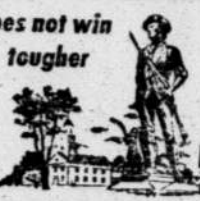

Cpl. Fred Gardner Reported Killed In South France

Word was received here Thursday night that Cpl. Fred Gardner had been killed in action in Southern France. Cpl. Gardner was the son of Mrs. Julia Ann Gardner, who makes her home at 707 South Seventh Street in this city, and this is her second son to have been reported killed.

A member of the Artillery, Cpl. Gardner, had been overseas two years, and had seen action in Tunisia, Sicily, Rome and then France. He entered the service 3 years ago, and prior to that time he had been farming in Oklahoma. Three of his brothers are in the service and are now overseas. Odell Gardner is in the South Pacific area, and another brother, Sgt. Cecil Gardner is stationed in Italy where he serves with the Engineer Corp. Cpl. Carl (Buck) Gardner is a member of the Quartermaster Corp, now at a base in India.

Another brother, Clyde, was reported killed more than a year ago on Guadalcanal. He was a member of the United States Navy.

New Wildcat Is Staked In County

According to an article in Sunday's issue of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, a new wildcat has been staked in this county.

The article stated that the Texas Company staked the Dawson wildcat as its No. 1. R. W. Higginbotham, Trust Company et al., 660 feet from the north and west lines of labor 16, league 279, Hutchinson County school land, in the southwest part of the county.

Texaco holds a large block in the area. The exploration, which will seek production in the San Andres lime, is four miles southwest of the Seaboard Oil Corporation No. 1 Weaver, recent failure, and nine miles southeast of the Cedar Lake pool in eastern Gaines County.

The paper stated further that Richmond Drilling Company No. 1 J. W. Nelson et al., section 34, block M, EL&R survey, prospect in northwestern Dawson, 2 1-2 miles north of the one-well Welch pool, was drilling below 4,900 feet, in lime, with a slight increase in gas, but not in oil. There was a very slight show of water from 4,878 to 4,880 feet. At 4,878 feet operator swabbed out 54 barrels of accumulated oil in 18 hours, recovering 14 barrels the last 15 hours.

S-Sgt. Clark Finishes Paratroop Course

S-Sgt. John H. Clark, son of Mrs. E. E. Hatchett of 112 South Travis Street in this city, has won the right to wear Wings and Boots of the United States Army Paratroops. He has completed four weeks of jump training during which time he made five jumps, the last a tactical jump at night involving a combat problem on landing.

Sgt. Clark, who has been stationed at Fort Benning, Georgia, visited in this city with relatives last week.

1656 Bales Of Cotton Ginned Up To Oct. 1

A census report received here shows that 1656 bales of cotton were ginned in Dawson County from the crop of 1944, prior to October 1, as compared with 12,341 bales for the crop of 1943.

This information comes from R. S. Stanfield, special agent for the Department of Commerce, Bureau of the Census, Washington.

Sixth War Loan Drive Will Open On November 20

The Sixth War Loan Drive will be launched November 20, and extend through December 16. Fourteen billion dollars is the total quota with five billion to be raised from individuals.

A communication from the War Finance Division states that with the accumulated success of the military operations, the people seem to have become more complacent, feeling that a relaxation in the financing efforts will not prove harmful. The article stated, "This is a most dangerous attitude as the sale of War Bonds is more important now than ever before."

"We will have a tough job in meeting the new quota. Please express the appreciation of the Treasury to your local business organizations who have cooperated so unselfishly with this program and ask that they again back up our boys at the front, by helping put the Sixth War Loan over the top."

"The Nation needs your help more in the coming Sixth Drive than ever before. Next to military operation the War Bond Program is the most vital part of the war effort. It is the number one obligation at home."

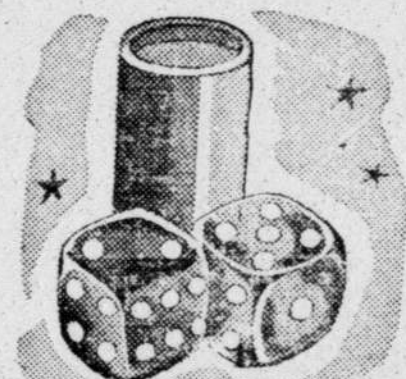

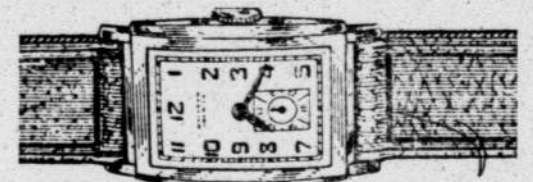
