Dual Producer Finaled In Knox County

Superior Oil Co. has completed its No. 21 P. C. Phillips as a dual producer in the Plumlee area of Knox County.

The well, 2½ miles north of Munday, in section 82, block 2, D&W survey, pumped 46.60 barrels of 30.1 gravity oil per day from the Plumlee (Tannehill) Field pay perforated at 1884-87 and 1903-13 feet.

It had a daily pumping potential of 94.35 barrels of 34.7 gravity crude from perforations opposite the Plumlee (Second Tannehill) Field pay at 1999-2009 feet.

Hole was bottomed at 2055 feet. Both pays were fractured.

Also completed in the Plumlee (Second Tannehill) Field was Superior's No. 5 M. C. Kuehler, three miles north of Munday, section 82, block 2, D&W survey. It had a daily pumping potential of 91.14 barrels of 34.6 gravity oil, plus 2 per cent water, from pay perforated at 2034-38 feet. Total depth was 2100 feet. Pay was fractured.

Rev. John Waddell Accepts Pastorate At Aiken, S. C.

Following Friday night's Holy Week Service, Rev. John C. Waddell announced he and his family will leave for Aiken, South Carolina, April 27 or 28. Rev. Waddell will assume duties as pastor of the First Christian Church in Aiken May 3.

Rev. and Mrs. Waddell had previously visited the town and church in Aiken, and had thought they would remain in Knox City, but after "thinking it over" decided to move.

"It has been the most pleasant ministry I have ever had," the minister said, and "We have liked it so well here that a decidedly better promotion is the only reason we have decided to leave Knox City."

Aiken, South Carolina, has a population of approximately 20,000, and is the site of an atomic energy commission, the Savannah River Project. There are some 100 members in the congregation there, and Rev. Waddell said the church ranked 14th in per capita in giving to missions. There are approximately 8,000 First Christian Churches in the United States.

Rev. Waddell has been pastor of the First Christian Church here for one and one-half years. They have two children, Stuart, 28 months, and Scott, 9 months.

Contract calls for the sum of \$20,500.00 for construction, and erection of the modern pool. Contract also specifies that completion be no later than June 1.

In addition to actual contract cost, Lions must have funds for erection of bath house, concession stand and fence. Former Resident Passes Away At Wichita Falls

Dr. C. E. Bailey, 75, of 2305 Ninth St., Wichita Falls, a practicing dentist for 52 years until his retirement in 1957, died in a Wichita Falls hospital Sunday morning.

Dr. Bailey is well known here, more especially by "old-timers" as he resided here from 1909 to 1918. He was Knox City's first dentist.

Funeral services were held at 3:30 p.m. Monday in the Hampton-Vaughan Funeral Home chapel with Dr. George R. Davis, pastor of the First Christian Church, Wichita Falls, officiating.

Burial was in Crestview Memorial Cemetery, Wichita Falls. Dr. Bailey was born July 9, 1883, in Bertram, Texas. He was graduated from the University of Tennessee School of Dentistry in 1905. He had practiced in Wichita Falls since 1918.

In 1955 Dr. Bailey received a gold key from the Texas State Dental Society honoring his 50 years of practice. He was also honored by the University of Tennessee.

He was a past president of the Wichita Falls District Dental Society and member of Texas State Dental Association in which he was a Good Fellow.

Dr. Bailey was a member of the First Christian Church. He married Miss Florence Savage in 1905 in Austin.

Survivors are his wife, of the home; one son, Dr. James O. Bailey, 2405 Speedway, Wichita Falls; two sisters, Mrs. Cora Jackson and Mrs. Clara Deese, both of Temple, Texas, one brother, C. J. Bailey, Baytown, Texas, and three grandchildren, Julie and Jim Bailey, both of Wichita Falls, and Phillip Bailey, with the U. S. Army in Germany.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN, Texas — "After seeing the appropriation bill—and with all the sentiment there is in favor of a teacher pay raise—I don't see how we can pay for it all without passing one of those big tax bills."

Speaking in private conversation was a legislator. He is one of an estimated 80 to 90 House members who told voters flatly last summer they wouldn't vote for a general sales tax.

But the "big tax bills" to which he refers are the Strickland, Roberts bill, Blanchard bill, Oliver bill, etc. All of these are, as someone said, "mighty like a sales tax," in that they would be collected on the basis of the sales of large numbers of items.

His predicament is shared by many Texas lawmakers this year. It is: How to finance the things the people of Texas want without voting a tax the people don't want?

BIGGEST EVER — House Appropriations Committee is recommending a 1960-61 spending bill that is the granddaddy of 'em all.

Altogether, spending from all sources, including federal grants,

would total \$2,401,276,388. It is \$240,000,000 higher than the 1959-60 budget.

Even so, it is \$7,500,000 less than recommended by Governor Price Daniel. Committee's bill calls for general revenue spending of \$322,461,196; the governor's for \$329,952,992.

Financing the committee's recommendations will require about \$157,000,000 in new tax money for the general fund. This results from adding together (1) the expected \$65,000,000 deficit from 1958-59, (2) the \$42,000,000 increase in spending for the coming biennium over this one and (3) an expected \$50,000,000 gap between expected revenue and present spending levels.

If the proposed public school teacher pay raise and any other part of the Hale-Aikin recommendations for school improvements are adopted, the new money needs would soar to between two hundred million and three hundred million.

Principal beneficiaries of the \$42,000,000 increase proposed by the Appropriations Committee would be higher education, up \$23,804,432; state employees, up \$3,400,000; state hospitals and special schools, up \$10,321,186; prison system, up \$6,000,000.

TAX FRONT — Meanwhile, the House Taxation Committee, beset by the prodding of the governor on one hand and the objections of various citizens on the other, toils on in its search for new money.

Recent actions include: Showing temporary disapproval, 12-6, of the governor's plan for the state to take over abandoned property and dormant bank accounts.

These include:

1. A nine-part omnibus tax measure by Reps. Bob Strickland of San Antonio and Wesley Roberts of Lamesa which would include a gross receipts levy on retail establishments. It would raise an estimated \$200,000 to \$300,000,000.

2. A 1½ per cent gross receipts tax on all business activity (with certain exemptions for farm supplies, charitable institutions, professional services, etc.) by Rep. H. J. Blanchard of Lubbock. It would bring in about \$300,000,000 to \$400,000,000.

3. A tax on "the first sale or use of any finished product" by Rep. W. T. Oliver of Port Neches.

4. A tax on "net profits and receipts" by Rep. Alonzo W. Jamison Jr. of Denton.

5. A "cure all" tax on manufactured goods by Rep. Jerry Sadler of Percilla, to bring in about a half-billion dollars per biennium.

It all led one House member to complain of a "million-dollar headache."

ECONOMY BILL MAKING HEADWAY — There's at least one fellow who believes that his type of job is useless, outmoded and unnecessary.

He is George Corse Jr. of Graham. Corse feels that school money is being wasted by keeping the job of County School Superintendent alive. He wants to dispense with the office and contends that it will save the State a minimum of \$40,000 annually.

To prove they were economy-minded too, the House passed his bill (HB No. 101 by Rep. Geo. Wilson of Newcastle) and sent it on to the Senate with their blessings.

HB No. 101 would permit the people of a county, by petition of 10 per cent of the eligible voters, to vote on discontinuance of the office of County Superintendent of Schools.

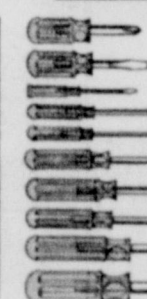

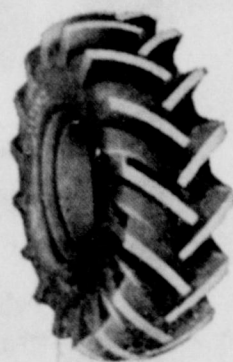

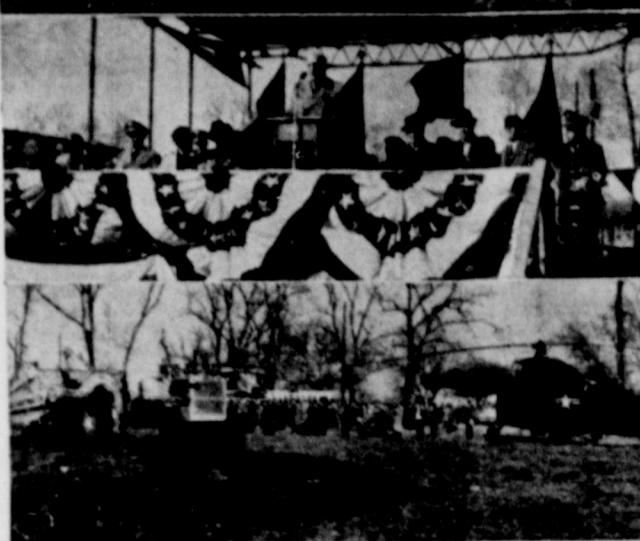

Corner on Cotton

Confusion as to how many acres will be planted to cotton this season follows the government announcement of farmers choosing "B" with its 40 per cent increase... about 2.5 million acres went into Choice "B"... resulting increase making over 3.5 million acres that will be planted to "B" cotton... this looks like 16.8 acres of cotton planted (a half million acres of the authorized land will go into conservation reserve)... but there won't be for its looks are deceiving... all of the "B" acreage will be planted if possible, but a considerable amount of the "A" acreage won't be... many farmers won't plant and won't turn in their allotment so some men have allotments who aren't farmers anymore... they have abandoned their farming and have found it too much trouble to notify their ASC committee... as predicted, California put a greater percentage of acreage into "B" than any other state... 60.6%... and Georgia was low with 1.4%... about 16% of the basic allotment of the country went into "B".

Soil Bank

There's a possibility of Congress being asked for more funds to take up to 40 million acres out of production... would cost about \$575 million or \$200 million more than the current annual payment ceiling.

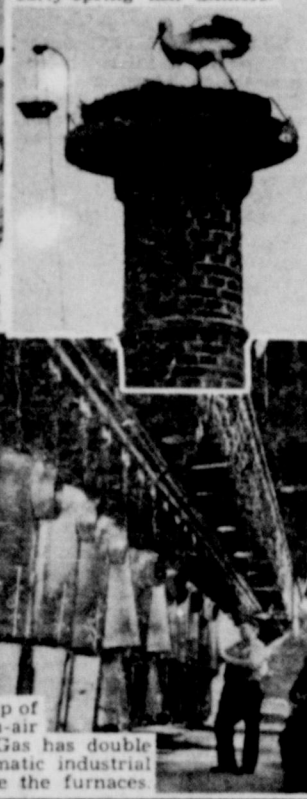

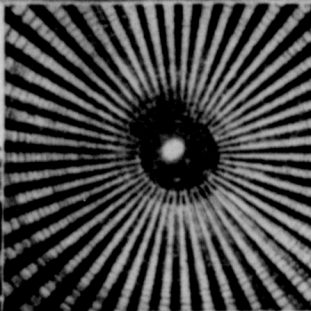

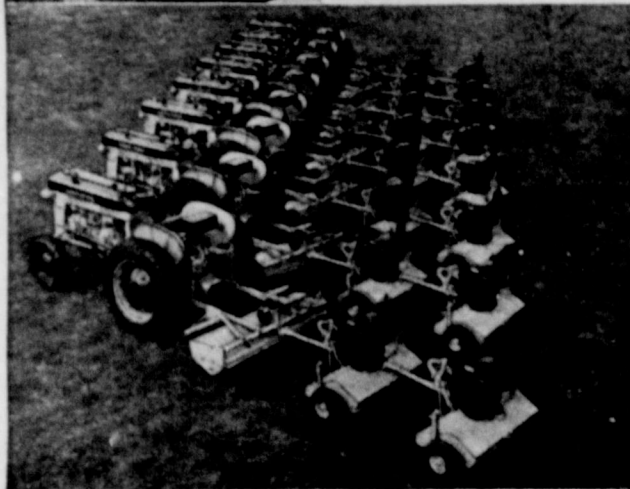
