

**NEW COUNTY JAIL**---This structure which has been added onto the northeast corner of the Court House houses the new jail facility which has been completed and an Open House is slated for Sunday beginning at 2 p.m. The structure was made possible by a \$100,000 bond issue last fall and was

built by Wiley Hicks Jr. General Contractor of Amarillo. It meets all state minimum standards for jails, has no outside entry except through the Sheriff's Office and can house both male and female adults and juveniles, all in separate cells.

# Open House Set Sunday For New County Jail

Sherman County residents are invited to inspect the newly completed Sherman County Jail at the Court House Sunday afternoon between the hours of 2 p.m. and 10 p.m., announced County Judge W.S. (Bill) Frizzell Jr.

The new jail has been under construction since early this year by the Wiley Hicks Jr. general contracting firm of Amarillo.

The 2500 square foot structure is attached on the northeast portion of the Court House with an entry through the Sheriff's Office in the basement of the Court House and has no outside

opening except into the Sheriff's Dispatcher Office.

The new facility is as modern as can be constructed and meets all state requirements including a padded cell. It contains a felony cell block that can hold up to six prisoners, a drunk tank with room for five prisoners, one juvenile cell, two juvenile female cells and two adult female cells, two misdemeanor cell blocks with room for four prisoners and the padded cell.

Constructed in such a manner that there is access corridor all the way around the cell blocks, the jail is built where prisoner

handling safety is of utmost concern. The jail has forced air-heating and evaporative air cooling and also contains its own kitchen facilities. The entire unit is constructed of pre-stressed concrete and steel and is designed to take care of Sherman County's needs for the foreseeable future.

This new jail facility was approved by voters back in December, 1971, in a \$100,000 bond issue. A similar measure for a total of \$80,000 was turned down by a 19-vote margin three years earlier.

The 1971 jail bond issue was brought to a head by a Grand Jury

recommendation that the old jail be condemned.

"We certainly are proud of our new jail," commented Sheriff Clois Vaughn. "Our entire staff feels indebted to all the taxpayers for making this possible. We hope that everyone will take this opportunity Sunday to come and see just how their taxmonies has been spent," he added.

The jail will be put into full operation by the county following Sunday's Open House.

"If you stay after 10 p.m. you can stay at the county's expense," laughed Sheriff Vaughn.

## Travis Crisp Delivers First Sorghum Here

Travis Crisp delivered the first dry load of grain sorghum to a local elevator for the 1972 harvest early Monday morning.

The load was delivered to North Plains Grain Company in Stratford and was a load of dryland maize cut off the Jerry Sparks place about nine miles north of Stratford.

The load was Martin milo and was planted in May. The load averaged 13.75 percent moisture and tested 57 pounds. Crisp said the field was averaging about 1,000 pounds of milo per acre where this load was harvested.

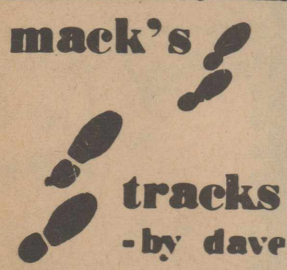
The load was actually cut late Sunday evening then brought to North Plains where it was dumped early Monday.

The area's first irrigated rain sorghum was delivered to the Stratford Grain Company's Stratford facility early Tuesday morning by Mrs. J.L. Stowers.

The load of irrigated maize was cut on the Stowers' farm located about six miles southwest of town late Monday evening. The load tested 13.72 moisture and weighed 56 pounds. Mrs. Stowers said the variety was Excel 707A, was planted on May 5, and watered four times from a tailwater pit. The rain was making about 6,500 pounds per acre where this load was cut late Monday.

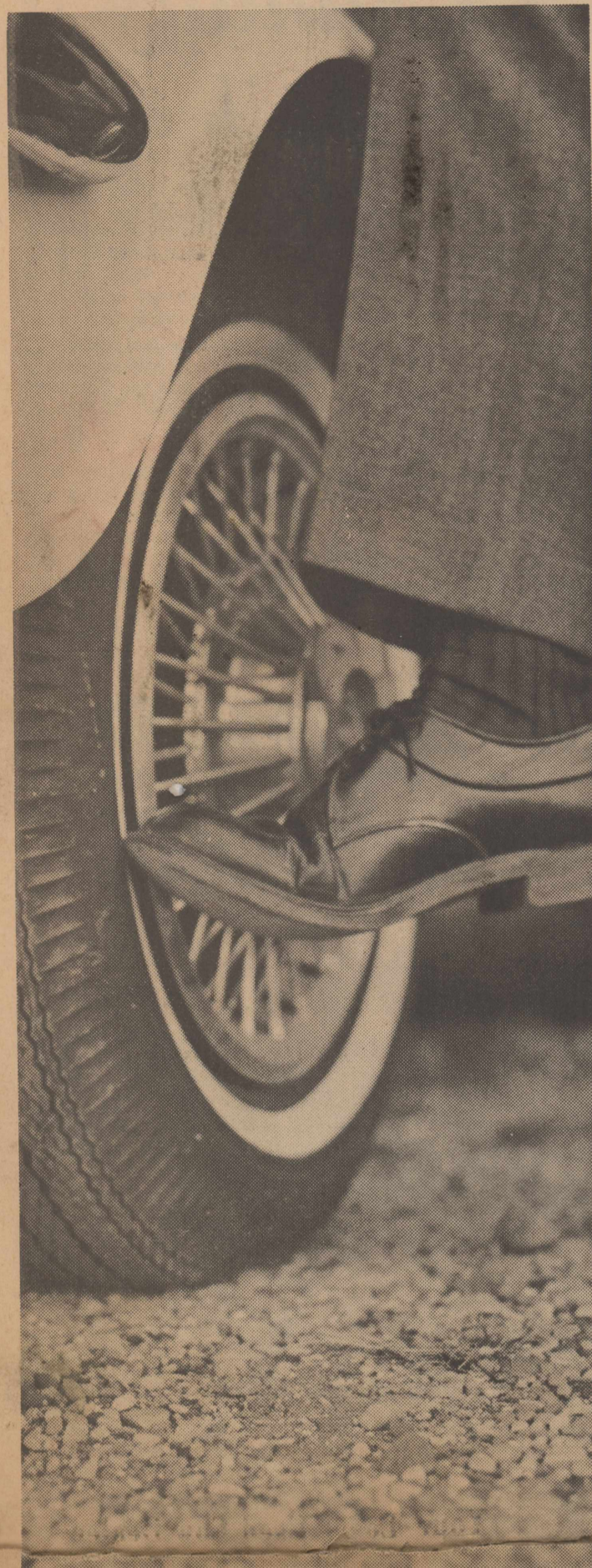

### Layman Revival At Assembly Begins Wednesday

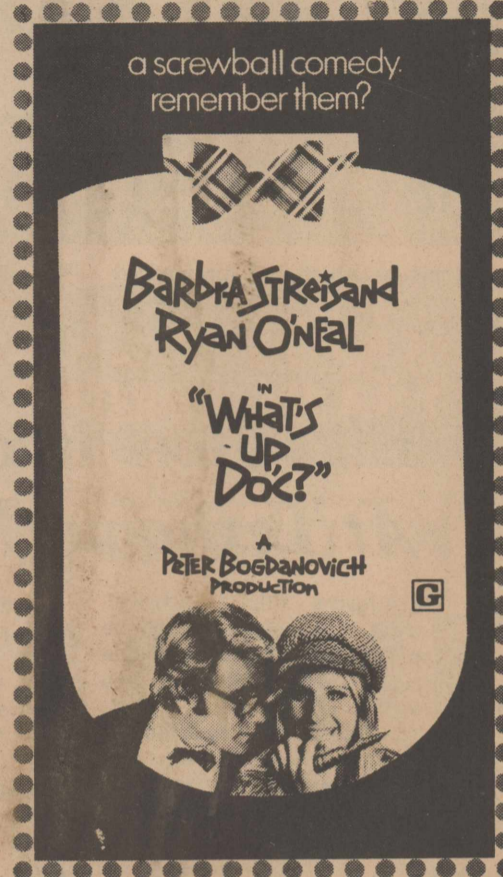

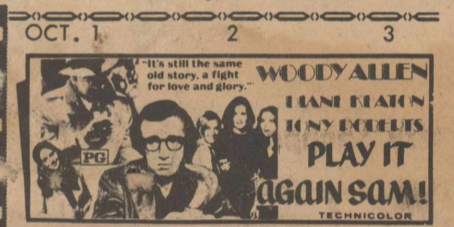
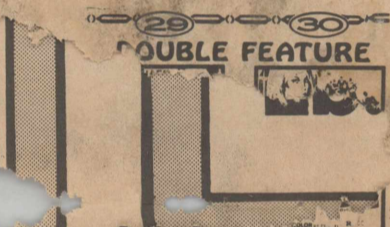

Exhibits may be picked up after 6 p.m. Sat., Sept 30 not later than 8 p.m.

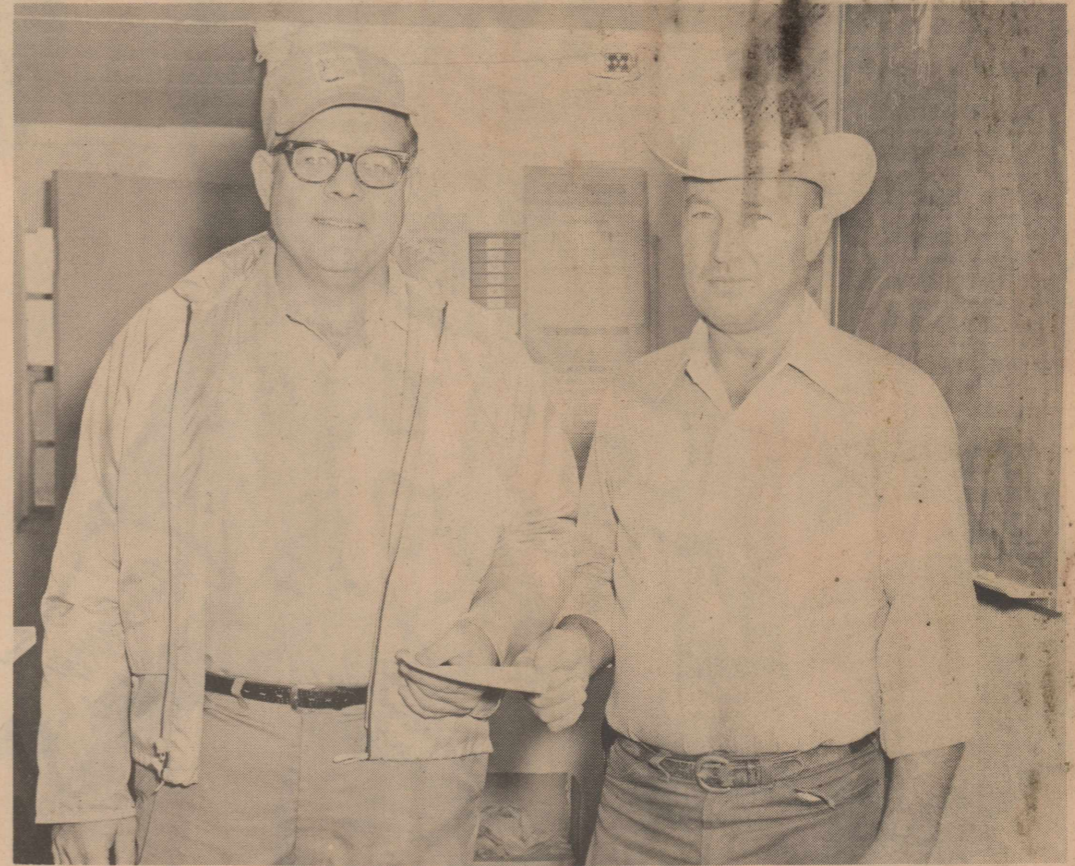

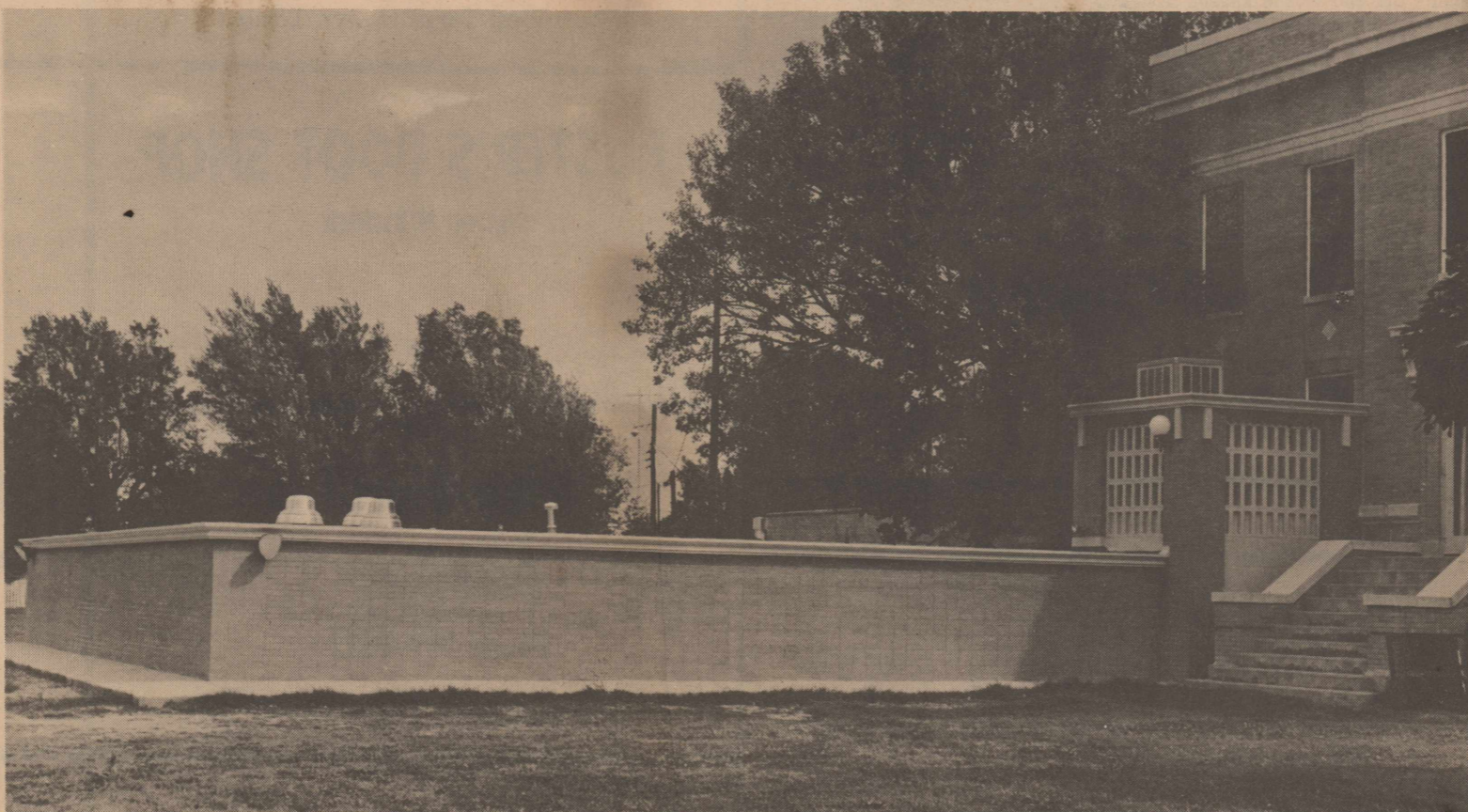

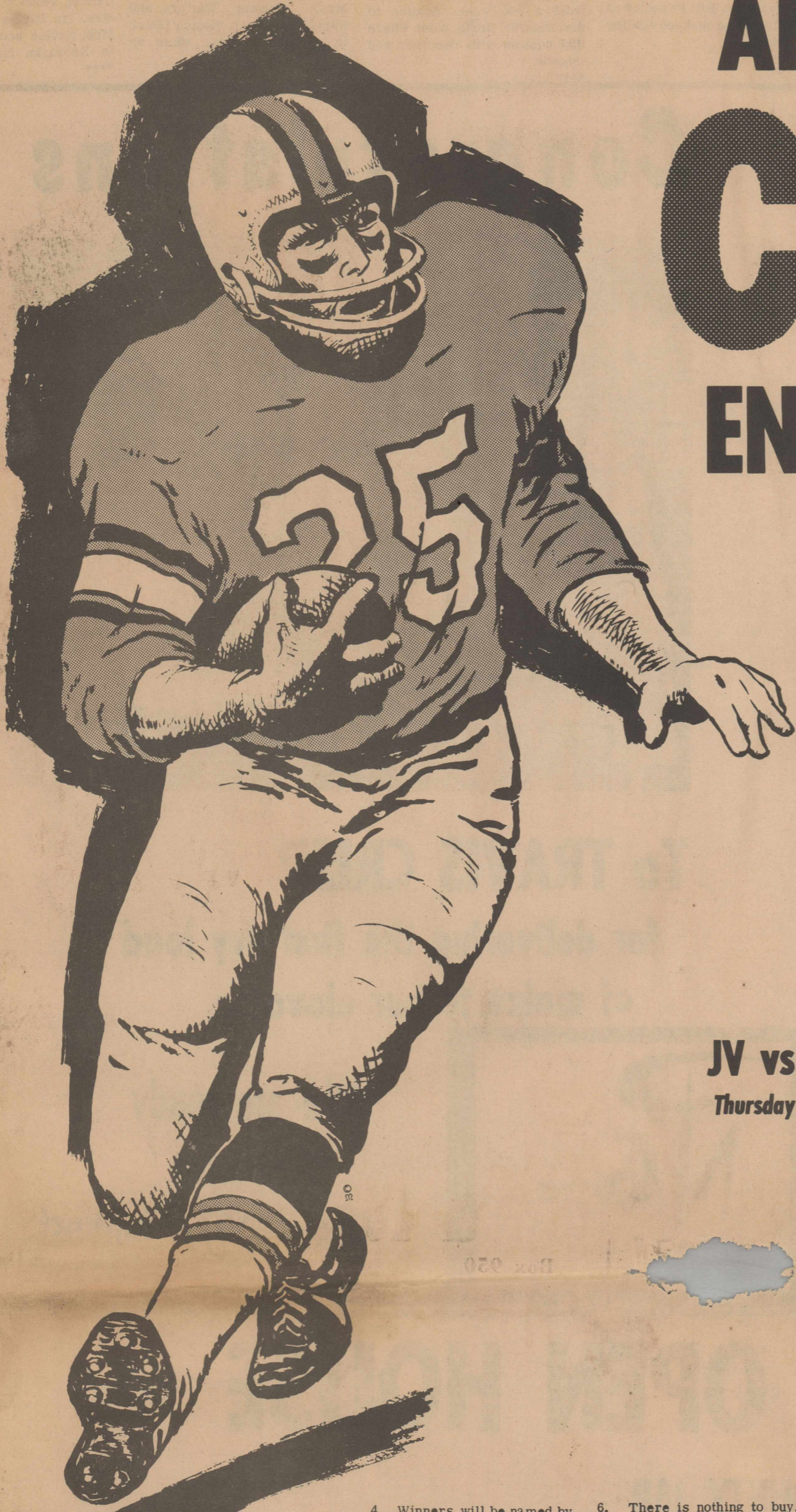

## Texhoma Sale Sets Annual Show Oct. 6

Texhoma Livestock Commission Company will hold their annual Feeder Cattle Show and Sale and free barbeque on Friday, October 6.

A total of 5,000 to 6,000 cattle and calves are expected for that event. Judging will begin at 9 a.m. for feeder steers and heifers; calves begin at 11 a.m.

The barbeque begins at 11 a.m. with the festivities in the sales arena from noon until 1 p.m. with the auction to commence at 1 p.m. selling the 12 loads that place first then followed by the balance of animals in the order in which they are consigned.

This past week a total of 2,786 animals sold with a good market active to higher with feeder steers and heifers fully 50¢ higher.

During the Friday run calves sold from \$115 to \$167 per head with other representative sales as follows: small group of WF steers sold \$57.75 and average 336 pounds; heifers mates to this group sold at \$48.75 per cwt; one group of 53 WF and Blk WF heifers averaging 694 pounds sold for \$38.53 WF heifers

averaging 727 pounds for \$36.30 per cwt; 111 WF steers ave-

raging 606 pounds for \$47 per cwt and 90 mixed steers averaging 795 pounds for \$41.25 per cwt.

Packer cows went from \$24 to \$27 per cwt with the bulk of the feeder heifers from \$36 to \$38 per cwt and bulk of feeder

steers sold for \$42 to \$44 per cwt.
