Menu for the Day

BREAKFAST—Sliced bananas with strawberries, cereal, cream, creamed chicken on toast, milk coffee.

LUNCHEON—Chicken omelet, lettuce sandwiches, waffles with fresh maple syrup, milk, tea.

DINNER—Baked calf's liver, cabbage and orange salad, jelly roll, milk, coffee.

The omelet suggested in the luncheon menu makes use of any bits of chicken left from the loaf planned for the immediately preceding dinner. Any regulation mixture is used and when the mixture is cooked two cups of creamed chicken are spread over the top before folding.

Baked Calf's Liver. One-half pounds calf's liver, 4 slices. Remove one thin slice fat salt pork, 2 tablespoons flour, 1/2 teaspoon pepper.

Put liver which is not sliced into deep bowl. Pour over boiling water to more than cover and let stand five minutes. Drain and wipe carefully. Place on fire in roaster. Cut fat salt pork in pieces about the size of a little larger than onion slices making eight pieces of pork. Use four wooden toothpicks or small skewers and on each put a piece of pork, then onion and then pork. Stick into liver over top. Sprinkle with pepper and flour and bake one hour in a moderately hot oven. Serve on a bed of hot rice potatoes seasoned with salt, pepper and butter and garnish with strips of broiled bacon and spoonfuls of hot well seasoned spinach.

To this day I can feel the mellow warmth in my childish heart that the first glimpse of "Old Man Burch's" crocus or lilac buds or for-

sythis or flowering quince and currant gave.

ALL DIFFERENT, NOW. The Corner is asleep this spring. Papers and fallen branches clutter the yard. There is no chocolate mould of fragrant upturned earth, and no tender green sprouts coming through. The lilac and flowering quince and almond look dead and brown, and the whole town feels the depression of the gone-to-seed Corner.

"Old Man Burch" is really old now—too old to use spade or pruning knife. It's only a matter of days, they say, before the county's best corner will come onto the market. The realtors are licking their chops in anticipation. But the town is down-hearted. It won't be the same town without "Old Man Burch's" corner where the five pines frame a silver moon and where spring always came first.

Just a little story of one individual who made his mark in his own, simple, unassuming life.

The Bacchus has been abandoned by her crew and the survivors she picked up from the Greek ship.

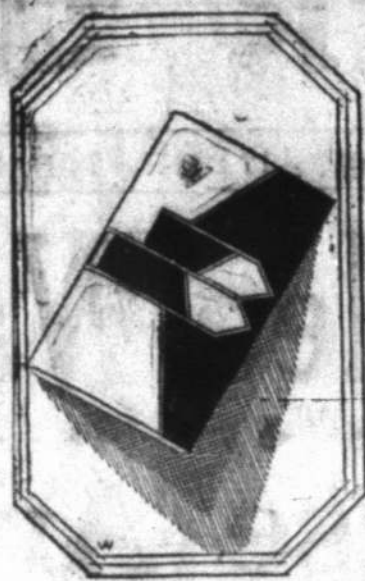
LIQUOR TRIAL

Three Conference Records Smashed

Texas University Turns Tables On Ancient Foe, Aggies; New Marks In Discus, Jump, Shot-put.

AUSTIN, May 4. (AP)—Texas University turned the tables on its ancient rival, Texas A. & M. college and triumphed 72-1-2 to 46-1-2 Friday in a dual track and field meet in which three southwest conference records were smashed by Longhorn athletes.

Baldwin of Texas hurled the discus 145 feet, nine inches, bettering the conference record of 143 feet, 10 inches held by Taylor of Baylor. Captain Smith of the Longhorn team went 24 feet, 3 1-2 inches in the broad jump. The conference record is 22 feet, four inches, which was excelled also by Shepard of Texas, who took second place Friday.

Harris of Texas put the shot 46 feet and 9 inches, three inches better than Baldwin's conference record.

SNYDER, May 4.—Appropriate ceremonies befitting the opening of a national loop highway were indulged in today near Plevana when the Cap Rock Scenic Highway was officially opened to traffic. They were buried alive for fourteen days when they became stuck in a rat hole near Bach's home. Bach said they disappeared two weeks ago. Yesterday W. P. Connelly, who lives near Bach, and conducts a floral establishment, decided to exterminate rabbits which had been gnawing on his plants.

He took a shovel and went into the woods, found what was either a rat or rabbit hole, and started to dig. He heard a squeak and dug further. Finally, ten feet from the beginning of the hole, and two feet under ground, he found "Pat". The dog's leg was caught fast in a root, and "Bobby" was imprisoned farther down the tunnel.

Sweeping Advance In Stock Markets Echoes Low Rates

Retention of Four Percent Levy Brings Corresponding Upward Trend In A Score of Issues.

(Associated Press Financial Editor)

NEW YORK, May 4. (AP)—A sweeping advance in stock prices today was Wall Street's response to the retention of the 4 per cent redoubt rate by the New York federal reserve bank. Extreme gains in the active issues ranged from 2 to 12 1/4 points, with final quotations generally around the day's high level.

So great was the accumulation of buying orders that the ticker fell behind the market in the first few minutes of trading and was just 10 minutes late in recording the last quotation. The day's sales totaled 4,364,100 shares.

Huge increases in brokers' loans reported after the close of the market yesterday by the New York federal reserve bank and the New York stock exchange were disregarded by market operators, who pushed more than three score issues to record high levels during the day.

Wall Street was convinced that there was still a plethora of funds available for stock market purposes despite the increase of more than half a billion dollars in loans during the last two months, the heavy exports of gold and the restrictive measures taken by the federal reserve banks through the sale of U. S. government securities.

Buying orders were distributed over a broad list, but the motor airplane and public utility shares gave the most impressive demonstrations of group strength. Rails moved up with the industrials but the gains were not as large.

General Motors regained its former place as the market leader by climbing 9 points to a new high record at 205.

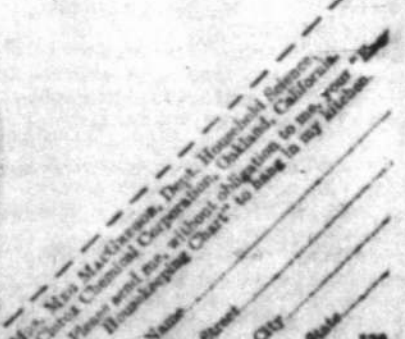
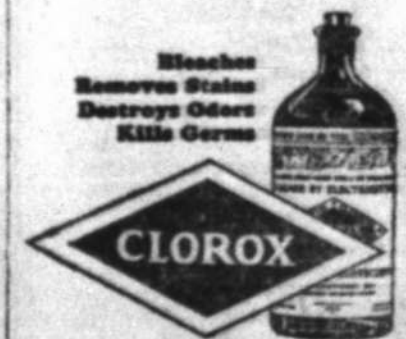

THAT YOUR JOY MAY BE FULL

If ye keep my commandments, ye shall abide in my love; even as I have kept my Father's commandments, and abide in His love. These things have I spoken unto you, that my joy might remain in you, and that your joy might be full.—John XV, 10 and 11.

THE REAL ISSUE

Despite claims of leaders of the Texas democracy to the contrary, the real issue before the people is the maladministration of public affairs by the republican party and sickening corruption disclosed in high places. It is not a question of whether or not the Eighteenth Amendment is endangered, not a question of prohibition and the enforcement thereof, but rather one that will lead to the restoration of honesty in government. The democratic party faces an opportunity to make the most tremendous appeal to independent voters if it fails to take advantage of it.

In Texas democrats are entreated to go to the conventions Saturday and express themselves upon one issue—prohibition—a question receiving minor consideration in practically all other states. Nothing is being said about the false doctrine of a protective tariff which has robbed agriculture and its allied industries for years, nor one sentence is uttered against the shameful disclosures of graft and corruption practiced by high republican officials. It all centers around the Eighteenth Amendment written into the Constitution more than eight years ago and which is as firmly fixed as a part of the organic instrument as the original document itself. No one is so foolish to believe it will ever be repealed; and efforts put forth by those favoring it excite the ridicule of those who were opposed to its adoption.

The dry advocates presuppose a situation that has never existed, which is, that enforcement of the law can not be entrusted to those who question the wisdom of the act or the principle involved. They assume that position imputes to men of high character and standing an utter disregard of their official oaths to uphold the Constitution and enforce all laws of the land. No men of sufficient reputation to commend them to the voters of the country would be so lacking in patriotism and false to their sworn obligations. This paper has in mind many officials who have made enviable reputations in enforcing laws with which they were not in sympathy. It has in mind many United States district attorneys and judges who rigidly enforce the narcotic act and the Mann white slave law who do not believe that either of them embodies a correct principle of government. But it is the law, and so long as the acts remain on the statute books they will enforce them regardless of their personal opinion as to their merits.

Injection of the prohibition question and that of religion only serves to complicate matters and confuse the people, thereby enabling ambitious men to further selfish interests. That is true whether it relates to official preferment or leadership of the party. It is used as a camouflage to disguise and conceal a hidden motive that none of them want the people to view or understand. If proof of the statement is required one has to look no further than the insistence that the people—democratic voters—simply declare themselves for an endorsement of an issue already settled and the nomination of candidates committed thereto regardless of whom they may be or the views they entertain with respect to the vital principles for which the party originally stood.

This paper would like to see the voters express themselves on the really important questions before the American people today. The leaders have been leading for several months; but today the voters will be given an opportunity to speak for themselves. If they do not the politicians will be left in position to bore another hoe in the hull of the ship of state.

LOCOMOTIVE WHISTLES

Locomotive whistles are due for some radical changes if heed is given by the railroads to the suggestions of Prof. Ar-

thur L. Foley, of the physics department at Indiana university. The whistle blows the wrong direction, according to Prof. Foley. It is intended primarily to be heard in front of the locomotive, and never further to the rear than the end of the train. By reason of the location of the whistle it is heard three times as clearly from the side as from the front. The noise ahead of the engine is cut down by placing the whistle behind the smokestack, steam dome and sand box.

The remedy is very simple, Prof. Foley points out that "even a mule knows that sound can be reflected; for the mule turns his ears in the direction from which the sound comes." All that is necessary is to place the whistle on the very front of the locomotive and place a concave reflector behind it. Then the whistle blast will be sent ahead where it will do the most good. The power of the blast can be cut down. The steam required to blow it can be curtailed and an economy effected in fuel. It is said 4,000,000 tons of coal annually are used for nothing but blowing locomotive whistles. That is why the railroads are giving serious consideration to the idea.

If the railroads ever apply this simple piece of good sense, Prof. Foley will be benefactor of those who live near railway tracks.—Des Moines Register.

THE BETTER SELLING MOTTO

Although that cynical motto of sharp dealing, "Let the buyer beware," has often been upheld in courts of law, there are plenty of signs that it eventually will disappear from the world of civilized commerce. The decline of tricky salesmanship has been due to many causes, perhaps the most pressing being that of competition.

Consider the improvement in the status of the resale of motor cars. Five years ago, when the market showed no sign of approaching saturation, purchasers of used automobiles were exploited shamelessly. Worn-out transmissions, for example, were sometimes made quiet with baths of ground cork and grease, not to be discovered until the car had been run for a week. Then the swindled purchaser had to go to the expense of renewing the gears or junk his machine. Nowadays, with plenty of used cars for sale, one hears little of such trickery. The dealer renews the worn gears, if the car is worth it, and sells the buyer just what he thinks he is getting.

The modern business man is operating on a permanent basis. He is remaining in the same store in the same city for a long period of years. He can prosper only in the degree that he wins the confidence of the buyer. Mr. Statler, the hotel man, expressed the whole viewpoint of service in his slogan: "The guest is always right."

Recently art circles in Philadelphia have been stirred by the refusal of a salesman to let a customer take away a painting that she was prepared to buy until he had shown her, by pacing off the length of her drawing room in the gallery that the broadly painted picture could never be seen in her house at a sufficient distance to make it a satisfactory addition to the decorations. Who can doubt that his honesty will be rewarded by increased sales for his firm, sales due to the increased confidence of the public? That salesman was operating under the new business motto: "Let the seller beware."

THROUGH THE GREATER PARENT-TEACHER ORGANIZATION

Election of Mrs. S. M. N. Marrs of Austin to the presidency of the National Congress of Parent-Teacher associations, by the Cleveland convention, is a thoroughly earned promotion. It is also a most graceful compliment to Texas, which of course commanded unusual attention from the meeting because the biennial gathering of the General Federation of Women's clubs will be held in San Antonio.

The Parent-Teacher movement is associated with the club women's organization, as with several other cultural and welfare enterprises. In effect, naming the wife of Texas State Superintendent of Public Instruction for the executive post also emphasizes the educational aspects of the work, which always have taken precedence over civic and social activities.

Mrs. Marrs had served five years as vice-president in charge of public welfare, and previously was president of district and state organizations, each for a five-year term.

Wherever found—and every progressive public school in the land now boasts its Parent-Teacher organization—this movement has exercised a harmonizing, stimulating influence. The age-old conflict of authority—once a frequent source of friction—virtually has disappeared. Thereby, the cause of discipline is promoted. Another worthy, needful end, the education of parents, is being served at the same time.

The Association aims, as Prof. A. R. Brubacher of New York State College for Teachers has explained, to help the father and the mother better to understand the first three of Jacques' "seven ages"—the infant, the schoolboy, the lover—with which they must deal. That is larger than any single educational, ethical or social program. Whatever helps to discharge better the responsibilities of parenthood and citizenship, falls within the scope of this movement; hence its expansion. And in that broader field it is rendering great service.

WORLD HIGHWAYS

A few years ago any man who predicted a network of improved highways and broad paved roads reaching over the country to every State in the Union, with persons traveling thousands of miles in automobiles in safety and comfort as is the case today, would have been called visionary, if not actually crazy.

New the tourist and the traveler can go almost anywhere in the United States on rubber tires over good roads. The Federal Government and every State have been active in a big road-building program. Yet this is by no means the end. The United States isn't the only country that is constructing highways. The time is coming when practically the whole world will be opened to the motorist.

Mexico now has a bureau of roads the director of which was recently in this country conferring with Federal and state authorities concerning the development of roads in that country. A time is foreseen when a network of highways will open Mexico's resources and tourist attractions to motorists.

A British baronet, Sir Abo Bailey who has become rich in South Africa, announces a plan to build a highway 4,000 miles long, reaching from the Cape of Good Hope to the mouth of the Nile, the entire length of Africa from Capetown to Cairo, with branches that would open up all Africa.

Other world highways that are contemplated are from Paris to Shanghai; from European capitals via Constantinople and Jerusalem, to India; from the highways of the United States to Mexico City, Panama, Rio de Janeiro, Buenos Aires, (the Paris of South America) and Valparaiso on the west coast. BARRERS TO CONVENT

Members of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association in Taylor and Jones counties will meet at the county court house in Abilene and Anson next Saturday afternoon, May 5, at 2 o'clock, for the purpose of selecting delegates to a district convention which will be held next week as a part of the process of electing annually directors on the board of the state association. This announcement was made by Clyde Daniel, field service representative of the organization in the two counties.

The affairs of the cotton cooperative marketing association are controlled by the membership. Mr. Daniel said, through directors selected by them. "Various county meetings are being held all over the state next Saturday by the members delegates to district conventions. At these district conventions the following Saturday nominees are selected and these nominees later balloted upon by the members through postal card ballot. The democratic principles of the elections are carried out on the basis of one man one vote. The state election is by the members, together with three public directors, one appointed by the president of the Texas A. & M. college, one by the governor, and one by the president of the board is composed of 29 directors of the Texas Farm Bureau federation.

Borah's Nicaraguan Position

Differences of opinion over the United States Government's policy in Nicaragua do not prevent general approval by the press of the announced change in Senator Borah's attitude. The Idaho Senator, chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee, and one of the most vigorous critics of the administration in this matter has announced his belief that the marines should not be withdrawn from Nicaragua until after the election which the United States pledged itself to supervise.

Observing that "possibly we made a blunder in the beginning," the Santa Barbara Daily News (Dem.) adds: "The fact remains that we have put our hands to the plow and cannot look back. We are in Nicaragua and we cannot get out until after the free election we have guaranteed the people has been held. Senator Borah's argument would make a study of the facts."

The Minneapolis Tribune (Rep.) seems unwavering to any one who offers the approving statement: "Senator Borah speaks the truth prophetically when he says that if the marines were withdrawn at this time or later in the year, Nicaragua would quickly relapse into a land of turmoil and bloodshed. So long as the marines are on the ground, it may be expected that there will be peace and quiet except in so far as Sandino and his elusive forces are able to mess things up in a restricted area."

The Idaho Senator's sympathies are with the liberal party in Nicaragua, says the Kansas City Times. "He hopes that this party may win at the coming election. But he recognizes the obligation of the United States to make good its pledge that a fair election shall be held. He would not have the marines withdrawn until the results are known and the successful party established as a going concern. Once the Nicaraguan situation is understood by the fair-minded, it is accepted as rational and constructive so far as our government policies are concerned."

To withdraw our entire force of 15,000 men from Central American republics in the opinion of the Kansas City Gazette (Ind.) "would be a dangerous move as well as a violation of our solemn pledge to both Nicaragua's political parties. It might, as Senator Borah believes, result in a return of the turmoil and domestic strife from which Nicaragua has suffered so long, and render impossible the settlement of that country's political problems through the orderly processes of the polls."

In the judgment of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch (Ind.), "the liberal opinion of the United States Government, Mr. Borah's position as to the wisdom of withdrawing the marines in the present circumstances. There will be reluctance, however, in condemning the Sandino rebellion. That it has cost many lives and considerable destruction of property, which might have been avoided, is undeniable. But the moral values of this sacrifice may not, in fairness, be dismissed. But win or lose, when that election has been held, we shall have no further excuse for prolonging an intervention which has had many aspects of dictatorship and been actuated by motives and in behalf of interests repellant to the American people."

The Senator is held up as an example to others by the Providence Journal (Ind.), which states: "Mr. Borah speaks particularly of the position of the Nicaraguan Liberals. The activities of this faction, it will be recalled, necessitated our intervention. Upon our request they surrendered their arms after receiving our assurance that a fair election would be held. It is impossible, therefore, to understand why a very small minority in the United States Senate should continue to oppose the fulfillment of that promise."

Senator Borah, ranked with the independents in Congress, was fearful at first, explains the Charleston Daily Mail (Ind. Rep.), "that the action of the administration meant the perpetuation of the conservatism in power and the squelching of the liberals. Now that the situation has changed, and the keeping of the marines in Nicaragua means that otherwise the conservatives would wipe out the liberals, his view has changed. However, the purpose of the administration has not changed. That purpose was in the beginning and still is to prevent either party from establishing the other, to have political questions in Nicaragua decided by the ballot and not by the bullet."

As the matter is viewed by the Norfolk Ledger-Dispatch (Ind. Dem.), "Although the liberals are the apparent victors in the election, when the United States of America combined with the Nicaragua-based forces, will be returned to power, as a result of an election supervised by the United States Marine Corps. That is merely expediency to the Nicaraguan tragedy of ill and wounded and dying and dead men of the United States Marine Corps."

As the issue itself, the First Daily Journal (Ind.) declares, referring to Mr. Borah's former criticism: "He was not objecting to a purely obstructive standpoint, seeking to embarrass the American government in every move it made as so many of the foes of our Nicaraguan policy have been doing. He had a right in his opinion and he opposed intervention, but once this course was decided upon, he loyally supported the administration."

But the Baltimore Evening Sun (Ind. Dem.) finds a very different explanation. "This may be proof that the marines should remain in Nicaragua," concludes the Sun, "but to withdraw them now, this course is almost certain proof that an election is approaching. Whenever an election is approaching, careful scrutiny always reveals Senator Borah supporting the administration. Other signs may fail, but not this. Vociferous outbursts of passion on the part of politicians may occur at different seasons. Careful consideration of the feelings of John Smith, taxpayer, by jobholders might conceivably be based on other grounds. But when Borah swings into support of the administration, there is no longer any doubt. An election is toward."

to rush its defenders. Fighting started which had not ended at two o'clock, the Japanese soldiers taking heavy toll of the attackers with a machine gun fire.

Messages from Shanghai from nationalist officials at Tsinan said that Japanese soldiers had broken into the house occupied by Dai Kung-Hui, only Thursday appointed commissioner of foreign affairs at Tsinan, and killed him. There was no further explanation of the incident.

Anti-Foreign Feeling
It is not known whether the anti-foreign feeling has been directed against nationals of an country other than Japan. An official bulletin at Tokyo early Friday stated there had been a massacre of all foreigners living near Tsinan, but this report was confined to Tokyo and could not be confirmed.

The Japanese took precautionary measures that the fighting might have its repercussions in other parts in which their nationals live and sent warships to a number of southern ports and points on the Yangtze river. Four battleships were dispatched to augment the forces at Tsinan, an important port at the foot of the Shantung railway of which Tsinan is the other terminus.

PEKING, May 4 (AP)—The capture of Tsinanfu, capital of Shantung province, is the greatest nationalist victory since the Nanking affair in March, 1927, and has been the occasion of a grave anti-foreign incident comparable with that at Nanking, threatening even more serious international complications. In the attack against foreigners the Japanese have been the chief sufferers, the Japanese infantry at Tsinanfu filling the role of foreign defenders which the Anglo-American warships filled at Nanking. However, whereas disagreements obviated positive international action against the nationalists after the Nanking affair, Japan has virtually a free hand to deal with the present situation.

Already a Japanese brigade from South Manchuria is moving toward Tsinan, enroute to Tsinanfu, from which place 600 additional Japanese infantry departed today to encounter their hard pressed comrades at Tsinanfu.

Leading Prevalent
With General Chiang Kai-Shek commander-in-chief of the nationalist troops, himself at Tsinanfu, informed nationalists yesterday having invaded and looted the Japanese quarter. A battle between Chinese and Japanese ensued, but so far as can be learned, it has not yet ended. There were considerable casualties on both sides among

the troops, with the death of many civilians and loss of property belonging to British, American and Japanese residents, due to the fighting and looting.

Third Party Talk
As the senate legislative mill ground away on some of the questions which seem destined to play their part in the coming presidential campaign, the conversations among certain groups of senators about the possibility of party defections in the event of certain happenings at Kansas City and Houston were continued.

These discussions were carried on between both Democrats and Republicans, but thus far the whole thing is in a nebulous state and probably will continue in that way for some time to come if it ever gets beyond that stage.

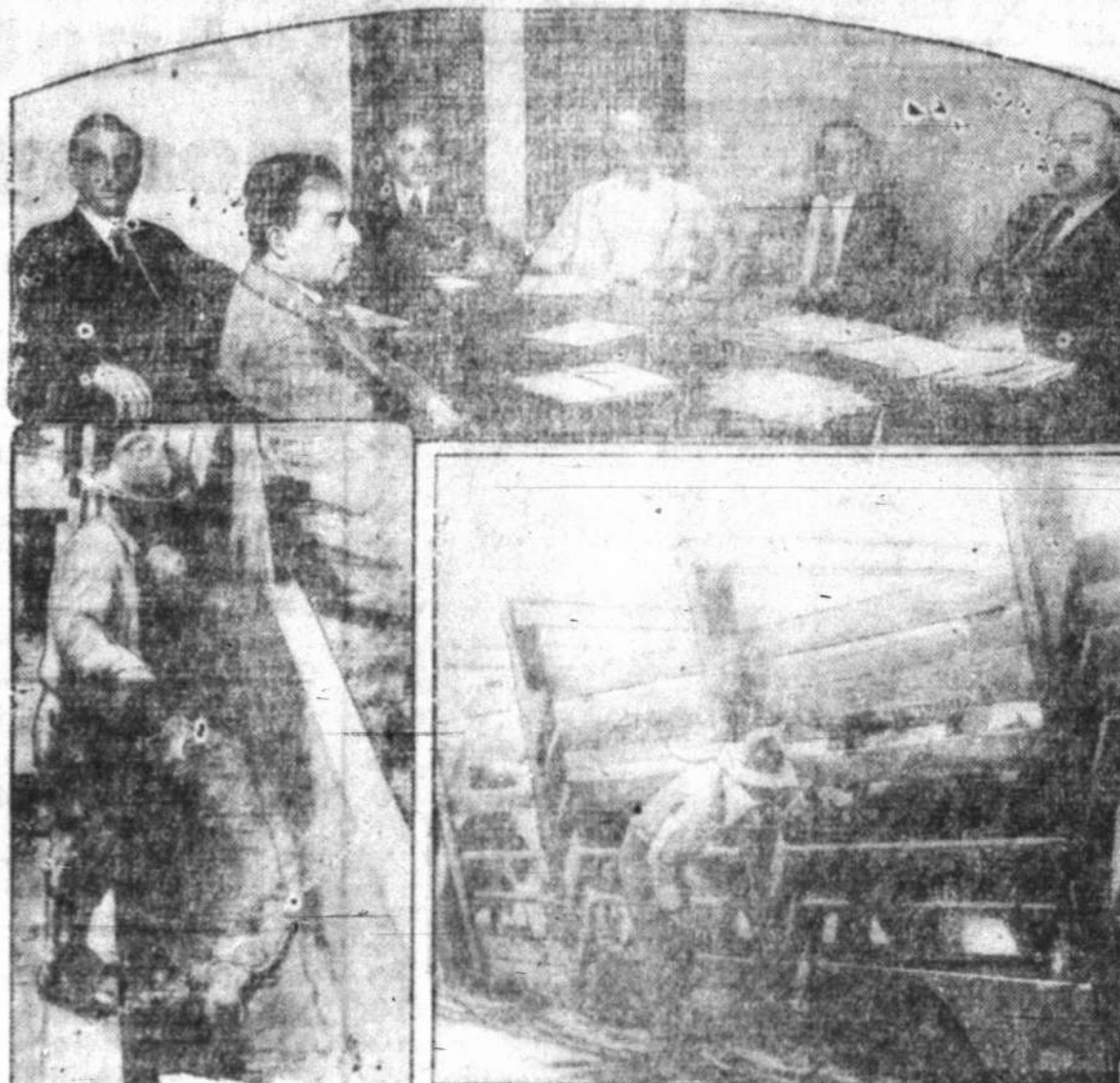
Warning Telephoned

Fact With Mexico Strengthens Fight On Livestock Diseases

WASHINGTON, May 4.—Common measures of defense against the invasion of foreign livestock diseases into other country soon may be put into practice by the United States and Mexico.

A treaty embodying uniform and reciprocal regulations already has been negotiated by the United States senate and awaits ratification by the Mexican government. It is the culmination of negotiations started more than a year ago by livestock sanitary officials and representatives of the two countries.

The conference group that drew up the final provisions of the treaty included Dr. J. R. Mohler, chief of the bureau of animal industry in the department of agriculture; Dr. A. W. Miller, who at that time was chief of the field inspection division; and Dr. W. W. Flournoy Jr., assistant federal inspector. Mexico was represented by Dr. Antonio Castro-Leal, chief of affairs of interior in the United States; Dr. Jose Figueroa, chief of the cattle division of the Mexican department of agriculture; and Dr. Daniel Ortiz Berumen, chief of section of the cattle division.

The terms of the treaty provide for the maintenance of quarantine stations; adoption of livestock sanitary police service; supervision of animal by-products, forage and other commodities offered for importation; disinfection of vessels, railroad cars and other carriers; prompt report of outbreaks of disease; establishment of quarantine zones; and other safeguards.

Last year more than 216,000 head sheep and 3,141 horses and mules were inspected and none allowed to enter unless free of disease.

The United States long has maintained rapid inspection of livestock entering from Mexico, although no epidemic of animal diseases ever has been traced directly to that country. Special precautions are taken against the Texas fever tick, foot-and-mouth disease, interdigital contagious pleuro-pneumonia and cholera.

By special act of congress Texas is the only state into which Mexican cattle may be imported if they have been exposed to the fever tick. Before they enter, however, they are driven through a dipping vat at a stated interval, and are certified to be free of infection. They are dipped again when they cross the border. Each animal is passed through an inspection chute where experts make sure no disease is carried into this country.

Foot-and-mouth disease is not common in northern Mexico, nor was it present at the time of the outbreak in the United States. Recognized, however, there was an outbreak in southern Mexico which was successfully eradicated while the present treaty was in the course of preparation. Mexican authorities took precaution that no animals from that section were offered for importation to the United States.

Because of prevalent diseases, there are a number of countries from which neither the United States nor Mexico purchases livestock. The treaty is expected to strengthen precaution against importation of such animals into either country and subsequently passed across the border.

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New York Traffic Students Prepare For Greater City

Double Population In 1965 Will Necessitate Doing Something To Safeguard The People

NEW YORK, May 4.—Looking forward to double the 9,000,000 population in New York's metropolitan area by 1965, a special regional plan committee of the Russell Sage Foundation here has suggested a plan by which future traffic could be relieved.

This plan is the result of five years of work surveying areas of congestion and compiling traffic figures. It calls for construction of several belt lines of highways running in concentric circles around the Metropolitan area with New York as the center and a series of radial highways diverging toward them from Manhattan Island.

Thus, the present practice of passing through this narrow and congested island from one outer borough to another would be eliminated. The motorists instead would take a belt highway and skirt the island from borough to borough.

Many Improvements Cited
Double deck streets and bridges, more bridges over the Hudson river in addition to the one just being built, auto tunnels under the East river and even across Manhattan Island, elimination of street cars on at least two of the main cross-town streets and substitution of buses, reduction of taxis, widening of essential streets, limitation of building heights in congested areas, raising of railroad crossings, diversion of traffic from congested spots to other less congested and round about ferry routes, to avoid crossing Manhattan Island, are some of the more important recommendations made by the foundation.

If all these were adopted, it is said, the city and its 400 surrounding communities in an area within a 50-mile radius could take care of 20,000,000 people easily.

But today, the figures show, there are 39 spots reaching out on Long Island, in New Jersey and as far as Stamford, Conn., which become congested of a Sunday as the result of traffic to or from New York City. At one point, where street car line and railroad crossing meet on a narrow highway, automobiles have been held up for eight miles back.

The bridges over the East river and the ferries on the Hudson have been the chief causes for congestion, the committee reports. Therefore, double decks on existing bridges and additional bridges over the Hudson are recommended. In addition there would have to be a vehicular tunnel under the East river and possibly one running cross-town to the Hudson, in order to keep such traffic as goes on to New Jersey off the Manhattan streets.

Trolleys and Taxis Slow
Trolley cars, it has been estimated, reduce the traffic capacity of the streets they travel on by 20 per cent, and in two cases by more than 25 per cent. Taxis, too, are said to hold up traffic, for a single bus could take care of as many passengers as two score taxis can accommodate.

Making a count of buses and taxis on Fifth avenue, on typical days, the foundation discovered that buses amounted to only 12 per cent of all the vehicles on the avenue, but carried 64 per cent of all the people riding along the street. Trucks in factory districts are

Bishop Formally Charged

KANSAS CITY, May 4 (AP).—Formal charges of "maladministration" and "immorality" were filed against Bishop Francis J. McConnell of Pittsburgh at the general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church here today.

In the count alleging "immorality," Bishop McConnell was charged with failing to keep the record of an annual conference, known as the Journal, which is not a true report of the proceedings. Alleged immorality, by the Bishop on the theory of evolution also were cited as grounds for the charge of "immorality."

NON-PAYING COWS.

C. E. Shields, manager of the company that is maintaining milk and cream routes out of Ranger, says many farmers in Eastland county own cows that do not pay for their upkeep. He predicts that it will be at least 10 months before the routes can be regarded as successful ventures on the part of the company operating them.

This is merely another argument in favor of increasing the quality of dairy herds on the farms of the county. This means that there must be more and better sires for the herds in order that the production of milk and butterfat per cow may be increased. After the initial expense of purchasing a pure bred bull there is no added expense in maintaining the herd. On the contrary, speaking comparatively the cost is reduced, for, as any farming expert can tell you it costs no more to feed and care for a high grade cow than for one of scrub stock and saprophy while the increased production of milk, cream and butterfat is a source of enlarged profits.

According to Mr. Shields the milk and cream routes will be continued and thus supply a constant and

Joseph Dunninger, the magician, undertook the experiment to disprove the spiritualistic claims of Nino Pecoraro, a self-styled medium who had sought to bring to earth the spirit of the late magician and thereby win a \$21,000 prize offered by Science and Invention.

Pecoraro's seance at the office of the publication several days ago, and the best he could do after five hours was to produce a voice purporting to be Houdini's which seemed to have nothing to say.

Dunninger last night, before the same audience of 30, some newspaper men and women and under identical conditions, produced a luminous ghost resembling Houdini, a message in Houdini's handwriting, some snatches of oral conversation and a paraffin cast of an ectoplasmic hand which is to be examined for Houdini's fingerprints.

Mrs. Houdini declared the hand-writing "Harry's" to be life and the luminous portrait the best she had seen yet, although she had attended many seances in hope of receiving the code message her husband had given her and which he said he would try to transmit to her after death.

Dunninger was bound, hands and feet, the knots sealed with wax and after being searched was placed behind a curtain. Then within 20 minutes writing appeared on cards and plates that had been left in view of the audience. A lamourne went sailing through the air and fingerprints appeared on modeling wax.

Charles E. Davenport, Pecoraro's manager, after viewing the performance with astonishment, asserted Dunninger had mediumistic powers even if he didn't know it.

"That accusation," said Dunninger hotly, "is not true. I give you my word everything you have seen here is a put-up job, accomplished without a particle of air from any supernatural source whatsoever."

Veto Shadow Over Two Big Measures

Coolidge Known To Disapprove
Of Both Flood Bill
And The McNary-Haugen
Farm Measure.

WASHINGTON, May 4 (AP).—Even before finishing touches have been applied at the capitol, the shadow of a presidential veto grew perceptibly darker today over two of the major legislative efforts of the present congress—the Mississippi flood control and McNary-Haugen farm relief bills.

President Coolidge has been giving careful study to the two measures and as far as he has ascertained, neither has been revised sufficiently to meet the objections he previously had raised.

He regards the farm measure, which today formally was sent to conference between the house and senate, as still embodying the fundamental principles to which he has expressed strenuous disapproval. As to the flood bill, he believes that but little has been done to meet his views.

Of the changes effected in the farm bill, the president feels that only a handful of the provisions that led to his veto of the measure last season have been eliminated. In addition, he looks upon these revisions as only incidental and not "line upon the principle features" to which he objects.

The farm bill's equalization machinery for crop stabilization is the chief point disapproved by the White House.

It was not as a teacher that Christ was thus approached, but as the coming of the head of the kingdom of heaven about which Jesus talked so often. His words had sunk into the ambitious souls of Salome and her two fiery sons, the "sons of thunder."

"We would that thou shouldst do for us whatsoever we shall ask of thee." The disciples expected Jesus to make some such grant as King Ahasuerus made to Esther (Esth. 5:3); but our Lord was no Eastern despot, no barbaric monarch; he exercised reason when he gives. He promises to grant whatever we desire, but only when he shares in us, guiding our desires, so that the issue may be happy (John 15:7).

A Foolish Request Granted v. 29
"And Jesus said unto them, The cup that I drink ye shall drink; and with the baptism that I am baptized withal shall ye be baptized." How like many of our prayers, their foolish request! His words were thus fulfilled: John, the beloved disciple, lived to be the last survivor of the Twelve, enduring long and often of that bitter cup of sorrow; baptized through not unto death, with that baptism of blood; a martyr in will but not in effect. James, after his eleven years of ministry, drinks and is baptized, even to the martyr's death. So their Lord's prophecy is fulfilled. That is his gift on earth to those who ask to be next him in glory. A poor gift, as the world might take it; and yet, was it not glory? Who does not envy those who were counted worthy to suffer and to die for the name of the Lord Jesus?

Worldly Greatness v. 42
"Ye know that they who are accounted to rule over the Gentiles lord it over them." He says: the worldly principle of greatness and the worldly ideal of a kingdom is, as "ye know," to exercise authority over men; domination; the master above his subjects, ruling them; by the power of personality, or ancestry, or shrewdness, or money, and the more power he has, and over the more people, the greater lord he is; world rulers, like Alexander, Trajan, and Napoleon; at the top of the heap. Jesus does not here condemn this method of exalting one's self; but he personally had rejected it, at the temptation of the wilderness, and among you, my disciples, he declares, it is not to prevail.

Greatness Through Service v. 44
"Whoever would be first among you, shall be servant of all." What then is the principle of greatness in his kingdom, the way in which high rank is to be attained in it? Service. Who would be great among you let him become your slave. Our English version loses the force of the two words "servant" and "slave." Servants were paid and performed the nobler tasks of the household; slaves did the menial or menial work, and ranked at the bottom of society. Jesus here is revolutionary in his teaching; overturns old values. He himself sets the example, "I am among you as a servant."

One that serveth." The picture of that Jesus, a towel around his waist, serving his disciples, has, dusty feet, is one of the unforgettable ones of the gospel story. "I have given you an example, that you also should do what I have done to you."

"A Ransom for Many," v. 45
"To give his life a ransom for many." A ransom is the price paid for the release of prisoners or captives. That life of his was the indispensable means for the deliverance of men from the slavery or captivity of sin; and thus to give it, as he was on the point of doing, would be service incomparable. Christ's first disciples had no question about the meaning of these words. "His own self" said Peter, "hath our sins in his body upon the tree" (1 Pet. 2:24). "Hath in love" said John, "that we loved God, but that he loved us, and sent his Son to be the propitiation for our sins" (1 John 4:10). "He loved me," said Paul, "and gave himself up for me" (Gal. 2:20). "The truth can not be put too simply: God forgives them; in that death of Christ our condemnation came upon him, that for us there might be condemnation no more; the forfeiting of his free life has freed our forfeited lives" (Denny).

Bearing shame and scoffing rude. In his place condemned he stood; Sealed my pardon with his blood; Alleluia, what a savior!

The True Spirit of Service
"True vicarious service is possible when a life is willing to make itself of no reputation. Colin H. Treasure Ships In Lake Erie Summon



MRS. MARGARET C. GOODMAN

NEW YORK, MAY 1 (AP)—The skeletons of three ships which have held their secrets for more than 50 years at the bottom of Lake Erie are luring Mrs. Margaret Campbell Goodman, deep-sea salvager, back to her watery profession after a dry, calm winter.

The S. S. Lady Elgin, Mrs. Goodman says, is fathoms down in Lake Erie, the vault of 200 eager emigrants and a casket for gold in unknown amount. It was the crack ship plying the Great Lakes during the land expansion years of the nineteenth century and bore innumerable settlers who were seeking land in the middle west. Many carried their life savings with which they hoped to make a new start. The boat finally sank in a storm, and Mrs. Goodman will seek to disclose its secrets this summer.

"I haven't completed all my plans yet, of course," she explains. "But in a few months I hope to have enough information gathered about the Lady Elgin to warrant going after it. I have located some of the captain's family, and from them I hope to get definite information about how clear my right to the salvage might be."

The Brunswick is another vessel that may perhaps have a summer visitor, Mrs. Goodman says. The boat is believed to have been loaded with \$200,000 worth of white oak and black walnut logs. The action of the years' constant swirling of

water will have had no effect upon the condition of the wood, she believes.

Mrs. Goodman plans to search for these two vessels, along with a third, the Atlantic, by airplane. The sunken hulks appear in the water like huge dark spots, navy experts say, and by this means she hopes to locate the treasure ships.

Mrs. Goodman first gained fame as a salvager of lost ships in 1917 when she organized a company that was successful in bringing the Pelee to the surface of Lake Huron and retrieving \$200,000 worth of copper. She had never been beneath the surface of the water before.

The need of money to support an invalid husband and a growing daughter put Mrs. Goodman into the business. Her work as a reporter for a Detroit newspaper took

her to an inventor who related his scheme for a diving suit of new design. She became interested, organized the company, conducted tests of the suit and carried the undertaking to a successful end.

The higher prices brought in a renewal of realizing or liquidation but after showing losses of about 3 to 6 points, the midday market stiffened up again. May selling at 21.05 and October at 20.81 or about 22 to 30 points net higher on active months. Demand tapered off later, and there seemed to be some selling during early afternoon on the weather details showing light but more general rains in the southwest.

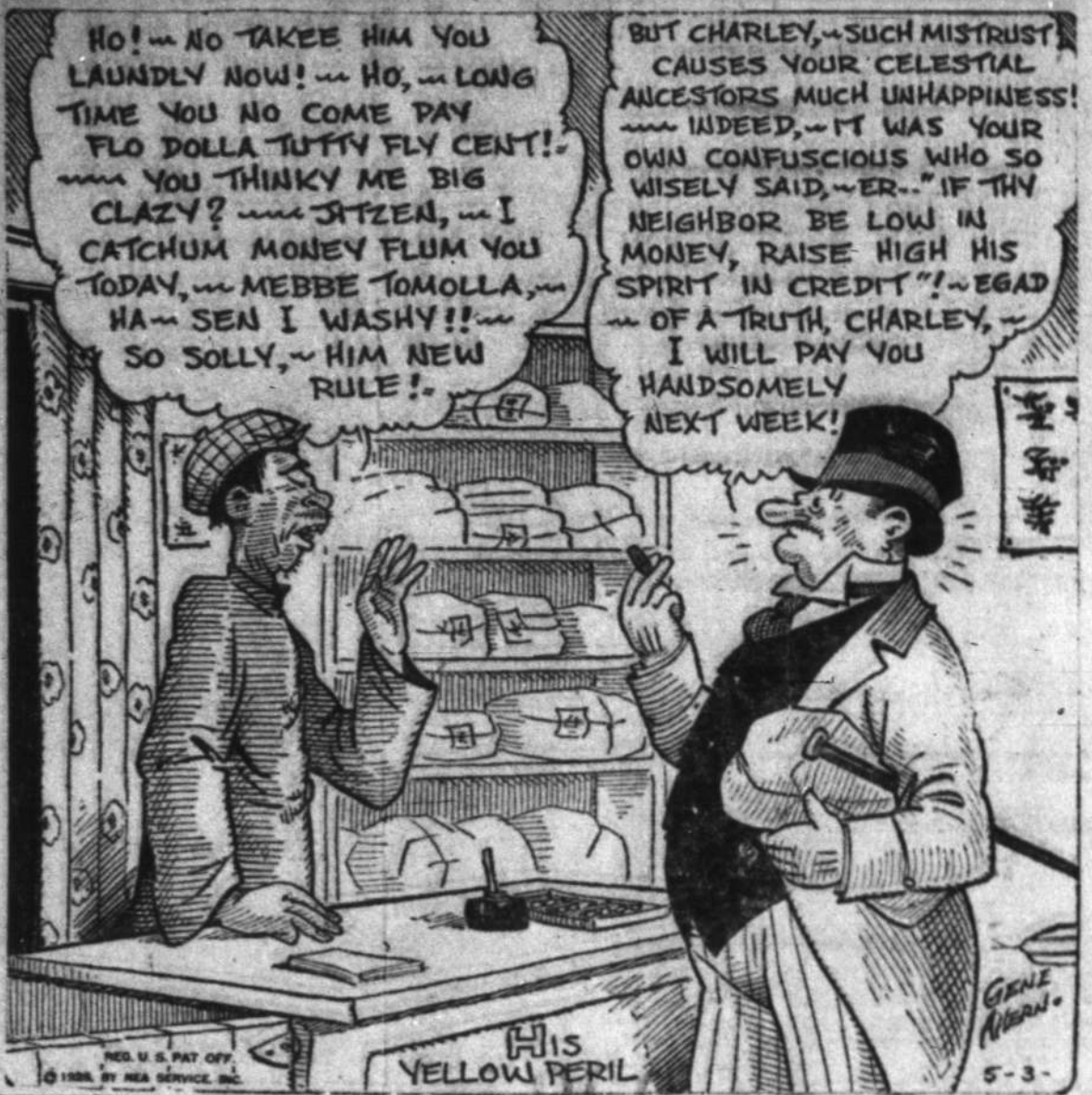

DAILY MARKETS

NEW ORLEANS COTTON

NEW ORLEANS, La., May 4 (AP).—Prices were without a definite trend on today's erratic cotton market, quotations at one time soaring 23 points above yesterday's close and at another dropping 22 points below. The general market closed steady, net unchanged to 3 points, down.

A report circulated that the government's figures on boll weevil emergence had been released, which later was proved unfounded caused a sharp rally during the morning hours, although this gain soon was lost on heavy liquidation by speculative long interests and favorable weather reports. At the peak, July sold at 20.65, 23 points up, but before the decline from this point had been checked, was quoted at 20.30, down 45 points from the high, and closed at 20.42 or net unchanged for the day.

Early trades showed gains of from

4 to 12 points on better Liverpool cables than due. July traded at 20.60, October 20.35 and December 20.29, 15 to 20 points above yesterday's close.

Reactionary influences soon took possession of the market on the appearance of the weather map showing favorable weather prevailing for the new crop and a favorable outlook. July dropped to 20.29, October to 20.05 and December 20.04 down 25 to 31 points from the day's high.

CHICAGO WHEAT

CHICAGO, May 4 (AP).—Wheat prices fluctuated as moderate speed today, repeatedly breaking and bulging on indecisive reports about the effect of rains in the winter crop belt. Bulls contended that much damage done by drought was irreparable.

Closing quotations on wheat were irregular 3-4c net lower to 7-8c

higher, corn 1-4c to 1c up, oats showing 1-8 to 1-4c to 1-8c advance and provisions unchanged to a-yne of 35c.

Corn averaged higher, purchases of corn against sales of hard being a factor. Most commission houses leaned to the buying side of the oats market.

Provisions reflected upturn in the price of corn.

COTTONSEED OIL

NEW YORK, May 4 (AP).—The cottonseed oil market displayed considerable firmness in early trading today, reflecting the recovery in lard and the steadiness of grain.
