## IN AUSTIN

# Fillies 2nd At State

Bovina's Fillies, who "came out of nowhere this season" according to one area sportswriter, finished three points behind Paducah's Dragons in the state Class A track meet at Austin Friday and Saturday.

Paducah, who finished third a year ago, tallied 53 points to 50 for the Fillies. Neither school had a graduating point-winner on its team.

Temperatures in the 70s, partly cloudy skies and cool breezes made conditions ideal for good performances as Paducah and Bovina finished in their Region 1-A finish order before a Memorial Stadium crowd of 4,000.

Five records were broken and one tied in the Class A portion of the fifth annual girls' state meet.

Paducah ended its participation in the meet with a record-breaking 880-yard relay performance, but Bovina cinched second in the last event, the mile relay.

The Fillies' third runner, Diane Gilbreath, pulled from third to first on her mile relay leg, and Debra Gilbreath anchored strongly for a time of 4:01.0, a season best for Bovina, and a 15-yard lead over the second place team in that event, Sabinal. Running the first two legs of the mile relay were Dianna Naegle and Sandi Sides.

"Just a step here and a step there in a couple of the events where we were matched against Paducah was the difference between first and second place," commented an elated Joel Nelson after the meet. The first year coach had nothing but praise for his team and expressed confidence that the Fillies would be back in Austin again next year with an even stronger squad.

Pat Shepherd, a sophomore who

placed sixth last year as a freshman, took second in that event this year with a toss of 118-6. Competition in the discus was held Friday with Jennifer Purdue of Sanford-Fritch winning with a toss of 125-4, breaking the record of 121-0 she set last year.

The 440-yard relay team of Naegle, Sides, Gilbreath and Gilbreath placed second with a time of 49.8, one step behind Paducah with a time of 49.6.

Debra Gilbreath took third place in the 220-yard dash with a time of 25.1, which tied the record set by Connie Christon of Stanton in 1975. Benita Punch of Groveton set the new record at 24.9 with Nodia Vaughn of Paducah coming in second with a time of 25.0, one-tenth of a second ahead of Gilbreath.

Also competing for the Fillies but failing to earn points were Naegle

in the triple jump and Sides in the 60-yard dash.

According to Nelson, the triple jump was an extremely "tough" event this year and the 60-yard dash was disastrous for Sides, a freshman competitor.

"There were five false starts in the 60 and Sandi had one of them," explained Nelson. "The girl that Sandi finished second to in the regional meet was disqualified for two false starts and that made for a lot of pressure on Sandi," he commented.

Lezli Williams, who was a regional qualifier in the 440-yard dash, made the trip to Austin as alternate on the relay teams.

Although only a first place team trophy is given at the track meet, the Fillies brought home a handsome plaque for first place in the mile relay and a "clutch" of individual medals for their performances.

# Hail Storm Damages Wheat, Barley Crops

The first turbulent weather of the 1976 "tornado season" struck here late Wednesday afternoon of last week, producing a devastating barrage of hail, a near cloudburst of rain and several tornadoes, including one that touched down near Friona. However, the damage inflicted by the tornado and hail storm was restricted to a relatively small area of the county.

The greatest damage from the storm was caused by pea-sized hail in the Pleasant Hill and Rhea communities. The hailstorm cut a five-mile wide swath from the Texas-New Mexico line near Pleasant Hill north to the Rhea Community. In the Pleasant Hill area, hail was piled six to eight inches deep on the roads and fields with county maintainers called out to clean the roads after the storm cleared.

Accompanying the hail was a sudden heavy rain that dropped up to two and one-half inches or more of rain in a period of less than two hours. However, the rain fell so hard that most of it washed away, leaving the ground hard-packed so was of little benefit to crops.

Barley and wheat crops, which were just beginning to head out,

suffered extensive damage, as much as 100 per cent in some instances. In addition to the battering hail, the plants sustained damage from freezing after the hail piled up in the fields.

The young corn crops in the area, most of which was off to a good start, also suffered some damage, however, the extent of the damage wasn't as severe as farmers estimated immediately following the storm.

Barrow ditches and fence rows still contained traces of hail some 18 hours after the storm.

The "white tornado" which touched down at Friona could be seen from as far away as Texico. The twister was first spotted east of Bovina with law officers watching the tornado as it moved toward Friona where it touched down on the N.E. Wood place, damaging a horse shed.

Several other reports of funnels between Bovina and Farwell were unverified.

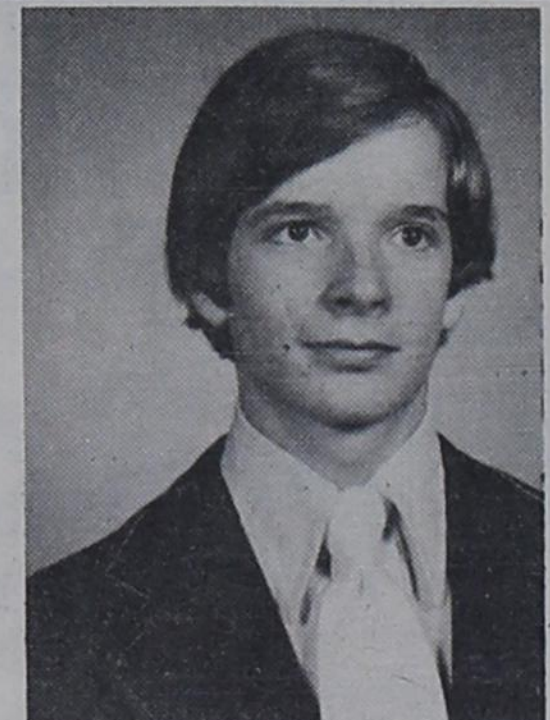

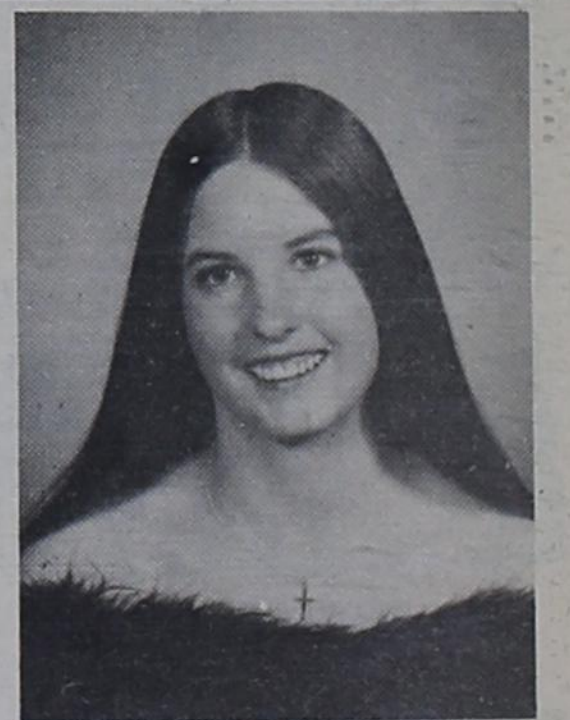

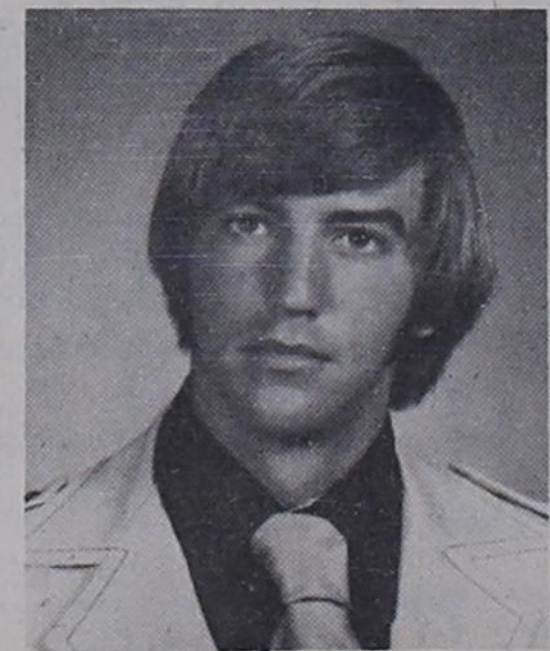

## Name 4 Delegates To State Convention

Naming of four delegates and four alternates to the state convention, plus approval of three resolutions were the main items on the Parmer County Democratic Convention held at Bovina last Saturday.

The meeting was conducted at the First State Bank, and was attended by 25 delegates who were elected to represent their precincts at the May 11 precinct convention. There were 48 delegates eligible to attend.

Elected as the county's delegates to the June 18-19 convention in Houston and the September 17-18 convention in Fort Worth were Don Williams, Hollis Horton, Clarence Martin and Wendol Christian.

Alternates elected were Maxine Williams, Lunell Horton, Louise Christian and Wynona Martin. It was explained that on presidential election years, there are two state Democratic conventions, and the delegates elected will attend both meetings.

Three resolutions were adopted by the convention, and recommended to the state Democratic leadership. Two of the items were sent from the Friona precinct

convention. The first resolution urged continued support of the Texas Water Plan, for conservation of our available water, and continued efforts for a water import plan to provide necessary water for domestic, industrial and agricultural use in the area.

The second resolution urged the delegates elected by the county to support the party leadership of Governor Dolph Briscoe.

A third resolution, which was worded and approved by the county delegates, put the Parmer delegation on record as endorsing the recent presidential primary voting system, and recommending that the legislature take action to continue this type of vote, whereby every voter has a say in selecting the presidential nominee.

Hollis Horton was elected and served as convention president. Bill Ellis was convention secretary. Voting precincts represented at the meeting were Friona, Bovina, Farwell, Oklahoma Lane and Rhea.

The meeting was a harmonious one, with business conducted on a mainly routine basis.

Protein potential is the primary reason for the special reception being accorded a new variety of hard, red winter wheat, Lancota, the new variety, is being released by agricultural experiment stations in four states. Ten to twenty percent more protein is produced by the new variety, according to development researchers who say that if all Nebraska's wheat acreage were converted to Lancota, protein production would be increased by 100 million pounds. Early performance testing of the new variety indicates it should be tough enough to compete with other high performance varieties throughout the plains states.

## Homes Needed In Parmer County

Foster homes are needed in Parmer and Castro counties to provide care for aged, blind, or other disabled adults who can no longer continue living in their homes, but are not medically eligible for nursing home care, according to David Brown of Amarillo, adult social services supervisor, Texas State Department of Public Welfare. The foster family home program is one of the adult programs provided by the department as an alternative to institutional care.

"We are seeking warm hearted people who have room in their homes for one to three aged or disabled people who are not related to them," Brown said. "The foster family must be willing to help provide opportunities for social, recreational and religious activities as appropriate. They would not need to provide health related services."

Upon notification, the social worker will interview prospective foster care

providers and check to see that the home meets health and safety standards. They will also give ongoing consultation to approved providers on any problems that may arise, he said.

"We would help the persons seeking foster care and those wishing to give it to get acquainted before further arrangements are made," Brown stated. "This is, really, a family-sharing program where all concerned need to be congenial, and we expect it to enrich the lives of all concerned."

Cost of the foster care is shared by each receiver and the welfare department, who together pay a total of \$220 per person per month to the provider, according to agency regulations.

## SCS Report

Are you interested in your irrigation well production?

Leon Grissom, chairman, of the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District says, "We have a service available to the farmers in Parmer County that is not too well known. This service is measuring irrigation well production."

About fifteen years ago the district purchased a flow meter. This meter is adopted to about any size discharge. The preferable way to check a well is to attach the meter to a short piece of pipe coming from a valve. The well or wells

being checked should have been running at least twenty four hours and preferably more.

This service has been used by a lot of producers who plan to put in center pivot systems. It is necessary to know your GPM before buying a system.

With the gas bills going so high, a lot of producers are interested in how efficient their operation is.

"If you have a well or wells that you'd like checked, contact the Soil Conservation Service, Friona," Grissom concluded.

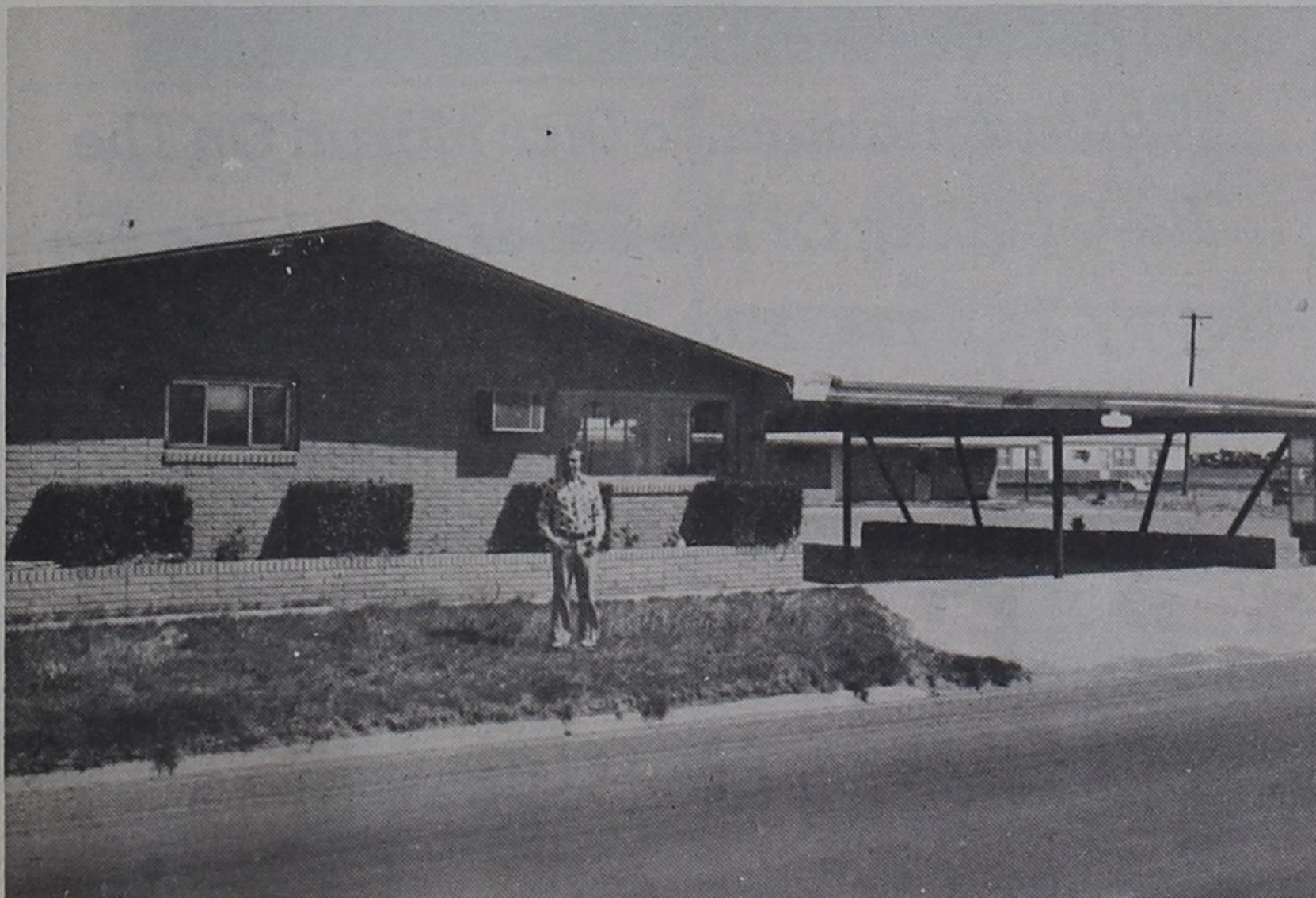

And not a senior in the bunch, Paducah included. It might very well boll down to the same two teams in next year's meet, but we'll put our money on the Fillies next time! Liked the way Garret Von Netzer (Amarillo Globe-News Sports Editor) phrased it in Sunday's paper: "Paducah finished third a year ago, while Bovina came out of nowhere this season."

In case anyone hasn't heard, Debra Gilbreath, Diane Gilbreath, Sandi Sides and Dianna Naegle picked up a first place in the mile relay and a second in the 440-yard relay; Pat Shepherd placed second in the discus and Debra placed third in the 220-yard dash. Debra, by the way, tied the old record in Class A with her time of 25.1. The only other District 3-A girl to pick up points at the state meet was Sue Slutz of Vega, who placed sixth in the 80-yard hurdles.

James Roberts, in his "Drifting Sands" column in the Andrews County News, says he'd like to help organize a taxpayer's lobby in Washington to work for three things:

Amend the constitution so that no congressman, senator, president, bureaucrat or federal judge could serve for more than one term; change the income tax laws so that everyone pays 10 per cent across the board with no loop-holes for anyone; and, provide that every governmental agency self-destructs after eight years.

According to the U.S. Labor Department, a hypothetical middle income urban family paid bills totaling \$15,318 over the year ended last fall, an increase of 6.9 per cent over the previous year.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics

regularly computes annual budgets for urban families living on low, middle and high incomes. The hypothetical family consists of a 38-year-old full-time employed husband, an unemployed wife, a 13-year-old son and an 8-year-old daughter.

The largest increases occurred in homeowning, up 9.2 per cent; transportation, up nine per cent; and medical care, up 10 per cent.

Whew! If that is a typical, "middle income" family, heaven help most of us! Take the Nuttalls, for instance, with a son in college and two daughters who will be graduating from high school this year. That can hardly be called typical, we'd guess, but if it costs over \$15,000 for a family with a junior high-age son and a second grade-age daughter, imagine what it must cost families with several children in high school and college.

It's difficult to comprehend how much it costs an "average" family to live in the 1970s. Comes awfully close to telling our age, but we can remember about 20 years ago when our family was living on something like \$50 per week. Course, some people might not call that "living", but we got by then. If it takes \$15,000 now to live an average life, can't see how the wife gets by without working!

Chatted on the phone with Arlin Hartzog of Bovina Gin Co. the other day and the subject somehow turned to cotton. He reminded us that the next week or so is the prime time to plant cotton in this county.

Arlin pointed out that cotton production, according to the government, will probably be 500,000 bales short this year of what is needed for domestic use and export to other countries. Last week, cotton was quoted at 64 cents in New York and in Lubbock the price was quoted at 50 cents and up. The local ginner also said there will be a good demand this year for the type cotton grown in this area.

Might be a good year to plant cotton. Especially for those farmers in weak water areas and for those who lost out on dryland barley and wheat crops.

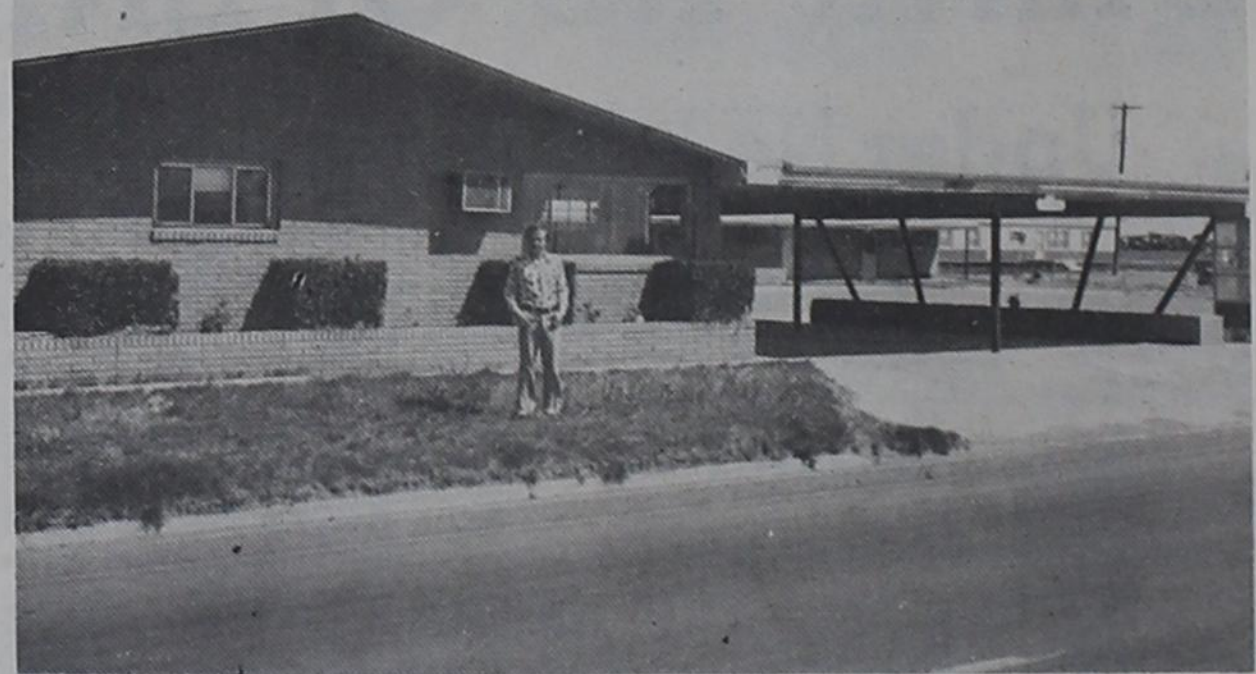

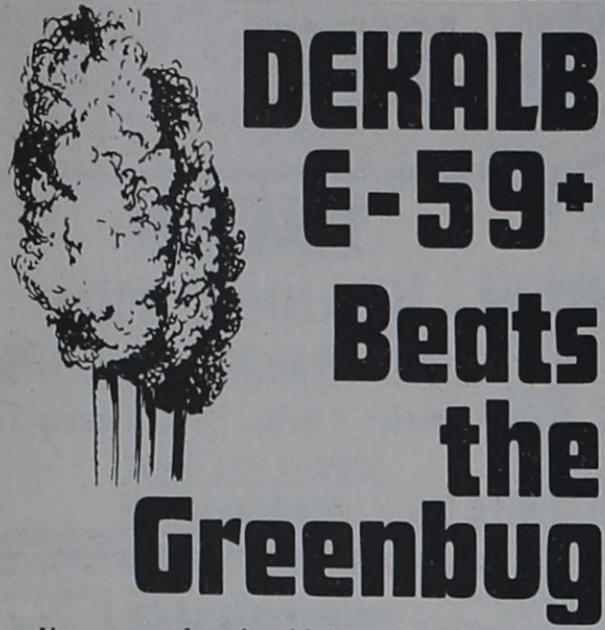

Seniors will sell refreshments throughout the day.

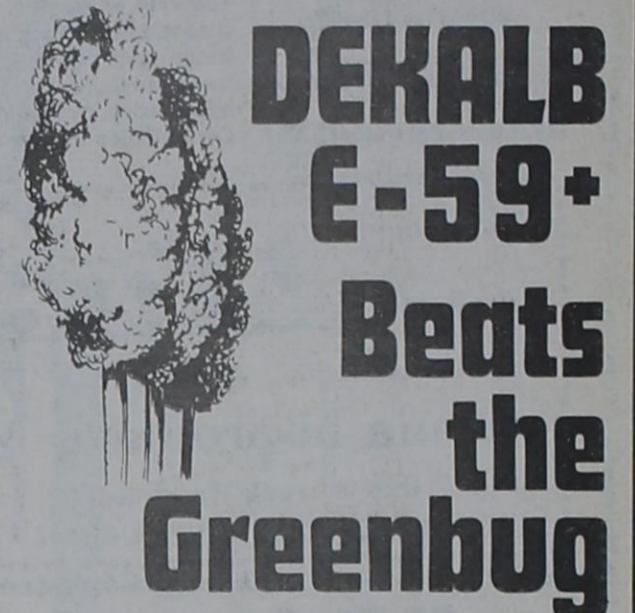

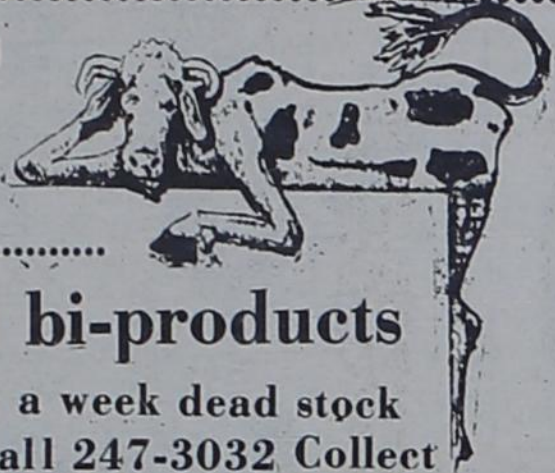

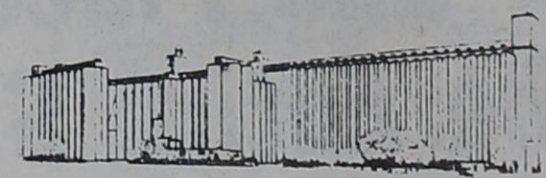
