SHANGHAI, April 15.—The moderates within the Cantonese regime today definitely broke with the communist element that has been controlling the civil government at Hankow.

The break, coming in the midst of a steady drive by the northerners along the Yangtze valley to regain the territory lost to the Cantonese armies in the past few weeks, now presents the possibility of civil war within the south.

With the long threatened split within the ranks of the Cantonese, now a reality, the new alignment of Cantonese leaders overshadowed the reply of Eugene Chen, Cantonese foreign minister at Hankow to the demands of the powers for an apology and reparations for the Nanking disorders of March 24.

Want Commission

Chen's reply, delivered to the congressional general of the United States, Great Britain, France, Japan and Italy last night, suggested the creation of an international commission to settle responsibility for the Nanking outrages, presents a problem of whether Hankow in view of the moderates break with the radicals there, can be considered an authoritatively representing the Cantonese government.

Today's split between the moderates and radicals, was made at a meeting of leading figures of the Kuomintang (Cantonese) political party, at Nanking.

CARROLL NOW IMPROVING

Physicians Say He Should Get Well
In Short Time Judging By
His Condition

GREENVILLE, S. C., April 15. (AP)—After watching their patient emerge periodically from the acute coma which seized him Wednesday, physicians attending Earl Carroll, New York theatrical producer, tonight announced there seemed to be reason why the improvement should not continue steadily.

Carroll will remain in the city hospital as a federal prisoner until his condition warrants his removal. Chief Deputy Marshal John Pinkley said.

Mrs. Carroll, who became ill with bronchitis and died after arriving from New York yesterday, was still confined to bed, but her physician said her temperature was normal and that she was doing satisfactorily.

NITRO CAUSED EXPLOSION

Gas Pressure Forced Charge Up To
Surface Of Oil Well At
Burger Is Found

BORGER, Tex., April 15. (AP)—Investigation of the unusual explosion which caused the death of three men and the injury of three others, at an oil well north of the Canadian river, a short distance from here, revealed Friday that it was the charge of nitro glycerin which exploded first and not the time bomb, drilling experts said.

The time bomb, the duty of which is to detonate the nitro charge, would not be able to cause the explosion in the first place, it was stated. It is now believed that the concussion of the charge of nitro against the derrick after being forced to the surface by gas pressure, caused the fatal explosion.

Taste In Heroes Wide

Stories of true love and other kinds, fantastical adventures, weird tales of horror and sage tomes on scientific and literary work, all are gobbled up by Lubbock's reading populace at the rate of more than 24,000 per week, says Wayne Hutson, local magazine wholesaler.

Lubbock ranks as one of the leading cities in the nation in the number of books and magazines sold here, Mr. Hutson explains. Something in the neighborhood of 8,000 magazines per week are sold through local sources, not counting daily papers.

The work which leads them all in point of sales is a confidential type dealing with love stories, final decisions at reformation, with the usual happy ending thrown in, he stated.

"You never can tell by the appearance of a customer though, what type of magazine they are going to select. As evidence of this a spinster lady, or one who appeared as such, and was dressed in the popular notion of the type with spectacles and all, entered the other day and bought a whole collection of the art papers," Hutson continued.

"Sometimes it is the spindling looking youth, who probably might run it up said 'Boy that reads the tough yarns about the hard boiled hero, while the two-fisted mechanic, and laboring man is apt to pick out a drawing room scene for his choice. Mostly folks like to read about their opposites in print or something they are not too familiar with."

Starting with a \$15 capital two years ago Hutson has built up a trade which embraces not only retail, but wholesale business, embracing 34 magazine agencies.

GILBERT GIVEN FURLOUGH

He was convicted of murder in Liberty county first in 1913 and given the death sentence which later was commuted to life, the proclamation said. In March, 1923, he again was convicted of murder and sentenced to life.

TOWNS INUNDATED

HEAVY RAINFALL ADDS
TO DANGER IN
LOUISIANA

(By The Associated Press)

MEMPHIS, Tenn., April 15.—Through driving rain tonight, levee guards along Arkansas streams and levee engineers in the Hickman, Kentucky, and Memphis districts of the Mississippi river patrolled the great dikes as fought rushing waters as the greatest flood in history moved down the drainage arteries.

Five hundred women and children, carrying their household goods and driving live stock ahead of them, moved out of a new danger south of Hickman. Twelve hundred men were working on the ten miles between miles eight and eighteen, Columbus, Kentucky, was inundated ten to fifteen feet as the water sought its level behind a broken levee. It was feared the Hickman levee could not hold all the water.

Much Land Flooded

Thousands of acres of lowlands in the basin of the Arkansas, White and St. Francis rivers were under water in Arkansas. Hundreds of inhabitants were refugees in more elevated portions of the valleys and other hundreds watched the turbulent tides swirling in or about their homes.

From Cottonwood Point, 110 miles north of Memphis to the south of the White, fifty miles south of Helena, the government levees of the Mississippi were reported in prime condition. But their keepers mustered every man and all machinery available to guard them against the ever increasing weight of water that has been leaping heavily upon them for four weeks.

The Arkansas river reached 54 feet at Fort Smith, the highest stage in 34 years. Motor traffic through the river valleys, where rain has been falling for days, is almost at a standstill, and train service has been interrupted at many points.

"Money will be needed to supply these people with food and clothing and to assist them in rebuilding their town. They were left destitute."

Moody said, in estimating loss at between \$500,000 to \$1,500,000.

BRITISH STATESMAN VISITS IN AMERICA

FORMER PREMIER MACDONALD
PAYS SENTIMENTAL HOMAGE
TRIP TO U. S.

(By The Associated Press)

NEW YORK, April 15.—James Ramsay MacDonald, former labor premier of Great Britain came to the United States on a sentimental journey today and elected to receive his first real welcome from rugged, urbane in the street.

The British statesman could not avert an official welcome, for the mayors reception committee for distinguished guests attended to that, and brought him to the battery on a municipal tug, but when he was free, he drove with his daughter, Isabel, to the Henry Street settlement in the heart of the east side, where the MacDonalds are to be the guests of Miss Lilian D. Wald. The former prime minister stepped entirely the usual economies at city hall, where visiting dignitaries are made formally welcome.

One luncheon is a rarity in the vicinity of the Henry Street settlement house and a first is unknown, so the arrival of Mr. MacDonald, and his daughter was the signal for some well-eyed staring from the children in the street.

Mr. MacDonald made it plain that sentiment and not politics dictated the voyage bringing him here. He sought, he said, the benefits of a stay at sea and ten days in the United States to live again the days of years ago, when he traveled on his honeymoon, the road he is now traveling with his daughter.

Crashes Near Boise, Idaho, While He

BOISE, Idaho, April 15. (AP)—William Sanborn, air mail pilot was killed at 1:20 o'clock this afternoon when his plane fell seven miles north of Kipp Hill. Ranch hands who saw the machine fall said Sanborn was dead in the cockpit when they reached it. They expressed belief that the accident occurred when Sanborn failed in an attempt to buck a heavy head wind.

MEXICO ACTS TO HALT MENACE OF NEW REVOLUTION

REBEL CHIEF KILLED IN
BATTLE AND AIDES
EXECUTED

PROPERTY TAKEN

CHIHUAHUA GOVERNOR

MEXICO CITY, April 15. (AP)—One rebel chief was killed in battle and four of his lieutenants were captured and executed after a fight between federal troops and a rebel band near Cariche in the state of Chihuahua, the war department announced today.

The rebel leader was Francisco Lopez.

REVOLT STARTED

MEXICO CITY, April 15. (AP)—Special dispatches from Chihuahua City state that Governor Almeida and Socorro Garcia, mayor of Chihuahua City have taken the field against the government heading a group of followers and are reported at present in the San Buenaventura mountains.

A group of local congressmen, the dispatches say have notified Military Commandant Zarza that in view of the movement of the governor an extraordinary meeting of the local legislature would be convened to appoint a new governor.

Military forces commanded by Colonel Vega, it is added, have been ordered to pursue Governor Almeida, while measures have been taken to prevent his brother, the mayor of Juarez, from engaging in an uprising.

Many members of the band, which was dispersed, were captured and sent to jail.

The government has confiscated the property of the rebel leader Rodolfo Gallegos. It was announced today, Gallegos led the band which held up and robbed a passenger train between Laredo and Mexico City, March 13.

Officials to Be Ousted

EL PASO, April 15. (AP)—While Juarez military authorities deny that Mayor Socorro Garcia of Chihuahua City is being held at the border city Garrison while reports of revolution are being spread in Southern Chihuahua, it was learned today that Gov. J. A. Almeida of the state of Chihuahua and his brother, A. B. Almeida, mayor of Juarez, are to be ousted from office within 24 hours, the El Paso Times will say Saturday.

Although Mayor Almeida could not be located in Juarez, political leaders here said he was being sought.

M. H. Duncan, superintendent of schools, made a short talk and a duet was sung by Miss Margaret Mitchell and Frances Stahl.

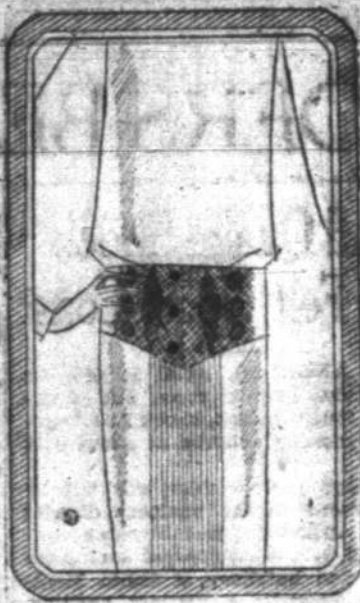

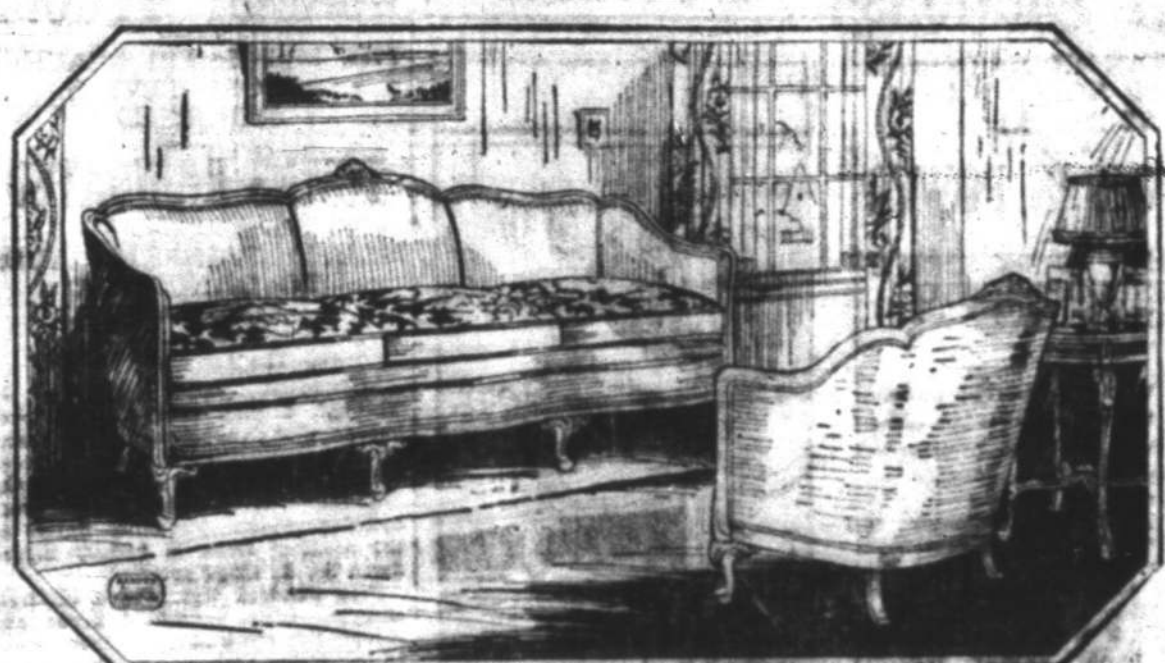
Frozen Maple Custard

One quart milk, 2 tablespoons cornstarch, 2 eggs, 1½ cups maple syrup, ½ cup seeded raisins, ½ cup chopped English walnuts, few grains salt. Heat milk and add cornstarch moistened with a little cold water. Stir until mixture boils and add salt. Add eggs, well beaten and cook, stirring constantly, about three minutes. Remove from fire and stir in 1 cup maple syrup. Turn into freezer and freeze until mushy. Cook raisins in remaining syrup until soft. Add nuts to syrup and raisins and add this mixture to half-frozen cream. Mix thoroughly and let stand until firm. One hour must be allowed for freezing after raisins and nuts are added. The custard can be packed in ice and salt and frozen without stirring for the entire period of freezing or it can be stirred for the first half and packed for the last half of the time.

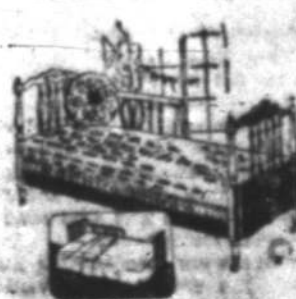

Germany Gets Term Of 5 Years In Pen

Notice of appeal from the conviction had not been served yesterday afternoon but counsel said an appeal will be taken.

The jury received the case at 5:18 p. m. Thursday and announced ready to report a verdict about 8:30 Friday morning after approximately five hours actual deliberations. The report was brought into court before Judge Clark M. Mullican at 9:13 a. m. Friday, and read by the judge.

Mr. Germany took the verdict calmly with no trace of emotion. He maintained the same cool demeanor while the sentence was read that has marked him throughout the trial which began Monday morning.

He was charged with misapplication of \$1,783.38 claimed to have been converted to his own use on May 18, 1925. Five other similar charges are now pending, involving amounts varying from \$623 to \$6,355.77. State attorneys have not indicated whether these cases will be called to trial at once.

Negro Is Returned To Crosbyton Jail

Sentenced to fifty years imprisonment in connection with charges growing out of the murder of B. E. (Bob) Morgan, prominent Dickens county farmer, last February, Son Gibson was here Friday in the custody of Elmer Reed, Crosby county officer, enroute to jail in Crosby county from Plainview where he is to be held pending outcome of an appeal that has been filed in the case.

An appeal has also been filed in the conviction and death sentence of Robert Lee Benton, alias Robert Stanley, another negro who was found guilty by a jury of Morgan's death, according to Mr. Reed. Benton is now held in the Hale county jail at Plainview. Formal sentence has not been passed on either of the negroes pending outcome of their appeal.

IS THE WORLD FACING NEW CONDITIONS?
WE THINK SO

There is no question in our mind that the world is facing many new conditions. This is brought about by the fact that America has shown to the older worlds how to use the modern weapons of war and defense, and it has given them a new vision, and of course this creates new conditions. Through many centuries the white races of the world have felt called upon to dominate all other races, apparently forgetting that, so far as man can learn the Almighty has given no pre-ordained command for the white races to rule all other races. Of the world's population, only about one-fourth is white. Possibly somewhat less of the world's population even professes any belief in Christianity. Three-fourths of this population is composed of the so-called yellow, or colored, races—those of China, Japan, India and Africa.

Until the Russian-Japanese War, when Japan so badly defeated Russia, these Oriental, or colored, races seemed to have been laboring under the impression that the white race was superior by virtue of its powers to fight. The defeat of Russia changed that thought and stirred within the races of Asia a realization of their own inherent power. Then came the World War, in which these colored races were again given an opportunity of realizing that they could use modern munitions of war just as well as the white races and that they had the inventive skill and the mechanical ability to fight with power equal to that of the white races. They knew only too well that their own physical endurance was greater than that of the white races, and that they could live on a pittance as compared with what the armies of the white race needed.

For years the Oriental races have been sending their young men to America and to Europe to be educated. Here they have caught a vision of the power of independence, in thought and action. They have learned something of our ways, whether good or bad. They have learned the power of chemistry, the power of modern methods of warfare. In some cases they have learned the power of the Gospel of Christ, but in many cases they have learned the evils in the life of America, and of Europe. This country has been like a great university to which thousands of the people from other countries have for years been flocking and learning good or evil, according to the influences under which they came while in America. They have gone back to their countries carrying with them the knowledge gained here. They resent being regarded as inferiors. They hold that the Orientals are at least the equal of the white race, and doubtless many of them think that they are far superior. They are no longer willing to be subjected to the rule of the white race—not always a wise rule. Coincident with this situation has come the tremendous power of the bolshevistic agitation going out of Russia into Asia and proclaiming Sovietism as the salvation of the world and especially of the down-trodden classes. Here and there throughout Asia the missionaries of the Gospel have been doing splendid work, but the very work that they have been doing has often helped to break down the castes which separated the peoples of Asiatic countries, the one class from the other. We have often disregarded the rights of these Oriental people, and Europe has been more guilty in this respect than America. We see now the seething caldron in China, with its 450,000,000 people, and no man on earth is wise enough to say what is to be the outcome. We do know that there has been developed a bitter hatred against the white race, and that China is crying "China for the Chinese," and seeking to drive out all foreigners, except the bolshevistic leaders of Russia—and to a large extent Russia is an Asiatic country. With the undying hatred among the Bolshevists of Russia against Europe and America, with the vast propaganda that has been carried on in Asia by the Soviets, a condition has been created fraught with more tremendous power for good or for evil—but apparently at least nine chances out of ten for evil—than the world has ever known. We are living in a period entirely unlike anything else in human history; for through all human history China, with its teeming hundreds of millions, has been quiescent so far as the outside world is concerned.

Within the last half-century Japan has come to the front as one of the great Powers of the earth, with scientific attainments the marvel of the age. The Chinese hold themselves as superior to the Japanese. They may perchance within the next quarter of a century accomplish more than Japan has done in the last half-century. India is held together under British control mainly because of the castes in that country, which make it impossible for the people as a whole to unite in any scheme for national success against British domination. How long that situation can last it is impossible to say. The Mohammedan world, with about 300,000,000 people, taught through the centuries that they are to conquer the world by the sword, and taught that death upon the battlefield will bring them instant admission to Heaven, with all of the visionary charms with which they picture the heavenly land, is ready at any moment to take advantage of any weakness in preparedness to meet such an issue on the part of Europe and America. Never before since the white race reached its ascendancy was there any thought on the part of the colored races that they were the equal in fighting power of the white race. Now that they have learned that they are the equal, and perhaps the superior, they have been stirred to a depth of feeling which no plummet line can measure. Deep down in the heart of these hundreds of millions of Chinese and East Indians and Mohammedans there is a growing sentiment against control or domination of the world by the white races. These people do not believe in Christianity, they are not controlled by its teachings and, therefore, the white race cannot appeal to any sense of Christianity in seeking to win the favor of these other races.

A few years ago one of the foremost business men of the South who had just then made a trip to Europe and was on his return trip made the statement that he had always been a great advocate for foreign mission work, and still believed in it to a very great extent, but also said that he was very greatly disappointed in some respects. He had expected to talk the Gospel in many places in the Orient, and was appalled by the enormous mass of the population in all the cities of Asia which he visited, and equally appalled by the small impression missionary work had made among these people as compared to their numbers. Here and there he found a good missionary field and much success, but speaking in the large he expressed his amazement, his inability to comprehend the seemingly endless number of people in the Orient who had never heard of the Gospel and knew nothing of its power. Any intelligent man who visits the East and studies it as this man did must come back with the same impression. But instead of being discouraged by this situation, it is all the more incumbent upon the Christian people of America and Europe to carry on their missionary work with greater zeal and liberality than ever before. In the meantime, we stand today facing a world situation which may well demand and command the attention of every thoughtful man and woman in Europe and America.

THE THREE RULERS OF THE SEA

The declaration of France to take any part in the new conference for the reduction of naval armaments may have the effect to promote American, British and Japanese harmony by throwing them together as the combined super-sea powers of the world, but the French refusal is regrettable for many reasons. The direct result must be that nobody will disarm, and the conference will be turned into a sort of heart-to-heart talk on the part of the three rulers of the Seven Seas.

The French government emphasizes the fact that France is already engaged in armament limitation under the League of Nations. That is as much as to say that there will be no effective limitation by France's aid. But from whence did the limitation already in practice proceed? From Geneva, or from Washington?

When England speaks, something is said on this subject of sea power, and England seems disposed to speak just now through the three-Power conference rather than through the League. France still has her eye upon civil or mercantile resources in relation to naval strength; and this is a subject which Great Britain, the United States and Japan are all inclined to "soft pedal." The prompt and enthusiastic Japanese adhesion to the Coolidge proposition is avowedly based on the knowledge that such a question as naval disarmament can never be settled without American participation, and that if America is not in the League and does not propose to enter the League the question may as well be considered outside of it. The Japanese naval authorities have declared the present auxiliary ships to be the minimum requisite for the national defense, and have announced that Japan cannot reduce her auxiliary ship force, no matter what international agreement may be made. The Powers as a whole are up against a "minimum."

We may infer, therefore, that nothing practical in the way of actual disarmament is likely to result from the three-Power conference. When held, its results are likely to be purely moral, as exhibiting the willingness of the Government of the United States not only to do everything in the way of limitation that Britain and Japan are willing to do, but to set an example of any reduction that is possible within the limits of national safety.

TEXAS TO THE FRONT

Texas leads this year in highway building in the United States. The amount of the Federal allotment for this state indicates when compared with the allotments to other states, Texas this year will receive more than \$1,000,000 as the Federal Government's share of the cost of building good roads in this state.

Of course it can be argued that Texas is by far the largest state in the Union, and that the allotment might well be larger as compared with that to be granted to other states. But it must be remembered that the Lone Star State in the past has been far behind other states in highway building, and the fact that the people of Texas now are taking an interest in the construction of good roads systems throughout the state is one well worthy of mention and favorable comment.

The Federal road aid only matches dollar-for-dollar the money expended by the state government. The Federal Government contributes on a fifty-fifty basis with the state, and the fact that the Federal contribution this year is larger in the state than in any other in the Union indicates that Texas itself is expending more money in the construction of good roads within its boundaries than in any other state in the Nation. This fact has not always been a fact in Texas.

Texas are taking an interest in road construction. They are realizing the value of road building, and with the coming program continuing as it has in the past, Texas should enjoy a large amount of tourist trade. Texas has been avoided by tourists in the past because of the poor condition of the roads in the state. Good roads have been only lately, but now the system of good roads highways which link one section of the state with other states throughout the country, are meeting with public favor.

But Texans will reap a greater benefit than that offered in the form of tourist trade. Good roads offer the residents of Texas an opportunity to extend their market radius because they can go farther to obtain the things they want. They offer the farmer a greater opportunity to dispose of his products, and for that reason is of service to the citizens of Texas. Good roads which furnish a means of rapid transportation are a necessity to this large state, and Texas as it is to be congratulated on the efforts of the people in every section to supply this necessity.—Vernon Record.

Dr. Flexner Tells Why the Span of Human Life Increases

Twelve years have been added to the span of human life during the past thirty years as a result of the employment of animals for the study of the physiology and pathology of man, according to Dr. Simon Flexner, Chairman of the Public Health Council of the New York State Department of Health and Director of the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research.

These statements were made in a health talk on "Medical Science and Experimental Investigation," recently.

"It was not so very long ago," said Dr. Flexner, "that a large part of medical practice consisted in putting drugs of which the doctors knew little into the human body, of which they knew less. A vast change has come over the practice of medicine within little more than half a century, and this change is directly dependent upon the fuller knowledge of man and his diseases, and ways in which the latter can be alleviated and prevented, derived from the study of animals, as from that branch of experimental science which is spoken of as animal experimentation."

The substitution of systematic experiments on animals for haphazard tests made on man has brought order and new knowledge into drug therapy, such as the employment of digitalis in heart disease, quinine in malaria, ergot in hemorrhage, the use of safe drugs to induce sleep in place of the more dangerous opiates, potent and safe antiseptics in the treatment of African sleeping sickness and many other diseases. The studies made upon animals have revealed the manner in which recovery, through immunization, takes place in the infectious diseases, and they have taught us how blood transfusion, often a life-saving device, may be safely carried out.

Progress From Animal Tests
"It is inconceivable that the advances made in the understanding of the essential nature of disease and of the logical means of its prevention and cure, could have come from the mere observation of sick human beings, and the haphazard dosing of them with indefinite drugs. We owe the great progress of the past thirty years, which has added about twelve years to the expectation of life to the employment of animals for the investigations of the physiology and pathology of man. And when it is taken into account that the number of animals employed for this purpose is relatively very small, that any experiment which may give pain is performed under anesthesia, that painful surgical operations on man are performed under anesthesia, and that a discovery made in any part of the world is at once freely communicated and may be applied far and wide, it becomes apparent how great is the sparing of human suffering, how profound the addition made to human happiness, and how small the sacrifice."

Regulation of motor bus lines is put in the hands of the Texas railroad commission as it should be. The motor bus is a public carrier, and the interests of the public should be properly safeguarded, and this bill is a step in that direction.

Well financed, able bus operating companies and individuals will benefit by the bill and will be enabled to improve and better their service. The truck and other will find it difficult to compete.—Mainview Herald.

Rumors of Revolt

Unconfirmed rumors have been received here to the effect that General Mariano Carrasco, chief of the federal forces in southern Chihuahua, has rebelled against the Mexican government.

General Roman Lopez, commanding officer of the Juarez Garrison, who is under Carrasco's command, left Juarez for the "south" Thursday night, military officials admitted tonight. Meanwhile, Major Jose Florescano, second in command of the Juarez Garrison, continues to deny reported rebel activities in southern Chihuahua and the arrest of Major Garcia. Major Florescano, however, said he understood Major Garcia had left Chihuahua city Thursday night by automobile. The automobile with Major Garcia's driver was seized on arrival in Juarez tonight. Major Garcia having left his car and boarded the train outside of Chihuahua city. It was learned, being arrested on arrival of the train in Juarez.

Tells Next Governor

Manuel Mascareñas, Juarez collector of customs, is said to be about to take over the reins of the Chihuahua state government, when Governor Alameda is ousted. General Carrasco is reported as having planned to be a candidate for governor of Chihuahua at next election.

It is said that General Carrasco is disappointed over the proposed ousting of Governor Alameda and reported appointments of Mascareñas. This was the reason, it is said for reports of a revolt of federal troops commanded by General Carrasco in southern Chihuahua.

EL PASO, April 15 (AP)—Despite threats by state officers at the Juarez Garrison it was almost tonight that Governor Alameda, congressman for the Juarez district, was jailed here today by military authorities.

Both Alameda and Mayor Socorro Garcia of Chihuahua City, with several Juarez politicians, were reported as being held prisoners by the Juarez military authorities.

Late tonight Mayor Alberto R. Alameda of Juarez could not be located, and it was reported that he was in hiding.

When the international bridge closed at 5 o'clock tonight, large numbers of heavily armed groups were stationed at the bridge heads.

Kung, called by the moderate leader General Chiang Kai-Shek, Cantonese governorship and came with dramatic boldness. Resolutions of punishment against almost a score of radical leaders of the Cantonese government at Hankow were adopted almost immediately.

New Government

Word of the impeachment resolutions, received through Sun Tai-Chi, Cantonese commissioner for foreign affairs at Shanghai, indicated that General Chiang and his supporters would establish a new government at Nanking.

The resolutions demanded that certain radical leaders be arrested as "disturbers of the public order in China." Among those mentioned by name were Michael Borodin, the Russian who has been acting as adviser to the Cantonese government; George Liu Chien, minister of justice; Chen Tu-Hsiu, leader of the Chinese communist party; Tung Ping-Shan, minister of agriculture; Ten Yeng-Ta, notorious agitator and fifteen others less known.

Foreign Minister Chen, was not mentioned in the resolutions. Speakers at the conference asserting that he was not actually communist, but was merely a tool used by Borodin and the other radical leaders.

Want Radicals Out

The quickness with which the impeachment resolutions were adopted caused surprise because it had been expected that there were plans to delay the meeting to await the arrival of more delegates from Hankow.

The conference, however, was said to have been attended by a majority of the central committee of the Kuomintang. Chinese sources also declared that a considerable delegation had arrived from Hankow.

No Official Comment

WASHINGTON, April 15 (AP)—While Washington officials appeared favorably impressed today by the unexpectedly conciliatory tone of the report from Hankow to the American demands growing out of the Nanking outrages, comments as to whether it would prove acceptable was withheld both at the White House and state department.

The sudden turn of events in China, both political and military, also disclosed by the day's dispatches, may influence materially the ultimate outcome as to fixing responsibility and obtaining reparation for the Nanking

Just below Hornersville, Mo., in northeastern Arkansas, the west side of Big Lake levee on the St. Francis collapsed. "Stages much above the flood stage are indicated in the St. Francis," was the laconic forecast of the weather bureau here.

More than an inch of rain fell here today and precipitation continued steadily early tonight.

Big Rise Feared

Farther upstream on the Mississippi the residents were alarmed over the prospect of 55.6 to 56 feet at Cairo, Illinois. Business at Hickman was virtually at a standstill and many stores have closed and removed their stocks. A call for three hundred additional workers for service on the Redfoot levee was sent from Hickman today. The crest is expected Sunday or Monday, and much sand bagging will be necessary if the waters are to be kept within the levees.

6-Inch Rainfall

NEW ORLEANS, April 15 (AP)—A five-inch rain drenched New Orleans and the lower Mississippi valley late today, adding to the high water hazard by soaking levees and slowing up the work of raising the river barriers.

The rains, which began shortly before noon, swept down with increasing fury at nightfall and two hours later scores of streets in the upper half of the crescent bend made by the river were flooded with water from two to ten inches deep.

Street car service was curtailed and hundreds of automobiles were left stranded in uptown streets as their motors were drowned out by the waters. At 8 o'clock the weather bureau reported a five-inch rainfall and although the downpour had slackened, it continued with diminished force.

Rock Springs Will Undergo Vaccination

ROCK SPRINGS, April 15 (AP)—Inoculation with typhoid anti-toxin was prescribed today for every resident and relief worker assisting in the rehabilitation of Rock Springs. All of the debris of Tuesday's fatal tornado was cleared away from the main streets and the town was ready tonight to begin rebuilding operations as fast as the money and material is available.

Fear that the water might be contaminated led health officers to appeal to the state health department for typhoid anti-toxin and 300 doses were sent by express immediately.

All of the dead animals found in the debris and the scores of horses, cows, chickens and others killed in the open were cremated this afternoon. No changes were made in the death list today, no additional bodies being found and no deaths reported from any of the many hospitals housing the injured survivors. As far as can be ascertained the death list, including all of those died in hospitals and ambulances, stands at 67. This does not include Mrs. Stedman and her son who were killed when the community of East Prong, 25 miles southeast of here, was destroyed Tuesday night.

Red Cross Aid

WASHINGTON, April 15 (AP)—Twenty deaths in the Rock Springs tornado were reported today to American Red Cross headquarters here. One hundred and sixty houses were destroyed or seriously damaged, the report said, while 200 families were being cared for by relief workers in the area.

Crime Wave A Myth Social Worker Says

DEB MOINES, Iowa, April 15. (P)—Crime wave? There isn't any, declares John A. Lapp of Chicago.

It is his business to know, for as president of the National Conference on Social Work he has in his fingertips extensive data on crime and its treatment.

The fact is, he says, that fewer people are in jails, prisons and reformatories in proportion to the nation's population than there were ten years ago.

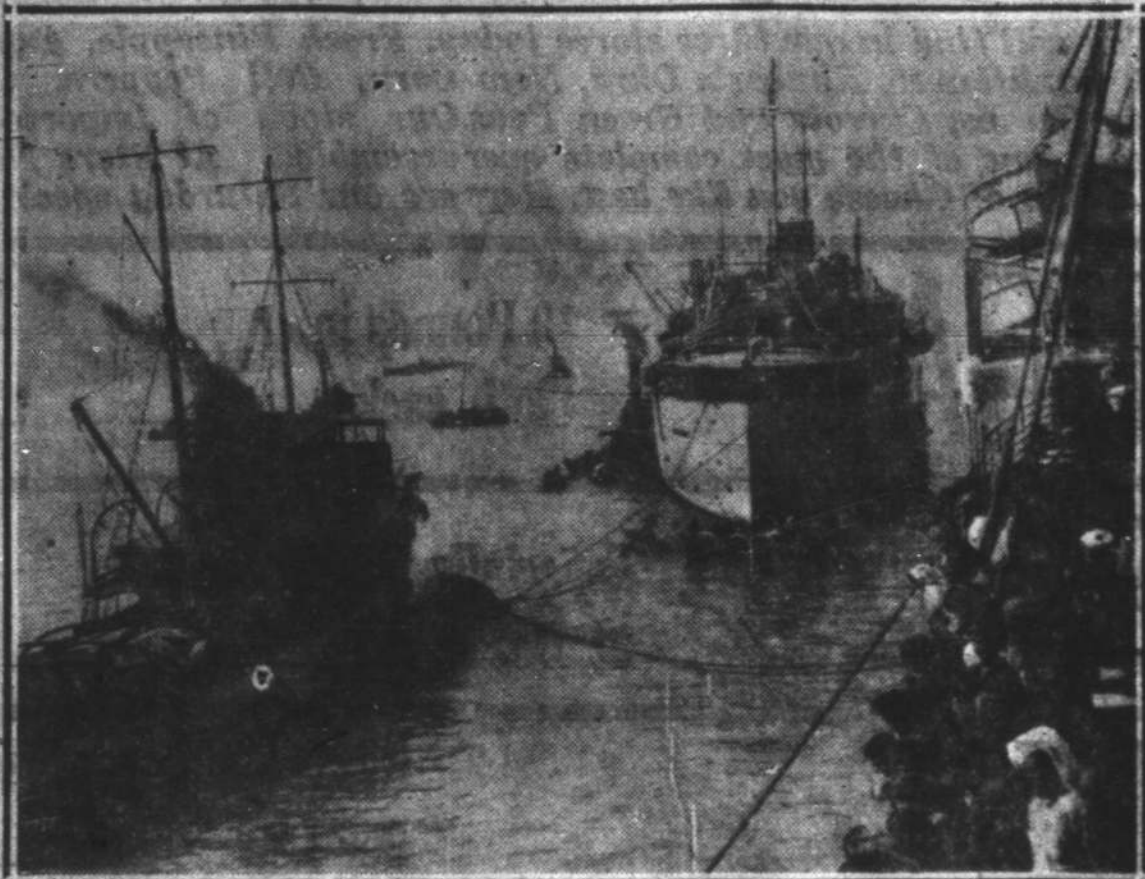
When the social workers meet in Des Moines May 12 to 18 they will spend no time, Lapp asserts, debating such myths as the crime wave. They will discuss the very certain progress in handling criminals and will plan methods of holding their hard-won reforms.

"A popular hysteria about crime gives rise to the idea that there is a crime wave which must be checked by drastic methods," says Lapp. "But crime in its totality has decreased in ratio to population."

"It is like the creation of a 'suicide wave'—one or two spectacular suicides are played up to give an outward evidence of an epidemic which is false."

Seats On Exchange Are In Name Only

NEW YORK, April 15. (P)—That antique piece of Wall Street furniture commonly called a "seat" on the stock exchange is a sad misnomer to the wary broker.

It really is nothing more than a "post" or, series of them in the floor where 1,100 brokers may deal in stocks and bonds.

Seats on the exchange are, but a name only. Their owners may buy and sell stocks and bonds at the post, just as the proprietors of the present mart first did in 1792 when that little band of 24 brokers dodged raindrops under a buttonwood tree in Wall Street and bought and sold continental securities. For 25 years exchange members stood out in the open, then came indoors, where for the first time they actually occupied chairs.

Fifty years and the comfortable trading "seats" disappeared because of the press of business and "posts" took their place. The few leather settees now at the base of each post are but mockeries to the four hundred active brokers who for five hours daily endure the unceasing grind of running from post to post executing orders. Active floor men cover on an average of ten miles a day, and seldom have

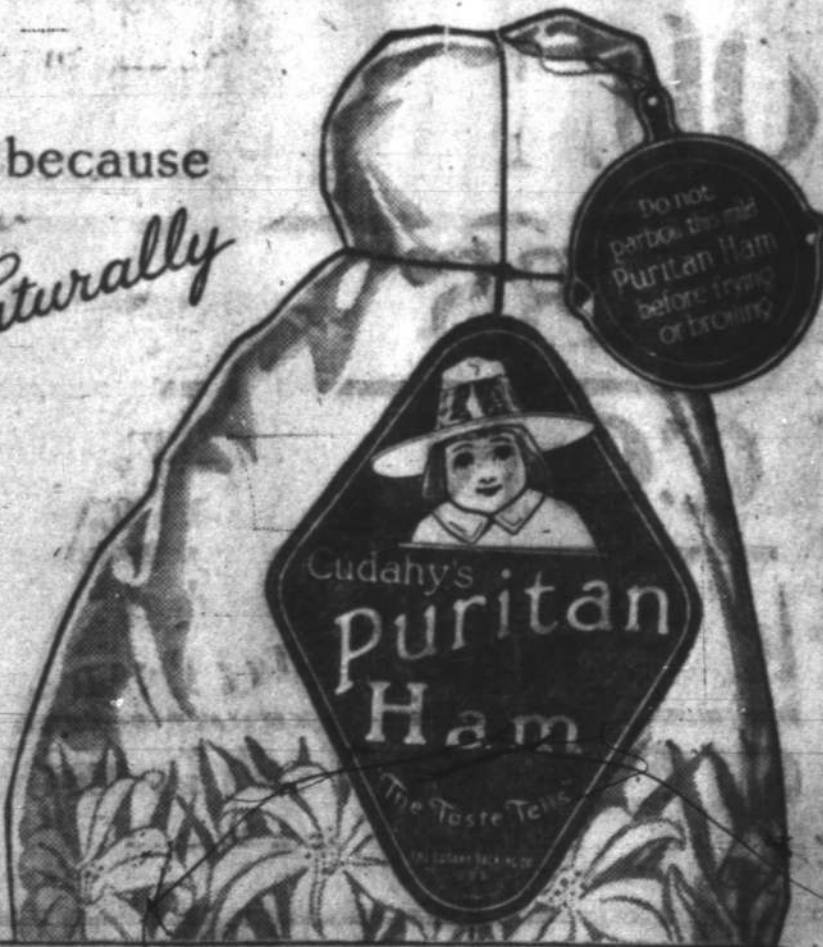

New Quinine Discovered Is Claimed To Kill Germs and Check Fevers Quickly

ELBERFELD, Germany, April 15. (AP)—Continued experiments with plasmoquine, the new synthetic quinine "without the bitter taste" have shown that as a specific for malaria fever it ranks next to insulin as one of the great weapons discovered.

Four comparatively unknown chemists, one only 28 years old, developed the complicated compound.

In more than 500 cases of malaria of every known form and from all parts of the world, plasmoquine has proved virtually 100 per cent effective. The Institute for Tropical Diseases at Hamburg reports. Plasmoquine killed the parasite bacteria in the blood which cause the disease within from two to seven days. It checked the fever within 24 hours, and eliminated the detrimental effects of quinine, especially in persons suffering from diseases of the heart. It is believed that the remedy also will eliminate recurring attacks of the fever.

Plasmoquine, an alkaloid with a chemical composition substantially that of quinine, was produced by Dr. William Röhl, 45, of Berlin, Dr. Werner Scheuermann, 38, of Nelsse, Dr. Fritz Schenck, 35, of Speyer, and Dr. August Winkler, 28, of Constance. Five years of intermittent work developed a compound, absolutely tasteless, which can be taken internally in tablet form even by infants afflicted with the disease.

Latin Studes Make Carvings In Soap

AUSTIN, April 15.—Their study of Latin will have a new and personal influence for the students of the Sam Houston Junior high school of Houston who have carved and molded in soap figures of Roman history, the Roman gods and their temples which have been on display at the University of Texas, according to Miss Roberta Lavender, adjunct professor of classical languages in that institution. Contract For Hotel At Big Spring Let

BIG SPRING, April 15.—The letting of the contract for the Crawford Hotel in Big Spring on Tuesday, April 12, was attended by thirty-two bidders. There was little spread in the bids. Frost & Frost, architects of El Paso drew the plans that were accepted by both Mr. Crawford and the hotel committee of the Big Spring chamber of commerce.

When Ramey Bros. of El Paso secured the contract for the construction of the Crawford Hotel a private contract was signed with A. J. Crawford guaranteeing to complete the building by September 15, 1927 on pay a forfeit of \$100 per day until building is completed. Mr. Crawford agrees to pay a bonus of \$100 per day if building is completed prior to September 15.

The bids accepted were \$128,524 for general construction, \$18,958 for plumbing, contract let to Cullyford Plumbing and Heating company, of Denver. The heating was bid in by W. F. Lucas of El Paso at \$4,756.38. The excavation is about complete and is being done by the Thorp Contracting company, of Big Spring. The pouring of concrete will begin within two days and two shifts of workmen will be used in the construction.

The outside dimensions will be 70 by 140 feet and on first floor will be lobby, coffee shop, offices, store rooms, beauty parlor, chamber of commerce office and drug store.

The building will be constructed at corner of Seamy and West Second and face south.

Professor Incites Battle Of Insects

SEATTLE, April 15. (AP)—Important to humans, although almost unnoticed by the general public, a war of extermination between mortal enemies in the insect world has been going on in the Pacific Northwest for four years and the end is not yet in sight.

The warfare was instigated by Prof. Trevor Klenz, professor of biology at the University of Washington in an attempt to control a serious infestation known as the earwig, a species of harmful insect, by importing parasitical tachinade flies from Europe. The tachinade flies are natural enemies of the earwig. Both came from Europe originally.

When poison bait and other weapons failed to check the encroachments of the earwig, the flies were pitted against them, first in a laboratory arena where the earwig was victorious, and then in the fields at large. An omnivorous eater of all growing things, the earwig also ensconces itself snugly in clothing or shipments of goods and does considerable damage.

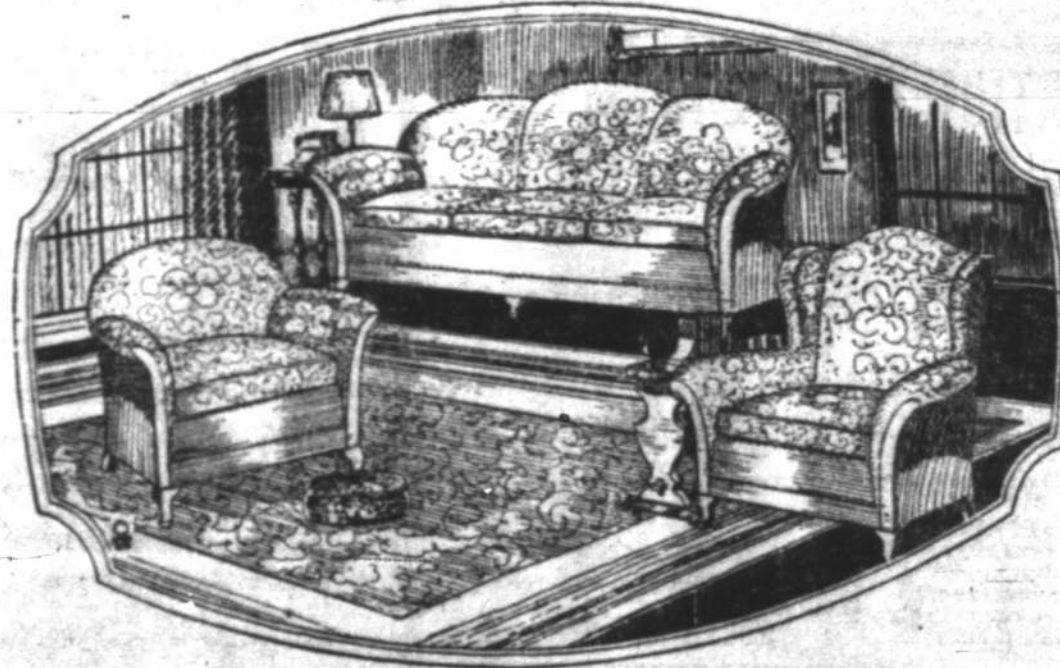

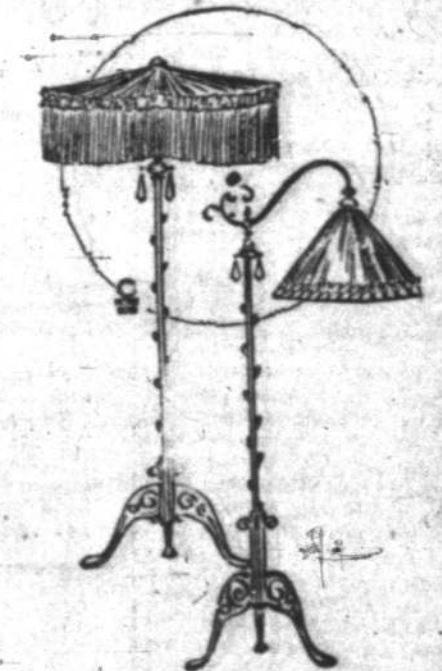

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

DR. J. E. NUNN

General Topic—Peter's Great Confession.

Scripture Lesson: Matthew 16:13-24.

13. Now when Jesus came into the parts of Caesarea Philippi, he asked his disciples, saying, who do men say the Son of man is?

14. And they said, Some say John the Baptist; some, Elijah; and other Jeremiah, or one of the prophets.

15. He saith unto them, But who say ye that I am?

16. And Simon Peter answered and said, Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God.

17. And Jesus answered and said unto him: Blessed art thou, Simon Bar-Jonah: for flesh and blood hath not revealed it unto thee, but my Father who is in heaven.

18. And I also say unto thee, that thou art Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church; and the gates of Hades shall not prevail against it.

19. I will give unto thee the keys of the kingdom of heaven; and whatsoever thou shalt bind on earth shall be bound in heaven; and whatsoever thou shalt loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven.

Introduction. A bundle of contradictions is a phrase often used to describe human nature in general or the character of some particular person. There are some individuals, of course, who more glaringly than others present this contrast. Simon Peter is one of the most notable examples. Here this unhappy characteristic finds historic and instructive illustration. He receives from the lips of his Master in this lesson both strong commendation and sharp rebuke. And he deserved both.

Jesus the Christ. Christ's real nature began to dawn on his disciples very gradually, until at length they reached the point where, through Peter as spokesman, they called him "The Christ, the Son of the living God." The Messianic hope of the Jews was realized in Jesus. The word Christ is the Greek form of the Hebrew word Messiah, or which the English equivalent is the Anointed One. Peter confessed that Jesus was this Anointed One, the long and promised hope of Israel.

Christ a Prophet, Priest and King. Christ was anointed of God to be Prophet, Priest and King. The Jews were expecting their Messiah to be a king, even the King of kings and Lord of lords. His kingdom in their view was to be in the "good time coming." The Jews expected their Messiah to be a prophet also, like unto Moses. They would agree with the saying of the Samaritan woman, "We know that when the Messiah cometh, he will tell us all things." They sent unto Jesus and asked, "Art thou that prophet?" And after the feeding of the five thousand the multitude said, "This is of a truth that prophet and should come into the world." To us now it is all very plain: Christ is indeed King of kings and Lord of lords; he is the world's Prophet, the very Word of God, the highest expression of the divine mind. He is also the everlasting Priest, yes, High Priest, mediating between God and man, having offered himself once for all as a sacrifice for the sins of the world.

Caesarea Philippi, v. 13. "Now when Jesus came into the parts of Caesarea Philippi." The most northerly point reached by our Lord. The city was rebuilt by Herod Philip, who called it by his own name to distinguish it from Caesarea on the seacoast, the seat of the Roman government. Caesarea Philippi was beautifully placed on a rocky terrace under Mount Hermon, a few miles east of Dan, the old frontier city of Israel. The cliffs near this spot, where the Messiah was first acknowledged, bear marks of the worship of Baal and of Pan.

"The Son of Man," v. 13.

"He asked his disciples, saying, Who do men say that the Son of man is?" "The son of man" was Jesus's favorite name for himself. The term was a well-understood designation of the expected Messiah, having its origin in Dan 7:13. The Messiah was the Son of man in that he represented man before the throne of the Divine Father, he was typical man, tempted in all points as man is tempted, taking upon himself the entire weight of the sins of mankind, suffering the penalty of man's sin upon the cross, and making for all men that will accept it a perfect atonement to their sins. In this single phrase is involved all that Christ came to earth to do for humanity.

"Who Say Ye That I Am?" v. 15.

"He saith unto them, But who say ye that I am?" This is the essential question for each one of us, and the question to be pressed home to each of our pupils. Whatever other name we may think about Christ, it is our judgment and decision that will decide our eternal fate.

Jesus "The Son of the Living God" v. 16.

"From the day of this conference at Caesarea Philippi down to the present day there have never been in the world but two opinions concerning Jesus of Nazareth. According to one opinion, Jesus is a man, a great man, a light and shining light like John the Baptist, a teacher and leader-hearted patriot and martyr; like Jeremiah an intrepid messenger from the courts of heaven like Elijah, a Socrates, a Seneca, or a Palestinian Confucius or Buddha, very great and very wonderful, but still a man. According to the other opinion he is the Messiah, the Son of the living God, the consummator of history, the one who was to come the Son of the Eternal, the only Son of God, unparalleled, unapproached, unapproachable, unique, unlike any other person that has ever been, or that ever will be."

"Upon This Rock," v. 18.

"And upon this rock I will build my church." Not upon Peter, the fallible, impulsive man whom Christ in the next moment would deem Satan and who was to deny Christ in his terrible hour of need, but upon Peter the first confessor, and upon the great confession which he had uttered, Christ himself, in a spiritual sense, in the one foundation stone of his church, and other foundation can no man lay; but in a material sense Peter's confession was the starting point of the church, and Peter went on at Pentecost as the spokesman of the church and broadened the foundation by three thousand converts made by his first sermon.

MARETS IRREGULAR
NEW YORK, April 15 (AP)—Bradstreet's tomorrow will say: Trade and industry still display many irregular and conflicting features. In wide areas of the west, southwest and south, and especially in the Mississippi valley and tributaries, the seasonal easterly forward spring buying has been retarded by excessive rains, high water and bad roads. In the eastern half of the country the weather has been more uniformly springlike, and a good business has been done, with the net result of an expansion of buying over a year ago. Wholesale and jobbing trade has tended to quiet. The commodity price trend has apparently been downward, with farm products, notably the grains, eggs and wool weaker, and grains at the lowest of the season. Industry likewise shows rather mixed conditions.
