# He's Quitting Game To Pamper Ulcers, Look To Business Career

"I just don't have the desire to fight it any longer."

"Pressure today is almost more than a man can stand."

Especially a guy with serious ulcer condition which already has required major surgery and numerous hospital confinements.

So, Truman Nix is getting out. Departing from coaching after 23 consecutive seasons as a head coach.

He is reluctant. Competitive sports are the next thing to a religion with him.

But he has made the decision... which was considered and put off again and again during the recent years.

Why?

His own profession that he just doesn't have the desire to fight it any longer" tells you best of all.

There are other reasons. All contributory.

Between chews on his Red Man tobacco, the rotund Colorado High athletic director relates "em for you. Down the list... conditions, problems and opportunities.

The guts of it all, though, is that Truman Nix has decided that it is best for his health, his family and his business future to step out now.

He counts the seasons, the teams. Twenty-three falls since he began head coaching at Hule. He made \$3,000 then. Coached football, girls and boys basketball, baseball and track while teaching five classes and helping with junior high football his sixth class period. At the half of basketball games, he swept the floor.

Now, it is AAA competition and salary of \$11,870. But the grind is telling. Even worse this season with only 2 wins against 7 losses.

"Bad season is not the only reason," Nix says. "I've had 'em before."

"I've been thinking about quitting since three years ago when I knew that eventually my ulcer was going to require major surgery.

"I couldn't make myself get out."

## Rites Here For Retired Rancher

Funeral for L. P. Merrill, a retired Mitchell County rancher, was conducted Tuesday afternoon in First United Methodist Church.

Merrill, 83, died Sunday afternoon in Root Valley Fair Lodge after several months illness.

Born in Somerville Dec. 14, 1886, he married Berta Lou

Nix recounts what he termed the thrills of his coaching career that has swung through the years to Rule, Hamlin, Andrews, Wink and Colorado City.

He's been coach of Texas High School All-Stars, president of Texas High School Coaches Association, served 10 consecutive years as an officer or member of the board's association, represented Texas coaches at conferences in Washington and all across the nation.

"I've experienced every thrill in coaching except win state," he says.

And "this summer I got to thinking more seriously about quitting." Came near to not starting the season this year.

"I even thought seriously about it year before last. But we expected a poor-poor season and I didn't want to quit it then."

Only 5 lettermen returned for the '69 team, but the Wolves put together a surprising 7-3 season, won South Zone title of District 3-AAA and lost to defending state champ Estacado in the zone playoff.

"I thought we would have a good chance for another good season this year, so I finally decided to continue another year.

"Then this year," Nix continues, "we had so much of that gang back I decided to keep on coaching this season."

"But I just don't have the desire to fight it any longer."

"Since the operation I feel pretty good... now. But with this season I can tell my condition is getting back where it was. I don't want that to happen. It is not fair to my family."

Nix readily admits that a coach, he at least, creates his own pressures. "I've created my own... brought it on myself. Every coach does that."

Nix believes the coaching pressure is increased here by the fact that Colorado High is a borderline AAA school—a school in the minimum enrollment for AAA competition against schools with maximum AAA enrollment.

## '71 Voter Sign Up On Climb

More than 7,500 persons have registered to vote in Mitchell County in 1971.

The registration passed the 1,500 mark last week in County Tax Assessor-Collector Monte Hardgree's Office and was slowly moving higher this week.

Deadline for voters to register comes Jan. 31, but numerous voters have registered early encouraged by voter blanks and reminders mailed this fall by Hardgree's staff.

Early response will lessen the late rush that usually comes after Christmas each year. But more than 2,000 still remain to register.

Applications from those persons in the 18 to 20-year-old age bracket have been fairly slow despite the new action by Congress to open voting to 18-year-olds.

Twenty-six have applied here to vote, but must await outcome of a Supreme Court decision before knowing whether Congress can lower the voting age without amending the U.S. Constitution.

However, here in C-City Nix has coached in both AA and AAA. Overall his record has been something like 28 wins, 30 losses and 2 ties.

His first season in 1964, coming here from fine success in Wink, is the low point. Only 1 win and 8 losses. Five defeats in 5-AA District play.

His Wolves climbed to a 5-5 mark in '65 and won 3 in 5-AA, losing 2. Still in 5-AA in '66, Nix coached his team to 4 wins, 4 losses and 2 ties with a 2-2-1 in district.

Nix's final year in 5-AA was '67 with a 6-4 season mark and 3-2 in district for a three-way tie for second.

Moving into District 3-AAA in '68, the Wolves managed a 5-5 mark, finishing in a tie for sixth place.

Therein is one of his regrets, one of the contributing factors for his decision to quit.

"I believe firmly without reservation, that athletics is the last frontier for our young kids today. And I just hate not to be a part of that."

"But I feel this slipping away. We just are not allowed to discipline kids like we used to. I don't mean physically... I mean like a dress code, things like that. And you've got to have it on a team.

The coach is sincere when he expresses appreciation for the manner "my family and I" have been accepted in Colorado City. For that reason we want to

keep on living here when he ends his professional coaching career.

Quarterback Club which he still persistently calls "booster club," to all his players and "above all" his coaching staff.

As he puts it plainly: "We worked our tails off."

Nix is openly disappointed at the outcome of this 1970 football season.

"This is my 23rd season as a head coach and I've had only four losing seasons (below a .500 win-loss mark).

Three of those have been in Colorado City and this is one of them."

He points this out more than once to back up his point that

Colorado High is a most difficult coaching task in AAA.

What is he planning to do after his duties of athletic director end here?

"I don't know what I'll do yet," he answers. "I want to stay here... in Colorado City... but I will not be in the school system."

"My only ambition in school has been to coach."

His friends say Nix is considering the business field, possibly in insurance or sporting equipment. But he tells you himself nothing is definite, except that he is resigning from coaching.

## Committee To Screen Coaching Applicants

A trustees committee will screen applicants for Colorado City's next school athletic and physical education director.

Tom Rees, board chairman for Colorado Independent School District, outlined the selection plan Wednesday to the Record.

His committee plan will be presented to trustees at their next meeting—possibly at a special session previously planned for next week.

If the board agrees—and indications from trustees are that they favor the screening committee procedure, Rees will appoint three trustees to the committee.

When selection of an athletic director, who serves as head coach in the Colorado City school system, finally comes is anybody's guess.

Truman Nix's letter of resignation from the position, was handed to Supt. Lloyd McKee Monday. Nix said his departure would not be until the end of the current school year next May.

Rees pointed out Wednesday the board must first act on Nix's resignation. Procedure for selecting a replacement cannot begin until the board officially accepts the coach's resignation.

Nix has one more year remaining on a contract that pays him \$11,870 per year and the board could complicate matters by refusing the resignation, but this action is not expected.

Rees said Supt. McKee would serve as an ex-officio member of the screening committee.

"Assignment of a screening committee will be review applications and schedule interviews with applicants.

"After proper review," the attorney said, "the committee will bring to the board those applicants it recommends for the board's consideration.

"Then it will be up to the board to approve the best qualified applicant."

Board administrative policy

No. 2134, adopted Nov. 8, 1968 states that "in event of a change" in the directorship of athletics and physical education "all high school coaching positions will be open."

The policy is one of many adopted and kept on file directing school administration and operation in accordance with requirements of Texas Education Agency. This adopted policy will allow the new director to make his own coaching selections, subject to approval by the board.

Nix made no recommendations for a successor to his position in his letter of resignation. His letter to McKee stated his decision briefly.

"After careful consideration and with deep regret I feel it best to offer my resignation effective at the end of this school year.

"I feel that I have served the school district with the best of my ability and that every decision I've had to make was with the students in mind. I will continue to work in a professional manner the remainder of the school year.

"If I can be of any help please let me know."

Although Nix did not recommend a successor, his friends report that Buddy Everett, an assistant, is highly regarded by the athletic director and considered by him to be capable of moving into a head coaching position.

Although the resignation was not submitted until Monday, inquiries from out-of-town coaches already had begun Wednesday at the school.

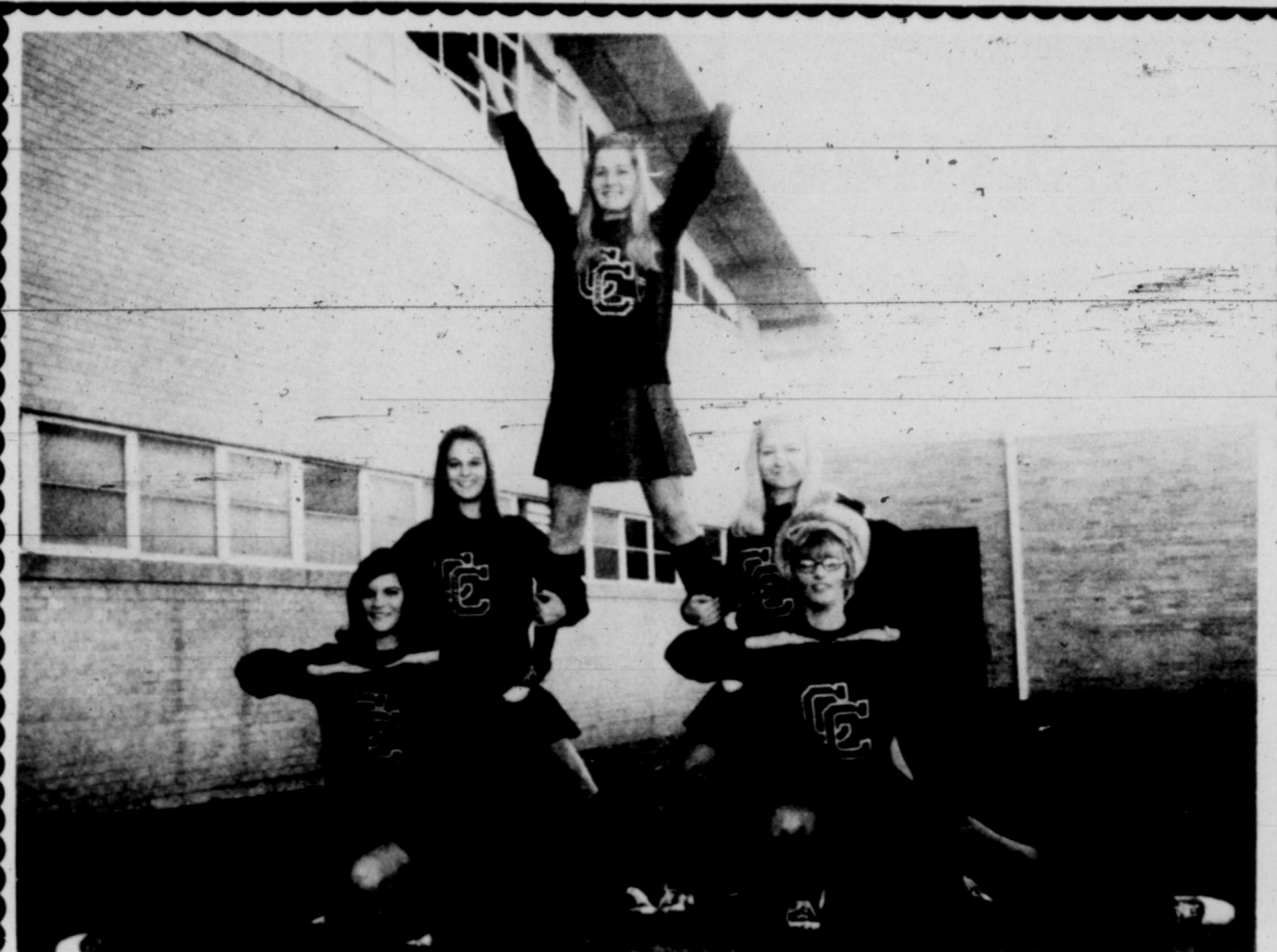

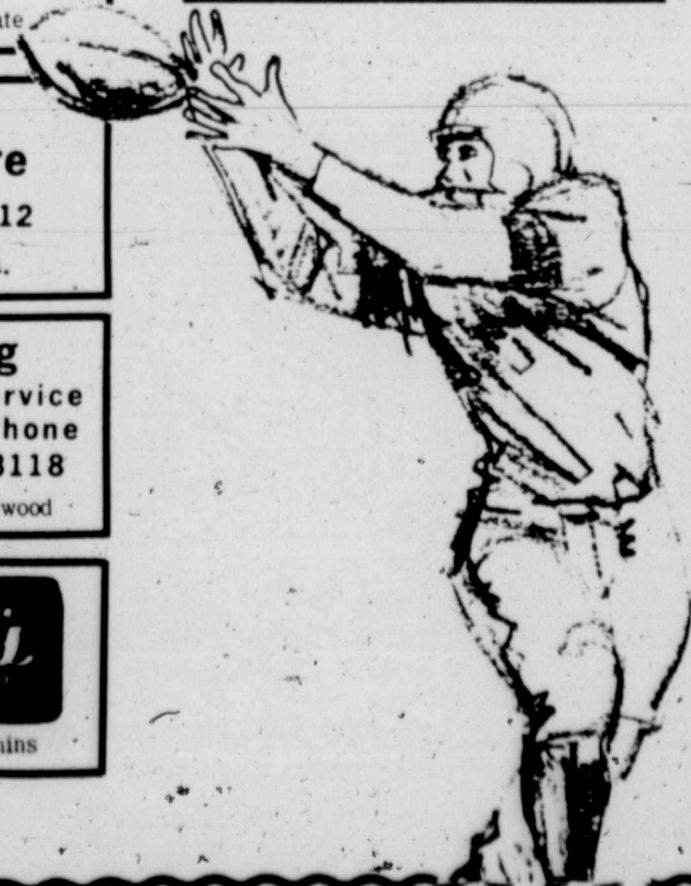
