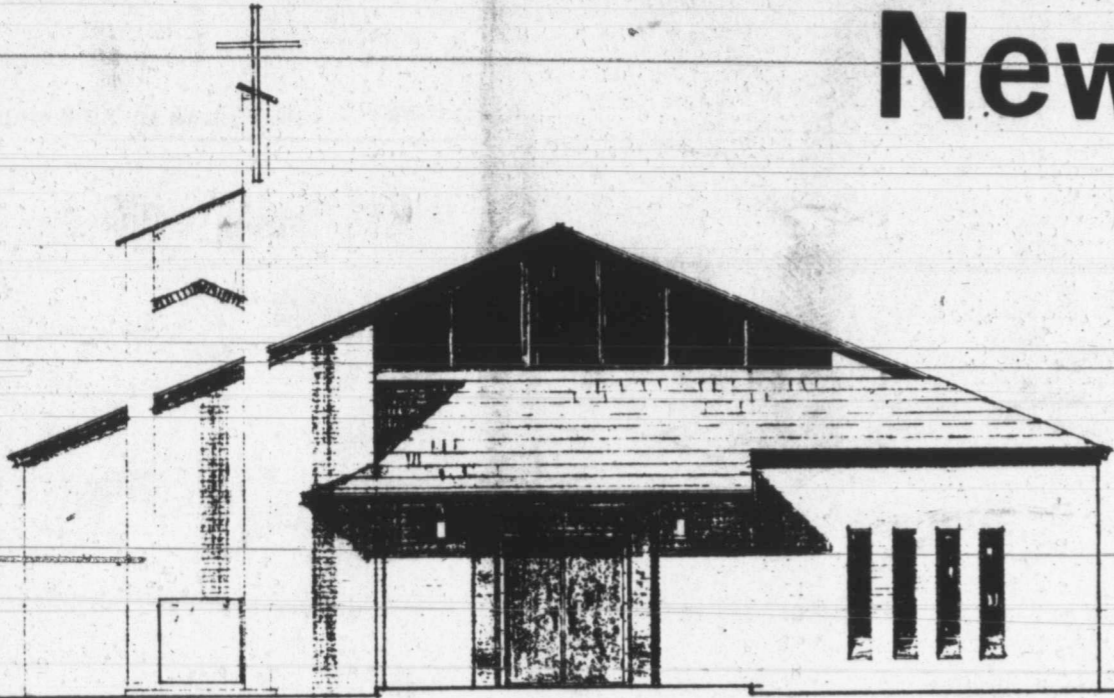

## New St. Anne's Buildings

### Construction Set To Begin Soon

Officials of St. Anne's Catholic Church Saturday announced final plans for a new church building and rectory with construction scheduled to get underway within two weeks.

The building will be located in the 1900 block of Walnut on

**Jim Beal Retiring From Decker & Sons**

H.C. "Jim" Beal, a native of Mitchell County, whose name is synonymous with the Jacob E. Decker & Sons Meat business in Texas is retiring March 3.

Beal is being succeeded by James L. Hunter, previously vice president of Armour Food Company's north central area and manager of the South St. Paul plant.

Beal will leave after nearly 39 years of service with Armour 25 of which were spent building the Decker organization and sales volume to its present dominant position.

Born Dec. 13, 1910 near Colorado City, Texas, on the "White Elephant Ranch" that his grandfather founded, Jim was named Henry Cummings Beal.

"Back in those days there was a popular comic strip called 'Little Jimmy' who was the 'Dennis the Menace' of that time," Jim explained. "When my father told anyone of the new addition to the family, he said 'a little Jimmy' arrived, and I have been known as Jim ever since."

Although he never uses the "Henry Cummings" name, he signs his business correspondence H.C. Beal.

Jim obtained his bachelor's degree in economics from Texas Christian University in 1932 and the next year earned a master's degree. That September he became the principal of the Conaway Rural Junior High School in Mitchell County.

"I found out I did not care for teaching so I decided to run for political office," Jim recalls. At the end of the school term he ran for county superintendent, finishing second in a four-man race. That also finished his political aspirations.

He went to Fort Worth to look for a job and applied at the former Armour Fort Worth plant. He also applied for a job as an organizer with the oil workers union. The next day he was hired as a student salesman by Armour. That night the union offered him a job, but he said he had given his word to join Armour.

"No telling where I would have ended up if the union job came in first," he says. "I was a liberal, politically, back then, but I have since gotten over it."

Jim started with Armour in August 1934, although he did not stay as a "student" very long. By the next month his personnel card shows he was a salesman. He advanced to Oklahoma City plant sales manager, 1942 and was promoted to the former general office in Chicago in 1945.

Two years later Jim was named manager of the Decker-Dallas branch. Armour had acquired Decker in 1936. Jim was named Decker district manager in 1948 covering an area that includes all of Texas and parts of Arkansas, Louisiana and Oklahoma.

At the time the current expansion program for the Garland plant was announced last summer, Jim was promoted to his present position of vice president and district manager, Jacob E. Decker & Sons.

He and Mrs. Beal intend to continue their residence in Dallas but they also plan to do some traveling and Jim says he wants to get out to the ranch for some hunting and fishing.

land sold to the Church by the city of Colorado City. Completion is expected within six months.

Cost of the two buildings has been estimated at \$95,450.

The new church building, modern in design, will have double brick walls with a drop roof over the front doors and tinted glass just above the drop roof and tinted glass panes on the front of the building.

The new building will replace the present 45-year old structure at 1715 Peach. General contractor for the new structure is Virgil Stone.

The new church and rectory will be located on a 3.5 acre lot on Walnut. Walnut is not now paved in that area but the city is expected to have the street paved before the church is completed.

Father Joseph Kennelly, who has been at St. Anne's for slightly more than two years, said future construction will include a parish hall and educational buildings.

The new church has some 3,400 square feet and will seat 333 worshippers. The new rectory building will serve as living quarters for Father Kennelly and his offices. The rectory has some 1,400 square feet.

The Parish Council of the Church have been working along with Father Kennelly for some two years in efforts to get the new building.

The jury went out at 2:06 p.m. Thursday to determine the guilt or innocence of the defendant and again at 5 p.m. to deliberate on his punishment.

He is now being held in county jail pending decision of his requests of appointment of an attorney to make his appeal for a new trial.

She said she went into the bathroom and was grabbed around the neck by a person who took off her clothing, attempted unsuccessfully to get her to

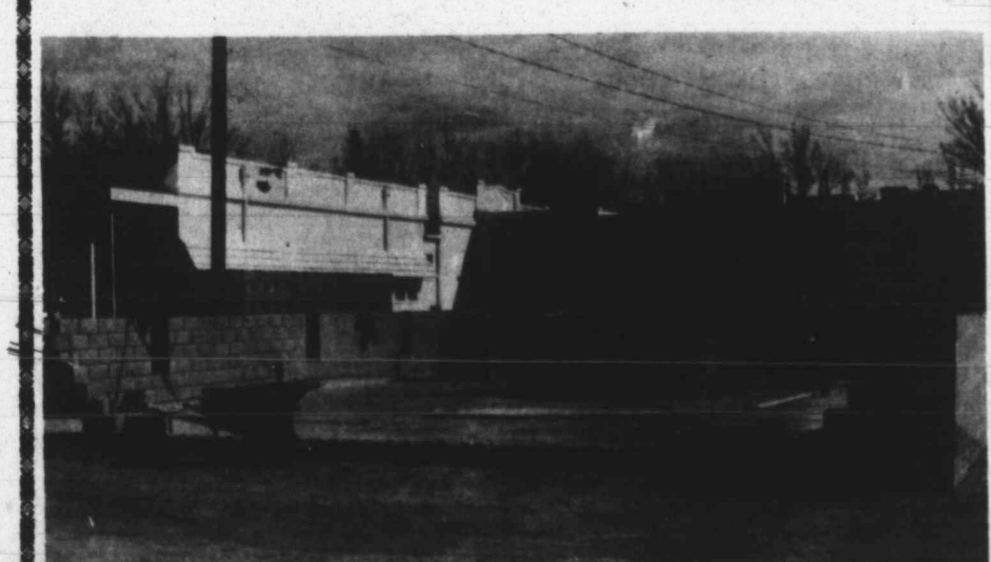
### Womack Easter Seal Chairman

Residents of Mitchell County will receive the annual Easter Seal Appeal letters in the mail beginning March 1. The Easter Seal Appeal, conducted yearly to provide disabled persons and their families treatment and services, will continue through Easter Sunday, April 22.

Womack is one of 223 men and women throughout Texas who are serving in this capacity. The cost of the statewide Easter Seal program is over one million dollars, financed mainly by the Easter Seal Appeal. Almost 90 percent of all funds raised by the Easter Seal Appeal remain in Texas to support the growing needs of the disabled in the state.

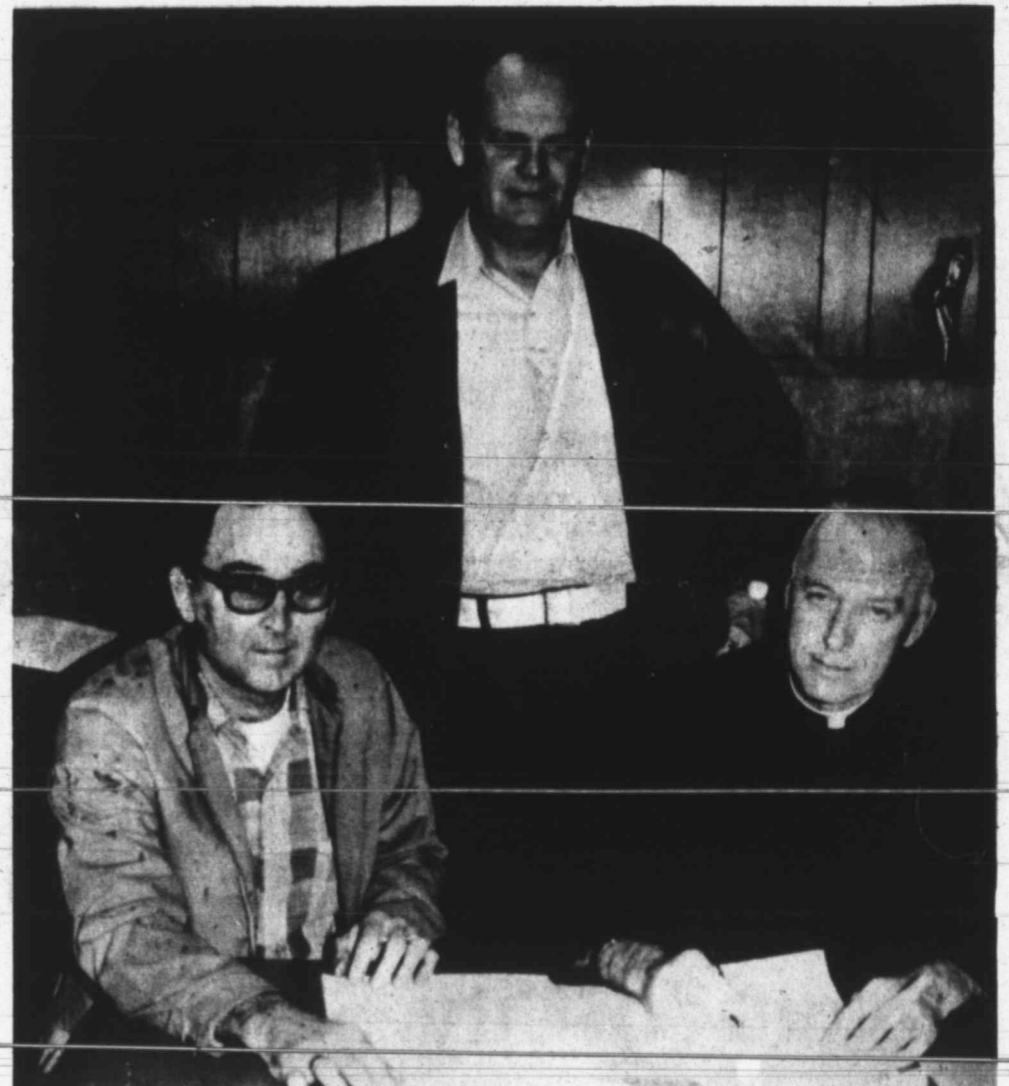

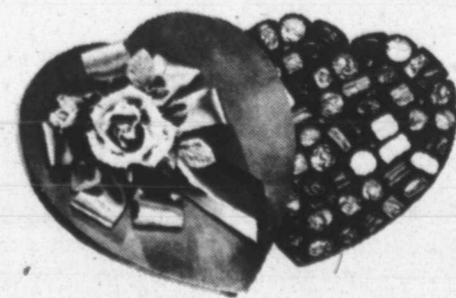
