MARKETING PLAN WORKING

Workmen Busy Building Bleachers Full Length of Field at Chesley Football Park—Vast Crowd Certain

ERNEST B. GUDE RETIRES FROM BUSINESS HERE

With the closing of business Saturday night, Ernest B. Gude, of the grocery firm of Gude & Norvell, retired from the business, which will be continued by L. B. Norvell, who takes over his partner's interest in the business. Mr. Gude will remain in Cisco until January 1, and will devote this time in making collections of outstanding accounts and to wind up his affairs here, as he and Mrs. Gude will retire to the simple life of ranch people after the first of the year.

The Gudes have some valuable ranch property in Tom Green county, which is well stock with saep, and for the past two years he has been giving considerable time to his ranch interests. The ranch has been operated since it was acquired some time ago by his sons, R. L. and Leslie Gude, but with the securing of additional lands and sheep the business has now assumed such proportions that it will require not only all of the time of the two young men, but also that of the senior Gude to look after their interests.

OLDEN FIELD IS AGAIN DRAWING OIL ATTENTION

The Olden shallow oil field, the newest pool in Eastland county, signaled the final day of the week by the bringing in of two new wells, both producers being in the townsites.

Adams & Ford completed their Pettit No. 1 for 60 barrels at the usual depth of 1,470 feet and the Magnolia brought in their Harris No. 6 at the same level for 70 barrels. The Pettit well is an offset to the south of the discovery well of Pittman, Barker & Adams, while the Harris is a location east of the Magnolia's baseball park well.

A test of great importance is just starting. Callaway et al are beginning a well on the Gullett, more than a quarter of a mile north of production. A producer would mean much to the field. Pittman, Barker & Adams are preparing to start a well offsetting the Magnolia's newest well.

TEN CARS OF PECANS
ADA, Okla., Nov. 29.—Produce dealers estimate that at least 10 cars of pecans will be shipped from Pontotoc county this season. With the cotton crop virtually picked, many families are gathering pecans of which there is an unusually large crop this year.

Cisco is astir in anticipation of the big football game with Cleburne next Friday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. Since the message was received announcing that the contest would be staged here, there has been little else talked about but the game.

G. H. Wells and Coach Chapman have returned from San Antonio, where they conferred with Roy Henderson. Mr. Wells says Cisco secured the game by the toss of a coin and that Mr. Ettlinger has been agreed on as referee, but has not accepted as yet. Other officials are also undetermined at this hour.

Much speculation exists as to the size of the crowd next Friday, but preparations for handling a record-breaking audience are already under way. The athletic council has let the contract for bleachers to be built the full length of the field and material was put on the ground and a large amount of work done Saturday. Tom Fields secured the contract and a large force of carpenters were put to work. When completed the seating capacity will be almost five thousand and more seats will be built if advance ticket sales indicate they will be needed.

The announcement of this game pepped up the Lobos as nothing could have done. Every man on the squad realizes that they have the toughest assignment that could possibly have been handed them and they realize fully that in order to survive this struggle every man will have to be in the pink of condition. The team worked out Friday and Saturday afternoons under the supervision of E. H. Whitehead and Chapman Williamson and they displayed great snap and ginger in their work. Every Lobo is on edge and they will be primed for the battle of their lives when they look down the gridiron toward the Yellowjackets next Friday.

The Lobos will need every ounce of strength they possess. Cleburne has a long record of championship teams behind them. Coached by the veteran Fred Erney, the team is fast, heavy and heady. They have the benefit of the vast experience of Erney, who was coaching championship teams while Chapman was a school boy. The Yellowjackets have made a wonderful record in their games this season and have fairly crushed all opposition that has confronted them during the season.

Draper at half and Turner at quarter constitute the backbone of the machine. Both men are wonderful fleet and both men are veterans of the game. Draper, like Ernie Wilson, is playing his fifth year of football. He was the premier dash man in the state meet last year and is conceded to be the fastest man on legs in Texas. Turner is as powerful as Draper as a ball carrier and few high school players in the state have shown better field generalship than he. In addition they have Lee, a veritable Boody Johnson, as a drop kicker. The Jackets are coming looking for blood and they are going to give the Lobos the battle of their lives or win.

However, the Cleburne combination is not unbeatable. The Strawn Greyhounds turned the trick last year at Strawn and Draper and all the stars were in the game then. It is true the Greyhounds were forced to the limit and barely got out with a one-point lead, but they won. The Lobos tied the Greyhounds last season and those who saw the game were convinced that Cisco had the better team. There has been much speculation locally as to whether the Lobos today are as strong as the Lobos of 1923. This game will settle for all time this argument.

The Lobos are in for their hardest battle of the year without doubt. They meet a line fully as heavy as their own and they meet a backfield rated as among the greatest in the history of the interscholastic league. However, the Lobos are in their own lair. A cornered wolf is the most dangerous foe for anything to meet and the Cisco high boys will be the cornered wolves Friday. By every man hitting hard and low and tackling low and unmercifully they can stop the Yellow Jacket attack. By playing in unison and fighting for every inch they can score, but in order to do that every man must be in the pink of condition and Cisco expects every Lobo to be in this condition Friday afternoon at 2:30.

SHREVEPORT, La., Nov. 29.—Murder and suicide was the theory advanced this afternoon following the finding of the bodies of Myrtle Ogdon, college student, and J. J. Bass, 27, sweethearts, locked in the embrace of death, in an auto in the residence section. Bass, apparently after shooting the girl twice through the brain, placed his arm around her and killed himself.

Spurred love was the motive assigned by the girl's parents when questioned Saturday night. Miss Ogden had gone driving with Bass with the understanding he would never again force his attentions on her, as he had during the past year. The auto traveled half a block with both occupants dead before coming to a stop against a tree. Passersby heard the girl pleading for her life just before Bass fired.

A. & M. STARTS DRIVE FOR WELLBRED Sires

COLLEGE STATION, Nov. 29.—A drive to further diminish the scrub beef sire and replace him with the purebred on Texas farms is a comprehensive program of the extension service of the A. & M. College of Texas, initiated this month. Co-operation will be given with various other agencies of the state in this drive, to have the Texas farmer avail himself of the opportunity of producing more profitable beef. Wellbred beefs with proper feed are topping the market and proving more profitable to the producers. It is recognized that the average farmer cannot substitute purebreds throughout his herd, and it has been found that this wholesale replacement is not necessary for him to increase his profit. He can increase the productive value of his scrubs by introducing wellbred males, and in this way he can gradually increase the standard of his herd.

MOTHER ADMITS STUFFED PAPERS MOUTH OF BABY

SHERMAN, Nov. 29.—Confessing that she stuffed newspapers in the mouth of her new-born babe until it died and then placed the body in a suit case and left it on a Frisco train, a young woman was being held at Ada, Okla., tonight. She was arrested on information from Sherman authorities.

CISCO MAN GETS CONTRACT BUILD MORAN HIGHWAY

ALBANY, Nov. 29.—The contract for constructing the highway between Albany and Moran has been let to Nelson and VanEman, of Cisco, and Clifton, who were the successful bidders for the dirt work, that is to say, the grading, a distance of fifteen and a half miles, running from Main street opposite T. A. Deats' harness shop, crossing the railroad near the jail and then down the east side of the Texas Central railroad to Moran, going to the south limits of the city of Moran. Their contract calls for \$40,887.10. Bridge work on this contract was let to Crouch and Noland for \$847,766.37. Bridges to be constructed across North and South Hubbard, Salt Prong, Deep Creek and Indian Creek, and all culverts. Total costs per mile on this road for bridges and grading amounts to \$8,080.61. The court and highway engineers are well pleased with these bids, as it is about one thousand dollars less than the county engineer figured it. They will get on the job in the next ten or fifteen days. The above contracts just call for the building of the bridges, and the dirt grade, and the surfacing of the road will be covered by another contract, and just what it will be surfaced with, as yet has not been determined, whether gravel or crushed stone, in all probability it will be surfaced with gravel, as there are quite a number of gravel beds adjacent to this right-of-way.

BUSY WEEK IN SHALLOW FIELD WEST OF CISCO

One of the most active weeks witnessed by the shallow fields around Putnam resulted in the bringing in of an even dozen wells. Perhaps the most important was that of the Godley Oil & Gas company, the No. 3 on the Kennedy, which extended the field three-eighths of a mile. This is in the field three miles southeast of Putnam and is good for around 10 barrels at 460 feet.

Producing from the same and at the depth of 520 feet, George Nichols No. 6 Davis is making 35 barrels. Goodloe & Harris have completed their No. 6 for 20 barrels. Polsky et al on the Rutherford, section 3, have a nice well. Morrison & Kleiner Bros. have completed their No. 4 Rutherford for 15 barrels.

In the pool three miles north of Putnam, the Big Five has three completions, the No. 1, 2 and 3 on the Shackelford, with a total production of around 80 barrels. Kuhlmeier-Kleiner Oil company added three producers, the No. 12, 13 and 1, with a total output of 60 barrels, on the W. E. Pruitt. These wells and the Big Five producers are at 600 feet. Dickey Bros. completed another well on the Qualls at 400 feet for 25 barrels.

CISCO POULTRY WINS THREE OF GRAND PRIZES

Cisco won three of the four grand champion prizes at the Rising Star Pig and Poultry show Friday and Saturday. The winners were T. E. Clark, second on old pen; R. L. Clark, first on young pen; S. P. Travis, second on young pen. Besides these grand champion prizes Poo won several other prizes: W. E. McWhorter almost made a sweepstake on black giants, and E. B. Isaacs entered nine birds and captured seven prizes on his Rhode Island reds. He won first and second on pullet; first, fourth and fifth on cockerel; second on cock; second on hen. C. C. Kimbrough won fifth on Rhode Island pullet. The News failed to get a full list of the prize winners, as one of the exhibitors furnished this list from memory.

First Consignment of Eggs Under Co-operative Marketing Plan To Be Shipped to Cisco From Rising Star

Already the co-operative marketing department of the Bankhead Poultry Producers association is beginning to function. There will be consigned to headquarters here early in the week the first hatch of eggs to be distributed under the co-operative plan. Rising Star poultry people are producing more eggs than the local demand can take care of, while in Cisco and other places the supply is less than the demand. To relieve this situation is the object of the association, and this first consignment will be sold to Cisco business men.

County Agent Bush, who was in Cisco Saturday afternoon en route home from the Pig and Poultry show at Rising Star, stated that the number of hens in the association will have to be increased 100 per cent before the local demands of the towns of Eastland and Stephens counties is supplied. "Eggs are selling in Rising Star and other places where they are plentiful, for 30 cents per dozen, while dealers in Cisco, Eastland and Ranger are paying 50 cents, and in Breckenridge a few cents higher. When this plan is functioning fully this will be relieved, as the surplus will be distributed where the eggs are less plentiful, and the market the highest."

Eggs are selling at retail in Eastland, Ranger, Cisco and Breckenridge at 60 to 70 cents per dozen, while it is stated that they can be bought at Rising Star, retail at 30 cents.

BRITISH RUSH MORE TROOPS TO THE SUDAN

CAIRO, Nov. 29.—Communication with Khartoum was on a halting and difficult schedule today through slashing of the telegraph wires, but latest reports stated that serious street fighting had been going on. The mutinous Sudanese who killed three physicians and destroyed the Khartoum hospital yesterday, are surrounding the British troops.

Warnings have been issued to the Sudanese troops that the penalty for mutiny will be death and that executions will be ordered of members of the organizations in which the mutiny originated.

The Sudanese have been receiving little ammunition and the British control machine guns and ammunition stores under heavy guard. It is reported an Italian attorney was killed during yesterday's attack. It is believed martial law has been declared in Khartoum.

River boats entering the Sudan have concealed their schedules and the only consistent communication has been by wireless.

The British are rushing reinforcements overland into the Sudan, it being the opinion of military authorities that it will require a considerable force to restore order. It is feared the disaffection has spread to include most of the Sudan, though the only violence reported has been in Khartoum.

SAN SABA, Nov. 29.—The jury in the case of Pearl Curry on trial here for the murder of her infant son returned a verdict for three years in the penitentiary. Suspended sentence was passed.

It has been said many times, in all languages, that tolerance is the greatest of the virtues. In New York, a wonderful thing is happening. At Columbia University, where he is a student, Jal Dastur C. TRADE AND THE AUTOMOBILE

In the days of dirt roads and horse-drawn vehicles farmers usually traded at the towns nearest to them. Merchants in those towns could count on a certain amount of trade without advertising effort on their part. If they kept a proper supply of goods on hands, that was about all they had to do to hold trade. The coming of the automobile and paved highways is changing this. Farmers with motor cars frequently follow the paving to do their buying. They may go much farther than they used to drive. Frequently they may pass through the towns that formerly had their trade and seek instead the nearest big city with its huge department stores. This need not mean the passing of the small town store. It will mean, however, that storekeepers in such towns have got to make greater efforts to attract and hold their farm customers. They will have to advertise their goods over a wider area and spruce up their stores to meet the competition of numerous other towns of the same size as well as of the nearest metropolis. Improving the service they give, the quality and assortment of goods and their advertising methods, will cost money, but experience shows that a wise expenditure of money for such purposes nearly always means steady business gains. The automobile and the paved highway can be the small community's best friend if residents and business men handle the problem right.

BOOTLEGGERS MUST PAY

A widow in Syracuse, N. Y., is awarded a verdict of \$1,500 against a cafe keeper who is accused of selling her husband liquor. After drinking the liquor, the husband went out and killed himself, which is no uncommon result of imbibing current alcoholic beverages. This is said to be the third verdict of the kind returned in Syracuse in the last two years, under a state law which makes liquor salesmen responsible for the acts of purchasers. It may be an unwarranted invasion of the sacred rights of bootleggers; but if such a law were generally adopted and enforced it might save a great many lives.

DOVES FOR THE CHRISTENING

Instead of breaking a bottle of wine over the bow of the big German air cruiser, ZR-3, when she was christening it, Mrs. Coolidge released a flock of doves. It was a striking variation of the traditional method of christening sea and air craft, and an appropriate one. The Secretary of the Navy explains that the doves are a symbol of peace, thus suiting the occasion because the Zeppelin is to be used only for peaceful purposes, and typifies peace between America and Germany. That may be a satisfactory explanation, even though the airship is under the control of the navy, a fighting force. It would be enough, however, to use the dove on such an occasion as a symbol of flight—and a carrier pigeon or an eagle might be still better.

No longer will the proprietors of the shack town across the Arkansas river here, greet their customers with a resounding slap on the shoulder as they pass out a bottle of fiery "corn." Likewise with the coming of 1925, the high pitched voices of men and painted women, raised in maudlin song and laughter throughout the night, will sink into a whisper. For Sheriff Gay, who succeeds John E. Johnston, has been sheriff before, and the bootleggers and gamblers are taking him at his word when he announces the lure at the Oklahoma end of the bridge here is doomed to go.

"Little Juarez," which is to Fort Smith what Juarez, Mexico, is to El Paso, has a national reputation, according to federal prohibition agents who have tried in vain in the past to sponge up the moisture there. Twenty-four hours after a particularly effective raid last summer, the town's habits were back again, working overtime, apparently in an effort to pay their expected fines. It was a "wild night" in the "Bucket of Blood," the "Fist, Skull and Eyeball," the "Broken Knuckle," the "Greasy Spoon," and other emporiums with similar names.

Calles, "Tiger of Sonora," Hopes to Bring to Mexico Peace and Prosperity

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 29.—Mexico hung up the last garland and tacked the last bunting today in preparation for the fete tomorrow when Plutarco Elias Calles takes the oath of president in splendor such as not seen since the days of the Aztecs. Great pomp and display is planned. Mr. Calles said today that in his speech of acceptance he would outline his policies for the betterment of the laboring classes, and would admonish politicians that greed and graft will not be tolerated. He will pledge himself to carry out President Obregon's policies of international obligation and serve notice on the discordant elements that while he covets peace, the rifle will lean conveniently against the presidential chair. A great era of prosperity is foreseen by the incoming president.

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 29.—General Plutarco Elias Calles, who takes office tonight at midnight as the President of Mexico, expects that his administration will usher in a period of prosperity and peace as Mexico has never known before. The "Tiger of Sonora," veteran of many revolutions, believes that internal strife in Mexico is ended and that her citizens are ready to attain an economic and social position comparable to that of Americans.

When General Calles was the guest of American capitalists during his recent visit to New York City he spoke of the opportunities American industrialists would have in Mexico.

"We have in Mexico not less than 12,000,000 men on the fringe of civilization, who neither know of nor enjoy the material gifts and spiritual advantages of the American people," he said. "Instead, before our struggles for liberty, they were condemned by the oppression of a limited, privileged, social caste."

"Humanity leaves us no other road than to make Mexico a community in which, on the basis of equality for all social classes, the worker in the field and in the city—now buying nothing because he has nothing and barely eats—will rise to the same economic status enjoyed by the American workers. Then the American industrialist will have a magnificent market in Mexico."

Serving as a private in Madero's army, Calles helped fight the landowners who held the Mexicans as slaves. He carried on the campaign later as governor of Sonora. As minister of education under President Obregon, he taught the liberated slaves.

General Calles has been called the Ramsey MacDonald of Mexico. He is a member of the International Machinists' Union, and is solicitous of the welfare of workmen above all else.

General Calles will encourage development of Mexican oil and mineral resources by Mexicans. American and British capitalists will be given concessions, if they do not attempt to break Mexico's domestic laws.

Mexico's new president has stated that aliens from congested districts of the United States would be received cordially in Mexico. Few Europeans go directly to Mexico, he said.

General Calles believes that divorce should be made easy. He would allow a couple to be divorced immediately if both parties desired it.

One of the new president's most radical projects, which he plans to inaugurate soon, is a new "union shop" prison system. Under this system prisoners will be paid union wages for their labor and will live "with all the comforts of home." Half of the money will be given to the convict's family. This system has already been tried out here, but General Calles plans to make it permanent.

Another innovation in the system is that a convict's wife or sweetheart is allowed to visit him in his private room once a week.

Most of the convict's pay is kept in a fund, which he receives at the end of his term. Thus a liberated prisoner faces the world with ready money and knowledge of a useful trade.

By such reforms as these General Calles plans to improve the condition of Mexico's citizens and bring them up to the plane of citizens of more civilized nations.

QUARANTINE NOT LIFTED
FORT WORTH, Nov. 29.—That to lift the hoof and mouth quarantine at this time might work disastrous and costly results, J. Boog Scott said he would advise against any such immediate move. Contrary to reports of the past few days the state and federal organization has not disbanded, and Harris, Galveston and Brazoria counties will continue the work of disinfecting.

OKLAHOMAN DEFENDS YOUNG PEOPLE KISSING
OKLAHOMA CITY, Nov. 29.—Who says it's wrong to kiss in public? Not R. L. Ferguson, civic leader here and cousin of Governor Fer-

guson of Oklahoma territorial days. "Young people always have kissed, and let's hope they always will," declared Ferguson today in defending "petting" parties on highways adjacent to Oklahoma City.

FREIGHT RATES ON HORSES TOO HIGH
AUSTIN, Nov. 29.—Freight rates on horses and mules from Fort Worth and all southwestern Texas points have been held unreasonable by the Interstate Commerce Commission. New rates of twenty-four cents per hundred pounds for a distance of one hundred miles, to twenty-eight cents for one thousand miles have been prescribed, according to information received from Washington.

Tells President He Has Found Secret Spanish Gold Mines And Buried Arizona Cities

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—President Coolidge dropped the executive cares of office a few days ago and listened enthralled while Lee G. Turner, a western ranchman, told him of eight years' digging into the mountain fastness of Arizona in search of Spanish gold, supposed to have been buried by those early pioneers of the new world. Turner told the president he believed he had located one such mine.

Not only does Turner say he located a Spanish mine, but claims to have excavated to an old Spanish roadway which is 25 feet wide and many miles in length, seven graveyards (burial places, he believes, of the seven lost cities of Cibola), deposit maps, old tunnels which been sealed with cement, and the site of an ancient village.

His claim is vouched for by H. S. Corbett, Republican national committeeman of Arizona, and Dean Butler, of the University of Arizona. President Coolidge assured Turner his discovery would be investigated and if found true he would be afforded protection when he begins final work on unearthing the gold.

Turner intends excavating within the next few months. But it is in the old Spanish gold mine—known as "the mine with the iron door"—that he is chiefly interested. For many decades searchers have gone to the Catalina Mountains in Arizona seeking the lost gold mine. The site of this mine, says Turner, is eight miles from Winkelman, Ariz., and not far from Tucson. For sixteen years Turner has searched for the lost Spanish mine, and although now only 34 years of age, he looks like an old man.

He came upon his recent discoveries as the result of maps given to him by James Reynolds, who was employed by a big corporation to seek out the Spanish mines in Arizona. Turner's claims are on ground which the government took 50 years ago from Geronimo, the Indian warrior. It was this confiscation that caused Geronimo to go on the warpath, it is said.

According to Turner Geronimo knew the secret of the mine with

the iron door, and he had the hidden gold in mind when he promised the government that if permitted to return to his people he would reimburse the United States for all the damages he had done while on the warpath—damage estimated at \$5,000,000. Turner declares that Chino, a brother of Geronimo, actually took him to the hidden mine in 1909 and challenged him to find the gold. The prospector failed to locate the mine after two years search, but discovered a cryptic writing which he says reveals to him the secret of the mine.

"I've found the old mine at last," said Turner at the White House. "I'm sure of it. I have some of the gold taken from spots near it by me. Sixteen years of my life I have spent in hunting it. I am not afraid to tell its approximate location, because no man could locate it without the clues I have obtained. Mexicans from old Fort Lowell, now in ruins, make a pilgrimage every year for the mine. They go in groups and hunt for days and weeks. They believe that if a man gets to a point in the mountains where he can see the north tower (nine miles away) of the San Xavier Mission through a hole in the highest range of the Catalina Mountains, known as "the window," that the mine lies in that line.

"This hidden mine has been known through the ages. The mound builders worked it. Then came the Indians and from them the Spaniards learned the secret. The Spaniards destroyed all outward traces of the mines by means of an artificial landslide. They intended returning and reopening it, but never had the chance."

FORD PUTS HIS NAME 2,651,000 PARTS DAILY

DETROIT, Nov. 29.—The name Ford goes on 2,651,000 Ford car and trucks parts every day as a protection to car owners against counterfeit parts.

Trade marking of Ford parts with the word in the now familiar script began in 1914 when spurious parts first appeared. This trade marking was extended in 1916 when the markets were flooded with the counterfeits and today, putting the name Ford on genuine parts has become something of an industry itself. Different standard parts into which the trade mark is worked during manufacture now total 351 from the 72-pound cylinder block to the quarter ounce switch key. A special department employing eighteen skilled engravers is continually busy making the stamp dies, while scores of other workers are engaged throughout Ford factories in marking the parts. In a majority of instances it has been found possible to incorporate the operation with the manufacturing processes. Spring leaves are marked as the steel is rolled at the mills. Drop-forged and cold-headed steel parts are marked by stencils cut into the dies. Some of the parts, like the crankshaft, piston rings, and rear axle ring gear—because of the sequence of operations and precision required—are stamped in separate operations. In the engraving department an average of 700 stamps and stencils of the Ford trade mark in various sizes are made daily. This trade mark on genuine Ford parts not only assures to the car owner products that represent twenty-one years of study out, research and work in developing the strongest materials

and the most efficient design, but also stands as a safeguard against the counterfeit.

Lea, president of the Texas Highway association and chairman of the Texas-Louisiana bridge commission, which is promoting the movement for construction of the bridge. Cost of the improvement is estimated at \$700,000.

JOHN FANNING ABSORBS THE JUDIA THEATRE

A deal was consummated this week between Manager Fanning of the Broadway, and Manager Cochran of the Judia theater, whereby the former buys the furniture, fixtures and lease of the Judia theater, and will conduct both picture shows in the future.

Manager Fanning stated it was his purpose to operate both shows on that same high principle that has characterized the Broadway since he assumed management. "The Judia will be remodeled, improved and practically made over, and two first

class houses will be operated here, as nothing but high class pictures will be shown," he stated.

"I am planning on having two days opening of the Judia—next Friday and Saturday—with the playing here of the Lobo-Cleburne game as the first day of the opening.

"Public service is commonly considered thankless, but I have not found it so in Cisco. On the contrary the response of the community to our efforts in giving wholesome entertainment has been most gratifying, and our success has been largely due to the fact that we have never allowed our program to drop below the high ideals established when we assumed the management of the Broadway. The same ideals will be maintained at the Judia."

Workmen will begin remodeling the Judia the first of the week, Mr. Fanning stated, that it may be ready for the opening day.

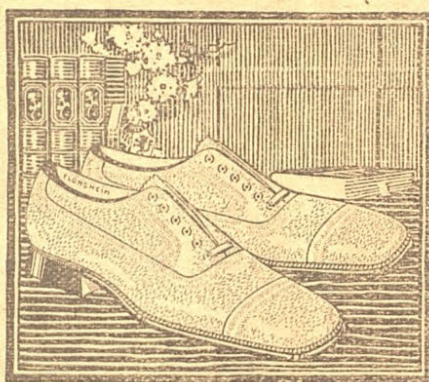

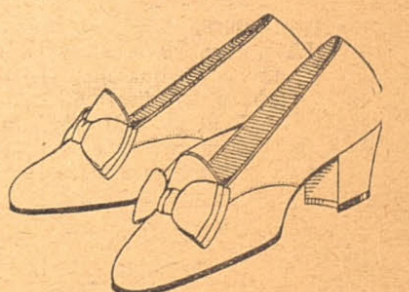

The Cisco 20,000 egg hatchery will begin operation in the near future. This was determined Saturday when F. G. Glass and G. W. Thomason arrived from Arlington to close the deal for taking over the Cisco Hatchery for operation the coming season. "I hardly ever begin hatching until January first, but I understand the Cisco poultry people are anxious to start hatching, so the plant will be ready just as soon as the eggs are brought in. I find the plant in very good condition. Some minor adjustments will have to be made, but this can be looked after in a few days," said Mr. Glass.

"Mr. Thomason, by brother-in-law, who has been associated with me in the hatchery business for several years, will move to Cisco and have direct management of the plant here. He will move his family to Cisco some time next week, and be on the ground constantly from now until the close of the hatching season."

At Arlington Glass owns and operates the largest hatchery in Texas, it is stated, and is thoroughly familiar with all the details of the business. This arrangement means that the Cisco hatchery will be ready for business in ample time to take care of the early hatch that will be demanded by the Cisco poultry folk.

"I understand the plant handled its full capacity—120,000 eggs—last season, and we contemplate running the plant to capacity this season. But this is only two-thirds of the hatchery capacity of Cisco, as the Frazar White Leghorn Farm has installed a 10,000 egg hatchery, which gives Cisco hatchery capacity of 200,000 eggs.

"I am not in possession of au-

thentic information concerning the poultry prospects of the Cisco section, but from general information, and the interest I have seen manifested, we are counting on building up a great poultry center in Cisco, and we hope to increase the capacity of this plant eventually to 100,000 capacity. Naturally this all depends upon the poultry association, but if the present interest in the poultry business continues, the Cisco Hatchery will have to be increased to 100,000."
