School Starts, 676 Enrolled

School bells rang in a new school year Monday with Hart schools reporting a first-day enrollment of 676.

Enrollment by classes is first grade, 77; second, 72; third, 52; fourth, 65; fifth, 46; sixth, 60; special education, 12 and kindergarten, 27.

Junior high and high school enrollment figures showed seventh grade, 59; eighth, 44; ninth, 51; tenth, 39; eleventh, 38 and twelfth, 34.

A scrimmage game has been scheduled for 5 p. m. Friday, Aug. 27 when the Longhorns

host Sudan's Hornets. Everyone is invited to attend the game and support the 'Horns.

The 1970-71 amended budget was accepted and approved in a called meeting of the school board Thursday evening.

Mrs. Ralph Cole was employed as a bus driver.

In other action, the board okayed a tuition charge of \$10 for students enrolled in drivers' education. Also approved was the installation of an underground incinerator for the high school. Cost of the incinerator is \$150.

New State Law Regulates Safety For Bike Riders

Bicycle riders will be governed by Texas traffic laws beginning Aug. 30 but the laws are basic safety rules already practiced by many bike riders.

Regulating bicycle traffic under state law as a requirement of the National Highway Safety Act of 1966, says Norman Suarez, general counsel for the Department of Public Safety in Austin.

More attention has been focused towards bicycle safety, Suarez said, because of the increase in the number of adult riders.

One of the regulations prohibits all bicycle riders from riding on sidewalks in the business district. (The state law adds: "all persons over 15 from riding on sidewalks even in residential areas".

The new law reads, "Every person riding a bicycle upon a roadway shall be granted all of the rights and shall be subject to all the duties applicable to the driver of a (motor) vehicle by this act..."

Other provisions require that a person "shall not ride other than upon or astride a permanent and regular seat..." and "no bicycle shall be used to carry more persons at one time than the number for which it is designed and equipped."

The law also prohibits persons on bicycles, coasters, roller skates, sleds or toy vehicles from attaching "the same or himself" to any vehicle upon a roadway.

A rider may not carry packages or articles which prevent him from keeping at least one hand on the handlebars, the law states.

Bicycles ridden at night must have a white light visible from at least 500 feet in front and a red light or reflector visible from 50 to 300 feet to

the rear.

"Every bicycle must be equipped with a brake which will enable the operator to make the braked wheels skid on dry, level, clean pavement," the law says.

Bicycle riders are also required to drive as close to the right hand side of the road as possible, taking extra precautions when passing a parked or moving vehicle.

DPS officials say children under the age of 14 stopped for traffic violations will be handled as juveniles.

Ten Accidents Investigated In County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 10 accidents on rural highways in Castro County during the month of July, according to Sergeant Vernon Cawthon Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and two persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first seven months of 1971 shows a total of 39 accidents resulting in two persons killed, and 14 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for July, 1971, shows a total of 564 accidents resulting in 38 persons killed and 324 persons injured. This was 40 more accidents, 28 more fatalities, and 38 more injured than during June.

The 38 traffic fatalities in July have been the most that have been recorded during any month of 1971.

Management Seminar Slated At Texas Tech

A ranch management seminar to be held early in October at Texas Tech will cover subjects related to range management, stocking rates, cow-calf nutrition, breed selection and improvement, livestock marketing and price forecasting, cost and return, cash flow and income maximization.

Emphasis in the school, however, will be on managerial techniques and methods to bring all of the above managerial variables together for both planning and operating a ranch business, according to Dr. Rex P. Kennedy, professor of agricultural economics at Texas Tech.

Staff for the seminar, to be conducted Oct. 4 through 8, will include representatives

from the faculties of Texas Tech and Texas A&M University and from the ranching and livestock industry.

"The seminar will be informative and instructional with emphasis on instruction," Kennedy said. "Because of this, the seminar is limited to 40 persons."

There is a tuition charge of \$100 for members of the State Society of Farm and Ranch Managers and Appraisers and the American Society of Farm Managers and Rural Appraisers and \$125 for non-members.

Persons interested in enrolling for the seminar may obtain additional information from Dr. Kennedy, Department of Agricultural Economics, Texas Tech.

'Blue Angels' To Headline 1971 Plainview Air Show

The 1971 Plainview Air Show will be highlighted August 29 with an appearance by the world famous "Blue Angels", official flight demonstration team of the U. S. Navy from Pensacola, Fla. flying their famous diamond formation in the 1,600 MPH McDonnell Douglas F4J Phantom Aircraft. The show officially begins Saturday, Aug. 28 with static displays of aircraft and aviation exhibits in the Hale County Agriculture Center from 4 until 11 p. m.

The show moves to the Hale County Airport in Plainview Sunday, Aug. 29, with flying slated to start at 2 p. m. Joining the Blue Angels Sunday in the show will be Van White of Lubbock in his clipped-wing Piper Cub, Roy Forrester of Amarillo in his Schweizer 1-26 Glider, Bobby Bishop of Alexandria, Minn. in a Bellanca Super Viking, members of the Amarillo Radio-Control Model Club, and the U. S. Navy Exhibition parachute team from the Navy Special Warfare Group Pacific in Coronado, Calif.

Flying the Navy Skydivers to Plainview will be the U. S. Marine Corps Air Reserve Training squadron from Whidbey Island, Wash. Not to be outdone by the Navy, the U. S. Air Force will have on display a T-41, a T-37, and a T-38, the three types

of aircraft used by the 3500th pilot training wing at Reese Air Force Base.

Instructor pilots will be on hand to answer questions by the public and to point out items of special interest on the aircraft. The Plainview Kiwanis Club is sponsoring the show for the fourth straight year and expect a record-breaking crowd to see the exciting aerial show. Admission will be \$1.00 for adults and 50 cents for children 12 or under.

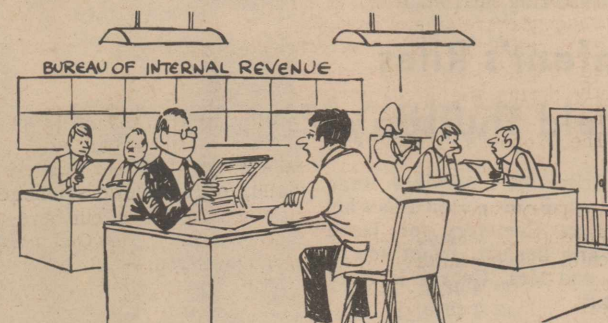

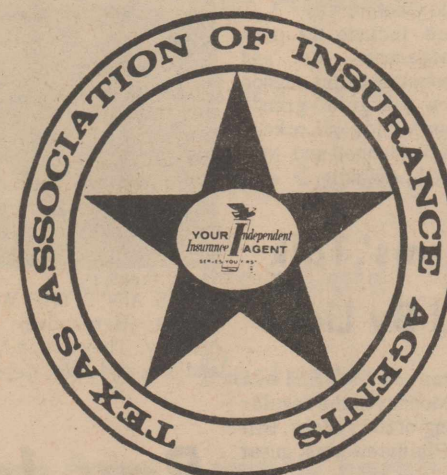

Record-Keeping Simplified For Farm Use Of LP Gas

"Record Keeping" has been virtually eliminated for LP Gas users engaged in farming, ranching or other agricultural operations.

This good news stems from the fact that the Highway Tax Law for LP Gas use has been simplified.

An annual "Special Farm User Permit" may be secured for \$60 per year for each vehicle in operation, payable in advance. The only record kept thereafter is a speedometer reading on the vehicle.

A special decal, issued by the State Comptroller, is affixed to each vehicle to signify that the tax has been prepaid. Deliveries and sales to these vehicles will be tax-free. The decal is transferable from one eligible operator to another.

Persons who elect to use the annual "Special Farm User Permit" must secure a decal for each vehicle on LP Gas. If for any reason its use is discontinued the Comptroller will refund the unused portion of

advance tax on a pro rata basis. Persons installing LP Gas carburetion during the year, will pay only for the remaining months of the calendar year.

Mileage driven in preponderant amounts above the permit amount will be subject to tax at the end of the permit year on an actual mileage basis.

Agriculturists may still secure and operate on a bonded or non-bonded user basis if desired.

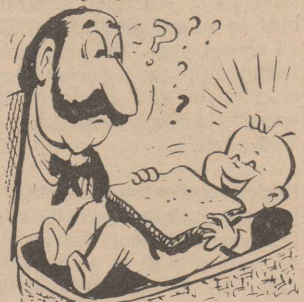

Not all mothers could nurse their babies or afford the services of a wet nurse. Of necessity they fed their babies from odd-shaped utensils that defied thorough cleansing. No one knew what the terms "sterilization" and "pasteurization" meant.

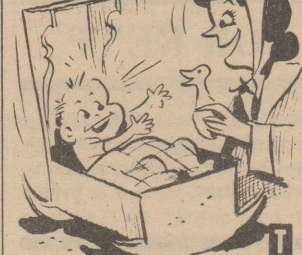


wine or beer. Butter or sugar might be added but some physicians regarded the use of milk as fraught with danger. One doctor is quoted as saying "Milk might bring on the watery gripes, or the infant might imbibe with the milk the evil passions and frisky habits of the animal supplying the milk."

Today's American mother, freed from the fears and superstitions of her ancestors, is becoming more informed about proper infant nutrition. Until recently, for example, many mothers were anxious to discontinue the use of formula after 6 months and start their baby on whole milk (which they proudly considered an in-

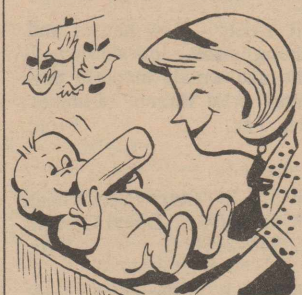
dication of the child's development).

However, in December, 1970, the Committee on Nutri-



tion of the American Academy of Pediatrics pointed out that the age of greatest iron need and highest prevalence of iron deficiency is from 6 to 18 months of age. The Committee stated that whole or evaporated milk contains only trace amounts of iron and should not be substituted for an iron-fortified formula.

With this Committee recommendation, more mothers will



now use iron-fortified formula as long as they bottle feed their babies. They may continue using the same iron-fortified formula as beverage milk along with the usual solid foods until their babies are at least 12 months of age.



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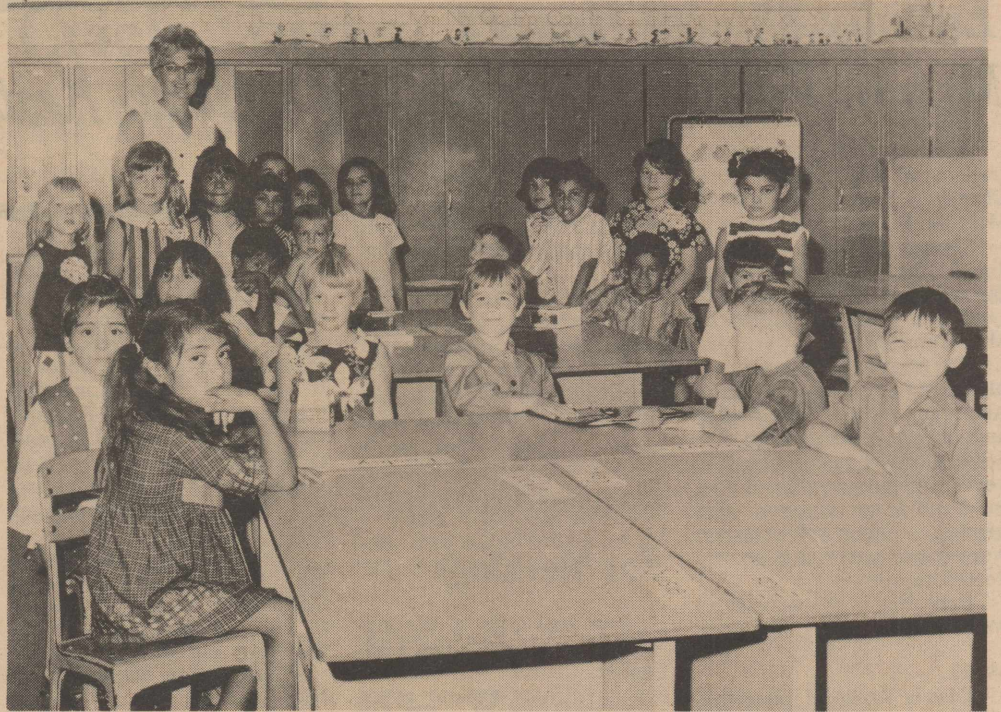

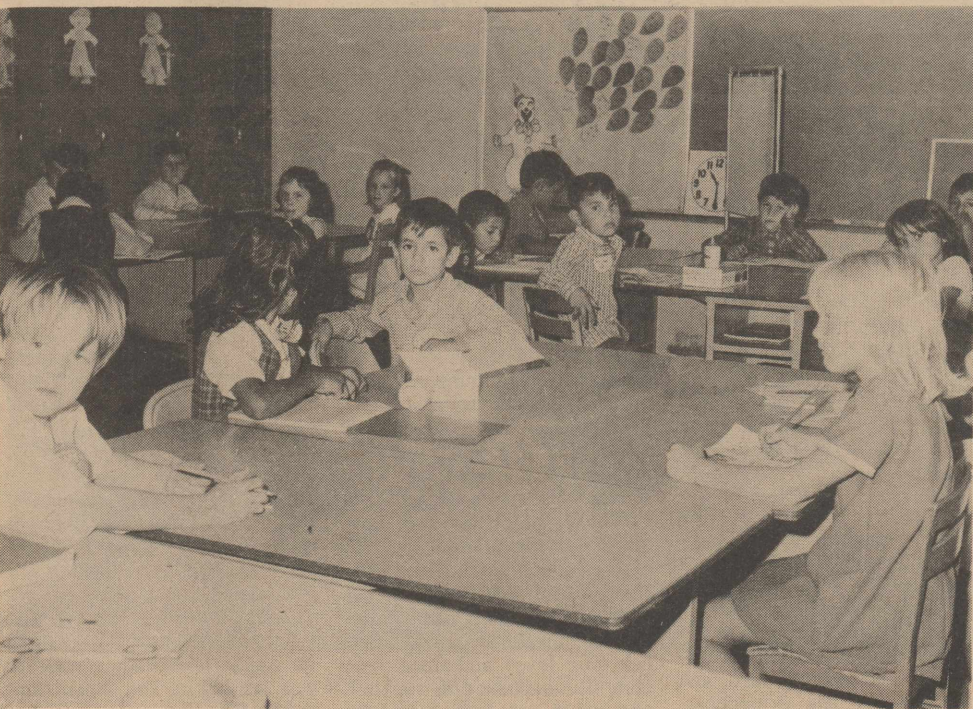
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Alfalfa Hay Can Provide Big Benefits For Farmers

"There is no substitute for alfalfa hay in a feedlot ration," said John Henry Baumgardner, animal nutritionist at Texas Tech University. "Texas, and especially the Panhandle, feedlots have provided a big, new opportunity for alfalfa hay."

Hay is big business. Of all the crops produced in this country, hay is second only to corn in farm value. And yet the efficiency is another managerial "must" to produce quality hay," said Bruce Rigler of Rigler Brothers Jersey Farm, near Plainview. "We have planted common alfalfa for 50 years, but in 1970 we planted Dawson variety as recommended by Browning Seed Co. of Plainview. It is a good yielding, leafy hay that withstands aphids damage. We are real pleased with it. It has performed as well as all advertising said it would. The first cutting of Dawson in 1971 yielded 2-2 1/2 tons per acre, and we expect to cut five times."

iciency of production and harvesting is very low. The average hay yield of Texas and Oklahoma is only 1.73 tons per acre. Profit opportunities are available to farmers who will grow quality hay and are able to produce up to ten tons per acre of alfalfa. The demand is there. The adoption of new varieties and better management practices can put more profits in the picture.

"The most obvious production problem is water. Alfalfa needs 40 inches of irrigation water per season to produce maximum yields," said D. Frank Petr, Texas Extension Service agronomist. "Many producers figure they must average six tons per acre to make money with alfalfa. Five tons per acre is the break-even point."

"The selection of a good

income of \$450 per acre," explained Rigler. "This is our most profitable crop."

Prices paid for hay have been inconsistent. Some growers report \$25 per ton is an average year-in, year-out price for baled alfalfa. Most feeders are unwilling to pay more than \$40 per ton for hay delivered to the feedyards. Some horsemen are willing to spend \$50 per ton to get top quality hay. They don't want to take a chance of foundering a prize winning animal on moldy or musty hay.

The challenge is there. If you have the water and fertile soil, if you plant the recommended variety, and if you harvest and irrigate at the proper time for quality as well as quantity, you have an attractive product to sell to all the livestock industry.

Financial Facts

Did you know that the U.S. used a special dollar to compete with the Mexican peso in the Orient.

Known as the trade dollar, the special coin was 420 grams in weight, as compared to standard silver dollar weight of 412.5 grams. The first coinage was in 1873 and for three years the export dollars could also be used in this country. They were legal tender to the limited extent of five dollars.

Because of the decline in the price of silver bullion in 1896, Congress instructed the treasury to limit coinage to export demand.

The trade dollar was issued until 1883. In 1884 ten coins were struck, and in 1885, half that number. Both of the latter striking were specimen proofs. An

1884 and 1885 trade dollar is worth about \$9,000.

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Dimmitt

Crop specialists recommend planting alfalfa in late August behind most of the serious weed problems.

Soil fertility is another management "must" in quality and quantity alfalfa hay production. Rigler Brothers figure that properly fertilized alfalfa will produce enough more quality hay so they can charge off the cost to one cutting and store four cuttings free and clean.

The timing of harvesting and irrigation can greatly influence both yield and quality. Most all hay specialists recommend harvesting alfalfa at one-tenth bloom for best balance of quality and yield. Then get the hay off and water. The last cutting of alfalfa in the fall should be far enough ahead of first frost to allow for a build-up of root reserve. In the Plains area, this last cutting is often made about the middle of September.

"Ten tons per acre of quality alfalfa sold through cows for milk production can mean an

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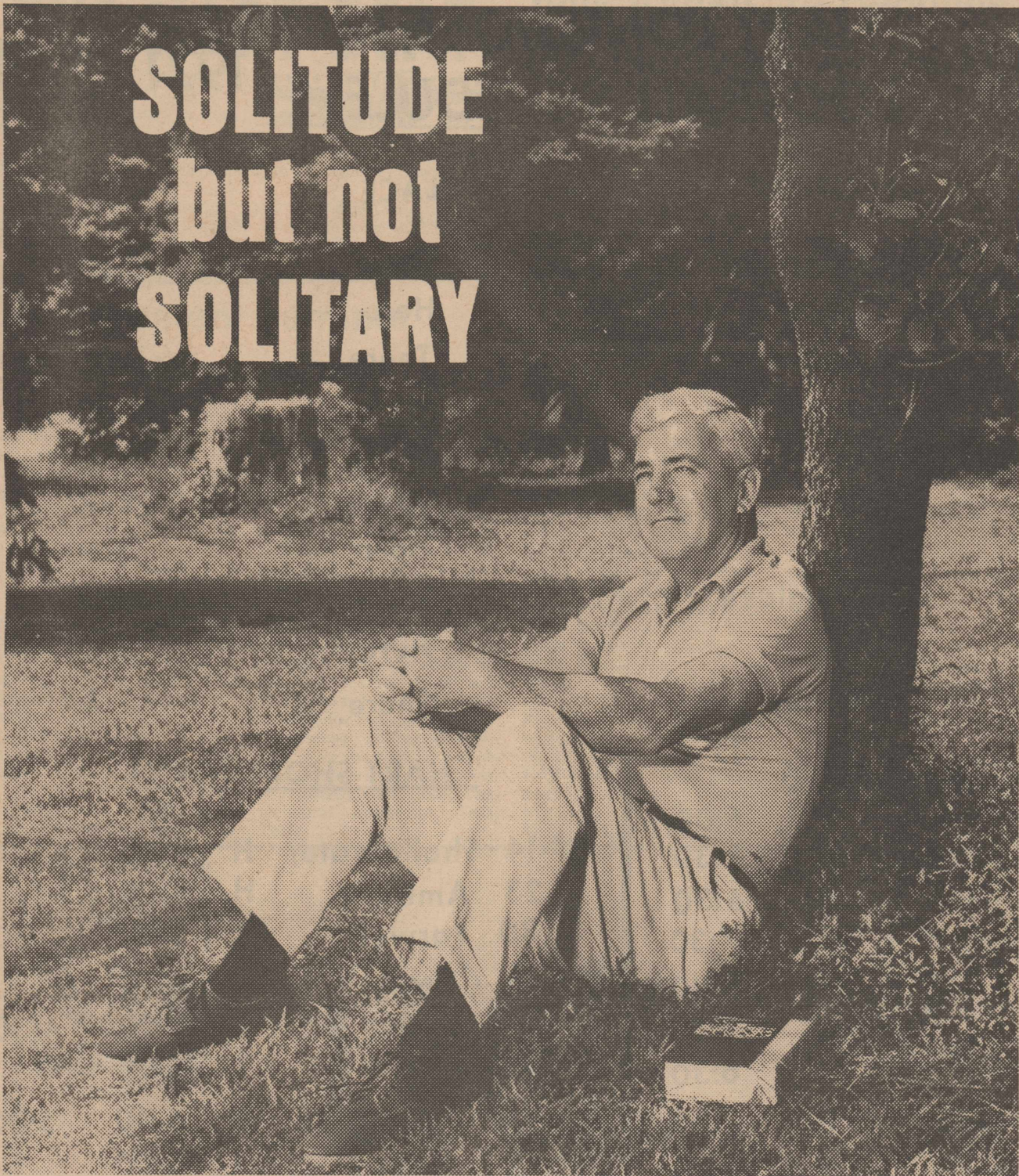
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SOLITUDE but not SOLITARY
