**Equalization Board Appointed,
Insurance Increase Discussed**

City councilmen discussed the group hospitalization insurance rate increase as proposed in two plans by Bankers Life Company, and appointed the Tax Board of Equalization during their regular session Thursday night.

Present to discuss the rate increase were Hubert Henry of Littlefield and Clyde O'Bar of Lubbock.

The proposed plan would be increased 41 percent for coverage of the employee

only, 45 percent increase for an employee and family or an employee and his or her spouse, and a 44 percent increase for an employee and children.

Total monthly increase would be \$653.35, while the total annual increase would be \$7,840.20.

The calculated annual cost for the present policy is \$17,776.56, compared to \$25,616.76 for the calculated annual cost of the proposed policy.

management of Bull Lake, and members voted to authorize Mayor J. E. Chisholm to sign the papers.

Progress on the new road construction was reported, and councilmen decided that an entrance fee of 50 cents per person and \$1 per boat was a fair fee.

Several possible improvements were discussed, but none were decided.

Thursday and Friday evening rains broke a 50-day run without rain in the Littlefield area.

Not since March 23rd had an appreciable amount of rain fallen, and on that day only .05 fell.

Showers were fairly general Thursday and Friday, and at press time Saturday more precipitation was predicted.

Rain in the immediate Littlefield area totaled from .7 to 1.35 for the two days. Anton was slighted in the Thursday showers but received 1.5 Friday. In the Pep area one inch was recorded north of Pep and over an inch fell to the northwest. Springlake received 1.1 inches, and rain measured an inch or more one mile north of Olton.

Rainfalls of less than an inch fell at most other communities in this area. Whitarral and Hart Camp received traces. Sudan got .1, Lums Chapel got .2, Beck Gin got .4, Earth and Fieldon recorded .5 to .7.

The rains broke a long-standing drought. Until Thursday, this area had received less rainfall for the first quarter of the year than in any time since rainfall records had been kept. Through Thursday, the total rainfall for 1972 was only .25 of an inch.

No rain fell in January; .1 was the total moisture for February, and only .15 came in March.

Soil moisture decreased rapidly during April's hot, windy days, but area farmers say there is still good underground moisture if enough rain is received to make the moisture meet.

Most irrigated farmers say they would be in pretty good shape with about two inches of rain. Dryland producers need three to four inches to plant on.

Sub-soil moisture in this area is the result of last fall's heavy rains which totaled more than six inches. The Littlefield area received 9.13 inches during September, October, November and December.

Pollution Control Submitted

City officials have submitted the Texas Water Quality Municipal Water Pollution Abatement proposal, as

required by the Legislature in Senate Bill 385 passed last year.

Deadline for receipt of the proposals by cities of 5,000 population or more, was May 1. The law affects 230 cities in the state, though only 150 made the May 1 deadline.

The proposal will be reviewed by the TWQB staff in Austin for final approval at a later date.

The legislation requires all cities in the 5,000 or more population bracket to form their own water pollution control and abatement programs, and to be responsible for the surveillance and enhancement of water quality problems within their city limits.

Programs also may extend to a city's extra territorial jurisdiction, though the latter is not a requirement. In addition, the law gives all cities, regardless of size, the right to monitor, inspect and sample possible water pollution discharges, as well as the right to enforce penalties associated with violations, though smaller cities are not required to do so.

The TWQB is charged, by the legislation, with the responsibility of assisting and advising the cities in the implementation of the program. Sam Slaughter, program director for the TWQB, during March and April, met with representatives of the cities

concerned, through the state's 24 Councils of Government to explain the program, and to offer the help of the TWQB.

In essence, the legislation simply requires that water pollution control responsibilities and powers already existing be carried out on a systematic basis, and within a program considered satisfactory by the TWQB technical staff.

Cities are required to make an inventory of all significant waste dischargers; conduct regular monitoring of waste discharges, including inspections and sampling; develop a procedure for obtaining compliance, including legal enforcement if necessary; and to plan pollution abatement from such sources as run-off from streets, parking lots and other urban facilities.

"While, generally speaking, water pollution control still rests with the state agency, it has long been our experience that laws enforced at a local level tend to stay enforced," said Hugh Yantis, TWQB Executive Director.

"There is a matter of civic pride involved, which, in sum, speaks well for our state," he emphasized, adding that "the Water Quality Board stands ready to lend assistance to any cities which need help in setting up their local programs."

HAIL SUPPRESSION

Cloud Seeding Set

A contract with Atmospherics, Inc. has been signed and the hail suppression and rain stimulation program begins here Wednesday, May 10.

Plans call for the program to continue through Nov. 1, but at the present time, Lamb County lacks about \$4,000 having enough money to support the program through harvest time.

Lamb County Better Weather, Inc. officers said they plan to beat the bushes until enough money is collected to carry the program through until the cut-off date.

At the present time enough money has been paid in to allow the program to operate from May 10 until some time after Oct. 10.

Thomas J. Henderson, president of Atmospherics, Inc., the California-based company handling the cloud seeding operations, met with Lamb County Better Weather officers last week. Dale Stanley, Orville Cleavinger, Harvey Messamore and Sandy Sanderson made an agreement with Henderson to have one of the three airplanes on the ground at the Littlefield airport when conditions are favorable for hail-bearing pop-up clouds which would be hard to detect on the radar unit at Plainview.

Stanley said in the past a few little hail clouds had popped up just to the west or south of the target area and had moved into and hail damaged areas in the target area before the clouds could be

picked up on radar.

The plane won't be permanently based in Littlefield, but will be sent here when weather conditions warrant it.

This is Lamb and Hale Counties third year in the pilot hail suppression program. Firing devices mounted on the wings of twin engine airplanes fire silver iodide into hail clouds to turn damaging hail into beneficial rain. Small portions of Floyd and Castro Counties are included, too.

Total cost of the program is \$143,000. Lamb County will pay approximately 43 percent of the total cost.

Although this is the third year for a hail suppression program, this is the first time rain stimulation efforts are included.

Originally, the seeding operations were to cover a five-month period, but 21 days were added to allow for hail coverage through a normal harvesting date.

**Dr. Hinc'kley Walks
For Fun, Fitness**

When Dr. Hubert Hinc'kley advises his patients to walk for exercise, they can go out and do as the doctor does, for this Littlefield physician follows his own advice.

Dr. Hinc'kley walks for "pure enjoyment and relaxation" as well as for the healthful benefits.

"I just enjoy walking," Dr. Hinc'kley said. "I like the scenery, and when I'm walking I do a lot of thinking." He personally prefers walking over bicycling. "And I'd rather walk than golf," he added, "because I get so mad at that ball, playing golf isn't always relaxing."

Dr. Hinc'kley started his walking regime while working with the famous Dr. Coons in the aero-space program. Walking and jogging were included in the astronauts' rigid training.

The Littlefield doctor walks every day, regardless of the weather, but his longest walks are on Saturdays and Sundays. He jogs the first half mile, then walks at a brisk pace.

Time limits him to 45-minute to hour walks during the week. But on weekends he walks to Bull Lake or farther. Dr. Hinc'kley walks west from his home on the Bula Highway, and averaging four miles an hour, he really covers distance in two and a half to three hour walks.

The author of one published book, Dr. Hinc'kley said he often thinks about the book he is writing while he walks. He carries a little note book with him and sometimes jots down fleeting ideas.

He finds some of the scenery around Bull Lake pretty as a picture, and

sketches old barns and windmills on the route he walks.

Passersby frequently stopped to see if they could give Dr. Hinc'kley a lift when he started walking. But now the doctor in his yellow hunting jacket is a familiar sight to those who live or frequently drive west of Littlefield. Occasionally motorists still stop to give him a ride.

"And two or three times I've had patients drive out to ask me about something while I'm walking," Dr. Hinc'kley said.

"I always wear that old jacket. It looks awful. The sleeves are ripped. Oh, it looks terrible. But it has a hood, and its color is a safety feature."

He takes a bottle of water and an orange or some fruit with him on the long walks. Because he is generally walking into the wind, there are times

He's been buffeted by the wind, drenched in sudden rains, and pelted by sleet. Perhaps the elements are one reason his family isn't too enthusiastic about walking. "My little boy was going to walk with me to Bull Lake one day. After about a mile, he turned around and went back home."

Mrs. Hinc'kley chauffeurs for her husband. He tells her how long he plans to walk and she drives out and brings him back, and when he finds something he wants to sketch she drives him back out with his canvas board, pencils and paints.

"Walking is an excellent way to keep healthy—emotionally and physically," he concluded. "The only drawback for me has been an increased appetite. I haven't lost any weight. When I get home, I sure am hungry."

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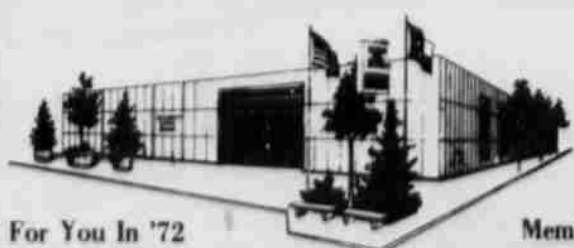
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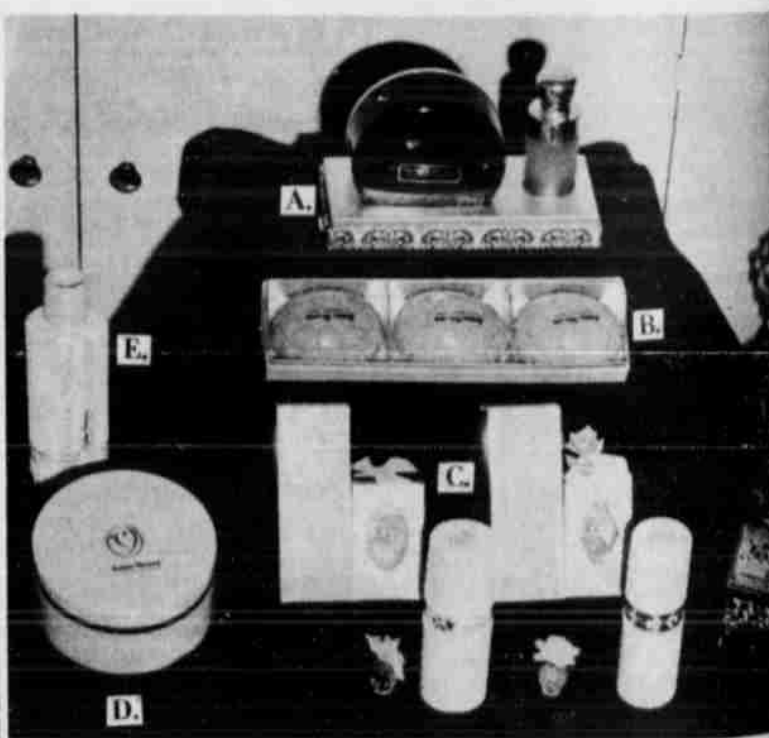
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Beta Sigma Phi Celebrates With Founders Day Banquet

Give Self

THE USUAL SELFISHNESS which is expressed in reluctant giving or no giving is a constant source of loss to the selfish person.

This is the person who cannot, or who will not give of self.

"WE SHOULD GIVE as we would receive; cheerfully, quickly, and without hesitation; for there is no grace in a benefit that sticks to the fingers." — Seneca.

GIVING OF SELF, controlled by the necessary restraint of good judgment,

does not impair the wholesome self-interest. In fact, this giving is a very important part of justified interest in life.

THE GIVING OF SELF made in our service and our work, much more to satisfying service and work than the deeds. The advice given is expressed in the phrase, "Put into what you do."

This is the key that unlocks the treasure house of self-fulfilling and work. This is the guiding helps to make the total living meaningful and profitable.

MANY GOOD PEOPLE in the daily routine of working faithfully meeting their obligations find little or no satisfaction they do.

They do not give of themselves; thus cheat themselves of the satisfaction they could and realize.

DAY AFTER DAY they become more depressed, and discontented with their lot in life. They are unable to understand wrong, and, in time, they become cynical and embittered.

SUCH PERSONS may be heard to say, "I've always done my duty, and understand why I am not happy. I have so little peace of mind." The wise gift of self prevents tragic disappointment.

MORE EFFICIENT WORK, useful service, and more helpful will all become realities when a little bit of self into our work, and our giving.

ASCS Gets Approval Of Grazing, Haying

Richard Newman at the Lamb County ASCS office announced Friday afternoon that Lamb County had been approved for emergency grazing and haying of set-aside acreages, effective May 15th.

Farmers must file application with the ASCS office prior to use of the set-aside acreage, however.

Newman said his office will have details by Monday, the first day applications can be made. The office manager estimated 300 farmers in this county will take advantage of the additional grazing period.

At the present time, the ASCS office here estimates that 180,000 acres will be planted in cotton this year. This is a

5,000-acre increase over 1971. 175,000 acres were planted additional amount is due to transfers in most cases. The County ASCS office handled 25 transfers this year.

Continued dry weather will reduce this figure, however. Participating in the grazing programs have until June 5 to plant because of lack of moisture. Producers who haven't received be approved without planting is received by the June date.

Grain sorghum must be planted June 20 unless lack of rain prevents planting.

Hunters Express Ideas On Quail Jurisdiction

A request for taking the quail hunting season out of the Lamb County commissioners' jurisdiction and putting it back under the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department was made by sportsmen who attended the public hearing in the courthouse Tuesday night.

Seven or eight persons expressed their opinions on the quail season during the hearing. Tape recordings were made

and taken back to Austin. The these comments will be submitted to Parks and Wildlife Commission.

The statewide quail season proposed change would be the nearest Nov. 15 through Jan. 15, nearest Feb. 15, or some 90 or 100 days.

Bag and possession limits were standardized at 12 and 36.

The quail season in Lamb County governed by the commissioners following a legislative act about years ago. If the commissioners refuses the season as set by the Parks and Wildlife, the quail season in Lamb County reverts back to law which allows 45 days from through Jan. 15.

Those present didn't expect themselves much over the short season, but rather wanted the season back under the Wildlife Department.

Because of the late setting of the season here last year, the publications showed three seasons at one time.

In order to get the Lamb County season in the Texas Hunting Guide, Lamb County commissioners will meet Monday.

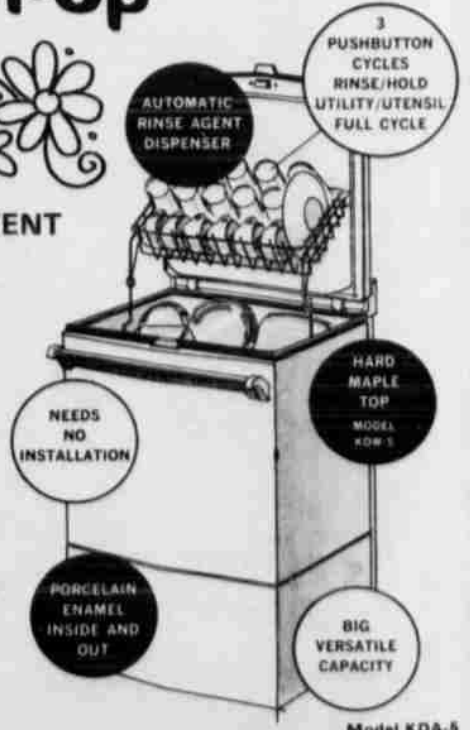

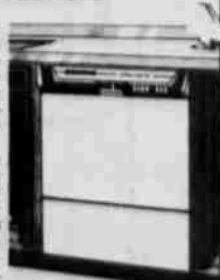

Ray Joe Riley Promotes Cotton

Ray Joe Riley of Springlake, and Dr. John E. Hutchinson, director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A&M University has

been appointed co-chairmen for the state in the Cotton Belt campaign to obtain "better yields of quality cotton for profit and market growth."

The co-chairmen will be involved in an intensive effort in the 14 major cotton-producing states aimed at increasing cotton yields and preserving the inherent quality of the fiber. Profitable production will be emphasized.

"The campaign is particularly important to cotton producers in Texas who produce more than 30 per cent of the nation's cotton," noted Hutchinson. "The effort is also consistent with the '76' program goals and production

guidelines for cotton producers supported by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service."

Need for the campaign is pointed up by a shortage in the supply of cotton, according to officials of the National Cotton Council who announced the appointment of Hutchinson and Riley.

Contributing to the cotton shortage has been unfavorable weather in all but one season since 1965. Yields have declined steadily since then. As a result, the carryover for the 1971-72 season, ending July 31, is projected at 3.25 million bales. This is less than a four-month supply.

2,000 Acres Near Earth To Be 'Buggy'

A 2,000-acre area west of Earth has been selected for a controlled experiment to see whether or not a tiny little imported wasp can control the greenbugs that plague grain producers.

Besides the Earth area, 4,000 acres of grain sorghum in the area south of Lockney will be in the experimental program.

The Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board, working in cooperation with the entomology research division of USDA, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Oklahoma Agricultural Experiment Station will be conducting the beneficial insect release program this summer.

Hopefully this program will prove whether beneficial insects can be used in the control of greenbugs and

similar insects. This will be the first large scale release of beneficial insects on a serious field pest to be conducted in the United States.

The insect to be used is a parasitic wasp commonly called the Braconid. The Braconid wasp is native and mummifies the greenbugs that normally infest fields in mid-August. The wasps will be released in order to inoculate these sorghum fields with a wasp population earlier so that serious buildups of greenbugs cannot occur.

Grown at Oklahoma State University in insectaries, the wasps will be air transported to Lubbock and released into selected fields.

Two releases of 5,000 wasps per acre will be made, the first approximately four weeks after

planting and the second approximately six weeks after planting. The releases will probably be made by hand, although there will be an experimental air release of the adult Braconid wasp.

The wasp attacks the corn leaf aphid or greenbug, lays its

egg on its back, and as the egg hatches, it uses the greenbug as its food source. When it becomes an adult, it flies into the air and begins its hunt for additional greenbugs.

A wasp is about the size of a fruit fly and is not the type that can cause any injury to

humans.

It takes about 14 days to complete the total cycle from the time the adult wasp emerges until it lays its egg and another adult wasp emerges. A wasp lives four to five days. During that time she will lay 200 eggs on as many greenbugs.

Water Table Declines In County

Water depth has declined more than two and one-half inches per irrigation well in Lamb County this past year.

In a test measurement of 73 irrigation wells over the county, the Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) found that in a 10-year period from 1962-1972 water levels declined an average of 2.18 inches.

The decline for 1971-1972 was 2.53.

Areas with the largest available water supply, and consequently the largest pumpage, continue to experience the largest average decline of the water table.

Water declined in the wells up

to 8.03 inches. A well along the Castro County line northeast of Springlake showed the decline of more than eight inches. A well about two and one-half miles north and seven east of Springlake showed a decline of almost seven inches the past year. The decline of the two wells for the previous 10 years was about four inches.

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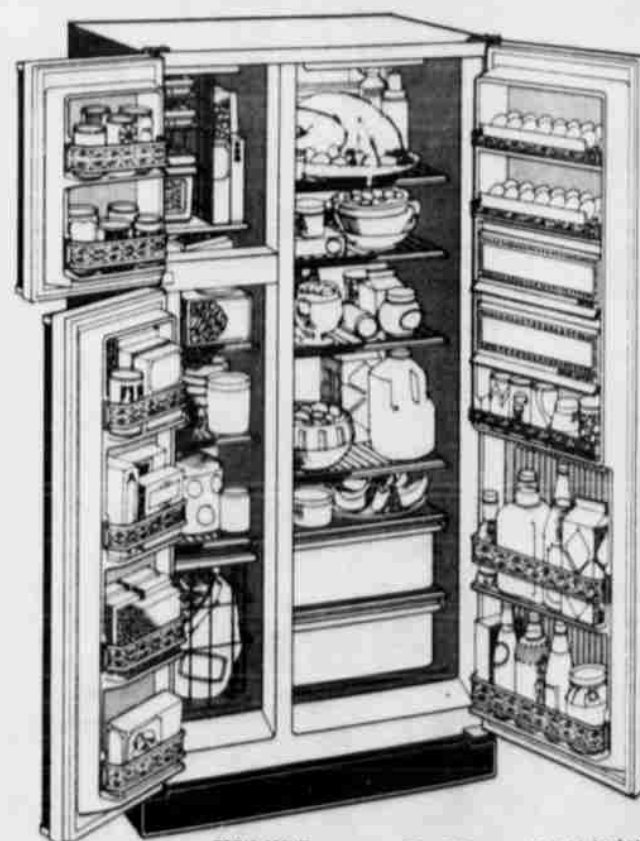

Two Littlefield Students To Enter Trouble Shoot

Students of this area who are looking for trouble will find plenty of it in the annual 1972 Plymouth Trouble Shooting contest, May 9 at Lubbock.

Representing Littlefield High School are Russell Turner and Leonard Reed.

They'll be looking for a pleasant kind of trouble — the kind that can lead to college scholarships, a chance to compete against teams from all 30 states in the National Trouble Shooting Championship at Los Angeles in June, and an inside track on a job.

The trouble will be in brand new cars, a series of malfunctions deliberately planted to test the knowledge the students have gained in classes in auto mechanics. The idea is to trace down the malfunctions using classroom procedures, correct them, and restore the cars to perfect running order.

First team to find and fix all the problems is the winner, provided the team also receives good grades in the written

examination which is part of the contest and which contributes to the final score.

Students here are sponsored jointly by the school and Garland Motor Company to encourage talented auto mechanics students to complete their education and seek careers in the automobile industry.

There are 106 regional contests scheduled throughout the United States this spring.

Regional meet winners receive trips to the National Finals at Los Angeles June 19, 20 and 21 to compete for more than \$125,000 worth of scholarships, prizes, trophies, tools and automobile components which will be given to their schools for auto shop training aids.

This spring, some 165,000 students studying auto mechanics in more than 2,000 schools in 50 states are competing for the right to represent their schools in the regional contests in which they qualify for the National Finals.

School instructors select their own school Trouble Shooting teams on the basis of the skill and knowledge students demonstrate in their class work. Competition is divided into two classes, one for high schools and one for post-high school institutions such as junior colleges and vocational training centers.

Teams consist of two students, who are assigned to a car in which the malfunctions have been deliberately placed. All cars are "bugged" identically.

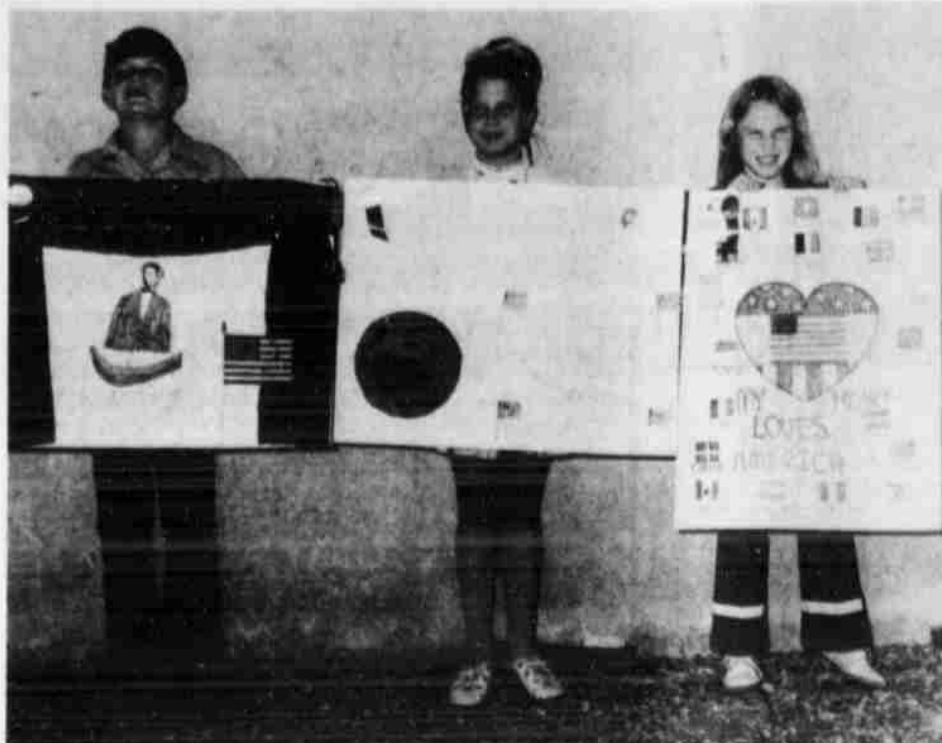
Surveys show that about 65 per cent of the contestants find jobs in the automobile industry.

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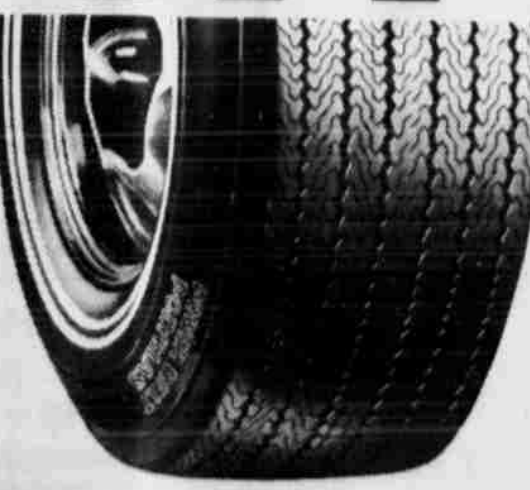
