Robert Lee Smothers Loraine Bulldogs 63-0

Coach John Malone's entire Robert Lee football squad, with quarterback Tommy Allen at the helm, smothered the Loraine Bulldogs 63 to 0 Saturday night at Loraine.

Director Stresses Cattle Regulations

Dr. R. G. Garrett, Executive Director of the Texas Animal Health Commission, stresses requirements regarding movement of cattle from livestock markets. These regulations are of importance to operators in a brucellosis area or to one that is in the process of being tested.

The regulations are as follows: After cattle are purchased and before removal from livestock markets, it shall be the joint responsibility of the purchaser and the livestock operator to have all cattle, subject to brucellosis tests or vaccinations, tested or vaccinated.

1. All cattle—except steers, heifers, calves under 6 months of age and official brucellosis vaccinates under 30 months of age—leaving this market to premises in any county in which type II brucellosis work is being conducted or has been completed, shall have to comply with the following:

a. Cattle originating in a Modified Certified Brucellosis County or Certified Brucellosis Free Area and accompanied by a health certificate, when kept separate and apart from other cattle in clean pens used for that purpose ONLY, can move without further tests.

b. Cattle from other than Modified Certified Counties accompanied by official health certificate showing negative to brucellosis test within 30 days, kept separate and apart from other cattle in clean pens used for that purpose ONLY, can be moved directly to owners premises, under quarantine, retested in not less than 30 nor more than 60 days, and, if negative, released.

c. Cattle that don't comply with paragraph a or b must be negative to a brucellosis test before leaving the livestock market. They can then be moved to owners premises, under quarantine, retested at his expense in not less than 30 nor more than 60 days, and, if negative, released.

d. In the event laboratory facilities are not available in the town where the livestock market is located, the livestock market will be required to furnish space and install necessary brucellosis testing equipment required under regulations of the Texas Animal Health Commission.

e. The veterinarian, before conducting and certifying to results of brucellosis tests at the livestock market, shall be specifically approved to conduct such tests.

There are additional regulations regarding movement of cattle within or the removal from a county in the process of being tested. Dr. Sousares, D.V.M., in charge of the local unit, will provide this information next week.

Allen completed a pass to John Kinsey for 17 yards and a touchdown early in the fourth quarter. James Blankenship made the 2 extra points on a run. Donny Robertson received an Allen pass for 32 yards and another touchdown in the fourth period. Blankenship again made the extra points on a run. The final touchdown came on a pass from Allen to Curtis Higginbotham for 6 yards and the score. Blankenship ran for the bonus points.

Bill Ledbetter intercepted a Loraine pass in the fourth period. Robert Lee's Tommy Allen attempted 15 passes and completed 11 for a total of 179 yards.

Robert Lee Steers took the advantage of every opportunity to score when they were on the offensive, and when they were on the defensive, which wasn't long at a time, the Steers allowed the Bulldogs to make only 80 yards for the entire game.

Sun Oil Executives Visit Silver Area

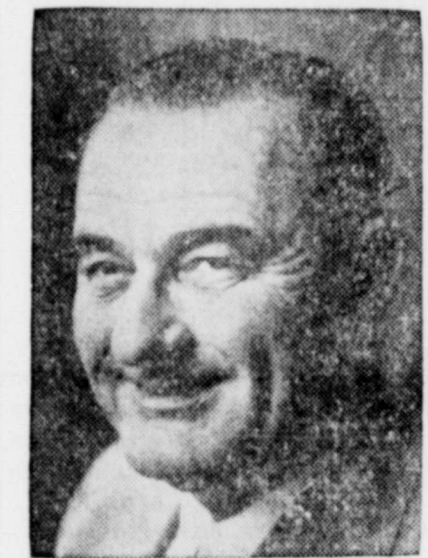

Lew Heuvel Saves Coalson Home

Mr. Frank Coalson gives Lew Heuvel credit for saving the Coalson residence from being razed by fire Sunday at 4:15 p.m.

There was no one at the Coalson house Sunday afternoon when fire broke out in a wall in the living room. It is thought that the wall heater caused the fire.

Lew Heuvel was making his rounds on the oil lease where he works and noticed the smoke coming from the house and promptly began to fight the blaze. He summoned help from the Robert Lee Volunteer Fire Department.

Coalson estimated damage caused by the blaze and smoke to be \$1,500. He said that the carpet would have to be replaced and the exterior would have to be completely repainted.

The Coalson home is in the Edith community about 15 miles from Robert Lee.

Coke County went along with the rest of the nation in backing Sen. John Kennedy and Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson for Democratic nominees for president and vice president of the United States. The nationwide election was held Tuesday, Nov. 8. In this county the Kennedy-Johnson ticket received 799 votes while Vice President Richard M. Nixon and Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge, the Republican nominees, received 575 votes.

In the race for United States Senator, Lyndon Johnson won in Coke County as he did over the rest of the state, over Republican John Tower. In the county Johnson received 919 votes to 441 for Tower.

Governor Price Daniel won handily over the state, and again Coke County followed the trend, giving Daniel 1152 votes and Republican William M. Steger 225.

Constitutional amendments three and four carried in Coke County, but Nos. 1 and 2 failed to get a majority. The vote was: No. 1—For 390, Against 415; No. 2—For 531, Against 317; No. 3—For 434, Against 415; No. 4—For 579, Against 276. The above figures do not include the amendment vote from the boxes at Lometa and Divide.

All of the amendments carried on a statewide basis.

Robert Lee gave the Democratic ticket its heaviest vote in the county with Bronte a close second.

Democratic nominees for all other offices, state, county and precinct, carried by large majorities in Coke County.

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Your County Agents Report

Home Demonstration

The Extension Office has been very busy place this past week. Every Plan of Work is due the 11th and since I will be out of the county the 7-11, I've had to double up a little!

I will be in San Angelo Monday through Friday attending a Cloth Workshop on semi-tailoring. This workshop will bring training to the point where I will be able to conduct at least a basic and one advanced and possibly a semi-tailoring workshop the county next year. I hope that all of you who are interested in learning various construction techniques will be planning to attend at least one of these workshops.

Since we're talking about Cloth now, how many of you are wearing your dark cottons the proper care?

We have such beautiful cottons now that we can wear them the year round and especially during the in-between seasons. With proper care they can be kept attractive and new looking for a much longer time. Good dark cottons should be dry cleaned to preserve their finish and appearance, at least as long as they are used for best wear.

Garments with decorative details, padding, interfacing and designs which cannot be removed must either be dry cleaned or laundered with special care. Dry cleaning avoids any risk of spoiling the appearance of the garments.

To launder the garments, wash each one individually in softened water. Rinse completely to remove all traces of soap or detergent. Soft water helps to prevent hard water curds or lint from sticking to the cotton. Use warm, not hot, water with mild soap or detergent. Soapless detergents are good for dark cottons, especially in hard water. Be sure to read the directions on the package. Some detergents are used for cotton and some are recommended for rayon. Do not use a bleach. Many of the bleaches affect the finish of the material. When ironing a dark cotton garment, press it on the wrong side to retain the finish of the material.

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Agriculture News

Testing for brucellosis got underway in Coke County on a limited basis at the end of last week. Full scale action by the crew assigned to our county will take place this week. Unless bad weather prevails or call for retest from other counties increase, Dr. Sousares and his staff should move through Coke County in three or four weeks. From all indications he has an excellent staff that is more than willing to do all that is required, plus a little extra. I hope that we will be able to do the same for them.

Brucellosis is more common in the county than I had expected it to be. In fact, they have already found more cases than I expected them to find in the entire county. At this writing, 13 positive reactors and 11 suspects had already been found in the county. And most of those were found in range cattle rather than cattle of the milk breeds.

The reactors, of course, must be branded and sold for slaughter, while the suspects will be isolated or segregated from the herd and retested. There probably will be a down grade in price when the reactor is sold, but to avoid further infection should be given value. And too, the loss of a calf or calves by abortion should be considered.

The men working on the program in the county, unless changes are made will be distributed in the four sections of the county as originally outlined. Robert Daniels began testing last Friday in Area I on S. E. Adams place. J. W. Service is line-up man in that area. In area two, Bill Haas began in the Blackwell district on Monday and Frank Doyno in the Bronte area the same day. Vernon Copeland is line-up man for Mr. Haas, while D. K. Glenn started contact work in the Bronte area.

Bill Burnett began taking blood samples in area three last Thursday. J. O. Rudd began initial line-up work in that area and Frank Percifull will be helping out by the time you have a chance to read this. Area four action began with Ben Boykin as contact man and Bill King doing the testing. They began taking samples in that portion of the county on Tuesday.

Dr. Sousares stated that one other man may be assigned to the county as soon as work in Tom Green county and the other areas in which they are retesting is completed. Also, two or three new men that they are training possibly will accompany the testers in Coke County.

The laboratory in which tests are conducted is taken care of by Bill Fowler and Mrs. Will Doran.

There are certain regulations regarding the movement of cattle while the testing program is in progress that the law sets forth. Each operator should familiarize himself with these regulations.

A separate article has been written regarding movement regulations.

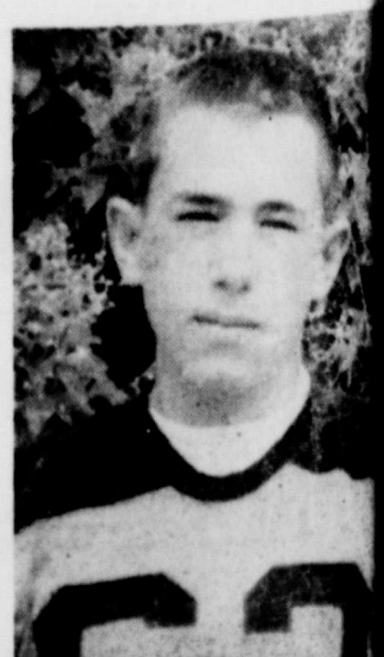

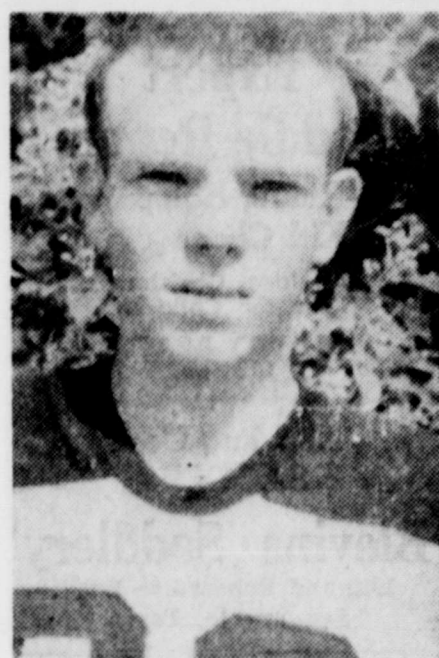
