TO BED ROCK IN ORIENT QUESTION

Officials Discourage False Hope That Road May Be Saved By Eastern or European Interests.

MUST MAKE OPERATING COST

Several Big Roads Have Refused Purchase—Wheat and Oil Shipments Will Aid Road.

AUSTIN, Texas, July 25.—The people living along the line of the Orient should not be lulled into false hopes with regard to the probability of that line remaining in operation, nor should they repose any false hopes due to any report sent out indicating that the line is to be refinanced or rehabilitated by Eastern or European interests, according to statements issued in Austin by parties closely in touch with the entire railroad situation, and which statement follows the recent trip over the Orient made by Dr. Walter Splawn, member of the Railroad Commission, and President elect of the University of Texas, and by A. H. Swanson, auditor of the Texas Railroad Commission.

The facts are that the Orient Railroad is still in the hands of the Federal Receivers and has built up an operating deficit of \$4,907,000 as against an original investment in Texas of approximately \$7,000,000. The line has thus lost, not including interest and depreciation, more than three-quarters of its total cost, each year building up added deficits until the total of the same has now practically eaten up the property.

Those who may be tempted to lull themselves to sleep as to the fate of the Orient by assuming it may be purchased by one of the larger railroad systems should reflect upon the statement recently issued from Washington, showing that the Southern Pacific, Rock Island, Burlington, Santa Fe, and Missouri Pacific Railway Systems had each in turn turned down the purchase of the Orient, and each in turn refused to consider the leasing of the property, although several of these systems made a minute inspection of the Orient.

The State of Texas has made no effort to collect any tax through what is known as the Texas Intangible Tax Law on the Orient, though other railroads pay many millions of dollars into the State funds by operation of the intangible tax law. The only way the Orient may continue in operation now is by the road actually taking in enough money in passenger and freight traffic to make its naked operating expenses, and if it fails, operation of the road must stop.

In a final analysis, of course, authorization in Austin will make every effort to prevent the discontinuation of the operation of the line. Large wheat shipments on the northern end of the line in Texas, and the prospective oil shipments from the Big Lake territory will assist the Orient in holding down a possible deficit for the current year.

Believed Mayor Will Request Extension of Furlough From Coolidge For Marine Officer.

STARTS NEW VICE WAR

Director of Public Safety Won't Quit Unless Fired, and Then After "Red Hot Battle"

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., July 25.—Mayor Kendrick will request President Coolidge to extend the leave of Brigadier General Smedley D. Butler from the Marines as Public Safety Director for at least two years, it is generally believed here.

The request is expected to be forwarded to Washington within a week. President Coolidge, it is reported here, will extend Butler's furlough.

STORM IN OKLA

Territory of 100 Miles Radius From Oklahoma City Gets Two Inch Rain and Electric Storm.

LAUNCH LEGION DRIVE AT FEAST

Oscar McDonald Post Begins Campaign For Members With Watermelon Supper Thursday.

EXPLAINS LEGION AIMS

J. C. Babb Explains Bonus Insurance in Address—State Health Officer on Program.

Launching an extensive campaign for additional members to the Oscar McDonald Post, members of the Legion here entertained for the ex-soldiers and friends at the City Lake Thursday night with a watermelon supper, and added attractions on the evening's program included a short address by J. C. Babb, Legion member, music by the Sweetwater Booster Band, and a speech by Dr. C. B. Harris of Fort Worth, General Health Agent of Texas.

The melons were cut in fourths and served ice cold to a large crowd present for the program. Ladies were served first, after which "rookies" lined up and marched by the serving table in true army style and were handed out their portion of melons.

In a short preliminary talk, J. C. Babb expressed appreciation on behalf of the Post for the large number of ex-soldiers present, extended an invitation to all ex-soldiers to join the Legion and in the Legion work, and gave some useful information on the bonus insurance. He expressed the aim of the Legion as "to uphold and defend the Constitution, for God and Country, to maintain law and order, Americanism, preserve memory of the soldiers, to combat autocracy in the masses and in the classes, and to promote peace and good will on earth."

The Sweetwater Booster Band furnished several lively numbers for the occasion and also shared in the eating program.

At the close of the program, several new members were signed up to join the Legion, and others expressed their intention of joining later.

The program was continued with an address by Dr. C. B. Harris, who came here from Fort Worth to deliver an address on public health at the Legion supper. Although the speaker was late in arriving, a fair sized crowd heard the interesting and helpful talk made by the well known physician who has appeared on the platform at many Texas cities.

Public health, the romance of medical achievement, and practical information on causes and prevention of disease were the high points touched in Harris' talk. He touched upon scientific discoveries in medical treatment, civic health, and urged the use of an educated, licensed physician for the treatment of ills. He appeared here under the auspices of the State Board of Medical Examiners, and the Texas Medical Association. Dr. Harris returned to Fort Worth Thursday night.

LOEB DIRECTED KILLERS HUNT

Gave Reporters Bum Tips in Franks Slaying, Witness Says—Discussed Case Freely.

SAID HE KNEW FRANKS

"Kind of Kid Anybody Would Kidnap and Kill" Witness Testifies Loeb Said of Victim.

CRIMINAL COURT ROOM, CHICAGO, Ill., July 25.—Richard Loeb brazenly directed the hunt for the slayers of Robert Franks two days after the murder, Howard Mayor, a Chicago reporter, testified at the judicial hearing of Loeb and Leopold today.

Mayor said he was working on the University of Chicago campus when he met Loeb. The conversation turned to the murder. "Loeb said he did not think the kidnapers would meet Jacob Franks to collect the \$10,000 or be at the drug store where Robert's father had been directed to go," Mayor said. "He suggested that I make a round of the South side drug stores in the hope that I might find the one to which Franks had been directed."

Alvin Goldstein, another reporter, former class mate of Loeb's, testified that he met Loeb in front of the Franks home the evening of May 22. "He asked me what all the excitement was about, and I told him of the murder," Goldstein said. "Then I saw him again the next day with a group of friends. They had several papers dealing with the murder."

"One of the group asked Loeb if he knew Franks, and what sort of a fellow he was. Loeb replied that he knew him, and he was 'the kind of a kid that anybody would kidnap and kill.'"

Tells of Finding Typewriter.

CRIMINAL COURT ROOM, CHICAGO, Ill., July 25.—Frank Blair, tall and rangy young man, a prominent lawyer, described at the judicial hearing of Nathan Leopold Jr., and Richard Loeb, slayers of Robert Franks, how he searched the depths of a lagoon at Jackson Park for the portable typewriter on which the youths wrote the \$10,000 letter to the victim's father.

The battered machine was placed before the witness, and he told of finding it on the bottom of the lagoon. He made the successful search after others had failed. After many hours, he was about to give up, when he saw the typewriter half buried in the mud, 14 feet below the surface.

Blair received \$1,000 for the find.

Extinguish Prairie Fire.

READY FOR ROPE

Men Who Were "Too Drunk" to Remember Crime Spent Last Hours With Families.

MERIDAN, Miss., July 25.—Resigned to their fate, Frank Atkinson and Clyde Greer, convicted murderers of R. H. Bryant, spent the last hours before walking to the gallows this afternoon with their families.

The wives and children of the convicted men spent most of last night in their cells. Both reiterated their innocence and said if they killed Bryant, they were "too drunk" to remember it.

Barring interference from the Governor's office, they will stand back to back on the scaffold this afternoon, and go to their death with one spring of the trap.

When the noose claims the life of Atkinson this afternoon, it will be the second time that his wife has been widowed by the law. Nine years ago her first husband, Allen Westbrook, was hanged for the murder of Mr. and Mrs. Columbus Cleveland, father and mother of Mrs. Atkinson.

BIG FIVE MEET

Attempt Compromise in Unofficial Meeting as Bankers Disagree in London Parley.

LONDON, Eng., July 25.—With the gulf between the French and the Anglo-American bankers as wide as ever, the Big Five—Ambassador Kellogg, Premier MacDonald, Herriot, and Steunin, and Count Stefani—met today at No. 10 Downing street to resume the struggle for compromise.

The meeting of the first committee of the conference, which has to deal with points under dispute, was postponed until the outcome of the unofficial meeting was learned.

ENGLISH RODEO

British authorities have dismissed the charge against the American cowboys at Wembley on the condition that the steer roping contest hereafter be excluded from the show. The incident generally is considered closed.

One of the interesting phases of the disapproval of the British spectators was the letter written the Manchester Guardian by a Britisher who purported to know all about life on the American plains. He alleged that he had spent many years there. But he condemns rodeos in general as not "a show for sportsmanlike people," and he particularly arraigns the "bullocks or oxen roping contests."

When American cowboys on this side of the water read of the 'bullock' roping exhibition they will get as sound a laugh as the American baseball fans who read the Englishman's account of a baseball contest as a game played with "hand protectors resembling very much elephants' ears."

LABOR AND PROHIBITION

"The average man is the greatest gainer from prohibition. It is not the men and women who work for a living and are busily engaged in producing the wealth of the nation who are agitating against prohibition.

"It is somewhat a mystery to us men engaged in the dangerous business of railroading why any wage-earner would want to return to the misery of the evils of pre-Volstead days. To say that the Eighteenth Amendment has been a total failure, that the drink habit is as bad or worse than before, we know is simply propaganda of those interested in the return of a business that has done more to retard civilization and human progress than any one thing in the world's history. We men in the railroad game know that the Eighteenth Amendment has been the greatest blessing we ever received; we know we are better off morally, financially, intellectually and in every other way by the outlawing of the booze business."—John Gordon Cooper, Congressman from Ohio, and member of Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers.

THE "OTHER FELLOW"

About 15,700 lives were lost in motor accidents (exclusive of grade crossing collisions between motor vehicles and trains) in the United States during 1923, an increase of nearly 2,000 over the 1922 record. Grade crossing fatalities make a total exceeding 17,000. This estimate was made by the National Safety Committee of the Automobile Department of the National Bureau of Casualty and Surety Underwriters on the basis of statistics of 135 cities.

This year it was little Finland which gave a sterling exhibition of stamina and endurance such as the modern world has seldom seen. Facing the barrier against the pick of people of 112,000,000, the little Nordic nation battled desperately, heroically, against overwhelming odds. And, indirectly, these odds were numerical, for had Finland such a population to draw from as has this country, the 1924 Olympics might have told a different tale.

Milk Improvement Association Backs Move in K. C.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., July 25.—Plans to establish a city milk laboratory with a full-time bacteriologist in charge, to assure Kansas City of a better milk supply, were announced this week by the park commission.

The Milk Improvement association is pushing the movement, and officers of that organization have declared that if the city will not employ the bacteriologist, then that organization will provide for one.

A field worker for the association declared in a meeting of the commissioners that he had records showing that 35 per cent of the milk taken from dairies outside the association's membership tested from 15 to 30 per cent water.

CANT RETURN MEATS

Perishable Goods May Be Exposed to Disease, Inspector Rules.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., July 25.—Perishable goods must not be returned to grocery stores and meat markets, according to an edict issued this week by a city food inspector.

The statement was issued following complaints of the dealers that mothers sent their children to the market for food, and the youngsters forgot just what was wanted and it had to be sent back. Perhaps it has been where there is disease, or left lying where it is exposed for several hours. All grocers and meat dealers are being instructed by the inspector to refuse to accept returned goods.

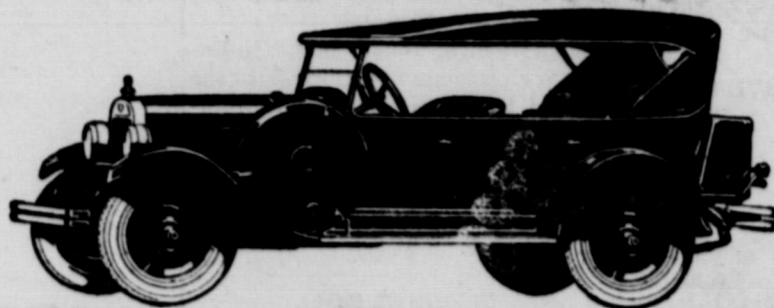

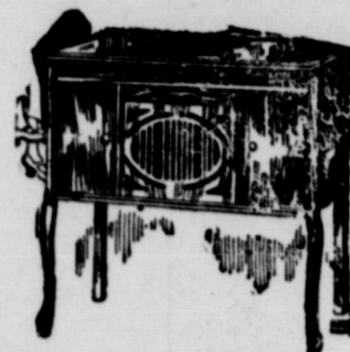

COTTON

Recent sensational rises in the cotton market, coupled with short carry-overs for the last three years and the present excellent crop outlook, mean an excellent chance for 30 cent cotton this fall and the general prosperity for this section that cotton either makes or breaks, according to

cotton men and farmers.

Reports are that the crop now has sufficient moisture, and that no serious crisis from lack of rain is anticipated before the first ten or fifteen days in August. Cotton raisers stand but little chance to lose on this year's crop, it is said, for if it is small, hikes in the cotton market that have recently occurred will in all probability be duplicated.

Short carry-overs and excellent cotton prices during the last few seasons have put cotton on a basis of supply and demand than an speculation, according to those in the game both as producers and buyers. Good cotton prices have brought about an increased acreage, and have made the general condition of this section more than ever dependent upon the cotton crop.

The dope is that West Texas has everything to win on the cotton crop this year. Even with no rain before the early part of August, a high price for the crop is virtually assured. Rain will mean an increased yield, and an equalization of prices in

proportion to the acreage.

West Texas is confident. Cotton should repeat its performance of the last three years, and sustain the general prosperity of this section.

REPORTS HIDDEN GOLD

Deer Hide Map Figures in Modern Buried Treasure.

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., July 25.—Somewhere in Saline County, Missouri, awaiting the romantic pick of some twentieth century treasure hunter, lies buried a large quantity of gold, if a story which has reached officials of the Missouri Resources Museum here is true.

The authorities received a letter this week from a man in Oklahoma, who inquired whether the officials here had in their possession a map, charted on a deer-skin and known as "The Deer Hide Map." The Oklahoma man went on to say that a quantity of gold being taken from California to New York by freighters was buried in Saline County, Missouri.

DROPS THIRTY DEGREES

Mercury Falls Rapidly Friday—Light Showers in West.

In contrast to the heat Thursday when the mercury climbed to 101 degrees in the afternoon, and hovered around 96 degrees the remainder of the day, the red line dropped down to 71 degrees Friday morning when a cold wind and a cloudy sky put an autumn feeling into the air.

The thermometer registered around 80 degrees later in the day. The T-P reported light showers on the west end of the division, but no heavy rains were reported.

BUILDING LOAN SAFE

Figures Show Successful Plan For Home Financing.

WICHITA, Kas., July 25.—That a safe plan to accumulate capital for home building is through building and loan associations is indicated by the record of these institutions for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1923.

These institutions had on June 30, 1923, assets amounting to \$3,342,530,000, the report states. And the aggregate loss from failure of building and loan associations for the entire United States for the year was less than \$50,000 or a loss of seven-thousandths of 1 per cent of the total assets of all associations.
