One Dead, Others Burned After Oil Tanks Are Ignited

Several Men 'Beating Their Way' Are Unaccounted For Following Train Wreck In Arkansas

(By Associated Press)
ALICIA, Ark., Feb. 28.—At least one man was dead, another critically injured, and an undetermined number were missing tonight after gasoline from several tank cars caught fire after a wreck of a Missouri Pacific freight train near here. All were a party of men "beating their way" the injured man, whose name was not learned, said.

The injured man said there were "several" men in the boxcar with him, "but one or two escaped." Due to heat and lack of equipment for fighting the oil fire, rescuers could not approach the burning boxcars in which the men were reported.

Six car loads of oil and three tanks of gasoline were threatened by the gasoline fire from one of the oil tank cars, which was released by the wreck. Fifteen cars, made up mostly of merchandise and lumber shipments, went into the ditch. Telephone and telegraph lines were burned and only meager details were available.

Danger from an explosion of the other tank cars also kept back rescuers. Wrecking crews from Little Rock, Ark., and Poplar Bluff, Mo., were en route to the scene.

AGREE ON PRESIDENT

Insurgent Leader To Head Dominican Republic

SANTO DOMINGO, Feb. 28.—(AP)—The government forces of President Horacio Vazquez and the insurgent leader of the movement against him with the apparent approval of the American minister, today agreed on a provisional president for the Dominican republic. He is General Rafael Estrella Urena, one of the insurgent leaders.

At noon President Vazquez, against whose continuation in office during the presidential elections the insurgent movement started, signed a decree appointing General Estrella Urena, secretary of state for the interior. According to the constitution, this member of the cabinet acts as president in the absence of the president and the vice president. At the same time President Vazquez asked the national assembly to permit him to leave the republic and to stay in a foreign country, "to go to his health as his reason for making such a request before his term of office was over."

Civic Clubs Here Discuss Library

County School Institution Considered By Committee From Kiwanis, Lions, And Rotary Clubs Friday

Plans for the establishment of a county school library were discussed yesterday at a meeting of a committee from the Kiwanis, Rotary and Lions clubs of the city.

Inspection of the library was made possible through the donation of some 300 or 400 volumes by T. T. Garrard, local attorney and member of the state board of education.

The committee, composed of Judge Clark M. Mulliken, J. J. Clements and Vaughn Wilson, discussed the proposal for sometime and decision was made to establish the library in the offices of the county superintendent of education at the courthouse. The books will be listed and copies of the list sent to every school in the county.

It was pointed out that the library was a working one rather than a reading institution and that any school wishing to use the books may do so by calling at the new office.

This plan has been adopted by several of the larger counties of the state.

Man Kills Wife, Suicides After Three-Hour Battle With Officers

Proposed Happy Reunion of Wife, Husband and Son Ends in Tragedy

BARTLETT, Feb. 28.—What was to have been a happy meeting between husband and wife and their one-year old baby girl, ended in tragedy here today. Edward Friedman, the husband, was taking the bodies of his wife and baby back to their Tulsa, Okla., home for burial.

Mrs. Friedman and baby were en route to San Antonio where their husband and father was employed with a construction unit of the Western Union Telegraph company. The truck in which they were riding turned over in a roadside ditch near Holland.

The ditch was filled with water and Mrs. Friedman and her baby were drowned before they could be rescued. Two other women, a man and several other children were in the truck.

The driver claimed that he was forced into the ditch by glaring headlights of an approaching automobile. He said the car brushed the side of his conveyance and that it went on its way after the accident.

Proposed Tariff On Gasoline And Oil Is Rejected

Items Held On Free List By Senate Vote Of 39 To 27 In Session On Friday Night; Roll Call Given

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—(AP)—Climaxing one of the most dramatic scenes in the long tariff controversy, the senate tonight rejected by a dozen votes the Thomas proposal for a tariff on oil and gasoline.

The roll call which came shortly after 10 o'clock showed 39 against a tariff and 27 for it.

The amendment voted upon, as introduced by Senator Thomas, democrat, Oklahoma, would have placed a tax on foreign crude oil of \$1 a barrel and on petroleum and other by-products of petroleum of 30 per cent ad valorem based on American valuation.

Rider Rejected.
Prior to the final vote, the senate rejected, 57 to 8, a rider by Senator Pittman, democrat, Nevada, which would have terminated the tariff on Jan. 1, 1934, and made it inoperative meanwhile if the price of crude oil at the point of production in either Oklahoma or Texas exceeded \$1.75 a barrel. Pittman proposed this as a guard against over-production which he said he feared would result from a tariff.

Producer Rumors Denied at Morton

Following persistent rumors that the Westbrook-Slaughter No. 1 well, located three miles south of Morton, had been brought in as a producer, an unofficial report last night to The Morning Avalanche stated that drilling had been discontinued awaiting orders from officials.

The report stated that, though contract depth of the well was 5,000 feet, it already has reached a depth of 5,042 feet and at this time is being drilled in gray lime.

Indications are good that production will be reached at lower levels, according to the report and it was said that orders probably would be received to go on down to a level of 6,000 or 6,500 feet.

The well, which was started on Sept. 28, 1929, is being drilled by Brandon & McCamey, of Ft. Worth.

Taft Is Becoming Weaker As Death Appears Imminent

Former President And Chief Justice Reported Slowly Sinking As Resistance Gives Way To Illness

No Decided Change

Regains Consciousness For Short Moment But Unable To Talk; Looks Up From Sick Bed Helplessly

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—(AP)—Weakness gradually encroached on William Howard Taft's resistance tonight, and increased the uncertainty over how much longer he could live.

During one of his conscious moments, he looked helplessly up from his sickbed into the face of his son. A gleam in his eyes showed that he recognized Robert A. Taft, who had arrived a while earlier from Cincinnati and was being followed from there by his brother, Charles P. Taft.

Unable To Talk
So weak was the former president and Chief Justice that he was unable to say a word. Previously the dying man recognized Dr. Francis R. Hagner and his sunken cheeks had rippled slightly into a smile. The smile was gone and the eyes closed almost at once, for then too Mr. Taft could not speak.

The physician afterwards described Mr. Taft as "slightly weaker," and said he had not been able to hear much conversation.

There was no decided change since yesterday," the bulletin added.

From time to time through the day persons called at the Taft residence to express their sympathy to Mrs. Taft because of her husband's critical condition. Ambassador Claudel of France was one. Mrs. Edward Everett Gann, sister of Vice-president Curtis, was another. Various justices of the supreme court also conveyed their solicitude.

Mr. Taft was being comforted by their daughter, Mrs. Helen Taft Manning, and other relatives. After their regular evening call at the home, Dr. Hagner and Clayton issued a bulletin through

John Dees Freed On Murder Count

Amarillo Real Estate Man Found Not Guilty After Deliberation Of Hour In Slaying Of Finis Brown

(By Associated Press)
AMARILLO, Feb. 28.—John Dees, realtor, was acquitted of a charge of murder for the slaying of Finis Brown, mechanic, after the jury had deliberated for an hour today.

Brown was shot to death in Dees' real estate office here October 5. Dees pleaded that Brown had made threats against his life, and said the gun was accidentally discharged.

The real estate man, who rented a house to Brown's divorced wife, said that when he heard of Brown's threats he had sent Brown's former wife to attempt to dissuade him. Shortly thereafter, Brown came to the office, Dees said.

The attending physician testified that two of the four bullets which struck Brown entered from the side and toward the back. State witnesses said that Brown was shot after he had left the office, was starting down the stairs, and other occupants of the building denied this, saying that all the shots were fired within Dees' office.

All Fourteen In Conspiracy Case Found Not Guilty

Defendants In Geo. Musey Trial Acquitted To End One Of Largest Liquor Cases For Many Years

GALVESTON, Feb. 28.—(AP)—A federal court jury tonight returned a general verdict of not guilty for 14 defendants in the George Musey conspiracy trial, ending the largest liquor case brought by the government here in several years.

Musey, said to be the leader of a ring, and four other defendants were not arrested. Two were freed by instructed verdicts before the jury got the case. The verdict was reached about 11 o'clock, less than five hours after the case went to the jury.

The case went to the jury early tonight after attorneys for the government and the defense had argued for four hours on points of testimony introduced since the trial started in federal court here Tuesday.

Conspiracy Defined

The point of difference in the arguments centered around the credibility of the government's chief witness, Chris Egan, a confessed member of a liquor ring. The court's charges defined conspiracy and went into the influence of a witness' character and interest in the case in judging the truth of his testimony.

Two defendants of the 16 on trial were freed by instructed verdicts before the jury got the case. The verdict was reached about 11 o'clock, less than five hours after the case went to the jury.

Grant Mail Route Morton to Lehman

Sheriff Baker, Others Are Under Indictments

HOUSTON, Feb. 28.—(AP)—Under federal conspiracy indictment for alleged vote juggling in the 1928 general election, Sheriff A. V. Baker of Hidalgo county and seven other men, four of them members of his administration, made bond of \$1,000 each today.

Baker, wealthy head of the "regular" democratic faction in the county, and the seven were accused specifically of conspiracy to injure persons in the exercise of civil rights by a federal grand jury which returned the bills last night.

D. I. Cox Shot To Death, Bud Aiken Held By Officers

Charges Of Murder Filed After Fifty-Seven-Year-Old Restaurant Operator Is Injured Fatally

Witnesses Missing

Search Started For Five Mexicans Who Witnessed Slaying; No Statement Made By Prisoner

(Special To The Avalanche)
AMESA, Feb. 28.—D. I. Cox, 57-year-old restaurant operator, is dead, and Bud Aiken, about 50, is in the Dawson county jail charged with murder as the aftermath of a shooting affray here at 7 o'clock tonight, which is said to have followed a quarrel over the municipal election held in Lamesa today.

The shooting, according to witnesses, occurred in Cox' restaurant after an argument half an hour before. Aiken is said to have had the cafe about 6:30 o'clock, stating that he "would be back." He appeared a half hour later carrying a Winchester rifle, officers said.

At the time of the shooting Cox was in the rear of the building while Aiken was in front. Cox was found lying on the steps at the rear door shortly afterwards.

Die Soon Afterwards

He was quickly given emergency treatment but died 20 minutes later. Examination of the body revealed that he had been struck by two bullets. One entered the left side of his back, penetrated his body and passed through his chest. The other bullet took effect in the right wrist.

Cox made no statement before he died and Aiken, who was arrested soon after the shooting, had made no statement early tonight. There were several witnesses to the shooting and an investigation is being made by County Attorney A. W. Gibson and Deputy Sheriff A. W. Bennett. Officers, however, refused to make public any of the witness' testimony.

Five Mexicans, a man, two boys and two women, all of them said to have been witnesses to the tragedy, had not been located tonight though

Jury Deadlocked In Damages Suit

Deliberation Of Hour And Half Fails To Produce Verdict In \$50,000 Case Of Lubbock Mexican

After a deliberation of one and one-half hours without reaching a verdict, jury in the suit of the five survivors of Francisco Carrasco, Lubbock Mexican, who was slain July 15, 1929, against W. T. Strickland, local rancher, recessed yesterday afternoon to again convene this morning at 9 o'clock.

The case, which is being tried in the 12nd district court before Judge Homer L. Pharr, went to the jury Friday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock. \$50,000 sought.

The plaintiffs, charging that Strickland with malice aforethought, unlawfully shot and killed Carrasco, are seeking \$50,000 damages. Carrasco was slain at Strickland's home.

Deep Test to Be Started in Terry

(Special To The Avalanche)

BROWNFIELD, Feb. 28.—A large rotary rig is being erected for commencing a deep test by the Midwest Oil company, 12 miles north-east of Brownfield in the vicinity of Rich Lake. The company has several thousand acres of land under lease in Terry county and expects to begin drilling within the next few days as a 120-foot steel derrick has been completed with exception of the crown block and all water wells finished.

The Midwest company has more than 10,000 acres under lease but there is a considerable amount of land in the vicinity of the well that has not been acquired and this is being eagerly sought after by other companies and speculators.

It is reported that two additional tests will be commenced in other sections of the county within the next few months by companies who hold large blocks of leases and the report, if true, would mean that Terry county would be thoroughly tried out before the end of the year.

Following a meeting of the board of directors of the local chamber of commerce, announcement was made that the local organization will cooperate in every measure possible to secure state and federal designation of the principal high-

Cotton Co-Op Is Nearing Reality For Texas Farmer

Only Formalities Remain Before Machinery Of New Marketing Association Is Set Up For Working

DALLAS, Feb. 28. (AP)—The Texas Cotton cooperative, hope of the Texas cotton farmer, was nearing reality today.

Formalities only remained before the machinery for the cooperative to function with the federal farm board could be set up. All details were agreed upon at a conference between leaders in the cotton industry which ended here yesterday.

T. O. Walton, president of Texas A. and M., as chairman of the special committee named by Governor Moody to work out a feasible plan for Texas farmers to obtain aid from the federal government, presided. In conference, besides members of the committee, were representatives of the farm board, the American Cotton cooperative and the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton association.

The cooperative to be known as the Texas Cotton Cooperative association, will be built around the farm bureau, with the consent of its members. The state will be divided into six districts, each district operating through the state body, with the federal farm board at its auxiliary, the American Cotton cooperative.

When any district delivers a minimum of 100,000 bales, it may break away from the parent organization and deal directly with federal agencies. C. O. Moser, executive vice-president of the national cotton cooperative, will be in charge of getting the cooperative functioning, and it was said that the Texas organization would probably be ready to buy the 1930 cotton crop.

NUTT TRANSFERRED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28. (AP)—The transfer of L. G. Nutt, in charge of the narcotic bureau of the prohibition unit, to the position of a prohibition field supervisor and a general shakeup in the narcotic bureau was announced today by Assistant Secretary Lowman.

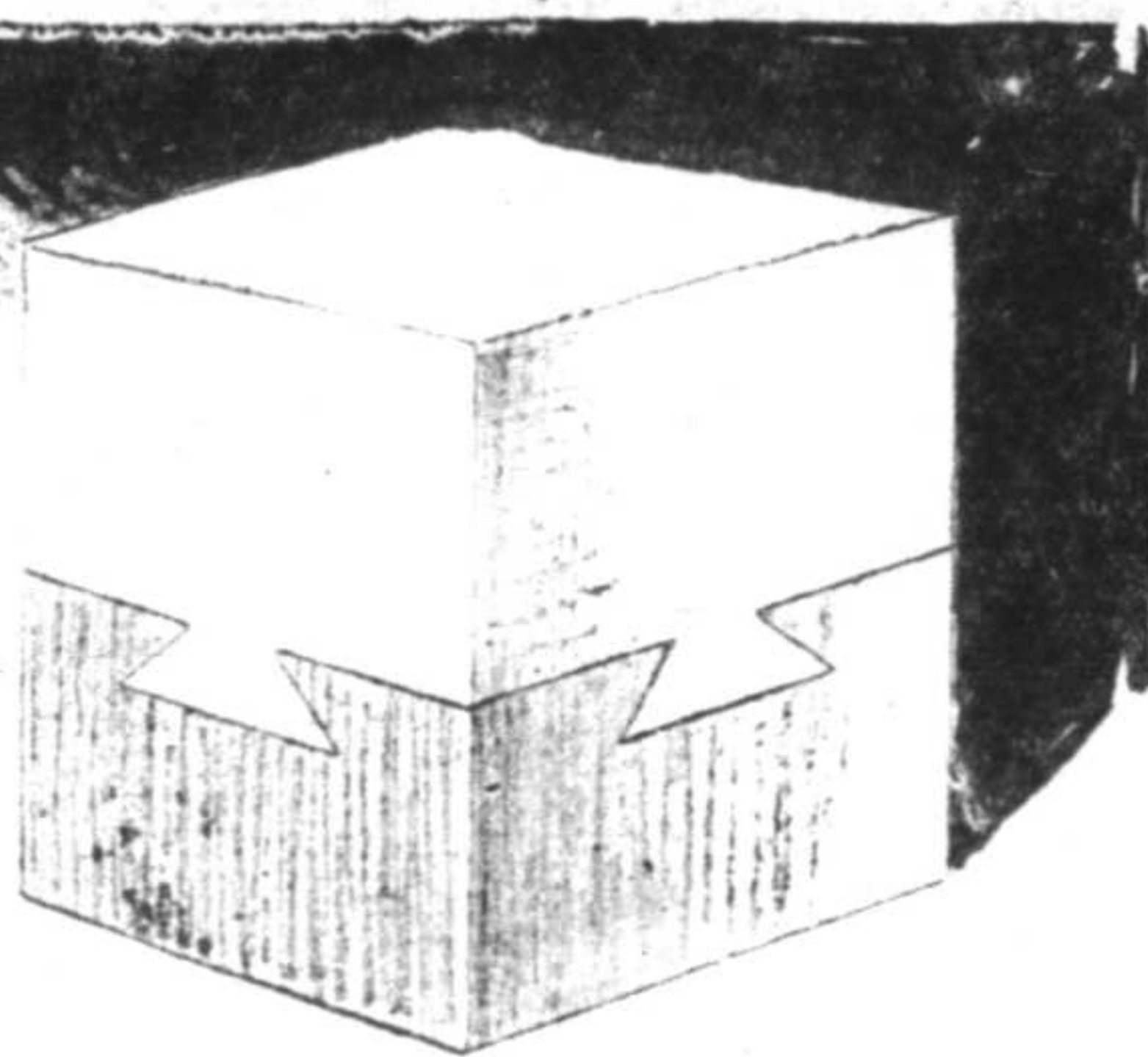

Demonstrations Staged In Spain

Former Premier Denounces King To Launch Wave Of Republicanism And Anti-Monarchical Displays

MADRID, Feb. 28. (P)—Metropolitan Spain today was swept by a tide of republicanism and anti-monarchical demonstrations after a public pronouncement by Jose Antonio Sanchez Guerra, former premier and bitter enemy of the late dictatorship, in which he said: "I will never again serve the present king."

Thousands gathered in the streets of Madrid and fought with police who attempted to bring down their red banners and hush their shouts of "down with the king" and "death to the king." Ten civilians were arrested, and one man was injured seriously in a clash outside the theatre in which the former premier's speech was delivered.

General Damazo Berenguer, new Spanish premier, announced that henceforth all public political speeches would be prohibited. Many of the most prominent leaders of all parties had been making preparations for public pronouncements, but the decision apparently ended their plans.

To the staunchest of the republicans, adherents of Guerra's speech was a disappointment. The former premier did not say he hoped for a republic. He did say the movement for a republic in Spain was stronger than ever and the country soon might adopt that form of government.

He demanded that parliament be restored and fix responsibility for the recent dictatorship, and determine the form of Spain's future government—all without violence or rebellion.

Not Guilty Plea Entered by Hannah

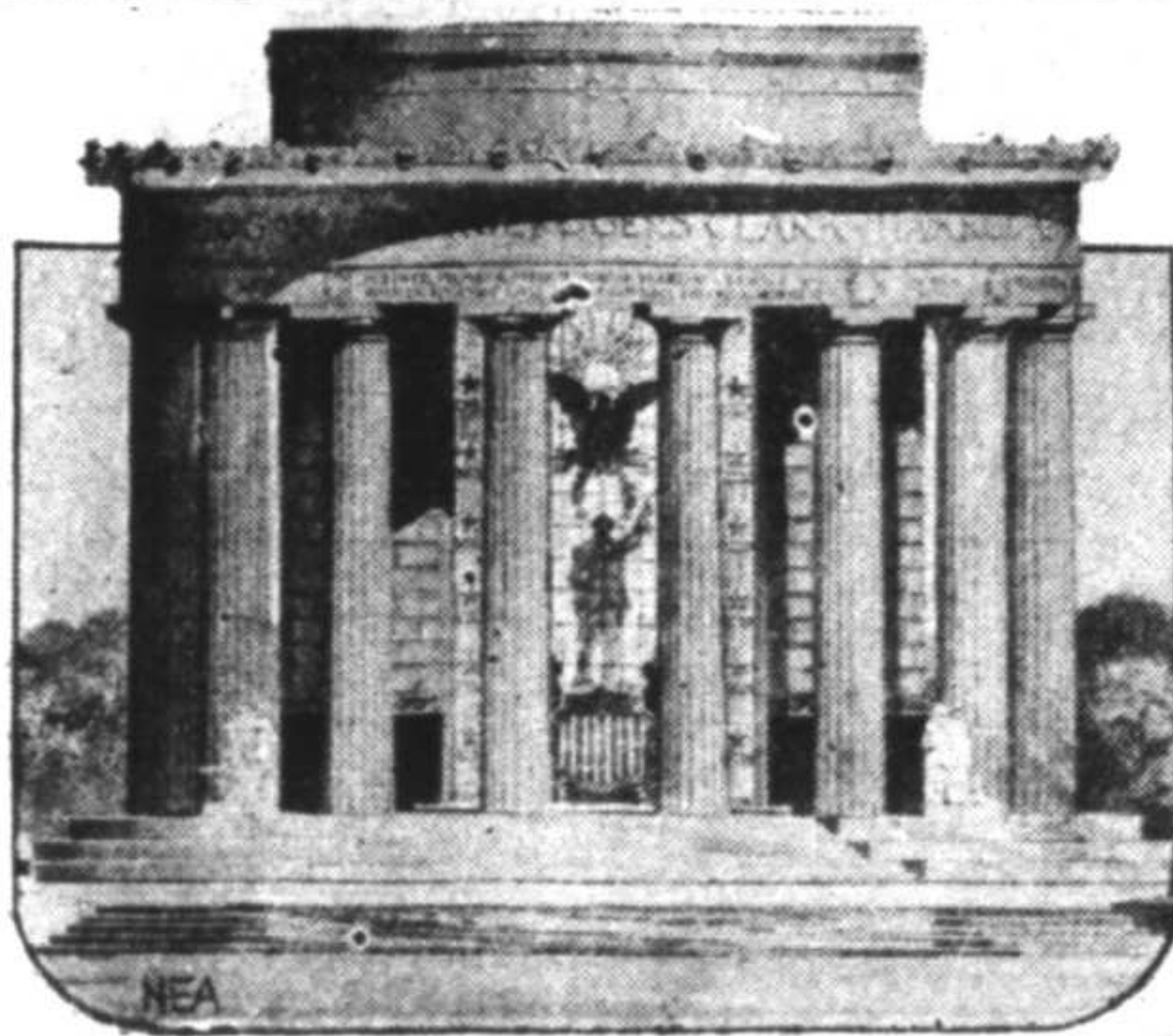
WOOSTER, Ohio, Feb. 28. (P)—Charles Hannah today entered a plea of not guilty to child stealing charges in connection with the disappearance 14 months ago of Melvin Horst, 4, from his home in Orrville.

The arraignment was held before Probate Judge U. S. Saunders behind closed doors as a precaution against any demonstration. Hannah has admitted in a confession that he killed the child, but the body never has been found. Earl Conold, alleged by Hannah to have buried the body, was not arraigned with Hannah. He also is charged with child stealing.

Kidnaping Story of Fifteen-Year-Old Boy Falls Through When Charges Filed

FORT WORTH, Feb. 28. (P)—A 15-year-old boy's story of being kidnaped in Bowling Green, Ky., a week ago and forced to come to Texas with two companions fell through today when police of Bowling Green wired that warrants were held for the boys on charges of converting property.

But Paul H. Runner has to face the music alone, for his friends left him and never returned. County officers believe they headed for Abilene.

Paul told officers the boys rented a car last Sunday. Riding around Bowling Green, they decided to strike for Texas. Near Keller, Wednesday night, a tire blew out, and the two companions went away, saying they would go for an inner tube. They didn't return, so Thursday Paul started toward Fort Worth in the car. The car turned over in a ditch, but Paul was unhurt. A motorist brought the boy to the county juvenile officer.

Paul waived extradition with the remark that he "was glad to do anything to get home."

LOAN GROUPS MEET

Annual Convention Held At McAllen On Friday

McALLEN, Feb. 28. (P)—Election of officers and selection of next year's convention city were the principal items on today's closing program of the annual convention of the Texas league of building and loan associations.

Speakers at the opening session yesterday told how their business had been hurt by the recent stock market losses. G. J. Cassell Berry, president, declared the losers would have done better to invest their money in Texas lands.

Claim Fund Used For Oil Tariff

American Independent Petroleum Association Has Raised \$50,000, Witness Testified In Hearing

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28. (P)—Wirt Franklin, president of the American Independent Petroleum association, testified today before the senate lobby committee that his organization had raised \$50,000 to advocate a duty on petroleum in the pending tariff bill.

Franklin said it had been suggested to him that the oil and sugar interests combine forces to get what they wanted in the tariff bill. He added other suggestions had mentioned lumber interests.

Franklin testified he was in the oil business as a producer, refiner and marketer and he had been in Washington since February 2, in the interest of a duty on oil.

He had discussed the proposed oil tariff with a number of senators, both republicans and democrats, he said, asserting no one had been employed and no "influence hired" to represent the association.

DeBerry Takes to Air in Campaign

FORT WORTH, Feb. 28. (P)—Fighting the governor with his own weapons, the radio campaign of the legislators opposed to Gov. Dan Moody's plan for prison rehabilitation was in full swing today with the opening guns fired last night by Sen. Tom DeBerry of Bogota.

Speaking from station WEAF here last night, DeBerry told his radio audience that members of the legislature had just as much right as the governor to carry their views to the people over the radio. The legislators, he said, agreed that the prison system needed rehabilitation, and differed with Governor Moody only upon his plan, and principally upon his project of centralizing the system near Austin.

"If no prison legislation is gained this year," DeBerry said, "the responsibility does not rest with those of us who want to improve present owned lands. The responsibility rests solely on those who have adopted an 'Austin or nothing' stand on relocation."

Poincare's Advice Sought By Tardieu

Premier-Designate Making Attempt To Form French Cabinet To Succeed Two Recently Defeated

PARIS, Feb. 28. (P)—Andre Tardieu, premier-designate, again today sought the advice of the veteran French statesman, Raymond Poincare, as to how to proceed in formation of a government to succeed the two—his own and that of Camille Chautemps—which have been defeated in the chamber.

It was believed M. Poincare told to proceed with his methodical canvass of the various party leaders and their subordinates, a policy which thus far has resulted probably in his conferring with 50 or more deputies and senators.

The method has aroused the furious resentment of the socialists, who met this morning and passed a resolution describing M. Tardieu's delay as a "scandalous comedy."

Their press claimed the former president and premier-designate were waiting until the radical socialists should have recovered from their anger at M. Tardieu's part in bringing about the defeat of Camille Chautemps.

AGED MAN KILLED

Body With Skull Crushed Found Near Tracks

DALLAS, Feb. 28. (P)—His skull crushed, Tex Range, 37, was found dead alongside a railroad track here today. He had been dead several hours when the body was found by a workman.

Shortly afterwards police arrested four men in an old shack near the track. They told the officers they had known Range, but denied any connection with his death.

Officers said there was a possibility the man had been killed by a train.

"On to Austin" was the war cry of the Ralls Jackrabbit basketeers last night following their second successive triumph over the Spearman Lynx in the series for the championship of Districts One and Two at the Tech gymnasium. The final score of the deciding game was 33 to 17. The North Panhandle cagers made good their threat of staging a comeback, but it was far too weak to cope with the fast-stepping Ralls sharpshooters. Last night's victory for the Lovvorn crew was not so decisive as the opening night's slaughter, but "Flashy" Walker and his mates held a margin sufficient to coast through to an easy win.

Lynx Still Greasy
Still unable to find the scoring stride that carried them to the championship of District One, the Lynx tried in vain to penetrate the stubborn Ralls defense. Fourteen of their seventeen points were made through shots from beyond the foul line.

Off to a flying start, the Rabbits scored nine points before the Jarvis crew had scratched the scoreboard. The victors were on the long end of an 18-12 lead when the rest period came.

The second half was a repetition of the opening periods, with the Rabbits showing the way in all departments. Spearman was held to 4 additional points while the winners were adding 15 more markers.

Walker Shines
L. Walker was the offensive star for the Ralls quintet, leading both teams in scoring with 12 points. Richards, stellar Ralls guard, was close behind with 11 counters. The latter continued his performance of the first night, sinking his long shots consistently.

The Ralls team, accompanied by Coaches Lovvorn and Rumph, will leave next Wednesday for Austin. Several hours will be spent in Fort Worth for the squad to rest before the journey to the state capital is resumed.

Preliminaries in the state finals are scheduled to start Friday.

Sharkey and Schmeling to Meet in June to Settle Heavyweight Crown

MIAMI, Fla., Feb. 28.—Jack Sharkey, no matter how much his technical knockout victory over Phil Scott may be disputed, will fight Max Schmeling, the clouting German, at the Yankee stadium, probably on June 26, in a 15-round bout to decide the world's heavyweight championship.

Frank J. Brown, general manager of the Madison Square Garden corporation, in the midst of checking up the extent of the financial success of last night's show, made this announcement today to confirm previous plans and dispose of rumors that Sharkey because of his poor showing against Scott, might be required to engage in another test bout, possibly against Tuffy Griffiths.

At the same time, Brown stated emphatically that Scott had fought his last fight in this country so far as the Garden corporation is concerned. SAN ANTONIO, Feb. 28. (AP)—Just by way of making the thing official, six Texas members of the Southwest Conference will get together tomorrow night and speed the 1930 basketball season.

Except that the three final bouts will serve to resurrect a pair of personal feuds, no particular significance attaches to the program. Arkansas university's student body has been celebrating the Razorbacks' fifth straight title ever since last Monday. Maybe the Lone Star boys will gang up and stop the Ozarkians next year—but that is another matter.

Texas university has second place in the best matter what the outcome of its tilt with the Aggies at College Station. Notwithstanding that Frank Chesham, stellar guard, will be absent from their line-up, the Longhorns will be favored to win. Chesham was ousted as the result of some flatfooting with Bruce Kattman, Southern Methodist forward, after the Mustangs had been plastered, 30 to 14, Tuesday at Austin.

A couple of close battles are anticipated when Baylor and Rice clash at Houston and Southern Methodist meets Texas Christian at Dallas. Their previous bouts this winter, at least, were hot and heavy. Baylor downed the Owls, 35 to 27, in an extra period at Baylor, and the Mustangs nudged out the Christians, 36 to 35, at Fort Worth.

Rice, having scored a notable 37-18 triumph over Arkansas in a last start, rates a favorite to trim Baylor, while the Horned Frogs, fresh from a victory over Texas, appear set to turn the tables on the Ponies.

Jake Hess, Rice diminutive ball hawk, seems headed for the season's individual scoring honors. The Owl flash, with 102 points, goes into the final game with a six-point lead over Roy Eury, Texas Christian center, with 96. Others with a chance of winning the honors that went to Holly Brock, Texas university star last year, were Ross, Texas, with 94 points, and Hart, Rice, 82.

Ponies After Third Place
Southern Methodist can clinch third place by defeating the Christians. On the other hand, if T. C. U. wins, and Rice thumps Baylor, the Mustangs, Frogs and Owls will finish in a tie for third, each with five wins and seven losses.

A hard-driving crew of Engineers captured the intramural football championship of Texas Tech Friday afternoon in turning back the rejuvenated Aggie eleven, 12 to 6, in a hard-fought battle in which the tide turned frequently.

It was the second successive triumph of the series for the Engineers and the win enabled the cohorts of Rhodes Ingerton to succeed to the throne occupied last year by the Liberal Arts eleven.

Aggies Show Power
Encountering unexpected opposition from the Farmers, the Engineers were forced to extend themselves to the limit in gaining their one-touchdown victory. It was not until the fourth period that the victors pushed across the winning counter.

In the first stanza the Engineers took the oval on their own 20-yard line and drove steadily across the field for the first score of the game. Maddox and Witherspoon carried the burden of this 80-yard drive and the former dived over for the counter. Try for extra point was missed.

The second period saw the Farmers fight back relentlessly with an effective aerial attack paying the way for the tying score. Bill Yager was on the throwing end of the heaves and incidentally did his share of the ball totin'. Yager went across for the tally but missed his mark when he attempted to pass across the line for the extra point. The half ended with the count tied, 6-6.

Metic Last Half
Both clubs came back scrapping harder in the last half. Fumbles, intercepted passes and intermittent spurts of brilliance made the outcome of the struggle anything but certain. The Aggies continued to fill the air with passes but were unable to put across another counter.

Recovery of a fumble in the last quarter paved the way for the Engineers' deciding touchdown. Witherspoon out of the lineup, Cousar stepped in to help Maddox carry the mail. This he did so well that he ended up across the final stripe. Try for extra point was again missed.

After this the Farmers tried desperately to come back with a touchdown, but the punch was lacking. An Aggie triumph would have thrown the three intramural teams in a deadlock. The final standing is conducted on the decision which gave Sharkey a technical knockout when Scott claimed he had been fouled.

"Robbed Of Decision"
Fred Dartnell, the Star's boxing expert, cabled from Miami: "I consider that Scott was deliberately robbed of the decision." The Evening News asserts that many American sporting writers agree the blow which gave Sharkey victory was a foul. It's famous sporting cartoonist, Tom Webster, who is in Miami, said: "Although our Phil never looked like winning, he should have had the verdict on a foul."

Scott's english manager was reported in the News as saying: "Scott has failed in his attempt to bring back to Britain the world's heavyweight championship, but his failure will be a blot on American boxing which will never be erased."

Idea Is Criticized
Another interview reported in the same paper is that with J. W. H. T. Douglas, one of England's best known sportsmen, who declared: "The idea of a minute's rest is ill-balanced. Either Scott was beaten or he was fouled. To give him rest, then ask him to continue, was inviting trouble and criticism."

The Star said editorially that the fight was no exhibition of skill but a disgusting, degrading spectacle which can only do such a fine, healthy sport, as boxing is when conducted on proper lines, more harm than good.

"From the first the sportsmanship of the American money makers who promoted the contest has been suspected," says the Star, "and as long as big boxing in America is conducted on the present lines British boxers, however good, should keep away."

The Evening Standard contented itself chiefly with printing an interview its representative obtained with Scott.

"Alimoniacs" Ask Protection from Gold-Digging Ex-Wives; Nation Wide Reform Thought Under Way

NEW YORK, Feb. 28. (AP)—Four years ago, while being led to jail, that Dr. A. Dalkle decided to do something about the alimony laws.

Today Dr. Dalkle is head of the legislative branch of the National Sociological league, nee Alimony Payers' Protective association. By his efforts three bills which would protect the husband from the gold-

until I became seriously ill. I was away from my office for more than a month, and a month's absence is very bad for chiropractors.

"By that time I owed my former wife \$350, and was given permission to make up the deficit in three payments. Two of these were made, but when I owed only \$115, I had to call her attorney and beg two days of grace so I could make some collection.

"Within an hour, he had a commitment order signed. I was jerked out of my office and marched to jail."

In 1929, the various states, and Mexico and France, granted divorces to 203,628 citizens of this country. For every 100 marriages, there were 17 absolute divorces and 42 separations.

"A superior court judge in Chicago," continued Dr. Dalkle, "calls alimony the greatest curse in America." He says there would not be nearly so many divorces obtained on meaningless grounds if women were not aware they could collect large alimony.

In New York City alone, there are 2,000 members, and the mailing list is 10 times as large.

It is only natural, one is certain, that Dr. Dalkle should feel deeply about this alimony business. It seems that he had been married for 16 years before there was a divorce. He opposed Mrs. Dalkle's request for alimony, but resignedly accepted an order to pay her \$75 a week. After all, he had a fairly prosperous practice as a chiropractor in the upper reaches of the Bronx.

Sent To Jail.
"Well," he recalled, "I paid for a while and was getting along all right

correct answer regarding his income, but only one in 200 ever is granted a referee's decision.

"Temporary alimony is awarded and the case set for trial. If the man is in arrears on these payments, or has not paid counsel fees, he cannot go to trial. The trial may be delayed for years, and the ex-husband may be sent to jail in contempt of court.

"So long as he owes a dollar, he has no legal standing and cannot plead his case. Physical disability or loss of his position or business has nothing to do with it."

For instance, there is the case of one Pojansky. At 74, he is the oldest inmate of the alimony jail.

Pojansky hadn't lived with his wife for 20 years. "For that matter," he said, "we never did agree."

When they finally separated, the wife was allowed \$20 a week alimony. Pojansky paid and paid. The couple had four grown and self-supporting children, but they offered no aid. Pojansky got old and lost his job. He was called to court.

The justice made an unusual decision; two of the children were ordered to support the father; the other two were to pay his alimony to their mother.

To Arrest Alimony Laws.
But another court overruled this decision. Pojansky was thrown into jail. He has been there four months now.

Said Dr. Dalkle: "All we want—and we're going to do it this time—is to amend the alimony and divorce laws to the point where both parties involved will be mutually benefited. Three bills have been introduced in the state legislature. They are: demanding proof of a wife's testimony concerning her husband's income; affording a husband about to be sent to jail for arrears in alimony a hearing and proper redress if entitled to it; removing the jail sentence as punishment for being in arrears unless the default is willful and inexcusable."

The youngest alimoniac ever confined in the jail "club" was 19. He met a gold-digger one week, married

MARCH 1, 1925—

W. F. Taylor, of Falls, has been named president of the chamber of commerce of that city.

Prof. R. C. Mowery, director of vocational education in a Lubbock school, will be one of the judges at the Teachers College Stock judging contest which is to be held in Fort Worth next week.

W. C. Wicher, Fort Worth attorney, has moved to Lubbock where he will be in business.

F. A. Norman, of the Citizens National bank, has returned from Fort Worth, where he attended the bankers' convention.

Miss Bernice O'Neill of this city is moving to Pampa where she will be in business.

It is believed that the vocational agriculture department in West Texas schools has developed remarkably in the past four years.

P. H. Amos, of Lubbock, has returned from Dallas and Fort Worth where he bought gin machinery for a plant that is to be put into operation at Levelland for the coming season.

The annual meeting of the district federation will be held in Canyon on May 4, 5 and 6, according to Mrs. Reese Tatum, of Dalhart, president of the seventh district.

Lynn county gained a total of 38,400 bales of cotton this season, which is an increase of nearly a 60 per cent over the 1923 crop.

The building in Morningside addition is increasing very rapidly.

A meeting has been held in Slaton to elect officers and to appoint all committees for making arrangements for the community fair to be held in that city.

The West Texas Gas company has temporarily moved its office to a building on Avenue I, according to Wesley McAllister.

Claim Settlement In Oil Land Suit

Secret Agreement Reported By San Angelo Newspaper Between California Oil Company And Claimants

SAN ANGELO, Feb. 28. (P)—The San Angelo Evening Standard today will say that a settlement between the California Oil company, the state and two claimants to acreage in Pecos county between the Yates Ranch and the M. A. (Monroe) Smith estate was effected secretly in Austin this week. This was learned from attorneys in the case here.

Fred Turner, who had filed on 108.55 acres, was said to have got \$200,000 of the total of \$375,000 settlement of the company, according to the newspaper. Bob Reid of Alpine also got part of the settlement, the publication will say. He had filed for what he alleged was a vacant strip on the Transcontinental Oil company's holdings in the Yates pool. The land commissioner's office had awarded him land of \$3 and \$3.50 an acre.

Reports here were that Turner's strip, almost square and 460 yards wide, was valued on the stand in value at \$1,500,000. Reid's strip was valued at a few thousands less. J. H. Tyler, claimant to 80 acres, was ruled out of the litigation.

TAKES JOY RIDE

Stolen Car Recovered Here Thursday Night

Three hours after it had been removed from the 1200 block on Main street, presumably by persons seeking a "joy ride," an automobile belonging to John Dalrymple, of this city, was recovered Thursday night by local police in the 1600 block.

The car had been parked shortly after 8 o'clock, while members of the Dalrymple family were attending a theater. The car was undamaged when found.

Nicholson Exploration Party Finds Huge Unknown Chamber in Caverns

(Special To The Avalanche)

CARLEBAD, N. M., Feb. 28. — An unknown chamber, hitherto unexplored by man, was penetrated Thursday by Frank Ernest Nicholson and members of his exploration party. It was learned in a copyrighted dispatch to the New York Times.

Icebergs and frozen waterfalls were on the downward trail to the room, and crossed over Devil's Den and into the Queen's chamber. Scaling the wall of the chamber the party found a hole above the formation. Passing through the hole they discovered a huge unknown chamber, 1200 feet long and 400 feet wide. Powerful flashlights barely revealed the lofty ceiling.

The floor is reported as having the contour of a mountain. The ground having loose formations similar to coral, the chamber has been titled by Nicholson as Coral Gardens. A pit some 20 feet in diameter was found near the end of the Coral Gardens. Nicholson was lowered into the pit, and he descended the vertical sides hand over hand. At about 25 feet downward the hole became crooked, the rope swayed and the flashlight broke. He continued the descent in darkness until he touched a rock some 75 feet down.

New Room Reached
The flashlight was repaired and the light revealed a further descent that led into a previously unknown room. In the center of the floor is a blue lake of pure water, beside which stands a stalagmite formation resembling a replica of a castle. Two members followed down with cameras.
