A. More than a year ago, Wal-Mart sent out "feeler" inquiries to a number of area cities including Colorado City. Chamber of Commerce Manager David Janca followed up on the inquiry about five months ago and made contact with a Wal-Mart representative. After discussions of the local economic conditions, site availability, other store locations, etc. it was determined that a local store would probably not be feasible or beneficial to either Wal-Mart or Colorado City at this time. However, future consideration of Colorado City has not been ruled out.

# Big Spring youth second drowning victim Friday

An 18-year-old Big Spring youth became the second drowning victim in just over a week, in the power plant restricted area at Lake Colorado City Friday.

The victim was identified as Jamie A. Baldwin, 18, of Big Spring. A companion, Pete Lara, called the Sheriff's office from

Pete Cooper's residents, reporting that his friend had fallen into the turbulent water at the plant discharge site, about 9:20 a.m. Game warden Ronnie Aston, Park Superintendent Mark Fambro, and Deputy Sheriff Tony Pantajo, joined by other Parks and Wildlife officers drug the area

with hooks for about three hours, finally recovering the body at 12:25 p.m. Justice of Peace Joan Merket was called to the scene and pronounced the man dead at 12:56 p.m. The fathers of the two boys arrived at the scene just about the time the body was recovered.

The body was taken to Kiker Seale Funeral Home here, then transferred to a Big Spring funeral home where services are being planned.

Warden Aston, said the man apparently fell into the water from almost the very same spot as the 20-year-old Snyder man who

drown there May 11. And the body was recovered in almost the identical same spot.

Warden Aston said TU Electric had repaired the hole in the fence after the drowning two weeks ago. These boys gained entrance to the restricted area by going

## Police version of shooting disputed

# LULAC asks investigation

A district director of League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC) told *The Record* Thursday that she was sending a telegram to an Assistant Attorney General, Department of Justice, requesting an expanded investigation into the shooting of a Hispanic man by a police officer here May 13.

After being contacted by local groups in both Colorado City and Big Spring, she said the shooting was just one incident in a string of civil rights complaints against Colorado City law enforcement.

The death of Sammy Gomez, 27, who was shot by a Colorado City police officer during an arrest attempt, is being investigated by Texas Ranger John Billings of Snyder and was scheduled to be investigated by a Mitchell County Grand Jury Friday.

"We are very concerned about all the allegations of civil rights violations in Colorado City," said

Terry Meza, a director of District 5 LULAC. Although the District organization had not acted, she said she was sending the telegram, asking for an expanded investigation into the shooting and other alleged civil rights violations by police during the last six months.

Oscar Ortiz, president of the local LULAC chapter, has claimed that this was the fourth such incident in Colorado City.

Meza said a couple of the other incidents include a priest who told LULAC that he suffered rope burns after his hands were tied

## Mayor issues statement after Grand Jury investigation

"This past week has been a week of great concern to all of the citizens of Colorado City, as well as to members of the Colorado City City Council," Mayor Jim Baum stated late Friday.

"We, as a community, have a history of caring. When incidents occur involving our Police Department, I think it's fair to say we all seek assurances that those incidents were handled properly and professionally. Today, the Mitchell County Grand Jury has investigated the shooting death of

Participation and support of the 2nd annual Project Celebration here, May 27, seems to be progressing with favorable response, as it should. and support by Pepsi-Cola Company. But, the main responsibility falls to the students to plan, organize, and implement their own celebration.

Project Celebration is considered by all to be a great success. A very large majority of the high school students in Mitchell County attended the event last year and a similar participation is expected this year.

And it is more than just conducting chemical-free parties. Project Celebration promotes a way of life that respects individuals who don't need alcohol or drugs to have a good time.

## IRS grabs \$17,434 from suit settlement

After an agreed settlement had been reached on the disposition of \$42,276 cash and a 1982 Pickup Truck, Internal Revenue Agents swooped in to claim \$17,434.77 of the money Friday morning.

The seizure and forfeiture cases, styled State of Texas vs \$42,276 and State of Texas vs 1982 pickup truck were to be heard in Judge Weldon Kirk's 32nd District Court Friday. Sheriff Wendell Bryant had the cases filed claiming the money and vehicle and been used for drug related purposes. The respondent, Armida Arnado Villa, wife of the man murdered in the truck where the money was found, denied the allegations and claimed the property.

Both the County Attorney and District Attorney's offices declined to prosecute the cases. Frank Ginzler was eventually retained to present the cases for the State. Ginzler was then hospitalized this week and couldn't attend the final hearings.

An agreed judgement had been reached, however, wherein the pickup truck and \$39,276 was to be returned to the victim's wife, and \$3,000 was to be retained by the Sheriff's Department.

However, after the IRS grabbed its part, the agreed judge-

## City Savings branch here acquired by Dallas S&L

The Colorado City branch for City Savings and Loan of San Angelo is now a branch of Southwest Savings of Dallas, as part of a \$2 billion assistance package provided by federal regulators' four insolvent Texas thrift institutions.

The Dallas-based savings and loan, the state's 18th largest thrift, agreed to acquire 78 offices and branches of the four troubled S&Ls.

In addition to City Savings, those to be acquired within the next year are Stockton Savings Association of Addison, Lamar Savings Association of Austin, the state's 11th largest S&L, and Briercroft Savings Association of Austin, according to George M. Barclay, president of the Federal Home Loan Bank of Dallas.

The Colorado City Branch, located at 2205 Hickory, and formerly Homestate Savings, is managed by Linda Fluit and is continuing normal operations under the new name. The local branch reported \$15,529,673 in local deposits at the end of the first quarter of the year, March 31.

Spokesmen for the FSLIC have said there will be no interruption in service at any of the acquired thrifts. All deposits are also secured.

The plan, announced Wednes-

day, may be the largest merger in the federal Southwest Plan designed to rescue the state's ailing thrifts, officials said.

## Storm yields 1.8"; sets off alarm

A heavy thunderstorm which dumped 1 1/2 to 2 inches of rain on Colorado City and generally throughout Mitchell County, also apparently set off the local fire siren, giving local residents quite a scare.

Rains fell generally throughout the morning Thursday then the thunderstorm hit after midnight. The storm apparently set off the fire siren at 1:41 a.m. resulting in a long, continuous blast for several minutes. Numerous people were reported going to their cellars, fearing a tornado. No other notification or "all clear" was given.

According to official NWS recordings at Morgan Creek Power plant, 1.8 inches of precipitation was received, bring the total for May to 3.98 inches and 5.96 inches so far this year.

## One guilty, 2 exonerated in city court

A six-person, two men and four women, jury found a local man guilty of plumbing without a permit, and two persons not guilty of traffic violations in Judge Clayton Fitch's Municipal Court Wednesday afternoon.

Robert McNeal had been cited in January for replacing a section of sewer service line without applying for a permit. Mark Piland of the City Attorney's office, who prosecuted the case, called Brenda Hammond, City Manager; Buz Rich, plumbing inspector; and Bert Ward, field examiner for the State Board of Plumbing to testify and confirm that McNeal was not a licensed plumber and had not applied for a Plumbing permit, as required by City Ordinance, and subject to up to a \$100 fine.

In his own defense, McNeal, who does remodeling, has a septic tank business and does plumbing work outside the City, stated that local licensed plumbers were apparently not applying for city permits either, with only a few issued in the past several years. He said the work he was asked to do was only a replacement of a small section of sewer service line that required no alteration. The jury found McNeal guilty and assessed a \$25 fine.

Two other cases scheduled for jury trial were eventually combined into one. Robert E. Cosby and Gregg Ham had each been issued a citation for "contest of speed" or racing around the curve from Highway 80 to SH 208 at speeds up to 46 mph, earlier this month. City Patrolman Randy Roberts took the stand to give the circumstances of the incident, and Cosby and Ham in their own defense. The jury ruled both men not guilty.

while in police custody. He said he was not allowed a phone call while being held in jail for 11 hours.

Also a juvenile has told LULAC officials he was placed in jail and maced while handcuffed behind bars, Mesa said.

Gomez was apparently shot to death by a part-time Colorado City Officer, Billy Ray Williamson, after he allegedly pulled a knife on officers attempting to arrest him for alleged aggravated sexual assault on a 19-year-old Colorado City woman. The local LULAC group headed by Oscar Ortiz, has claimed receiving a report that Gomez was not wielding a knife.

Gomez' aunt, Jessie Gomez, the only civilian witness to the shooting has said she did not see her nephew brandish a knife before he was shot to death.

In her account, she was quoted in the *Abilene Reporter-News* that she and her father, Frank Gomez, were at the Front Street residence when the police arrived. Other than the two police officers, who entered the home, Ms. Gomez said she was the only witness to the shooting because her father was watching television in another room.

She said two officers entered the house with their guns drawn after she called to her nephew, who was sleeping in a back room. She said Gomez told her to get out of the way because he was going to be shot. As Ms. Gomez turned toward a phone to call Gomez' parents, she said she heard two shots, not three. She said all the officers said was "Sammy" and then they shot him.

The parents, Macario and Minnie Gomez were quoted as saying they were suing both Colorado City and Mitchell County alleging their son was beaten while in custody on two previous occasions.

Gomez was living with his parents at 1220 Oak after being paroled from TDC last June. According to the records in the District Clerk's office, Gomez was sentenced last May to eight years in the TDC for assault on a police officer, and as part of a plea bargain, an earlier conviction for attempted murder was reduced.

Macario Gomez was quoted as saying he did not know if his son was home the night of the reported rape. "We'll never know whether he was guilty or not," his father said.

"It looks like there's a pattern or trend of civil rights violations by Colorado City law enforcement agencies," Meza said, "and there should be an expanded investigation."

According to news wire reports, The Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corp. will spend a record \$2 billion on the deal over a 10-year period. Southwest is contributing \$25 million of subordinate debt to the consolidated company as equity, but no outside capital will be used.

The thrifts have a combined assets of more than \$4 billion. City Savings and Loan Association has assets of \$687.3 million, a net worth of negative \$221.9 million and deposits of \$866.2 million.

Barclay was quoted as saying even though the merger will begin with a large 116-branch outfit, Southwest will quickly begin shutting down its duplicated services.

Officials said they didn't know how many branches will close, but customers of all the thrifts will be notified of branch closings by mail.

The Federal Home Loan Bank Board has now resolved the problems of eight Texas thrifts under the Southwest Plan, which was announced by the board in February and initiated last week.

The Southwest Plan goal is to fold 109 or more insolvent S&Ls into 25 to 30 surviving institutions.

Numerous other drownings have occurred there. Once a person falls into the turbulent water below the discharge area, there is no getting out. Aston said, this boy was apparently a good swimmer, because after falling down a concrete slope embankment, his companion said he swam about

half way out of the turbulent area before he was sucked under.

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# Home Economics FOCUS

Thursday morning I had to go to a meeting in Abilene. It was before 8 o'clock and I headed east out West Point Road. I saw some children standing by the side of the road, obviously waiting for a school bus or car pool. Not so unusual, right?

Right, with one exception: their grandfather, it seemed, was waiting with them. Isn't that a great way to help kids get off to a really good start? Those children probably got on the bus with just a little added boost of confidence. Grandparents have so much to offer families, especially if they live in the same town.

Parents, think today of ways to involve grandparents, and all you grandparents can be thinking of ways you can offer support and stability to children.

What if you don't live in the same town? Can you still provide love and support? You better believe you can!

Read on!

### How to be a Long-Distance Grandparent

Even if you live miles away, you can be a source of comfort and stability to your grandchildren. Here are some ways to spice up your relationship with grandchildren who live at a distance:

- Send postcards and letters. Young children love colorful picture post cards. When you write letters, include pictures of yourself, your pets, scenes of a trip or pictures of the child from a previous visit. Add some trivia questions and riddles for older children.

- Send audio cassettes. The children can play them over and over again and a taped "letter" is easier for a young child to understand than a written one. Children can reply with their own tape. They can talk about friends or animals, read stories they have written at school, sing or play the piece they are practicing on a musical instrument.

- Use phone calls. If you need to watch your budget, reserve calls for special occasions. Sometimes events that are occasional, rather than regular, take on special significance.

- Invite one grandchild to visit at a time. It prevents sibling rivalry and will help assure a relaxed time for both of you. Make plans with the child, by letter or phone, for something special to do, such as a trip to a museum, an amusement park of a fishing spot. Teach your grandchild a skill, such as how to embroider, use tools, make a favorite recipe or plant a garden. If possible, arrange time for play with other children during the visit, too.

- Take a trip together. It doesn't have to be an elaborate or overly expensive excursion. Go to a lake, state park, historic places or stay in a motel with a swimming pool. Choose your trip destination based on the child's age and changing interests.

To be important to your grandchild, you don't need everyday contact. You can maintain emotional contact from a distance. And when you're together, watch your grandchild thrive on your undivided attention and unconditional love.

## Loving, Ritchey and Morris attend leadership seminar

Mitchell County Extension Homemakers Teresa Loving, Nelma Ritchey and D'Dee Morris attended the second session of the Family Community Leadership Conference sponsored by the Texas Extension Homemakers Association, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Kellogg Foundation May 10-12 at Stanton.
