Curlee Named New Hospital Board President, Callan Comments Heard

Fisher County Hospital Board members elected a new board president when they re-organized during their regular May meeting recently.

Former Fisher County Hospital Board President William Cleveland, Jr., was replaced by Horace Curlee.

Nominations for the position of board president were solicited by Hospital Board President William Cleveland, Jr. New Board Member Rodney Tankersley immediately nominated Horace Curlee. Steve Nowlin nominated William Cleveland, Jr.

The vote on the nominations was called for by Cleveland, Board Members Rodney Tankersley, LaVonia Neepor and Horace Curlee all voted in favor of Curlee. Cleveland and Nowlin didn't vote. Curlee was elected.

Board members canvassed the results of the election and administered the pre-oath and oath of office to newly elected board members Rodney Tankersley, LaVonia Neepor and Steve Nowlin.

The board, under old business, discussed the pending exclusive contract with Jackson & Coker, physician search company. Fisher County Hospital Administrator Ronny Ammons informed the board that the agreement with Jackson & Coker had a \$26,000 cap. "If we find a physician through this firm, \$26,000 would be cheap compared to the \$1,000 a day it is running to staff the hospital emergency room", said Ammons.

Board member Rodney Tankersley indicated that he was not in favor of the agreement entered into by the board with Jackson & Coker. That agreement spells out that Jackson & Coker be given an exclusive agreement and would be paid a fee even if a physician is located through no effort initiated by their firm.

The board, agreeing with Administrator Ronny Ammons, re-affirmed its desire to guarantee a permanent physician up to \$150,000 a year the first year of local practice.

Ammons also informed the board,

"If we don't find a medical technician (laboratory technician) we're going to have to close the hospital down." Ammons has been frustrated recently in his attempt to find physicians who are willing to locate in Fisher County, medical technicians and nurses.

Following the "Jackson & Coker" discussion under old business, the board named William Cleveland, Jr., as vice president and Steve Nowlin as secretary.

The board appointed Dr. Rudolph Cantu to the medical staff as well as James Burleson.

The board adopted a resolution for the lease of laboratory equipment from Diversified Lenders of Lubbock for a \$98,000 hematology machine for the laboratory. The resolution was to lease the machine for five years with a buy-out after five years.

The board adopted a resolution on malpractice insurance and reviewed delinquent accounts.

Dr. C. Maurice Callan addressed the

board in open session concerning some thoughts he wanted to air on the cooperation between the board and physicians, administrator and association between the hospital and Methodist Hospital in Lubbock.

Dr. Callan said that he felt the last two boards had been very cooperative and pleaded for that cooperation to continue in the future. He indicated that the cooperation is vitally needed among the board itself, the board and administration and the board and physicians in order for the best medical care possible to be afforded patients using the Fisher County Hospital medi-

cal facilities.

Dr. Callan said that he felt the board should continue giving its support to Mr. Ammons in his capacity as administrator. He felt Ammons was doing a good job.

In closing Dr. Callan indicated that he was pleased with the association the Fisher County Hospital had with Methodist Hospital in Lubbock and felt the local hospital should continue with some form of association agreement.

Following the meeting, Dr. Callan was asked his opinion on several subjects.

Comment on the future of the

Fisher County Hospital.

Callan - "This hospital can survive if we can get another physician to come here and work".

Comment on the job you feel Administrator Ronny Ammons is doing locally.

Callan - "He is doing a good job for the Fisher County Hospital District".

Comment on the future of rural hospitals in general.

Callan - "They are in bad trouble, in general".


Comment on the most pressing issue facing the Fisher County Hospital board in the next three years".

Callan - "Money".

Comment on the projected survival rate of area hospitals in the future.

Callan - "Of the five hospitals in a cluster around us, Snyder, Sweetwater, Aspermont, Hamlin and Rotan, one will probably go at some point in the future. The ones that survive are going to be the ones who do their homework".

Report By County Education District #11 Administrator Circulated

Rotan And Roby May Be In For Equalization Of Residential Property For Tax Purposes

Fisher County may be in for an equalization of residential property in the Rotan and Roby school districts, according to the report issued at a meeting in late May attended by approximately 14 Fisher County officials and L.R. Peveler, County Education District #11 Administrator.

Purpose Of Meeting

From information obtained from

Terry's Farm Store Opens In Co-Op Gin Building In Roby

Terry's Farm Store, located in the building formerly occupied by Farmer's Union Co-op Gin, officially opened in Roby last week.

Tony Terry has been named as the manager.

The new business plans on stocking a full line of farm supplies and Paymaster and Acco Feeds & seeds.

The business is in the process of conducting a sale to clear out some of the discontinued items. An advertisement concerning the sale can be found in this week's paper.

Teddy Kral, Fisher County Chief Appraiser, last Monday afternoon, Peveler's purpose for meeting was to attempt to convince the 'powers to be' that there needed to be a property value equalization in Rotan and Roby.

According to his computations, Rotan ISD single family dwellings were only 72.71% of true market value and Roby ISD single family dwellings were only 87.13% of true market value. In contrast Crosbyton was at 96% of market value; Post was 95% while Ralls, Southland, Jayton-Girard, Hermleigh, Snyder and Ira were at or above 100% of market value.

First Contact On May 15th

Kral indicated that he was first contacted by L.R. Peveler around May 15th asking his opinion of a re-evaluation in Fisher County. "He was interested in getting the homes in Rotan and Roby at 100 % of market value", said Kral. "Peveler was of the opinion that some were valued too high and some were valued too low," according to Kral.

County Is Under Valued

Basically, according to Kral, Peveler, representing County Education

District #11, did not feel Fisher County was where we should be with respect to our property values.

Meeting Is Called

"He asked if I could set up an informal meeting so he could give a presentation on the valuation study of Fisher County for 1990 and 1991. I complied, invited 14 or 15 people. Those attending were: Dr. Nolan Kinsey, Rotan School; George Price, Roby School; Joe Dickson, Rotan City; Jimmy Price, Roby City; Judge Marshal Bennett, Fisher County Judge; Cecil King, Citizen's State Bank; Hank Day and Bill Day, business community representatives. A representative of the First National Bank of Rotan was invited. "In all 14 or 15 attended. I felt like we have a good cross section from around the county," said Kral.

The meeting was conducted on Friday, May 22nd in Roby.

Peveler had some handouts, some reports and chaired an hour and a half meeting as the County Education District #11 Administrator.

Rotan, Roby Boards June 8th

Peveler has asked and will be granted an audience with the Rotan and Roby

school boards on June 8th to bring board members up to date on the valuation study of property in the Rotan and Roby district. He is scheduled to be in Roby at 7:30 p.m. and in Rotan at 9:00 p.m.

The Fisher County Appraisal District, made up of five individuals elected by the taxing entities in Fisher County, will meet again on July 14th, unless a special meeting is called. They are now normally meeting every other month.

Appraisal District Members

The members of the Fisher County Appraisal District are Jay Hendon, Chairman; Freddie Max Stuart, Vice Chairman; Gene Terry, Secretary; Leo Long and Clay Fowler.

Overall, taking into consideration houses, lots, rural land, commercial property, oil & gas, mobile homes, Rotan ISD is taxing at 94.41 % of market value; while Roby ISD is taxing at 95.66%.

Property More - Oil, Gas Less

If a re-evaluation takes place, Fisher County property owners will be taxed more and oil & gas property taxed less. Oil and gas properties in both Rotan

State Capitol Highlights

AUSTIN - Texas Railroad Commissioner Lena Guerrero, along with Texas oil and gas producers, vented anger against Congress for voting last week to restrict the TRC's role in regulating that industry.

The new law passed by predominantly non-oil state lawmakers to protect cheap natural gas prices "would create chaos in the natural gas system," Guerrero said.

It created some confusion about Guerrero, who days earlier scorned rumors she was siding with a "Bubba cartel" to fix higher gas prices.

Her remarks seemed to put

Guerrero, who has postured as the consumers' commissioner, out front favoring higher prices to benefit the state's gas industry.

Perot on More Ballots

Texas Secretary of State John Hannah said Dallas billionaire Ross Perot had more than enough valid petition signatures and would be on the Texas presidential ballot.

Perot also qualified for the Florida ballot last week, but riled gay and lesbian groups nationwide with his vow to exclude them from top jobs in his administration.

Perot also included "adulterers" in the types of people he would avoid hiring, if he knew about their activity.

Lane Denton Indicted

Former Waco lawmaker Lane Denton, whose Austin-based telemarketing firm has been under investigation for more than a year, was indicted by a Travis County grand jury on two felony charges.

The indictment alleged that Denton misapplied more than \$67,000 in 1988 and 1989 while he was executive director of the Texas Department of Public Safety Officers Association, a statewide troopers' group.

Denton was charged with theft and misapplication of fiduciary property. Each count carries up to two years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

Denton, 50, a longtime Democratic Party figure, whose wife is state Rep. Betty Denton, denied wrongdoing and predicted he will be cleared.

Bullock Wants Mail-Order Tax

Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock urged Congress to pass a new law allowing states to tax in-state mail order sales by out-of-state companies.

The U.S. Supreme Court said states could pass laws to force such taxes, now voluntary, if Congress permits.

Comptroller John Sharp, who also wants the new tax, said such a tax could raise \$150 million for Texas government.

Runoff Election Voided

State District Judge John DeLaney voided the result of a runoff election and ordered a new one for the new congressional seat created for Hispanics.

State Sen. Gene Green, D-Houston, who narrowly defeated former state representative Ben Reyes, said he will appeal DeLaney's ruling.

Reyes had sued for a new election on the grounds that several illegal crossover votes for Green provided the basis for his narrow margin of victory.

Mattox And Crazy Horse

Former Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox, now in private practice, is defending the new Crazy Horse malt liquor against irate American Indian groups.

Their leaders claim the New York-based brew, which will reach Texas stores this month, evokes racism and debases one of their great leaders.

Mattox contends the label is protected as commercial free speech.

Lewis Eyes Comp Rates

Lame duck Texas House Speaker Gib Lewis asked a Senate committee to investigate why workers' compensation insurance companies are raising rates if their losses are going down.

An industry spokesman said insurance officials are not confident the trend will hold, and they have years of over-regulation to make up.

Other Highlights

■ Texas Jail Standards Commissioner Jack Crump said counties might be able to house prisoners in tents as early as July.

■ The University of Texas is ranked eighth in the nation's top 107 research libraries; Texas A&M was 47th; University of Houston, 106th; and Rice University, 107th.

■ The GOP National Convention to be held in Houston this summer will cost the city almost half a million dollars for providing

police protection.

■ The Texas chapter of the NAACP voted to ask its national leaders to file a lawsuit blocking the use of the Texas skills exit exam required for high school graduation.

■ The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals told Attorney General Dan Morales it does not have jurisdiction to hear his appeal of a ruling that the sodomy law is illegal. Instead, the appeal will be heard solely by the Texas Supreme Court.

■ The 14th Court of Appeals acquitted the first woman prosecuted in Texas for passing cocaine to her unborn baby. Apparently the court was fearful of setting a precedent allowing law officers to subpoena hospital records and arrest pregnant women who test drug-positive.

IRS AUDITS

Now that you've filed your tax return, you might be wondering about your chances of being audited. The good news is that, in general, your chances of being audited are under 1%. Naturally, the higher your income level, the higher your chances.

The IRS scores tax returns for audit potential based on such factors as total income, size and types of deductions, and "hot" IRS areas (tax shelters and home office expenses, for example). Returns with scores indicating a high likelihood of understated income or overstated deductions are flagged for further review.

Generally, IRS audits are targeted at one or two specific areas of your return (e.g., capital gains, rental losses, or itemized deductions). The most common type of audit is the mail audit. Usually, this type of audit results when items reported on your return do not match 1099 information forms filed with the IRS (such as interest income, dividends, capital gains, and miscellaneous income). To avoid this type of audit, report items on your return as they are reported to you on the 1099 form, if possible. Don't combine separately reported items or amounts. Office and field audits are more complex, generally addressing such areas as rental properties and businesses.

If you are selected for an audit, give us a call. Our experience in dealing with IRS agents and IRS procedures can make your audit response easier and more effective.

Your best weapon in an audit is adequate documentation supporting items on your return. In fact, while 1991 is still fresh, you might want to review your return. Match 1099 information returns with reported income; tie reported deductions into receipts and cancelled checks. Then, file these documents with your copy of the return. 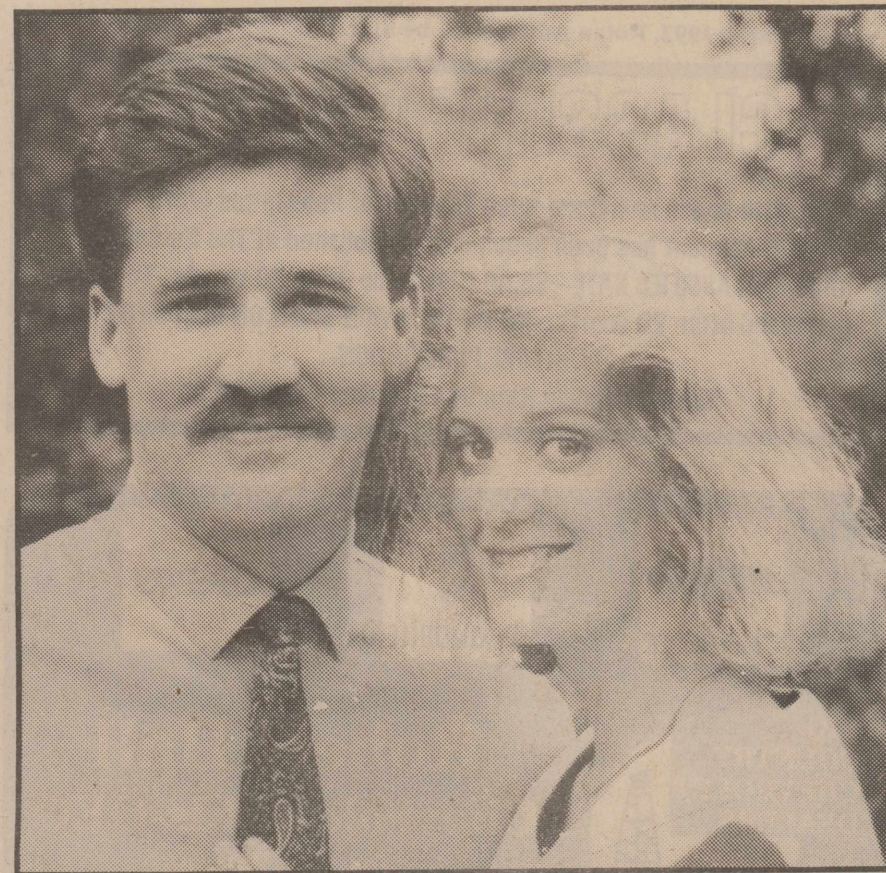

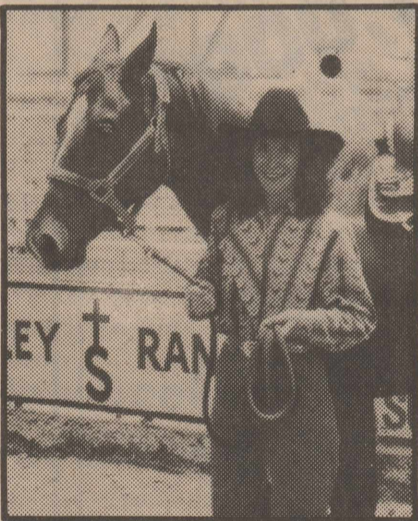

By the time the 1992 wheat harvest ends, farmers will have a new, high quality variety for fall planting.

TAM 202, a semi-dwarf hard red winter wheat, has features that will benefit both the farmer and the end-user.

This variety should do a better job than what's available currently the breeder noted. It's an alternative that may answer different situations experienced by farmers.

Texas farmers plant about 6 million acres of wheat a year, mostly in the High and Rolling Plains regions.

The new variety, the result of a breeding effort that began 10 years ago, claims high yields, disease resistance and good milling and baking qualities among its attributes.

Beyond the farm, hard red winter wheat -- used primarily for bread -- has to have good baking qualities. TAM 202's performance in this area is one of the key assets of the new variety.

Changes in the new Federal Grain Inspection Service classing system, scheduled to be implemented in 1994, will rate some of the current popular varieties "soft". Wheat classed "hard" is preferable for milling and baking, so the "soft" rating results in a price dockage of as much as \$1.20 per bushel -- or one-third to one-half of the price a farmer receives.

That is one of the most compelling reasons to release the new variety. Another advantage of TAM 202 is yield. In long-term yield tests, TAM 202 produced from 4 percent to 17 percent more than TAM 101, Chisholm and TAM 109, three popular varieties grown on the Rolling Plains.

Because of its profuse tillering, the planting seed rate can be reduced 15 percent to 20 percent and still produce the same yields.

Disease resistance is another trait. The variety carries a gene for stem rust resistance. And while not immune to powdery mildew, it carries sufficient resistance to thwart all but the most severe epidemics.

Information about TAM 202 planting seed is available through Texas Foundation Seed Service, (409) 845-4051.

Add vanilla and oleo and stir. Add coconut and pour into baked pie shell. Sprinkle meringue with coconut and bake at 350 til golden brown.

Meringue:
3 egg whites; 1/2 t. cream of tartar; 6 T. sugar.

Beat egg whites and cream of tartar til soft peaks form. Add sugar and beat

on Hi until it is no longer grainy and stiff peaks form.

Plain Chocolate Cake

2 c. flour; 1 3/4 c. sugar; 1/2 c. cocoa; 1 tsp. soda; 1/2 tsp. salt; 2 eggs; 1 c. Crisco oil; 1 c. buttermilk; 1 c. boiling water; 1 tsp. vanilla.

Mix ingredients as listed except water and vanilla, then add them and mix well (batter will be thin). Bake in three greased and floured pans. Bake in 350 oven for 20 min. Cool in pans 10 min. then on wire racks until cool.

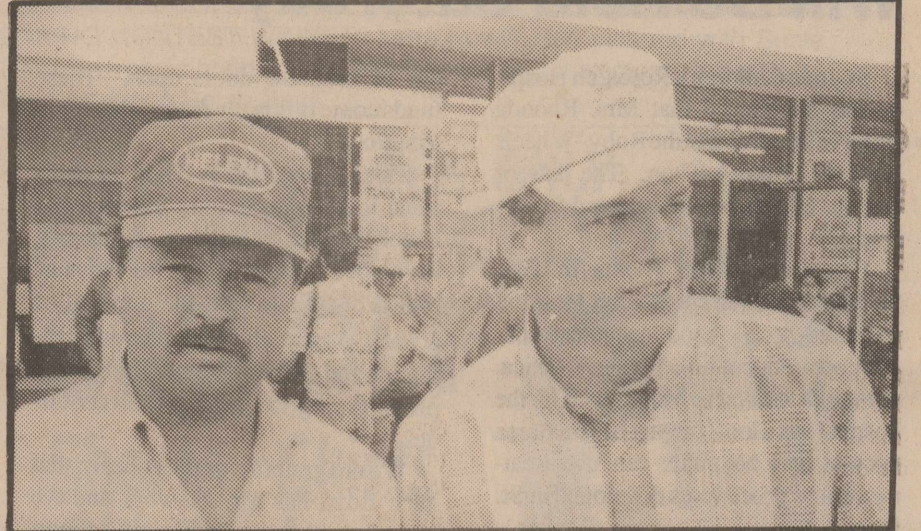
Icing:

ISD and Roby ISD are over 100% market value at the present time, according to Peveler's valuation study of Fisher County for 1990 and 1991 released on May 22, 1992.

Kral Sends Letter

Fisher County Chief Appraiser Teddy Kral attempted a re-evaluation several years ago and abandoned the process. In anticipation that he could get involved in another battle over re-appraisal, Kral sent out the following letter to those attending the meeting clarifying his position.

"This letter is sent as a follow-up to the meeting held in the District Courtroom at the Fisher County Courthouse Friday, May 22, 1992. As chief appraiser of Fisher County, I feel it is necessary to inform you of my position in regard to the meeting.

"The decision to equalize values or to re-value property will not come from me or any of the appraisal district staff. The decision must come from the taxing entities of Fisher County and should be led by the school districts. If a taxing entity desires revaluation then they should declare it in a formal motion to become part of the entity minutes and then send a written statement to the Fisher County Appraisal District Board of Directors stating their request. The board should then formally instruct the chief appraiser and appraisal district staff of the board's decision based on the entity requests.

"If there is to be a successful equalization or revaluation in Fisher County, there must be public endorsement of this action by the taxing entities and the board of directors. Without the full and unwavering support of the taxing entities and the board of directors, any attempt at equalization will be futile.

"The taxing entities must publically share in the responsibility to re-value. I also feel that the taxing entities should help in educating the public of the necessity for equalization or revaluation through public meetings and newspaper ads.

"Whatever is decided by each entity, let the decision be made based on what is right for the taxpayers, not because of fear of reprisal from outside influences.

"Please realize that if the Fisher County Appraisal District is directed to re-value for 1992, there could be some delay in certification, effective rate calculation and tax roll preparation.

"I want it to be perfectly clear that I have no personal stake in whether the revaluation / equalization is done or not. If the staff and I are directed to do it, we will make the attempt, but not without public endorsement by the taxing entities.

"I will neither promote nor prevent revaluation. This time it will be the decision of the taxing entities of Fisher County."
