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Races in Loraine Election

Competition shapes up on all fronts in Loraine's city election Tuesday.

Two community leaders — incumbent Vance Dickenson and Dr. Bruce H. Johnson — oppose each other in a race for mayor.

Seven candidates are on the ballot in a contest for three City Council places.

It is one of the most interesting municipal elections in years for Loraine.

On the ballot for council positions are Roy Richard, W. C. (Cliff) Henderson, James T. Green Jr., Virgil L. Walker, Loyd Ray Finch, B.W. Tartt and Mrs. Jimmie Lee Parker.

Incumbents in the race for councilmen are Green and Walker, who are seeking reelection.

Not seeking a return to the council is Luther Anders, third councilman whose term expires this spring.

Dickenson, who has served several years as mayor, is principal of Loraine High. Dr. Johnson, making his first bid in community politics, is owner and operator of Johnson Hospital.

The city ballot is a far cry from Saturday's Loraine school trustee ballot, which listed only three candidates for the three open board places.

7 Boys Win Hutchinson 4-H Prizes

Seven youngsters took home the prizes Thursday in Hutchinson Elementary School's annual 4-H Club Show.

Scoring a double blue ribbon win with two first place awards was Dwan Crow.

First places in the other two divisions of the show went to Jimmy Golden and Billy Adams.

The 4-H show was directed by Olson Sweat, fifth grade teacher and sponsor of the Hutchinson 4-H Club, and County Agent Jack Burkhalter.

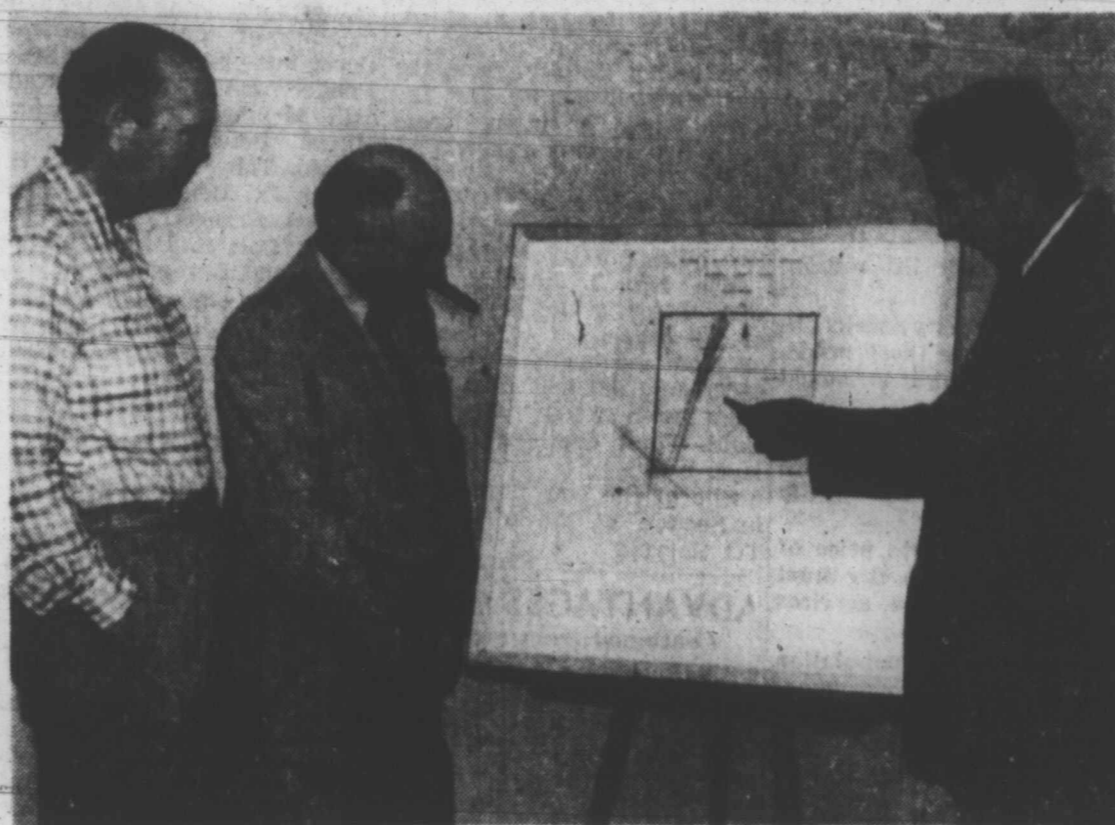
Judge for all divisions was Associate County Agent Al Byrd.

AIRPORT ENGINEER HERE

Parley Gives Nod for Airport Site Selection

City and Chamber of Commerce representatives discussed airport sites here Thursday with a Federal Aeronautics Administration engineer.

Immediately after the conference, the local group signaled a go-ahead for the selection of a municipal airport site.

Here from the FAA offices in Fort Worth was Bob Boswell, FAA airport engineer.

Conferring with him were John T. Merritt, Dr. Elton Berkman and City Councilman R. B. Baker, members of the Chamber of Commerce's aviation committee; Max Caddell, Jeff Taylor and Ernie Larmer, representing the chamber's executive group; and City Manager Rollin K. Sneathen.

The FAA engineer and City Manager Sneathen provided the conference with up to date data on the city's airport development efforts in the past and the status of the federal airport program under the new FAA agency.

Boswell checked prospective airport sites being studied by the city and listed various requirements for size, clearance and other factors, including zoning in an airport's vicinity.

The city is now in the process of selecting sites that would be adequate and convenient for a municipal airport.

Present landing strip south of the city is being leased on a month-to-month basis as a make-shift airport for the city. And the rental of the inadequate strip faces the possibility of being ended at any

time because the strip is being included in a gravel excavation project.

Gist of the planning coming from the conference Thursday is that the city will seek an airport site that can be developed gradually on local level or, if the project is feasible, to be developed under

the federal airport program of the FAA with government providing half of the funds.

Gradual or all-local financed development of the airport would be planned for dovetailing with any future federal airport program. In that manner, the city would be

EXPANSION AT STAKE

City Votes Tuesday On Limits, Council

Colorado City's qualified voters Tuesday will elect four city councilmen and decide whether the city expands its boundaries.

Seven candidates vying for interest in the municipal election.

But an even greater incentive balling may be the annexation proposal — an action that would stretch the city limits to include areas on both sides of Interstate 20 freeway and State Highway 208.

Actively supporting the annexation plan, recommended by a citizen's committee, are Chamber of Commerce directors and City Council.

Only one incumbent, Lawrence Ruddleck — is among the candidates seeking the four two-year council terms. The other six are newcomers to the city ballot.

Here is the order in which the seven will be listed on the ballot for voters Tuesday at City Hall:

Sam L. (Buzz) Majors, partner in Sam L. Majors-Jewellers.

Dr. Elton Berkman, associated with his wife here in the practice of chiropractic.

A. W. Hubbard, local cashier for Texas & Pacific Railway.

Lawrence Ruddleck, a assistant chief clerk at Col-Tex Refinery.

Ira Uttz, owner and operator of Colorado Tire & Supply.

Francis A. (Frank) Derogbus, owner of Frank Motor Company.

Eelon Harrell, farmer and

rancher residing here within the city.

Declining to seek reelection and, therefore, assuring the close of their City Council service are three veteran councilmen—Mayor Pro Tem L. J. Taylor, former mayor R. B. Baker and O. L. (Doc) Simpson.

Polls in City Hall will close at 7 p. m. Election staff will include Mrs. Roy Porter, Mrs. J. A. Sadler Jr. and Mrs. J. T. Holley.

Beginning at southwest corner of existing limits, and extending south to Labelle

Ave., east on Labelle Ave. to Colorado River; follows the river north to a line even with the extension of Canyon Ave.

East on Canyon Ave. to a line even with the extension of Sherman St.; north to the Texas & Pacific Railroad, then east to State Highway 208 (to Robert Lee); south to Block 43, containing Wallace School and old City Water Works tract;

Then, north to the Texas & Pacific Railroad; East from Highway 208 for a distance of 5 blocks.

AT LUNCHEON EVENT

5 Advantages in Annexation Told

Five major civic advantages in annexation were emphasized Thursday at a special luncheon in Civic House.

The annexation proposal on the city election ballot Tuesday — shared the luncheon spotlight with candidates for City Council and Colorado Independent School District board of trustees.

Ernie Larmer, manager of the Chamber of Commerce — sponsoring organization for the luncheon, pointed out the five major progress points in favor of annexation.

"Perhaps the first and most important long-range benefit accruing to the city," Larmer stated, "will be the fact that this annexation area will come under our zoning ordinance."

"And the development in the area can be controlled to prevent development of substandard areas that require a large outlay of tax funds to eliminate after they have developed."

Other advantages for the overall city explained by Larmer are:

A. Subdivisions and individual planning, platting and development will be coordinated to assure alignment of streets and alleys, to provide adequate street width and utility service entrances.

B. Building and construction coming into the corporate limits of the city by annexation will become eligible for greater percentage loans (for construction financing). In addition, more loan sources will become available for the area coming into the city limits.

C. Residents of the annexed area will receive full time garbage, police and fire protection — municipal services essential in promoting the growth and development of a city.

D. Residents of the annexed area will begin to assume their share of the city tax program that pays for such community-wide facilities as park, swimming pool, city recreation program, maintenance of city streets — which they have enjoyed formerly.

'Team Effort Wins' Coach Tells Crowd

Coach Max Bumgardner of San Angelo College "tickled the ribs" of 250 persons at the Second Annual Quarterback Club here Friday night . . . and then settled down to talk seriously of sports and life.

Bumgardner, successful athletic director and head coach of San Angelo College, kept the crowd-foaming for 20 minutes with jokes and bits of humor.

And then told the crowd — predominately high school students — that football is not only a sport, but a way of life.

He compared sports to the Biblical story of Eleazar, a captain in King David's Army.

"Eleazar played the game to the hilt in his battle against the giant-like Philistines . . . he gave it all he had . . . regardless of the odds . . . and won a team victory," the mentor said.

Loraine Has Big Write-In

Incumbent Warren Costin and two newcomers in school affairs — Roy Noble and Osie Roberts — Saturday won terms as Colorado Independent School District trustees.

They led a seven-candidate ballot here at City Hall when 512 voters within the school district cast ballots.

Loraine voters, in a separate election, elected two incumbents — Plez Beaty and Royce Mahon — along with Rae Furlow in balloting that featured a spirited write-in vote.

Total 172 ballots were cast in the Loraine election. Furlow, Beaty and Mahon were the only names on the ballot and, therefore, all votes for Brame and Butler were write-ins.

In voting for the Mitchell County School Board, C. C. Thompson was re-elected trustee at large without opposition, polling 273 votes in Colorado City and 163 in Loraine. Renamed county trustee for Precinct 1, also without opposition was A. K. McCarley with 264 votes here in Colorado City.

CITY MANAGER REPORTS

Needed Projects Carry \$770,000 Price Tag

City Manager Rollin K. Sneathen Friday tabulated more than \$770,000 in needs for Colorado City.

Approximately \$77,200 were listed as "immediate" for 1959.

The remainder — nine projects amounting to \$695,550 — are apparent now and may be critical needs at any time.

At the time, Sneathen emphasized that municipalities — especially those the size of Colorado City — are now "boxed in" by a series of circumstances that require more and more services for the tax-paying public, result in increasing costs and expenditures and, yet, limit the size and sources of income for cities.

Sneathen, principal speaker

at a busy luncheon program in Civic House, traced the history of municipal services and their broadening growth in today's modern fire, police and public works programs.

"From all this it may be seen that the activities of the city have mushroomed to such an extent," the city manager said, "that the box walls are getting higher and higher."

"And the additional needs of the city will be harder to get into the box."

To provide his audience with "an idea of the present needs" of the city of Colorado City, Sneathen listed these current 1959 needs and their costs:

Codification of all city ordinances, \$4,500; two additional police patrolmen, \$6,800;

fire truck designed especially for trash, grass and country fires, \$12,000; new maintainer for street department, \$9,000; two new pickup trucks for water and street departments, \$2,800; two new police patrol cars, \$2,200.

New truck chassis for sanitation department, \$3,500; water system for cemetery, \$24,000; one part-time employe for cemetery, \$1,200; additional remodeling on Recreation Center, \$3,500; more playground equipment, \$2,000; one part-time park employe for spring and summer, \$1,200; boat launching ramp at Lake Colorado City Park, \$1,000; water department warehouse and shop, \$3,500.

NEW SHARON SITE

Westbrook Field Logs Producer

New oil producer for Mitchell County's Westbrook Field is Humble Oil & Refining Co. 4 Phelan.

The oiler was completed for daily pumping of 4220 barrels of 25.9 gravity oil, plus 50 per cent water.

Production was from perforations between 3,180 and 3,190 feet. Depth was plugged back to 3,249 feet from an original 3,288 feet.

Site for the No. 4 Phelan is 1,980 feet from north and

east lines of Section 49, Block 28, T-1-N, T&P Survey. Spotted as a new location in the county's Sharon Ridge.

1700 Field is Simms & Weaver of Amarillo No. 11 J. D. Fuller, four miles southeast of Ira.

The No. 11 Fuller will be 990 feet from south and 990 feet from west lines of 201-acre lease in Lot 8, C. A. O'Keefe Survey.

In Nolan County, near the east Mitchell County line, the Nena Lucia (Strawn Reef) Field has logged a new producer.

It is the Humble Oil & Refining Co. 7 Jahew Jameson, five miles northeast of Silver.

The No. 7 Jameson was finished for a daily potential of 179 barrels of 44.5 gravity oil from perforations between 6,973 and 6,981 feet after treatment with 2,500 gallons of fluid. Total depth was 7,080 feet.

Site of the new producer is in Section 88, Block 1-A, H&TC Survey.

by the city manager add up to \$77,200 in cash by best estimate.

But the future requirements would require almost 10 times as much — \$699,500.

Big Slice of the future costs are in the city's share of a municipal airport, the expense of expanding the municipal water supply and treatment plant, and construction of new facilities at City Hall.

Sneath estimated the city's portion of a new municipal airport — land purchase and construction under the federal airport program with federal government paying half the expense — would be \$210,000.

However, the city manager stipulated that it was his personal belief that airport development costs should be on a countywide basis for the county as a whole would benefit from airport service.

Tab for duplicating or doubling the city's water treatment plant would be approximately \$250,000. And although this need is listed as "future requirement," year-to-increase in water usage may make this a critical necessity within a short period.

Sneath said the City Hall is delinquent as to fire, police, city council, courtroom and administrative offices. It also has insufficient vault capacity, he said. And the price of providing sufficient facilities would be \$160,000.

Other "future requirements" listed by Sneath follow with cost estimates:

Two new dump trucks for street department, \$2,500; new traffic signals downtown and extension of white-way street lighting, \$20,000; remodeling and installation of filters at Ruddleick Park swimming pool, \$15,000; new concession stand at Lake Colorado City Park, \$12,000; replacement of pumps and switching equip-

ment at sewerage lift station, \$25,000.

But as the city seeks to solve and finance these needs, Sneath explained, it is "boxed in" by:

(1) High level and broad coverage of municipal services to which citizens are becoming accustomed.

(2) General rise in price of goods and services a city must buy to provide the services demanded.

(3) Increase in population which municipal government must serve, therefore increasing the cost of services.

(4) Restrictions imposed by state constitution, city charter, statutes, judicial decisions which "severely limit" the sources of revenue and the amount of revenue obtained.

In addition, the state has now entered the field of setting salaries and working hours and conditions for police and firemen (in cities 10,000 population and above) and this will probably be felt by Colorado City within a couple of years as population increases here.

(5) Reasonable attitude of city employees that they participate in same standards of American life as other workers, thus obtain fringe benefits and other working conditions.

"This box also has a lid," Sneath stated, "and that lid is tradition or what purports to be tradition. Most municipalities, and ours is no exception," he continued, "find it beyond our capacity to break out of the box."

"But tradition, habit, old patterns... keep us inside." "I have attempted to inform you of the limits within the box," Sneath concluded, "so you can understand those limits and help in the broadening of the dimension to make more room for even greater service by the city administration."

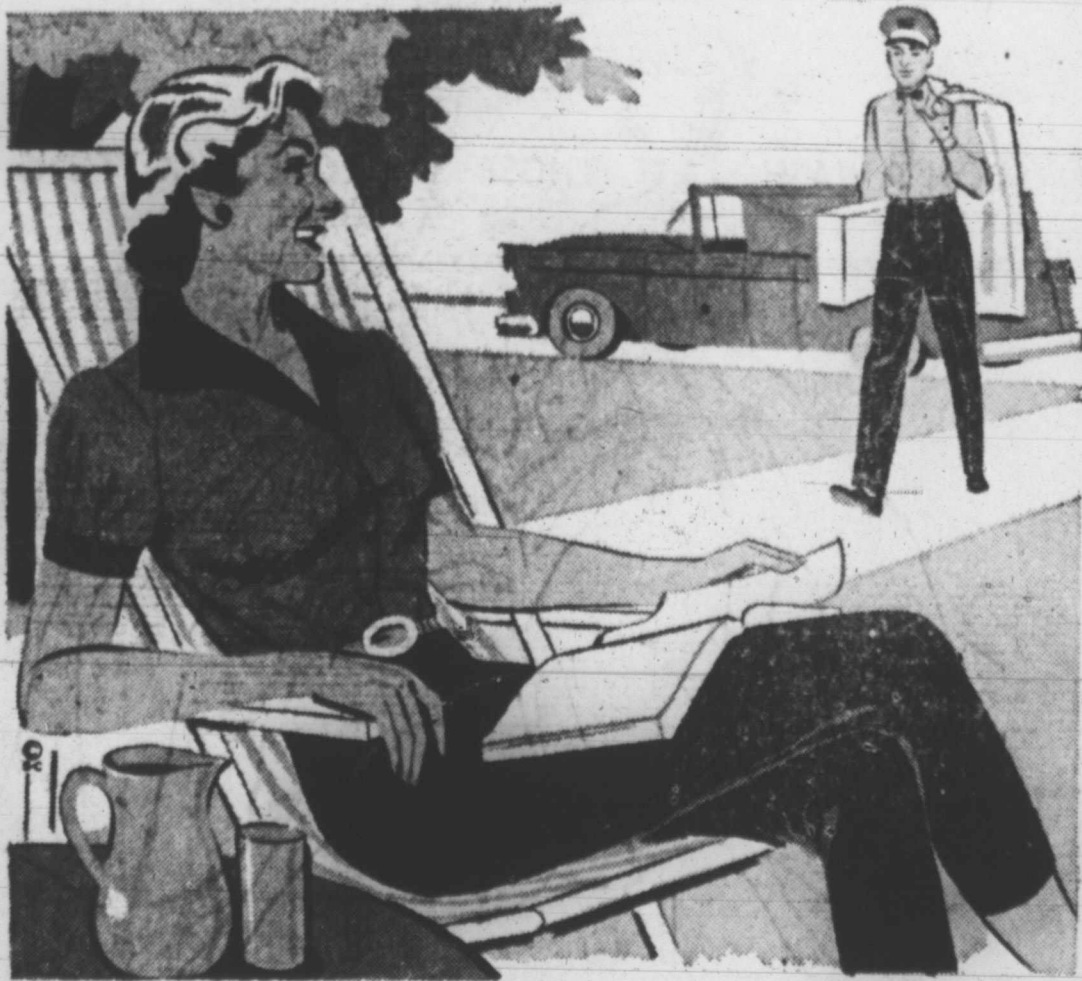

Planting date for blue panic, sorghum, and Johnson grass and weeping love grass is April 15 through Aug. 31, and for rye is Sept. 1 through Nov. 30, Worley reported.

Applications for payment under the 1958 wool program must be filed not later than April 30 at the County ASC Office.

Producers will be eligible for payments to be made this year under the 1958 program for wool and unshorn lambs marketed during the period April 1, 1958 through March 31, 1959.

Producers who have not delivered their sales slips to the County ASC Office are requested to do so as soon as possible. Marketing charges, record of purchases of unshorn lambs where shearings are reported in wool sales, names of counties where sheep have ranged, pastured or fed, and location of applicant's headquarters must be reported to county office when filing your application.

Loans are available to eligible producers through the County ASC Office for the construction or purchase of facilities for farm storage of eligible grains and seed.

Loans may be obtained for facilities without obtaining a commodity loan on the stored commodity. Loans are for a four-year period at an interest rate of 4% per annum. Full information concerning this program will be furnished at the ASC Office, Worley said.

The excess wheat must be destroyed by May 10, 1959. Farmers with excess wheat acreage are requested to notify ASC office when excess is destroyed.

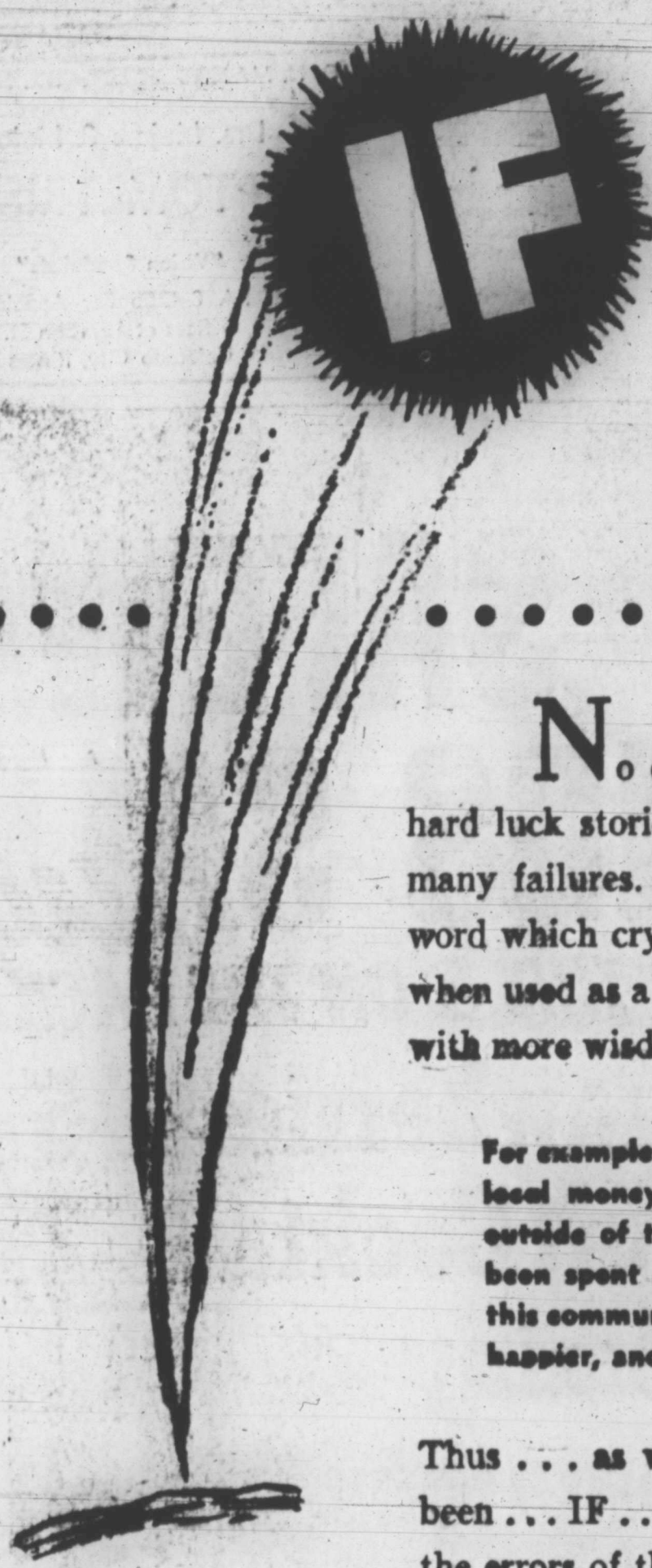

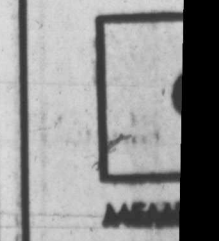

R. R. TULLY JR., SPEAKER Social Security Discussion Highlights Buford Program

The Buford Home Demonstration Club was hostess last Friday to members and guests of the Looney and Carr HD Clubs for a special program concerning social security featuring a guest speaker.

R. R. Tully Jr., representative from Abilene office of Social Security, was program speaker for the meeting in the Buford School.

Mr. Tully was introduced by Mrs. Welden Wiggins, president of the Buford Club.

"The basic idea of old-age and survivors insurance under the social security law is a simple one," Mr. Tully informed the group. "During working years employers, their employees, and self-employed people pay social security taxes which go into special funds.

"And when earnings have stopped because the worker has retired, or died, or is disabled and is 50 years of age or over, benefit payments are made from the funds to replace part of the earnings the family has lost," Tully stated. "Everyone who pays or has paid social security tax should write to the main SS office every two or three years, requesting a record of the amount of their old-age and survivors insurance." Tully emphasized in his talk. "This is also helpful in keeping the social security account and number straight."

"Nine out of ten working

people are building protection for themselves and their families under the social security law," Tully said.

In his discussion Tully explained social security rights and responsibilities to the group. A question and answer session followed the discussion.

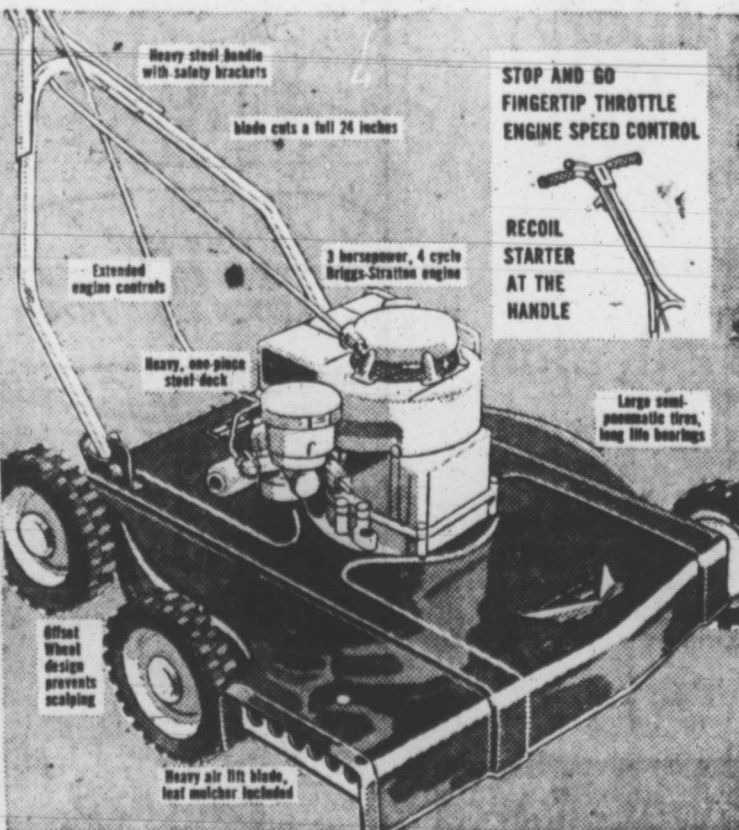

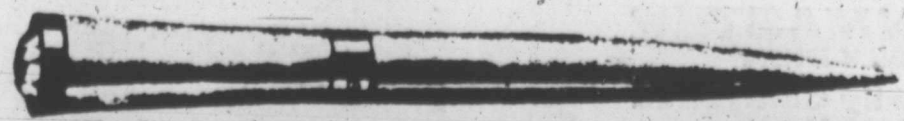

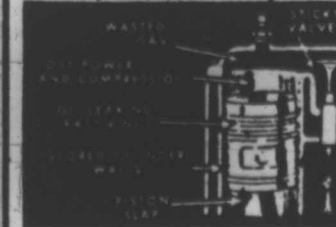
