Rankin Resigns School Post

M. H. (Kenny) Rankin tendered his resignation as tax assessor and collector and business manager of Abernathy school district and the local school board accepted same in its meeting Monday night. Rankin, who held the school post for about three years, was named assistant to Edwin Hardesty, who assumed his duties as postmaster here Saturday. Hardesty follows George Ragland, who was named carrier for rural route 1. Ragland had been postmaster since 1927.

Rankin's successor in the school job had not been announced at press time.

Renfro Succeeds Ward As School Trustee

In a regular session Monday night, Abernathy school board accepted the resignation of Dan Z. Ward as a member of that body and named P. H. Renfro to fill his unexpired term, which will end April, 1943.

Ward received a commission as a first lieutenant in the army and left late last month for Aberdeen, Md., to take a refresher course before entering active duty. Lieut. Ward was an instructor in the vocational department of an Austin school before coming to Abernathy.

Renfro, who is employed at Tucco, received third high vote this Spring when patrons of the school district named two trustees.

Registration of all students will be held on that day following an opening program that morning in the auditorium. A teacher is needed for the music department. Mrs. Homer Bridges of this city was elected librarian and will be in charge of the study hall as well as the library. She was a teacher in the Science Hill school several years ago.

Children who have not reached the age of six years before Sept. 1, 1942, may start to school this year. All students must be vaccinated against smallpox and beginners must have a birth certificate, Mr. Swinburn said.

Abernathy school has contracted with Iowa Avenue school district to receive about 20 students from that district during the 1942-43 term, it is announced by W. V. Swinburn, superintendent of Abernathy schools.

PARAMOUNT NEWS

From the Log Of A Man At Sea

(Editor's note: The following letter to his wife and sons was written in the form of a log by Elmer Hurley, a former Abernathy man who is now in Naval construction service. Mrs. Hurley and their two sons are residing in San Angelo. Following is a note Mrs. Hurley sent the Review along with the letter: "Buford, here is a letter from Elmer if you care to publish it. It had been seven weeks since I had heard from him. It is the first I've had since he sailed May 25. Mae Hurley.")

May 27, Wednesday evening,
Somewhere in Pacific

My Dearest Susie & Boys:

I am starting a log of my trip since leaving Newport. Left Newport Wednesday morning at 8 o'clock by special pullman coach, 22 of us, and talk about a time, we really had one, but there is no need in telling you that, as you should have received some cards along the road. We arrived in San Francisco Saturday night at 11 o'clock, arrived at the receiving ship at 2 a. m. Left the ship at 5 (censored) transport in San Francisco Bay. We thought we would pull out that night but it was after (censored) left. We could not leave the ship after we got aboard. The first day out, I never saw so many sick people in my life, every place on the ship you would look you could see some one feeding the fish or they would be so sick they couldn't feed the fish, but so far I have managed to get by without getting sick. The sea has been a shade rough so far. We are now about 500 miles out, the weather looks a little stormy, no telling what we will run into tonight.

We have a tough time getting all we want to eat — only two meals a day and the water proposition is serious. I don't know what we are going to do for a bath, as we barely have enough water to drink. I think

I will have anywhere from 20 to 30 days of this, so I will write some each day, so, good night for this time.

May 28, 1942, about 2 p. m.
Well, everything has gone very good so far, nice and warm today. The sea isn't quite as rough as it has been. We had fire drill, boat drill and air-raid drill today. All of the ships have had rifle practice today. We have to wear our life preservers at all times, so most anything could happen. All of the boys are about over their sea sickness. I don't know for sure yet where we are going, but I will mail this in Honolulu. (Guess we didn't go by here for the censor marked it out, just wrote "no" by trolman warned.)

In 1940 there were more men than it if we go by there. I think we have about (censored) on this ship. I don't know where they are going either. This is about all that has happened today, will write some more tomorrow.

Sunday, May 31st.
Everything has gone very good so far, we should be about 2,400 miles out. I think we will start hitting some islands tomorrow or next day. The sun is really getting hot. It is so hot you can't hardly stay up on the top deck. The only thing I have seen was some flying fish, no whales, submarines or sharks. I am getting anxious to put my feet on land again, but I think we will have about 15 more days of this. Lubbock would really look good to me now. I finally got to take me a bucket bath.

Monday, June 1st.
I thought we were going to land today, a couple of sea gulls met us, but no land yet. This has been rather a pleasant day, has been cloudy, a little rain this morning, but when that sun comes out, it is really hot. Everyone is over their sea sickness and going good, (censored) yesterday, and everywhere you look you can see a crap game or poker game. I don't know how many more days

of this we are going to have, but we are supposed to cross the equator tonight or tomorrow that will put us close to (censored) you will have to get out your map to see just where I am.

Friday, June 5th.
Haven't seen land yet. It shouldn't be many days before we do. Every thing is going very nice, the only thing, it rains every hour or two. I have been trying to sleep on the top deck in my hammock, but just about the time I get to sleep, it starts raining. It only rains ten or fifteen minutes at a time, but it keeps that up nearly all night.

This is the tenth day at sea. I did not know there was so much water in the whole world, they say we are about half way to our destination now so I will write more later.

June 6th.
Every one had a thrill today (censored) met us, they were the first ships we had seen since we left Frisco. The weather is a lot cooler than it has been. Nothing else has happened so will write more in a day or two.

Sunday, June 7th.
Another Sunday at sea, and we haven't seen any land yet. I think we are going to miss all of the islands, we are supposed to be in New Zealand Friday, but of course I don't know for sure. The sea is really

303 Words S. J. R. No. 21
A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to appropriate Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on August 31st, 1937.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section, as follows: "The Legislature is authorized to appropriate so much money as may be necessary, not to exceed Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on Aug. 31st, 1937."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1942, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pay for building constructed for John Tarleton Agricultural College;" and

"Against the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pay for building constructed for John Tarleton Agricultural College."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expenses of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.

Dear Buford,

Well, here I am in the city in which General MacArthur was born. This is a nice camp. We are seven miles from Little Rock, Ark., up in the hills north of the city. We live in small hutments, six men to the hut. I live with three Oklahomans, a Texan and one man from Washington.

I have made good grades on all tests so far, and plan to go to officers training school after eight weeks here.

The army food is fine. In fact, I've gained two pounds after being in the army ten days.

It is very hot here. It was only 101 degrees yesterday. I stay soaking wet all the time. At the present time there is not a single dry thread in my shirt.

Tell the Home Guard to take my advice and train hard, because I see men of all ages here. None are too old. My roommates' ages are 46, 42, 36, 27 and 26. Your friend, Pvt. Hubert C. Settle, Co. B, 72nd Bn., 15th Rgt., 1st Plat., BIRTC, Camp Robinson, Ark.

Dear Buford,

I received my first copy of the Review Friday, and enjoyed reading it very much. Thanks for sending it. Abertnathy has become so much like home to me that I enjoy seeing what the folks are doing.

I am located in a very beautiful place here. We are just outside Colorado Springs, and can see Pike's Peak from our barracks windows. The camp is a new one, and locations and accommodations are the best I've seen.

Hope you can read this. There's no place to write except on the bed. Haven't much to write. Busy all the time. Get two weeks of basic training here in rifle, drill, gas, etc. Get shots in arm, typhoid and tetanus.
