It's Homecoming Week

for C-City and Westbrook

The week of October 2-6 kicks off Homecoming activities for Colorado and Westbrook High Schools.

A bonfire, parade, dance, crowning of King Flame and Homecoming Queen, half-time ceremonies and a week of special dress are just some of the many activities planned for Homecoming at Colorado High School.

Thursday evening a car caravan will meet at the high school parking lot at 7:30 to go to the bonfire which is scheduled around dark. One of five candidates will be crowned King Flame and reign over the bonfire activities.

Friday's parade will be held at 4:30 p.m. Each class will enter floats and all the participants will line up at 4 p.m. The parade will start at the First Baptist Church, proceed to Third Street and then to Hickory. The parade will then travel through downtown on Second Street and end at the Mitchell County Courthouse.

One of six candidates for Homecoming Queen will be crowned during half-time ceremonies. In addition, the queen

from ten years ago, Denise Jackson Henderson, will participate in the half-time activities.

CHS began Homecoming Week with special dress days. "Two Wolves Are Better Than One", so on Monday students dressed as twins. On Tuesday "Wolves are First Class" which led to students donning their favorite college t-shirts. On Wednesday, "Wolves Are Too Cool" so students wore hats and shades.

Today is "Boot The Pirates" so

there'll be a school-full of boot-wearing students and on Friday, of course, everyone will be wearing red and black.

The Westbrook Wildcats started their Homecoming Week with a crazy hat day Monday. Tuesday was wild hair day and Wednesday was twin day.

Today Westbrook students are all decked out in blue and white "to the max" in preparation for the pep rally and bonfire.

No school will be held Friday

due to a teachers' meeting. Westbrook plays Dawson at 7:30 p.m. with the Homecoming Queen being announced during halftime ceremonies.

A post-game party for grades 7-12 will be held in the school cafeteria with games, music, food and drinks.

Westbrook homecoming ribbons are on sale at the school for \$1.

Newest convenience stores to open soon

Construction is underway on Colorado City's latest fast food restaurants and accompanying convenience stores. Burger King is expected to open the first part of November and McDonald's should open around Christmas, according to the contractors.

J. W. Heidelberg, Jr, contractor with West Texas Building Systems, said that workers at the McDonald's location at the northwest corner of I-20 and 208 finished removing the old fuel tanks last week. This week they'll begin the concrete work on the foundation.

The Exxon convenience store with a full menu McDonald's is owned by Johnny and Tammy Guess, owners of Snow's Exxon.

The Burger King and McD's Convenience Store was originally

scheduled to open in October. However, delays and additions to the original plans have postponed the opening a couple of weeks, said an owner, Mike Dennis.

Plans are for the business to be a 24-hour a day operation, said Dennis.

"That depends on having a sufficient number of employees to cover all the shifts," he said, adding that applications are still being accepted. Applicants can apply at the construction site on the southeast intersection of I-20 and 208.

Next week workers are expected to lay the West Texas quarried limestone rock on the building front and install the glass to finish enclosing the structure.

Local man's body found 12 hours after accident

The death of a Colorado City man is under investigation after his body was discovered 12 hours after a traffic accident in Midland Thursday evening.

The body of David Lynn Tovar, 33, was discovered Friday at 11:45 a.m. near the scene of an accident that had occurred Thursday evening in the 1100 block of S. Midland Drive.

Midland police responded to a rollover of a gray 1992 Toyota Corolla SR5 station wagon at 11:07 p.m. Thursday night.

According to the police report, the vehicle had apparently gone out of control on a curve and flipped or rolled several times before striking an electrical pole. The impact sheared the pole in half and knocked out electrical power to the immediate area for a short time.

Despite a search of the surrounding area, law enforcement personnel at the scene found no occupants in or near the vehicle.

Hospital room rates to increase

Room rates at Mitchell County Hospital will be going up by \$50 a day, following approval by the Mitchell County Hospital Board at a called meeting Thursday morning.

Rates will increase from \$150 for a room without a bath to \$200 a day. Rooms that have a bath have been \$160 a day and will increase to \$210.

The rate change brings the hospital's rates closer to those charged by area hospitals and is closer to the maximum allowable

Chris Sanchez returns from Houston hospital

"Everyone's welcome to come and see me," said Christopher Sanchez, the local ten-year-old who recently returned from a Houston hospital.

Sanchez, who has been battling bone cancer since last spring, said he was anxious to see his friends now that he's home.

He and his family returned Saturday after a

month long stay at M.D. Anderson Cancer Center in Houston where Chris underwent an amputation of one leg, and an operation to remove tumors in one lung.

His father, Daniel Sanchez, said 14 tumors were removed from his left lung. "The surgeries went well and Chris is doing well. This chemotherapy didn't make him sick as it did

before," said Mr. Sanchez.

Originally, he was scheduled to have a third operation on the other lung. However, that procedure was rescheduled until October 17 and instead he had a chemotherapy treatment before returning home last weekend.

"People are sometimes hesitant to call or come by the house because they're not sure, but Christo-

pher welcomes everyone and they can visit any time or call," said Mr. Sanchez, who openly gave out his phone number—728-5272—so friends can easily call Chris.

During his two week rest at home, Christopher said he plans to catch up on his school work. The fourth grader is a student in CISD's Homebound School Program.

COOK'S CORNER



Effie Wheeler

Effie Wheeler has been cooking for about 70 years. That alone is a feat worth talking about, but how she started cooking and what she cooked is even more of a story.

Effie grew up in a family of 16 children, eight boys and eight girls. Being the ninth child, she learned early on how to cook big meals. In fact, a typical breakfast at her home was nine cups of dry oatmeal (made in a huge steamer), bacon or sausage, eggs and biscuits—lots of biscuits—100 to be exact!

By the time Effie was 16, it was her job to make those biscuits every morning. Some were eaten for breakfast and the rest were taken in school lunches. Since all the children were born between 1900 and 1921, there were quite a few going to school.

The only other thing Effie enjoyed cooking growing up was candy. In fact, after she married James Watkins in 1930 and brought him home on their honeymoon to meet her family, her mother told him "the only thing Effie knows how to cook is biscuits and candy."

James' only reply was, "That's all right!" James and Effie lived at Mule Creek, NM, 60 miles from the nearest town. There she taught school in a one-teacher school for \$85.00 a month. Her husband's family owned a ranch out there. In fact, a few of the 21 pupils she taught were kin-to-her-husband.

In 1936, James and Effie moved to Arizona where they both worked in the mining camps there. Effie worked 22 years as a bookkeeper in the camps. Her job was very important in that she kept up with

all the minerals going out of the mines, along with other book-keeping duties. "I just like working with figures, so I really liked my job," Effie told me.

During this time, the couple had two daughters, Jimmie Jacks, who now lives with Effie and Beverly Nichols, who lives in Kansas.

After 36 years in the mining camps, James' health was deteriorating, so the decision was made to buy Effie's family farm and moved back to Texas. Effie was pleased with the decision, but knew James had never liked Texas sandstorms. Needless to say, after 37 years of being away, Effie returned to Loraine.

In 1968, when James died, Effie continued to run the farm, feeding cows in the dead of winter and doing all the other things to keep a farm operating.

In 1975, Effie married Raymond Wheeler, but continued to live on the farm. They spent quite a bit of time travelling around the country and took two memorable trips—to Italy and Hawaii. In 1984, Raymond died and she was once again on the farm by herself.

In 1993, Effie and Jimmie decided to sell the farm and move into town. It was a hard decision, but one that had to be made.

Effie has stayed busy over the years with the Loraine Home Demonstration Club, Loraine Senior Citizens and the Loraine Methodist Church. In 1986, she was named Mitchell County Woman of the Year and in 1993, she was given the title of Club Woman of the Year by the Home Demonstration Clubs.

Plans were made for the Looney Club to serve at a tasting spree on November 7 from 11 a.m.-2 p.m. in the C.C. Thompson Room.

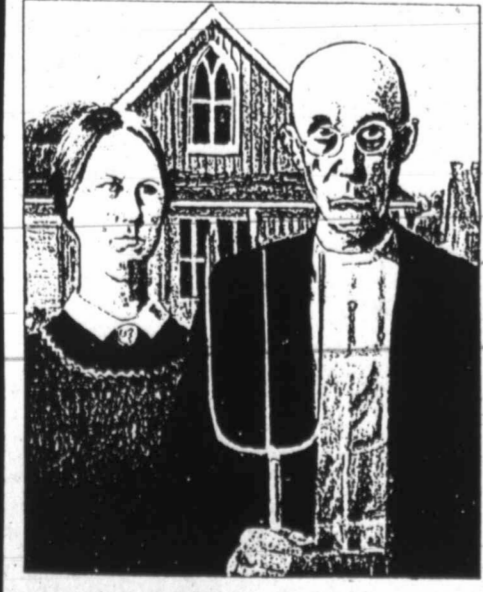
Refreshments were served to six members, Lou Ella Hall, Lonie

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A modest woman, I'm sure there are many other accomplishments in Effie's life she didn't share with me. She blushes when praised for a job well done, so her daughter Jimmie, who now lives with her told me some of these facts.

In a home filled with laughter, when asked to sum up her life, Effie just said, "I guess you could say I've had my day in the sun and my day in the shadow."

The three recipes Effie is sharing with us today are old family favorites. Many younger folks may not have even tried to make bread pudding, but according to Jimmie, "Mama's is the best!"

MAMA'S BREAD PUDDING

4 medium size biscuits
 1 large can milk
 1/2 can water
 3 eggs
 1 cup sugar
 1 tsp. vanilla or lemon flavoring
 Crumble biscuits and pour heated milk and water over and stir thoroughly. Beat eggs and sugar together and add flavoring. Pour over biscuit mixture and stir. Pour into two-quart baking dish and cook at 350 degrees for 45 minutes, or until done. Should still have a custard consistency in the middle.

DATE LOAF CANDY

3 cups sugar
 1 cup milk
 1 Tbs. white Karo syrup
 1 cup chopped dates
 1 cup chopped nuts
 1 Tbs. butter
 1 tsp. vanilla

Mix sugar, milk, syrup and dates and cook until it forms a soft ball in cold water. Remove from heat and beat until mixture loses its gloss. Add nuts and vanilla. Pour on wet cloth and roll into a log. Refrigerate until hard. Should set within two hours. Slice as desired or all at once and store in airtight container. Will last two weeks.

QUICK CHILI AND BEANS

1 lb. hamburger meat
 1 medium onion, chopped
 1 can tomato soup
 2 cans pinto beans
 1 Tbs. chili powder (or as desired)

1/2 tsp. salt
 Brown meat, onion and salt together in large skillet until meat is browned. Add remainder of ingredients and simmer thirty minutes. Serve with cornbread or crackers.

Private pesticide applicators need to renew certification

Private pesticide applicators who were certified before January 10, 1989 have until December 31 of this year to renew their certification or apply for a private license.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency requires that certification be renewed every five years for private pesticide applicators such as farmers who use restricted or state-

limited use pesticides on their crops.

Two options for renewal are available. Applicators may obtain 15 continuing education units, including two credits in laws and regulations and one credit in integrated pest management, by December 31 and repeat this process every five years.

Applicators who cannot meet the December 31 deadline have the option of taking Texas Agricultural Extension Service's private applicator training course and applying for the private application license, which has a fee of \$50.

Continuing education units may be obtained by completing TDA-accredited courses, by applying for credit through appropriate college

courses or through training held by out-of-state sponsors including universities, national associations or the federal government.

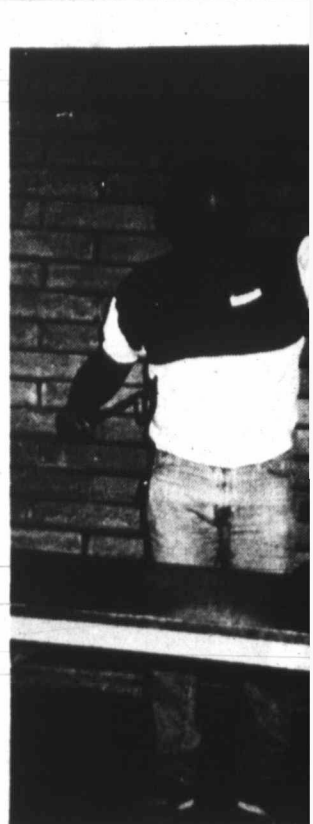

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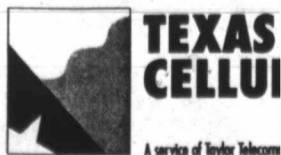

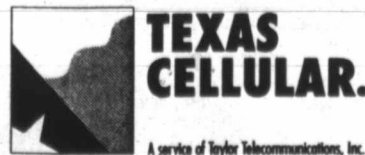

OIL & GAS NEWS

Flowing 41 barrels of 44-gravity oil and 430,000 CF gas daily on a 12/64 choke, the No. 3 Brennan Ranch has been recompleted in Mitchell County's Dunn Field. Flowing tubing pressure was gauged at 600 PSI. Location is four miles north-northwest of Colorado City with Baytech Inc. as the operator.

The seven-year-old well was first operated by Kohler Energy Corp. It produced 397 barrels of 46-gravity oil and 245,000 CF gas on an 8/64 choke with flowing tubing pressure standing at 915 PSI.

The recompletion bid plugged back the 8,200-ft. well to 7,989, with perforations for Strawn Formation pay at 7,928 to 7,931 feet into the wellbore.

Baytech Inc. of Midland has staked location for a pair of developmental wells between six and eight miles north of Silver in Mitchell County's Jasmine Field. Both wells carry permits for 7,400 feet of hole. The No. 1-10 Nail is located in a 280-acre lease in the C.H. McGinnis Survey A-910, while the No. 1-23 Nail is in a 160-acre lease in the H&T RY CO Survey A-17.

Meridian Oil Inc. has filed first production reports on a new Westbrook Field developmental well located four miles west of Westbrook in Mitchell County. The well, known as the No. 1108 Southwest Westbrook Unit, produced 26 barrels of 25-gravity oil. Meridian took it to a total depth of 3,250 feet and plugged back to 3,200. Production will be from a Clear Fork Formation interval, 2,916 to 3,114 feet into the hole.

Showing combined ability to produce 55 barrels of oil per day, two new wells have been completed nine miles southwest of Westbrook in Mitchell County's Iatan-East Howard Field. The wells are designated the Nos. 16 and 17 C. Fee Mitchell. They will produce from San Angelo perforations ranging from 2,550 to 3,048 feet. Both wells have a total depth of 3,300 feet. Parker & Parsley Development Limited Partnership is the operator.

some advice for those wishing to improve their lives through exercise: "Make up your mind, have determination and don't allow yourself to think about quitting. If you miss a session, go right back!"

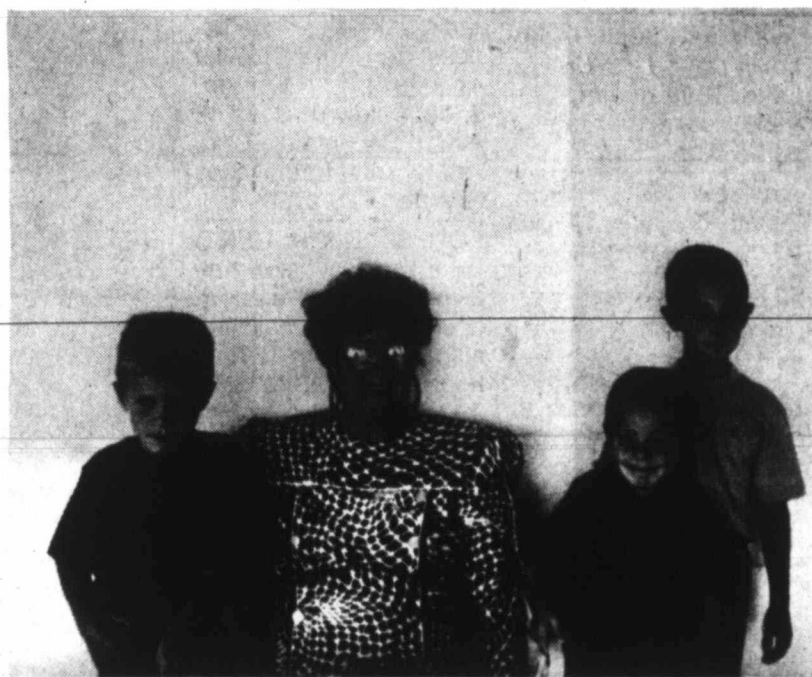
Their advice on eating is to "avoid the fat—instead of salt pork and ham to add flavor, use spices and herbs."
