FILMS REVEAL DEMPSEY BLOW IS FAIR PUNCH

SLOW MOTION PICTURES OF FIGHT SHOWN TO NEWSPAPER MEN

NEW YORK, July 22.—The official slow motion pictures of the Dempsey-Sharkey fight, showing the mugging in the seventh round, revealed today that the disputed blow which contributed to Dempsey's victory was apparently fair.

Three Blows Shown

The films were run off three times to permit the newspapermen, to compare their judgment. The slow motion of the fighters revealed that Dempsey struck three hard rights to the stomach of Sharkey before delivering the left to the jaw that knocked out his opponent.

Rickard Much Interested

As the slow motion picture of the seventh round was shown, Tex Rickard, promoter of the fight, said he had never seen heavyweights fight as fast as they did last night.

Pictures Fail To Halt Arguments

NEW YORK, July 22.—The controversy over whether Jack Dempsey did or did not foul Jack Sharkey before knocking out the Boston sailor last night raged with increasing force rather than diminishing today.

Communists Are Voluntarily Jailed

Fuller Confers With Prisoners Sentenced To Die

BOSTON, Mass., July 22.—Governor Alan T. Fuller, in whose hands with the consent of the executive council lies the pardoning power, visited the prison today and interviewed Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti, under sentence of death for murder. He also talked with Celestino Madeiros, awaiting electrocution for the murder, who has asserted that members of a gang with which he was associated committed the murders of which Sacco and Vanzetti were convicted.

RANCH IS HELD AS TROOPS ARE SENT TO SCENE

RUSSELL JOHNSON, HEAD OF SMELTING FIRM, IS KIDNAPPED

WASHINGTON, July 22.—Kidnaping of one American citizen by Mexican bandits and the occupation of the 75,000 acre ranch of another was reported to the state department today coincident with the receipt of a note from the Mexican foreign office expressing regret at the attack on William E. Chapman, American consul at Puerto Mexico. The advice said civil and military authorities were searching for those responsible.

Troops Hunt Bandits

The kidnapping of Russell Johnson, superintendent of the American Smelting and Refining company near Parral, was reported by Consul McEnelly at Chihuahua. Federal troops were searching for the bandits, the message said, and Charles Schoenfeld at Mexico City has made representations to the foreign office in regard to the case.

Key To Pacific

The army chief of staff declared that it had long been recognized that the nation holding the Hawaiian Islands had the military key to the Pacific, controlling both the eastern portion of that vast ocean as well as the western coast of the United States.

photographs of Commander Ryd and Chamberlain and held them together.

"There," she cried almost hysterically, "look at these four, just four men to whom their exploits were all in a day's work. Men real men, and yet great-hearted boys! I love Charles Lindbergh almost as much as I do my own Charles. Chamberlain is a splendid man, and Commander Byrd—a kind-hearted gentleman. To these Americans my heart goes out with all a mother's feeling. I can never forget what they have done for me. With-

out them they would have been no one to help me until Charles returned, but here they are, three modest, great-souled men who have done so much to help me with the American people."

Her Soul Tells Her

Asked why she felt so confident that her son was still alive, Madame Nungesser said:

"Since he was a babe in my arms the thoughts of Charles and my thoughts have been the same. When we have separated our letters, crossing, have contained the same thoughts and expressions. Call it telepathy, if you like, but I, his mother, and his greatest friend, who went through the trials and horrors of the war with him, tell you that he is alive. Perhaps he is alive. Perhaps he is lying injured off in Canada or Labrador, but he lives. My whole soul tells me that we shall see each other again."

"Look at me. Today I wear blue tomorrow pink perhaps, any color, but never black. My Charles, the most wonderful lad in all France, will not die without me. When they put me in my coffin and threw it down, then Charles may be dead too, but not until."

"Tell the good American people that a mother is coming to find her son. I often feel he is waiting for me to come."

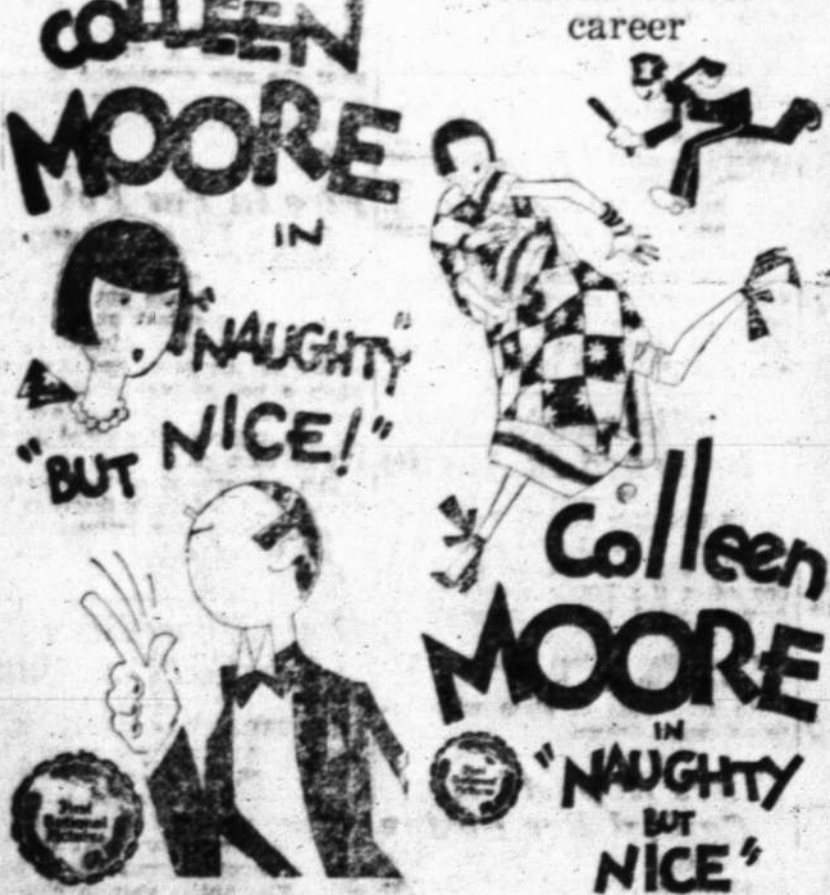

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MAJORITY OF GOTHAM PRESS TERMS DEMPSEY'S BLOW A FOUL

SCRIBES CLAIM EX-CHAMPION'S BLOW TOO LOW

REPORT OF ONE JUDGE TO SAY PUNCH WAS BELOW WAIST

(By Associated Press)
 NEW YORK, July 22.—Although referee, Jack O'Sullivan, declared the punch was fair, a majority of sports writers whose opinions were reflected in metropolitan newspapers today apparently considered that Jack Dempsey landed a low blow just before he knocked out Jack Sharkey with a left to the chin.

The New York Times says Dempsey's "accompaniment was disputed by many who saw the test" and will hold the belief that Dempsey should have been disqualified on a foul.

"Two Foul Punches" — The Herald-Tribune in one account, refers to "two foul punches" Dempsey, "to which Jack O'Sullivan, the referee, paid no attention," although they were "deemed a good eight inches below the belt." The same paper adds another story:

"It was a strange fight, as strange as the rumors that were being through the stadium when it started, as strange as the shifting of the odds that made Dempsey a favorite before the two men entered the ring. All the circumstances were startling, not to say peculiar.

No Evidence of Injury
 According to the World, the right to Sharkey's body "did seem to be close to the belt" but it points out that the referee refused to allow claim of foul and that the official physician of the boxing commission found no evidence of injury.

Judge To Report Punch As Foul
 NEW YORK, July 22.—(AP)—Charles Mathison, one of the judges of the Sharkey-Dempsey fight, declared he would make the following report to the state athletic commission:

"Jack Sharkey was hit below the waist line immediately before the knockout punch and Dempsey should have been disqualified because of the foul, but it was not in several other rounds."

O'Sullivan's Report
 Referee Jack O'Sullivan said:

"The blow which preceded the knockout punch, a left to the jaw, was a fairly delivered one. It was a right uppercut that landed right on the waist line, but not below. It is true that Dempsey landed several times below the waist line in previous rounds, but in no case were the punches injurious or dangerous, nor was there any protest by Sharkey previous to the last round."

 NEW YORK, July 22.—The "Hollow Shell" of Hollywood was loaded after all, it seems, and today Jack Dempsey, at 32, is on the high road of sensational comeback as the result of a stunning knockout victory over Jack Sharkey, the 35 year old giant.

In a finish as sudden and dramatic as it was marked also by sharp controversy, the former king of the heavyweight dropped Sharkey for the count of ten in the seventh round of his 15 round match and put an abrupt end, for the present, to the confident course of the young Boston sailor.

Bitter Controversy
 A vicious right to the mid-section—a blow that aroused bitter controversy as to whether it was fair—ended the fight. It was a right uppercut that landed right on the waist line, but not below. It is true that Dempsey landed several times below the waist line in previous rounds, but in no case were the punches injurious or dangerous, nor was there any protest by Sharkey previous to the last round."

REPORTS EXONERATION DENIED IN STATEMENT BY REGENTS

(By Associated Press)
 AUSTIN, July 22.—The reported "exoneration" of L. Theo Belmont by Texas university regents investigating the controversy revolving about his policies as school athletic director, proved today to be only a conditional exoneration with a tangle of reprimand in it.

A hitherto unrevealed resolution adopted by the regents Tuesday put Belmont on probation for a year with notice that his retention after that will depend on his ability to ally criticism and keep up harmony. "If he is unable to accomplish this, his usefulness will cease," the resolution said. It was prepared by Regent Sam Nothary and passed only today by C. D. Simmons, secretary of the board, which cloaked its meetings this week with secrecy. A report obtained by all newspapermen after the Tuesday meeting that Belmont was "exonerated" by the regents, went unchallenged by the board at the time.

Minority Is Favorable
 Regent Nothary made the minority "favorable" report from the investigating committee, which was adopted. R. L. Holliday of El Paso and Edward Crane of Dallas had a majority unfavorable report.

The statement from Simmons was obtained by the Austin Statesman after inquiries to certain regents.

Controversy has centered about Belmont's athletic administration intermittently for several months and has been investigated both by faculty and regents committees.

While believing his fighter "was fouled more than a dozen times" Buckley said he would not appeal the decision.

"The referee's word is final," he said.

COTTON PICKER MACHINE TO BE LOCATED HERE

THOROUGH TEST TO BE MADE OF INVENTION BY DALLAS MAN

An invention, which is declared will revolutionize the cotton picking industry, the Herring Automatic Cotton Picking machine, will be given a thorough test in Lubbock and surrounding country which about twenty of the machines will be placed in the Lubbock territory about September 19. It was announced last night by Edward G. Trimble, president of the Employers' Indemnity Corporation, and capitalist of Kansas City. Only one other section of the state will be used in testing the machines in Texas. The company does not sell stock, working on the lease plan of placing the invention in this section. No orders for the machines will be taken this year, officials of the company announce.

Does Work of 30 Men

The automatic picker was patented several years ago but was never thoroughly protected until recently. Each machine is capable of doing the work of 30 men in a day's time, less than of the implement claim. They are built, not on the sled type, but as wheeled affair which runs above the cotton. Each has 1440 picker points on it, which puts every one into play over 3 feet of cotton without damaging the green bolls, blooms or stalks in any manner. It took only a few seconds for last night's finishing picture but it was a thrilling climax in spite of the subsequently disputed views of it. Not only was the controversy over whether Dempsey's blows were fair or foul but wide difference of opinion as to whether it was a right or left to the body that was low and a right or left to the head that provided the climax. Dempsey as well as Sharkey, settled the latter issue. They agreed it was a right hook to the body and a left hook to the jaw that furnished the victory combination.

Dempsey Prepares For Trip To Coast

NEW YORK, July 22 (AP)—Showing no ill effects after his spectacular knockout victory over Jack Sharkey last night other than a slight puffiness about the eyes, Jack Dempsey was up early today and played 15 holes of golf with his manager, Leo P. Flynn.

Opinions Differ

To observers on some sides of the ring it appeared Dempsey's right to the body was several inches below the waist line and three feet foul. To others it appeared on the border line while just as many more were equally confident the punch was altogether fair. The referee shared the same view and his decision appeared upheld when the referee's physician, declared after examination of Sharkey that no evidence of injury or a foul blow was apparent, at least on the surface.

Official Gate Is Less Than Million

WASHINGTON, July 22 (AP)—The gate at the Dempsey-Sharkey fight last night as reported to the treasury was \$985,927, paid 77,283 fight fans who witnessed the bout. A telegraphic report received from Louis J. Campbell, supervisor of accounts and collections in the New York office of the internal revenue bureau, informed the bureau that the admission tax totalled \$98,592.76.

Fighters Split \$450,000 Purse

NEW YORK, July 22 (AP)—Jack Dempsey and Jack Sharkey split a purse of slightly more than \$450,000 for their battle last night, which drew a gate of \$1,075,960, and attendance of \$2,999. According to the Tex Rickard's estimate, it was the fourth million dollar fight in ring history. In all of which Dempsey has been a principal. The former champion now is assured a cut in his fifth big-money fight when he meets Gene Tunney in a return title bout.

Rickard's contracts with the fighters called for Dempsey to get

27 1/2 percent and Sharkey 22 1/2 percent. Dempsey was understood to have been guaranteed \$250,000, and on a percentage basis, it figures to go slightly over that, with Sharkey getting a little over \$200,000. Here are the promoter's figures.

- Rickard's share \$44,498.

The Coast Guard boys, who police the off-shore waters for scoff-laws, have managed to stay singularly anonymous. A rum ship is seized—and that is that. Meanwhile they bob about the seas in their little speed-boats like waterbugs.

He Got a Break But Duke got the sort of break that carries Doug Fairbanks thru reels of snappy camera action. Slipping about New York harbor a cork during a heavy squall, the 227—even the coast guard ships are anonymous—sighted an unlighted tramp steamer in. It had slipped past about a dozen patrolmen.

Duke halted it and got no response. Manipulating his little craft alongside he clambered to the deck after taking a couple of shots with his boat's two-pounder. In true movie fashion, the first crew member to accost him was sent to the deck with a blow from his revolver butt. A couple of seconds later he was in the captain's cabin, a gun barrel against the ribs of the pilot and the ship headed for the Jersey flats.

Million Dollar Cargo Thus was the tramp-freighter Economy with a million dollars worth of liquor aboard seized by a

lone ensign—all in the space of a few minutes. And the name of Duke joined the list of intrepid soloists. "I really didn't think anything like that would happen to me," smiled Duke. "I used to be a newspaper reporter in Washington and wrote stories about such occurrences. But the Coast Guard game seemed something like a policeman on a water boat—until this came along."

Ferdinand Body Rests Today In Winter Palace

(By Associated Press) BUCHAREST, July 22.—In simple golden oak casket, covered with flowers from Queen Marie and his daughters, the body of King Ferdinand rested today in the golden hall of Cotroceni palace. Thousands of sorrowing Rumanians passed the pier to do honor to their beloved king.

The body was brought to the winter palace yesterday from the royal summer estate at Sinaia, where the monarch died. It will lie in state until Sunday, when burial will take place in the royal mausoleum at Curtea de Arges. On his tomb will be engraved the words: "I am a Rumanian, first, last and all the time."

Guns boomed as the funeral train came to a stop in the capital. Although rain was falling, silent crowds watched as the coffin, surmounted by the sovereign's sword and cap, was born from the station on a carriage and thence through the streets of the city to the palace. Men, women and children went as the cortege passed.

With the boy King Michael's reign established, the country remains calm, and the government has made known its determination to quash any attempt by followers of former Crown Prince Carol to regain the throne for him.

The 1923 agreement creating the commission called for complete disposal of all claims presented the end of August 1927. A total of 2,257 claims, 2,463 by the United States, have been filed up to the present, but as only 51 claims involving upward of \$2,000,000 have been awarded, extension of the life of the commission was regarded as imperative.
