PERSONAL.

Paul Michaeloff, the engineer commissioned by the Russian Government to examine and report on the ports and water communications of North America, is at present in Ohio.

Wm. R. Castle, of New York, has been tendered by King Kalakaua the Attorney Generalship of the Hawaiian kingdom. He has accepted.

Prof. Goldwin Smith has purchased the Toronto Mail, and will advocate in its columns the independence of Canada, as to annexation, no announcement is made.

The Khedive of Egypt was educated in Paris, speaks French to perfection, is a capital talker on any kind of subject, and takes an especially keen interest in England, or anything English.

Commander George C. Remy has been assigned to the command of the naval force on the Rio Grande, which consists of the Rio Bravo, steamship, and several steam launchers.

Michael J. Kerr, was born on a farm near Titusville, Pennsylvania. He says that it was on his father's place that the first oil was struck. His father sold out in 1852 for \$9,500. Subsequently the discovery of oil was made, and in 1856 the same place was sold for upwards of a million dollars.

The chief of the house of Astor now is John Jacob Astor, oldest son of the late William B. Astor. He served on Gen. McClellan's staff, and has been for many years the active manager of the Astor property. He married Miss Charlotte Gibbs, of New York.

Jackson, of Williamson county, Tennessee, and that it was unlikely to see her he visited Nashville last spring. SENATOR John A. Logan of Illinois was very ill at Chicago at last advice, and much anxiety is felt both there and at Washington in his behalf. He will be unable for some time to take his seat in the Senate.

DURING the last three or four months the changes of foreign Envoys dispatched to Washington have been quite numerous. The Russian, Austrian, Italian, Spanish, Chilean and Peruvian Ministers have all been recalled and others sent in their stead. The British Minister, Sir Edward Thornton, is the oldest in the diplomatic service at the capital.

THE Greenback Party were recently in session in Chicago. They call themselves the National Independent party. It is almost certain that they will hold a national convention, and nominate a candidate for the Presidency. That a large body of the inflationists and anti-specie-resumptionists will refuse to act with either party in the next presidential election, we can scarcely doubt. This is the rock on which the Democratic party is more in danger of being wrecked than anything else.

THE President, in his message, comes squarely out for recognizing the belligerent rights of the Cuban patriots. It seems that he was not a moment too soon, so far as that question affects parties in this country. In Washington a few days since a prominent Democratic Senator stated in the presence of several gentlemen that if President Grant wanted to give the Republican party the benefit of recognition of Cuban independence and the movement for the abolishment of slavery on the island, he must do so at once, for the Democrats would not wait long after the meeting of Congress before taking the initiative in the matter themselves.

We have "gone in with" the Statesmen in opposition to taking Tom Scott's road for either the Southern Pacific or the Texas Pacific railroad that both the South and Texas need. Let the Government and Texas give their aid to such a road, and we will hold up both hands for it. But if Tom Scott's road gets that aid, the true Southern Texas Pacific railroad will get nothing and will never be built in our time. Let the press of the State inform our Representatives and Senators in Congress fully on this subject.

The President on Cuba.

The past year has furnished no evidence of an approaching termination of the ruinous conflict which has been raging for years in Cuba. The same disregard of the laws of civilized warfare and just demands of humanity which have heretofore called for the expression of condemnation from the nations of Christendom, have continued to blacken the scene. Desolation, ruin and pillage are pervading the rich fields of one of the most fertile and productive regions on the earth; the incendiary's torch is firing plantations and valuable factories and buildings—these are the agents marking the alternate advance and retreat of the contending parties.

The President narrates the damage to the interests of commercial nations, especially those of the United States, and insecurity of property owned by citizens of the United States in Cuba. He has hoped Spain would be enabled to establish peace in her colony. Because of this hope, and from an extreme reluctance to interfere in the affairs of another, and a friendly nation, he has patiently and anxiously awaited the progress of events. The armed bands of either side now occupy grounds as in the past. The President makes a long argument and concludes: "A recognition of the independence of Cuba being, in my opinion, impracticable and indefensible, the question next presenting itself is, that of recognition of belligerent rights of the parties to the contest. After further argument the President concludes. The recognition of independence or of belligerency being, thus, in my judgment, equally inadvisable, it remains to consider what course shall be adopted. Should the conflict not soon be brought to an end by acts of the parties themselves, and should the evils which result therefrom, affecting all nations, and particularly the United States, continue, in such an event, I am of the opinion that other nations will be compelled to assume the responsibility which devolves upon them, and to seriously consider the only remaining measures, mediation and intervention."

The South.

The truth sometimes comes to us from an unexpected source, and from an unwelcome tongue. The Chicago Inter-Ocean truly says that the South is now more prosperous, more progressive, and more wealthy than it ever was before. This is not true of many individuals and families, whose misfortunes have been great, and whose lot is hard; but it is true of the mass of the Southern people. The same paper says that "when the dupes of the demagogue shall know what the intelligent planter has already found out by experience, the condition alluded to will prevail, but not until then. The former slaveholder, however, would not revive the previous condition of the country, when, without the expense and annoyance of a slave household, his land, by improved cultivation, is more remunerative than under the former superficial course, while the supervision of freetrader becomes more pleasing and satisfactory. The Southern evil, then, does not arise from external circumstances. It is innate—it is disaffection. It was this which caused secession; and now that secession is but a name, disaffection is still gnawing at the life. There is no reason why the Cotton States should not closely emulate the other sections of the Union, if they would only seek secession proclivities and cultivate Union principles."

Judges and Politics.

We have always held that Judges should be chosen without reference to party politics, and that they should stand as much aloof from partisan strife as clergymen. We well recollect that the late Hon. Wm. Piquney Hill, when nominated for the Supreme Court in 1866, just after the war, the same time Judge Devos of this city was nominated, refused to run, and remarked to us that Texas had never, therefore, supported party nominations for judicial positions.

We have been led to express these views by the following extract from the letter of Chief Justice Waite, of the Supreme Court of the United States, declining to allow his name used in connection with the Presidency. We commend it to the consideration of those friends of Judge Ireland who wanted him to see the Supreme Court Bench as a stepping stone to a political office. The Chief Justice says: "There cannot be a doubt, that in these days of political judicial questions, it is especially dangerous to have a Judge who looks beyond the judiciary in his personal ambition. The Supreme Court is now, I believe, justly regarded as a sheet anchor of the Nation. Will it continue such if the Chief Justice be placed in the political whirlpool?"

"My friend, consider these things, and tell me if you really think I ought to permit my name to be used as suggested by you. If you do, I do not."

The Army on our Rio Grande frontier, it can be called an army, is to be very considerably strengthened, and General Ord's command is more important than this Department has been at any time since the war.

The Secretary of War has ordered a very considerable concentration of troops on the Rio Grande, especially at those points which cannot be guarded by the steam launches on the river against the raids of cattle thieves. The result will be

that we shall soon have close and hot work. The raiders care nothing for neutrality laws or the peace of the two countries, and they will not give up their lucrative spoil without a struggle. This will force the crossing of the river by our troops in pursuit of thieves and stolen cattle.

Much more Government money will be spent in Western Texas than heretofore, which will be of benefit to the country.

THE PRESIDENT ON PUBLIC EDUCATION.

The President earnestly recommends that a constitutional amendment be submitted to the legislatures making it the duty of each State to establish and forever maintain free public schools adequate to the education of all children in elementary branches, within their respective limits, irrespective of sex, color, birthplace or religion; forbidding the teaching in said schools of religious, atheistic or pagan tenets, and prohibiting the granting of any school funds or school taxes, or any part thereof, either by legislative, municipal or other authority, for the benefit or in aid, directly or indirectly, of any religious sect or denomination, or in aid or for the benefit of any other object of any nature or kind whatsoever.

Is the Austin Statesman in favor of the ratification or rejection of the new Constitution? Who can tell? We want to know, you know, because we want to know how to vote.

Associated Press Dispatches.

DOMESTIC.

SUB-TREASURY BALANCES.
New York, December 10.—Sub-Treasury balances: Gold, \$42,610,901; Currency, \$40,929,945. Sub-Treasurer paid out \$35,000 on account of interest, and \$498,000 for bonds. Customs receipts, \$420,000.

TWEEK.
New York, December 10.—Inspector Dilks believes Tweed is on the ocean. There is good reason to believe he made his escape many hours before it was reported. It is generally believed that warden Denham and keeper Hogan were privy to his escape, and that Tweed embarked on some private craft on East river, in which he is now sailing for some foreign port. Tweed's cases, which were up to-day, were postponed.

INDEPENDENT GRANGERS.
Chicago, December 10.—The National Committee of Independent Grangers, including delegates from many of the granges of the Northwestern States, met in this city and effected a temporary organization. The committee propose to take steps toward nominating an Independent candidate, whom the Grangers will support for next President.

FOREIGN.

TURKISH AFFAIRS.
Ragusa, December 10.—Rauf Pasha has succeeded in throwing propositions into Gornakko, but the insurgents assert that he was subsequently defeated near Gornakko, losing one thousand killed and wounded.

THE KREMYN—ARMENIA.
London, December 10.—The Colorado Gazette publishes a report that the Klediyev has ordered fifteen thousand men to march against the Abyssinians. A special to the News from Vienna reports that the Turks have succeeded in supplying the garrisons of Nicolo with provisions.

200 LIVES LOST.
London, December 10.—The Fall Mail Gazette this evening contains the following brief but startling news item: A awful explosion has occurred at the Swallow Malt mill, near Barnstaple, in the West Riding of Yorkshire. It is feared that more than two hundred lives are lost.
