CAUSES ALARM

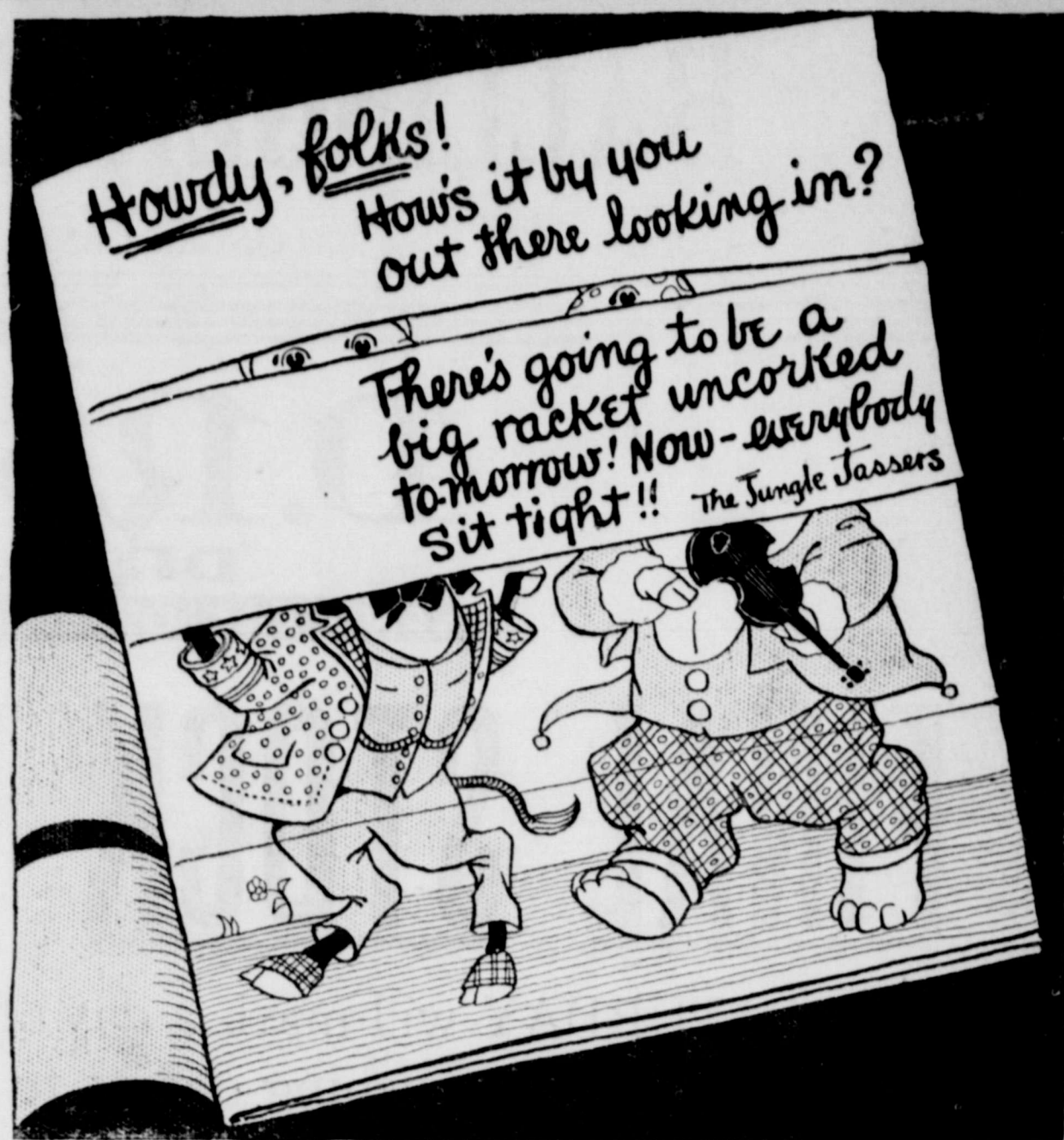
Mrs. Laura Wooten wandered

night and take care of the un-
fortunate woman pending prepa-
rations for carrying her to the
asylum.

Mr. and Mrs. Hinkle heard Mrs.
Wooten when she left the room
about ten o'clock Thursday night,
and attempted to stop her, but
before they could overtake her
and place her under restraint, she
escaped. After a brief search
without success, the friends called
for help by turning in the
fire alarm, and for about two
hours quite a crowd of men were
out seeking for Mrs. Wooten.
About twelve o'clock she returned
to the Hinkle home, and it is
reported that she told friends she
had been out walking.

Mrs. Wooten was placed under
guard for the remainder of the
night, and arrangements are be-
ing perfected for taking her to
the hospital for insane, where it
is hoped that she will recover.

Following the death of her
husband, County Superintendent
Wooten, who was stricken down
with appendicitis while attending
one of the most popular men in
the county, and the family has
many friends throughout the
county who will be grieved to
learn of the tragedy which has
befallen them, and trust that
proper care and treatment will
restore Mrs. Wooten to her good
health and sound mind.
Rev. and Mrs. W. C. Kunze will
leave in the morning to accom-
pany the Wooten boys with their
mother to San Antonio, where
Mrs. Wooten will be placed in an
asylum. The boys have been
rooming at the home of Rev. and
Mrs. Kunze, and it was at their
request that Rev. and Mrs. Kunze
go with them to San Antonio
with their mother. The trip will
be made through the county in
a car.

The schedule will start next
Tuesday night with games be-
tween the Bulldogs and the

Treasurer. An admission of 15c

Gordon W. Northern, of Fort
Worth, has accepted the presi-
dency of the West Texas Baseball
League, according to information
received in Ballinger, and will
sign up with the directors at an
early date. Northern was elected
president at the meeting of the
league held at Sweetwater last
month.

The contract with the presi-
dent, as agreed upon by the di-
rectors, provides that Mr. North-
ern spend the entire playing sea-
son in the league, and he can not
leave in Ft. Worth and look after
the league's interests. He must
reside in the league and visit
from time to time the various
club towns.

The contract also provides that
he make a \$10,000 bond for the
faithful performance of his duties
in making monthly financial
statements to the president of
every club in the league and for
furnishing weekly players and
team standings, averages, etc. He
will draw a salary of \$1800 if
there are six teams in the field
and a salary of \$2400 per year,

should the league be increased to
eight clubs, and he will be sub-
ject to dismissal at any time by a
majority of the club directors,
should his services as president
prove inefficient.

The league will meet at Stam-
ford on Dec. 20th, for the pur-
pose of discussing other matters
for the coming season and to ad-
mit two more clubs, if it is de-
cided wise. Lubbock, Plainview and
Big Spring are wanting in the
league, but it has not been deter-
mined whether the distance will
keep them out or not.

Citation by Publication THE STATE OF TEXAS, To the Sheriff or any Constable of Runnels County—Greeting:

You are hereby commanded to summon C. E. Nelson and A. Lewis, by making publication of this Citation once in each week for four successive weeks previous to the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in your County, if there be a newspaper published therein, but if not, then in any newspaper published in the Thirty-fifth Judicial District, but if there be no newspaper published in said Judicial District, then in a newspaper published in the nearest District to said Thirty-fifth Judicial District, to appear at the next regular term of the District Court of Runnels County, to be held at the Court House thereof, in Ballinger, Texas, on the first Monday in January A. D., 1922, the same being the 2nd day of January A. D., 1922, then and there to answer a petition filed in said Court on the 15th day of August A. D., 1921, in a suit, numbered on the docket of said Court No. 2070, wherein G. L. Dunn and W. E. Dunn are Plaintiffs, and A. Lewis, C. E. Nelson, W. V. Thraves and D. M. Hillyard and John Q. McAdams, trustees for the Winters Oil & Gas Co., are Defendants, and said petition alleging that on December 10th, 1918, R. D. Colwell and Minnie E. Colwell were the owners in fee simple and in possession of the following-described land situated in Runnels County, Texas; Being 500 acres out of the T. J. Harde-man Survey No. 267, Abstract 234, Certificate 15, and being fully described by metes and bounds in deed from L. P. Hinde to said R. D. Colwell and recorded in Volume 82 page 248 of the Deed Records of Runnels County, to which reference is made in said petition; and that plaintiffs are now the owners of and in possession of said lands and premises; that on December 10th, 1918, said R. D. Colwell and wife executed and delivered to D. M. Hillyard and John Q. McAdams, trustees for the Winters Oil & Gas Co., an oil and gas lease on the above 500 acres of land, wherein the said lessees and their assigns were granted the privilege to enter upon said premises for the purpose of drilling for oil and gas and doing such things necessary in said operations. Said oil lease provided that if no well was commenced on said lands on or before December 10th, 1919, said lease should terminate as to both parties unless the lessees or their assigns should pay to lessors the sum of 20 cents per acre which rental operate to defer drilling operations for a period of 12 months from said date.

That defendants are claiming some interest in said lands and premises by virtue of said oil and gas lease and purported assignments made of portions of said lands covered in said lease; that defendants and each of them have forfeited all interest in said lease contract, by reason of having failed to begin drilling operations on said leased premises or paying the rental as provided therein; and that defendants' claims constitute a cloud on plaintiffs' title and if allowed to stand upon the records of this county will greatly damage plaintiffs and their peaceable possession and enjoyment of their title in said lands.

Wherefore premises considered, plaintiffs pray that the defendants and each of them, be cited in terms of law to appear and answer this petition; that upon hearing hereof they have judgment for title and possession of said land, and cancelling and annulling said oil lease contract and all assignments made thereunder, and quieting their title in them in said lands and premises, and for such other relief they may be entitled to.

Herein fail not but have before said court, at its aforesaid next regular term, this writ, with your return thereon, showing how you have executed the same.

State Offers Rebuttal In Miller Case at Brownwood

BROWNWOOD, Dec. 9.—The Miller murder case which has been occupying the district court here since Monday, will not go to the jury before Saturday afternoon, or Saturday night, according to counsel in the trial today.

The state began offering rebuttal testimony this morning, following a long story related by the defendant in his own behalf. Bob Miller took the stand yesterday afternoon, and a crowded court room heard him review the difficulties he and Bengie had, covering a period of about two years. Miller stated in the outset that Bengie had on more than one occasion threatened to kill Miller. The defendant went into detail in reviewing these happenings, finally leading up to the time of the killing.

Miller stated that he first met Bengie in 1904. They became friends and were good friends until about two years ago, when Bengie fell out with him while Miller was carrying the mail because Miller would not bring him cases of extracts. Bengie abused him for declining to make such deliveries, and Miller said that he told Bengie that Mrs. Bengie and the girls objected to it. Miller told of a time when Bengie sent a check by him to town to get cashed, which Miller stated that he did and brought Bengie the money. Next day Bengie accused him of holding out part of the money, and they had some words.

On another occasion Miller hauled a negro to town from the Bengie ranch, as a passenger on his mail car. Bengie tried to make Miller pay him \$40 which he claimed the negro owed Bengie, and accused Miller of taking the negro off. This time the quarrel over the money shortage in connection with the check cashing came up again, and Bengie claimed it was \$11 short, while the first day he accused Miller of holding out \$30. After this Miller stated that he had as little to do with Bengie as possible and shunned him.

After Miller was elected sheriff Bengie asked him for a deputyship, testified Miller, and he refused the request and told Bengie he was drinking too much to be an officer. Later Miller and R. D. Shamate, prohibition enforcement officer, went to the Bengie ranch to investigate drinking among the Mexican laborers on the ranch. They arrested a Mexican and put him in jail. They had some words with Bengie on this visit.

Next day Miller and Shamate returned to the Bengie ranch, having been notified that they over-looked the booze. The officers met Bengie and told him their mission. Before going to the Bengie house they took a pistol off Bengie. This angered Bengie and a few minutes later he snatched another pistol from a desk and held it against Miller while cursing him. Shamate disarmed Bengie again. Mrs. Bengie urged her husband to behave. Shamate arrested Bengie, and with an oath Bengie said "I will get both of you. This is Tom Bengie talking." The officers carried Bengie to Millersview, and at that place Bengie got hold of an axe, but Shamate made him drop it. Miller told how he captured a ear load of tequila and four Mexicans. Said the Mexicans could speak good English and told him that the tequila was for Mr. Bengie, saying that Bengie had sent them after the stuff. From this time on relationship between Bengie and Miller grew more serious, according to the defendant.

Miller related incidents leading up to the killing, and stated he had been repeatedly warned by friends that he would be killed by Bengie, and that on the day of the killing when Bengie came to Eden, where Miller was living, that friends warned him to be on his guard that a well formed conspiracy had been laid for Bengie to kill him. The actions of Bengie and his friends caused the defendant to believe that his time had come, unless he left town.

KIRK IS STAR FOR BAYLOR

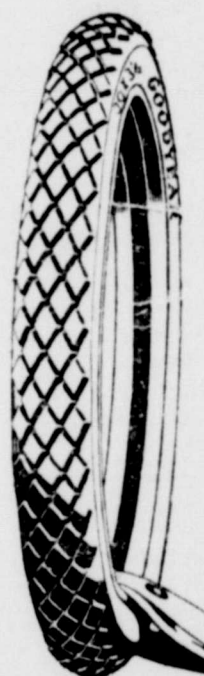

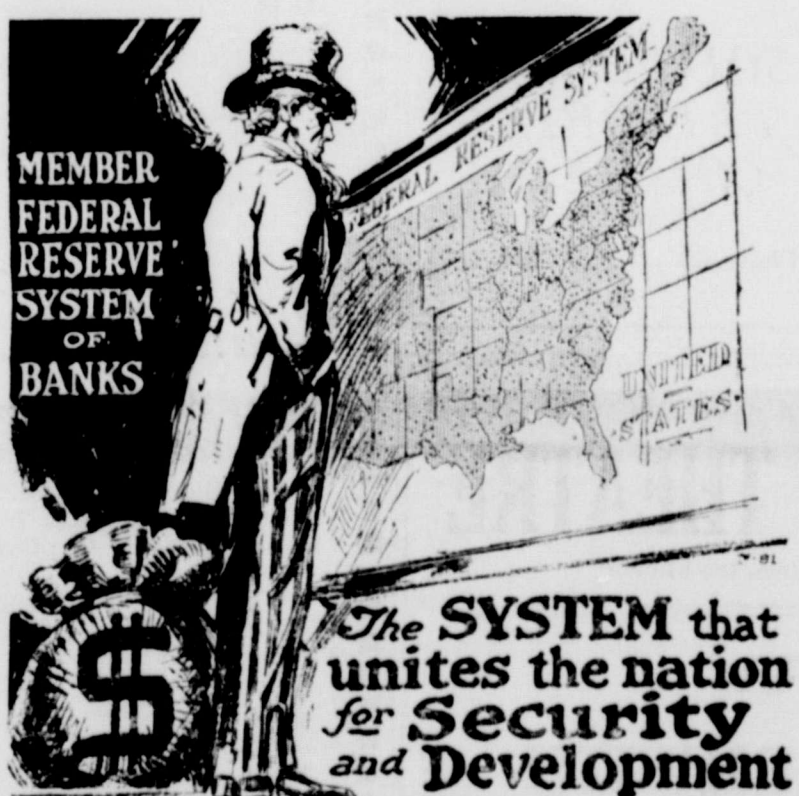

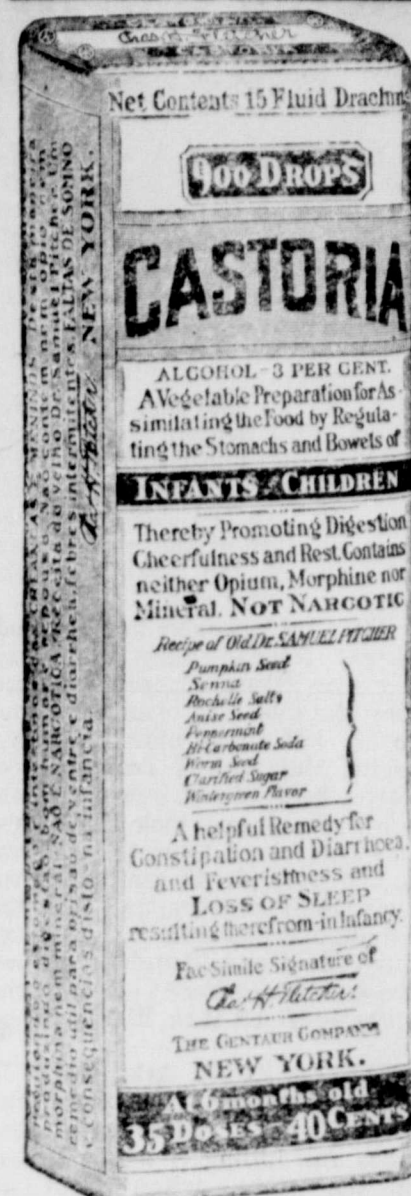

Noted Bandit Battles Way Out of Arkansas Prison

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Dec. 9.—Warden Dempsey, Mrs. Dempsey and son and two daughters, were locked in a cell by Tom Slaughter, sentenced to hang, and the convict made his escape in Mrs. Dempsey's auto which was standing in front of the prison gates last night.

Later this morning Slaughter passed thru Benton, about twenty-five miles South of Little Rock and engaged in a gun battle with the city marshal there, who had been notified of the escape and who was on the lookout for the prisoners.

After the prisoners had escaped, it was learned that Slaughter, feigning illness, succeeded in getting the guard to open the door to his cell about nine-thirty last night, and with a smuggled revolver held up this guard and another guard and took their pistols and forced them to go ahead to the stockade, where their presence admitted them, and then the bandit overpowered the guard on duty there and Slaughter opened the cells and offered all the prisoners confined their liberty.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Dec. 9.—Tom Slaughter, the notorious bandit, who is under death sentence for killing a trusty guard at the state prison farm at Tucker, some time ago, made his escape from the penitentiary here at two-thirty o'clock this morning, taking six other convicts with him.

For five hours prior to his escape Slaughter ruled the penitentiary walls like a czar on his throne, and offered liberty to all convicts who wanted to escape. Only six accepted the bandit's offer to escape. Five of the prisoners who escaped with him are negroes, four of whom are under death sentence, and who were expected to be hanged at an early date, together with Slaughter.

Six negroes from Phillips county, Arkansas, under death sentence for participating in race riots in 1919, refused to leave the prison with Slaughter, although their way was clear, and they were offered an opportunity to flee from the shadow of the gallows.

Slaughter was confined in the death cell, and was under guard, but despite that fact someone smuggled a revolver into his cell, and armed with this the prisoner outwitted the trusty guard on duty last night, and took complete charge of the prison, and for several hours held the guards at bay and gave his prison mates full opportunity to leave the prison before he stepped out and made his get-away.

A posse is scouring the country in an effort to capture the convicts, and it is expected that all will make a fight for their lives, and none will probably be taken alive, as they are sure to hang if captured. In the meantime the prison authorities are making an investigation in an attempt to learn how the bandit was furnished with a pistol.

SHIP CREW HELD BY MEXICANS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9.—Advices to the state department today from American Consul Burdette, at Ensenada, Mexico, said that all members of the crew of the American fishing boat, Mabel, which was seized by the Mexican patrol several days ago, are being held prisoners by the Mexicans.
