

3-Year Term For Bungled Burglary

A bungled burglary has resulted in a 3-year prison term for Colorado City's Earnest Luera.

The young man was sentenced this week in 32nd District Court on a plea of guilty to the May 25 break-in of Sam L. Majors Jewelry.

Luera, who already was on probation from a three-year prison sentence, smashed a

window at the jewelry store, and hurried away into the night with his loot.

But he left behind such incidents as his driving license.

Judge Austin McCloud also revoked Luera's probation from the earlier 3-year sentence for assault. However, the two terms will run concurrently, the judge ordered.

Caution Light For Tax Plan

School officials are taking a close, serious look at all legalities before hiring a lawyer for collecting delinquent taxes.

Supt. Lloyd McKee, Business Manager J. S. (Jay) Craddock Jr. and Administrative Assistant Gary Gardner were in Big Spring Thursday to confer with Gil Jones, who has advised the school district on other court matters in the past.

One of the points of their conference concerned contract requirements and limitations between the district and a tax lawyer.

School board earlier Monday authorized Supt. McKee to go ahead with plans for contracting with a lawyer to collect unpaid back taxes.

However, any contract for the delinquent collection must be approved by the board, which

means the question will come back to the board again for the final hiring decision.

City officials also are looking toward a similar program. Both governmental agencies need every tax dollar they can obtain to keep ad valorem tax rates and assessment from increasing above what is absolutely necessary to operate their respective programs.

It is generally known that numerous lawyers are not eager to agree to a collection contract with only one governmental body. The usual 15 per cent collection fee paid them is not enough to justify all that is involved, they say.

Which means that the practical approach to collecting delinquent taxes points to the same lawyer for city, schools and county, if possible.

City Council and City Manager J. A. Sadler Jr. have been studying the plan. But whether their plans can be synchronized into a one-collector project remains to be seen.

However, you can bet both are serious for the delinquent collections. They desperately need more cash. The schools have gone to the bank to borrow extra money now to meet over-budgeted costs during recent months. This must be paid back at the bank, the sooner the better.

TSTA Unit To Hear Western Texas Dean

Dr. V. N. (Ben) Brock, dean of Western Texas College of Snyder, will be speaker for a Monday night meeting of Mitchell County Unit of Texas State Teachers Association.

The meeting, first of three in the new school term, will be hosted by Loraine teachers in Loraine School cafeteria.

Delegates to an October district TSTA meeting are to be elected in a business session conducted by Leroy Scott, unit president.

Dr. Brock, to be introduced by Frank Brownfield, vice president of local TSTA group, will discuss organization and prospects of the new Snyder junior college to be opened in 1971.

Brock, who received a doc-

tor of education degree last spring, from Texas Tech University, served as principal of Snyder High School five years, was a magna cum laude graduate of Hardin-Simmons University.

He earned a master of education degree from University of Texas and did additional study at University of Texas and University of Minnesota before completing the doctor's degree.

Prior to becoming principal at Snyder in 1964, Brock served as a teacher and vice principal at Sweetwater High School. He was awarded the Gold Key from Columbia University in 1963 in special ceremonies in New York City in recognition as an outstanding educator.

Brock was recognized as Outstanding Young Man of Sweetwater in 1956. Earlier he had been selected as one of 12 Texas schoolmen for special study in school administration at UT.

Brock is a member of Texas and National Association of Secondary School Principals, Phi Delta Kappa, state and national professional organizations for teachers and administrators.

He has served as District XIV membership chairman for TSTA for the past two years and was elected to serve as chairman of the principals for this year.

Dr. Brock, who assumed the position of WTC dean last month, was a member of District Executive Committee of Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, faculty chairman of Texas High School Press Association and state director for National Association of Journalism Directors. He has written professionally, having had several articles published in state and national magazines and periodicals.

He has been an active worker in church and civic affairs. A member of First Baptist Church of Snyder, he serves as a deacon and presently teaches a men's Sunday School class, broadcast weekly over a Snyder radio station. He is a member of Snyder Chamber of Commerce, a director of United Fund and a member of Rotary Club.

Fair Entries Due Thursday

Entries for competition in various divisions of Mitchell County Fair will begin arriving at the fair grounds early Thursday morning.

Delivery of the entries--com-

peting for honors in junior and senior agricultural divisions, horticulture, women's, and youths division for foods, handwork and sewing, arts and crafts--will be the initial fair activity.

It will come from 8 a.m. to 11 a.m. Thursday hours before the downtown parade which officially opens the fair for its three-day run from Thursday to Saturday.

Deadline for all entries, fair

officials emphasized Saturday, will be 11 a.m. Thursday. The entries and exhibits must remain on display throughout the entire fair.

Cash money will be offered to best three floats and to best decorated bicycles in the opening day parade, according to Sefton Pickens, parade chairman.

First prize for the floats will be \$50 cash with \$25 and \$15 for second and third. Separate \$1 cash prizes will go to the kids with the 5 best decorated bikes.

Pickens said automobile and equipment dealers are being urged to place their cars and rolling stock in the parade.

Colorado High and Loraine High bands will be featured also in the parade, which will begin at 5:30 p.m. Thursday and move west on Second Street from Austin (East Hill).

All participants in the parade will receive a free pass to the fair.

Numerous attractions will be at the fair along with the various division exhibits. These include carnival rides, Texas Parks & Wildlife Department exhibit, a Saturday play-day sponsored by Westbrook 4-H Club, refreshments and food booths.

Judging the various divisions of exhibits will be in these main categories:

Agriculture (Junior and Adult)--Dry land and irrigated cotton, grain and seed varieties, fruit and nut varieties.

Horticulture--Roses, chry-

santhemums, perennials, dahlias and annuals, all according to their varieties.

Women's division--Canned fruits and vegetables, pickles and pepper sauce, preserves and jellies, cakes, breads and pies; candies, embroidery, cut work, applique, infants and toddlers wear, etc.; quilts, spreads, comforts and rugs; crochet, knitting, weaving, tatting, holiday accessories; sewing of various clothing.

Youth division--Sewing (clothing, linens and handicrafts), foods (quick breads, yeast

bread, cakes, cookies, pastry), canned goods (fruits and vegetables, pickles, preserves and jellies), candies.

Arts--Judgings in these age groups: Junior (6-9 and 9-12), Youth (12-18), Adult, in oil painting, watercolor painting, dry media and acrylics.

Crafts--Same age group as for arts for entries in ceramic, mosaic, jewelry, leather, metal, decoupage, woodwork, paper mache, novelty kits, sculpture, pottery and other handicrafts.

Cattle Short Course Beef Production Study Begins

A beef cattle production short course for adult farmers and ranchers will be conducted Monday through Thursday in Lo-

raine High School Vocational Agriculture Department.

Frank Litterst, beef cattle specialist with Vocational Agriculture Division of Texas Education Agency and Department of Animal Science at Texas A&M University will be instructor for the course.

Main emphasis of the course will be cattle breeding program and reproduction problems, according to Eddie Puckett, Loraine ag teacher.

Lab field work will supplement nightly study sessions set to begin at 8 p.m. under sponsorship of Loraine vocational agriculture department.

Litterst, available to assist cattlemen with individual problems and provide on-the-farm instruction during the course, is a graduate of Texas A&M University with a degree in Animal Husbandry.

He served as instructor in Veterans Agriculture Program in Hays County four years and was district sales manager for Burres Feed Mills in Fort Worth.

Litterst has operated his own ranching and farming business consisting of both registered and commercial cattle, sheep, Angora goats, pecans and grain farming. He is a former director in State Shorthorn Breeders Association and a member of American Angus and Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

A \$2 registration fee will be charged. Beef production short course certification will be presented to each cattlemen attending all the training sessions.

All interested farmers and ranchers are invited to attend the four-day course. Puckett said.

The three day program is set for convenience of participants of food commodities program as well as others desiring the test.

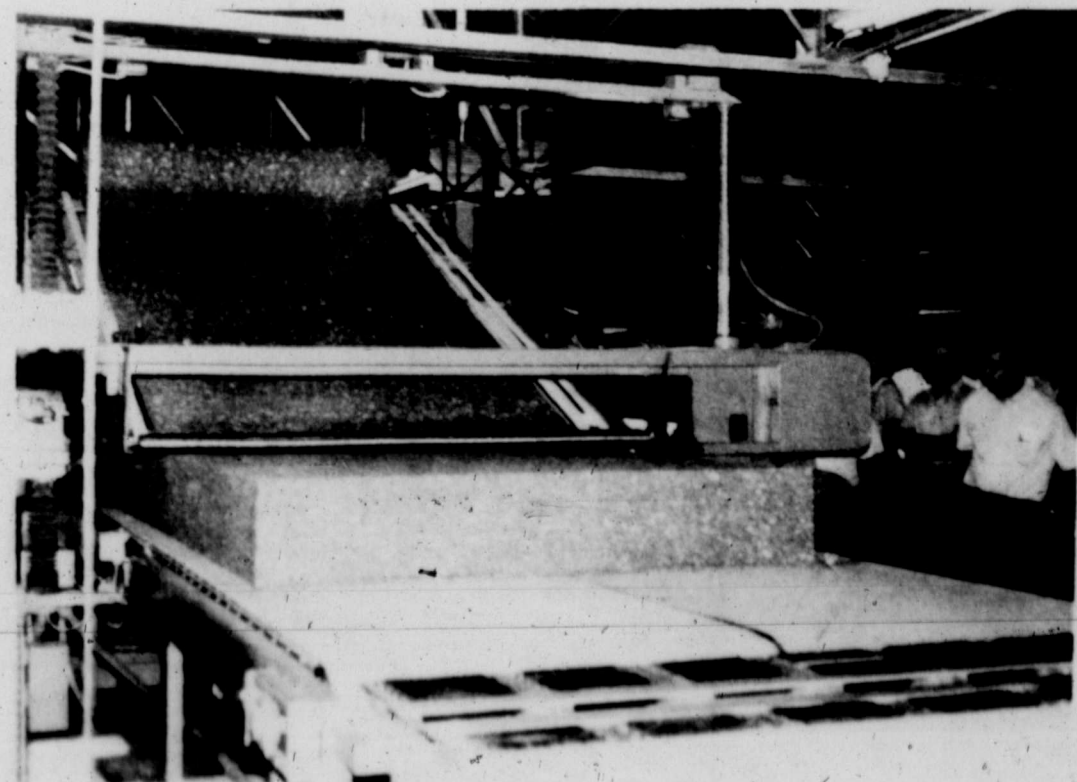
