I have followed this case from his medical discharge from the air corps ground crew at Lowry Field, Colo., until he was drafted back in the service a few weeks ago. I can assure you that everything he writes in his letter comes straight from his heart. He has made many unsuccessful attempts to re-enter the service since he received the medical discharge which followed two or three visits to surgery. He pinned his final hope on selective service to place him back in the army, and it worked—he is happy!

Glenn has three brothers in the service and another brother probably will take up arms for his country next year. They are sons of Mr. and Mrs. G. A. Reagan, farm couple who reside northwest of Abernathy.

Another Abernathy soldier—whose great desire is rapidly propelling him to the accomplishment he sought—is Clyde E. Rhodes, Jr.

From the time he hit March Field, Calif., as a member of the air corps ground crew, his burning desire was to pilot one of Uncle Sam's fighting planes.

The coveted Silver Wings are now in sight! This week he begins advance flight training with Class 43-A at Roswell Army Flying school at Roswell, N. M. He has licked the problems of pre-flight, primary and basic training, and the advance instructions at the controls of a twin-motor ship at R. A. F. S. is the only hurdle left in his race for the Silver Wings. If he makes this last lap, he will have come up the hard way—through the ranks of enlisted men. He is an aviation sergeant.

He knows his plane from prop to the tip of the tail. His experience as a mechanic gives him an extra knowledge of his ship. If he gets those Wings, you may know that he really deserves them.

School Offers Film Programs

In co-operation with the Federal government, Abernathy school is offering a complete film program for this community every two weeks. Supt. W. V. Swinburn announced Tuesday. The pictures, ranging in showing time from 30 minutes to one hour, are produced by the Coordinator of Inter-American Affairs, Office of Civilian Defense and the Office of War Information.

A complete change of program will be available every two weeks, and Supt. W. V. Swinburn is placing the films and the school's projection machine at the disposal of church groups, lodges, clubs, civic organizations, etc. He urges these groups to show the films during all of their sessions where they would consistently fit in with the program of the meeting.

Although the purpose of the films is to advance the war effort in general, they are informative, interesting and entertaining and would be a worthwhile feature on any program where they could be shown.

Following signing of petitions and at the request of farmers, school board members in a regular meeting Monday night decided to dismiss Abernathy school from Tuesday afternoon to the morning of Monday, Nov. 23, to permit students to aid farmers in harvesting the cotton and feed crops. This is the first time in several years that the school has been dismissed for this purpose.

With the closing of school, from three to five hundred students will be available to assist with the harvest. The number of hands from "South of the Border" in this area is considerably smaller than in past years due to tire shortage, etc.

Motorists can secure application form for registration for gasoline rationing from filling stations and other places in Hale county, E. W. Kinney, Hale county rationing board chairman, states.

The forms are for "A" and "D" ration books, for passenger cars and motorcycles respectively. Attached to the forms will be a tire inspection blank on which must be listed serial numbers of the five casings which the car owner intends to keep on the car. Excess tires must be sold or donated to the government. If a motorist has more than five tires for his car, gasoline rations will be denied. There will be periodical inspections of tires and original tires must be on the car, or the owner be able to show he secured the tires through regular channels, or rations will be denied.

Kinney emphasized that owners of commercial vehicles or trucks should not try to register those vehicles when registration will take place on Nov. 12, 13 and 14 at school houses over the nation. Applications for commercial vehicles and trucks are not available at the rationing board, and Kinney reports they are expected soon.

He stressed that at present, the applications now at service stations are for passenger cars and motorcycles only.

Applications for gas rations will be distributed by firms to motorists calling for them. Applicants will take the forms home, fill them out and present them at schoolhouses Nov. 12, 13 or 14. Following is a list of firms which will distribute the applications:

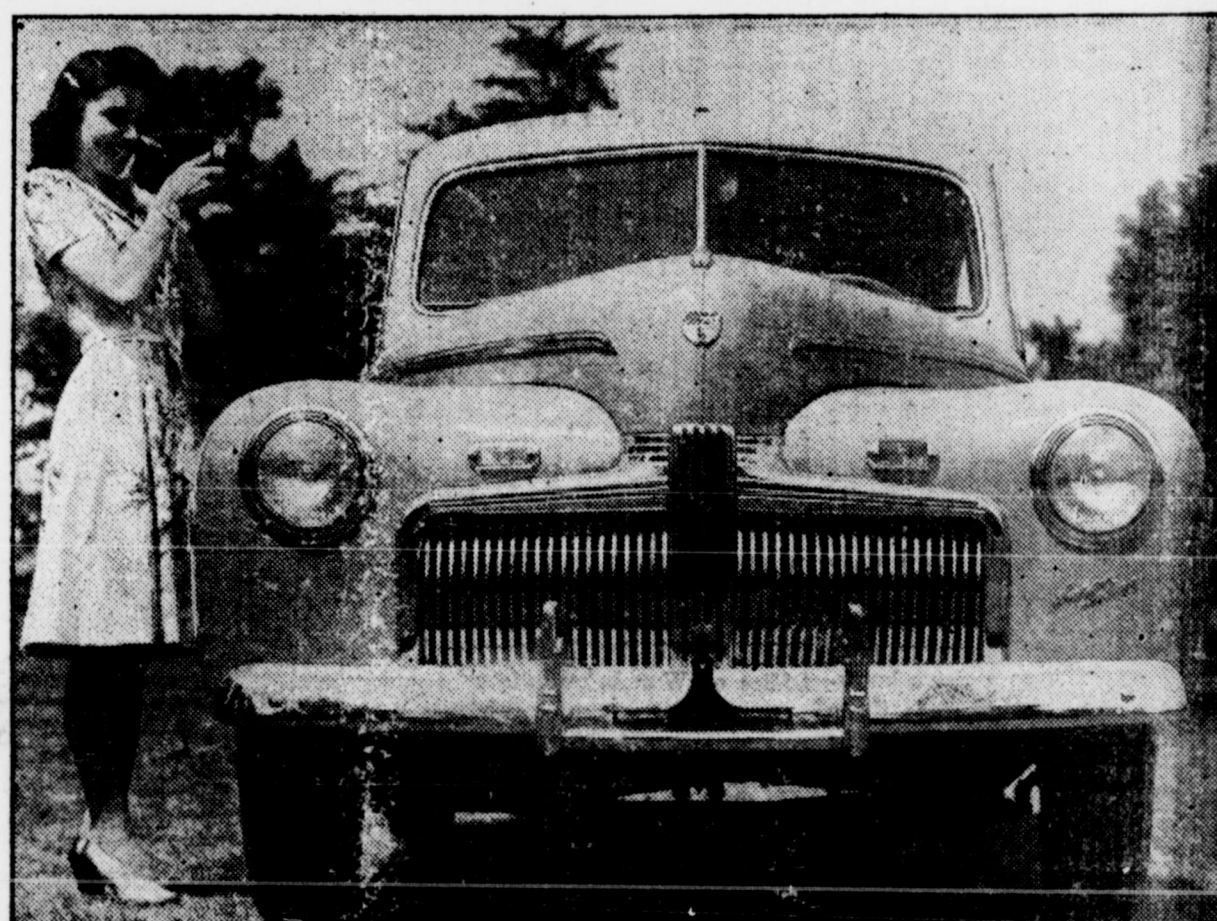

I enjoy this nice and warm country, though, we're catching up on our swimming and summer sports, while I guess it's kinda cool out where you are. They tell us a few flakes of snow fell in 1936, so don't guess I'll see much snow this winter.

Dear Editor:

I was informed by a friend in today's mail that you were asking for my address. To assure you that I still think of my home town, I will

write you this letter.

Since the 11th day of September, I have been stationed at three different camps and air fields and have traveled some 4,500 miles. This finds me patiently waiting for more shipping orders.

As you know, my first enlistment in the army air corps was cut short by a medical discharge. From that day until my induction this time I never gave up hope of getting back into the good old U. S. Army. During those months after my discharge I was completely lost, I missed all my buddies, Reville, Retreat, and all the other things that go with Army life. I tried continuously to re-enlist, and finally that great day came, and now I am at home with my comrades and a member of the greatest organization in the world, according to my estimation, there is nothing better than being a good, honest, courageous soldier. I am proud of my uniform, and all the liberties it stands for.

To all the boys who will be joining us, I will truthfully say that they will receive a hearty welcome from all us comrades now at arms. This is a great place to be, and for a great cause, so there is plenty of room for all red blooded Americans who are seeking adventure and action. Join

us and you will be proud.

One of the greatest sights I have ever seen was a battalion of well disciplined and well trained soldiers marching in formation. Each man must do his part, he must be a member of the team. Teamwork means that each man gives everything in his power to make for the success of the whole unit. Success in battle depends on teamwork just as much as success in a football game depends on the pull-together spirit of the football team. Unless you play your own special part, the team may not win.

I can't tell you what we are learning or what we are doing, but will assure you that we are going to worry the Japs and Nazis a lot.

Since childhood I have wanted to be a soldier, and now that I am one I take great interest in statements made by our great military leaders. Here is a statement by our famous commander, Gen. Douglas MacArthur:

"On the fields of friendly strife are sown the seeds,

Which, in other years, on other fields, will bear the fruits of victory."

These words were spoken by a great leader and have a great meaning, so why not pass them on. It is time for lights out, so I must

close and go to bed, as you can know we get to sleep as late as we want to in the morning and then have our breakfast served in bed by a pretty waitress.

I would appreciate a word from you anytime.

Well, Buford, here goes on a note thanking you for the paper. It is swell and brings back some good feelings reading the news of good old Abnathian. I enjoy reading the letters that the other boys who are in the armed forces write in. I like to know where every one is — hoping that some one I know might be close enough to see once in a while. I've been in the air corps now 17 months and two boys from Abnathian are all I've seen. One of them was Wesley Hazle, who is stationed near here, and the other was John McDonald, from New Deal community, but it has been several months since I've seen either of them.

I'm stationed at Hamilton Field, California, at the present. I'm looking to be moved from here, though, also every one else you see that I

pretty soon, and where they are will be I don't know as yet. I've been stationed here at this field since July. At the first I was stationed at March Field, Cal., and by the rounds Mills Field, and now here. Most of that time has been spent in the field. That at Long Beach and Mills was.

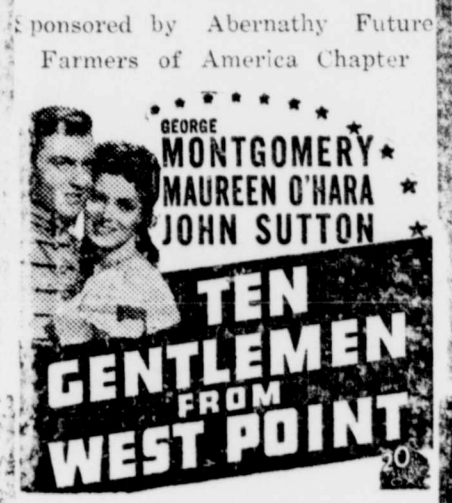

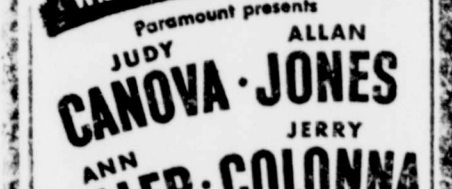

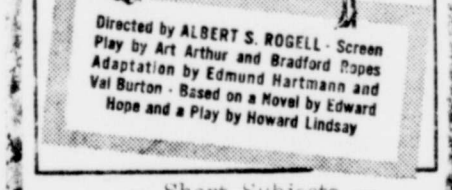

FARM ELECTION SET NOV. 14

D. B. Williamson, chairman of the Lubbock county Agricultural Adjustment agency committee, reports the annual election of community committeemen will be held Friday, Nov. 13, and the county committee on Saturday, Nov. 14. The county A. A. chairman said the elections this year will come about a month earlier than customarily because of gas rationing which goes into effect after Nov. 22.

Community committeemen will be elected in the same manner as in past years. Producers will meet and select their community representatives, three from each of 12 communities into which Lubbock county has been about evenly divided. The 36 community committeemen selected this year is twice the number previously elected. The idea, Williamson said, is to give the communities better representation and more trained workers in the agricultural war-time program, all of whom must continually be explaining the A. A. program.

Producing farmers in every community are asked to take part in the Nov. 13 meetings if they are complying with the farm program, he said.

FARMERS ARE ASSIGNED 1943 COTTON ACREAGE ALLOTMENTS

The Agricultural Adjustment agency, through state official B. F. Vance, in College Station, has announced that 31,000 Texas farmers in 26 counties already have been given their 1943 cotton acreage allotments. Allotments will be available for all farmers by Nov. 20. They are expected to be the same as 1942 for most farms.

Texas cotton farmers in 1942 received a total allotment of 9,947,819 acres. Vance said farms on which cotton will be planted next year for the first time since 1940, will be classified as new cotton grower farms. Any producer who does not receive a regular 1943 cotton allotment may request one by contacting the local AAA committee in his home county.
