Conference of Organizations Submit Goals for 80's

Members of the Conference of Organizations met this past week with member of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce to present a set of goals which the Conference and minority organizations would like to see included in the Chamber's goals for the 80's.

Eight member of the Conference presented the new goal which were gathered in a series of meeting held in minority communities. The meeting were coordinated by different organizations. The meeting were held after many protests were made by different persons saying that the Goals for the 80's Committee organized by the Chamber of Commerce was not representative of the minority community and did not reflect some real necessities with the minority community. Committee members were criticized for have only a token few chicano and black on the committee.

The new goals addressed each of the categories addressed by the original committee. The new goals primarily focused on the human needs of Lubbock citizens.

Two new goals were proposed to the Committee on Agriculture. The first addressed the need to make use of existing job training centers to upgrade the skills of today's farm laborers so they may continue to serve productive roles in the farm economy. The second goal expressed a need to "establish a pilot project to establish line of communication between local communities and the migrant farm worker so that their human needs are met as they move from place to place." A suggestion was made to add to an existing goal that a program be developed "to reach young people in the minority communities that would make them aware that minority citizens hold higher level agriculture jobs than at the cotton chopping level."

A broad goal that suggested that the Committee on Cultural Affairs "strive for broader community-wide participation in programs that offer opportunities to share our

(minorities) culture with others," was proposed. The proposed goal pointed out the fact that one third of the Lubbock population was minority and that the present cultural programs provided only limited opportunities for the different ethnic groups in Lubbock to share their culture with each other. The goal proposed that there should be greater support for the 16th of September fiesta and that "the creation of a bilingual opera or other bilingual cultural events."

Three goals were proposed to the "Spirit of Lubbock Committee." The first addressed the redevelopment of the Guadalupe neighborhood. The goal stated that the redevelopment of the areas should be a top priority and not overshadowed by the Civic Center project. The second goal asked that any printed materials praising the Spirit of Lubbock should be provided also in Spanish, "so that all our citizens can be part of this important program to recognize our strengths as a people." The specific goal was suggested to designate a special observance each year to further a goal of improved human relations in Lubbock. A "Brotherhood Month" was suggested to "feature a variety of programs ranging from church observances to community wide programs to call attention to the need to improve the relationships of those individuals who are different from us."

A major concern of the group which presented the goals was the development of affordable housing for moderate income families in Lubbock. The group suggested that the Committee on the Economy "take every feasible step to promote and encourage" this development. It was proposed that the city pursue a workable program of tax exempt bonds to make additional funds available for home loans at a reduced interest rate. It was also proposed that the city work to promote new residential development in North and East Lubbock. A second major goal presented to the Committee on the Economy proposed that ways be

sought to "keep local salaries high enough so that the least skilled of the local work force can meet the minimum needs of his or her family without resorting to public assistance. The last goal proposed to this Committee was that the City "seek new ways to promote economic development and stability or minority-owned businesses in Lubbock."

The Conference proposed three goals to the Committee on Education. They were: 1. Place more stress on the historic contributions of minorities as a routine part of Texas and American history so that all students recognize their role in history. 2. Offer instruction in Spanish as an optional program in all elementary schools so that bilingual skills can be developed earlier at this early age. 3. Offer advanced courses in Spanish as a second language to Mexican American students in high school so they can attain greater skills in their native language.

A goal was suggested to the Committee on Recreation and Entertainment that they make maximum use of the Yellowhouse Canyon Lakes as a regional recreation area by promoting annual events in various sections of the lake area. A concern was voiced to have more activities in the north and southeast ends of the system.

The new goals were also suggested to the Committee on Government and Taxation. The Conference proposed that the city "encourage optimum minority participation in planning and decision making on all levels of local government and tax-supported agencies. A second goal asked that more employment opportunities for minorities in county government be sought. The final goal asked to provide an office of public defender to make more efficient use of county funds now spent on court appointed attorneys and to provide maximum legal defense for indigent citizens.

The Committee on Transportation was asked to seek to provide

Hightower Visits Lubbock

Hightower Raps Foot-Dragging On Gasohol Industry

Texas Railroad Commission candidate Jim Hightower Monday called for increased gasohol production and said commission members are inhibiting the development of a gasohol industry.

Hightower, 36, former editor of the Texas Observer in Austin and a legislative assistant to former U.S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough in the late 1960s, criticized present commission members for what he said was their non-support of gasohol legislation last year.

"They could have supported legislation sponsored by Rep. Dan Kubiak and others to encourage a Texas gasohol industry, but Exxon opposed the bills, so the commissioners wouldn't help and the bills lost," Hightower said at a Lubbock press conference.

"Our railroad commissioners have scoffed at gasohol entrepreneurs and said this new energy source needs more study. But grain farmers in Texas aren't fooled. They know the time for study is over, and the time to build is now," he said.

As a member of the three-member commission, Hightower said, he would more closely scrutinize gas utility applications for increased rates of return.

"Since 1970, your basic gas rates in Lubbock have increased a whopping 269 percent," he said. "The railroad commissioners have let them raise rates on a typical bill from \$8.20 to \$30.25 a month."

"But that's not all. The commissioners have also ruled that these monopolies can also charge you for their advertising expenses, their fuel costs, even though they buy some of their fuel from their own subsidiaries, and even the fees they pay to their lawyers to get a rate increase."

Hightower criticized his opponent, incumbent Commissioner Jim Nugent, for taking, he said, "90 percent of his campaign contributions from company executives, lawyers and lobbyists he is supposed to protect us from."

Nugent, in turn, has charged Hightower with being backed heavily by eastern liberals.

Asked if he would be influenced by out-of-state interests, Hightower said a \$25-per-plate fund-raising dinner was held for him recently at the Lone Star Cafe in New York but said, "I don't take money from anybody I could do any favors for."

He said he expects to spend about \$200,000 in his campaign and said Nugent, "will outspend me three or four to one."

Hightower is a native of Denison who earned a bachelor's degree in government from North Texas State University and was director of the Agribusiness Accountability Project in Washington from 1970 to 1975.

RESPOND TO CARTER'S PUSH USOC FOR VOTE

Colorado Springs, Colo. - Under heavy pressure from the Carter administration, the U.S. Olympic Committee's House of Delegates will meet this weekend and decide whether to support the president's call for a boycott of the summer games in Moscow.

President Carter sought the boycott in January to protest the Soviets' invasion of Afghanistan and has not softened his stand.

USOC officials, although opposed to a boycott, indicated at the time that they would support the president. But they have been slow to take official action in the hope that the world situation might change before the May 24 entry deadline.

This weekend's session begins Thursday night with a meeting of the 21-member USOC administrative

committee, composed of the officers and selected representatives from national governing bodies. Only 13 have a vote.

One member, rower Anita DeFrantz, said the committee, responsible for the conduct of the daily affairs of the USOC, routinely meets before the House of Delegates convenes.

However, it is the administrative committee's resolution which could be the center of debate when the 300 member House begins consideration Friday night of what action shall be taken by the amateur sports organization.

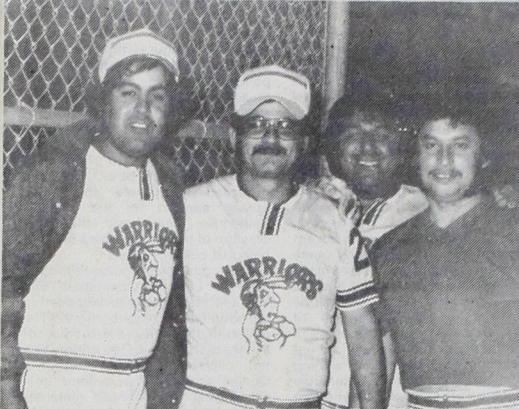
The resolution would grant final

decision-making powers to the administrative committee, which could then decide in mid-May whether to boycott if Carter still thinks it would be in the interest of national security.

White House officials have said Carter will not change his position.

Senior administration aides would prefer for the House to vote to support the boycott Saturday but have said it would be acceptable if the delegates indicate that they will reject the Soviet invitation but delay the formal refusal until a later date.

The White House officials said they

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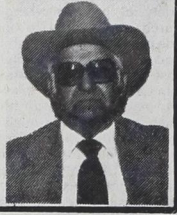
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CONTINUACION DE LA SEMANA PASADA.

Pero, me parece justo explicar, que yo jamás he padecido de nervios, ni soy creyente en espantos ni en apariciones. Sin embargo, me sorprendía mucho lo que me estaba sucediendo.

Esa noche, cuando me acosté a dormir, me quedé pensando en todas las atrocidades que habíamos cometido en contra de los vietnamitas. Cuando cerré los ojos con la intención de dormirme, sentí que alguien se acercó a mi cama. Solo sentí la presencia. Sin abrir los ojos, fui pasando la mano poco a poco hasta mi pistola calibre 45 reglamentaria. No estaba seguro que fuera alguien de "sangre y hueso", pero sentía que alguien se iba acercando a mi cama.

Quando se acerco a mi cabecera,



y solo me hacia falta escuchar el resuello, me dí la levantada de pronto, con mi pistola en la mano, apunté mi arma con dirección a esa "persona", pero al abrir los ojos ¡no encontré a nadie! ¿Me estaré volviendo loco? me preguntaba yo solo. Volteando a ver a mi compañeros, los veía a todos durmiendo como recién nacidos. Creí que algo deberían haber visto, pero solo era yo el que tendría que pasar por eso.

Tratando de olvidar el asunto, hice lo posible por quedarme dormido. Ahora que sabía que lo que me estaba sucediendo no era real, ya no le iba a dar mucha importancia al caso. A penas estaba quedandome dormido, cuando volví a sentir esa misma presencia. Era como cuando algo, o alguien se le acerca a uno tanto que todo lo que falta es sentir el contacto de su cuerpo. Esta vez. Pero cuando abrí los ojos, ¡vi lo que era! Allí al pie de mi cama, estaba un bulto vestido de negro de pies a cabeza. Yo jamás he visto la muerte, pero esa aparición, llevaba el mismo vestuario de como pintan a la figura de la muerte en las pinturas.

"¿Qué es lo que buscas?" me acuerdo que le pregunté sin ni siquiera pensarlo.

Como no me contestó, le volví a preguntar lo mismo. Pues no hallaba que mas hacer ni decir. Seguía sin hablar. En tonces, le vi la cara. ¡Era una horrible calavera! Un escalofrío, corrío por todo mi cuerpo. Yo que jamás había sentido el miedo, sentí que no pude moverme, ni siquiera hablar. Quisiera haber podido gritarles a mis compañeros, pero la vós no me salía de la garganta. Mientras,

aquel esqueleto, parecía burlarse de mi espanto.

Permanecimos unos instantes, viendonos uno a otro, ucando de pronto, se fue desapareciendo poco a poco, hasta que se fue de mi vista. Por un rata, me quedé esperando que re-apareciera, pero ya no volví. Confiado en que ya la pesadilla de esa noche había llegado y pasado de su culmino, me volví a quedar dormido. Ya había logrado agarrar el sueño de nuevo, ¡cuando le dieron un fuerte jalón a mis colchas, dijandome descubierta de pies a cabeza!

Eso, es lo ultimo que recuerdo. Cuando recobré mis sentidos, me platicaron allí en el cuarto de un hospital mental, que comencé a disparar mi pistola con rumbo a la ventana, hiriendo a uno de los guardias. Yo no me consideraba loco, ni aun creo que haya sufrido algun ataque de nervios, pero tuve que tomar un tratamiento psiquiatra por el termino de seis meses. Al finalizar ese tratamiento, quedé con la misma opinión que tuve desde aquella noche: no fué nada imaginario lo que a mi me sucedió. ¡fué taitalmente real y veridico!

Usted puede entablar casi todas sus reclamaciones de beneficios por teléfono sean beneficios de retiro para usted y su familia o beneficios de sobrevivientes para viudas o viudos o niños. Usted puede aplicar tambien para beneficios de incapacidad sobre el teléfono, o apelar la decisión de su reclame de Seguro Social.

Así es como lo ace. El empleado del Seguro Social le llamara la aplicación sobre el telefono preguntandole y despues le enviara las formas por correo a usted. With fuel prices going up the way they are, you probably spend a lot of time thinking about ways to cut down on energy costs. Perhaps this is a good time to remind you that most of your Social Security business can be handled by telephone.

What kinds of things can you do by phone?

1. Information and advice
2. Process actions in connection with your benefit
3. File a claim for benefits
4. Verification of office hours and address

5. Ask what personal records to bring

And you can file most claims for benefits over the telephone, such as retirement benefits for you and your family, or survivors' benefits for widows, widowers and children. You can even apply for disability benefits over the telephone, or file an appeal of a Social Security decision about your claim.

Here's how you do it. The Social Security employee will fill out the application over the phone by asking you questions, and then mail the forms to you. You review them for accuracy, sign them, and then return them to the Social Security office. You can mail any personal records into Social Security; they will be photocopies and returned to you. even if you would rather bring in the records yourself, you can save time and trouble if you have the application filled out and then just drop off the necessary records.

In a few cases, a personal interview may be required. But I suggest you call first. You can usually save yourself a trip. At the very least, you can cut down the amount of time you might have to spend in the Social Security office if you come prepared.

To make telephone service more efficient, Social Security has been expanding the use of what we call "teleservice centers"—facilities with staff specialized in handling phone calls from the public. These centers cover a large population, like big metropolitan areas or, in some cases, an entire state. Our 32 telephone centers now service 90 million people. They can usually be reached by toll free numbers available to people living in the service area. In our area the number is 1-800-392-1603.

Teleservice centers help you in two ways: they simplify a lot of your business, because you do it by phone; and often they reduce the number of people who visit the local offices, saving you time if you choose to go into a district office yourself. And if you need to be referred to a local office, the telephone service center will direct you to the nearest one or have a Social Security employee return your call.

Over the years, Social Security has worked in other ways to make its service accessible and convenient. One way has been to expand our network of local and branch offices. We now have over 1,300 offices in big cities and small towns across the country. And we send out Social Security representatives to contact points in small localities to deal with people who can't get to one of our offices. Doing your business by telephone is one more convenience offered by Social Security. It saves you time, effort, and money for transportation. And it also saves energy.

En el movimiento popular están incluidos los trabajadores del campo, los jornaleros, los trabajadores, las señoras de los mercados y últimamente el Bloque Popular Revolucionario, incluyó dentro de su movimiento de masas a los empleados bancarios.

En cuanto a la burguesía, el interés de la burguesía es indiscutible; no existe división en la burguesía. la burguesía está conciente; está conciente de lanzar al ejército, incluso aplastar al movimiento popular con una masacre al estilo 1932. Por tanto la burguesía está clara con sus objetivos; el pueblo también está claro con sus objetivos. Sólo hay dos campos: el de los explotados y el de los explotadores.

En resumen, si, el movimiento popular está ganando constantemente; está ganando espacio, por decirlo así dentro de la lucha que se está dando. El movimiento popular es fuente aunque la burguesía es la que tiene el dinero, detenta los

medios de producción par provocar al pueblo con su hambre y que se manifiesta en una lucha espontánea. Sin embargo el pueblo tiene sus organizaciones populares y se encuentra completamente organizado.

Que eran medidas sanas que beneficiarían a las masas. Pero él declaró que si no había participación del pueblo dentro del proceso de la reforma agraria, esta reforma agraria no era auténtica. Se refería específicamente a la organización popular.

Por tanto con el asesinato de Monseñor Romero ha habido una avance en el movimiento

popular. Ya que este incidente ha enseñado al mundo entero la crisis en que existe en El Salvador.

El drama latinoamericano actualmente está representado en el pueblo salvadoreño y luchan por que no se lleve a cabo una intervención. La Unidad de todos los latinos desde el Rio Bravo hasta la Patagonia, Por tanto la lucha en El Salvador es irreversible, ya que en durante 48 años de tiranía militar sembró años de tiranía militar se sembró únicamente odio, represión, tortura, delincuencia, etc...

improved ingress and egress to east Lubbock by seeking additional funding necessary for a grade-separation at Quirt Avenue and East 34th Street.

The Conference and participating organizations also addressed an area which was not addressed by the Committee 80. The group specifically addressed health problems in Lubbock. The following goal were proposed:

To broaden public information on sound health practices and so strengthen individual control over health outcome.

To see lowered health care costs through early identification and intervention in the health problems of mind, body, habit and environment.

Through coordination, to fully utilize all available health resources for the improved health and productivity of all people in the South Plains.

To solicit cooperative effort among all jurisdictions in support of regional planning within Health Systems Agency II.

To provide a sliding scale for those who work but cannot always afford medical care.

To secure a County Medical Examiner.

The proposed goals were recieved by Harold Harriger, chairman of the Committee 80; Bernie Bass, member of the executive committee, and John Logan, executive vice president of the Chamber.

Harriger expressed that the new goals would be presented to the individual committees and that members of the Conference of Organizations would be invited to meet with each individual committee of the Goals for the 80's.
