials of the bank, all of whom served prison terms in connection with alleged irregularities in the management of the institution, testified for Mims today.

Congress Settles Down To Business Given By Hoover

House Prepares To Tackle Tax Reduction Task As Senate Begins Clean Up Old Unsettled Disputes

BY FRANCIS M. STEPHENSON Associated Press Staff Writer WASHINGTON, Dec. 3. — Given a large order of business today by President Hoover, congress turned to its task the strictest senate cleaning up old unsettled disputes while the administration controlled house poised to prepare for tax reduction.

A hastily attentive senate received Mr. Hoover's lengthy propositions. As soon as reading of the annual message was completed, the senate plunged into disposition of the three year old dispute over the right of Senator-Elect Vane, of Pennsylvania, to a seat.

House demonstration, the house interrupted reading of the Hoover message occasionally with hand-clapping. The representatives applauded the president's wish to make Washington a model city in law enforcement and his designation of law enforcement as the nation's most serious issue.

The first division in the senate this session saw the tariff coalition of democrats and western republican independents of the extra session in sway again to reject an attempt by the republican regulars to defer the Vane case until next Monday.

Severe Cold Wave Claims 27 Lives

South Still Held In Grip Of Winty Blizzard With Moderate Weather Promised For Today

(By Associated Press) ATLANTA, Dec. 3. — The south tonight still was fast in the grip of a cold wave that has taken 27 lives. Moderating weather was promised for tomorrow, however.

Sub-zero temperatures were recorded in the mountains of southeast Kentucky today and in north Tennessee the mercury sank below the zero mark. While elsewhere from the Ozarks to the Atlantic and down to the Gulf of Mexico sub-freezing weather prevailed.

Barbourville, Ky., with an unofficial temperature of 12 below zero, was believed to be one of the coldest spots in the United States this morning.

New Orleans, where ice is a rarity, reported the 27th death, Patrick J. McShane, of Toronto, Canada, died in a van as a race track there and physicians said his death was due to a combination of exposure and intoxication.

The icy northwest winds that whipped the entire south had their effect in northwest Florida where at Pensacola the mercury dropped to 22 and the Jacksonville weather bureau predicted freezing temperatures for central Florida tonight, extending to the overglades.

Prompt Disposal Of Tariff Urged In Hoover's Talk

Effective Pro Enforcement And Tax Reduction Act Recommended To Congress In First Message

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3. — Prompt disposal of the tariff controversy, a \$160,000,000 income tax reduction, more effective prohibition enforcement and a host of other recommendations, both domestic and international, were submitted to congress by President Hoover today in his first annual message on "the state of the Union."

The 12,000-word document which was read in both branches of congress by clerks, made known that the president would submit adherence to the World Court to the senate "at some time when it is convenient to deal with it" and said the administration held "high hopes" for success of the London naval limitations conference, beginning in January.

Language Forceful. Exceptionally forceful language was employed by Mr. Hoover in dealing with law enforcement. What the government needs to do, he said, is to "reestablish faith that the highest interests of our country are served by insistence upon swift and even-handed justice for all offenders, whether they be rich or poor."

To obtain more effective enforcement of prohibition, the president recommended a concentration of enforcement agencies in the department of justice. He specifically mentioned the District of Columbia, which he said "should be the model of city law enforcement in the nation."

The president asserted that measures taken recently to benefit the general economic situation "must be vigorously pursued until normal conditions are restored."

2 Farmers Named

THAT the state would demand the death penalty and that the defendant would plead insanity as defense in the trial of Clay Lester, accused of slaying his wife, became apparent Tuesday afternoon in questions propounded when 2 of 13 veniremen examined were selected for the jury.

Two hundred veniremen were summoned for the trial, the selection of jurors starting yesterday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock in 99th district court, with Judge Clark M. Mullican presiding.

Continue Selection Court adjourned yesterday evening at 6 o'clock and will reconvene for continued questioning of veniremen this morning at 9 o'clock. J. D. Womack, who lives near this city, and Arthur Isom, who lives two and one-half miles northwest of Idalou, both farmers, qualified for the jury at Tuesday afternoon's session.

To Plead Insanity

Charles C. Triplett, of the defense counsel of Schenck & Triplett, informed prospective jurors that the defendant would interpose in his defense a plea of hereditary insanity, particularly that of insanity resulting from excessive use of narcotics.

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Sooners Join In Free Bridge Job

Oklahoma Highway Commission To Cooperate With Texas In Span Over Red River Near Denison

(By Associated Press) OKLAHOMA CITY, Dec. 3. — The Oklahoma Highway Commission joined the Texas Commission today in awarding a contract for the construction of a free bridge over the Red River between Durant, Oklahoma, and Denison, Texas, one-half mile west of a toll bridge now in operation. The Texas commission announced it had awarded the contract yesterday, subject to approval of the Oklahoma commission.

The contract, which was for \$230,291.51, was let to the Southwest L. E. Myers company, of Dallas, Texas, as Lewis Wentz, chairman of the Oklahoma commission, said. Each state will bear half of the cost of construction.

The Oklahoma commission announced that new bids would be received on the Teral, Oklahoma, and Gainesville, Texas, bridges. The Myers company was low bidder on these structures when bids were opened last week.

Girl Health Champ Has Occasional Date; Boy Dislikes "Gadding About"

(By Associated Press) CHICAGO, Dec. 3. — Florence Smock, Lake county Florida, and Harold Pestline, Morgan county, Indiana, both 17, late today were named health champions of the United States in the competition staged under auspices of the National 4-H Clubs Congress. Miss Smock's average was 93.7, while Pestline's was 93.2.

Miss Smock, who hails from Eustis, Florida, is a junior in the high school there, and a brunette, stands five feet, four and one-half inches in her medium high heels, and weighs 129 pounds. Brown eyes with hair to match naturally ray chequer and a small, delicate nose, set off her oval, smiling face. She is the daughter of Charles Smock of Lake county, Florida, and swims, dances, and occasionally has "dates."

The boy champion is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Pestline, of Martinsville, Indiana. He finished Martinsville high school a year ago, and his ruddy cheeks and stalwart shoulders bespeak a life spent chiefly in the open at hard farm work. He is five feet eight and weighs 150; doesn't care much about dancing or "gadding around" as he calls it, and he doesn't smoke.

Scientist Finds African Negro Is Highly Progressive; Attends Movies

NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—Darkest Africa is getting lighter by the minute, and is about as dangerous today, if you stick to the beaten path, as Yellowstone National Park, according to George A. Dorsey, anthropologist and author who wrote the one-time best-seller, "Why We Behave Like Human Beings."

Just returned from a tour of the world which included a trip from Cape Town to Cairo, Dorsey found Africa "the most interesting country in the world, from the scientist's point of view." He also learned that savages are behaving like civilized human beings.

"I found an enormous industrial progress in the 20 years since I last visited the country," he said. "I saw the sons of old slave-trading, man-eating cannibals riding around on bicycles, driving Ford's, going to motion picture shows to see Mary Pickford and finding out American news on every gramophone with the latest disc."

Studied Negroes' Progress. Dorsey wanted particularly to study the negro in his native country, under the different forms of government in different countries, and to see how this country with its 100,000,000 negroes is working out the civilization of its own people.

South Africa, he reported, "changes itself" and is not a primitive barbaric place, either for the Boer or the negro, each a product of a long and slow process of

other. The Boers are a hard, sour people with an intensely complex culture, the product of just as long a process.

But in Central Africa, particularly in Kenya and Uganda, Dorsey found the negro making the greatest progress socially and materially, and I found him the boy who

exist here. "The British, it seems to me, are particularly intelligent in their dealings with the natives, giving them every chance to do everything they can do, keep their own property, and raise their standards of living."

Education Made Practical. They have not had the usual concept of education—that is, they did not teach the cannibal to read and write, and then shift him off from a life in which this knowledge would be useful. Dorsey declared, instead, the negro has been trained industrially, to use machinery, build roads, drive motors, and cultivate the soil.

Women are taught more sanitary methods of housekeeping and the rudiments of scientific care of children," he went on.

"There is practically no machinery yet in the homes, because labor is so cheap. But there is a steady settlement that does not have its stigma. Motor and the country is full of them have opened up the country as no other agency could have, and have made it necessary to build roads and bridges. Bicycles are as popular here as they were in this country a quarter of a century ago."

Found Cruelty in Congo. The Belgian Congo, he said, is a pleasant picture.

"Here," he said, "I found the negro exploited. The country is pure for him and his commerce being stripped of its soul, its spirit, its natural beauty, with brutality and cruelty to evidence generally."

Watching the savage negro, in all parts of Africa, Dorsey continued, "I am not sure that I have not found a more primitive and brutal man anywhere, and that when he is given a chance, he can do as good a job as the white man."

Edison Has Discovered Profitable Rubber Producing Plant, He Claims

WEST ORANGE, Dec. 3. (AP)—Thomas A. Edison, in one of his characteristically laconic interviews, has disclosed the discovery of a plant that will produce rubber on a profitable basis.

Questions were submitted to the aged inventor at his laboratory, and he made brief replies.

He was asked: "Have you found one plant or more which will produce a satisfactory amount of rubber for commercial purposes?"

He answered: "Yes."

Other questions and their answers were:

Q: "In your opinion what is the business outlook for this winter?"

A: "Fair."

Q: "Are you going to conduct any other major experiments this year?"

A: "I am conducting several other experiments, some of which have been in progress for several years, but not yet commercial."

Q: "What reports do you get from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology about William Houston?"

A: "Houston was the Edison scholar in competition with boys from all states."

A: "I get no reports. He is down with scarlet fever and is quarantined with 20 other students."

Mr. Edison will leave on Thursday for his winter home at Fort Myers, Fla.

Kleinschmidt And Party Are Honored Guests Of Eskimos On Way To Santa

Marvels of Airplane
And Rifle Shown
to Northerners

BY CAPT. F. E. KLEINSCHMIDT
Special Correspondent of the A-
valanche-Journal and head of Ex-
pedition to Home of Santa Claus.

(By Wireless)
POLAZEROK VILLAGE, Eskimo-
land, Dec. 3.—In yesterday's dis-
patch I related to you our great
flight from Hudson Bay to Victoria
Land, north of the Arctic Circle, and
our reception by the Eskimos. Their
fears of the monster bird without
feathers are completely allayed and
they now regard our machine as
merely another marvelous vehicle of
the white man. The more they see
of such things as a rifle which kill
an animal with a little puff at a
long distance, or a watch or a pho-
tograph, the less they think of it
as anything but a thing of the white
man.

We have excavated a big hole in
a snowbank on the side of the hill
and pulled in our precious plane. We
are the honored guests of our Eskimo
hosts, and they have turned over to
us their Kos-ze-ga.

Huts Are Crowded
In the winter the Eskimos live in
very small houses or igloos such as
I described in my last dispatch for
they have very little fuel with
which to heat their igloos and keep
warm. Two families often live to-
gether. They have a stone dish full
of seal oil and render moss is used
as a wick. This lamp heats and
lights their igloo. There is no room
for any work such as the men have
to do, therefore a village consists of
several huts and a village chief and
house. Here the men go to work
on canoes or kayaks, and on other
large articles. They are doing a
big feast and dance tonight. The
house to our honor tonight. We are
going to rig up our wireless set
here so we can wireless our pictures
and kept in constant touch with
you. We will take the short wave
set along with us on our sleds. The
Kosze-ga is quite comfortable and
we do not mind the small of seal
oil. Our sleeping quarters consist of
bunks built along the wall. Today
and tomorrow will be spent getting
the sleds, dogs, render, provisions
and cameras ready for our trip to
Santa Land.

My dispatch was interrupted and
Sparks dropped his smoking pipe.
There was excitement outside. The
cry was "Nannook! Nannook!" (polar
bear in Eskimo). I rushed for the
motion picture camera. Mrs. K.
came running with the camera. We
got some wonderful pictures of the
polar bear running over the ice
jumping in the water, swimming
and diving. Tell the kiddies that one
thing is sure, and that is they are
going to see the polar bear pictures
in Lubbock for we took motion
pictures of the hunt.

We are wiring you a still picture
of the polar bear full of arrows.
The Eskimos and Mrs. K. The man
at the left is Pa-tu-nuk, who fought
the bear and killed him with the
spear in his hand. It was a coura-
geous act and a great fight.

LET'S FINISH THE JOB

EARLY reports emanating from Community Chest headquarters are cheering but the time for complacency is not yet here. The final victory is yet to be won and Lubbock's legions, bearing the banner of humanitarianism, must push forward until the entire budget of \$30,000 is raised.

The Morning Avalanche is not now—never has been, in fact—fearful that the city would not do justice by the organizations embraced by the Community Chest drive. The only worry we have ever had is that the job would not be cleaned up as quickly and as completely as it might be.

The entire budget, set by a committee of Lubbock men after extensive study, stands out as a challenge to this community. Any total short of \$30,000 will not be acceptable to those who always expect Lubbock to do its best. Let's be happy over the initial day's report but remember that the task has yet to be finished.

TRIBUTE TO WOMEN JURORS

If the experience of the state of Ohio with women as jurors is the same as that of other states where they act in that capacity, the fears and prophecies so freely expressed by many persons when women began to go into the jury box have been completely disproved. An inquiry conducted by Judge Robert H. Day, of the supreme court of Ohio, among trial judges, prosecuting officers, members of the bar and women themselves who have served as jurors showed a practically unanimous opinion that as jurors they are fully as satisfactory as men.

One of the most frequent arguments made against women as jurors was that their naturally greater sympathies and emotions would sway them to sentimental and merciful verdicts when the evidence called for severity against a defendant. Experience in the Ohio courts has been just the contrary. To use a slang phrase, in criminal trials the women have been more "hard boiled" than men. So stern are they in murder cases and so ready to vote for life imprisonment or the death penalty when the evidence is strong against a defendant that some lawyers active in the defense in criminal cases have begun to challenge them as talesmen. Neither, too, are they showing any prejudice in favor of their own sex.

The chief justice of the state supreme court gives it as his opinion that in the main women are as competent jurors as men, but he is doubtful about their experience in the ways of the world. He thinks they are too trusting and too ready to believe as closely as men. In several respects the women are showing themselves as more reliable jurors than men. They take the duty more seriously and are free from the influence of political business and lodge affiliations. Summed up, the judgment of the Ohio judiciary and bar is that women are stabilizing influence in the administration of justice and that jury duty broadens them and makes them better citizens.

TOO MANY CITY DOCTORS

There has been considerable discussion of the apparent passing of the country doctor. Much of this has been a lament for a vanishing type—the faithful, self-sacrificing and omniscient family physician, who made up in zeal what he lacked in scientific experience and training. But Secretary Wilbur, who is himself a physician, has carried the matter into the realm of statistics and reports that doctors are actually getting scarcer in country districts and over-crowding each other in the cities.

The opportunities for profitable practice, the lure of specialization and the many advantages of a city life for the professional man may be blamed for this uneven distribution of the fraternity of healing. The situation has serious implications—serious for the rural population if it is to be left short of medical care and possibly serious for the doctors themselves if too many of them invade the cities. The latter condition threatens the physicians with the fate of other professions. A few of them achieve distinction and proportionate prosperity, but the majority make a poor living because of excessive competition for a limited amount of business.

According to Secretary Wilbur, distribution of dentists and nurses is equally disproportionate between country and city. Here there seems to be an opportunity for a "back-to-the-land" movement with great possibilities of profit and usefulness for those who can resist the city's lure and are ready to go where they are more seriously needed.

RIGHTS AND RISKS OF HOSPITALITY

The United States supreme court has upheld the validity of a Connecticut statute releasing owners and operators of motor vehicles from responsibility for injuries to guests transported gratuitously in their cars, unless the accidents leading to injuries were caused intentionally or by heedless and reckless disregard of others.

Under the ordinary laws of liability, a guest can sue and recover. This practice has often worked a great hardship to persons whose hospitality has cost them heavily in purse because of accidents, and has led to notorious abuse of motor liability insurance. In its decision the supreme court says: "We cannot say that abuses originating in the multiplicity of suits growing out of the gratuitous carriage of passengers in automobiles do not present so conspicuous an example of what the Legislature may regard as an evil as to justify legislation aimed at it, even though some abuses may not be hit."

The decision will meet the general approval of motorists as conformable to common sense and equity. A passenger taking a courtesy ride may reasonably be asked to take the risks of a trip which costs him nothing. The law covers cases where the guest is the victim of recklessness which rightly deserves his host of immunity. General adoption of such a principle would clarify the problem of motorists' liability to the extent of freeing it from the danger of much collusive litigation.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—The queerest things happen in China!

"Absolutely nothing is impossible there," Viscount Uchida once told me, when he was foreign minister of Japan. A land that puzzles a Japanese statesman, whose own country seems pretty peculiar to an occidental, certainly must be extraordinary.

Anyhow, bizarre incidents already are beginning to occur in the daily life of Nelson T. Johnson, although he has not yet even sailed to take over the job of American diplomatic representative in the celestial republic, whither President Hoover recently assigned him, as successor to retiring Envoy John Van A. MacMurray.

In fact, Nelson T.'s career started trending toward the eccentric on the eve of his actual appointment before it was definitely decided on.

Nelson T. was simply a prosaic assistant secretary of state at the time—one of four, a very ordinary government functionary.

If he had any idea then of the unusual mixup which his personality and his name were about to involve the administration, in maybe he would have sensed something prophetic in it.

Johnson was of just barely enough official consequence to get him an invitation to the White House dinner in honor of Charles G. Dawes given to the latter by the president immediately prior to the Chicagoan's departure to resume his duties as United States ambassador in London.

Next to Secretary of State Stimson, the really essential guests at this blowout were the members of the senate committee on foreign relations—especially Chairman Borah and Senator Hiram W. Johnson, of California; the Californian perhaps even more so than Chairman Borah, because he has had considerable political friction with President Hoover and it was vital to let the whole country know that not a bit of coolness still existed between them.

The foreign committee members having been provided for room remained for a few extras and it was thus that Nelson T. was included.

At the last minute, however, the discovery was made that the table looked like being a trifle crowded. Accordingly the names went forth.

"Scratch off Johnson."

Whereupon the White House secretary-in-charge of invitations scratched off the name of Senator Hiram Warren Johnson of California.

It is not of record what fate subsequently befell the secretary.

Nelson T. Johnson may be of so little social consequence that it was reckoned he would be least missed among the 50 or 60 folk whom it was originally intended to invite to dine with Ambassador Dawes, but there are reasons for believing he will make an exceptionally good minister to China.

He and retiring Minister John Van A. MacMurray are alike in that they both have specialized on far eastern diplomacy and that both speak Chinese—a mighty rare accomplishment outside of Asia.

But they differ greatly in temperament. It is John Van A.'s view, as revealed by his methods in the American legation at Peking and an extremely common view among white men in that part of the world, that the oriental can best be dealt with by knocking him over the nose early and often.

It has proved tolerably successful in the past, in times of weaker and meeker Chinese government than at present, but in recent years the republican Chinese have displayed increasing signs of resenting it.

More than once, during the troubles which have marked his incumbency in Peking, Minister MacMurray has clamored for at least the threat of force to back up his policies—which might have been all right if mere threats had turned out to be sufficient, but would have involved a good deal of inconvenience if the Chinese had stood pat and told us to go ahead with our fireworks.

Nelson Johnson, on the other hand, as chief of the state department division for far eastern affairs, until his recent elevation to an assistant secretaryship, has persistently put the soft pedal on the warlike mood of which John Van A. was so fond—and being some thousands of miles nearer to headquarters, here in Washington, has managed to keep John Van A. from playing much of it.

Minister MacMurray is supposed, not unnaturally, not to have liked it, and the popular theory is that it was a good thing his resignation.

John, it seems, holds that the Chinese are easy enough to get along with harmoniously, if one falls in with their old ways, eats birdseed soup as if he liked it and recognizes that impossibilities are perfectly normal in a country where they are constantly happening.

The great gains that have been made in increasing life expectancy have been made by overcoming infant mortality, the infectious diseases of youth and the great plagues.

People do not live to more extreme old age than they used to, but a great many more people live to middle age and beyond, so that the average length of life is lengthened.

According to Dublin, there are about 5000 people in the United States out of a total of 110,000,000 who claim the distinction of being one hundred years old or over, but he says, as most statisticians think, there is a good deal of postscriptalistic in this claim. Raymond Pearl found 30 people out of 3,000,000 lived to the age of 100, and of these, 20 were women.

Since 1921 the death rates for heart disease and cancer have been definitely on the increase in people past middle life. This is significant, because cancer is essentially a disease of middle age or beyond and the reason there is more cancer is people are living longer to have cancer.

Another increase emphasized by Dublin is that in diabetes. This increase may also be associated with the fact that more people are living longer and that the span of life has greatly increased in recent years. The wear and tear on the human system has a definite part to play in determining the length of life. When the machine has lost its power of repair and regeneration, the wear, effort and stress placed upon it, the more likely it is to survive for a longer period of time.

On Dec. 4, 1783, General Washington delivered his farewell address to his officers.

After the war, Washington had exerted himself in endeavoring to obtain from congress a settlement of the claims of his officers.

It is probable that, had he so desired, Washington could have established a monarchy, sustained by his army, at this time. He took the course, however, of quelling this disposition on the part of his soldiers, whenever it occurred.

On Nov. 25, 1783, the British evacuated New York and Washington bid his officers farewell on December 4. He made his formal resignation at Annapolis several days later and retired to private life.

Transfer on the leases, involving 660 acres of naval oil reserve No. One worth \$15,000,000, was made to the Doheny interests in 1921 during the administration of the late President Warren G. Harding.

CONSIDER APPEAL

Red River Stream Bed Suit Again Taken Up

AUSTIN, Dec. 3. (AP)—After listening to seven hours of arguments from attorneys, the third court of civil appeals tonight considered the state's appeal from a judgment favorable to more than 600 defendants, involving title to 75 miles of the stream bed of the north fork of the Red river. The holdings are in Gray and Wheeler counties.

The litigation is generally known as "the Bradford case." C. W. Bradford being one of the defendants.

SAN ANTONIO, Dec. 3. (AP)—A protest against the appointment of Mrs. J. E. King, of San Antonio, to a position on the National Child Welfare conference, recently authorized by President Hoover, was sent to Secretary Wilbur of the interior department today by a group of women representing the Texas county republican women's club and the Hoover democratic women of San Antonio. It was signed by Mrs. J. C. Griswold, republican national committeewoman for Texas; Mrs. J. M. Glass, president of the local W. C. T. U. and Mrs. Byron S. Eastburn.

The opposition to Mrs. King, according to the telegram, was based on Mrs. King's activity in Texas politics in behalf of Albert E. Smith in the presidential campaign last year.

UNDER DEATH SENTENCE

PHOENIX, Ariz., Dec. 3. (AP)—Mrs. Eva Dugan was under sentence today to die on the gallows February 21, for the murder of A. J. Mathis, aged Tucson rancher. The death sentence, pronounced more than two years ago after her conviction by a Phoenix jury was affirmed by the state supreme court. Mrs. Dugan, should attempt to secure a commutation of sentence to life imprisonment, will be the first woman to be hanged in this state.

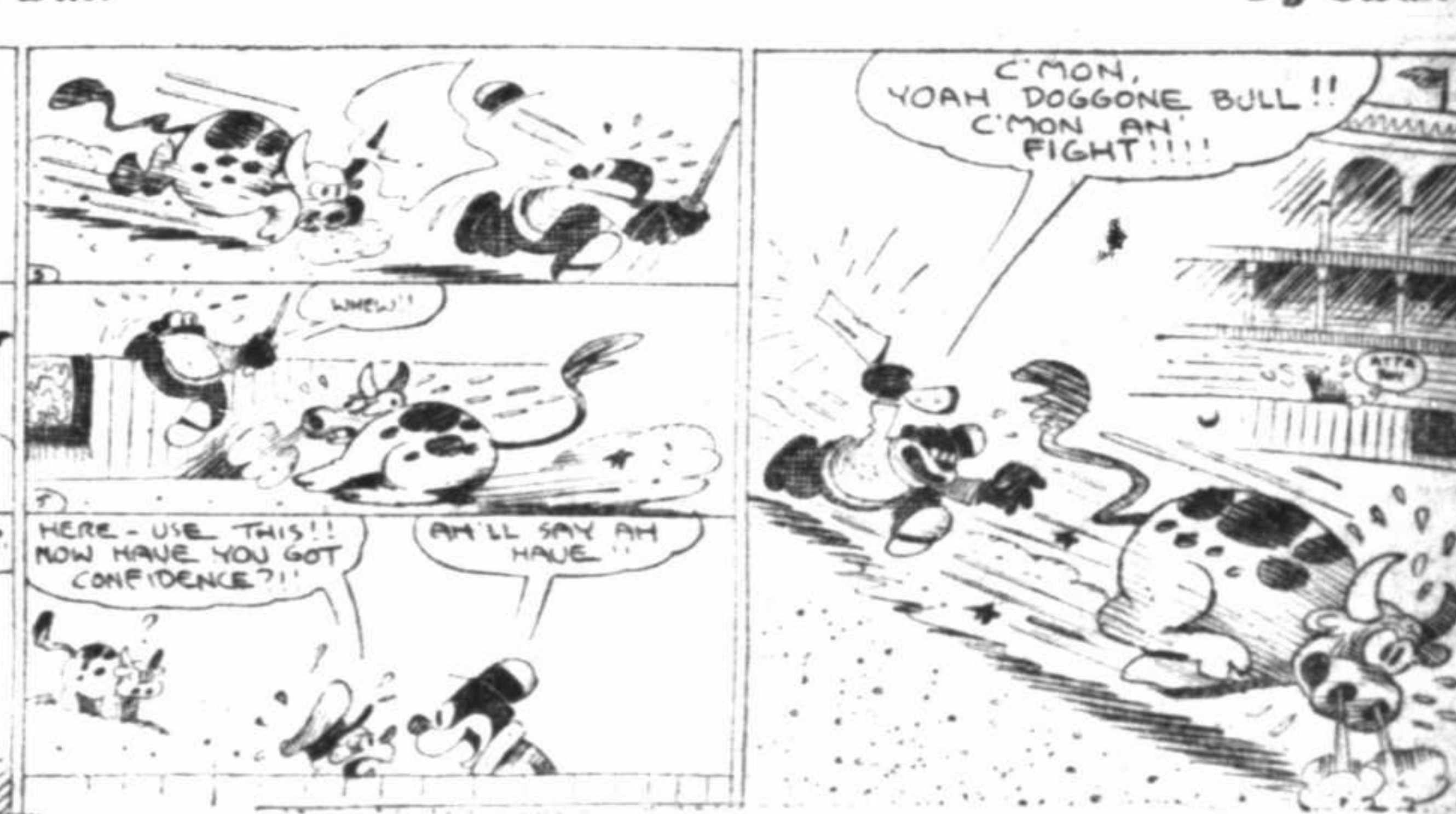

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Cotton Higher; Stocks Surge Upward

Bullish Private Cotton Estimate Causes Increase

President Hoover's Message To Congress Construed Favorably In Session Of Cotton Mart Tuesday

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 3. (AP)—Favorable construction of President Hoover's message to congress coupled with two bullish private crop estimates caused cotton to work over \$1 a bale higher today. January contracts after declining to 17.12, rallied to 17.45 and closed 2 points under the latter figure for a net gain of 23 points. The general market closed steady at a net advance of 23 to 25 points.

Liverpool cables were relatively lower and resulted in an opening decline here of 3 to 4 points. The market continued to ease with January selling to 17.12 and March to 17.40, or to 6 points under the previous close.

Estimates Made. Later in the morning two private crop estimates of 14,200,000 and 14,350,000 bales, respectively, were considered bullish and started prices on the upside. After mid-session the advance gained momentum under covering by shorts and rather general buying promoted by a favorable view of the president's message and active positions now showed gains of 20 points from the low.

In final trading the market encountered some demand attributed to expectations of a bullish estimate by a prominent private authority and January sold up to 17.45 and March to 17.40, or to 34 points above the early low. Final prices were 2 to 3 points under the low.

Advances Follow Opening Declines

NEW YORK, Dec. 3. (AP)—Slight opening declines in response to relatively easy Liverpool cables were followed by advances in cotton to close on covering and trade buying. January contracts sold up from 17.12 to 17.30, and closed at 17.45 with the general market closing very steady at net advances of 15 to 27 points.

The opening was steady at unchanged prices to a decline of 3 points with active morning selling about 4 to 5 points net lower during the first few minutes under liquidation, while there also appeared to be a little Southern selling.

December declined to 17.06 and March to 17.40 while May sold up to 17.75 but the market soon turned steadier.

The weather reported in the South was considered unfavorable for the saving of late cotton and expectations of smaller crop figures from the government next Monday seemed strengthened by private reports.

General Paroles

Issued By Moody

Four Furloughs Granted To Inmates Of Penitentiary By Governor; \$1000 Bond Forfeiture Remitted

AUSTIN, Dec. 3. (AP)—Governor Moody today issued three general paroles and granted four furloughs to inmates of the penitentiary and remitted a \$1000 bond forfeiture.

General paroles were given to Doll Bird, convicted in Hopkins county and given two years for violation of the prohibition law, and Carl Stephens and Shields Craft, sent to prison from Brown county for burglary for two years each.

Served One Year. Bird had served one year and his property interests were in immediate need of his attention. The governor said Stephens and Craft were boys under age when convicted and had evidently been led into the offense by a person older than they. Governor Moody said. The Board of Pardons recommended elements.

The \$1000 bond forfeiture was remitted to Mrs. Alice Williams of Harris county, who with E. Riess and L. H. Croom were sureties for J. B. Stanley, defendant and principal in the state prison at Atlanta, Ga., by Mrs. Williams, who asked the authorities to notify her when he served his time, but they neglected to do so. It developed Riess and Croom were insolvent, and the judgment was against Mrs. Williams solely.

Furloughs Given. Furloughs of 60 days each were given Clarence Hurst, Hopkins county, serving four years for violating the prohibition law, and Leo Amadio, Harris county, given two years for forgery. Amadio's mother was in dire need of his support and Hurst's family needed his assistance, the governor said.

John Clegg, serving four years from Erath county for violation of the prohibition law, was granted 15 days to visit his sick wife, and Will Luman, Dawson county, under three year sentence for murder, was allowed 30 days to be with his wife, who is ill.

Hoover's Message Causes Prices To Advance Rapidly

Stockyards Contribute Many Remedies to Latest War On Disease by Science; Glands Save Many Human Lives

Animal Extracts Are Effective in Many Human Maladies

CHICAGO, Dec. 3.—The squealing pigs and bellowing cattle that go to their doom in droves at the Chicago stockyards are providing the public with something quite different from the bacon, ham, sirloin steaks, shoe leather and football covers that are usually considered the stockyards' chief products.

They are furnishing the medical profession with medicines of incalculable value, which in the course of a year save many thousands of lives and conserve the health of many millions of Americans.

Since medical science discovered the importance of the glands in the human organism, and traced the manner in which glandular extracts can be used to combat sickness, the stockyards have become extremely important to the health of the nation.

The removal of glands from cattle, hogs and sheep and their reduction to medical preparations of vital importance, are now among the chief functions of the great packing houses.

Six-Story Laboratory.
There is, for instance, Armour & Company. A six-story building houses great laboratories where such things as suprarenalin, concentrated liver extract and thyroid preparations are made available for doctors.

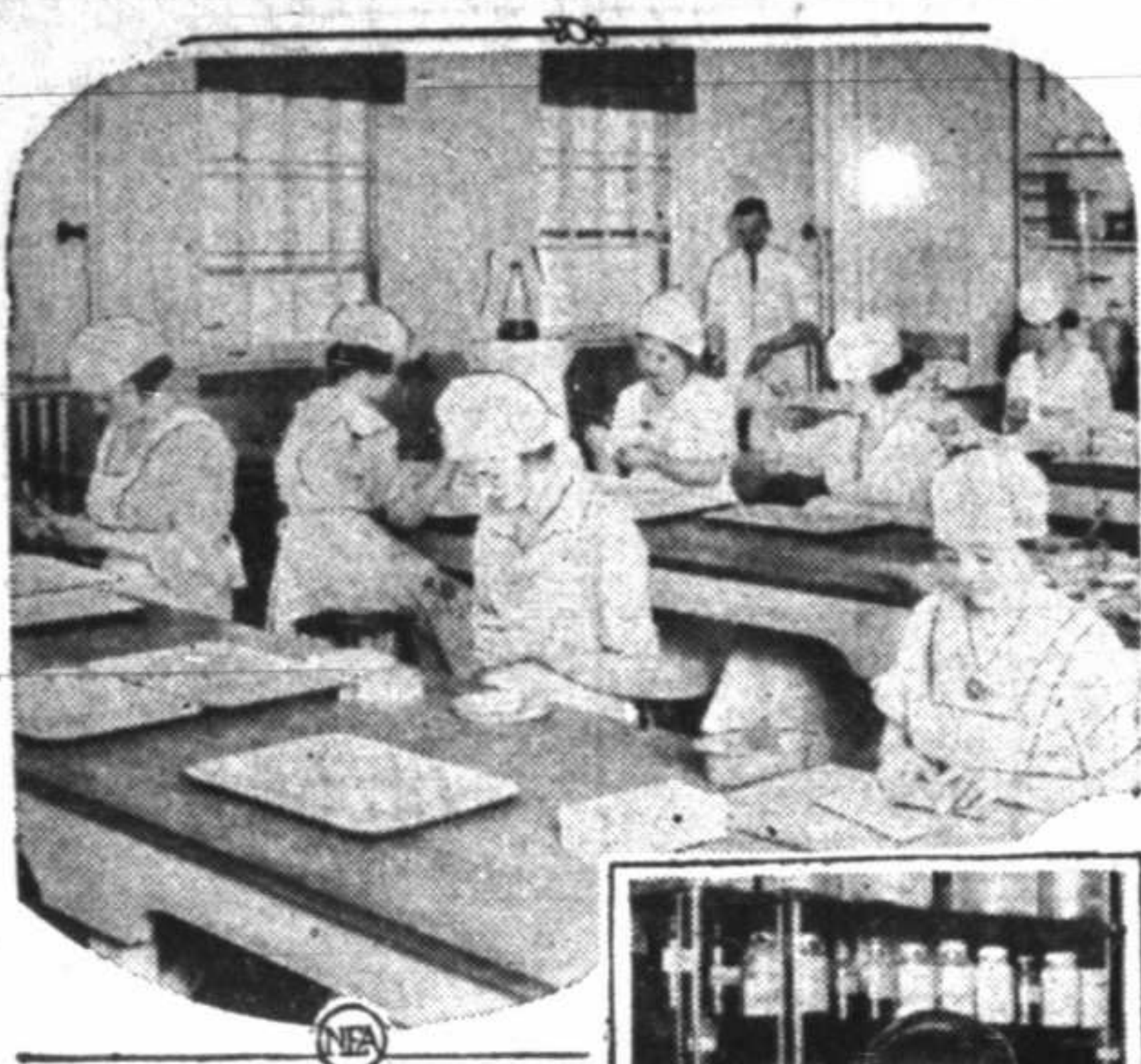
An incredible amount of work goes into the preparation of these medicines.

To make one pound of suprarenalin, for example, the glands from 15,000 cattle are needed. For a pound of posterior lobe pituitary substance, 12,000 cattle are required. In the long lines where the carcasses of slaughtered animals pass under the knives of the cutters there are men whose sole duty it is to remove the essential glands.

In the laboratories are 13 huge vacuum ovens. The glands are placed on trays and passed through these ovens.

Then, dried, the glands are freed from excess fat, powdered and then spread on trays once more, but through another set of ovens. Then they are ready for the chemists, who make them into medicines.

Supply Many Medicines.
The number of medicines that come from the stockyards is simply amazing.



One of the little-known angles to the work that goes on in Chicago's stockyards is shown here. These employees in the hospital-like laboratories of Armour & Co. are preparing glands and extracts taken from animals for use as medicine in the treatment of human diseases. The remedies have proved very effective in combating maladies in which there is a deficiency of the required factor in the human system.

Beneath the brain of a steer there is the pituitary gland—a body about the size of a hazel nut. The posterior lobe, about a tenth of the whole, provides an extract that is extremely useful to physicians in childbirth cases.

In the throat is the parathyroid gland, about as big as a lima bean. From this is made an extract that regulates the amount of calcium in the blood, used in healing wounds and ulcers.

Near this gland is the thyroid gland, whose use in regulating body metabolism, combating goiter and reducing excess weight is famous. Nearby lies the thymus gland, about the size of a man's fist, from which comes another extract used in medicine.

From the steer's short ribs comes red bone marrow, where red blood corpuscles for the whole body are made. An extract of this is used in treating anemia. The steer's liver,

properly treated, has a kindred use in the treatment of pernicious anemia.

Contain Priceless Insulin.

The pancreas, near the liver, contains the priceless insulin.

Above the kidneys are the suprarenal glands, about the size of an ordinary oyster. These must be removed immediately while they retain the animal heat and rushed to the laboratory, from them is made suprarenalin, a supremely important heart stimulant.

The hog gives valuable thyroid and pancreas glands. Pepsin is also found in the hog's stomach lining. From sheep are taken thyroid, pancreas and suprarenal glands. In addition, it has been found that the

STOCK ACT INTRODUCED

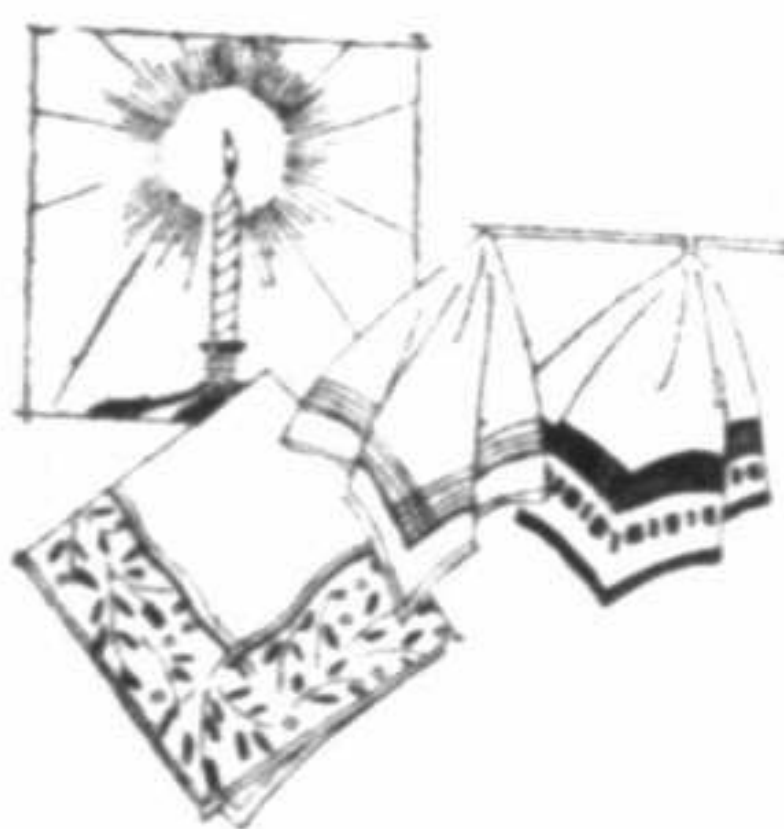
