# Early Snow Blankets Area Following Soaking Rains

Soaking rains and early, wet snow fell in the Cross Plains sector during the week end, possibly doing more good than harm through its harvest season.

Gentle rain fell through most of the night Saturday, and a good portion of Sunday, after beginning Saturday evening. About 24 hours later the rain turned to sleet and quickly gave way to snow, which wasted little time covering the ground.

An unseasonably early snow,

the white fluffy stuff was considered extra wet, and in this section of the state covered the ground two to three inches deep. The temperature hovered about the freezing mark, but it was not cold enough for the snow to build up on highways and roads in the immediate Cross Plains area. No hazardous road conditions were reported, and traffic had no trouble moving.

Apparently the snow was somewhat lighter in the Cross

Cut sector as one resident there reported just enough snow to "cover the ground," while most of the other communities in this locality reported two to three inches.

Most of the snow melted during the day Monday, and virtually all traces were gone by noon Tuesday, as the temperature warmed considerably.

Moisture provided by the snow and rain was beneficial. Although it halted peanut harvesting, little damage was believed done to the 1980 crop. The rain and melted snow provided adequate moisture for easy digging of peanuts when the harvesting can be resumed. Small grain crops were also benefited greatly, those up were given a growth boost while other seeds will now hopefully come up and provide winter pasture for livestock.

Apparently the communities of Cottonwood, Atwell and Rowden received somewhat more rain than some others. Dayton McInnis at Cottonwood said that his total was about two inches, noting 1.50 inches of rain and another estimated half-inch of snow. Mrs. Bill Kelly in that community also reported 1.50 inches of rain.

Roy Tatom at Atwell said that about two inches of moisture was received there, rain and

## Local Postmaster Gives Yuletide Mailing Tips

With the Christmas mailing season just ahead, Cross Plains Postmaster Joe E. Hanke, Jr., is offering some tips for customers to make sure their cards and packages arrive on time and in good shape.

In addition to shopping early, Postmaster Hanke urges customers to properly address cards and packages with the name, street number and name or post office box number, and the city, state and zip code reserved for the last line. It's also a good idea to put a slip of paper with the recipient's name and address and your return address inside package. Be sure to include your return address including your Zip code on all envelopes and packages.

Postmaster Hanke also reminds customers to check the size of their envelopes before mailing Christmas cards. Letter size standards which went into effect last year require envelopes to be at least 3 1/2 inches long to be accepted for mailing.

The Postal Service is also asking its customers to put an ounce of extra care into preparing packages for mailing. Parcels will arrive at their destination in good shape if mailers follow a few simple instructions.

1. Make sure the contents are

- well-cushioned and there is no empty space in the box. Use crumpled newspaper around the item, on the bottom, the sides and on top of your gift. Foamed plastic shells and air pocket padding also are good cushions.
2. Brown wrapping paper and twine cord are not necessary. Wrappings can rip off, and twine can get caught in processing machinery.
3. Use sealing tape to close off and seal the box. Three types are recommended: pressure-sensitive tape, kraft paper reinforced with nylon or glass and filament-reinforced pressure-sensitive tape. Don't use masking tape or cellophane tape. They're no longer recommended due to past poor performance.
4. Use a smudge-proof ink for the address which should appear in the lower right-hand corner of the box. Write your return address in the upper left-hand corner. Be sure to include the Zip code for both the addressee's address and your return address.
5. Remove any other labels or addresses from the carton.
6. Mail early in the month and mail early in the day to avoid the rush.
7. Send irreplaceable articles, cash and all valuable items by registered mail.

The closest contest was the game between the feminine junior varsity units of the two schools which Santa Anna won 16-15. Buffettes dropped a 47-14 decision, and Buffaloes were beaten 65-47.

Local junior varsity girls jumped to a 7-2 advantage in the first quarter, and that margin held to halftime as both units tallied 4 points in the second period. Santa Anna zipped ahead 16-11 by scoring 10 points and holding the interning Buffettes scoreless. Cross Plains held the hosts scoreless in the final quarter, but could not overcome the deficit.

Varsity Buffettes began that game with the Santa Anna feminine varsity behind 13-7 after first quarter, and that was increased to 19-9 at halftime. The hosts increased the point spread by 23 points in the second half out-scoring Buffettes 11-2 and 17-3 in the third and fourth cantos respectively.

In the junior varsity game Jo

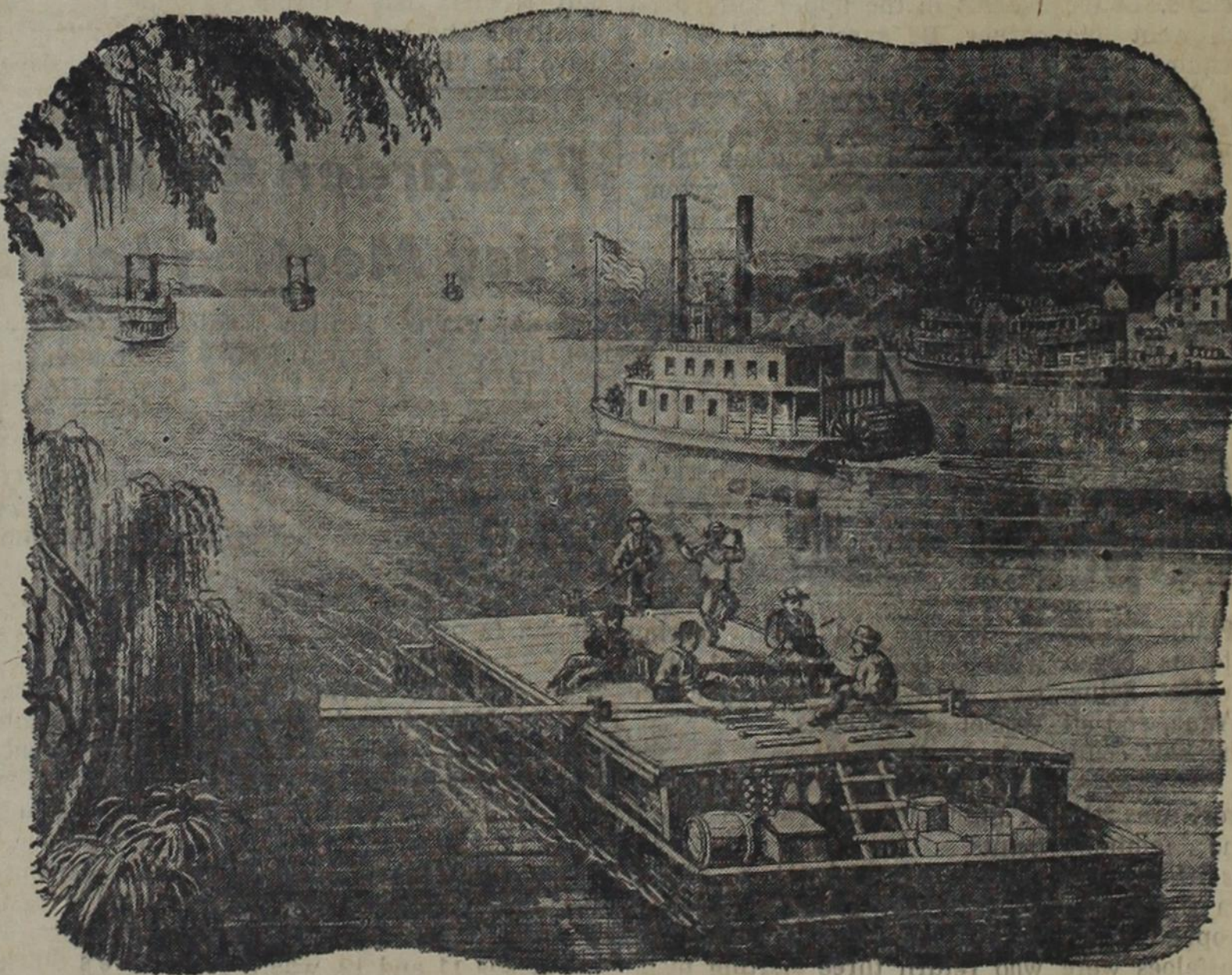

## Direct Deposit Offers Advantage To SS Folk

Direct deposit, a voluntary program allowing people getting social security or SSI checks to have them deposited directly into a checking or savings account, offers area residents several advantages. Glyn Hammons, social security district manager in Abilene, said recently.

Instead of being sent to a person's home, the check is sent directly to his or her financial institution. Some advantages are:

— A person never has to worry about the check being lost or stolen.

— A person can leave home on vacation and not worry about the check sitting in a mailbox. The money is available in an account.

— A person can save transportation costs and help conserve energy. He or she does not have to go any place and stand in line to cash or deposit the check.

— Keeping money in a checking or savings account is safer than carrying a lot of cash.

— A checkbook provides a written record for keeping track of expenses. Checks are often less expensive than money orders and cancelled checks serve as receipts.

To arrange for direct deposit, a person should complete a direct deposit form, SF-1199.

The form can be obtained at any financial institution and the people there will help complete it. A monthly benefit check contains all the information needed for direct deposit.

Completing the form only authorizes deposits into a person's account. Only that person or someone authorized by him or her can make withdrawals.

Hammons said that it is very important for people using direct deposit to keep so that security informed of their correct mailing address so they will continue to receive important notices about their social security or SSI checks or about Medicare.
