Canberra Makes Discovery
Of Missing Ship; Radio
Used To Send Messages

(By Associated Press)
SYDNEY, Australia, April 12.—Fri-
day—The airplane Southern
Cross was reported found today
with its crew of four men all well.
The airplane Canberra sent a
message saying:
"Have found Southern Cross. All
alive and well. Have dropped
food."

The Canberra was one of the several
airplanes that had searched the
wild Northwestern Australian bush
for days.

The Southern Cross was said to
have been located about 30 miles
from the Port George Mission. An-
other mission in the Kimberley dis-
trict of Western Australia had re-
ported that an airplane passed over
it toward the southwest on March
31 and with this as the only clue
the search was centered in that dis-
trict for the past 12 days.

The Canberra said the Southern
Cross was on a mud flat south of
the Port George Mission.

At 11:30 a. m. the Canberra radioed
to the Southern Cross: "If you
can hear us walk out into the open
ground."

After five minutes the Canberra
told the Southern Cross: "They
must be hearing but haven't re-
sponded."

It was 20 minutes past noon when
the Canberra still flying around the
Southern Cross, radioed: "The Southern
Cross is approximately 90 miles
from the Port George Mission. Can
see whole crew now."

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Prison Portable Squawks Tune As Electric Chair Takes Texas Negro

(By The Associated Press)
HUNTSVILLE, April 12.—Walking to his death holding a red rose,
as a prison phonograph squawked out "When the Roll is Called
Up Yonder," Wade Wellborn, negro, calmly paid with his life in
electric chair early today for the slaying of his wife at Mount Pleasant,
in February, 1928.

A few moments before the negro stepped into the little gray
execution chamber of the penitentiary here, he fell to his knees
before the open door of his cell and offered up supplications for the
repose of his soul.

Marshall Ralston, condemned "Santa Claus" bandit, who must die
at Cisco, started his little portable phonograph and strains of
"When the Roll is Called Up Yonder" floated through the
silent corridors.

A few moments later Wellborn walked without a trace of emo-
tion into the death chamber, seated himself in the electric chair,
and watched calmly as attendants adjusted the electrodes.

Lights of the prison blinked four times and eight minutes later
the negro was pronounced dead.

Pretty Brunett Holds Up Bank; Gets \$5,000 Haul

(By Associated Press)
DENVER, April 11.—Threatening
to blow up the bank with a package
she said contained nitro-glycerin, a
well dressed, pretty brunett secured
\$5,000 from the Colorado State bank
this afternoon.

Walking up to a cage with the
package in one hand and a match
in the other, the woman passed a
note to Teller C. E. Kenney which
read:

"Give me all the bills you have in
the case or I will touch off this bot-
tle of nitro-glycerin and blow you
through the window."

The note was passed so quickly
that customers who thronged the
bank and other employees were un-
aware that the holdup was in progress.

Kenney told detectives that at
first he hesitated and then the woman
kidded him by tracing imaginary
figures on the front of his cage with
the match. He said she looked down
suggestively at a brown paper par-
cel she carried under her arm and
then a short fuse protruded from
which a short fuse protruded.

Kenney took a handful of \$5 bills
and shoved them through the win-
dow. Then the brunett declared:
"Not five, if please; they're too
bunglesome. I prefer tens, twenties
and larger."

Kenney gathered up several
bundles of \$10 and \$20 bills. He
pushed them out of the cage and the
woman gathered them up and placed
them calmly in a purse which she
carried in her right hand with the
match.

The woman then turned and
walked out of the bank. She was

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U. S. Artillery Is Moving On Naco To Protect Lives

Rebel Movement of Rolling
Four French 75's Into
Their Camp Causes Pre-
cautionary Measure.

Order More Troops

Border Patrol Strengthened
So As To Prevent Any
Possible Destruction To
Life And Property.

(By Associated Press)
NACO, Ariz., April 11.—United
States artillery was moved to-
ward Naco tonight, ready to protect
American lives and property should
Mexican rebels open an artillery at-
tack on the entrenched Naco, Son-
ora, federal. The American move
began as the rebels rolled four 75-
millimeter guns into their camp
facing Naco while rebel General
Gonzalo Escobar held a council of
war with five of his aides at Cana-
nara.

A battery of field artillery was
ordered from Fort Bliss, Tex., to
Don Luis, five miles north of the
border on an elevation overlooking
Naco. Previously two three-
inch field pieces had been started
for Naco from Camp Jones at
Douglas, Ariz. The artillery ar-
ray was scheduled to augment the for-
midable demand of 18 border patrol-
ing army airplanes that, in event of
another assault on the Mexican
town, shelling and bombing be con-
fined strictly to the Mexican side
of the line.

Coincident with the war con-
ference in Cananara, reports, seem-
ing well substantiated, came from
the interior war zone, and the
chief of the state department to de-
mand abandonment of any attempt to
the federal hold on Naco. The re-
ports were to the effect that the
rebels planned to concentrate their
troops at Guaymas, Sonora, to
meet the federal army now forging
its way up the coast under the
leadership of General Jaime Car-
rillo.

The investigation was started pri-
marily at the instigation of Lee
Shannon, former Texas federal pro-
hibition enforcement officer, who
came to Washington six weeks ago
to confer with Doran. At that time

WRECKED FARM HOUSES IN
ISOLATED AREAS STILL UN-
EXPLORED; 50 KNOWN TO
BE VICTIMS.

Relief Work Is On

Reports Of More Deaths And
Wounded Come In As
Communications Restored;
Houses Demolished.

(By Associated Press)
LITTLE ROCK, Ark., April 11.—
Wrecked farm houses in iso-
lated parts of mountainous North
Arkansas still were unexplored by
rescue workers tonight, 24 hours
after a pair of tornadoes dipped and
swung across the region, leaving a
death toll expected to reach close to
60, more than 200 persons injured
and huge property loss.

Rescue work showed great progress
in the most thickly settled com-
munities and the known dead to-
night numbered 50. No accurate
check of the injured could be made
because of lack of systematic ef-
forts in registering them and de-
moralized communication lines.

Relief Work Conducted

Relief work was going forward in
the Swift section, center of the
storm area, where 25 bodies had been
recovered and thirty to fifty inju-
red persons taken from under piles
of debris.

The Red Cross placed a large
number of relief workers in the
storm sections while residents of
stricken communities organized lo-
cal relief work. Business men of
Swift and Albia, between which
streets crossed the greatest toll,
and of Newport, nearby, held a
meeting at Swift and mapped out
a program of relief and rehabilitation.

Dates Postponed Until Fall So That President Hoover May Attend; Was Set For May 13, 14 and 15.

(Special To The AVALANCHE) STAMFORD, April 11.—The 1929 annual session of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce will be held the latest in the year of any of the ten previous conventions as a result of the recent postponing of the dates until fall, in order that President Hoover may attend.

The President has expressed a desire to attend but has informed WTCC officials that it would be impossible for him to be out of Washington May 13, 14, and 15, the original dates set for the convention in El Paso.

Another celebration in which it is planned that the President participate was postponed to be held at the same time as the annual convention of the regional organization. This is the proposed unveiling of a monument to commemorate the 75th anniversary of the buying of the Gadsden Purchase, a strip of land amounting to 45,335 square miles of land now forming parts of Arizona and New Mexico, from Mexico.

England Enthused Over Appointment Of General Dawes

Morning Newspapers Print Enthusiastic Comments on Ambassador; Taken As Promise From Hoover.

(By Associated Press) LONDON, April 11.—English newspapers were enthusiastic today in comments on the appointment of General Charles G. Dawes as ambassador at St. James. London morning papers printed the American's picture and long biographical notices recalling his public service, especially that in the cause of peace.

The president could not have proposed a name more acceptable or better known in this country."

Lubbock Awarded Medical Meet; Dr. Lattimore Chosen

Local Physician To Head Panhandle-Plains District Group; 1930 Convention To Be Held Here.

Dr. J. P. Lattimore, of Lubbock, has been elected president of the Panhandle-Plains District Medical Association. The two-day convention of that organization, held at Amarillo Tuesday and Wednesday, and Lubbock was selected as the next meeting place of the association. Dr. Lattimore's election becomes effective a year from now, Dr. W. L. Laugh, of this city, now serving the organization as president.

Immigration Man Tells Of Rebels' Flight To Texas

When the Mexican federalists threatened the capture of Juarez Tuesday night, according to E. Warren, United States immigration inspector, who was in Lubbock Saturday, hundreds of Mexicans fled to the rebel army that has occupied the city across the Rio Grande from El Paso, for the past two weeks, crossed the river into Texas.

The rebels, swarmed across the Grande in droves, headed by General Inspeccion Warren, and the federalists took them without bloodshed. Now the city is as wide open and calm as before.

When the revolutionists were in charge of the city, an improvised court was placed on everyone and on every business. Citizens who remained in the city had to pay from ten cents to a dollar, and the saloon operators sometimes paid as high as \$100.

LOOKS 30 YEARS YOUNGER NOW, SAY HIS FRIENDS

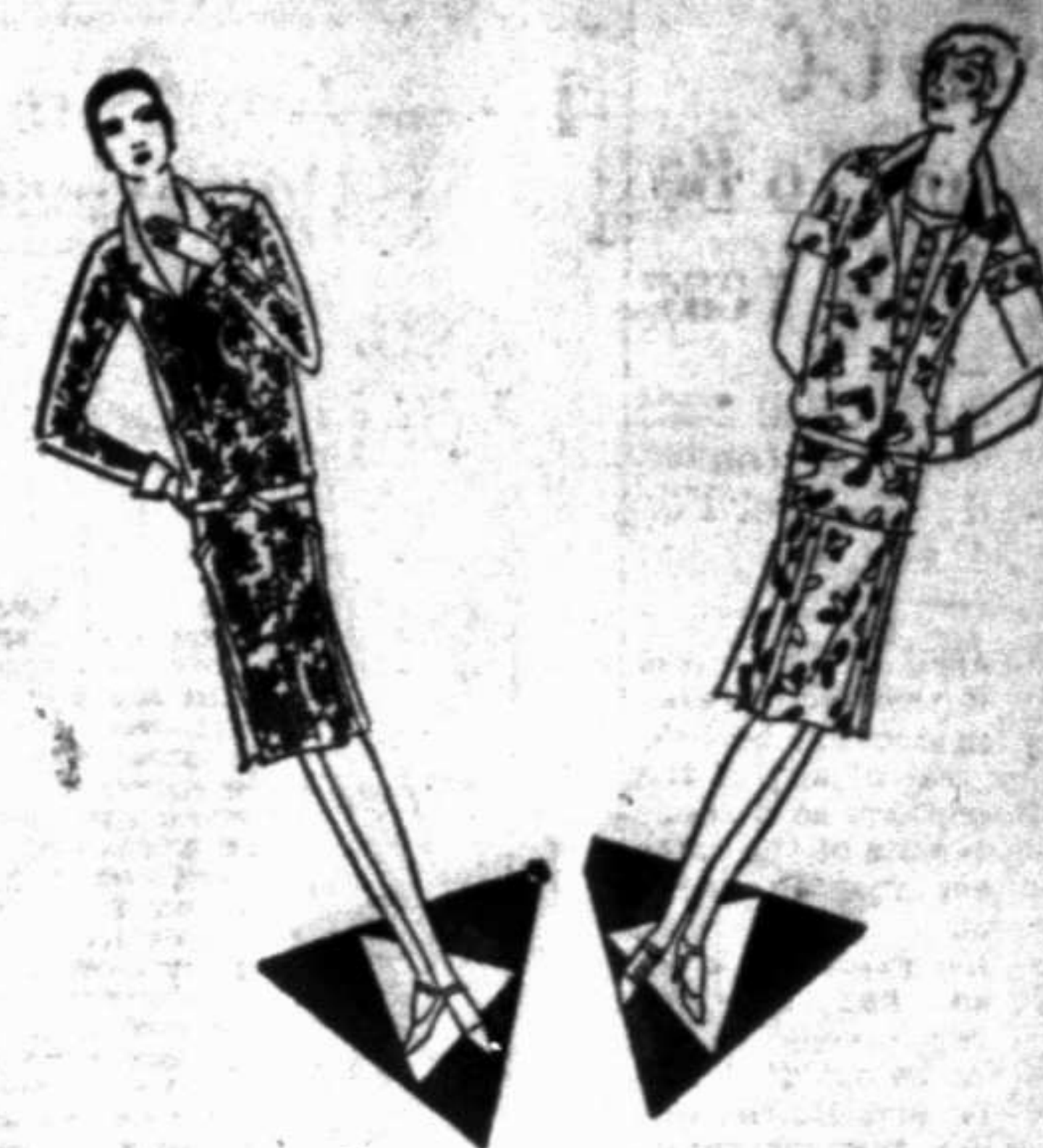
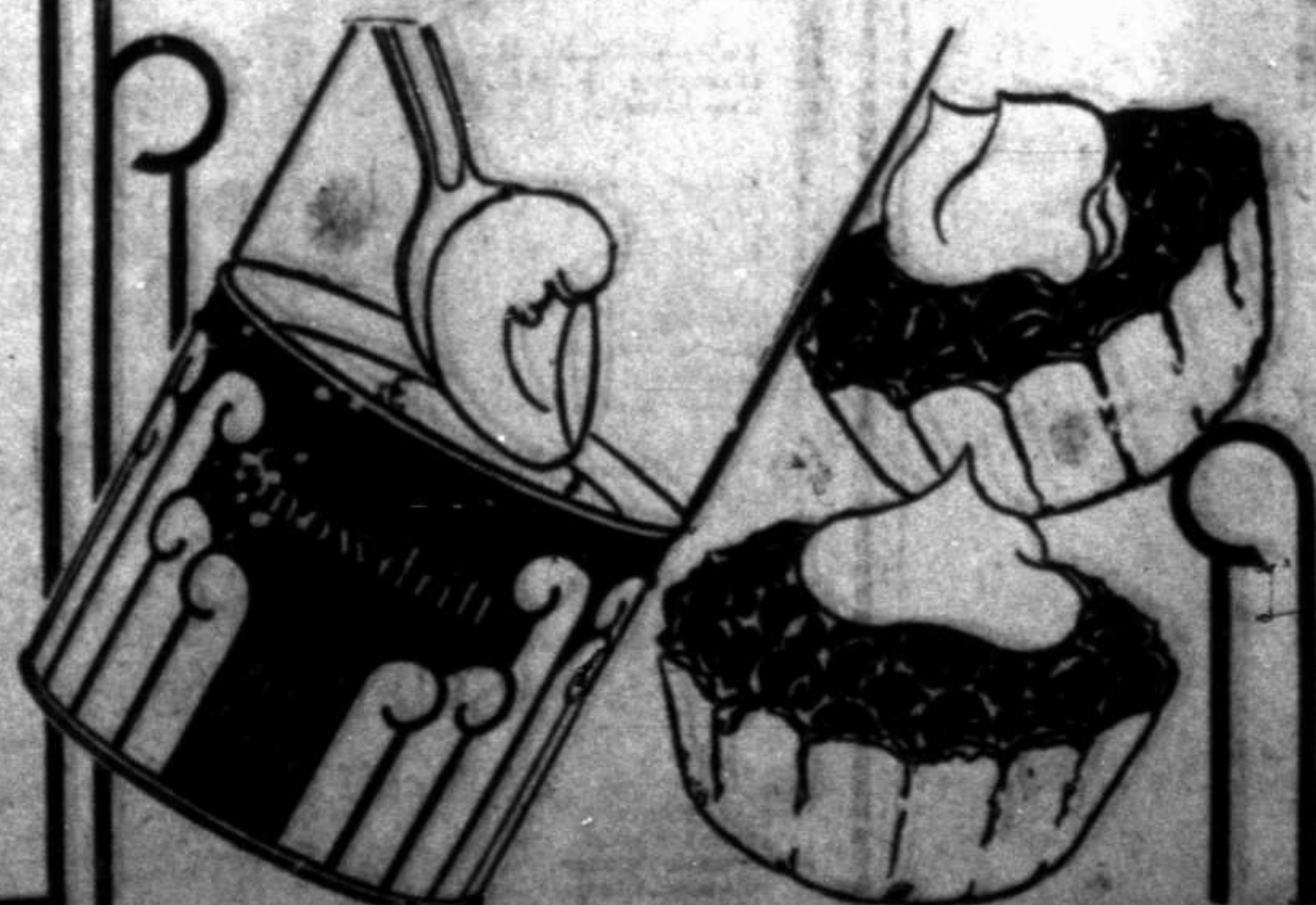

How to Achieve Beauty

Beauty today is very much a matter of care and perfect grooming. So much so that smart women who are fastidious about every tiny detail of their appearance often present an ensemble effect of greater loveliness than that of the more naturally beautiful acquaintances. Any woman may cultivate this perfection of appearance by paying strict attention to the important little details. For this reason I am going to outline a program of care in "little things" that contribute largely to beauty.

Eyebrows, for instance, and ears, necklines, the grooming of hands and nails, are some subjects we shall consider in their relation to a complete beauty ensemble.

Today eyes and eyebrows matter tremendously—with all the leading modistes of Paris sporting off-the-face hats. The tight little pull-down clothes that have been smart for several seasons have concealed eyes and eyebrows so well that many women have been tempted to become careless about properly caring for them. But the vogue of the cloche is less important at present than the more revealing turban—and even those who wear hats with some sort of a brim must remember that hats cannot be worn at all times, and that it is wisest to have eyes and eyebrows as faultlessly groomed and lovely as scientific care and art can make them.

There are all types of eyebrows—some that are straight and sturdy—others that sweep outward gracefully like wings; others slanting humorously—still others that arch emphatically in a proud, patrician curve. In general, the outline that the brows have naturally is the line that is most becoming to their owner's type of face, but if it is not, she may somewhat change their shape to suit her type. A little experiment in brushing the brows in different ways will prove which lines are most becoming. And continual brushing will train them to stay in the way that they should go.

But, in attempting to change the shape of your eyebrows, do not go to extremes in overdoing "plucking" them. And never, never shave them into a more perfect line. The eyebrow that is shaped by these methods is nearly always harsh and unbecoming. And the too-thin eyebrow gives an unpleasant, severe expression to the eyes and face.

The tweezers may be used to remove any wayward hairs that are straggling from the main eyebrow line, and any that bristle surprisingly in the space between the brows just over the bridge of the nose.

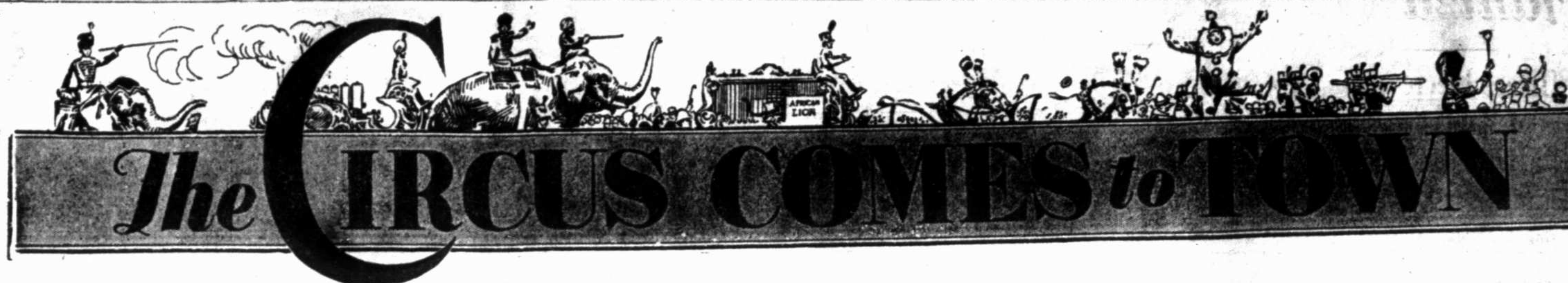

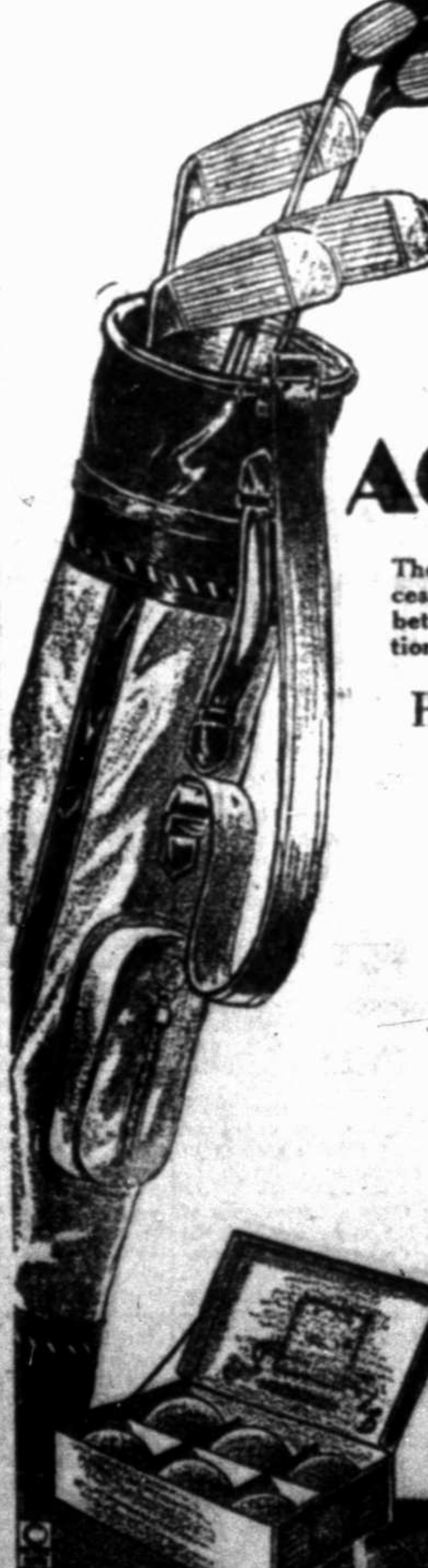

Stocks Advanced Thursday In Cut Of Bankers' Loans

Bears Uncovered Weak Spots But Call Rate Drop Shifts Market Sentiment—Loans Drop \$185,000,000.

NEW YORK, April 11. (AP)—The stock market made the best start since the start of the year today, the upward movement being an outgrowth of a pleasing earnings statement and expectation of a notable reduction in brokers' loans and shorts to cover and promote ambitious operations for the second half of the year. The day's developments, however, were not sufficiently promising to attract much public participation, and the day's turnover exceeded the \$100,000,000 level by a narrow margin.

Bears uncovered a weak spot during the first hour, but when the call money renewal reduced 9 percent, was shifted to 6 percent, the market actively generally shifted to the upside. Money held at 9 percent all day.

Bankers' Loans Drop
A drop of \$185,000,000 in brokers' loans announced after the close, equaled the most optimistic expectations, although Wall Street generally had looked for a reduction of at least \$100,000,000. In addition to the brokers' loan companies, the Federal Reserve bank, which had been in its weekly position, reported a reduction in its loans of \$100,000,000, the total to \$5,427,000,000, a drop of \$100,000,000 from the record high level reported March 20, but more than \$1,000,000,000 above the level of a year ago.

Gas Prices Go Up
The day's business included increases of one cent a gallon in gasoline prices in the east by a number of refiners. Sinclair reported a 1929 average of 13.70 a gallon, up from 13.60 in 1928.

Consolidation in the upturn in stocks was such leading issues as American Telephone and Telegraph, General Electric, Consolidated Gas and U. S. Steel, which sold up about 2 to 4 points.

A private report estimating domestic consumption for March at 620,000 bales seemed to be rather under bullish expectations and might have been a factor on the early decline which carried prices off to 20 to 25 cent lower and 1977 for December contracts. Offerings tapered off at these lower levels, however, and trading became quiet at mid-day while prices showed more steadiness.

Later the demand increased, with some trade buying of near months in evidence. There was also covering on the rally which carried May back to about the 20 to 25 cent level. December sold up to 19.93 with active trading generally showing net advances of about 1 to 5 points. Closing quotations were within a point of the previous day.

Private cables said the Liverpool market had been influenced by London and local selling and reported a small offtake in cotton cloth and yarns with stocks accumulating. Port receipts today 8,748 bales, U. S. port stocks 1,000,000. Exports today 25,327 making 7,046,653 of at this time.

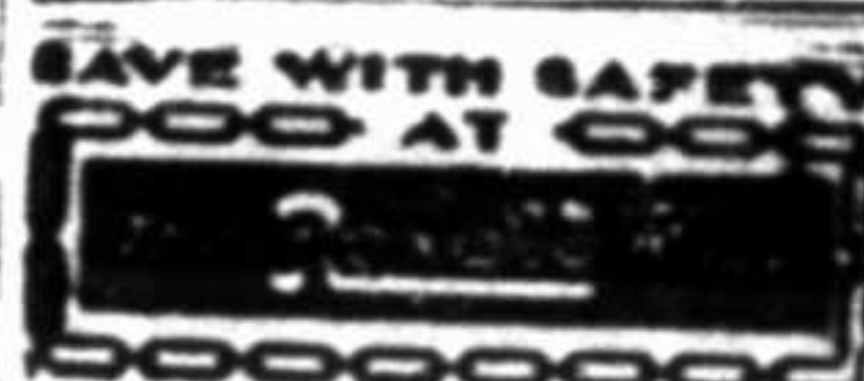

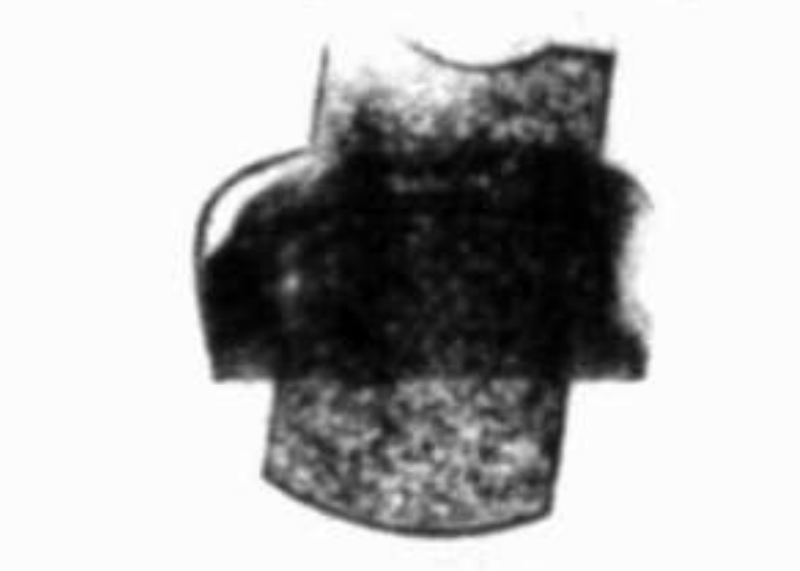

tents and other supplies to the homeless and injured.

Death List Climbs Slowly. Reports of additional injured continued to come in tonight as communication was restored to the storm area, while the death list climbed slowly during the day after the early morning efforts of rescue workers.

The bodies of two children who had been missing—Jack Defries, 2, and his sister, Ruth, 4—were found in a drainage ditch in the Swift community. Eleven-year-old Joe Bullard's body was recovered from a creek. He also had been listed among the missing. These, together with the death of Mrs. Randall Hudgens in a Newport hospital, increased the number of dead at Swift to 25 and the total number of storm death to 46.

Houses Demolished. Hundreds of houses in widely scattered sections were demolished creating a tremendous problem in caring for the homeless.
