BOY SCOUTS IN THREE DAY CAMP

FIVE BOY SCOUTS ATTENDED CAMP ON WOLF CREEK AT JINES SPRINGS PARK

and sunburned but happy and still wanting more, thirty-five Boy Scouts returned home Monday morning after spending three days in camp at Jines Springs south of Perryton. This camp, held under the direction of the Ochiltree Council, was a complete success according to the sixty Scouts who were present all part of the time. Perryton was represented with the largest number of scouts having 31 Scouts in camp; 21 Scouts came from the city of Spearman; eight from Higgins; four from the Bison Farm Park; and one Lone Scout from Pansworth.

L. Oakley, Scout executive of the Ochiltree Council, was director of the camp. He was assisted by men from Perryton and Spearman: Dr. A. L. Haas, Herbert Campbell, L. F. Noe of Spearman; Hartman, Addison, Cutter, Apple and Donald Penn of Perryton were among the adult leaders who helped make the camp a success.

The Scouts were divided into nine teams which gave an opportunity for competition throughout the camp. Points were awarded in a number of Scout contests and for best meals and cleanest camp each day. The Raccoon Patrol won the all round camping championship with a score of 70.

The Wolf Patrol from Spearman, Francis Reed, Patrol leader, was a close second with sixty-five points.

Swimming and water work was a feature of the camp. Two swimming pools were held each day at the Jines Springs swimming pool. The city system of safety whereby each Scout swam with a buddy whom he reached was used. Although there were over fifty boys in the pool at any one time a single Scout was never strangled.

A swimming demonstration was given Sunday afternoon for the visitors who were at the pool. Every Scout was impressed with the rapidity with which the Scouts responded to the "clear the pool" signals and the buddy call. Every two minutes a whistle was blown and each Scout had to stop and hold up his buddy's hand. In this way a definite check was kept on all the boys in the pool.

A council campfire was held each night in a hook of the canyon which formed a natural amphitheatre. Games, songs, stunts, featured these council fire programs. At the Council fire Sunday night a Court of Honor was held at which time Second Class badges were awarded to Earl Callaway, Troop 2, Perryton; and Wilford Lance, Troop 3, Perryton. First Class badges were presented to three Scouts from Higgins: Carson Patton, Clyde Tarbox, and Elmer Tarbox. Firemanship and painting merit badges were awarded to Clyde Coter, Jr. of Troop 1, Perryton.

At the Sunday School service Sunday morning the Raccoon Patrol put on a very interesting dramatization of the morning's Sunday-school lesson. The walls of Jerusalem were besieged and before King Nebuchadnezzar's hosts in truly historical fashion.

At the conclusion of the camp the Honor Campers were selected by the Scouts themselves. These Scouts were selected for all round good camping, cheerfulness, helpfulness, and other qualities of a good Scout. Those selected were Dalton Patton, Alfred Dowers, and Glen Wilson of Perryton; Gene Clize, Francis Reed, and Albert Tamm of Spearman; Tommy Ewing of Higgins; Russell Nowlin of Higgins; and Lone Scout Harold Anderson of Pansworth.

NEW MOTOR FEE LAW IN EFFECT

NOW HAVE UNTIL FEBRUARY FIRST TO OBTAIN NEW MOTOR REGISTRATION TAGS

Sheriff Talley has received the following communication from the State Highway Department regarding legislation which has just been passed and is now in force in reference to registration and number plates on cars. As will be noted, car owners will now have until February 1 to obtain new license plates and that yearly fees will be computed on a monthly basis instead of quarterly as in the past. The new law reads as follows:

The registration for all vehicles and chauffeurs hereunder shall begin with the first day of January and end with the 31st day of December of each year. Each application filed hereunder during the first month of a calendar year shall be accompanied by the full amount of the license fee herein prescribed. Application filed hereunder during the second, third, fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh, eighth, ninth, tenth, eleventh and twelfth month of the calendar year shall be accompanied respectively by eleven-twelfths, ten-twelfths, nine-twelfths, eight-twelfths, seven-twelfths, six-twelfths, five-twelfths, four-twelfths, three-twelfths, two-twelfths and one-twelfths of the amount of the annual license fees. Provided that every person shall have until the first day of February of each year to register his motor vehicle for that year if same was duly registered for the year or part of year next preceding and bears proper number plates accordingly; and no penalty shall accrue for operating a motor vehicle on the public highways or streets during the month of January on account of the same being registered for that year, provided such vehicle was duly registered and bears the proper number plates for the year or part of year next preceding.

LOAD OF 1929 WHEAT HAULED

FIRST WHEAT PRODUCED BY R. W. NORRIS OF NOTLA COMMUNITY; TEST IS HIGH

The first load of 1929 wheat was received Wednesday afternoon at 5:30 o'clock, produced by R. W. Norris of the Notla community, thirty miles southeast of here. It was purchased by the W. H. Douglas Grain company, Mr. Norris receiving 85 cents per bushel, three cents above the market price of 82 cents.

The wheat tested 61 and was hard and good color. There were no green grain and it was in excellent condition. R. E. Wamble hauled the load to town for Mr. Norris, the load containing eighty-three bushels. According to Mr. Wamble the wheat is making over twenty bushels to the acre and was harvested from a field of volunteer wheat. A bonus is being raised among the Perryton business men which will be given Mr. Norris.

The first load of wheat produced in Ochiltree county was raised by Will Brown, also of the Notla community, and sold in Canadian. It tested 54 pounds and was said to be making twenty bushels.

The Legion was reluctant in postponing the production but the rush of harvest business interfered so with members of the cast that it was thought advisable.

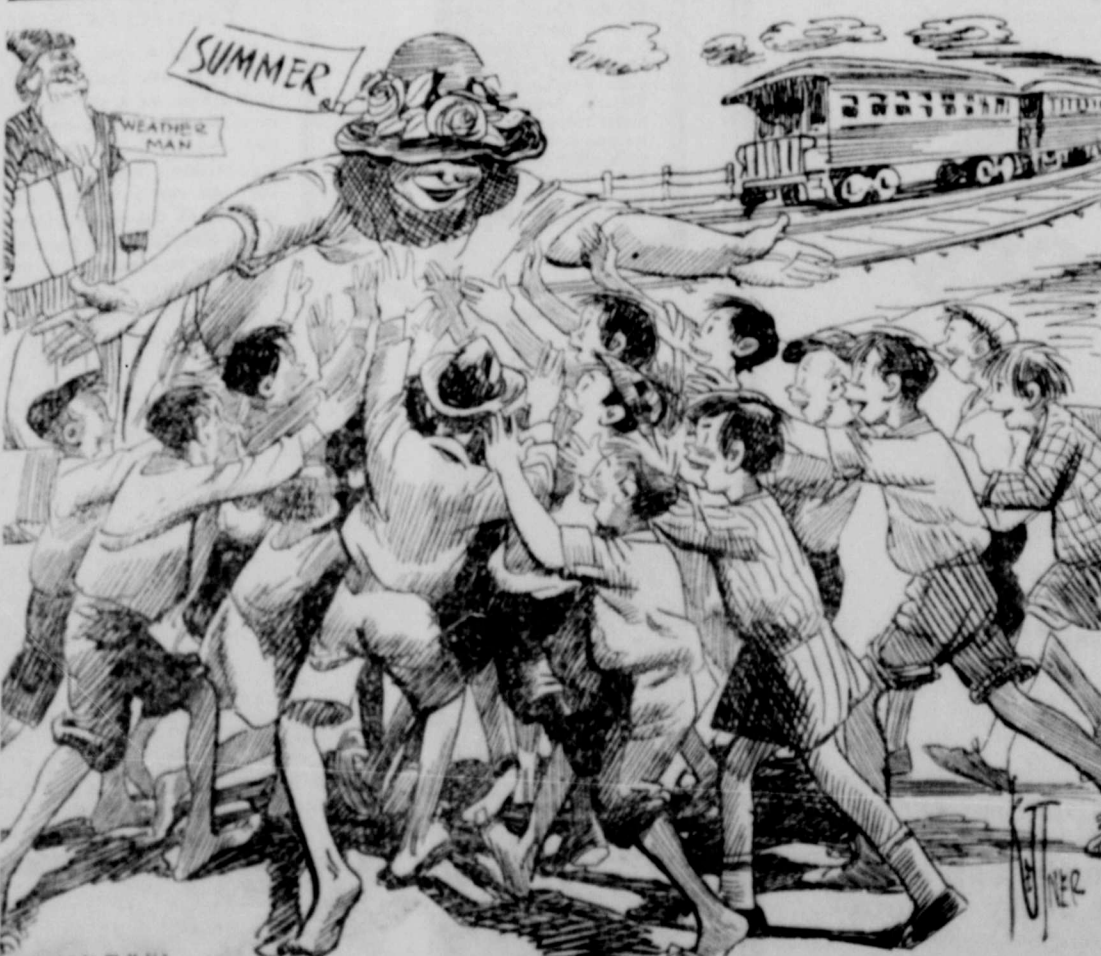
MASONIC LODGE HOLDS ELECTION SATURDAY

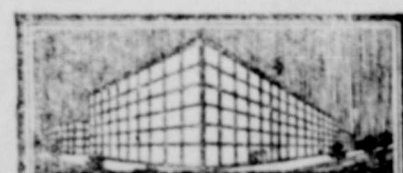

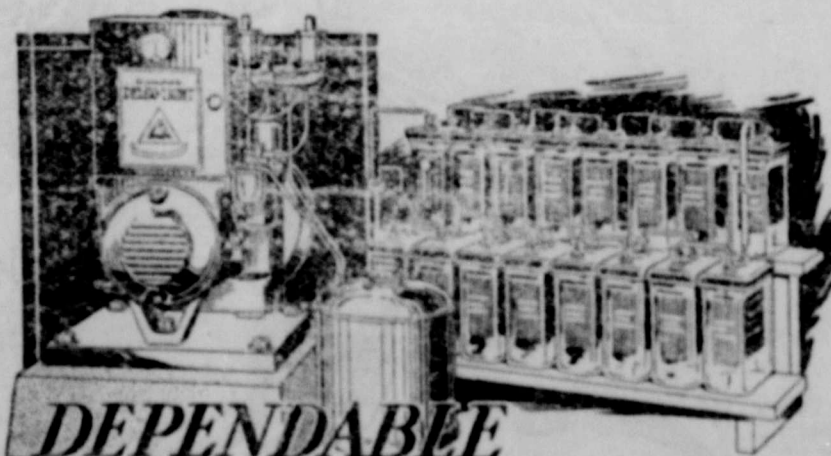

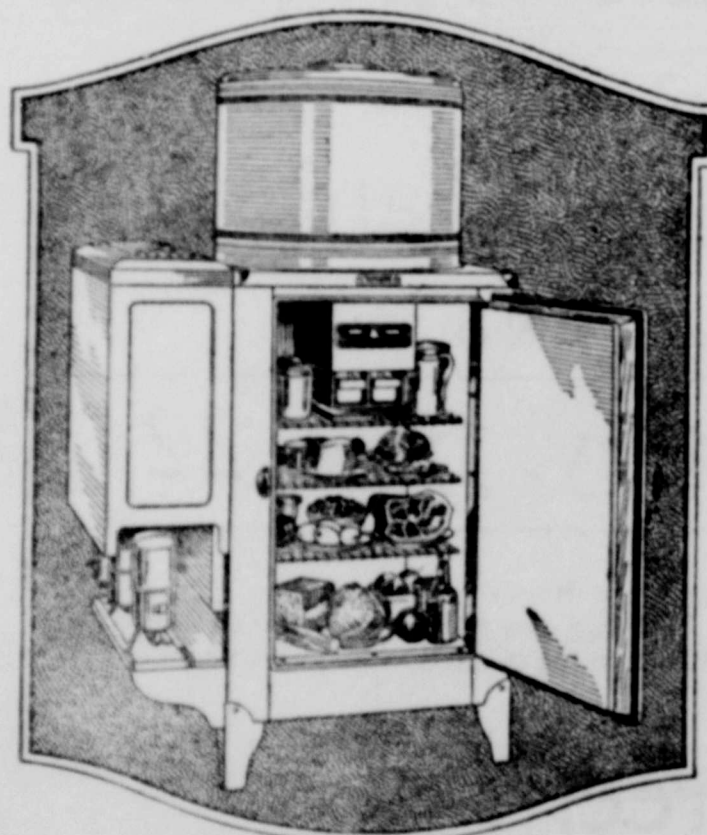

OVERCOMING BALDNESS
There has always been much speculation as to why men grow bald. I do not believe there is one particular reason. Baldness is an accumulation of causes. After long winter days with little athletic activity except for those fortunate who are able to "go in" for winter sports, most women are weary and bored with inactivity, and with the enervating, stagnant air of many overheated houses. They long to be out of doors once more, breathing in the fresh fragrant air and moving with free joyousness to rid their bodies of the torpidity and lassness which they seem to have acquired during the winter.

Still, some women need to be reminded—the women whose spring duties, house-cleaning and clothes problems, etc., take up so much interest and time. To those women, then I say "Exercise!" Forget your home cares or, if you are a business person, your office, for a part of each day or a day of each week. Get out into the country and walk with your friends, with your husband or children. Walk and breathe deeply and enjoy the outdoor freshness all about you.

If you are a golfer, play golf. If your game is tennis, play tennis. Begin it early and get ahead of the others who are waiting for mid-summer to come. The courts are being prepared now and the time is ripe to begin.

But if you are one who does not care for tennis or golf, and who does not wish to be out of doors—do go out and work in your garden! Health and beauty await you early and late in the garden, before the flowers have even begun to think of blooming and up until the time they taste the first frost of fall. The work you can do there—if you do not overdo it—will be well invested, since it brings double returns of beauty.

For the women who have no gardens there are still other exercises. Indoor setting-up exercises are always good, but this season they should be taken out of doors. Fresh air is quite as important as the exercise which accompanies it.

And if you do not care for plain unadorned gymnastics you could

keeping the scalp clean. A dirty scalp fails to nourish the hair. In summer, when the head perspires and tends to rot the hair, a shampoo once a week is necessary.

The application of hot and cold towels is a splendid stimulant, but care should be taken to dry the hair thoroughly afterward. Absolutely clean towels should be used.

If the scalp is naturally dry, olive oil or coconut oil is a good substitute. The hair should be parted and the oil applied directly to the scalp and not allowed to run down the hair. A superfluous amount of oil soon becomes rancid and catches dust.

It must be understood that once the hair root is gone, no remedy on earth will cause a new hair to grow from it. But if it is treated correctly when it begins to crack, baldness can be avoided.

PROPER CARE OF PULLETS NOW MEANS LARGE EGG PRODUCTION LATER

July is just around the corner. Mighty interesting month from the standpoint of poultry keepers. There's that struggle between that hot weather temptation of going off fishing and that job of taking care of pullets.

July is the month when things begin to shape up for the poultry keeper. Egg prices are taking a turn in the right direction—upward. Pullets are drawing near maturity. An article in the current issue of the Poultryman, a poultry magazine read by some million and a half poultry keepers in the United States and Canada, brings out some of the many things that should be done for pullets during July so that they will be laying in October, November and December when egg prices are really high.

Centuries ago when the hen was a wild fowl, it took nature ten to twelve months to bring the baby chick to egg production. Then, egg production of forty to fifty eggs easily met nature's demand. Today, records of over 300 eggs per year are not uncommon. The article emphasizes the importance of bringing the pullet into early production and thus gaining the advantage of the peak of the fall market for eggs.

"When will your egg crop be ready for harvesting?" the article says. "Well, now that depends. Yes, it depends upon a good many things, such as the time of hatch of the pullets, the breed of poultry—and even more upon the management practices involved. Eggs in the nest throughout the winter isn't luck, it's management."

"The word management... did you ever stop to consider what it involves? There's the arrangement of housing; clean and sanitary practices; control of lice, mites, and internal parasites; feeding and watering; attention to marketing of eggs and surplus or culled out birds; and many other details. All of these things together with this important item, proper feeding, must be watched now in order to bring your pullets into production during those peak months."

"In the Purina laboratories and on the Purina Experimental Farm, it has been found that a baby chick should be fed a starting mash that is high in protein. Beyond the six weeks baby chick stage the pullet should be fed a growing mash. It has been found that the growing mash need not be so high in protein, but be higher in carbohydrates, and should contain high quality ingredients that are in balance with each other. During the growing period the scratch grain should constitute a large portion of the pullet's menu. Ingredients making up the scratch feed, likewise, should be sound, clean and in balance with each other. All of these things are necessary to bring the pullet into production at the age of twenty four weeks. That will bring the pullet into production during the peak price season and mean more money to the producer," the Poultryman continues.

The article says that the cockerels in the flock should be marketed early. "The removal of the cockerels from the flock and the giving over to the pullets of the space previously occupied by the cockerels helps to push the pullets along into production."

"It is well to remember that to get the baby chick safely through the babychick stage with all of its troubles and handicaps of disease is not enough. The growing pullet must be given the very closest attention if she is to come into production during those months when highest prices are being paid for eggs."

Remember this summer to watch diseases, provide clean range, cull out the cockerels so as to get more

room for the pullets, and provide clean water in large quantities. Above all, keep a high quality growing mash in front of your birds and feed a high quality scratch grain. Then you will find your pullets laying at five and one-half months of age. You will bring them into egg production in time to catch the peak months with their golden profits. But you must start now to make that peak fall season—not tomorrow—the next day—but today. July is just around the corner and the beginning of high prices for eggs.

"COMBINES" IN THE EAST

Scientific investigators who have studied the economics that follow the use of the "combine" or combined harvester-thresher in the grain fields of the United States believe that many more of these machines could be operated in the Eastern States than are now in use. Trials on large farms in the East have proved the practicability of combining under the weather conditions prevailing there. Unless the number of combines operated cooperatively or as custom machines increases materially, however, it seems evident that much of the small grain on the small farms in the East will be cut with binders.

An agronomist of the United States Department of Agriculture suggests that the combine would offer one particular advantage in the East that it does have in the West. It is recognized that a valuable feature of the combine is that it leaves the straw in the field and does not cause so heavy a drain on the fertility of the soil as follows the removal of the entire crop. In the dry-land farming sections of the West, however, the straw does not decay rapidly and sometimes is considered objectionable. In the more humid East this does not apply.

In the South, combining is desirable because it permits double cropping and the return to the soil of two crop residues in one season. A legume crop, such as soy beans, can be seeded after the grain crop is harvested and in turn can be harvested with the combine in time for the seeding of winter grain.

FOR POISON IVY

After exposure to poison ivy or poison oak, thorough washing of the skin surface with strong kitchen or laundry soap having an excess of alkali, is a good precaution. Lather well, and rinse several times in running water. Pay especial attention to the finger nail and tender skin between the fingers. This treatment is carefully done may be

tried even after inflammation has developed, to lessen the area affected, and the intensity of the poisoning. As a preventative a solution of 1 part of iron sulphate in 5 parts of water has been recommended. This solution should be freely applied to the parts likely to come in contact with the ivy and allowed to dry. By this means some measure of protection may be afforded to persons who are engaged in work that makes it difficult to avoid contact with the plant. A 5 per cent solution of potassium permanganate applied locally is reported to be a very good remedy. The brown stain caused by this solution will gradually wash off or it may be removed more rapidly with lemon juice. Solutions of cooking soda or Epsom salt are ordinarily as helpful as any local applications. In the early stages ointments are not recommended.

COOPERATIVE FEATURES IN FARMERS' ELEVATORS

Reports to the United States Department of Agriculture from about 1,500 farmers' elevator associations indicate that more than 97 per cent are farmer owned and farmer controlled. The officers of about 71 per cent of the organizations consider the associations cooperative enterprises.

The organization set-up of 69 per cent of the associations provides that stockholders shall have but one vote each. In the case of 77 per cent of the organizations there are limitations to the amount of stock that can be held by an individual, and for 62 per cent of the associations there are limitations as to the per cent of dividends payable on capital stock. Nearly 73 per cent of the associations pay patronage dividends to stockholders and 22 per cent pay some patronage dividends to nonstockholders. But 15 per cent of the associations pay full patronage dividends to nonstockholders.

There is considerable variation for the associations in the different producing areas. Eighty-four per cent of the associations in the winter-wheat area consider themselves as cooperative enterprises. Seventy-eight per cent of the associations in the spring-wheat area list themselves as cooperative, 76 per cent in the soft-wheat area, 64 per cent in the corn belt, and 42 per cent in the Pacific coast area.

The percentage of associations in the various areas with provision for paying full patronage dividends to nonstockholders are as follows: Spring-wheat area 27 per cent; Corn Belt, 16 per cent; soft-wheat area,

8 per cent; Pacific coast area, 6 per cent; and winter-wheat area, 2 per cent.

MAINE WAS A PIONEER IN TUBERCULOSIS ERADICATION

Dr. John R. Mohler and other specialists in the Bureau of Animal Industry of the United States Department of Agriculture are thoroughly enjoying the progress of what they believe to be one of the greatest races in all history. Their interest is intensified by their position to the race, namely, the interstate contest for the reduction of tuberculosis among cattle to the point where a State may be classified as "modified accredited area." These men were active in promoting the race; they are also the coaches and advisers of the contestants; and they are the judges of place.

North Carolina was first under the wire on October 1, 1928. Maine finished May 1, 1929, and Michigan, Indiana, and Idaho are well to the fore for the third place on the honor roll.

In connection with Maine's achievement, Doctor Mohler recalls some of the interesting features of the early history of tuberculosis eradication

in the State. As long ago as 1826 officials at the State agricultural college suspected the presence of tuberculosis in the college dairy herd. Slaughter of the animals confirmed the diagnosis. This was before the use of the tuberculin test in the United States in 1892.

The board of health of Portland and Old Orchard, Me., in May 1896, were probably the first to require examination of all cattle furnishing milk for cities, and it is interesting to note that two dairy companies paid a premium for milk from tested cattle.

The cooperative work between the State and the United States Department of Agriculture started in 1917. The total indemnities paid in the 12 years amounted to approximately \$425,000 and the operating expense was less than \$210,000.

Maine's success in the campaign to suppress the disease was achieved largely through the leadership and efforts of H. M. Tucker, chief of the Maine Division of Animal Industry, and G. R. Caldwell, the Federal representative. Testing is to be continued and all herds from which any reactors were removed after the last test, and certain others are to be kept under special observation and will be retested several months.

Maine, in establishing itself as relatively free from bovine tuberculosis, Doctor Mohler says, assumes new importance in New England. The State not only produces dairy production but in recent years has been

selling about 1,000 dairy cattle a month to neighboring States. Plenty of money to McLean & Thomas

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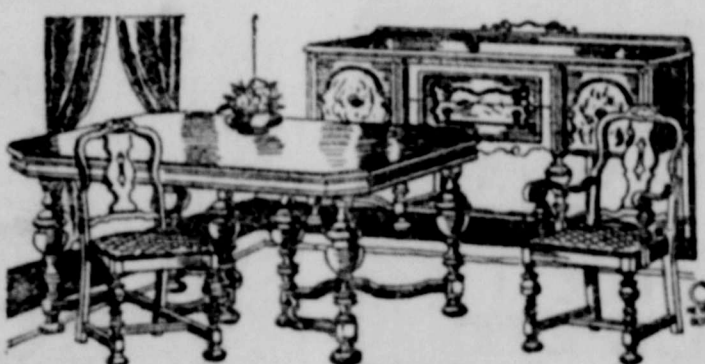
