March of Dimes paves the way

The 1962 March of Dimes, a little late getting started locally, but just as worthwhile as ever, is under way in Garza County.

And, once again, the question is asked by many people, "How in the world can the March of Dimes possibly meet the needs of the millions of people afflicted with crippling birth defects and arthritis?"

An impressive precedent has been set in the polio fight, with some 336,000 polio patients receiving direct assistance from the March of Dimes since 1938 at a cost of more than \$330 million.

Now that the National Foundation has expanded its program to include even more widespread conditions of crippling, it has taken positive action to deal with the needs of vastly greater numbers of people.

At this moment at least 320,000 Americans are completely unable to work because they have rheumatic diseases and are the most seriously crippled among the 11,000,000 who suffer from arthritis and rheumatism. Moreover, each year in this country some 250,000 babies are born with significant birth defects.

It is known that early diagnosis and prompt treatment of both arthritis and birth defects can do much to prevent or reduce disability. Yet the facilities, the techniques and the medical knowledge to do so are available to relatively few who

should be getting attention.

The average hospital right now is barely able to maintain present levels of patient care. It rarely has funds for creative programs designed to solve today's complex patient care problems.

That is where the National Foundation comes into the picture and where your contributions to the March of Dimes helps.

Briefly, National Foundation chapters in each of the nation's 4,100 counties have been given the green light to use local March of Dimes funds in financing Special Treatment Centers at major hospitals and medical schools.

Also, chapters in smaller communities are being encouraged to use available March of Dimes funds to establish Evaluation Clinics for birth defects or rheumatoid arthritis at community general hospitals.

Such chapter-sponsored programs will supplement the national organization's fast-growing network of major Clinical Study Centers in which extensive research, teaching and treatment programs have been combined to produce the knowledge, the techniques and the skilled personnel needed to bring expert medical care within reach of the millions afflicted with crippling diseases.

These are bold new medical care programs and they are being made possible and can continue only through your support of the March of Dimes.—CD.

Action, not alarm, called for

No one should get unduly alarmed over the story in last Thursday's Post Dispatch that a tuberculosis skin-test survey is being planned in the Post public schools.

The fact that a number of new cases of TB have been discovered here within the last three months should not be minimized, but, as one of the visiting doctors from the McKnight State TB Hospital said, "Post probably is no worse off in the incidence of TB cases than many other communities of comparable size."

The visiting doctor pointed out that it just has been brought to light here. No telling what predicament a number of other communities would find themselves in if a spot check were to be made.

The Dispatch wholeheartedly goes along with the county health officer and with other doctors

of the community that not only a thorough checking program, but an intensive follow-up is called for here.

Tuberculosis is generally supposed to be one of the diseases we've got "on the run." But, to keep it in that category, we've got to stay after it. And, in the final analysis, periodic check-ups are the only thing that will keep TB on the run.

The Dispatch hopes that plans for the school-wide testing program are not allowed to "die on the vine" because of public apathy. We are convinced that the doctors of the community are determined to see it through, and that the city and county governments, along with the school district's board of trustees, will cooperate to the fullest extent. Outside of that, all that is needed is the cooperation of the public at large.—CD

Poll tax deadline creeping up

Regardless of what one thinks of the pesky poll tax—and we're of the opinion most Texans would like to see it abolished as a voting prerequisite—one is going to have to pay it again this year if he wishes to cast a ballot in this year's important elections.

Exempt, of course, are persons just reaching voting age and those over 60. To make it even easier, the over 60's are not even required to apply for an exemption certificate, since Garza County is under 10,000 population and certificates are required only in counties over that popula-

tion figure.

The lamentable fact that Texas is one of only five states still requiring poll tax payment as a voting qualification, doesn't help matters. The cold fact remains that if one wants to vote in Texas this year he either must pay a poll tax or claim an exemption.

Time not only is short, but is running out. If you are one of those who need to pay a poll tax in order to vote, you must do so before the Jan. 31 deadline.—CD

Double U Ranch benefits from conservation work

Reseeding of sandyland range sites and spraying for the control of shinnery oak on the same sites have paid handsome dividends for the Double U Ranch in Garza County, according to Bobby J. Gray, work unit conservationist for the Garza Soil Conservation District.

In 1959, through the assistance of the Great Plains Conservation Program, which provides for cost-shares of from 50 to 80 per cent of the cost of conservation work, the Double U Ranch seeded approximately 2,000 acres of sandyland range land and sprayed the area with a mixture of one pound of 245-T and one gallon of diesel oil and water to make a four-gallon solution per acre.

The ranch area was deferred for the 1959 growing season and sprayed the second year with a mixture of one-half pound of 245-T for the control of the shinnery oak.

The first year following seeding and spraying very little results were noted.

The second year, 1960, some Indian grass, switchgrass and sand lovegrass was noticeable. The following year, 1961, large amounts of Indian grass and sand lovegrass showed up on the area.

The area then was covered for the most part with the Indian grass and the sand lovegrass.

About 20 per cent regrowth of the shinnery oak was noted on the area in 1961. This is about what is expected from this sandyland site with reseeding, spraying and a two-year deferment period carried out, Gray said.

This area is now classified as being in a good condition with the recovery of the better grasses of Indian grass, switchgrass and sand lovegrass, this condition having been brought about in three years, as the area was examined in 1958 and very few of the better grasses were observed.

This treatment, Gray said, has improved the livestock carrying capacity on this range site from approximately 80 acres per animal unit yearly to 25 acres per animal unit yearly. In terms of numbers of animal units per section, this has raised the carrying capacity from about eight animal units per section to about 25.

Directors plan Friday action on purchase of WR dam site

White River Municipal Water district directors have been called to a special meeting Friday night to take action on the purchase of the dam site for the long-planned White River dam.

The district's land committee has been negotiating with the three bidders involved for the last eight weeks.

The committee is expected to make a full report tomorrow night and possibly come in on details on one or more land purchase contracts.

Attending the session will be representatives of the district's engineering firm from Fort Worth.

Mayor Powell Shytle is Post's representative on the district's land committee.

Purchase of the land is all that has been holding up advertising for construction bids for the big dam. Possession of the site is necessary so that bidders can inspect the site preparing their bids.

The district comes into possession of its full \$4,000,000 in construction funds next month from the state water lending agency.

Bids can be opened within about 90 days after possession of the site is obtained.

White River directors held their regular January meeting last Thursday night in Crosbyton, but did not take up the land purchase problem at that time as the land committee felt it could finalize arrangements within a few more days.

Tom Benton, the district's tax assessor-collector, reported to directors that collections of the district's new property taxes to date included: \$19,562.15 from Ralls, \$17,000 from Spur, \$23,380 from Post and \$14,666.60 from Crosbyton. He

said about 60 per cent of the district's taxes have been paid, with Jan. 31 the deadline to prevent a 10 per cent penalty and six per cent interest being added. The penalty is required by state law, Benton pointed out.

The directors voted to employ Benton for another year at \$400 per month salary. They raised his mileage allowance from seven to eight cents per mile.

Directors decided to accept bids on a car to be purchased by the district for use by its new manager.

The mayor's proclamation urges

that all citizens who are eligible to vote "proceed promptly to pay their poll taxes" unless they are exempted by reason of age. In Garza County and other counties of under 10,000 population, it is not necessary for those exempted by reason of age to apply for a certificate of exemption.

Mayor Shytle's proclamation also stated: "A people that does not exercise its rights stands in danger of losing them. I hope, therefore, that every eligible citizen of the City of Post will be a qualified voter and will cast his vote in 1962."

TRAFFIC TOLL ON RISE IN COUNTY

Seventy-eight rural traffic accidents, resulting in five persons killed, 36 injured and property damage estimated at \$63,480, were reported and investigated in Garza County during 1961, according to Sgt. A. E. Roberts, Highway Patrol supervisor for this area.

The county's rural traffic toll is more than double what it was in 1960, when 33 reported accidents resulted in two persons killed, 18 injured and property damage estimated at \$27,389.

For the month of December, the Highway Patrol investigated nine rural traffic accidents in the county, in which four persons were injured and estimated property damage was \$5,000.
