12,000 Volts Prove Nearly Fatal Accident To Lineman

A near fatal accident occurred Wednesday afternoon about 4 p. m., when John Garrison, Line Foreman over a crew from Big Spring, was hanging a transformer for the city's new water-well on North Fourth Street, one block east of the Highway Warehouse.

Garrison and his crew, employees of the Texas Electric Service Company, were working on the line which carried 12,000 volts. He was atop the pole and in some manner, came in contact with the voltage.

He was painfully injured, although it was thought Wednesday

afternoon that he would recover. His clothes were practically burned from his body and he received burns about the arms, lower limbs and body. Except for the coolheadedness of his crew, the accident would probably have proved fatal. They climbed to the top of the pole and brought him

down, rushing him to a local hospital, where he is resting as well as could be expected.

Although in great pain and suffering from the severe shock Garrison was conscious all the way through.

His family was notified and started immediately for Lamesa.

The statements of Lamesa's two banks at the close of business, June 30th, show the county with nearly one hundred thousand dollars more on deposit than was shown a year ago.

The 1940 reports show that there are \$1,713,048.75 on deposit in the two institutions, while at the same date in 1939 there were \$1,616,828.78 on deposit. The March 31st statements showed \$2,112,579.58 on deposit.

Loans and discounts showed an increase in the 1940 statement with a total of \$798,324.60, as compared with \$593,518.89 at the last call and \$526,995.02 on June 30th, 1939.

Cash quickly available shows a total of \$1,101,090.05 for this call, while the March 31st call showed \$1,708,279.72 and the June 30th, 1939 call totaled \$1,252,163.23.

For the season of the year the banks in Lamesa show the very best condition. The June 30th statements usually shows deposits at a low ebb, and loans and discounts up.

New Oil Town No Longer To Be Known As Cedar Lake As Post Office Department Grants Office And Calls It White City

Announcement was made Wednesday that the new town of Cedar Lake now has a Post Office, except it is not Cedar Lake, but White City. The change in name was made by the Post Office department, because of the fact that there is already a Cedar Lake postoffice in Texas.

Walter Kadditz received the appointment as the first postmaster, and the new office will be set up in the townsite office.

It is also announced that Stanolind will likely start drilling on a new location Thursday. The new site is west of the American Warehouse No. 2, which was completed several weeks ago as a commercial producer. This well is out nearly to the center of the lake.

This makes the eighth well to be drilled in the Cedar Lake pool, and there has not been a dry hole yet. With pipeline connection assured for the new field, it is felt that activity will be on the increase there shortly.

According to Bill White, the line being built from the Denver City pool to Big Spring, will come close to Cedar Lake, and there is to be a line built from the Yoakum field to Midland, which will also run very close to the Cedar Lake pool. One, or possibly both of these, may be tapped.

United States Army To Show Equipment Here

Is Part Of Preparedness Day Programs Being Held Over Entire United States

Interest in the Motorized Train which the United States Army will have in Lamesa Tuesday, July 9th has mounted steadily since the announcement was released Monday.

With three armored cars, three scout cars, anti-aircraft guns, 50-calibre machine guns as well as a great deal of other army equipment, this bids fair to be one of the most interesting exhibits ever displayed in Lamesa.

The unit will be accompanied by a United States Army Band and a personnel of about fifty officers and men. These officers will be in position to accept applications for entry in any branch of the United States Army and those who enlist and are accepted, may if they desire, leave Lamesa with the train, for the branch of service they prefer.

The train will arrive in Lamesa at 9 a. m. and will be here until 3 p. m., during which time the equipment will be open for public inspection, and those in charge will be glad to answer all questions pertaining to entry in the service.

This Preparedness Day here, is one of a series being put on by the government all over the United States. The train will be in Big Spring Monday, Lamesa Tuesday and Lubbock Wednesday. It will travel from there on to other points. There is a large number of these trains touring the nation, putting on Preparedness Day programs.

The local Preparedness Day program will consist of talks by both Army officers, as well as local citizens. The details had not been worked out Wednesday as to the program, but those who visit Lamesa that day, are promised something worthwhile.

Plumbers Must Be Examined Before Working In City

At a special meeting of the City Commission Monday evening, an Examining and Supervising Board of Plumbers was created to meet the terms of the law governing cities with population of over 5,000 inhabitants. The law provides: "Except in cities of less than five thousand inhabitants, a license shall not be issued to any person to carry on or work at the business of plumbing, or to act as an inspector of plumbing, until he has appeared before an examining or supervising board for examination and registration and shall have successfully passed the required examination."

The law provides that this board shall be composed of five members. The city health officer, the city engineer, the city inspector of plumbing, a master plumber of not less than ten years active and continuous experience as a plumber, and one journeyman plumber of not less than five years of such active and continuous experience.

The Board as created is composed of City Engineer, J. R. Pruitt, City Health Officer, Dr. J. C. Loveless, City Inspector of Plumbing, E. J. Tanner, and Plumbers S. F. Reynolds and R. H. Williams.

The state law also provides: "Any person, whether as master plumber, employed or journeyman plumber, engaged in, working at, or conducting the business of plumbing without license as provided by law, shall be fined not less than twenty-five nor more than two hundred and fifty dollars."

The City officials stated that hereafter all said laws will be strictly enforced and that all persons expecting to practice plumbing in the City must appear before said Board and pass the required examination and register.

Local Officials Leave Monday for Important Meet

County Judge W. M. Yates, Mayor W. L. Marr, and Raymond Lee Johns, secretary of the Lamesa Chamber of Commerce, will leave Monday morning for Waco, where they will attend a statewide meeting called by Governor W. Lee O'Daniel, for the purpose of discussing airports for every county in the state, as a part of the National Defense plan.

Dawson County has no adequate airport facilities, and it is hoped that as a result of this meeting, the county may secure a port adequate for the present as well as the future needs of the community.

It is believed that under the defense plan, the city and county will only be required to furnish the land of approximately two hundred acres, with the Federal government furnishing the money for buildings, etc.

It is also believed that if such a port is established here, that Army men and planes will be sent here for the purpose of civilian training of pilots, as a part of the Defense Plan.

Local People Will Attend Statewide Airport Meet At Waco Monday, July 8th

County Judge W. M. Yates, Mayor W. L. Marr, Raymond Lee Jones, manager of the Lamesa, Chamber of Commerce, and possibly others, will go to Waco Monday, July 8th, to attend a statewide meeting called by the Governor's Statewide Planning Committee.

Purpose of the meeting will be for the purpose of building new airports and the improvement of existing fields.

It is understood that Dawson County has a very good opportunity of securing an airport, with government aid. It is thought that all that will be required of the local governments, will be the securing of approximately two hundred acres of land, suitable for the port and that the government, through WPA, will take care of the remainder. Of course this is merely conjecture, and the entire plan will be revealed at the Waco meeting.

Local officials are greatly enthusiastic over the prospects of securing a port and are quoted as saying they will do everything possible, and necessary to get it.

There is a growing belief that these ports, located in various cities over the nation, will be chosen as governmental training fields for civilian pilots, as a part of the Federal Government's defense program. This of course is only supposition, but it is being discussed more and more by air-minded citizens.

There is also great possibility of Lamesa securing an airline at a future date, provided adequate airport facilities are provided.

It has been stated that Lamesa is the largest town in West Texas without an airport, and air-minded citizens are doing everything in their power to secure such a port.

Dr. Cox Says:-

A warning about the dangers of snake bite has just been issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. A number of cases of snake bite are reported each year in Texas during the summer and early fall; however, few of them result fatally.

Most of the bites occur on the hands or feet, which indicates that stepping or falling in the immediate vicinity of an unseen snake or picking up objects under similar conditions are the hazards of contracting snake bite. The pain following the injection of poison is most intense. Other symptoms are swelling, giddiness, difficult breathing, hemorrhage, weak pulse, and vomiting.

If one is bitten by a poisonous snake, such as the rattlesnake, the following first aid measures should be carried out:

After making proper incisions at the site of the wound, apply suction and continue for at least half an hour.

Apply a tourniquet above the site of the wound, releasing same every ten or fifteen minutes for about a minute at a time.

Secure the services of a physician at the earliest possible moment.

DO NOT run or get overheated and DO NOT take any alcoholic

Dr. Cox Says:-

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer today warned city and county health officers over the state to take immediate control measures against the spread of diarrhea and enteritis (summer complaint). Widespread outbreaks of the disease have already been noted in several parts of Texas and unless immediate checks against the disease are inaugurated there is a likelihood that the 1940 morbidity and mortality total may rise above that for 1939, when a total of 2,338 deaths were reported in Texas.

"June, July and August of each year witness the peak prevalence of intestinal disorders, most of the victims being infants who suffer from so-called 'summer complaint.' Adults are also often affected, the food being quite susceptible," Dr. Cox further pointed out.
Infants actually develop enteritis, accompanied by fever and severe diarrhea due to inflammation of the bowels. The patient's bowels discharge often contain blood and mucus. Convulsions and coma frequently precede fatality, particularly in the infant type of summer diarrhea.

URGES DUCK REGULATIONS

Duck hunting regulations, which if adopted by the U. S. Bureau of Biological Survey, would undoubtedly bring better fall sport to Texans, have again been urged upon Dr. Ira N. Gabrielson, chief of the Bureau, by the executive secretary of the Texas Game Department.

Regulations recommended by the Texas game chief include: allowing of hunting to start at sunrise rather than 7 a. m., an earlier season in the northern half of the state and the use of a few live decoys. These are the principal objections Texas sportsmen have to the regulations on migratory waterfowl. The chief urged the same recommendations upon the Bureau last year, but federal authorities were unable to adapt them.

OUT-O-DOORS

Q. Who was the first Commissioner of the General Land office?

A. The first Commissioner of the General Land office was John P. Borden, brother of Gail Borden who founded a fortune on condensed milk. Bascom Giles, the present Commissioner, is the twenty-first man to hold this office.

FACTUAL: The first fire company in Texas was organized in Houston in 1836—before the city was chartered—and was known as A. C. Allen's Bucket Brigade and Protection Fire Co. No. 1.

Q. What is the enrollment of the American Legion in Texas?

A. Commander Lou Roberts of Borger reports an enrollment now of 28,222 which is a gain of 2,240 over the same date in 1939.

ODDITY: A male walking on an inclined tread mill furnished the motive power to print newspapers in Houston in 1862. Because of conditions during the war between the states, Willard S. Richardson moved from Galveston to Houston to publish the Galveston News, and the male was used to make the presses go.

Q. Who was Lorenzo De Zavala?

A. De Zavala was an international character whose experiences extended over several European countries and several of the American republics. He was the first vice-president of the Republic of Texas. His nephew, Augustine De Zavala, lives in Austin.

FISH STORY: A twelve foot giant fossil fish from the Cretaceous of Texas is on display in the Texas Memorial Museum. It was dug from solid rock and is one of two complete skeletons found in Texas, having been excavated from rock Austin, Chalk, near Celina in Collin county.

HISTORICAL: Sam Houston, David Burnett, and Anson Jones, all three of whom were presidents of the Republic of Texas, were brother Masons and members of the same lodge, Holland Lodge No. 1 of Houston.

Q. Where was New Icaria founded?

A. In 1848, a French Socialist settlement, named New Icaria, was made near Justin in Denton Co. MUSEUM: Collections or exhibits in the Texas Memorial Museum are built around an educational idea, because the individual is concerned with information that is usable in his struggle to "get along."

Q. How many colonies were approved by the Mexican government prior to the Texas Revolution of 1835-36?

A. Bascom Giles, Commissioner of the General Land office, states there are records in the Land Office to indicate there were fourteen such colonies. Stephen F. Austin was impetuous of four and in partnership with Samuel Williams of a fifth. The other nine colonies were: McMullins and McGloins DeLeon's, DeWitt's, Robertson's, Fower and Hewitsons Milam's, Burnett's and Zavala's.

When and where will the A-

Over 500 Farms
Measured In
County

Over 500 farms have been measured and checked in Dawson County. Quite a number of farms are found to be overplanted on cotton allotment. Inasmuch, as some of this cotton over the county is now in the blooming stage, which is the stage at which the bolls are first formed, it is very important that all farm operators check their cotton acreage carefully before the reporter calls at the farm. In other words, if the cotton acreage has been measured and it is found that there is excess cotton acreage after the bolling stage has been reached, this excess cotton cannot be plowed under after reaching this stage of growth.

At present numerous questions are being asked in the County A. C. A. Office relative to planting land that was planted to cotton and has blown out, to feed crops. This is entirely permissible but care should be exercised in not exceeding the total soil depleting allotment. The total soil depleting allotment is the total of the cotton and general allotments and what allotment, if any. This land may be planted to any feed crop, such as grain sorghum and corn. All land planted to cotton in 1940 and later planted to feed should be reported by the farmer to the measuring reporter.

If the total soil depleting allotment is over seeded due to over planting the general allotment, no opportunity will be given to plow this excess acreage under, unless of course it is plowed under before the measuring reporter measures the farm.

To avoid penalty, however, it is permissible to plow under cotton acreage to offset excess general crops.

Dawson County has all new farm maps that are being used in this year's compliance. Practically all farms are checking out the same acreage as in previous measurements. These new maps should be more accurate than the old maps. Remeasurments should not be requested unless there is a substantial difference in the measured crop land. The County AAA Office would like to again call to the attention of the farmers the necessity of making a deposit for rechecking all farmland. This deposit is required in all cases and is subject to re-

measured.

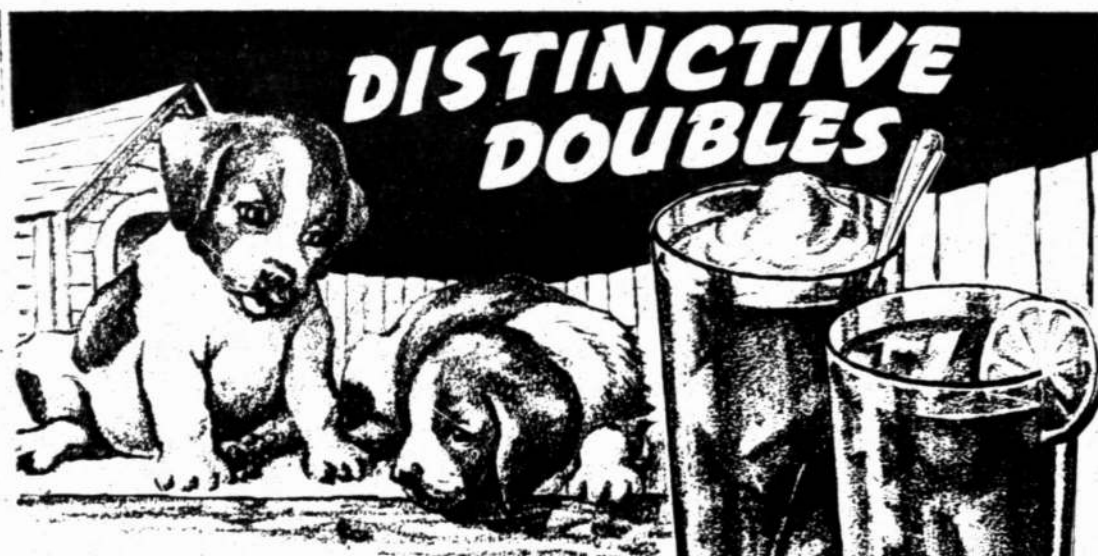
