WASHINGTON, March 3.—The south and southwest invaded the free list of the Hawley-Smoot tariff bill in the senate today and carried off protective duties for long staple cotton, turpentine and wool.

Another night session found the senate still considering the notable section of the bill with prospects that it would be disposed of soon.

Little debate preceded the vote on a proposal of Senator Borah, republican, California, for a duty of seven cents a pound on cotton of a staple of one and one-eighth inches and over. A roll call was demanded, however, after it was approved earlier by a viva voce vote. It carried, 49 to 33.

All three factions in the tariff struggle split on the vote. Twenty-five republicans and 24 democrats voted for the duty, the first on cotton since the emergency tariff act of 1921, and 23 republicans and 19 democrats opposed it.

Senator Smoot, republican, Utah, served notice that compensatory increases on tire fabric, cotton threads, and possibly other commodities in the cotton schedule would have to be made on account of the vote. It was this statement that caused Senator La Follette, republican, Wisconsin, to demand reconsideration of the Smoot tariff amendment.

WASHINGTON, March 3.—A prediction that the tariff bill would be passed by the senate by Wednesday night was made by Senator Smoot.

Taft Tenaciously Clings To Life

Reserve Energy Of Former
President, Chief Justice
Amazes Physicians; No
Change Shown Monday

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, March 3.—One month from the day that he resigned as chief justice, William Howard Taft today clung tenaciously to the thin thread of life, which has sustained him since Wednesday.

In view of his 72 years, the former president's reserve energy has amazed the attending physicians. They have said that this will be his last illness, emphasizing that any improvement would be but temporary.

The regular morning bulletin by Doctors Francis R. Hager and Thomas A. Clancy said Mr. Taft had spent "a good night," and added: "He continued to take some nourishment. A few days ago his condition was very critical, but he has slightly improved, and, unless some further sudden change occurs due to the arterio sclerosis, his span of life for the present is indeterminate."

Arterio sclerosis, or hardening of the arteries with consequent impairment of the blood circulation, has given the doctors more concern of late than any of the other ailments afflicting Mr. Taft.

Interest Is Aroused Here In Move For Extension Of Burlington Line In Area

A GREAT deal of interest has been aroused in Lubbock, especially among interested parties in the Santa Fe's recently rejected rail building program into New Mexico, through the announcement from Stamford of a movement for extension of the Burlington railroad in this state and into New Mexico.

Expressions of impatience have been evident in this city due to the delay in the promised visit to Lubbock of Santa Fe officials to discuss this city's status in the situation. Local Chamber of Commerce officials announced last night that no further word has been received from the rail authorities, though a meeting was scheduled here either Tuesday or Wednesday of this week.

500 Miles Involved
The program as announced from Stamford embraces four different lines, involving over 500 miles of new construction by the Burlington route.

The project includes an extension of the line now terminated at Dimmitt, northwestward to Tucuman, N. M., an extension from Plainview

southwestward to Roswell, N. M., extension of the Wichita Valley, a Burlington subsidiary, northwest from Spur, its present terminus, to Plainview, and the building of a new line from Stamford directly east to Fort Worth.

To Meet Tomorrow
Representatives of the interested communities in the sections that would be served by the proposed new lines have been called to meet at Plainview tomorrow for purpose of planning an organization to sponsor a concerted effort to show executives of the Burlington system the importance and necessity of adopting and carrying out the program.

It has been pointed out by interested parties that if the Burlington undertakes the construction as outlined, that system will have a network of lines in West Texas and New Mexico equal to that of the Santa Fe and also give to Burlington the most direct connections between West Texas and New Mexico territories and the main inland centers of transportation of any rail line serving the region.

AUSTIN, March 3.—The house of representatives late today voted for sine die adjournment of the fifth special session of the legislature on March 15. A resolution by Rep. Coke R. Stevenson of Junction calling for adjournment next Saturday was defeated. The 30-day constitutional limit will expire March 20.

The resolution must be concurred in by the senate before it is binding on both houses.

The proposal to cut the session short ushered in an acrimonious debate that raged for nearly two hours during which former Governor James E. Ferguson was given credit for initiating the idea of premature adjournment.

Admonition Opposed
Representative B. E. Quinn of Beaumont, opposed adjournment, although he said he had signed the original Stevenson resolution which had proposed adjournment last Saturday but was laid on the table with an amendment by Rep. Penrose Metcalf of San Angelo to make adjournment March 8.

"I ordered my name stricken from the resolution when I discovered former Governor Ferguson was advocating adjournment of the legislature," Quinn stated.

Rep. T. R. Bond of Terrell said he believed the greatest emergency existing was for the legislature to adjourn and go home.

Should Remain Loyal
Rep. B. J. Forbes of Weatherford declared the legislators owed it to the people to remain loyal.

Dan Cupid Winner Over Grim Reaper

Births in Lubbock during the month of January surpassed the number of deaths by seven, according to statistics announced yesterday from the state department of health at Austin. Births during the first month of the year totaled 28 while the number of deaths was 21.

According to the report there were filed in Texas in 1929, 62,458 death records which is an increase of more than 10,000 over the previous year, and an increase of more than 20,000 over the years 1927 and 1928, when the vital statistics laws passed.

Though this total does not include any delayed records, on a basis of 5,000,000 population, indicates a gross death rate for the state between 11 and 12 per 1,000.

Bullet-Riddled Body Of Slain Youth Discovered

Posse of 300 Finds Remains In River After Long Hunt

(By Associated Press)

TEXARKANA, Ark., March 3.—The body of Lloyd Elliott, 22, was found here today in the Sulphur river. A bullet wound in the head and another near the heart was found on the body. Elliott had been missing since Friday. His body was found after an all-day search by a posse of 300 officers and men.

Two alleged moonshiners with whom Elliott was said to have had trouble were sought tonight by Sheriff G. H. Brooks.

Horse, Dog Return

Elliott, who was engaged in raising hogs in the Sulphur river bottoms about five miles from his home, left Friday with his two partners, relatives said. The trio separated while rounding up the hogs and the other men returned home, thinking Elliott had preceded them. Saturday Elliott's horse and dog returned home without him.

Today W. J. Tucker, one of the searchers, observed Elliott's feet protruding from the river near the bank after following two sets of footprints to the scene. Neither of the footprints corresponded with those of the slain man. Officers traced the tracks to the spot where they believed Elliott was slain.

Trouble Related
Relatives said Elliott had had trouble recently with two men whom they believed moonshiners. The trouble was understood to have been over the theft of some of Elliott's hogs.

The slaying of Elliott was the third near here in recent months attributed to moonshiners. Last November the bodies of Lee and Arthur Mason were found in an abandoned well in Miller county, Ark. after they had been missing 10 days. Both had been shot a number of times.

Elliott was survived by his parents, four brothers and one sister, all of DeKalb.

Leaking Gas Main Blamed For Blast

Officers Probe Explosion In Telegraph Office At San Angelo; Claim Spark Caused By Roller Chair

SAN ANGELO, March 3.—The igniting of an accumulator gas under the floor from a leaky gas main by a spark caused by a roller chair striking a nail in the floor was blamed by officers here today for the explosion in a telegraph office Saturday that resulted in the injury of several persons.

Officers, who made an extensive investigation of the explosion, said they had learned that messenger boys had stood in an alley outside the building and struck matches to cause flares of gas to burn from the ground.

Three of those injured remained in a hospital today, but physicians said all would recover.

Ill-Fated Pilot

Prisoners Not To Be Admitted Due To Crowded Cells

(By Associated Press)

HOUSTON, March 3.—No more prisoners will be admitted into the main state penitentiary at Huntsville or any of the prison farms "until the normal capacity of the system is reached," the state prison board decided today by unanimous resolution.

The board took this action at its regular semi-monthly meeting here. The resolution follows:

"On account of the extremely overcrowded condition of the penitentiary proper at Huntsville and the various prison units at the farms, and the physical condition of the said properties, and for protection of the public at large and the state, as well as for the protection and welfare of the prisoners themselves, the acting general manager is hereby instructed to notify the transfer agent of the system and the warden of the penitentiary that no more prisoners will be received in the state prison system until the normal capacity of the prison system is reached, at which time further notice will be given. The above resolution adopted by the prison board on 3-3-30."

Carl Williams In Acreage Warning To Cotton Grower

"The recent weakness in cotton prices should be taken as a sharp warning to cotton growers," declared Carl Williams, of Oklahoma, member of the federal farm board, in a bulletin received Monday by the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Williams, in his outline of the situation, calls attention to the fact that the weakness rests on two things—a low current rate of cotton consumption and trade anticipation of a larger crop in 1930. His view are in line generally with resolutions adopted last week at a meeting in this city of Panhandle and South Plains growers and bankers.

Wets' Testimony Against Pro Law To Finish Today

Time Extension Granted To Opponents Of Eighteenth Amendment; Dry To Put Witnesses In Hearing

WASHINGTON, March 3. (P)—Chairman Graham of the house judiciary committee said today it had been definitely decided to end tomorrow wet presentation of their case against prohibition. Those opposing the eighteenth amendment were to have closed their testimony last week, but an extension of time was allowed because of the number desiring to be heard.

The dry have not made public their list of witnesses, saying they preferred to announce them after the "wets had had their fling."

Testimony by wet witnesses before the committee was assailed today in a statement by the Board of Temperance, Prohibition and Public Morals of the Methodist Episcopal church.

The statement asserted that the dry might show better judgment if, instead of answering the wet charges, they requested anti-prohibitionists "to make use of the time granted to the supporters of the law."

The statements made by the opponents of prohibition, it is said, "have in many cases been so ill-considered, so reckless, so sensational, that they are calculated to cause a distinct reaction against the wet movement."

LIQUOR EXPORT UP

Bill Would Ban Shipments Into United States

OTTAWA, Ont., March 3. (P)—A bill to amend the export act, enabling the government to forbid the shipment of liquor to the United States, will be introduced in the house of commons by Prime Minister Mackenzie King this week, probably tomorrow.

The general opinion seems to be that if the bill comes to a vote both the liberal and the conservative parties will be split on it. The United Farmers of Alberta and the progressives will be almost solidly for the bill, it is understood.

Two Dallas High Youths Given Long Prison Sentences

Young Men Explain Series Of Robberies With Desire For Thrill; Ask Chance To Begin Life Anew

FORT WORTH, March 3. (AP)—Two Dallas high school boys, with tears in their voices, faced a jury in district court today and asked for a chance to begin life over. The young men, Raymond Snoga and Roscoe Hendrix, were at the end of a trail of robberies that began with a desire for a thrill.

They were charged with robbing two Fort Worth filling stations and with an assault to rob the Sun Drug company. It was at the drug store that they were caught. The jury brought in verdict of five years in the two robbery cases, two years in the other, making a total of 12 years. This was the minimum that could have been given on the pleas of guilty, and the jury recommended that the time run concurrently. Judge Hoxey followed this suggestion, and the boys will have to spend the minimum of five years each in the state penitentiary. They were sentenced following the jury verdict.

Admits Guilt

Snoga took the stand and said, "I never intended to be a hickster by trade. I just wanted to see what it was like. I'm guilty of these things. While I was a student in high school I read about hijackings in newspapers and got my idea from them. I think I could make a man of myself if the jury sees fit to be lenient."

While he was saying this, in a way that suggested his voice was about to break, the mother, Mrs. C. B. Snoga, sat inside the rail of the court. She was crying softly.

Sought Thrill

A few minutes later Hendrix took the stand and said he was seeking a sort of thrill. I read about robberies and didn't realize the seriousness until it was too late. I never intended to hurt anyone and took it for granted the victims always would be.

Poplance Nervous Following Series Of Earth Tremors

Brawley, California, Back To Normalcy; Business Of Clearing Up Debris Of Quakes Under Way

BRAWLEY, Cal., March 3. (AP)—Although the poplance still is slightly nervous, Brawley went on a business-as-usual basis today after clearing up the debris left by a steady series of earthquakes.

Bricks that fell from the walls of buildings and glass which cracked to the sidewalk during the heavy shocks were hauled out of town quickly. Supplies of glass also were rushed here from Los Angeles to repair damage to store fronts.

Began Tuesday

The quakes began last Tuesday and were felt throughout Imperial Valley, from Calexico, on the Mexican border, to Calipatria, near the Salton Sea. On Saturday at 3:47 p. m. the first major shock was experienced. It was centered here.

Three other major tremors visited the same area during the night, and yesterday, in their wake, several smaller ones occurred, the last at 2 p. m.

One two-story apartment building was wrecked and was condemned, and the walls of more than two score other business structures were cracked.

Leg Fractured

Mrs. E. C. Durham sustained a fractured leg when a mass of bricks fell on her as she was walking down the street. A ranger was knocked unconscious by bricks falling through the top of his automobile, and a child was struck in the face by a piece of a cornice.

Many hotel guests here spent sleepless hours Saturday night sitting in lobbies and interrupting card games to dash into the streets with each recurring shock. Residents, however, apparently unafraid in frame houses, adhered to their routine.

WINTER VISITS SOUTH Severe Lash Felt In Wide Southern Section

ATLANTA, Ga., March 3. (AP)—Winter rode a howling March wind across the south today, sending the mercury from spring-like heights to sub-freezing temperatures over a wide area, and brought snow to sections of Virginia and North Carolina.

The suddenness of the cold wave's arrival caught most sections unprepared after more than two weeks of balmy spring days, but damage, if any, apparently was slight.

Peach growers of South Carolina were not caught napping, and last night smoldering pots glowed in their orchards while snow fell out of the mountains of North Carolina and Virginia.

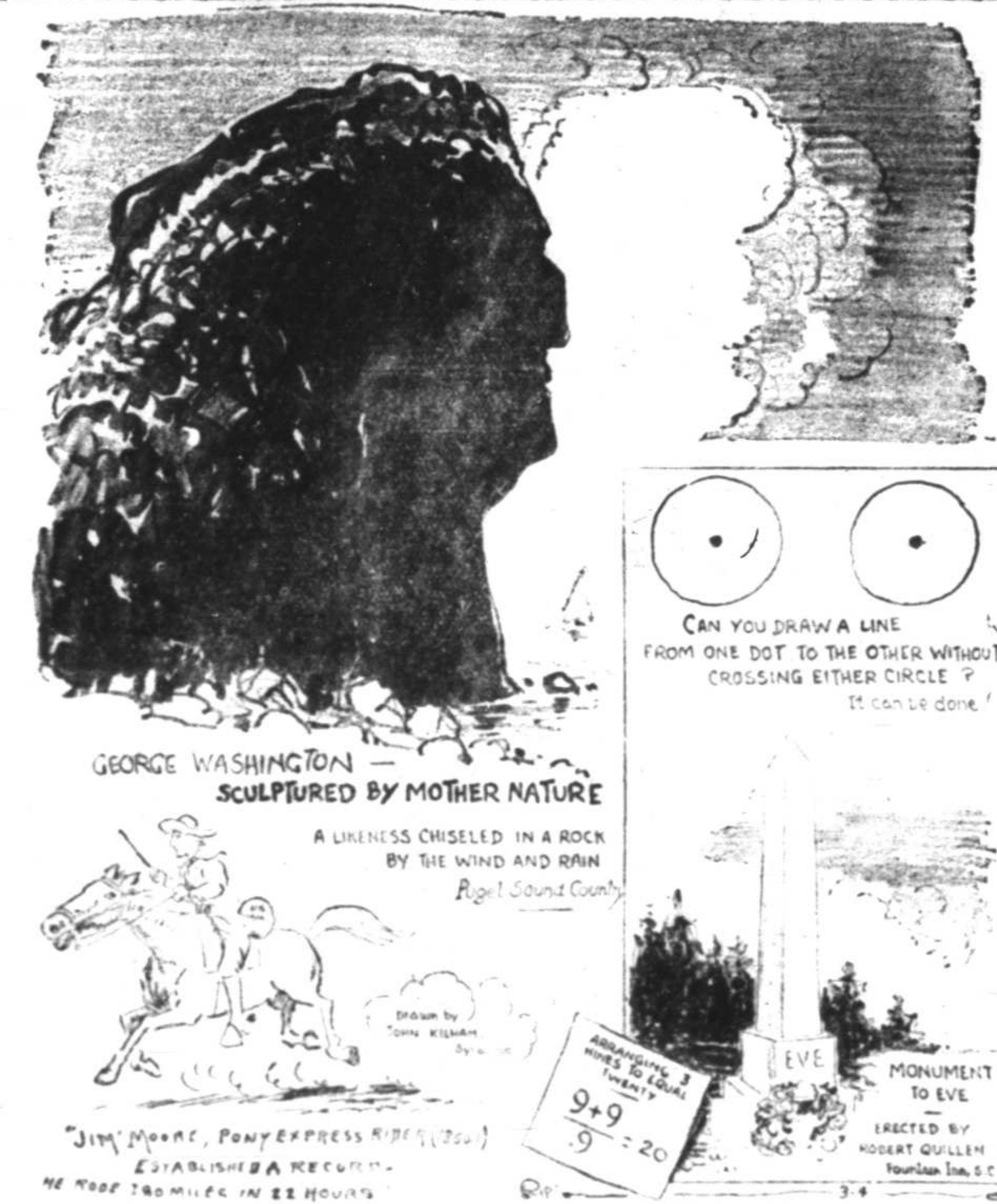

Americans Cable Appeal To Parley

"Reduction, Not Mere Limitations" Is Sought By More Than Thousand Who Signed Appeal

NEW YORK, March 3. (AP)—A cabled appeal, sent from this city by the foreign policy association over the signatures of 1,200 of the nation's most prominent men and women, was in the hands of the American delegation at London today.

The message urged "reduction, not mere limitation" of armaments. It was sent yesterday, after it had been written and the signatures had been authorized within 48 hours through an intensive telegraphic campaign of the association.

The message said the Kellogg-Briand peace compact outlawing war had been signed by all the participants in the parley and would guide the conference.

The message was signed by eight governors—of California, Minnesota, Utah, Arizona, Idaho, Tennessee, Virginia and Kentucky—and 212 presidents of universities and colleges, by leaders of nationally prominent women's and men's organizations, by actors and actresses, authors, judges and persons celebrated nationally or locally for various activities.

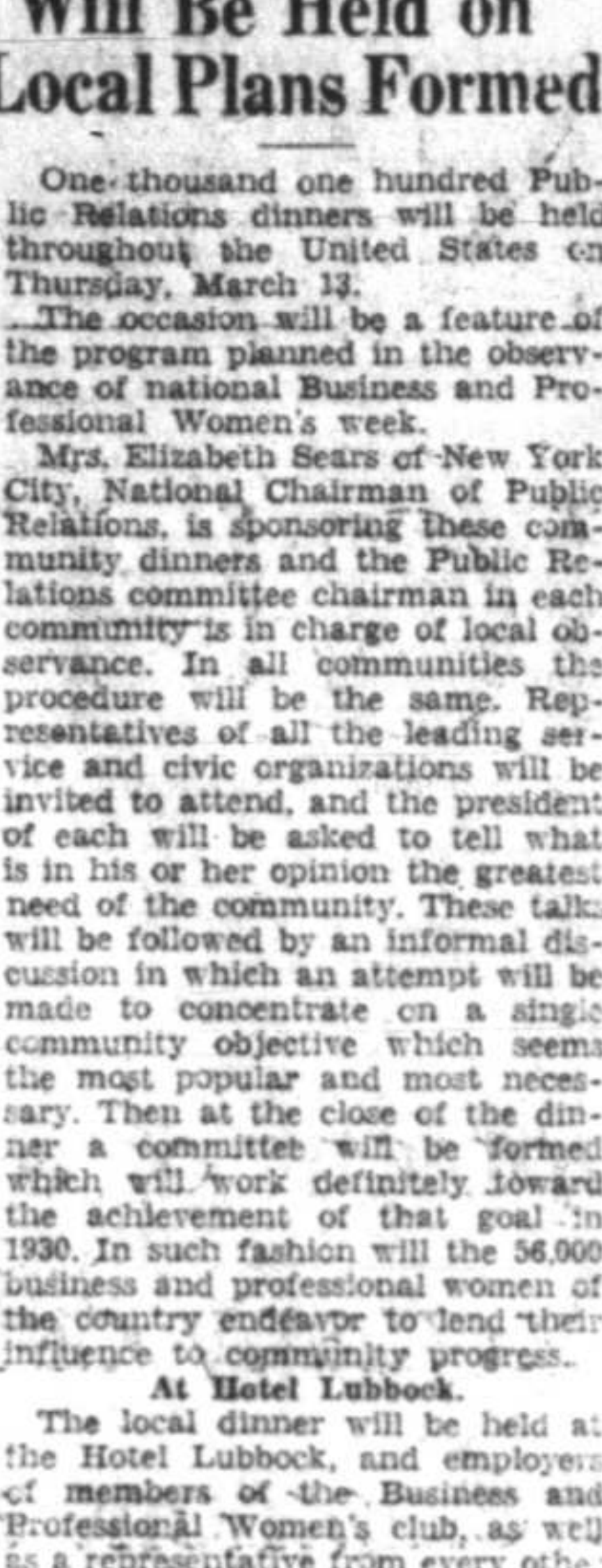

SOME WONDERS OF EYESIGHT!

There are many different phases in the development of a pair of eyes from the day of birth until a person reaches maturity. They are put to many different uses, and must be adaptable to the immediate needs, and therefore the development and the wonders therein are of a most interesting nature. Below is depicted some of the most important and interesting things with which Optometrists are brought in contact.

THE BEGINNING

KITTENS are born with their eyes closed while babies have theirs open at birth, but still the human infant has very little advantage so far as the use of the eyes is concerned.

A human infant is a striking example of the fact that "the higher the place of a species in zoological scale, the more helpless the youth at birth." The baby does not know how to use its two eyes together, although its pupils contract and its lids close when it faces a bright light.

At the end of about the fifth week, it has learned to look at an object that is in the direct line of vision, but it has not yet learned to find something otherwise situated.

Ability to use the two eyes together and the power of realizing the position of an object appear about the sixth month but are not developed to any great extent until the end of the first year. Investigators have come to the conclusion that the full power of blending the pictures, seen by each eye, is not fully developed until the end of the sixth year.

The power of seeing two pictures as one, is known as the fusion faculty, and it is one of the most remarkable attributes of our mind and our brain. We shall not discuss the whys and wherefores of this power; but suffice it to say that it is the use of the eyes together which gives us our perception of depth and also of distance although a one-eyed individual can acquire this in a different manner.

Seeing Double!

WE ARE constantly seeing double. Just try this little experiment. Hold the index finger of the right hand directly in front of your face and with it in that position direct your gaze across the room. This shows that each eye is receiving an image of everything we look at but those images, falling upon the center of vision, known as the fovea, are so blended that they appear to us as a single picture. This faculty, or power, is believed to be limited to humans and to some of the higher forms of apes. Certain it is that in many of the lower animals the eyes are so placed that this faculty is not possible.

Of late much investigation has taught us that many persons who see perfectly with each eye have a great deal of difficulty in using the two eyes together and many ingenious methods have been developed for the purpose of training the eyes to work together as they should. In these days of congested streets and chaotic traffic conditions, it is easy to understand how important it is for individuals to see distinctly and to gauge distances properly while walking or driving. We are so accustomed to seeing one object singly that we think nothing of it, but if something occurs to disturb our ability to do this, we notice this at once. The average individual does not have great difficulty in seeing one thing when he looks at it under normal conditions. When, however, a person is drowsy or, as we say, "can hardly hold his eyes open", he will frequently find that besides blurring, there will be definite double vision. There are many people who have an eye defect which is only prevented from making them see double by tremendous effort on their part.

Needless to say, this effort is accompanied by eyestrain, headache, dizziness, and often nausea. Cases of this kind are successfully treated by OPTOMETRY and eliminates such conditions.

Seeing!

LET us now consider what we mean by ordinary seeing. It has been definitely determined that what we call a normal eye should be able to recognize a letter of a certain size at a certain distance; that is, at 20 feet, we should be able to recognize a letter or character that is one-third of an inch high, provided its various parts are not less than one-fifth as large. Seeing, however, is not just a simple matter of a definite size at a definite distance. Many other factors enter into it and we shall consider some of them briefly.

Three Factors In Vision

VISION has been divided into three parts known as the Physiochemical, the Physiological, and the Psychological phases. These differences are not hard to understand. Light strikes the eye and enters and has an influence upon the structures which it meets. From being just light, it is transformed into nervous energy. Here the first phase ends and the second begins. The impulses travel along the nerve and into the brain and here they reach the third phase and what we call "seeing" takes place. Needless to say, if the light cannot enter the eye, if the nerve cannot transmit the sensation or if the brain cannot interpret it, we do not see.

First and foremost, our seeing depends upon the impression that the eye receives. Black ink on yellow paper ranks first in legibility and it is to the credit of the Texas Highway Commission and also of some of the similar commissions of other states that this combination is made use of in license plates.

It goes without saying that, even with proper illumination and proper color combinations, eyes will not see properly if they are defective in shape and unable to focus, but fortunately modern science has been able to meet these conditions with properly fitted lenses.

The second phase of vision, the transmission of the impulse over the nerve, is something with which man can interfere but little. If the optic nerve or its continuation is inherently defective very little can be done.

If the first two phases of vision have been properly accomplished and the brain, not through defect but lack of training, fails properly to interpret the images sent to it, there is often much hope of improvement. The details cannot be gone into now, but some interesting developments have recently been accomplished.

The complexity of life under the conditions of our intensive civilization is constantly presenting problems of various kinds and the problems of eyesight are no exception. Policemen Shoot Down 2 Gunmen Robbing Theater

Beam Of Reflected Light From Yegor's Pistol Only Target Of Officers In Early Morning Fight

DETROIT, March 3. (AP)—Two policemen with only a beam of reflected light from a robber's pistol as a target, shot and killed two men attempting to rob the safe of the Harper theater here at 4 a. m. today.

The battle, in which powder burns on the face of one of the officers, was the only injuries received by either, occurred in the dark attic of the theater above the main floor of the auditorium.

The robbers were identified as Phillip J. Twomey, 30, and Leo Garbada, 30, both of Detroit. Twomey lived until admitted to a hospital, but Garbada was instantly killed.

Patrolman Donald Bondy, on whose back the theater is located, and Sergeant Isaac Farley, who was pursuing the robbers into the attic after Bondy had discovered the men in the building.

Unable to see the robbers, Farley and Bondy flashed their pocket lights into the corners of the attic. A reflected beam of light from the pistol of one of the thugs gave the policemen a momentary target, and they opened fire. Their fire was returned, but the firing ceased before the police guns were emptied.

The robbers, who had crawled on the iron pipes paralleling the roof, saw a ventilator, fell through the thin plastering of the ceiling. Garbada's body fell part way through.

One Dead And 13 Others Burned In \$3,000,000 Blaze

River Front Fire At New Orleans Is Brought Under Control Monday; Injured Trapped Aboard Boat

NEW ORLEANS, March 3. (AP)—A river front fire of undetermined origin, which burned to death one man and injured 13 others, was brought under control today after damaging a wharf, two warehouses and a steamship. Leonard Smith, warehouse supervisor, estimated the loss at \$3,000,000.

The charred body of Joseph Ryan, 45, messman of New Orleans, was found aboard the steamship Scandia of the Dixie Mediterranean Steamship company, which drifted into midstream after the flames had severed its moorings.

The injured, all of which were members of the crew or visitors from New Orleans, were trapped aboard the ship. Mrs. Elizabeth Battam, 57, seriously burned, was taken from the craft by Sergeant Charles Lunn, who picked her up in his arms, jumped overboard and swam to safety.

Approximately 30,000 bales of cotton were destroyed and 100,000 damaged. Half of the damage was accounted for in the loss of the cotton which was to have been shipped this week to Italy aboard the Scandia. The latter, a 7,825-ton ship, valued at \$300,000, was estimated damaged to the extent of \$75,000.

Painters' Union Holds Meet Here

Members of the local union of the Painters, Decorators and Paperhangers of America met in business session at the Cotton exchange last night. Following the business meeting Charles A. Guy, editor of the *Avantage-Journal*, publication, spoke briefly on matters of civic interest.

The newspaperman told the gathering of a number of civic projects and also that the Lubbock news-papers are desirous of carrying more news of union labor in Lubbock.

D. D. Whitley, member of the union, was appointed to act as reporter from the Painters, Decorators and Paperhangers and the organization agreed to aid in disseminating union labor news here.

ACCIDENTALLY SHOT

GAINESVILLE, March 3. (AP)—Robert E. Murrell, 25, former student of the United States Military academy at West Point, was in a sanitarium here today in a serious condition from a bullet wound in the left lung inflicted yesterday when an automatic pistol he was cleaning was accidentally discharged. Two blood transfusions today had failed to improve his condition. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Murrell, of Valley View.

BRADY, March 3. (AP)—D. A. Newton, superintendent of schools at Goldsboro for the past seven years, has been elected superintendent for the city of Rome today by Mrs. Henrietta Tower. BABY SURVIVES
EL PASO, March 3. (AP)—A three-day-old baby today survived the mother, Mrs. E. Piusina Martinez, 23, so severely burned February 17, she died yesterday.
Mrs. Martinez poured gasoline on a laundry stove. Doctors did not believe she would live more than a few days after the explosion.

Eradication Seen For Florida Fly

ORLANDO, Fla., March 3 (AP)—Dr. A. T. Baker, entomologist for the department of agriculture in charge of Mediterranean fruit fly research experiments in Florida, today told a congressional subcommittee that in his opinion "not a single larva, pupa or living fruit fly is in Florida today." He said he believed the pest had been eradicated.

Chairman W. R. Wood, Republican, Indiana, asked Dr. Baker how soon the department of agriculture should raise the quarantine regulating the shipment of fruit out of the state.

Dr. Baker said he could not give the exact date, but if no flies were found by July 1, or after the time of opening of Sicilian cherries, then he would have no hesitancy in recommending to the department of agriculture that the regulations be lifted.

Predict Speeding Of U. S. Business

WASHINGTON, March 3 (AP)—A prediction that American business activities would speed up to a normal rate within two months was made today by Secretary of Commerce Lamont, who said a slowing down in the last three months had not been as extensive as had been feared, and that the approach of spring and warm weather would increase employment.

All up and down the country the college basketball races are drawing to a close and sectional champions are being crowned.

Southern California and Washington stand out on the Pacific coast. Purdue is as good as they come in the region of the Big Ten. Arkansas has crashed through to its fifth straight southwest conference crown. Down in the Missouri valley where Kansas waged a comeback fight and throughout the Southern conference with its powerful combinations including Alabama, Duke, Washington and Lee and Kentucky, the pace has been hot with the fittest surviving.

The eastern campaign has been a cut-throat game with Syracuse knocking off Pittsburgh and Pennsylvania; Columbia wrecking Syracuse hopes for mythical eastern honors; and other teams such as Johns Hopkins and Old Eli Yale coming through to prove that the Columbians are not invulnerable.

But eventually a champion of the eastern league comprising half a dozen strong colleges is crowned each year and a handful of teams outside the league stand out.

With the regional returns coming in the stage is set for a basketball "natural," a free-for-all, the winner of which would be a bona fide national champion of the colleges. The question of how the brand of basketball played in the Rocky Mountains or the south compares with that of the east or the far west could be settled for this year at least.

Great teams of the various sections such as Arkansas and Purdue with a just claim to title consideration would have a chance to say it with baskets.

But instead of going ahead to this logical climax, the various teams disband and call it a season. There surely is no over-emphasis here. Meanwhile a new group of teams—teams which up to the moment have taken little part in the publicity—will get together at Kansas City the week of March 10 to play for the "national championship" in the annual tournament of the Amateur Athletic union.

Held under the auspices of the Kansas City Athletic club for the last nine years, this tournament draws none of the big college sectional winners. The "big shots" here are the collections of stars representing various industrial concerns. The great team of Butler college did win the title in 1924 and Washington college captured it in 1925. McPherson, Rockhurst, Phillips and Denver university are other institutions that have finished well up. But the names of the mighty in the college world are conspicuous by their absence and many of the small institutions in the Kansas City district are no whooping to compete in southwestern university's invitation tournament at Winfield, Kan. Rather than continue in the A. A. U. event.

There has been some discussion as to the advisability of making a division in the national tournament so that the college teams would play among themselves and the independent organizations would do likewise. But so far this suggestion has not borne fruit. Such a move might cause a change in the attitude of the big colleges toward the event.

Status On Fight Decision Is Same

Miami Boxing Commission Refuses To Take Action On Complaint Of Johnston

MIAMI, Fla., March 3. (P)—The Sharkey-Scott fight decision today remained just as much of a closed chapter in the annals of the Miami boxing commission as it was Saturday before Jimmy Johnston, Phil Scott's manager, announced he would seek to have Referee Lou Magnolia's decision revoked for deciding in favor of Jack Sharkey, American heavyweight title contender.

The boxing commission, it was learned, will not take any action on Johnston's complaint. The manager maintained that Magnolia told him, while Scott was lying on a stool after his first complaint of a foul, that he would disqualify Sharkey.

Leake Wins Title In Skeet Match

Bush Unperturbed Over Failure Of Shires To Report

Showing Of Youngsters On Chicago Roster Will Determine Strength Of Pale Horse Entry

SAN ANTONIO, March 3. (P)—Given anything like an even break with his young talent, Don Bush, retired new pilot of the Chicago White Sox, should put a team in the American league race capable of finishing several notches higher than last year's seventh place unit.

That is, if a few of the youngsters like Victor Fraser, Irving Jeffries, Smedley Jolly and Ernie Smith even approximate their promise, the Sox figure to be a tough club to beat. Bush does not predict a first division team—it is too early for that—but he is far from discouraged at the prospect.

Shires No Worry
Bush is entirely too absorbed in the task at hand to become exercised over the absence of Art Shires, the well known first baseman. Contrary to popular belief, he is losing absolutely no sleep over the Great One's failure to sign a contract. He would like to have Shires on his ball club; concurs in the belief that Shires is quite a first baseman, and promises to give him "every chance" if and when he reports. There is the impression, however, that the Chicago White Sox are quite prepared to go on without him. But Clancy is on the ground and wants the first basing job the worst way.

Incidentally, and officially, there is no chance of Shires reporting until he signs the contract offered him and makes his peace with Charles Comiskey. He still is a suspended player and will have to promise a number of things before he draws a uniform. Also incidentally, the contract proffered him did not call for \$11,000.

The remainder of the Sox infield promises to be well cared for. The veteran Willie Kamm is back at third, Chalmers Clesell definitely has been shifted to second and a trio of buyers are battling for shortstop. Irving Jeffries, brilliant recruit from Dallas of the Texas league, so far appears to have an edge on Ernie Smith, up from Birmingham of the Southern, and Bill Hunsfield, veteran holdover. Jeffries, a converted third sacker, has made a great impression on Bush and appears certain to stick. John Kerr, last year's regular key-stone, is trying to hold his own against Clesell, but it looks like a losing proposition.

It is the outfield where Bush looks for the most improvement. He feels the Sox had plenty of nothing last year, but lacked the punch. He expects his present staff of gardeners to give American league pitching a fit. Carl Reynolds, John Watwood and Alex Metzler are veteran strength. Reynolds and Watwood, young and with a year's experience, figure to boost their batting averages of last season.

Jolly Likely Prospect
Jolly, a big fellow from San Francisco of the Pacific Coast league, is bound to break in some where. Standing six feet, three, and with 218 pounds distributed evenly, he smacked the ball for a .387 average last year. When there were more, he had a .264 mark with Dallas last year. George Blackberry, 365 with Waco, and Dave Harris, 248 with Providence. Those figures are the only spring tonic Don Bush needs.

Three veteran right-handers, Urban Faber, Alphonse Thomas and Ted Lyons, form the nucleus of a mound staff that could stand a little bolstering. Faber was the only member of the Sox staff who managed to break even last year, but again, there was a paucity of batting punch.

One Southpaw
Harold McKinn, Bob Weiland, Ed Walsh, Jr., Ted Blankenship, Grady Adkins and Sergeant George Connolly, not exactly an impressive array, round out the list of holdovers. There is not a southpaw in the group. In fact, Pat Caraway, who won 19 and lost 17 with Topeka of the Western league last year, is the only pitcher on the Sox roster.

Vic Fraser, who won 15 and lost 8 and compiled an earned run average of 2.61 for Dallas, is due a thorough trial and should make the grade. Bush would rather talk about him than any man in camp.

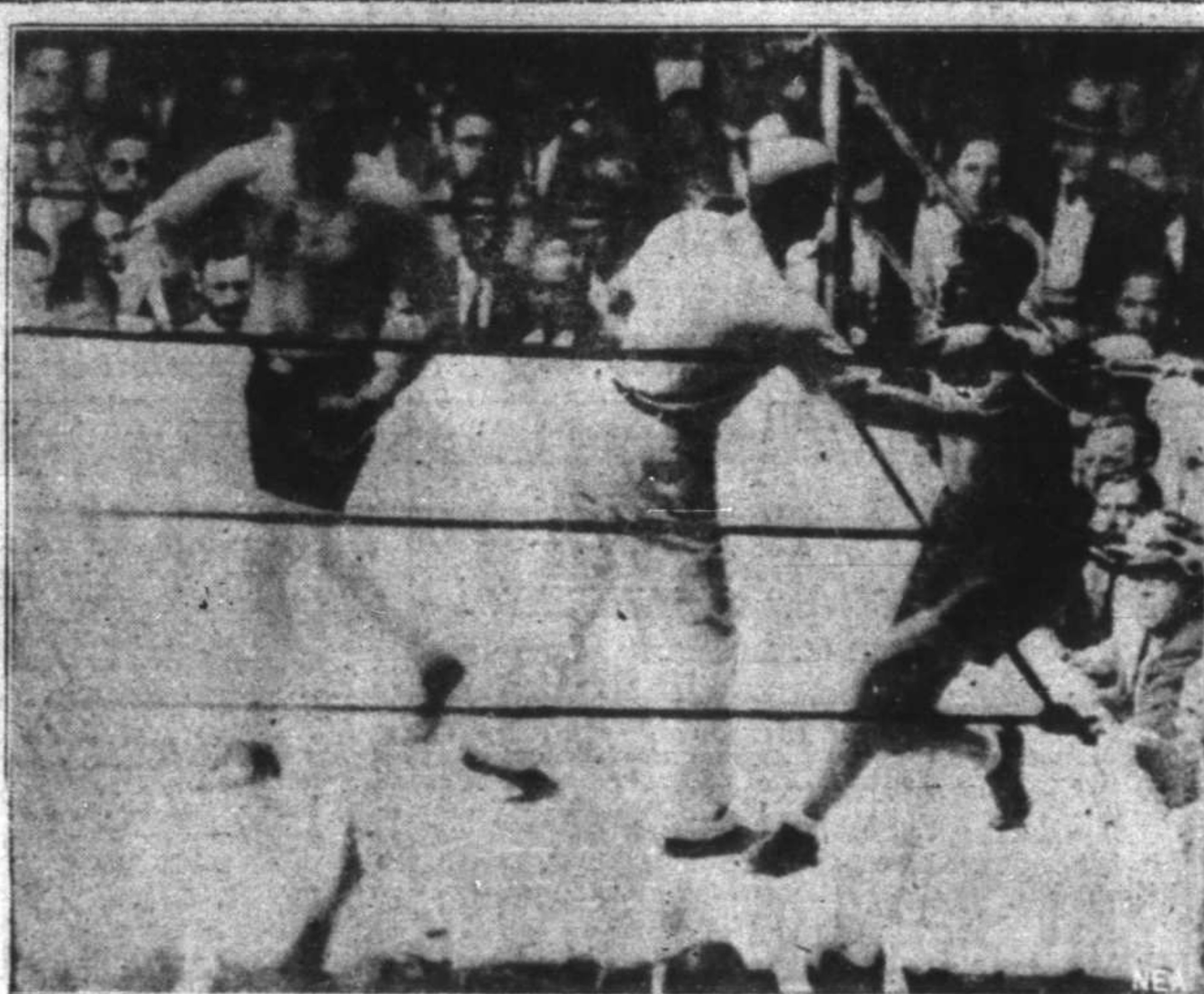
Blankenship Hopeful

Sir Thomas to Enter "Shamrock V" In Fifth Try for Yacht Supremacy

GOSSPORT, England, March 3. (P)—Sir Thomas Lipton's new American Cup challenger, Shamrock V, is nearing completion and will be launched soon for sailing tests at Cowes, Southern and Hampshire. The builders call it "the fastest cutter that ever spread canvas to the breeze." Sir Thomas, not so superlative, says the new challenger has a "much better chance than any of the other Shamrocks."

All England is watching the Irish yachtsman, Lipton, in his fifth and possibly last American Cup race with crack yachts of the United States off Newport, R. I., September 13. When the new Shamrock sails sometime in July it will be the fourteenth time that British yachtsmen have started out to try to regain the world's premier yachting trophy, which they lost to the Schooner America in 1881.

Sir Thomas made his first attempt in 1899 and lost. He repeated the

challenge in 1901, 1903 and 1920 but was unsuccessful. On the threshold of his 80th year he is going to try again.

The new challenger is about 70 feet long and has a hollow, steel, three-section mast 190 feet high. It has a sail spread of about 7,000 square feet. In this respect it is smaller than the last challenger, 10,500 square feet of sail.

Both challenger and defender will be of approximately the same size and sail spread, since this year they must adhere to the "J" class regulations of the New York yacht club. Each will have a mast considerably higher than any yacht has yet been stepped into a vessel of corresponding size.

Capt. Edward Head, famed Brightlingsea sailing skipper, has been selected by Sir Thomas to sail his challenger. The luxurious triple-masted steam yacht "Brit" will be the Shamrock V.

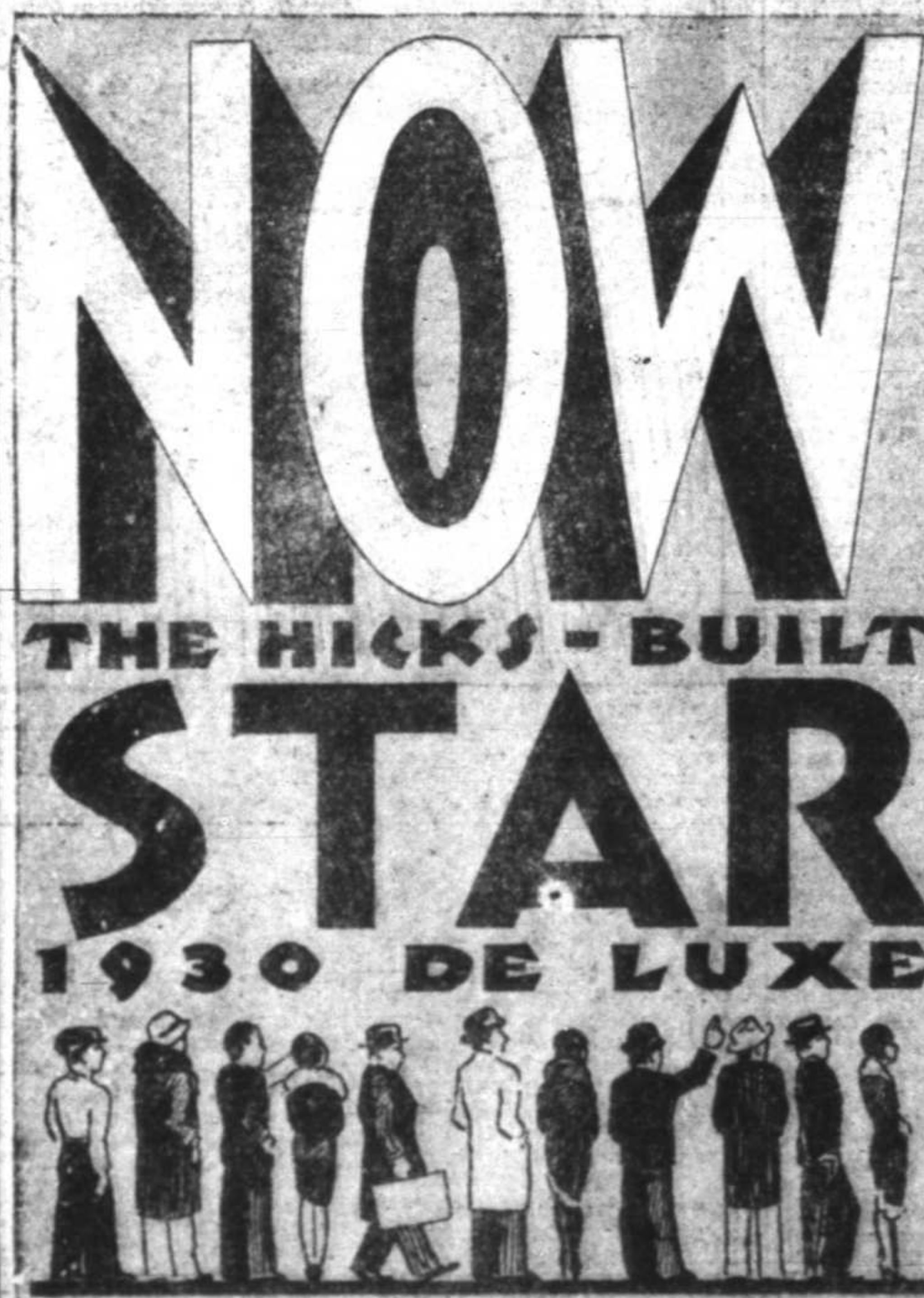

A PUZZLE IN LEGALITIES

ACCORDING to recent dispatches by The Associated Press, one Hess Tyler has been sentenced to die in the electric chair for the murder of Bryan Hall, former Eli, Texas, stockkeeper during an attempted robbery. The trial was held in Memphis, up in Hall county, not so far removed from Lubbock, and during it the defendant did not take the stand or offer any testimony in his behalf through others.

But, quoting the dispatch further, "attorneys for Tyler said a motion for a new trial would be filed"—which gives Texans a brief but adequate glimpse into the way one part of their public business is being handled.

The jury trying Hess Tyler took a ballot upon conclusion of the case. One of the twelve held out for a 90-year prison term for awhile but eventually succumbed to the opinions of the other eleven and agreed to the death penalty. There is nothing to indicate that any of the jurors believed the defendant innocent of the murder charge—and everything to indicate that even from the start of their deliberations they were of one accord in believing him guilty.

But "attorneys for Tyler said a motion for a new trial would be filed"—despite the fact that there is nothing in the verdict to indicate that a second trial is necessary, or would bring out anything not already aired in the case. Think that over.

When private business sits down to consider a question it views the facts, then acts. There is no "fooling around" in the matter. If a contract is to be signed it is decided upon in its various phases and signed. Boards of directors don't make a decision, then kill time and waste money reviewing the situation. That's all there is to it.

The Morning Avalanche is one newspaper which believes more business and less legal red-tape is essential to the proper conduct of our courts. It believes the time has come when mercy, in the courtroom, should be tempered with justice if protection that the public deserves is to be upheld. It believes that the sooner there is less "appealing" and general "horsing around" in the trial of cases the sooner the one-time respect for law and order will be returned to this country. And not until.

If Hess Tyler had a leg to stand on in his own defense—and if his lawyers think he had—why didn't he take the stand? If he is not guilty as charged, why weren't witnesses produced to support that theory? If the jury had any such opinion why was it unanimous in believing his guilt on the very first ballot and taking all these queries into consideration where are the grounds for a new trial?

Perhaps one of the court attaches wore a red necktie and a pink shirt and it is necessary to call in a few alienists as so much per head. That's about as good an excuse as we can think of for wanting to waste more of the state's time and money in the trial of a criminal case.

SAFEGUARDS

All doubts that another touring season is just around the corner were removed by the announcements from several states this week that sanitation corps are preparing for their spring inspections of drinking water sources, refreshment stands and eating places for the protection of the motoring public.

With millions of men, women and children motoring over the highways of the United States, any eating and sleeping in every manner and form of hostelry sanitary conditions are as essential as good roads. Human beings are common carriers of disease germs and must be protected from contamination by their fellows.

Motor travel on the scale it is done today would have been extremely hazardous in the days when epidemics of smallpox, typhoid fever and other malignant diseases were common. Even with the limited traveling of that period epidemics were frequently spread by travelers and the death rate from disease among them was high.

It is now possible for the stranger, by the exercise of the most ordinary precautions, to live almost anywhere in the United States with relative security from the ravages of disease. Travelers no longer harbor the old fears of "catching something," barring the common cold.

Largely responsible for this improvement in the way of sanitation and purity are federal, state and municipal public health services. But the traveling public also has had a part in it, by patronizing only the outwardly clean.

On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

SENATE SHOWS CHARACTERISTIC LINE-UP ON MOOT QUESTION OF LITERATURE, STEWART FINDS

WASHINGTON, March 3.—All around progressives and 100 per cent stand patters are about equally scarce in congress.

Closely examined, a progressive is apt to be found unpleasantly intolerant in streaks. Strictly investigated, a stand patter is just as likely to prove himself thoroughly broadminded on some subjects.

Strait-laced ideas concerning other people's morals are so characteristic of the otherwise progressive element as to be almost the rule. This is precisely the line of thought which lawmakers of ultra-conservative views most generally tend to follow to liberal conclusions.

However, there are exceptions. Two of them (one on each side) have been especially prominent recently in the United States senate.

Senator Bronson Cutting of New Mexico probably is as completely enlightened a liberal as ever came to Washington. If there is any question on which Senator Reed Smoot of Utah is not an arch-conservative, it never has been developed in debate at the capitol or brought out by a confabulation in a committee room.

Senator Cutting led the fight to deny to custom house clerks the power to decide what foreign books Americans may read. Senator Smoot led the advocates of a rigid censorship policy.

Curiously enough, the "naughty literature" paragraph, over which the controversy raged, was included in the tariff bill—whatever the connection may be between import taxes on manganese, dairy products, woolen goods and similar commodities, and the writings of authors like Shakespeare, Cervantes and Moliere.

At any rate, the house of representatives passed it with the rest of the bill, and the Utah statesman put up the struggle of his life to preserve it, unchanged by the senate.

Senator Cutting did not, of course, as Senator Smoot represented (and undoubtedly honestly believed) favor flooding the country with obscene foreign books. He did maintain that the average custom house inspector is unequal to choose literature for Yale, Harvard, Princeton, other American institutions of higher learning, the Congressional Library and this country's men of letters generally.

Naturally an argument, in any real sense, was impossible.

Senator Cutting was disgusted and Senator Smoot was horrified.

The latter read voluminously from the more plain-spoken, old-fashioned pages of the world's greatest classics, to show the objectionable sort of matter which threatens the youth of the United States unless a rigorous quarantine is interposed against it.

Senator Cutting rejoined with extracts from such books as Chaucer, the Bard of Avon and even the Bible, in an effort to convince his opponent that fully as undesirable material can be dug from the most unimpeachable sources if they are resolutely searched with the object of finding nothing but the salacious.

The senate lineup behind the rivals was what might have been expected.

Senator Cutting, the liberal, found his supporters among the conservatives, who largely, like himself, are men of education. Senator Smoot's backers were mainly the economic liberals who mostly less acquainted with the classics, and afraid of them on moral grounds, objected to leaving ordinary folk to make their own selection.

The ultra-conservative Senator Frederick H. Gillett's position was typical of the stand pat attitude.

Your Health

BODY CAN STAND EXTREME COLD BETTER THAN IS SUPPOSED

Death from exposure to cold occurs fairly frequently in the temperate zone. The mortality ranges anywhere from 200 to 400 deaths per year in the registration area of the United States. In Canada and Alaska, illnesses and deaths from cold may be even more frequent.

Recently, Dr. S. W. Britton has made a special survey of the relationship of cold to life and has discovered some extremely interesting facts. It has been found that some fish can survive exposure to sea water at temperatures from 10 to 12 degrees below zero for several hours.

Frozen But Not Killed
Under such circumstances, the fish gradually lose all sensibility and finally appears to be frozen stiff. The heart itself stops. The animal may be practically frozen to death for a brief period, then the temperature of the surrounding water increased and it comes to life.

As the animal returns to life, the heart beat appears first, and then breathing, then vision, then the ability to maintain a proper position in the water, and finally the ability to swim. It has been found that the heart of a fish can be frozen for several hours at a temperature of -4 degrees Fahrenheit and yet after slowly thawing, it will recover to natural rhythm.

The human body is likewise able to withstand extreme degrees of cold under certain circumstances. Records have been made of instances in which drunkards have been exposed to extreme degrees of cold air and water for hours and still recovered. One drunkard whose body temperature was 78.4 degrees Fahrenheit and who had been exposed all night to air at about 21.2 degrees Fahrenheit, completely recovered.

The individual's temperature may fall considerably, and Dr. Britton provides records varying from 79.3 degrees Fahrenheit to 83.1 degrees Fahrenheit, with recovery after treatment. Recovery in cases of exposure while drunk depends in large measure on the amount of alcohol taken, the resistance of the individual generally and the particular amount of cooling that he undergoes.

Artificial Respiration Is a Help

Just as in cases of unconsciousness due to other causes, such as gas poisoning, sunstroke, and many instances in which the circulation and respiration are greatly interfered with, artificial respiration may frequently be practiced with success. Warm baths or packs gradually increased to higher temperatures and the drinking of warm fluids are valuable aids to resuscitation when unconsciousness occurs due to freezing.

For this reason, persons who seem to be dead from the results of freezing should not be permitted to pass away without any attempt being made to restore them to life. Just as people have responded to relief after electric shock or drowning after several hours, so also in freezing the attempt to resuscitate should be prompt and long continued.

Cotton Declines; Mart Reactionary

Prices Are Lower Under Re-Selling In Monday's Mart

Buyers Are Influenced By Renewed Weakness In Values Of Wheat; General Market Closes Steady

NEW YORK, March 3 (AP)—Cotton was lower today under liquidation and re-selling by recent buyers who were evidently influenced by the renewed weakness of wheat. A further decline in silver and reports that sales of fertilizer tags in the south up to the first of March were in excess of last year's may have helped to depress the market. The market opened steady at an advance of 1 point to a decline of 3 points. The market seemed to be attracting very little support. March sold off to 14.45 and October to 15.48 during the early afternoon, or about 15 to 18 points net lower. Quotations were a few points up to 1:45 and then declined, or about 15 to 18 points net lower, but closing quotations were a few points up from the lowest with near months relatively steady in the late trading on closing.

Cotton Market Is Moderately Active

NEW ORLEANS, March 3 (AP)—Cotton was only moderately active today and prices developed a downward trend. Cables were better than due but the market opened unchanged to 2 points down and ended in early trading in sympathy with a lower opening in the wheat market. Due to the action of the farm loan board, in declining to buy wheat further at the October loan price. After declining 15 to 16 points prices rallied 3 to 6 points on covering by shorts in advance of the holiday here tomorrow. The market near noon, eased on a bearish statement by Secretary Hester showing the sale of fertilizer tags had increased at the end of February by more than 27,000 tons. On this bid prices dropped quiet in the late trading and prices leveled 17 to 21 points under Saturday's close. The market was rallied 3 to 6 points in advance of the holiday.

Wheat Recovers Little of Loss

CHICAGO, March 3 (AP)—Suffering a maximum fall of 5 cents a bushel today, wheat futures recovered but little of the loss and the market closed steady. The unsettling influence appeared to be action of the federal farm board's allies in ending payment of a fixed price for country run wheat at terminal markets. Debarment of export demand for wheat from North America equaled also as a weight with visible and invisible domestic supplies estimated today to be fully as large as a year ago. Wheat: Clear unsettled, 2 1/2-3 1/2; 1-2 cents a bushel lower than Saturday's finish. Corn closed 1 1/2-1 1/2 cents down; oats 1-1 1/2 cents off; and provisions unchanged to a rise of 2 cents. Corn and oats gave way with wheat, despite estimates that with the exception of 1925, the present stocks of corn on farms are the smallest since 1919. In provisions the hog market strength more than offset the influence of grain weakness.

Portion of Greenville and Frank L. Tiller, secretary of Rosenberg, "It isn't right," said Padlock commenting on the board's action "to keep men in prison with cuts in their salaries between the cells and windows. The dormitories on the farms are crowded and can't house more."

The board has been discussing this action for a long time. The system has a capacity of 5,000 men and now has 5,123. It is becoming "physically impossible to care for any more with any degree of safety."

The Huntsville prison was built to house 600 men; it now has 950. We are threatened with riots, mutiny and disastrous epidemics. "Something had to be done. And until something is done, the burden must fall on the various counties."

Prisoners now in transit will be received in the prisons, it was said. Speaking for the board, Padlock said the resolution "positively was not" intended as an act to be held over the head of the legislature, which was considering prison reorganization and reform.

The action was not taken with that in view at all, he declared, "but to protect prisoners and the state generally. We have been considering this step for some time. It happens that matters have come to a climax when the legislature is about to take action, one way or another, on the prison question."

County and city jails in Texas will be used to house men or women convicted of felonies and sentenced to prison in the next few months, it was indicated.

AUSTIN, March 3 (AP)—Action of the state prison board in closing the Texas penitentiary system to all commissioners because it was claimed it had reached the saturation point, caused considerable comment among legislators tonight.

Several expressed the unofficial opinion that the action was illegal under Texas laws.

The master political stroke, was the comment of Rep. A. H. King of Throckmorton, one of the leaders of the rehabilitation of existing properties in preference to building a new industrial plant at Austin.

"Well, guess they will finally put the screw to us and force us to move the penitentiary to Austin," said Rep. J. C. Durall of Fort Worth, another opponent of the Austin site plan.

"That is plainly illegal and child's play," said Rep. Ooke R. Stevenson of Junction.

Japan and America Near Agreement

LONDON, March 3 (AP)—Still characterized by that inscrutability popularly associated with the Orient, negotiations toward settlement of the American-Japanese naval problems moved forward again today.

No phase of the London conference has been more heavily veiled in secrecy than the informal conversations which have been proceeding since last week between Senator Reed and Ambassador Matsudaira.

Their task is to thresh out unofficially between themselves an agreement they are reasonably sure will be acceptable to their full delegations. They are old friends from Washington days, and it is because of this informal nature of their efforts that the American delegation feels justified in resisting all efforts to probe their exchange of views.

Winter On Visit To South Monday

ATLANTA, Ga., March 3 (AP)—A severe back lash of winter to the southeast in a sub-freezing grip that extended nearly to Chicago City, and brought a prediction of frost for south Florida.

The unexpected assault of winter swept out of the northwest Saturday night, causing the mercury to climb from spring levels to near freezing Sunday. Today saw the mercury sink to sub-freezing levels over a wide area.

There was hope for relief in the offing as the weather forecast predicted fair and slowly rising temperatures for tomorrow.

Damage to growing crops thus far has been light. C. F. Von Herrmann, Atlanta observer, said peaches would be benefited by the cold wave.

PROBE NOT JUSTIFIED Excitement Blamed In Deputy Sheriff's Death

HOUSTON, March 3 (AP)—An investigation of the death of Deputy Sheriff William Fuchs, 60, who fell from a horse early this morning after arresting a man at a roadside dance hall near here, late today had not justified ordering an autopsy. Justice of the Peace Campbell R. Overstreet ruled. The supposition was that Fuchs died from natural causes and the excitement incident to the arrest, involving Deputy Alec McDonald described as a "free for all" fight.

Meanwhile, a charge of resetting an officer was lodged against J. J. Carroll, 28, refinery employee.

Fuchs and McDonald, who had been assigned to the dance, were called to eject a man said to have been quarreling. McDonald said a scuffle ensued. Fuchs dropped dead beside the automobile after the two had arrested the man and had taken him outside.

FALLS TO DEATH Dallas High School Student Leaps Four Stories

DALLAS, March 3 (AP)—Falling from the fourth floor ledge of the Baylor hospital here, Alfred Johnson, 17-year-old high school student, was killed instantly today. He struck on a concrete floor below his window.

The youth had been a patient for several weeks, suffering with a nervous disorder, and apparently was in a delirium when he fell. Two nurses and a doctor were standing at his window, begging him to allow them to help him from the ledge.

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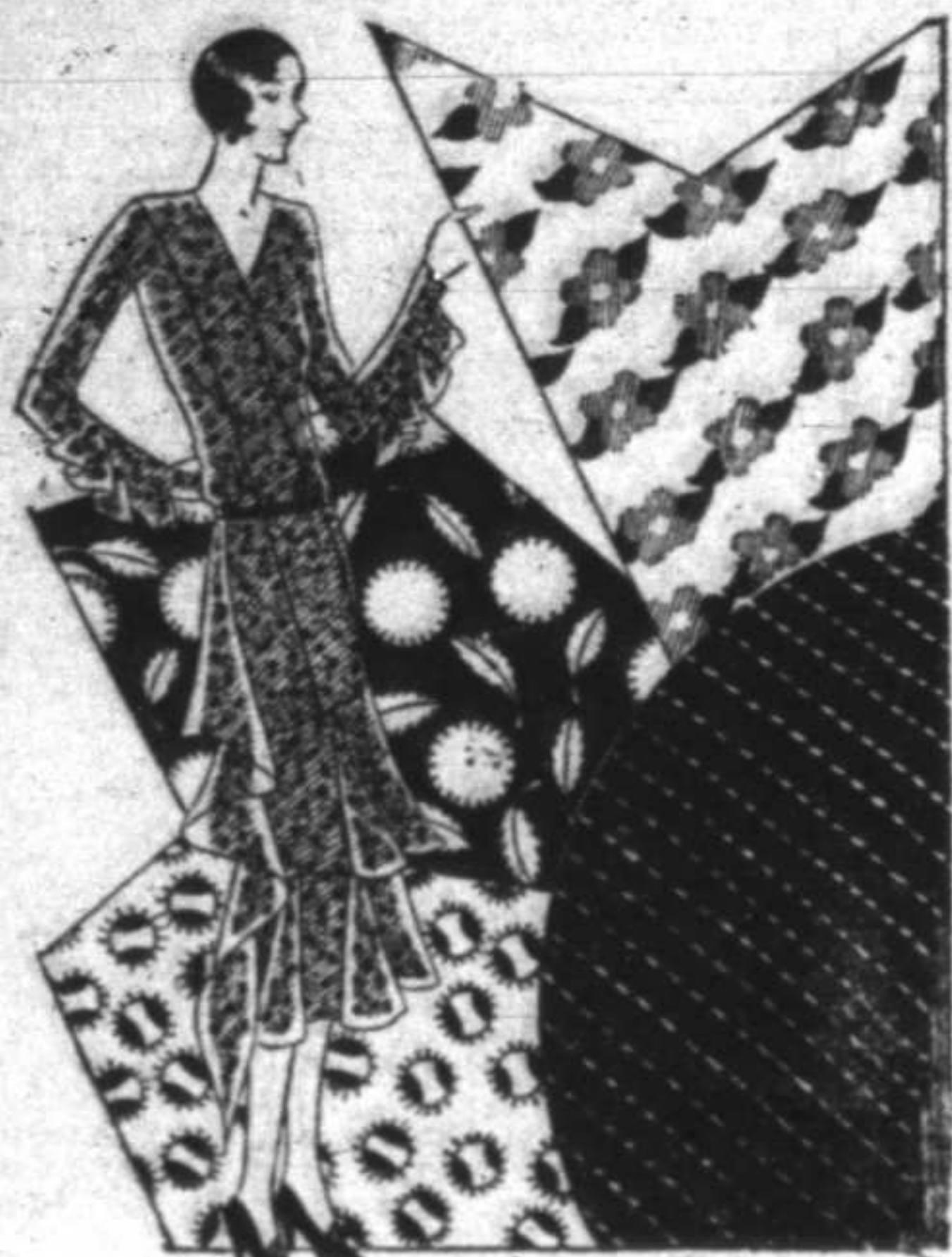

Peace Meeting To Open Methodists' Annual Meeting

Former Missionary To Japan To Talk In Opening Of Twentieth Conference; Is To Be Busy Session

(By Associated Press) AMARILLO, March 3. (AP)—A great peace meeting, featured by an address by Dr. Sidney Gulick, former missionary to Japan and outstanding leader in international peace relations, will herald the opening of the twentieth annual session of the Woman's Missionary Council of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, here March 13-18.

Dr. Gulick's subject will be "International Relations Around the Pacific Basin." Starting with the peace meeting the night of March 13, sessions will be held daily.

Consecrate Young Women High spots in the program will include the consecration of 20 young women to missionary and deaconess service; a series of noonday Bible talks by Dr. Paul Kern of San Antonio; reports of regional and administrative secretaries; fraternal messages from Christian nationals and missionaries; and platform addresses by nationally known men and women.

Bishop John M. Moore of Dallas will officiate at the consecration service the night of March 13 and Bishop W. N. Ainsworth of the Orient and Macon, Ga., will preach the council sermon on the morning of March 16.

Many to Attend The meeting will assemble approximately 300 delegates from all sections of southern Methodism, representing a missionary constituency of approximately 300,000 Methodist women scattered from Maryland to Arizona and in ten foreign countries.

The life and work of the late Miss Althea Jones of Houston, superintendent of children's work, will be memorialized. Miss Jones was killed in an automobile accident while engaged in her work last summer.

Coming at the close of a Methodist quadrennial and just prior to the denomination's general conference at Dallas in May, the approaching session promises to be of more than usual interest, since it calls for the election of officers for another four years and marks the time when members to the general conference, supreme church tribunal, will be formulated.

Texas has a larger membership in the missionary societies than any other state and will have the largest representation at the convocation.

Amarillo will be the farthest west that a meeting has ever been held. In carrying on its work the Woman's Missionary Council raises and expends annually more than \$1,000,000. The foreign centers in which the Council operates are China, Japan, Korea, Mexico, Cuba, Africa, Belgium, Poland, Brazil and Czechoslovakia.

DENVER, Colo., March 3. (AP)—Clearing skies gave promise of relief today for the Rocky Mountain region after a cold spell of the last few days that reached a climax with the coldest weather reported since January.

Butte Flat, Mont., was the coldest spot in the region yesterday, with a mercury reading of 23 below zero. In Butte at the same time it was eight below, and Helena's minimum temperature of 12 below came within two degrees of equalling the lowest mark ever recorded for March 2. The 14 below record was established in 1898.

Temperatures considerably under the freezing mark prevailed in Wyoming.

Business Improves During February

Tenth Federal Reserve Report Claims Activity Is Stimulated In Month As Building Slows Up

(By Associated Press) KANSAS CITY, March 3. (AP)—The monthly review of the Tenth Federal Reserve Bank reported rapid business strides in the district during February, following a distinct January decrease, largely influenced by unusually cold weather.

Spring like weather of the current month stimulated activity of all lines, indicating business was moving rapidly toward the busy season of the year.

Business Volume Higher

The general volume of business was reported slightly higher than in December, but considerably lower than in January a year ago. Retail sales decreased 42.9 per cent during January as compared to December. Wholesale selling, five lines combined, showed an increase of 4.3 per cent, however.

Compared to January, 1929, virtually all banking business, grain and livestock receipts, manufacturing and meat packing showed a loss during that month this year.

Building Checked. Building was checked drastically by the cold. Building permits issued in 30 cities during January were 29.3 per cent smaller as to their value than in December, and 29.9 per cent less than in January, 1929.

The January output of crude petroleum and soft coal was larger and shipments of zinc and lead ore smaller than for the preceding month, while all mineral lines reported that January output did not measure up to that reported for January, 1929.

Unemployment was unusually high in January, due to an almost complete cessation of out-of-door work and curtailed operations of industrial plants. However, the advent of warmer weather in February also brought a resumption of activity and general relief to this situation.

MADRID, March 3. (AP)—In view of the latest disorders in Spain, which were featured by antimorarchial demonstrations, it was decided today that schools and universities should not be reopened until Thursday.

It has been learned that the military leaders of the country have distinctly disapproved the antimorarchial manifestations of the past few days, and that the conservative classes are preparing acts of homage to the king, as a kind of public demonstration which followed the speech of former Premier Sanchez Guerra.

The Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce will give a luncheon at which Amon G. Carter, Fort Worth publisher, will speak. In the afternoon the editors will be taken to the fat stock show, the rodeo and the horse show. Later they will tour the new exhibit halls and visit the livestock, automobile, poultry, pigeon and other shows. A dance will close the festivities for the writers.

Almost 300 head of livestock, exclusive of saddle or cow ponies, will be seen in the rodeo. There will be 60 head of wild Brahmas steers for steer riding contests, 60 head of wild steers for bulldogging, 60 head of wild calves for calf roping and 110 outlaw horses.

Amateur Diggings Attacked By Judge

PAINT ROCK, March 3. (AP)—Burial sites of a race that has bowed to the progress of man are being despoiled by the inept hand of the amateur, says O. L. Sims, county judge here and an authority on history and culture of the Southwest.

Amateurs are digging out Indian graves and throwing away priceless relics, he said. They are stumbling into remains of villages from the Concho country to the Rio Grande.

"People who are mildly interested and don't know the process required to save the articles they may recover go into the caves of the Big Bend country, find pottery, baskets and other relics and toss aside the fabrics that are covered with the dust of ages. An expert sifts the dust from these caves and gets fine beads. The earth is removed with a trowel from the fabrics, and they are painted with shellac for preservation. Then these can be removed to a museum," Mr. Sims said.

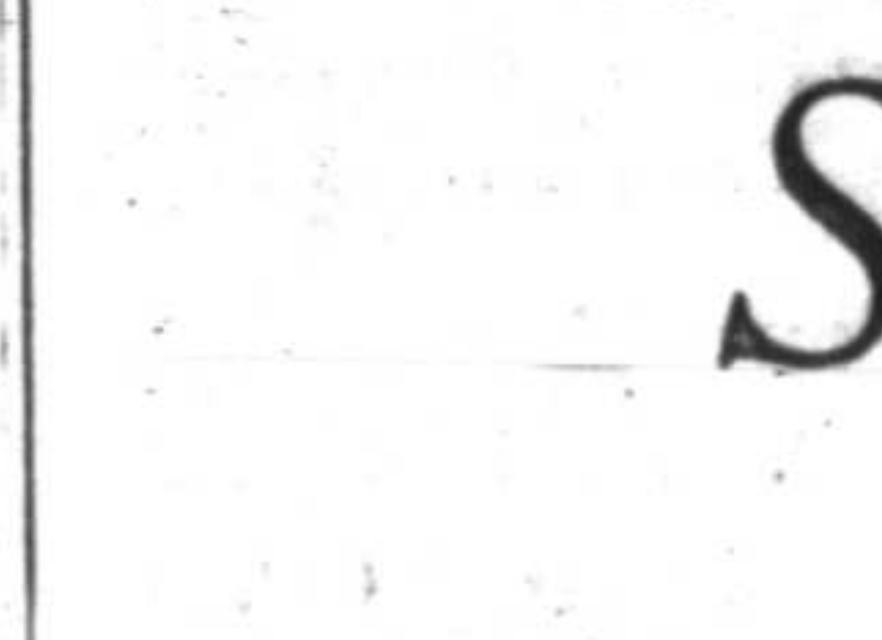
