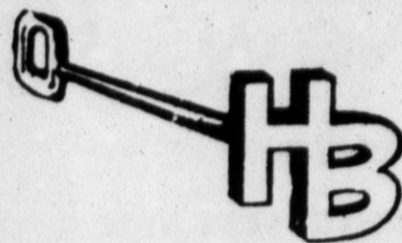

Cold arctic air brings hard freeze to much of state

By The Associated Press

Very cold Arctic air spread across Texas today, bringing freezing precipitation and a hard freeze to a vast area of the state.

Only the Texas gulf coast and extreme South Texas escaped the sub-freezing temperatures and bone-chilling wind chill index readings.

Travelers advisories were in effect because of ice on bridges and overpasses on roads across portions of North Texas and for icy roads in West Texas.

Clements' task force to review fiscal scene

AUSTIN (AP) — A budget review task force being appointed by Gov.-elect Bill Clements will look at all state agency spending for ways to save money, its chairman says.

Clements on Wednesday appointed Rep. Mike Toomey, R-Houston, to head the panel which will make recommendations to the incoming governor before the 1987 Legislature convenes in January.

Toomey has been a member of the House Appropriations Committee, which helps write the state budget every two years. He was a member of the House-Senate conference committee which cut more than \$500 million from state appropriations during this summer's two special legislative sessions.

In a telephone interview from his Houston office, Toomey said the review panel will consider all options for holding down state spending, including cuts the Legislature to date hasn't looked at. He said he hopes to begin meetings next week.

"There are a lot of things that we (in the Legislature) didn't do. In my opinion, we didn't do a zero-based budgeting approach," he said.

Such an approach starts the budgeting process with no money for an agency, then requires it to justify all proposed spending.

Northerly winds at 5-20 mph hour prevailed across the state and brought wind chill factors in many sections of West Texas and North Texas to well below zero.

Wind chill factors recorded around the state this morning include -12 at Wichita Falls, -4 at Abilene, -3 at Waco, an even 0 at Fort Worth, 2 above at Lubbock and Midland and 6 above at Amarillo.

Most of the state has cloudy skies early today and patches of drizzle and light rain were common across the state. In many areas that drizzle and light rain took the form of sleet or freezing rain and some isolated snow flurries were reported.

Forecasts called for occasional snow in the mountains of West Texas, patches of freezing rain over sections of North Texas and West Texas and the Hill Country of South Central Texas tonight and Friday morning.

A winter storm watch that had been issued for portions of West Texas tonight has been canceled. The National Weather Service says there may be from 1-3 inches of snowfall in some areas of West Texas tonight.

Forecasters say there is a slight chance of freezing precipitation again Friday morning. A warming trend will begin late Friday and continue Saturday.

Lows tonight will be mostly in the 30s, ranging from the 20s in North Texas and Northwest Texas to the 40s in extreme South Texas.

Highs Friday will be in the 40s and 50s over North Texas, West Texas and in the 50s and 60s in South Texas.

Early morning temperatures were mostly in the 20s and 30s except in extreme South Texas where readings are in the lower 50s. Extremes ranged from 12 at Amarillo to 52 at Galveston.

Other early morning temperatures around the state include 20 at Wichita Falls, 24 at Fort Worth, 28 at Waco, 33 at Austin, 40 at Corpus Christi, 45 at Brownsville, 26 at San Angelo, 18 at Lubbock, 24 at Midland and 32 at El Paso.

Whites may become minority in U.S.

WASHINGTON (AP) — High immigration rates pose the possibility that a century from now the European whites who have dominated the nation will slip to minority status, a private population group reports.

Low birth rates among the current population, coupled with immigration estimated at 1 million annually — legal and illegal — could result in

Hispanics, blacks and Asians constituting more than half the population by the year 2080, the new report speculates.

"The nation must once again redefine itself," reports the study, "Immigration to the U.S.: The Unfinished Story," published by the private, non-profit Population Reference Bureau.

Major population changes are not unheard of in American history, a land where American Indians were succeeded by Northern European whites and black slaves. At the turn of this century Italians, Greeks, Poles and others from the south and east of Europe flooded in, vastly changing the complexion of the nation.

Today the flow stems largely from Asia and Latin America, the study notes.

"One thing is clear: The nation's ethnic composition is again changing dramatically. This is an opportunity and a challenge."

"If illegal immigration remains high and annual immigration averages 1 million, the non-Hispanic white population would drop to just under 50 percent in 2080," the new study said.

The report was written by Leon F. Bouvier, a population researcher and former vice president of the Population Reference Bureau, and Robert W. Gardner, a research associate at the East-West Population Institute in Honolulu.

The 1980 Census counted 226.5 million Americans, of which 79.9 percent were whites other than Hispanics. The Census said 11.7 percent of Americans were black, 6.4 percent were Hispanic and 2.0 percent were Asians and others.

At current high immigration rates, the non-Hispanic whites could shrink to 49.8 percent of the population by the year 2080 — becoming "the largest minority in a nation without any ethnic majority population."

At that time Hispanics would make up 23.4 percent of the nation, having surpassed blacks as the second largest group in 2010.

President's report sees families as victims of liberal programs

WASHINGTON (AP) — A report today to President Reagan by a special administration task force charges that the fabric of American family life has been torn by two decades of liberal social experiments, from no-fault divorce laws to permissive sex to the easy availability of welfare.

The task force on the family, in a report authored by its chairman, Gary L. Bauer, undersecretary of education, endorses restrictions on welfare for unmarried teen-age mothers, exhorts the courts to back off rulings that undermine traditional family mores and urges the government to resist social engineering and lighten the tax burden on families.

Bauer was releasing the 70-page report, "The Family: Preserving America's Future," at a news conference today. He presented the recommendations at the White House on Wednesday to the Domestic Policy Council, and it will be discussed at a Cabinet meeting with the president in several weeks.

The report hews closely to Reagan's own conservative views, arguing that the government can best help families by interfering in their lives as little as possible.

It also challenges conventional wisdom on teen-age sex.

"Contrary to the old excuse, everybody is not doing it. Adolescent sex is on the decline," the report said.

Citing data from the National Center for Health Statistics and other surveys, the report said, "Several studies indicate the percentage of American teen-agers sexually active declined between 1979 and 1982. Almost half of all unmarried 18-year-old girls are virgins."

"On drugs, we are now sending an absolute message of 'no' to our children," the report said. "On sex, we're still stuck in the '60s, trying to make the best of unacceptable conduct."

The report says the poor — minorities in particular — have paid the biggest price for the liberal, let-

Court upholds TRLA award

The 5th Circuit Court of Appeals has upheld an award of \$200,000 granted to farm workers who sued Griffin & Brand produce shed of Hereford.

The class action lawsuit accused Griffin & Brand of violations of the Farm Labor Contractor Registration Act during the cantaloupe harvest of 1977 in Presidio. Texas Rural Legal Aid filed the case with private attorney James Herrmann, former director of the TRLA Farm Worker Division.

Violations found in the case were that the produce packers had failed to inform the workers in writing of the correct terms of employment, failed to provide promised work and misrepresented terms of employment.

Each farm worker received \$500 for each of the violations.

The \$200,000 is the largest amount ever awarded in Texas under the act, according to a press release by TRLA.

The appellate court has remanded the case to the trial judge to determine whether additional damages and attorneys' fees should be awarded.

Illegal schemes becoming popular

HOUSTON (AP) — Twenty-five people, many who had been fired or were about to be laid off, have been charged with participating in an endless chain scheme that Houston police say has become popular in these oil-tough times.

Police Sgt. Mike Landry said many of those charged Tuesday in the upper-middle class neighborhood did not know each other. They used code names such as Hope, Charity, Midas and Hot Tuna.

"There were ex-oil folks, ex-investment folks," he said. "I must have talked to 12 people, and every one had been fired lately or was about to get laid off. Most were kind of down and out and thought it would be a way to make some easy money."

The 25 were charged with participating in an endless chain scheme, a class B misdemeanor. Seven others were released without charges.

Authorities also seized \$7,000 at the townhouse where the arrests took place Monday night. It was the third such raid to occur in the area in the past two weeks.

"It's a vicious cycle," Landry said. "There's a bunch of (schemes) in Houston."

Besides losing their original investment, those charged face up to six months in jail and a \$1,000 fine if convicted. Each also had to post an \$800 bond.

To play the game, a person puts in \$500 to be a "passenger," and then recruits others to work his way up to "pilot." Once a pilot, he can walk out of the "airplane" with thousands of dollars, while those below him continue the chain.

Landry said such schemes are illegal but common. Officers have cracked down on them recently because of an increasing number of complaints coming mostly from people who have lost money.

"For every one person who makes money, you have to add eight people to the game," Landry said. "On paper and in person, it's an easy scheme and everybody ought to make money."

"But eventually, you're going to run out of friends, and the one that started it gets all the money and the rest of them hate him," he said.

Pentagon studies data banks

WASHINGTON (AP) — Pentagon officials say they will take steps to limit access to unclassified government and business computer data banks as part of a Reagan administration effort to make it more difficult for hostile governments to acquire technical and economic information.

Officials from the Defense Department, FBI and CIA already have approached the computer data bank industry, company officials say, to ask them how to best control access to electronically stored information.

In an interview Wednesday, Diane Fountaine, director for information systems in the office of Assistant Defense Secretary Donald C. Latham, said she was attempting to let the information industry know "we are very serious about protecting information, including unclassified but sensitive information."

At the same time, John Poindexter, President Reagan's national security adviser, has signed a memorandum creating a new "sensitive" classification, further restricting access to government information, The Washington Post reported in today's editions.

Poindexter signed the memorandum Nov. 6, the Post reported. It gives federal agency heads the power to label information "sensitive," which would prohibit it from being distributed outside the government — and into data banks.

Canadian plan to be tested

WASHINGTON (AP) — A successful Canadian program for helping workers find new jobs after, or even before, they get caught by plant closings and mass layoffs will be tested next year in six states.

Iowa, Michigan, New Jersey, New York, Ohio and Vermont each will get \$20,000 under grants approved Wednesday by the Labor Department to foster reemployment labor-management committees at two companies in each state anticipating large layoffs in 1987.

Responding to mounting criticism that the Reagan administration is doing too little too late to help the nearly 2 million workers displaced annually by layoffs and plant closings, Labor Secretary William Brock agreed earlier this year to take a close look at a heralded Canadian worker reemployment program.

The congressional Office of Technology Assessment said in a report in September that it usually takes three to five months for the Labor Department to get job training and placement aid to displaced workers after a layoff is announced.

Because most employers provide less than two weeks notice of layoffs or plant closings — and many give none — the government aid is seldom timely or effective, the OTA report said.

The trial experiments in the six states will be modeled on the two-decade-old Canadian Industrial Adjustment Service, a small government agency with a record of finding new jobs — usually within a year or less — for 66 of every 100 workers displaced by plant closings.

Thatcher's son engaged to Texan

LONDON (AP) — Mark Thatcher, son of the British prime minister, and Diane Burgdorf, the daughter of a Dallas millionaire, announced their engagement today with a discreet announcement on page 20 of the London Times.

In a brasher tone, the British domestic news agency Press Association trumpeted: "Miss Burgdorf comes straight out of the TV soap opera 'Dallas' — she is fashionably dressed, immaculately groomed, brimming with self-confidence."

The brief paid ad on the Times' Court and Social page appeared as the first of 12 couples' engagement announcements in the "Forthcoming marriages" column. Details of when and where the wedding would take place were not announced.

Acting on a tip thought to have come from Downing St. that an engagement announcement was imminent, British newspapers, radio and television reported Wednesday that the couple were believed engaged.

Thatcher, 33, stayed poker-faced, telling reporters "no comment" when he and his 25-year-old fiancée appeared Wednesday at 10 Downing St., the prime minister's official residence.

Press Association said the fiancée, who runs a real estate business in Dallas, is the daughter of Theodore and Lois Burgdorf.

It said their fortune was founded on Burgdorf's auto dealership, Burgdorf Chevrolet Inc., based at Pittsburg, Texas, about 100 miles east of Dallas.

Press reports said Wednesday that Thatcher and his fiancée are expected to marry in Dallas early next year and will live in Texas. Thatcher works in Dallas as a sales executive with the British company Lotus Cars, reportedly earning \$64,000 annually.

Thatcher and his unmarried twin sister Carol are the only children of Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher, 61, and Denis Thatcher, 71. Mrs. Thatcher, who flies to Washington on Friday for talks with President Reagan, has said publicly she is impatient to become a grandmother.

Texas family to sell \$2 million sapphire

KILGORE, Texas (AP) — A \$10 investment by two boys may net them a large trust fund if a star sapphire purchased with the money is sold by their father.

Roy Whetstine bought the 1,906-carat sapphire in rough form at an amateur gem show in Tucson, Ariz., in February. It has since been appraised at \$2.28 million, his agent said Wednesday.

Whetstine is selling the stone so that his sons could "be set up financially for the rest of their lives," said Jim Griffin, a Longview jeweler and agent for the Whetstine family.

Griffin said he has named the stone the "Life and Pride of America's Star."

Although the sapphire has been ap-

praised as high as \$2.28 million, Whetstine said Wednesday that he believed that he may get \$1.5 million on the market.

Johnathan, 11, and Stephen Whetstine, 4, each gave their father \$5 to bring something back from the Tucson gem show. On a whim, Whetstine bypassed the professional gem dealers and went to an area where more than 5,000 gem dealers were displaying their wares.

Whetstine found the egg-shaped, brown-and-black stone in a box of rocks priced at \$15, and realized he had made a valuable find.

"You want \$15 for this?" Whetstine asked, holding the potato-sized stone. The dealer promptly cut the price to \$10.

Production cuts urged for Texas oil

AUSTIN (AP) — Proposals to trim Texas oil production in an attempt to stabilize oil prices have been taken under consideration by the Texas Railroad Commission.

The cut in statewide allowable production, opposed by major oil firms, was argued Wednesday by two Dallas independent oil producers. Texas has had so-called 100 percent monthly allowables since April 1979.

William Burrow and H.S. Bennett asked the commission to consider cutting the monthly production time by three or five days, which they said would avoid waste and eventually boost sagging oil prices.

Susan Cory, commission chief counsel who conducted the hearing, asked if they realized only about 500 of the state's 232,000 oil wells actually pump 100 percent every month for a total of about 141,000 barrels per day.

"Ten percent (three days reduction) would mean only 14,000

barrels," she said.

"That's a beginning," Burrow said.

Bennett said if Texas reduced its production, he believed Louisiana and Oklahoma would follow.

"Those three states, with Alaska, produce more than 60 percent of the U.S. oil," he said.

Major producers, joined by many of the state's independents, told the hearing that such a reduction would cost oil producers and the state millions of dollars.

"A 10 percent reduction in the Texas state allowable will not in any way strengthen our domestic energy industry and will have a significant negative impact on Texas," said Everett Hutchinson, spokesman for Exxon Corp.

"If this 10 percent reduction went into effect, Mobil would have to shut in 300 wells in Texas," said R.J. Swaggett, speaking for Mobil Production of Texas and New Mexico.

Burrow said he and Bennett

A star sapphire is an opaque stone marked by a white criss-cross. Sapphires are a type of mineral known as corundum, which also includes rubies. Sapphires usually are dark blue.

Griffin said after having the stone authenticated by the Gem Trade Laboratory Inc., a subsidiary of the Gemological Institute of America, other experts declared the stone was larger than "The Star of Queensland," a star sapphire found in 1948 in Australia.

That stone weighed 1,156 carats in its rough form, which is more than 700 carats smaller than the "Life and Pride of America's Star," said Griffin.

According to Griffin, an appraisal

by the L.A. Ward Gem Lab of Fallbrook, Calif., estimated the market value of the Whetstine sapphire at \$2,000 per carat when cut and finished. The rough stone was appraised at \$1,200 per carat, said Griffin.

Cal Thompson of the Tucson Gem and Mineral Society, which puts on a gem show every February in Tucson, said in a telephone interview Wednesday night that Whetstine's discovery shows how easily a wholesale gem dealer could buy a bunch of rocks and put them up for sale without studying them all in detail.

In the 30 years the Tucson show has been going on, "There have been some fantastic sales," Thompson said.

"T. Boone said a 25-day production schedule would firm oil prices and I think he's right," Burrow said.

Ms. Cory said the three-member commission will decide Monday at its regular weekly meeting whether to give a decision on the proposal on Nov. 17. The commission, which did not hear Wednesday's arguments, also could ask her to make a report and a recommendation at a later time, she said.

Supporting Burrow's request was W.R. Edwards, a Houston energy consultant, who said the commission's current method of using estimates of market demand from refiners produced surpluses.

"Low prices are obtained by surplus supplies," Edwards said. "Nominations now exceed the

market demand. The Railroad Commission should have reduced allowables by 30 percent during the last 10 months to meet market demand.

"The curtailment of production and reduction of the surplus will result in a rapid recovery of prices to oil producers," Edwards said.

Burrow also proposed that any major company that increases its imports next year be penalized by reducing its domestic production the same amount.

Bennett said he was not backing the import penalty.

Rex White, speaking for the Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association, said the reduction would cause independents "further trouble at the bank."

Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association said a 10 percent reduction would be equal to a severance tax loss to the state on crude oil of \$9 million annually.

Scientist working to eliminate worms

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) — Scientists are working on a project that may give parasites and ultimately farmers the upper hand in the battle against worms that annually destroy millions of dollars of

crops, officials say.

The result also may help reduce the amount of pesticides farmers spray on their crops, Texas A&M University researchers said Wednesday.

Retired Air Force nurse finds horses keep her even busier in retirement

WICHITA FALLS, Texas (AP) — Louise Marshall says she rides the "Cadillac" of horses, the Paso Fino, believed to be the oldest true native breed of horse in the Western Hemisphere.

Ms. Marshall, a retired Air Force colonel, raises the relatively rare breed at her stables on Anchor Road. "These horses don't trot — they have a smooth gait — a four-beat lateral gait," Ms. Marshall said. "In Argentina, the Paso Finos are used as cattle horses."

There are only 9,000 Paso Finos in the United States, Ms. Marshall says, and she owns six of them.

"Back in Elkhart, Ind., my dad put me on a plow horse when I was six," she says, adding, "I really knew nothing about horses. I had to read about them. But this is what I've always wanted to do."

Ms. Marshall says she read about the Paso Finos in Western Horseman magazine and purchased her first one in Greenville, a gray mare. She says the Paso Finos have replaced golf, photography and the club work that once filled a great deal of her leisure time.

Ms. Marshall bought her home in Wichita Falls when she was stationed at Sheppard Air Force Base in 1972. She returned to make that a permanent home when she retired in 1980 from Wright-Patterson Air Force Base in Ohio.

A graduate of Wayne State University and the University of Illinois at Chicago Medical Center, Ms. Marshall is a veteran of the Korean and

Vietnam wars, where she served as a flight nurse, assisting in transporting the wounded and prisoners of war. Later in her military career she also was an administrator and educator.

"I had a good career," Marshall said of her 30 years in the military, "but I was ready for this."

On a hot, windy autumn day, Ms. Marshall had just finished "putting up 250 bales of hay by myself."

She says she doesn't believe age is a hindrance to doing what a person wants to do. "It's the mileage that counts," she said.

S. Brad Vinson, an entomologist in A&M's College of Agriculture and project leader, says the scientists are looking into the possibility of artificially rearing hundreds of thousands of tiny mosquito-like parasites.

The parasite, campoletis, lays its eggs in the larvae of a worm that destroys a variety of crops, including cotton, tomatoes, pecans, sorghum, soybeans and lettuce.

"The eggs thrive in the worms and kill them. Once the egg hatches and kills the worm, the newborn parasite goes out and finds more worms to kill," he said.

"The parasites help out in the battle against insect pests, but there aren't enough of them," he added. "For every 100 worms, there may be only 50 parasites. The parasites are always behind."

Vinson wants to raise the parasites in laboratory conditions.

In addition to learning how to artificially rear parasites, Vinson said the scientists also are investigating how to better attract the parasites to fields of crops.

Vinson said one problem with using pesticides on the worms is that the beneficial parasites are more susceptible to the poison, while the harmful worms quickly become resistant to it.

She explained the gait which is performed at three speeds:

Classic Fino, classic show ring gait, is performed with the horse fully balanced and demonstrating a rapid, steady, unbroken rhythm of the hoofs and slow forward speed.

Paso Corto is an ideal trail and pleasure type gait.

Paso Largo is the speed form of the gait and the same beat is maintained while the rider appears almost motionless in the saddle.

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Whitefaces have destiny in own hands

Herd hosts Borger in battle for playoffs

The 1986 District 1-4A season all comes down to a climax of a game Friday night for the Hereford Whitefaces, when they host Borger at 7:30 p.m. at Whiteface Stadium in the regular season finale.

At stake is a bi-district playoff berth. Hereford enters the game with a 6-1 district record, and Borger is

tied for third place with Canyon with 5-2 marks.

Lubbock Estacado, which stands in the top spot in the district with a 6-0-1 record, hosts Pampa in its final district game. Estacado beat Borger 27-24 last Friday.

Canyon, which hosts Frenship on Friday night, can only make the playoffs if ties for second place with Hereford and Borger—and wins a

coin flip. If Canyon does beat Frenship, here are the three mathematical possibilities, depending on the outcomes of the Hereford-Borger and Estacado-Pampa games:

1. If Hereford beats Borger and Pampa upsets Estacado: Hereford wins the district championship with a 7-1 record, Estacado places second at 6-1-1, Canyon placed third at 6-2, and Borger fourth at 5-3.

2. If Hereford beats Borger and Estacado beats Pampa: Estacado wins the district title with a 7-0-1 record, Hereford placed second with a 7-1 record, Canyon third at 6-2 and Borger fourth at 5-3.

3. If Borger defeats Hereford, along with Canyon beating Frenship, there would be a three-way tie for second place, each team with a 6-2 record. Estacado would finish in first place, no matter what happened against Pampa, in this case.

Also in the last case, a Canyon loss instead of a win over Frenship would mean a second place tie between Hereford and Borger.

But both the Whitefaces and Bulldogs need nobody to explain it to them. Both know what this game means for the 1986 season.

"We're the only one of the three teams that really control our own destiny," Hereford Coach Don Cumpton said. "It's an advantage for us, because the others can only hope for a coin flip."

"Our players have worked hard, the intensity's been good, and the concentration's been good. The players know what they have to do," Cumpton adds.

The Borger offensive leaders that the Whiteface defense will particularly need to shut down are running back Jerry Don Sweatt and quarterback Charles Walker.

"Borger is throwing the ball much more than they have in the past. They are very balanced offensively like we are," Cumpton said, noting that Borger has 1,504 yards rushing and 1,197 yards passing this season.

Hereford has 1,690 yards rushing and 1,128 yards passing. Hereford has averaged 312.0 yards total offense per game, and Borger has averaged 300.1 yards.

Sweatt is the workhorse in the Bulldog backfield, with 1,151 yards rushing for the season. He is averaging six yards per carry and 127.9 yards per game, and has scored 16 touchdowns.

"Sweatt is real quick and has tremendous balance," Cumpton said. "We'll have to do a really good job of tackling him."

Quarterback Walker has completed 83 of 166 passes for 1,103 yards, with nine touchdown passes and eight interceptions.

"Walker plays free safety on defense. He's probably Borger's best athlete," Cumpton said. "They've got three receivers they like to throw to, each has more than 18 catches. Walker spreads it out pretty good."

Those three receivers are Brad Knight with 22 catches for 277 yards and three touchdowns, Robinett with 19 catches for 330 yards and two touchdowns, and Don Coffey with 18 catches for 240 yards and one touchdown.

Cumpton said that Walker and middle linebacker Mark Neas rank as Borger's top two defensive players.

Hereford's balanced offensive attack is led by running backs Mark Artho and Vincent Brown, quarterback Todd Shire and receiver Bobby Baker.

Artho and Brown has rushed for a combined 1,234 yards. Artho is second in the district in rushing yardage with 829 in 135 attempts.

Brown has rushed 86 times for 405 yards and nine touchdowns. Artho has scored five touchdowns rushing.

Shire's passing statistics for nine games are 1,034 yards with 81 completions in 153 attempts. He has thrown 13 touchdown passes and has been intercepted four times.

Baker leads all other District 1-4A receivers by a wide margin with his 46 catches for 607 yards and eight touchdowns. Borger's Knight and Dumas' Mike DePaul are second in the district with 22 receptions each.

Two other Hereford players are in double figures in receptions. Marcus Brown, who has rushed 66 times for 284 yards and four touchdowns, has caught 11 passes for 159 yards and two touchdowns. Chris Johnson has 10 catches for 132 yards and one touchdown.

"This ought to be a real good football game. Statistically, both teams are even offensively and defensively," Coach Cumpton said.

"In a game of this magnitude, with so much at stake, turnovers, mistakes, and the kicking game will be big factors," Cumpton adds.

Opposing offensive units have averaged 238.0 yards per game against the Whiteface defense, including 149.9 yards rushing per game. The Bulldog defense has allowed 241.8 yards per game, including 184.5 yards rushing per game.

Borger uses a multiple offensive formation, basically with the wing-T formation. Cumpton said the Bulldogs employ lots of shifting and motion from that offense. On defense, Borger uses a pro style 6-1 pattern.

Coach Cumpton reported that because of injuries, defensive tackle Brent Berry will be out of the lineup Friday and left guard Tim Koenig is questionable. Berry injured a knee in practice Tuesday.

Cumpton said Jim Bob Parker would probably in place of Koenig, if Koenig is not able to play, and that Richard Dobbins, Chad Clements and Walter Brockman will see action at the defensive tackle position.

Berry is one of eight Herd defensive players with at least 40 tackles in the Whitefaces' nine games this season. Berry has 56 tackles, second only to linebacker Michael Phibbs' 78 tackles.

The others with 40 or more tackles are: linebacker Trent Bowling, 55; defensive back Ricky Ruiz, 54; defensive tackle Lee Young, 48; defensive back Fidencio Cantu, 43; defensive end Derrell Page, 41; and defensive back Robby Collier, 40.

Phibbs led the Hereford defense with eight tackles in the game against Estacado. Ruiz, Berry, and Tim Long each had six tackles, and Collier, Young, and Rodney McCracken each had five tackles.

The District 1-4A champion will go against Sweetwater in the bi-district playoffs, and the 1-4A runnerup will play Big Spring in a bi-district game.

Big Spring clinched the District 2-4A championship last week with a 27-17 win over Snyder. Big Spring, which hosts Andrews Friday, is 7-0 in district play and 8-1 overall.

Sweetwater, which suffered its on-

ly district loss to Big Spring, hosts San Angelo Lake View Friday. Sweetwater is 6-1 in the district and 8-1 overall. Big Spring and Sweetwater both beat Monahans, the district's third place team.

But before the bi-district playoffs come along, there's some unsettled business in District 1-4A. And Hereford has its playoff destiny in its own hands, whereas Borger and Canyon do not.

Two weeks ago, at the Hereford-Estacado game, the Estacado cheerleaders held up a sign at halftime that was supposed to read, "We ain't done till we're No. 1."

However, the "n" on the word "done" appeared to have a tail on it, making it look like a "g." That made one think the "e" in "done" looked like an "s," and as a result the sign appeared to read, "We ain't dogs till we're No. 1."

Could that have had something to do with Estacado's game against Borger, in which the Matadors escaped from Bulldog Stadium in Borger with a 27-24 win over Borger last week?

The Hereford Whitefaces, meanwhile, go into Friday's game thinking, "It ain't going to be the 'Dogs in the playoffs.'"

Be careful, and we'll see you on the sideline.

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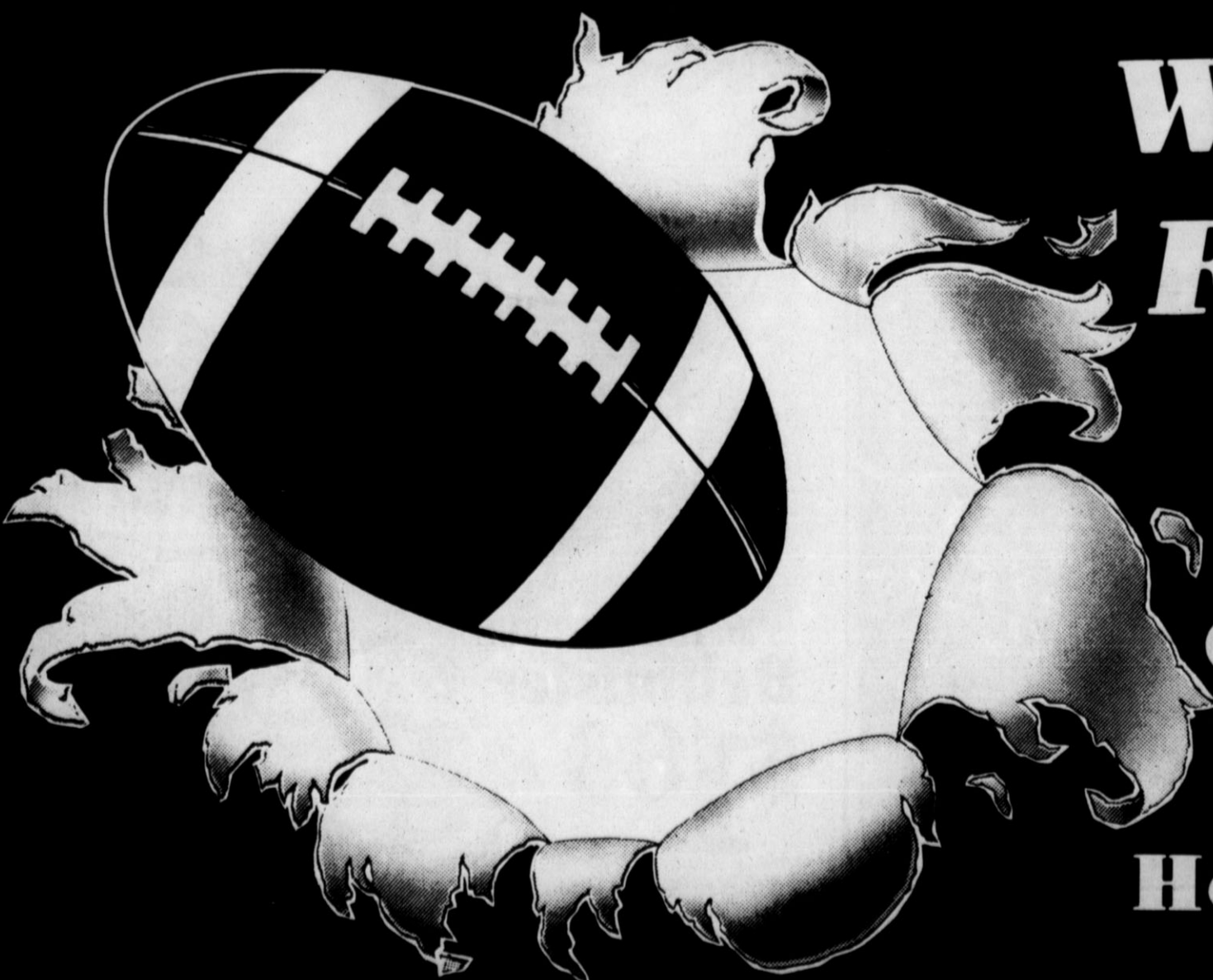
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Trailed Houston by 10 points in second quarter

Dallas Mavericks rout Rockets, 114-85

DALLAS (AP) — It took the Dallas Mavericks most of the first half to get into the game, but when they did, they made it a long night for the Houston Rockets.

Rolando Blackman scored 31 points to lead the Mavericks to a 114-85 rout of the Houston Rockets in an NBA game Wednesday night.

It was a blowout, but in the early going it appeared that it might be Rockets blowout.

The Mavericks trailed by 10 points early in the second quarter before Blackman scored 10 straight points to lead a Dallas rally that gave the Mavericks the lead for good.

"It was very tough," Blackman said. "We were trying to put points on the board and in the early going, it just wasn't working out. We had gotten in a bad state of mind."

Memories of Tuesday night's 104-103 loss to the Utah Jazz may have been bothering Dallas, Blackman said. The Mavericks held a seven-point lead in that game with less than 30 seconds remaining, but couldn't nail down the victory.

"We started pressing a little and things like Tuesday night's game (a 104-103 loss at Utah) started creeping into my mind," Blackman said. "I started asking for the ball and I just got into a good flow offensively. In those situations where you are asking for the ball, you want to be able to hit."

The Mavericks, 4-3, were behind, 40-30 with 5:55 remaining in the second quarter, but Blackman scored 12 of the team's 17-0 run to give Dallas a 47-40 lead before Akeem Olajuwon scored with 1:43 remaining.

Dallas held a 52-48 halftime lead and continued their attack in the third quarter as they outscored the Rockets, 32-20, for an 84-68 lead at the start of the fourth quarter.

The Rockets, 4-2, got a game-high 32 points from Olajuwon, but Houston could never get closer than 15 points in the fourth period.

Derek Harper added 20 points and Mark Aguirre and Sam Perkins added 16 and 15, respectively for Dallas.

Olajuwon, who led all rebounders with 11, was the only Houston player to score in double figures.

Another indication of the blowout was in rebounding, where Dallas won the battle of the boards, 52-38. Perkins and center James Donaldson led Dallas with 10 rebounds each.

In other NBA games, it was Boston 124, Milwaukee 116; Washington 101, Chicago 99; Detroit 108, Phoenix 100;

Sacramento 110, Denver 106, and the Los Angeles Lakers 122, Seattle 97.

Celtics 124, Bucks 116

With Larry Bird ejected from the game, Danny Ainge, Bill Walton and Scott Wedman out with injuries and Coach K.C. Jones at home with the flu, it didn't figure to be Boston's night.

But the Celtics, led by reserve forward Fred Roberts, hardly missed a beat Wednesday night when they extended their home winning streak to 44 games with a 124-116 victory over the Milwaukee Bucks.

The 6-foot-10 Roberts came off the bench to score 23 points, pull down 12 rebounds and add six assists in 34 minutes. He had 12 points and nine rebounds in the decisive third period.

"I knew I had to play 100 percent," said Roberts, signed a few weeks ago as a free agent. "I didn't want to look pretty — just scrap and help us get a win."

Bullets 101, Bulls 99

Washington's Jeff Malone, whose specialty is hitting jumpshots from the outside, was surprised when Chicago crowded him. And he made the most of it, accounting for five points on driving layups down the stretch.

"A lot of people don't play me close, so I take jumpers," said Malone, who scored 30 points. "But (Elston) Turner and Michael (Jordan) were on me way outside, so I went by and made the move."

Moses Malone scored 33 points to lead the Bullets, who blew a 13-point lead but hung on to edge the Bulls and end a three-game losing streak.

Pistons 106, Suns 100

Isiah Thomas was satisfied with Detroit's victory but not its offense.

"We've still got a ways to go, in terms of offense," said Thomas, who led the Pistons with 31 points. "During the course of the season, the shots will fall."

BREAKING THE ICE

Aperitifs are an important consideration for any wine dinner. Coming first, they set the tone for what is to come. The term "aperitif" derives from the Latin word "aperire," which means "to open." Aperitifs set up the palate for the rest of the evening. Depending on what is served, they can dull the appetite and anesthetize the palate. Or, they can stimulate and awaken the taste buds. Martinis, highballs, and other potent alcoholic drinks tend to dull the palate. In order not to ruin a carefully planned meal with accompanying wines, light alcoholic drinks or wines are best. Try sherry, vermouth or other aperitif wines to begin.

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Harrison in dual roles this month

NEW YORK (AP) — Gregory Harrison didn't even have to change his shirt, or his more frequent lack of one, when he moved from serious to satirical in two very different "mysterious stranger" roles.

Harrison plays the handsome wanderer, Hal, in "Picnic," the William Inge play about sexual desire in the heartland, circa 1953. Produced by Harrison's own production company, it airs this month on Showtime.

In the CBS miniseries "Fresno," a sendup of nighttime soaps beginning Sunday, Harrison is the hunk, Torch.

"I play a mysterious stranger who comes into town," he said in an interview in New York. "In fact, I'm wearing the same exact wardrobe I wear in 'Picnic' — a pair of boots, Levis and no shirt, although I always have the shirt over my shoulder or in the back of my pants. And if I get real emotional, I shift it from my left shoulder to my right."

Harrison got his big break playing Dr. "Gonzo" Gates in "Trapper

John, M.D." With the clout that came from a successful series, Harrison formed Catalina Production Group Ltd. six years ago. (He grew up on Catalina Island off the coast of Southern California.)

A successful production of "The Hasty Heart" for Showtime in 1983 led to the deal to do "Picnic." Its all-star cast includes Rue McClanahan, Michael Learned, Dick Van Patten and Jennifer Jason Leigh.

The play, Harrison said, was something he had always wanted to do, but the comedy "Fresno" was more difficult.

The miniseries, centered around feuding raisin empires, stars Carol Burnett, Dabney Coleman, Charles Grodin and Teri Garr.

"It was one of the most difficult things I've ever done," he said. "Having to act in scenes with Carol Burnett that were so well written and so, so funny in the first place, then to have to keep a straight face on camera was a real challenge."

Though it is his first on-screen

comedy, Harrison won't be going for laughs, he said.

"I pretty much play it straight. I play it as though I mean it. I mean, that's why I laugh at 'Dallas.' They actually act like they think this isn't a bunch of crap, and I thought, well, that's funny to me, so I'm going to play this like I think it's important."

He said he had played Hal "several times for five minutes" doing scenes from "Picnic" in theater workshops. For movie fans, the role is strongly identified with William Holden.

"The movie is one of my all-time favorites. But you know the play of 'Picnic' is a lot different from the movie," Harrison said. "It was a William Holden vehicle, the movie. The play is more of a statement about women than about the character that William Holden played and that I play. It's about all the variations on womanhood much more than it is about some sexy guy."

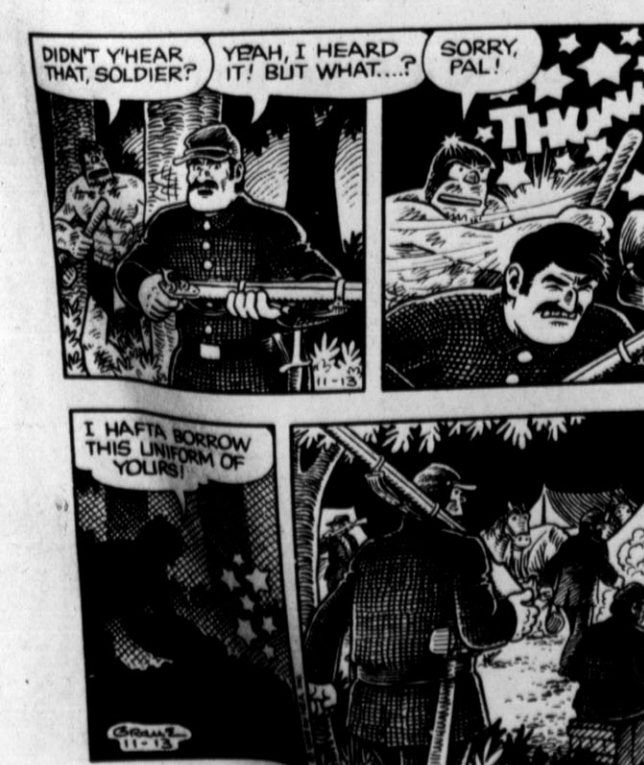

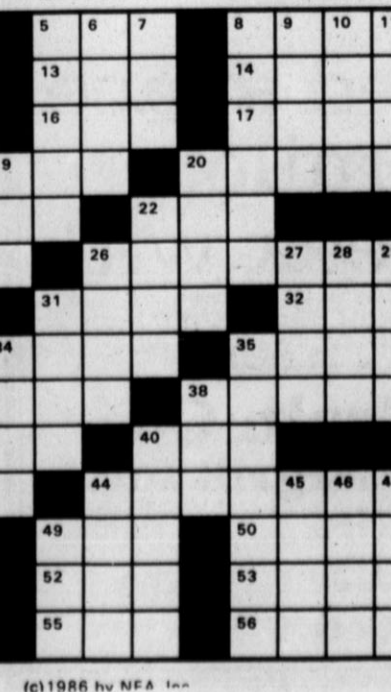
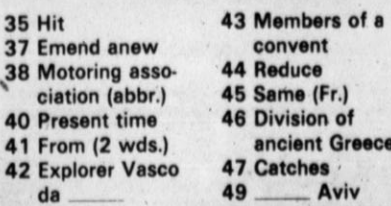

Teachers still think about quitting

NEW YORK (AP) — Salary gains and other improvements during the past year failed to reduce the number of public school teachers who want to leave the profession, a new survey has found.

A majority of teachers said they endorse many of the aims of school reformers, but only little more than a third said they think reform has helped teachers, according to findings released Tuesday in the third annual Louis Harris poll of teacher viewpoints.

According to the poll, commissioned by the Metropolitan Life Insurance Co., 55 percent of the teachers said they have seriously

considered quitting the classroom, compared with 51 percent in the 1985 survey.

The margin of error was plus or minus 5 percentage points.

The 1986 poll was the first to include the opinions of principals, superintendents, teacher union leaders, state education officials, state legislators who serve on education committees, and deans of colleges of education.

Only 36 percent of teachers felt recent reforms have had a positive impact on teachers, but 78 percent of state education officials and 73 percent of legislators thought reform

had helped teachers.

More than 90 percent of teachers and education leaders agree that poor pay is a leading contributor to an impending teacher shortage.

And more than 80 percent from all groups surveyed said teachers are doing an "excellent" or "good" job.

"This survey reinforces the value of teachers in our society and the need to pay them more," said Mary Hatwood Futrell, president of the 1.8-million member National Education Association, the nation's largest teacher union.

"Agreement is highest among those who are closest to the schools, namely, teachers, principals, and teacher union and association officials," she said.

On reform issues, 72 percent of teachers remained set against merit pay, as did 55 percent of principals.

But 73 percent of education college deans favored merit pay, as did slim majorities of superintendents, legislators and state education officials.

Teachers were more favorably disposed to other types of pay scales created under school reform.

By a slim 49 percent to 46 percent plurality, they supported career ladder programs, such as one in Tennessee which divides teaching into different jobs and gives teachers the chance to move up a ladder of higher salaries and greater responsibility.

Mentor teacher programs, in which excellent teachers are assigned to coach other teachers, proved most popular among those surveyed. Of the 44 percent of teachers familiar with such programs, 82 percent favored them, as did over 80 percent of all categories of educational leaders.

2 tsp. salt

Mix all ingredients in large bowl. Keep covered in refrigerator for up to 6 weeks. Do not stir or mix again, just pour in muffin pans when needed. Bake at 400 degrees for 14 minutes.

Another favorite for the White family is:

CHESS PIE
1 cup sugar
3 egg yolks, beaten
1½ tablespoons flour
½ cup milk
½ cup butter
1 tablespoon cornmeal
1 tsp. vanilla
½ cup coconut

Mix all ingredients, pour into unbaked pie shell. Bake 40 minutes at 375.

NOTICE OF PROPOSED REDUCTION IN AT&T's TEXAS RATES

The Public Utility Commission of the state of Texas has entered orders in two recent cases that would substantially reduce the charges which AT&T pays to the state's local telephone companies and which could allow AT&T to reduce prices for most of AT&T's customers on calls placed within the state of Texas.

The total amount of the reduction to AT&T's customers is expected to be between \$115.3 million and \$120.6 million. This is in addition to the \$19.8 million reduction in AT&T's Texas basic long distance prices that went into effect on March 1, 1986 and is in addition to the approximately \$2 billion in AT&T interstate price reductions that took effect earlier this year.

If the changes are approved, all of AT&T's direct dialed long distance, directory assistance, WATS and 800 service customers would be affected, and would experience a decrease in their prices for these services when calling within the state of Texas. The following tables show the anticipated impact of the changes on AT&T customers by service category.

Heat the broth. Add the vegetables and meat. Bring to a boil and simmer 5 minutes. Serve immediately.

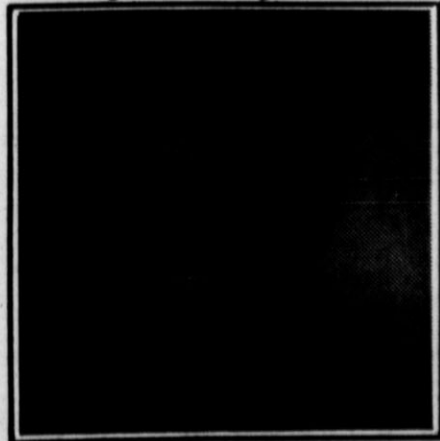

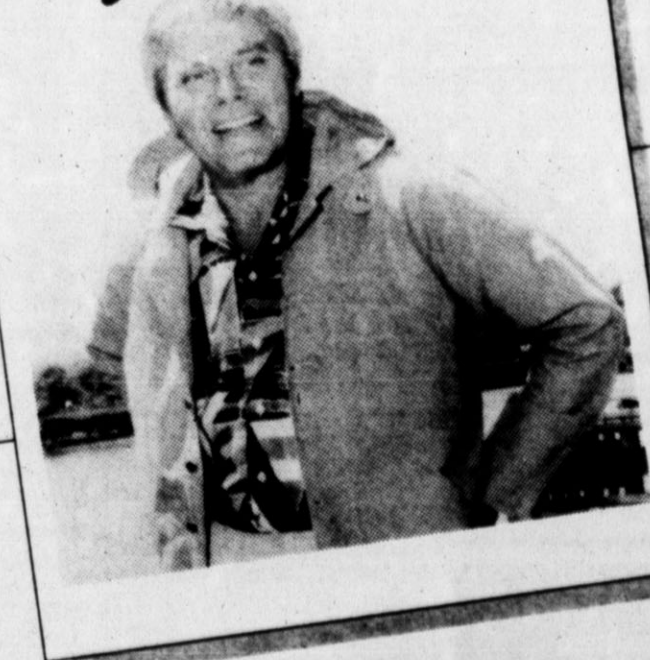

Over Alzheimer's drug discovery

Researcher fears hysteria

BOSTON (AP) — A researcher who discovered what could be the first effective treatment for Alzheimer's disease says he fears his encouraging results will spark "mass hysteria" among people desperate for the experimental drug.

Dr. William K. Summers disclosed his results in a study published in today's New England Journal of Medicine. Of 17 senile people treated with the pills, 16 showed sometimes

remarkable improvement in their memory and ability to cope with daily life.

"If this is validated, I think we will have our first viable treatment for Alzheimer's," he said in an interview.

However, the drug, known as tetrahydroaminoacrine, or THA, is not available for routine use. Doctors cannot prescribe it. Until it's approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, it will be given only to people in scientific experiments, and no one knows how many years approval will take.

"I am very enthusiastic about this drug, but I don't want to get a mass hysteria going," he said. "I'm trying to avoid everybody getting whipped into a frenzy about this, because it will be some period of time before it's

available."

Summers, a researcher at the University of California, Los Angeles, based his study on the treatment of people with moderate to severe Alzheimer's senility. "Of these 17," he said, "four of them got dramatically better, seven got clearly better and five of them got better to anybody's eye."

Among the patients were two so badly affected by the disease that they didn't know their own names. After receiving the medicine, they could feed themselves, go to the bathroom on their own and recognize their families.

One less severely affected man went back to work part-time. A retiree who before could barely speak took up daily golf again, while another victim resumed driv-

ing, cooking and cleaning her house.

Summers stressed that the drug does not cure Alzheimer's disease. Instead, it eases the symptoms of the disease, much as insulin controls diabetes or L-dopa relieves Parkinson's disease.

THA also does not stop the progression of the disease, and victims probably will reach a point when they are not helped by the drug, he said.

"It causes a reversal of symptoms, principally those related to memory deficits," he said. "I am anticipating that it will continue to do that for a period of time, but as the illness progresses underneath the medication, I expect that toward the end there will be more or less a sudden collapse of the symp-

ptoms."

Another Alzheimer's expert, Dr. Kenneth L. Davis of Mount Sinai Medical Center in New York, was cautious about the drug's potential.

It's not "a golden bullet," he said. "I do think this drug will help some people, and there is a market for it. I see it as a short, rational step" toward controlling Alzheimer's disease.

He noted that similar drugs have failed to produce dramatic results, and he suggested that Summers' study might have benefited from fortunate selection of study subjects and careful monitoring of the patients' drug levels.

Alzheimer's disease is the major cause of senility among the elderly.

ENDOMETRIAL CANCER

Endometrial cancer—cancer of the lining of the uterus—is not one of the big three cancers in women (lung, breast, and colorectal), but it has remained a significant problem. It is almost always a disease of women who are nearing or have gone through menopause.

About two of every 100 women will develop endometrial cancer in their lifetimes. In recent years the survival rate for this disease has increased to 90 to 95 percent when caught early.

The first sign of endometrial cancer is usually abnormal bleeding from the vagina. Bleeding after menopause doesn't necessarily mean cancer, but should always be checked out by your doctor. The same goes for unusual vaginal discharge which too can be a symptom of endometrial cancer.

To diagnose endometrial cancer the doctor will take a tissue sample from the lining of the uterus by doing an endometrial biopsy or a D&C, where a sample of the lining is taken and examined in a laboratory. Because endometrial cancer shows up in Pap smears less than 50 percent of the time, that test alone isn't reliable for diagnosing it.

The type of treatment and chances of survival depend on how far the disease has spread. The main treatment for this disease is removal of the uterus (hysterectomy), which may be

followed by treatment by drugs (chemotherapy) or radiation therapy.

Women who have had cancer of the breast, ovary, or colon have a higher risk of developing endometrial cancer, as do those who are overweight, diabetic, have high blood pressure, have never given birth, or have a history of irregular menstrual periods. Obviously, if a woman has already had a hysterectomy, she will not develop endometrial cancer.

Another risk factor is use of the hormone estrogen. Endometrial cancer has been linked to taking large doses of estrogen alone over a period of time. However, doctors have found that using smaller doses of estrogen and combining it with another hormone, progesterone, nearly eliminates any risk of cancer, and more importantly, protects the woman against the bone disease, osteoporosis.

Leaving the childbearing years is no reason to stop having regular check-ups. Remember, early detection of endometrial cancer, or any problem, means a better chance of survival.

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — Boots bought in Mexico and confiscated at the border because they are made from endangered animals are en-

ding up on the feet of U.S. Customs agents.

Some rank-and-file inspectors are upset about a policy that permits the boots, which

cost as much as \$200 and are made of such things as sea turtles and rare crocodiles, to be issued to internal affairs agents who investigate corruption.

But Don Sherman, director of the El Paso district of the U.S. Customs Service, said the items help undercover agents blend into a crowd during an investigation.

The boots are made out of the skins of animals under protection by the U.S. government because they are on the endangered species list. Importing them into the country is prohibited.

An unsigned memo distributed to members of the National Treasury Employees Union No. 143 in El Paso describes an incident two months ago in which an unidentified Customs Service internal affairs "headhunter" came across the Paso Del Norte Bridge carrying two pairs of the boots.

"Reportedly, Mr. Headhunter explained that the boots were seized merchandise he had taken to Mexico for maintenance, i.e., to have them stretched to size. Moreover, Mr. Headhunter indicated that the nature of their job demanded that they use these types of prohibited items so as to blend in," the memo states.

"By wearing seized crocodile and sea turtle boots the headhunters have sunk to a new low. This management practice is as ridiculous and preposterous as it would be for inspectors to smoke the pot and snort the coke we seize!" the memo states.

Charles Guinta, the Treasury union's El Paso president, declined to comment on the issue except to say that "the union does voice the opinion of all employees and their feelings."

Jim Thornton of Austin, a field representative for the Treasury employees union, told the El Paso Times the memo was produced in El Paso, but he would not say who wrote it.

"They're getting away with murder," said Thornton of the agents. "While they're investigating other employees, they themselves are taking license. It stretches the rules and regulations."

Seized merchandise usually is auctioned, except for illegal items such as narcotics — and boots made from endangered animals. Illegal items are required by law to be destroyed.

But Sherman said the practice is common and legal. "It is a common practice for law enforcement agents, not only customs but other investigative type of authorities, to be issued many kinds of seized property to be utilized in conducting their investigations," he said.

DR. GOTT Anesthesia and overdose

DEAR DR. GOTT — What damage, if any, will an overdose of general anesthesia have on one's body? Will large amounts of muscle relaxers do any harm?

DEAR READER — General anesthesia can cause respiratory and cardiac arrest. Muscle relaxants, if given in excessive quantities during surgery, also can cause paralysis of respiration. The damage from these drugs usually is acute and life-threatening. The patient requires total life support until the drugs can be neutralized. If a patient is inadvertently given an overdose of anesthesia — but can be carried through the immediate difficulty — long-term problems are not apt to develop.

Anesthesiology is, at times, an inexact science. However, complications and overdoses ordinarily can be satisfactorily handled by qualified specialists both during and after surgery.

DEAR DR. GOTT — I am in my 20s and just lost a great deal of weight. Everything seems to be firm except my breasts, which sag and have stretchmarks. What can I do to firm them up?

DEAR READER — A woman's breasts are supported by tiny "guy-wires" called suspensory ligaments. If, because of inadequate external support (in the form of a bra), the breasts are permitted to sag, the suspensory ligaments stretch and stop giving internal support. They never regain their elasticity. Many women who were overweight (or whose breasts did not give adequate support during pregnancy) find that their breasts have stretched and won't return to normal. There are no medicines or exercises to correct this. However, plastic surgeons are quite skillful at remodeling breasts. Ask your doctor to refer you to a plastic surgeon if you wish to have your breast condition corrected.

DEAR DR. GOTT — I'm male, 54, and started using a hair product to remove the gray. It works fine, but at night it rubs off onto the pillowcase. In the morning, my eyes are sticky and gummy. The box says not to get it in the eyes. Is this product safe to use?

DEAR READER — Although it's probably safe to use, I wouldn't use it. The material could get into your eyes at night or cause an allergic reaction. Change products. Better yet, let that gray show through. You won't be able to change the wrinkles in your skin that come with age, so leave your hair alone.

DEAR DR. GOTT — In the old days a person was not considered dead until his heart no longer beat and no breath was discernible on a mirror. Now we hear about brain-dead people. Isn't this just a handy definition for doctors to use so they can get organs for transplants?

DEAR READER — No. It is a more accurate indication of death. A person doesn't die all at once. Some tissues are more resistant than others to lack of oxygen and nutrients. For example, patients' hearts can stop beating without death taking place. A heart can be salvaged, put in cold storage and transplanted. A person can suffer cardiac arrest — and be "dead" — but can be resuscitated. If respiration stops, forms of artificial respiration can be used, almost indefinitely, to keep the body's organs alive. In short, medical technology enables certain patients to live even if their hearts and lungs are not functioning.

However, brain tissue is extremely sensitive to lack of oxygen. The brain cannot survive and function if it is deprived of oxygen for more than about three minutes. In addition, no current medical techniques can correct or replace a damaged brain.

Therefore, the traditional view of death as heart stoppage or cessation of breathing is too narrow a definition. At present, "brain death" is a more useful and practical concept. Brain death is diagnosed by a strict set of criteria that include the analysis of the brain's electrical activity by a brain-wave test (EEG). A person is not considered dead until brain damage is evident and irreversible.

Aside from giving doctors a conclusive endpoint to life, the concept of brain death permits scientists to extract other organs — that are not "dead" — and reuse them in the form of transplants, as you point out.

In the future, as medical technology improves, the concept of brain death will have to be revised. For instance, doctors may someday be able "artificially" to resuscitate the brain, as well as the heart, lungs and kidneys. Then a new definition of death will have to be worked out. At present, "brain death" is the most appropriate method by which to establish whether a person has passed beyond the point where traditional death can be reversed.

Check heat system to improve efficiency

Cooler weather has brought relief from both the heat and high air conditioning bills. But another kind of heat — from the furnace — will begin to drive utility costs up again.

Fine-tuning your heating system may help hold utility costs down by increasing its efficiency, says Dr. Susan Quiring, a housing specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

Gas heating systems should be checked and cleaned at least every other year, she explains.

Dirt accumulation inside the furnace is difficult to remove and reduces heating efficiency, she adds.

Electric furnaces don't need much maintenance, but heat pumps require periodic servicing. A trained service technician can clean and adjust your system to assure maximum efficiency.

"With a forced air system, simply

keeping the filters clean will save help money," Quiring says.

The specialist says that the entire volume of air in a house is circulated through the furnace three to four times in a single hour of operation.

The furnace filter traps airborne lint and dirt, preventing it from coating the fan and furnace heat exchanger. But when the filter accumulates dirt, it begins to restrict the air flow and heating efficiency.

Quiring recommends checking filters every four to six weeks during the heating season, and replacing dirty filters promptly.

Disposable fiber glass filters cost 50 cents to a dollar each, so you may find it easiest to buy a season's supply and keep them on hand.

Metallic or plastic filters can be cleaned and reused, Quiring says, but they must be sprayed after each cleaning with a special coating that allows them to attract small dust particles.
