## N. Y. Communists Jailed in Anti-Churchill Outbreak

By United Press.

NEW YORK, Mar. 15.—Winston Churchill, receiving New York's city official honors and appreciation for his wartime premiership of England, said today that the world looks to the United States for guidance in achieving the aims for which the United Nations fought the costliest war.

Even as Churchill was speaking in a crowded city hall council chamber, policemen were hurrying 20 self-styled Communist veterans off to precinct houses after they staged an anti-Churchill demonstration.

### Earthquakes Jolted Southern California Area Today

LOS ANGELES, Mar. 15. (AP)—Earthquakes jolted Southern California at intervals today, ripping giant holes in the Owens Valley Viaduct when a torrent of boulders poured down a mountainside. Center of the quakes was along the Inyo and Kern county boundaries, 100 miles north of Los Angeles, where the aqueduct, supplying water to the city, was broken and burst for 10 miles. There was no danger of a water shortage.

### Texas Daily Oil Output Set at 1,991,623 Bbls.

AUSTIN, Mar. 15. (AP)—The Texas Railroad Commission today issued an order for April oil production in Texas estimated to provide 1,991,623 barrels a day. There will be 21 producing days out of the 30 for the state generally.

**STREET-SPACE RENTALS.** ABILENE, Mar. 15. — In addition to relieving the downtown parking situation, the new one-hour time limit on the business district parking meters is proving a profitable change for the city, records of the city treasurer reveals. For the period Feb. 15 to Mar. 15, the meter receipts were \$4,795.80, compared with \$2,374.20 for the month of January.

**WAGES AND SALARIES.** WASHINGTON, Mar. 15. (AP)—The Wage Stabilization Board today announced approval of all wage or salary adjustments agreed upon before Feb. 14 in cases pending before it.

### Canada Uncovers Approval GM-CIO 4 More Members of Agreem't Expected in a Few Hours

OTTAWA, Mar. 15. (AP)—A Communist member of parliament and a McGill University chemistry professor were charged with espionage today as new secrets of the alleged Soviet spy ring in Canada were revealed in a second report of the royal commission. Charges of violations also were laid today against three other government employees, to bring to nine the number of persons so far charged in the far-flung investigation in which 13 men and women were arrested a month ago.

**RATIONING EXTENDED.** WASHINGTON, Mar. 15. (AP)—The House today voted overwhelmingly to extend the government's emergency allocation, priority and rationing powers until March 31, 1947. Present expiration date is June 30, 1946.

**WILL CONTINUE SUPPORT.** ATLANTIC CITY, Mar. 15. (AP)—President Truman, in a message read to the opening meeting of the council of the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration, pledged the United States today to continue its support of the organization and described it as an "integral part of the machinery of peace."

### Thieves Break Star Tile Plant in and Rob Mu-Turns Out 2,000 nicipal Airport Pieces Each Day

Thieves, probably youthful ones, broke into the office at Municipal Airport last night and removed property valued at about \$200, said Joe Coulter, airport manager, this morning.

Articles stolen included three model gas engines, one model airplane, five khaki baseball caps and one aircraft radio transmitter-receiver. No damage was done to airplanes in the hangar, Mr. Coulter said.

Deputy Sheriff Vaughan of Eastland was here today for an investigation and expects to uncover the thieves within a few days, he told Mr. Coulter.

The number of juvenile late-hour night birds in Cisco has been increasing rapidly during recent months, the Daily Press is informed.

**CHAMPION HEN EGG.** Chester Allen, route four, Cisco, exhibited a white leghorn hen egg at the Daily Press office this morning that would seem to be entitled to the blue ribbon for size. The egg weighed four ounces and measured six and 5-8 inches in girth. Mr. Allen's usually large flock of white leghorns has been considerably reduced in number during recent months, but he still has about 100 laying hens.

**RISEING STAR.** Mar. 15. — Rutherford & Steel Co., who about six weeks ago installed a plant on East College street for the manufacture of concrete tile, are this week making their first deliveries and state that from this time on they expect to fill orders in a reasonably short time. The plant is now turning out almost 2000 pieces a day, according to Charles Rutherford, and that the production will be stepped up from now on.

In a display advertisement in Rising Star Record today, the firm is urging those who plan to build soon to place their orders now for delivery when needed. Makers of the brick state that a period of 14 days for curing should be allowed after the bricks are taken from the mold.

Size of the tile pieces is 5x8x12 and are recommended for use in all styles of buildings, including residences, garages, poultry houses and other structures. The firm has orders on hand for quite a quantity of the material and expect the business to expand rapidly, especially when finishing material for building becomes available.

### Oilbelt Teachers Convention, Abilene, March 22-23

For the first time in four years teachers of the 23 counties of the Oilbelt district, Unit No. VII, of the Texas State Teachers' association, will hold their annual convention in Abilene next week end, Friday night, March 22 and all day Saturday, March 23.

Principal drawing card for the convention will be three addresses by Dr. Kenneth McFarland, superintendent of schools at Topeka, Kansas. He will speak at the first general session Friday night, beginning at 7:30, at the second general session on Saturday morning, 9:30, and at the school executives luncheon at Wooten Hotel, Saturday, 12:30 noon.

In addition to the two general sessions, section meetings have been planned for Saturday afternoon which will be of interest to teachers of all grade levels and subjects. The elementary school classroom teachers will form the largest group and will assemble in the Abilene high school auditorium where H. A. Hefner, elementary school principal of Graham, will preside. Appearing before this group will be Dr. George P. Mechem, director of curriculum, of Corpus Christi public schools.

He will discuss "Answers to Questions of Teachers in Reading, Spelling and Language." Elementary School Principals section will hear Charles H. 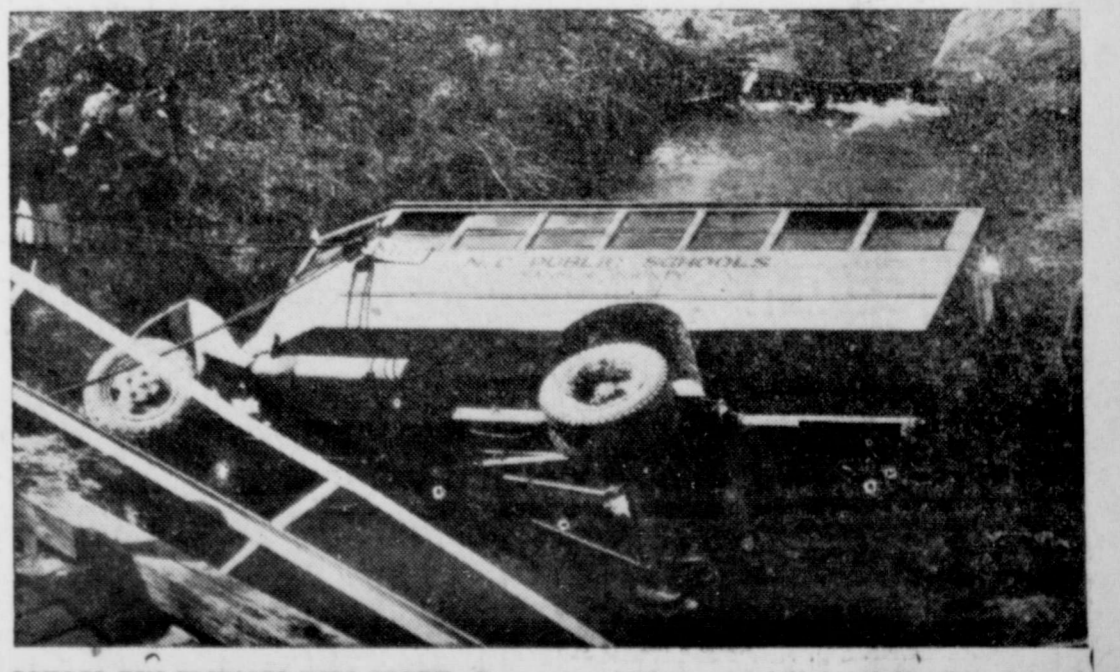

**SERVICE MEN DUE.** NEW YORK, Mar. 15. — More than 2,000 returning servicemen are scheduled to arrive today at two east coast ports aboard six transports, while 4,988 more personnel are due to disembark from seven vessels at two west coast ports. In addition, one ship with 454 Irish war brides and children is expected at New York, and one vessel with 145 personnel is scheduled for New Orleans.

**HEAVY NAVAL CUTS.** WASHINGTON, Mar. 15. (AP)—Informed sources revealed today that the budget bureau made a cut of \$2,075,000,000 in the navy's proposed \$6,300,000,000 budget for fiscal 1947.

**VETERANS COME FIRST.** WASHINGTON, Mar. 15. (AP)—A Civilian Production Administration official said today that priorities similar to those of wartime may be imposed on industrial construction in order to make more lumber available for building homes for veterans.

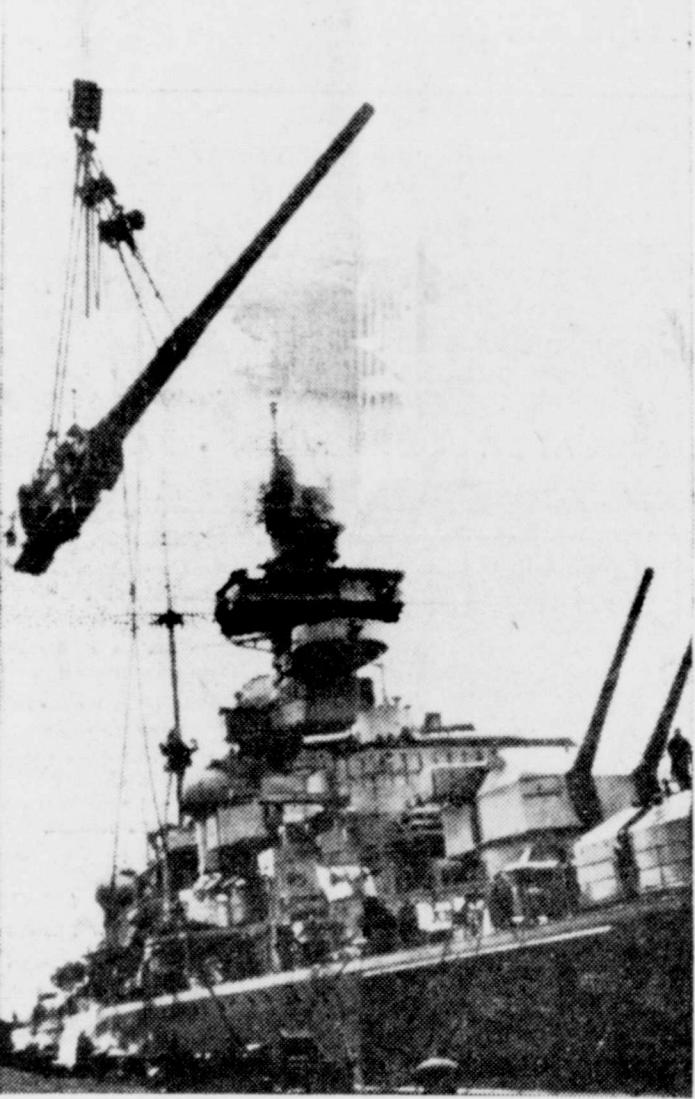

economic life of the community; but to discourage expensive activities of the federal government that tend to compete with the American business man and to hamper the principles of free enterprise and sound economy.

5—To consider the federal government's responsibilities as the guardian of all its people, to protect one group from wanton exploitation by another; and to establish between labor and management a permanent and sound basis for settling disputes, granting full and enforceable justice to the grievances of either party, possibly by the establishment by law of an unbiased Arbitration Court of qualified and well-paid judges, whose decisions would be backed by proper and just law.

6—To promote federal aid in a sound and reasonable way to our American educational endeavors and to facilitate in every way the state educational programs; looking at all times toward a secure future through competent and well-trained boys and girls.

7—To protect and strive to improve upon existing social legislation and the progress it has made in the form of old age pensions, social security, child labor laws, etc.

8—To work and to faithfully cooperate at all times to the best interests of our veterans, to facilitate immediate hospitalization to all those who need it, to observe the functions of the Veteran's Administration, and to assure all veterans of their rights under present legislation.

9—To encourage the removal as rapidly as possible of all governmental war time controls and to resort to temporary subsidies as a means of protecting minority economic groups such as the farmer, rancher, small business man, etc., during the economic flurries which will inevitably follow.

10—To remember at all times our position in world affairs, and that to maintain that position we must have sufficient armed force to carry on the principles of the United Nations and to insure its doctrine against violations, but this without the intent of becoming a militaristic power ourselves.

11—To closely observe the actions of our State Department in its promotion of our Foreign Relations and to try to insure the path of our nation against a course toward another world conflict. To promote the development of the United Nations as the one sound competitor to the use of armed force in settling international disputes.
