## Chamber breakfast slated Wednesday

The Colorado City Area Chamber of Commerce will hold its quarterly Business Forum breakfast/program Wednesday, July 20, beginning at 6:30 a.m. in the Fellowship Hall of First United Methodist Church.

Speaker for the forum will be Robert Prock, manager of the West Texas Regional Office of the Texas A&M University System. Prock will explain the Small Business Incubator concept to help start new businesses, which is being instituted by the local Chamber. Prock, 47, has a wide background in marketing, management, accounting and economics and has been very active in chambers of commerce and other service organizations.

Chamber manager David Janca said that TV station KTXS will be here on Monday, July 18, for an interview with the local Business Incubator steering committee, and will return Wednesday to film the Breakfast Forum. The coverage will be televised on the station's 6 p.m. news program Monday.

Tickets are now on sale at the Chamber Office for \$9.00 for both the July 20 and the November 16 business forums. The breakfast for the events will be prepared and served by the Methodist Men's organization.

## Sales tax rebates jump to \$41,450

A total of \$41,450.02 in sales tax rebates, from May sales, have been received from the State by the various local taxing entities.

Colorado City received \$27,090.85 from its 1 1/2% levy, a 77.23% increase over the \$15,285.48 received for the period last year. For the year, thus far, Colorado City has received \$192,110.54, up 41.18% over the \$136,072.13 at this time last year.

The City of Westbrook received \$513.51, bringing the total for the year to \$9,168.19, an increase of 121.04% over the \$4,130.89 in rebates a year ago.

Loraine did not receive any rebate this month, but has received \$2,884.64 thus far for the year, down 2.93% from last year.

From its 1/2% sales tax levy, Mitchell County received \$13,845.66 for the period, bringing the year's total to \$69,692.19.

State-wide the sales tax rebates were up an overall 14.3%, indicating a continuing recovery from the economic slump experienced the past two years.

In comparison with surrounding cities, local sales have been generally stronger. Big Spring had \$83,935, down 15.90%; Sweetwater had \$47,719.93, down 6.22%; and Snyder had \$57,085.09, an increase of 23.09% for the May reporting period.

## \$2.5 million in state aid received in '87

The Texas Department of Human Services has spent an average of \$216,368 per month, or about \$2,596,416, in Mitchell County during 1987, Ray L. Dunavant, Regional Administrator, has advised Mitchell County Judge Bill Carter.

Mitchell County represents 1.27% of the total population of the region, and received 1.67% of the DHS expenditures in the region last year.

Of the total monthly expenditures, direct services included \$12,152 per month for family aid and dependent children, \$48,482 in food stamps, \$11,952 for Medicaid prescriptions, \$32,643 for health services, and \$82,087 in nursing home payments.

Monthly contracted services included \$4,548 for Child Day Care, \$2,649 for Foster Care, \$7,176 for family care and \$4,932 for medical transportation.

Staffing expenditures included \$8,833 for salaries, \$729 for travel expenses, and \$185 for overhead cost, per month.

## 5-Year Capital Improvement Plan drafted for Colorado City

\$3.9 million expenditures projected

After nearly ten months of work, a 5-year Capital Improvement Plan for the City of Colorado City, was presented to the City Council last Tuesday.

The plan, which projects major expenditures of \$3,984,100 over the next five years was drawn up by a committee composed of Council members Tom Carlock, Dee Hearn, Bob Reily, former City Manager Dan Johns, City Manager Brenda Hammond; Buz Rich, Public Works Director; and David Sanders, Water Superintendent in weekly meeting with the various department heads.

Largest projected expenditure is a \$3,000,000 water facilities upgrade project, to be financed by revenue bonds, scheduled in 1992. Other major expenditures are for planned equipment purchases for landfill and sanitation equipment, street paving, and sewer line upgrades.

Included in the the plan are planned expenditures for new or expanded facilities which cost more than \$1,000. Each year's projects will be reviewed and revised as necessary, and be included in the annual budget, and the plan will continue a five year projection with the addition of another year.

The 1989 plan, which has already been included in the current budget calls for \$229,420 in capital improvements. 1990 will include \$206,420; 1991 has \$208,920;

1992 totals \$3,181,920; and 1993 total \$157,420. These expenditures are all above and beyond the city's normal annual operating budget.

A breakdown of all the planned capital improvements are shown elsewhere.

In presenting the plan, the

committee stated "The Capital Improvement Program represents a commitment to the future of the community, giving priority to needs to improve or repair existing facilities, facilitate new development and serve new

businesses, homes and citizens."

Implementation of the plan will allow: (1) systematic review of proposed projects to coordinate timing, location and financing, to avoid mismanagement; (2) determination of the most appropriate means of financing the expen-

ditures and allowing enough "lead-time" to prepare for it; (3) to ensure linking of the Master Plan with the fiscal plan for physical development; and (4) stabilization of tax rated through intelligent debt management.

The Capital Improvement plan is a means of documenting adequate growth management for the city.

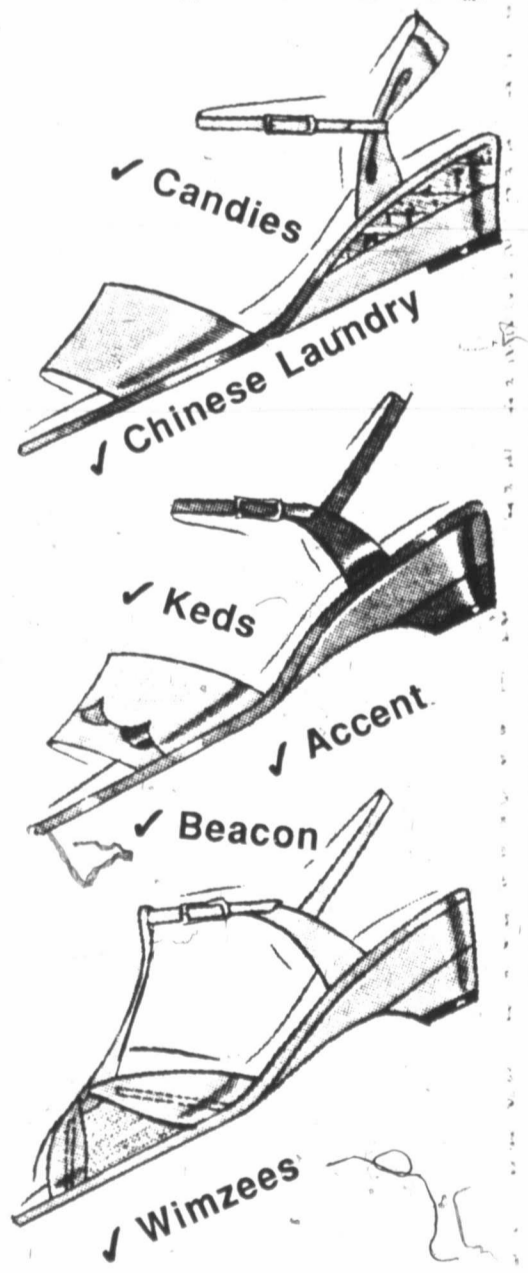
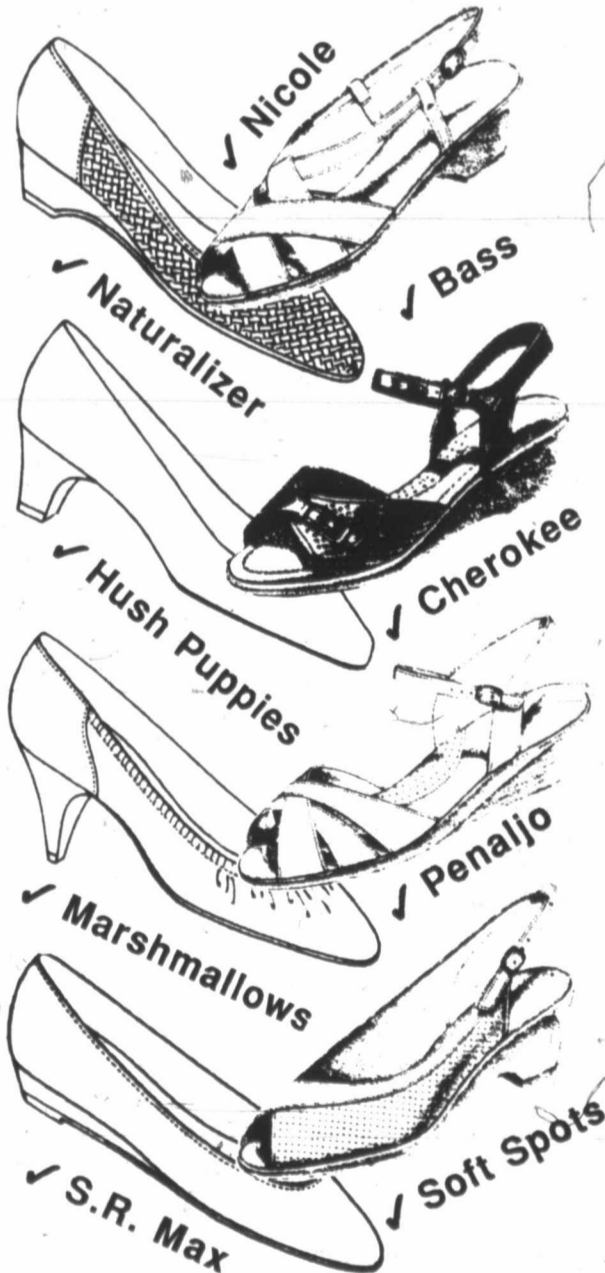

It's hard to understand guys like Kenneth Cooper. Dr. Cooper, you'll recall, is director of the Aerobic Center in Dallas. His fitness program is used by both the U.S. Navy and the U.S. Air Force.

At birth.

I must sound terribly jealous of the man, but it's only because I am. The way I see it, Dr. Cooper looks better, feels better, makes more money and will live to a later date than I will - even though he got a 12-year head start.

No man should be allowed such privilege.

A friend gave me this book years ago and I dutifully filed it in the book shelf along with all of my other self-improvement books. There is where it should have stayed. But no...there I was lying in front of the television set, minding my own business and sipping on a cold drink which is known for its high caloric content. I was dipping my guacomole salad and watching the ball game, bothering nobody really, when the book began talking to me.

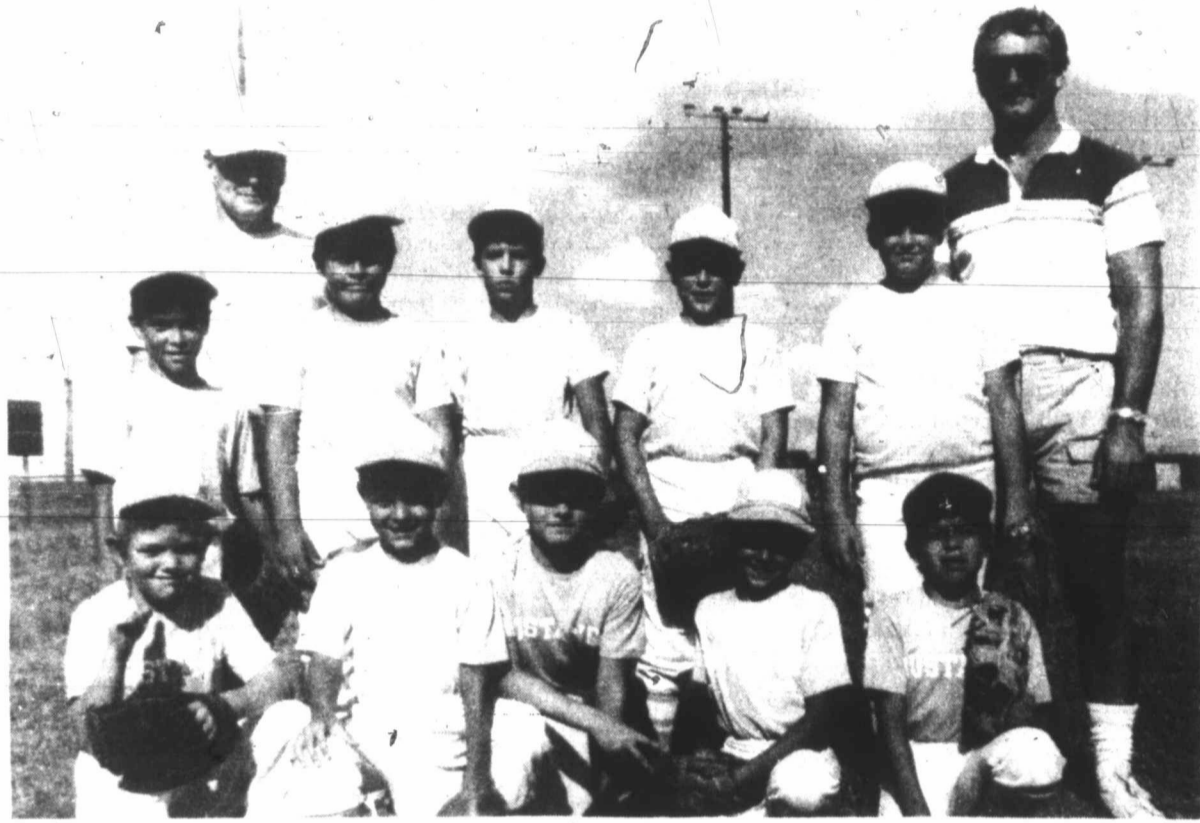

The event will be conducted in the WCTCOG offices, 1025 East North 10th Street at Judge Ely Boulevard in Abilene.

The session will begin at 10 a.m. and conclude by 3:30 p.m. Lunch will be provided; there is no registration fee. The Workshop will be directed toward both officials and staff of local governments who have primary fiscal responsibilities in their respective areas.

The workshop will be presented by Jim Edwards, Administrator of Technical Programs for local governments in the office of the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts, the lead agency in Texas with expertise in all areas of local government finance.

During the morning, the Public purchasing section will include information about internal control

measures, centralized purchasing and laws governing purchasing. The Court Cost section will cover statutes regulating court costs, how they are administered, recent changes in the law, and the amount courts may keep from fees. Following lunch, the Cash Management discussion will focus on ways to save and generate money through timely deposits, how to aggregate money, and how to save on interests (for instance, in capital purchases).

The session will be geared to real-world, everyday local government finance, and will feature specific, tangible instruction and suggestions which will be of help to officials both in more effective management of public dollars and in compliance with applicable laws and regulations.
