County Crops Are Making Progress

Crops generally made excellent progress in Mitchell County in the past week, according to County Extension Agent Rob Benson.

Benson estimated 72,000 acres (a figure close to last years) planted with 98 percent up.

"Mitchell County rains have been very

spotted" he commented. He noted generally we have good ground moisture.

However, he continued with a few days of 20 mile an hour winds and 95-100 degree temperatures the ground dries out fast.

Some landowners, southwest of the city got as much as three inches

of rain Tuesday while the northwest and western part of the county got only a trace.

Benson estimated if conditions continue favorable and the county gets a good three inch rain in the next few weeks, the cotton crops will be very good this year.

Cotton crops overmuch of the county are late this year due to lack of planting moisture in early May and heavy rains in late May and early June.

Normally, excluding insects, weeds and other stress factors, during the first three weeks of blooming 61 percent of the blooms for the season are produced. It takes about 21 days for the blooms to open.

The infamous bollweevil may not be too much of a problem this year according to Benson.

The cotton insect count recently taken was light. Benson indicated the main reason for the light count was due to last year's cold winter.

He said it would be to the farmers advantage to have a late crop this year because the bollweevil reached its peak emergence the first part of May.

The weevil can live 14 to 18 days without eating. A cotton square (boll) must be about one-third developed for the weevil to attack it.

Since the cotton was not planted, in most instances in Mitchell

County, until the past two weeks and it requires 35 to 40 days after planting to attain the one-third developed squares, the bollweevil will go hungry and die in most cases.

Ranchers too are in good condition, according to Benson. He noted most could use a good driving rain to fill stock tanks which are near dry in some areas of the county.

However, grasslands are doing fairly well he commented.

Benson stated the cattle market looked good through 1981 due to the cut-back in production. The number of cattle on the market is down substantially, he said.

Vandals Trash Swimming Pool

The Colorado City Swimming Pool in Ruddle Park was open again by noon Tuesday after it was forced to close because of a vandalism incident two days earlier.

At about 7:15 a.m. Sunday, Colorado City Police Officer Billy Williamson, while on patrol around the pool, found that the trash cans and benches and other debris

in the area had been tossed in the pool.

Because of this incident, it had to be drained, cleaned up and filled again. This forced its closing all day Monday.

City Manager Ray Mason said Tuesday that he couldn't put a dollar figure on any damage to the pool, it just took a lot of time to clean it up.

Williamson added that, "The incident caused a lot of inconvenience for everyone."

According to Assistant Police Chief Jerry Cowin, anyone caught in the pool after closing hours is guilty of a class C misdemeanor and may be fined up to \$200.

The incident is still under investigation by the Colorado City Police Department.

Valley Lodge Gets Superior Rating

Root Valley Fair Lodge took the limelight at the regularly scheduled board meeting of the Mitchell County Hospital District Tuesday evening.

The 46 patient lodge received a superior rating of 218 points from the Texas Department of Health during an on

site Independent Professional Review conducted June 5.

The TDH prefaced their report by stating "It is indeed a pleasure to visit a facility whose overall operation is as excellent as yours. You and your staff are certainly to be commended for a job well done!"

It was reported by Hospital Business Manager George Witten that the nearest score given by the members of the inspection team was 165 points.

It was also reported by Witten that shortly after the lodge was reviewed, Director of Nurses was offered a position with the TDH as advisor and consultant of nurses, which she declined.

Board members inquired as to the health of Hospital Administrator Charles Root who has recently had a triple heart by-pass in a Lubbock hospital.

Witten reported the operation was successful. He commented it had been necessary to use arteries from both of Roots legs to do the by-pass.

He stated that Root was up and walking the second day after surgery and as is typical of most patients, complains the food is awful.

Items on the agenda included opening bids on Electric Embosser and imprinters. Two bids were presented, one for new equipment from Farrington and one for

City Applies For Funds

Application has been made and the city qualified to receive government funds to help bring industry to Colorado City.

According to City Manager Ray Mason he submitted an application to the Urban Development Action Grant Program a little over two weeks ago.

Under the program a city must meet several criteria. It must be established that the town is in distressed economic condition. There are points which are mandatory. Colorado City comes well within the guidelines of each category.

Percentages of population growth, poverty stricken, housing built prior to 1940 and increased income were considered.

Statistics were taken from 1960 to 1975. They showed a population of 5,055 and a decrease of 3.29 percent since that period. The established government percentage to qualify was a minimum increase of 15.52.

The percent of poverty stricken individuals in Colorado City was listed as 24.37 percent. The government minimum figure was 11.24 percent or more.

In this frame of reference the State Department of Public Welfare

noted for the fiscal year ending August 31, 1978 in this area \$1,075,326 had been spent on medical assistance payments.

The department paid food stamp bonus value of \$124,406 and All Families Deprived Children's Program supplied \$56,158.

During that time frame there were 601 persons eligible for Medicaid in this district.

Figures showed 43.56 percent of all housing in the city was built prior to 1940. Government minimum figures were 34.15 percent or more.

Income figures per capita, using figures from 1969-1974, showed

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Town Talk

The one thing government has shown over a long period of years is how incompetent it is at handling its own affairs. So how can people in government expect to run somebody else's business?

There seems to be a big hub-dub about oil companies making big profits. What is wrong with that? That's what the free enterprise system is all about-profit. The bigger the company, the bigger the profits should be or else the management gets changed. Who owns oil companies? The answer to that is individuals who own stock in oil companies.

So by the government saying oil companies are evil, they are saying that American individuals are evil. By trying to add tax to so-called windfall profits, the government is attempting to double tax the people and companies who are already paying taxes on these profits.

By taking away profits, the government is taking away money that could go into the economy and also encourage development by oil companies of more sources of energy.

Instead of doing this, the government would be taking in more money to waste on more bureaucracy or some crazy programs or giveaways to foreign countries.

This is supposed to be a government by the people. Instead, it seems to be a government against the people. All this may sound a little angry but Americans seem to be in an angry mood, and, again in my opinion, there is cause for anger.

Stephens Gets A Judgment

Thirty-Second District Court Judge Weldon Kirk awarded an \$81,389.55 judgement Friday to Rita Stephens and her son, Laston, of 433 W. 14th Street.

Suit stemmed from an alleged dogbite incident which occurred on May 12, 1978.

According to the judgement, Mrs. Stephens and Laston were being visited in the Stephen's home by Cheryl Ruth of 443 W. 14th Street, when a dog named, "Brutus," belonging to Jimmy and Cheryl Ruth came into the house and attacked Laston who was three-years-old.

The alleged attacked caused a gash on the right side of the child's head and also resulted in the loss of his right ear lobe and the loss of the tragus of his right ear.

Mrs. Stephens subsequently filed suit against the Ruths asking for the following damages: \$50,000 because of the mental anguish and trauma to Laston Stephens caused by the dogbite; \$25,000 because of the anguish and trauma to Rita Stephens in connection with the same incident; \$1,489.55 to pay for present medical bills for the child and another \$7,500 to pay for future medical bills.

Total damages filled for in the suit amounted to \$83,989.55.

The judgement by Kirk was awarded by default when the Ruths failed to appear in court. In addition to the \$81,389.55 figure, it also included interest from the date of the judgement at a rate of nine percent per annum.

Frontier Parade In Step

Jury Indicts Bell

The Mitchell County Grand Jury Friday indicted Barbara Bell, 25, Rt. 3, Box 82, of Colorado City for criminal negligence.

The charge came in connection with a May 18 incident on the Sterling City Highway.

Bell was the driver of a vehicle which collided with a bicycle ridden by nine-year-old Amanda Rivera and her seven-year-old brother, Rene.

The Rivera girl was killed in the accident and the boy received serious injuries.

The charges for which the driver was indicted is a Class A misdemeanor for which the maximum punishment is a fine of not more than \$2,000 or one year in prison or both. Bond was set at \$1,000 and has been posted.

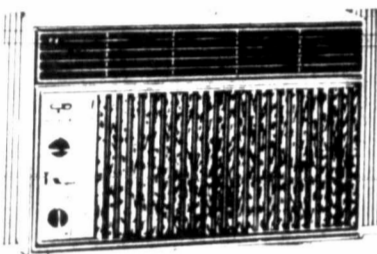

In addition, all persons who are 65 or older or under a disability for purposes of payment of disability benefits under Federal Old-Age, Survivors, and Disability Insurance are also entitled to an additional exemption of \$10,000 from the market value of their residence homesteads for the purpose of school taxes.

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STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—Energy dominated all issues this week at the State Capitol how to ration it, how to conserve it, and how to find new sources.

Faced with short gasoline supplies and long lines at service stations in the Houston and Dallas areas, Governor Bill Clements mandated last Tuesday that stations must restrict sales through purchase limits and a California-style odd-even license plate number plan. The plan (for Harris, Dallas and Tarrant counties only) restricts gasoline sales to a maximum of 20 gallons, and allows fill-ups for odd-numbered plates on odd-numbered calendar days, and even for even, etc.

Hours after his announcement, Clements' legal advisors remained uncertain on how much authority the governor's office has if any to enforce the mandate.

More fuel-related troubles appeared on another horizon when Agriculture Commissioner Reagan Brown told Clements Thursday that a truckers' boycott and sporadic violence around the country threatened Texas' \$40 million watermelon and vegetable crop. Brown told Clements his office was swamped with telephone calls from Texas producers in need of trucks to haul their produce to markets. The trucker boycott, a protest of rapidly escalating diesel prices, aims "to empty food shelves in supermarkets around the country" and is slowly bringing Texas agriculture to a "grinding halt," a Brown aide said.

Harry Hubbard, president of the Texas AFL-CIO, said he thought refinery workers and truckers who transport gasoline should not have to wait in line for fuel. "Making Texans stand in line for gas is like making Kansans stand in line for wheat," he said.

Clements came under fire in Austin from conservative State Rep. Dan Kubiak who called him "irresponsible" for vetoing budgeted funds for several alternative energy projects. Kubiak, who successfully sponsored a bill allowing gasoline production in Texas, criticized Clements for ham-stringing gasoline and other energies only three days before mandating his gas rationing plan. The Rockdale legislator called on Clements to include "the rapid development of alternative energy" in the Governor's promised special session.

Primary "Death Knell" Sounded

A "Killer Bee" senator sounded the "death knell" for a regional presidential primary, saying he had checked with state officials from New Mexico, Oklahoma, Alabama and Mississippi with negative results. Those neighboring states, Sen. Ron Clower, D-Garland, said, "do not want a simultaneous primary with Texas."

Clements earlier had indicated he might call a special session to consider a regional primary if enough interest was aroused. Other projects with neighbors may be more successful. Clements was to at-

law enforcement to control drug traffic on both sides of the border, and the importation of oil and gas from Mexico's vast reserves at prices acceptable to Mexico.

If the four governors and U. S. Ambassador to Mexico Patrick Lucrey agree on a plan, they will depart Brownsville with a date for a summit with the governors of Mexico's six border states. If the border state governors agree with the plans, the recommendations will be turned over to the State Department as a guide to an international agreement between the two countries.

Clements Calls on LULAC

In his address Thursday to the national League of Latin American Citizens convention, Clements told delegates "You are our greatest resource" in solving the problems shared by the border governors and building closer ties with Mexico. Saying it is better to rely on a friend like Mexico for foreign oil supplies, Clements also brought the 2,000 delegates to their feet when he said oil companies should be required to either reinvest windfall profits into energy production or be taxed "100 percent-I repeat, 100 percent on

those above normal revenue."

If LULAC was pleased with Clements' statements, it also is pleased with his 1978 gubernatorial opponent, former Texas Attorney General John Hill. Five days after the convention, LULAC national director Ruben Bonilla endorsed Hill as the group's choice to replace U. S. Attorney General Griffin Bell, who intends to resign prior to the 1980 primaries. Bonilla said their Hispanic choice, Reynaldo Garza, was recently appointed as 5th U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals judge, but "Hill would be an extraordi-

nary choice" because of his record on civil rights.

Roloff Homes Supported

Despite a State District Judge's orders to close the unlicensed children's homes of evangelist Lester Roloff, the facilities remained open last week. Officials from the Department of Human Resources refused to break through a human barrier of about 300 hymn-singing persons clutching Bibles and American flags who stood in the front entrance to Roloff's Peoples Church. The teen-aged residents of Roloff's Rebekah Home for Girls

had been moved from the home to the church next door, and their parents and some 150 pastors from 25 states kept a front-door vigil.

Roloff voluntarily closed down his Zapata boys' home facilities on June 19 in obedience of the court order, but maintained a stubborn resistance at the girls' home near Corpus Christi.

State officials, unsure of how to handle the large crowd, said they did not know when or if they would enter the home. Roloff, meanwhile, says he will "never give up."

Benson commented on the "Savory Short Duration Wagon Wheel Grazing System" in operation on the Bertram and Stubblefield Ranch.

He noted the program was designed to allow twice as many cattle to be grazed on a section of land.

The section, 640 acres, is divided into nine equal parts. The cattle graze it completely out, including undesirable grazing which would normally be left, before they are moved.

This allows the grazed portion of the range to grow untrampled or grazed for about a two month period.

Stubblefield is working with a little less than

a full section and presently running 25 head. He will increase the number to 32, then 50 if the program works as described.

This grazing system is used extensively in South Africa with great success according to Benson.

Benson commented, this system would not revolutionize the cattle industry in our area because it would be too expensive and impractical to build the intricate fencing system required.

However, he commented it appears that in isolated instances, such as Stubblefield's, it can be used to allow producers to run twice as many cattle successfully.

Farabee Blasts Program

State Senator Ray Farabee blasted Washington in a written statement given Tuesday, for its lack of any national energy program.

He stated "State government does not set energy policy, but somehow the Department of Energy expects state and local governments to enforce their piecemeal plans."

He suggested until we have a coherent national energy plan, there will be continual crisis.

He explained he thinks it is unfair to expect state or local governments to carry out something which the federal government can neither explain, understand nor administer.

Farabee filed a protest with DOE in Washington last week opposing the "conservation plan" because the regulations reflect what he termed "ignorance of the problems in the 30th Senatorial District," of which Mitchell County is a part.

He said his office received a number of requests for assistance in connection with energy needs related to the wheat harvest, disaster needs and health care. "We received excellent cooperation from the Governor's Office of Energy Resources, and I am pleased that although they are limited in their authority, they have been able to provide assistance in most instances."

The board voted to accept the Farrington equipment at a bid of \$3,036.77 with a possible delivery date of from 60 to 120 days, which was noted as the standard time given on bids made to government entities.

The embossers and imprinters will be used to make plastic cards at different stations in the hospital. Target date for conversion to the computer system is August 1. Witten stated due to Roots recent hospital stay the projected date may need to be moved back to September 1.

Witten presented the financial statement to the board. He noted the net loss for the month of May 1979 at \$23,706.86, which is 16 percent more than budgeted for that month.

During the financial report the board voted to write off \$6,235.98 worth of unpaid bills as charity for the past year

and \$10,715.47 as bad debts Witten commented he thinks that inflation has just begun to show up in the accounts receivable.

Bob Reily, representative to the ambulance board from the hospital district gave a report on the projected ambulance budget. He noted the subsidy from the hospital district to the ambulance service will remain the same as last year due to an anonymous donation which will off-set increased cost.

It was also reported the ambulance service has recently purchased four new tires. It is planned to purchase four new wheels and chains so the tires can be mounted and the chains placed on the tires.

When it is icy next winter the whole wheel, tire and chain assembly can quickly replace the wheels on the vehicles.

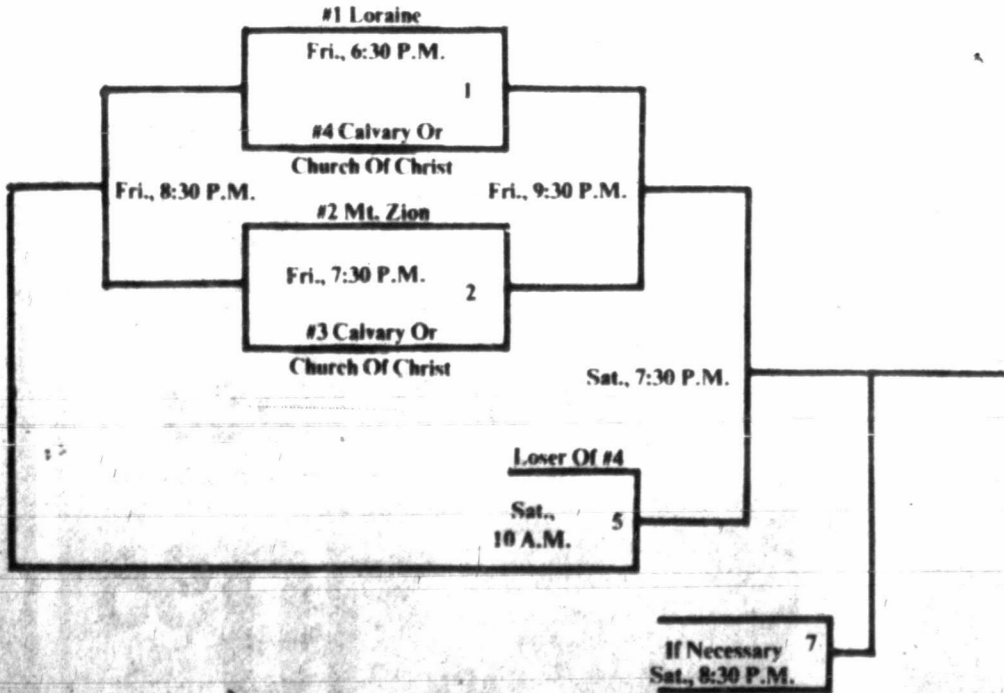


