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Local American Legion Installs Officers Monday

DRIVE PLANNED

Members of the American Legion of the Oscar Frye Post in Burk Burnett installed the officers for the 37-38 term at the meeting in the hall over the Betty Anne Bakery last Monday night. The officers installed were Fred Brookman, commander; Henry Pearlman, first vice commander; J. W. Allen, second vice commander; B. L. Robinson, third vice commander; Luther Hatch, adjutant; Henry Prinzing, finance chairman; Joe Majors, service officer; Jim Johnson, historian; chairman of child welfare; John Golden, chaplain; Tex Willis, sergeant at arms.

The organization changed the meeting dates to second and fourth Thursdays instead of Mondays. Past Commander, C. F. Johnson, Joe Majors, and Ralph Brookshier were presented with past commander pins by the organization. The honorees thanked the organization for the recognition.

Commander Brookman stressed the fact that one man could not make a success of the Legion and asked for the cooperation of the entire body. A membership drive will be started in the near future and every ex-service man will be contacted. A committee was organized to make plans for the renting of a suitable place for meeting.

Slight Drop Is Registered In Local Students

A drop of 14 students was registered Wednesday when a total of 1054 students compared with 1070 for the same day last year in the Burk Burnett schools. However, there was a gain of 28 students in the high school division where a total of 403 compared with 375 for the same date last year were registered.

The decrease of 42 students in the grade divisions offset the major gain in the high school department. However, as the routine of classes are selected for the primary department in the local churches an actual increase is expected. The four classes of students in the first grade are attending in the Baptist and Methodist churches since the Central Ward school was condemned by the school board as unsafe.

The registration started Monday morning. The high school and primary students reported at the normal class rooms. The Central Ward school children met the teachers outside of the building.

Tuesday the primary children were transferred to the churches and four classes of ward children to the high school building and four to the primary building.

This week Superintendent C. J. Duncan and Principal Lee Clifton are adjusting the program in order that all the children can be adequately housed.

Both the superintendent and principal urged that the primary students register not later than next Monday.

Burkburnett Dove Season Opened 17

Burk sportsmen were cleaning their guns and were ready for the opening of dove season Wednesday. The birds are reported fairly plentiful and local hardware stores have been selling large supplies of shells and a few guns.

J. H. Dornier, state game warden, has warned hunters that bag limits must not be exceeded, nor quail taken with the doves before the season opens. Hunters out of their own counties must have licenses.

The irregular seasons resulted from failure of the legislature at its last session to harmonize state and federal regulations.

The daily bag limit on each species is 15. The possession limit is 15 of each species, or 15 in the aggregate of both species.

Mourning doves and white wings may be shot from 7 a. m. until sunset of each day during the open season.

Both species of birds may be taken only with shotguns no larger than 10 gauge and capable of holding only three shells. Magazine guns will be allowed to hold only three shells at one time in the magazine and chamber combined. The magazine must be permanently plugged so that it will hold only two shells.

Burkburnett fans are pledged to be at the annual grudge game one hundred per cent Friday night as the business men voted to close every business establishment in the city in order that every fan will be able to attend the game. Drug stores, cafes, theatres, filling stations and all other business places that normally keep open at night will be closed at 6 for the game.

The largest crowd that ever attended an opening game in this city is expected at the Burk Burnett-Nocona game. The intense rivalry between the two teams is expected to pack the stadium.

Tolly McKown will lead the Bulldogs in the opening shot at the invaders from Nocona. The game will be bitterly fought as are all contests between the two teams. Jack Crain, Nocona ace ball carrier and captain, will match the brilliant performance of McKown. The battle between these two individuals is expected to be one of the outstanding duels of the year in Class B football. The representatives of 10-B and 12-B represent the best in each district.

The spectacular play of the two backs creates an additional interest in the game.

The Bulldogs starting lineup has been tentatively selected, and after a series of experiments, Coach Volney Hill and Assistants Polk Robinson and Wallace Beasley are set for the game.

The backfield will have only one man, a very much aforementioned Tolly McKown, that played last year. The new men are John Blair, all-district end in 36, Buck Willett, and Fred Brown. Willett and Blair are the blocking backs with Willett carrying the ball occasionally. McKown is one of the speediest members of the squad and he will team with McKown and Willett to provide the attack.

Into this backfield on the defense will shift Murray Evans left end and Richard Johnson right tackle. These two boys have given the coaches evidence of superior line-backing ability, and the success of the team will depend much on their ability at this task.

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A WISE DECISION

Superintendent C. J. Duncan and members of the school board took decisive action on the vacating of the Central Ward school last week. While this action appeared to be sudden to the general public, it was the results of many weeks of serious planning and thought on the part of the men. A thorough inspection of the school was made by three different groups before the trustees voted to abandon the building.

The Burkburnett Star wishes to praise both the thoroughness of the investigation and the decisiveness of the action.

Once the board became convinced of the actual condition of the building, they shut it down so tight that even the registration of classes was held outside of the building.

The new arrangement will be inconvenient. The children will be separated into four different buildings, high school, grade school, Methodist and Baptist churches. The officials and teachers and the children will have difficulty in getting readjusted to the new conditions.

In spite of this difficulty, the decision to abandon the building is one of the wisest things that he board has done in many years. The action ought to do what nothing else seems to have been able to do—awake the people to the need of a new school building.

During the boom days the building was thrown together in haste to satisfy the demands of the state department of education. Credit was withheld from the Burkburnett schools until the structure was completed. It was completed from funds secured by the sale of oil lands belonging to the school.

The result of the haste, high labor and materials expenses was that the school did not meet the requirements for safety and permanency. Now we are paying for that haste.

From it, however, we have learned a lesson that ought to be of great value to Burkburnett school patrons. The lesson is that in building for the future, nothing less than the best should be tolerated.

When a new building is planned, regardless of the cost, regardless of the trouble, it should be the best that we have. Our children are valuable. Much more valuable than a low tax rate or escape from financial responsibility.

No one objects to spending legitimately and wisely. The school board now has the opportunity to serve the next generation. Whatever plans are made, the trustees should use the same wisdom in making these plans, the same decisive courage as they used in abandoning the school building.

HEROISM THAT MADE THE CHURCH

Dr. J. W. Moore, formerly a missionary to China who is here on a leave, spoke to members of the Baptist association last Thursday afternoon about the heroic work of the missionaries in China.

Dr. Moore said that in spite of the war and danger, in spite of the fact that the ruthless war machines of several nations disregard the safety of native and foreigner alike, the missionaries are sticking to the job. By refusing to leave they have forfeited the right to claim protection from their own governments.

These missionaries state emphatically that they had rather remain and suffer with the native Christians. To leave at the present would be evidence of cowardice.

Natural instincts would drive this group of workers to seek the safety offered them in the areas protected by international armies, but the act of resorting to armed protection would do much to kill the effectiveness of the message which they carry as teachers of religion. It would be difficult to teach faith in their God or peacefulness of living by resorting to armed force.

So we pause for a few moments to pay tribute to the men and women that have the courage to stick by their jobs in the face of danger and hardships. They renew our faith in the basic integrity of humanity and give us a fresher outlook in a world so sprinkled with selfishness and fear. They are of the stock that has made the church a potent force in the world. "From the blood of martyrs."

FOOTBALL SEASON

Last year was the most successful season in the history of the Burkburnett Bulldogs, and the result is that this community has more fans both inside and out of the community than ever before. It isn't strange that a winning team should attract many devotees. Everybody likes to follow a winner.

This year the team will have the same problem that they had last year. They must win six conference games in tougher competition and win these games one at a time. Regardless of the optimism and fanaticism of the fans, that is going to be a hard job.

Starting this week almost anywhere in the city you could find a group of fans, and if you listened closely you could hear, "What do you think Nocona will be able to do with McKown," or "Can the Bulldogs stop Crain?"

The Fans Are Interested In The boys that are one of the squad, and the merchants have paid for their pictures to be printed elsewhere in this paper.

Another Thing Is That To Make the game legal and fair, Butler Westerfield, publisher of the post, will be at the microphone on the loud speaker for the contest. This is as it should be. There hasn't been a Nocona-Burkburnett game for the last 15 years without Butler present. So with him at the mike Friday, the game will be officially recognized as a contest.

Let's Take a Look at Each Boy in the squad.

Tolly McKown, Left Half is the one that most people are interested in at the present. His record last year was one of the best that we have ever seen. He gained more than 2,000 yards in interscholastic league games. He has developed into a faster, more confident player. His passing is better. This is his third year as a regular and he finishes this year. He is kicking more consistently. His number is still 75, and he weighs 160.

John Blair Is Playing in an Un-familiar position on the offense after Coach Hill shifted him into the backfield. He played end last year and made all district. Murray Evans took over his job when Hill found that there were no experienced material for the back quartet. Evans shifts to the defense linebacking job and Blair takes over his regular slot. Weight 140, number 52. Letterman.

Fred Brown Lettered Last Year, and has a couple more years with the squad. He is playing in quarterback spot. McKown calling the signals. Weighs 129, number 20. Fairly fast and he will make a good hand this year.

Buck Willett Is About our Fast-est man. He is learning to like the game, and really gets down the field in high. His punting is the best on the squad. Number 55, 132 pounds.

Murray Evans Started at Cen-ter two years ago and has traveled all over the squad in line and backfield, but he is settled at the end job. He is a wizard on pass catching and can back that line on the defense. 165 pounds, number 88.

Orto Elliott Is Trying This game football. He said down in town last week that he would be glad when the playing really got tough. 145, number 50. First year man. Tackle position.

Harry Elliott Was Shifted out to tackle and back to guard. He made the district team last year, and now he is on the spot, a watched man. He has his spurs to prove this year. Number 56, weighs 156. Left guard.

Deace "Ducky" Hageman earn that title of "Ducky" by gaining about 40 pounds during the summer. He commands the pivot post and serves as the battering ram for plays in that territory. Weighs 155, number 40.

Jack McKown and Tom Spray are alternating at the other end of the line. Jack is a freshman. He is long and has three years to learn. Weighs 133 pounds, number 77. Tom is an old hand. He had hard luck this summer with his health, but he is recovering rapidly. He may be ready for the first conference game or even before that. Number 33.

Richard Johnson has been as-signed to the tackle position, and shifted to backfield in the defense. He has the job of helping Murray Evans back up that line. Weighs 156, number 33.

Little Mite Jack Kelly ought to weigh about 30 pounds more.

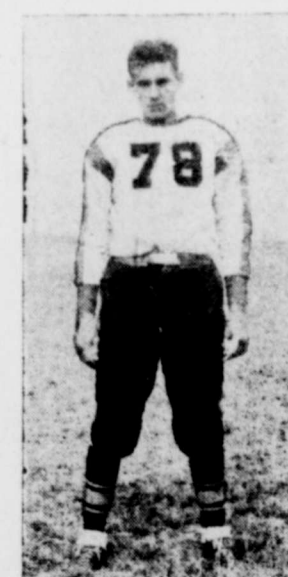

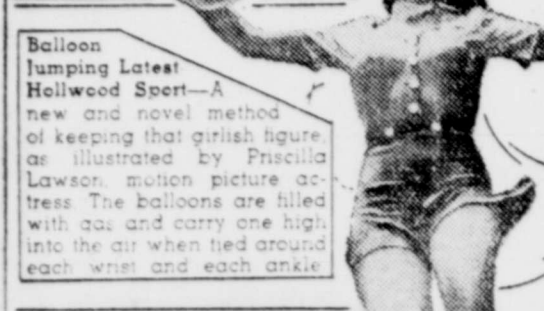

HEADLINES

The partial embargo imposed by the president under the neutrality act will lead to the same complications as previous attempts made by the nation to stay out of war. While the step is in the right direction in as much as the president has said that all government owned or controlled ships could not carry the ammunition or implements of war, it falls short of absolute neutrality. The executive warned the privately operated ships that they sail at their own risk. This announcement is to the effect that the government will not protect these vessels when they ship war materials. That sounds beautiful, but let an American ship be fired upon at the loss of property and lives, and it is highly probable that you will see the American marines and navy swing into action.

Former Experience

United States intended to stay out of the last fracas in Europe. There was an open declaration of neutrality by the president, but when the American ships were sunk and American property and lives lost all the resources of our nation were thrown into the conflict. We came out with some badly burned fingers, and have declared that we will not repeat the experience. But keep your fingers crossed.

Strange Relation

It is possible that there was no intention on the part of the government to bring such a sharp drop or break in the market last week, but when the two per cent loan policy was announced, the market support was withdrawn in the haste to invest in the new issue. The reaction points the way toward an automatic control of the market by the government. When the government wishes to stop a bull market a rise in interest rates creates an effective check.

Cowardly Attack

Hugo Black may be guilty of the fact that is charged that he was a member of the Klan. Many men made the same mistake when the prejudice ran high in the nation a few years ago. But whether he is guilty or not guilty, we firmly believe that he is the victim of one of the most cowardly attacks that was ever made politically on any man in public life. He left the country for a tour of Europe. While he is gone a newspaper of opposite political belief and a newspaper syndicate started a series of articles challenging his right to sit on the supreme court bench. Even admitting that he is guilty, the attack of a man who is not at home or in position to defend himself is one of the basest things that any American newspaper ever did.

AAA Goals

The AAA for next year will at-

tempt to hold cotton down to 29 million acres in the southern area. This is four million acres less than is planted this year. The drop that has been rapid during the last few weeks caused urgent and decisive action.

Submarine

The mystery submarine holds more possibilities of war than any other single fact right now. It is possible that the 120 battle ships representing nine nations may fire on or capture a vessel that belongs to another nation, but not actually the mystery ship. That would be a dangerous accident.

State Crime Compact

One law that has helped the criminals escape has been the law which keeps the officers of one state from crossing the border of another state in attempt to secure criminals that have committed crimes or escaped penalty. The signing of the state compact between 21 states at Kansas City this week was a major victory for law enforcement. The meeting plans to allow four major objectives. 1. Allowing officers to cross state lines. 2. Permission for extradition of witnesses (only criminals may be extradited now.) 3. Agreement of 16 states to simplify extradition. 4. Agreement of 17 states providing reciprocal parole and pardon administration.
