BANDITS ROB FOUR BANKS IN MID-WEST

MORE THAN TWELVE THOUSAND KNOWN TO BE TAKEN

(By Associated Press)

PADEN, Okla., June 20.—The First National Bank of Paden was robbed today of approximately \$2,000 in cash and bonds by three young men who fled westward after locking the cashier and bookkeeper in the vault.

The robbery was accomplished in orthodox manner. A. R. Novotny, cashier, and G. D. Massey, bookkeeper, were alone in the bank. They were forced to lie on the floor while the two young men entered the bank looted the till and safe. Novotny and Massey then were forced into the vault, from which they managed to emerge about 10 minutes later.

A check of the loss had not been completed an hour after the robbery. Novotny said it was approximately \$2,000 including \$400 or \$500 worth of bonds. Officers in surrounding towns were notified. Paden is in western Oklahoma county.

MISSOURI BANK IS HELD UP BY LONE MAN

FERRELVIEW, Mo., June 20. (AP)—Holding bank employees and customers at bay with a revolver, an unmasked man today held up and robbed the Ferrelview State Bank of an undetermined amount of money and escaped in a motor car in which another man was waiting.

The robber, equipped with all the loose bills and change in sight in the cashier's cage.

As the robber ran from the bank, employees of the institution fired a number of shots through the windows at him and the motor car.

Two Star State Witnesses Heard In McKee Trial

MRS. MAYHALL AND DAUGHTER ARE ON STAND

COMPANION OF MAN CHARGED RELATES INCIDENTS

LAMESA, June 20.—Two star state witnesses, Mrs. Emma Mayhall and her 9-year-old daughter, Ida, were heard from the witness stand here this morning in the case of Ira McKee, charged with murder in the fatal shooting of W. R. Billingsley at Sparsburg on May 1st.

Mrs. Mayhall, companion of McKee at the time he is alleged to have killed Billingsley during an attempted filling station robbery, testified that she was forced to accompany McKee when the latter made his wild flight from the scene of the tragedy.

Left Engine Running "I was driving with McKee," the woman said, "and when he came to Sparsburg he told me to leave the engine in the car running while he went to see a fellow."

"After I heard several shots McKee came back and told me that a man had knocked him down and he had to shoot him. He told me that if I told anybody he'd kill me too."

Ida Mayhall, the woman's daughter, corroborated her mother's testimony in a childish treble when later called to the stand.

CO-OP FAVORED IN LAMB

MEETING IS HELD TODAY IN LITTLEFIELD

MOSER EXPLAINS WORK OF BRANCH OFFICE BEFORE GROUP

LITTLEFIELD, June 20.—Virtually assured of a branch office of the Texas Cotton Cooperative association, Littlefield business men closed their doors in responsive approval and united with farmers of Lamb, Crosby and Hale counties this afternoon at a mass meeting where C. O. Moser, vice president and secretary of the American Cotton Cooperative association, outlined the fundamentals leading to establishment of unit organization in this city.

Branch offices with surrounding receiving stations are practically bringing the world cotton market to the farmer's door," Mr. Moser told a group of 50 business men and farm leaders at a conference this morning. The business discussion of the morning session was the barometer which revealed local enthusiasm and virtually presaged the success of a branch office.

"I am gratified over the universal response of Littlefield and Lamb county citizens," he said. "One can reasonably predict that 1,000 members will be enrolled in this county."

This afternoon's meeting is being held in the Palace theater.

The association is receiving more requests for branch offices than can be granted, Mr. Moser said. There are 70 towns applying for the division offices, while 28 have been located.

N. H. Payne, of Lubbock, field representative of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton association, is attending the local meetings.

BUILDING IN GOTHAM FALLS

SCORE OF MEN SAID TO BE AT WORK WHEN COLLAPSE COMES

NEW YORK, June 20.—A five-story building on lower Washington street, in downtown New York, occupied by a fruit firm, was reported to have collapsed today with twenty men at work in it. Fire and police trucks and six ambulances were sent to the scene.

An eye-witness of the wreck said that "the whole building seems to be in the street." Police and firemen were digging in the ruins and police lines held back huge crowds which gathered. The site of the collapse was in the wholesale fruit and vegetable warehouse district.

ITHACA, N. Y., June 20. (AP)—Discovery of the reason why anesthesia causes unconsciousness was announced today at Cornell university.

They cause nerve cells to become thick and white, like tiny hard-boiled eggs. Oblivion accompanies this change, and consciousness does not return until the cells resume their normal state.

The amazing part of the discovery is that a knockout blow on the head or the coma of narcotics or intoxication all produce similar cell changes.

PRICES SAID TO BE FAIR

MEETING IS HELD ON PRODUCE MARKET PRICES HERE

Representatives of local produce houses met this morning with the board of directors of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce in joint discussion of comparative figures on the produce market, a conference occasioned by criticism recently made against the local prices by a group of farmers and business men of the county.

The produce men said that prices paid in this city are favorably comparable with those paid in other cities of West Texas and stressed that they could not continue to do such a large volume of business unless the local market is kept fair and just.

Survey Report Given

A survey made March 6, which varies perhaps from the present market, shows that the following prices were paid at that time: Lubbock, eggs, 16 cents; butter, 30 cents; sweet cream, 40 cents; sour cream, 28 cents. 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DEDICATION FOR NEW AIR FIELD HELD

OVER 250 PLANES ARE IN AIR FOLLOWING CEREMONIES

(By Associated Press)

SAN ANTONIO, June 20.—Beneath flying flags and a blue sky, 10,000 San Antonians and visitors from all sections of the state, today witnessed the formal ceremonies at Randolph Field as the "West Point of the Air" was dedicated to the future of aviation in this country.

Describing the 2300 acres of smoothly-rolling land as "the best site I have ever seen for a flying field," Brigadier General Frank P. Lahm, commander of the air corps training center, declared the new training center as equal to meeting any demands which the department of aviation may make for the next century.

Presentation of the field was made by Mayor C. M. Chambers to Major General James E. Fechet, chief of the air corps.

Mrs. William Randolph, widow of the late Captain Randolph for whom the field has been named, stood beside General Lahm and raised the United States flag to the top of the pole. As the flag glided toward the blue sky, a 21-gun salute sounded over the great field.

When completed he said the field would have a capacity of 500 planes and the necessary personnel.

At 11 o'clock the field received its aerial baptism as 250 army planes from Brooks, Kelly and Dodd fields, Fort Crockett, Fort Field, Okla., and March Field, Calif., circled over the crowds in an aerial review.

WARDEN QUILTS TEXAS PRISON

E. F. HARRELL RESIGNS THURSDAY; NO ONE NAMED YET

HUNTSVILLE, June 20.—Resignation of Warden E. F. Harrell of the Texas state penitentiary was announced here today by Leo Simmons, general manager of the prison system.

Harrell submitted his resignation Thursday and it took effect at once, Simmons said.

No reason was given for the resignation according to Simmons. No successor has been selected.

Captain R. H. Vaughan, assistant warden, was appointed acting warden, and Captain N. E. Barfield was promoted to the assistant warden's post.

Mr. Simmons, who is empowered to appoint and retire the warden said he would "not be in any hurry" to name a permanent warden.

The manager said he did not care to make any statement in connection with Harrell's resignation.

Mr. Harrell was out of town, and could not be reached for a statement.

LUBBOCK MAN LINES UP ON SMALL'S SIDE

SENATOR TO GIVE OUT STATEMENT TOMORROW ON WITHDRAWAL

State Senator Pink L. Parrish, of Lubbock, whose candidacy for the democratic gubernatorial nomination was filed by Crosby county friends, will not make the race for the office.

In a telegram to The Journal today Senator Parrish said: "Withdrawing my name as candidate for governor. Will support my friend Clint Small and will have statement for papers tomorrow."

The action puts to rest conflicting declarations of the past two weeks concerning Senator Parrish's political activities.

When his candidacy was filed with the State Democratic Executive committee on June 2, Senator Parrish was en route to a Shrine convention in Toronto, Canada, and could not be reached for a statement. He was in Fort Worth yesterday, conferring with Lee Satterwhile, campaign manager for Clint Small, Washington senator, going from there to the capital. The Journal's statement of today is the first Senator Parrish has made since his candidacy was filed.

Lee Satterwhile, former Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives and a longtime political power in West Texas, told The Journal over the phone from Fort Worth yesterday that he had conferred with Senator Parrish and that the Lubbock man had decided to withdraw from the race and support Senator Small. TWO ACCIDENTS HAD ON OUTING

AMSTERDAM, Holland, June 20.

Two accidents which brought injuries to several of his guests and servants marked an outing of the former Kaiser, William Hohenzollern, and his family yesterday.

One was a boat explosion and the other was an automobile accident. Wilhelm, with his wife, the Princess Hermine, and about ten members of his household were guests of the Countess Pannewitz on two boats on Lake Kaag, near Leyden, when an explosion occurred on one of the craft.

The boat, which was not that on which the former Kaiser and Princess Hermine were riding, burst into flames and sank rapidly. The other boat immediately went to the aid of passengers and crew and pulled them aboard. Three persons were injured, two being members of the former Kaiser's household and the third a mechanic. The explosion was not explained.

In the second accident a motor car in which servants of Wilhelm were traveling between the Hague and Harlem overturned and the occupants were slightly injured.

The former Kaiser sent an aide to inquire after the sufferers, who were sent to a hospital.

"He was lying on the concrete at the time," she stated, adding that the concrete in question was the "porch in front of the cafe."

"I heard three gun shots fired before I got there," she continued. "I stopped when I heard the fourth shot fired."

Saw the Man
Mrs. Billingsley said she was "18 or 20 feet" from the man in whose hand she saw a pistol and who had fired the shots at her husband.

"I saw him down on the concrete and I saw this man shoot," she continued. "He was down on the concrete. This man says 'I don't guess that you will think I am joking now,' and then he walked away."

Mrs. Billingsley said that she heard her husband say it was a "dirty trick to hold up a widow woman."

The witness then told of going up the stairs to the court house at Lubbock on Wednesday, the day before the trial opened to the jail and of hearing a voice in the jail which she identified as "the one I heard speak to my husband." She was positive in her identification of the voice and effects of Mr. Sheard to shake her under cross-examination failed.

Tells of Plan
A. M. Bennett, deputy sheriff, told of the plan used to get McKee, then in jail, to talk so that Mrs. Billingsley might hear him and identify the voice, if possible. John Keller, a state highway patrolman and Jack

Reavis, also a patrolman, were the ones talking to McKee.

Strenuous objections to this testimony were made by defense counsel and exceptions taken to the overruling of the court.

Mrs. Mary Bryce, mother of Jack Bryce, herself a holdup victim, made a good witness for the state. In a strong, positive voice, more certain even than that of Mrs. Billingsley, Mrs. Bryce outlined the events of the holdup.

Under cross-examination her story was unshaken. She testified that her son, after the shooting, went outside, picked up a shotgun there that she believed Mr. Billingsley had brought with him and "fired the gun twice to attract attention of the neighborhood."

Mrs. Bryce also claimed that she had observed the defendant "walk just like" the man did who had entered her filling station the night of the shooting. This statement brought objection on the part of the defense attorneys.

Jack Bryce, the third eye-witness to the holdup, said he had been "kicked four or five times" by the hi-jacker. "After he got the money he kicked me again," he stated.

"As he ran out of the store after he fired the first shot, that hit Mr. Billingsley, Mr. Billingsley hit him over the head," young Bryce stated.

It was after he had fallen that Mr. Billingsley was shot twice, the witness testified.

Verna Bryce, the daughter of Mrs. Bryce, was a short witness. She merely told of being across the street when she saw the holdup man go into the family's place of business. She then crossed the street, saw through the door what was taking place and ran back and told Mr. Billingsley.

put to use after its discovery.

May Fly Down There
Within a few years it may be that people will be flying down there. At least permanent weather stations should be established and it will be only a few years until they will.

He pictured the South Polar area as a once tropical land, with carboniferous deposits like America's coal age, but "now in the clutches of an ice age with glaciers still active."

The bottom of the world, he said, has even more effect than the north on weather and he praised the members of his expedition who carried

on the scientific studies in temperatures exceeding 75 degrees below zero.

Observations Made
There were half-hour observations during the long polar night of the aurora australis, which is believed to have great effect on the world's weather, and readings later when the sun came back over the frigid wastes.

Important radio readings were taken, he said, especially of the short-wave echoes which were caught in their journey through space.

From the writer of scientific material four books will be written to which Rear Admiral Byrd will contribute one article, on the geographical aspect.

and thence to Amarillo, it was said Thursday by Walter H. Beck, vice chairman of the highway committee of the Chamber of Commerce.

Highway No. 24 already is designated between Seymour, in Baylor county, to Benjamin, in Knox county, with construction work under way from Benjamin eastward to the county line and a hard surfaced road already built from the county line into Seymour. Knox county has voted bonds for construction of the highway westward from Benjamin to the King county line, but the stretch across King county apparently is the greatest stumbling block in the way of the highway's completion, according to Beck.

Dickens Has Unit
Dickens county, just west of King, has a hard surfaced highway that will be part of Highway No. 24 when it is completed, that runs west from Dickens to the Crosby county line.

East of Dickens, to the King county line, no provision has been made for the highway, but Dickens county officials have placed themselves on record as promising that they will complete this stretch when King county agrees to paving of the highway through its territory, according to Beck. Beck pointed out that King county is sparsely settled, and is served by but two highways, what will be No. 24 when it is designated, running east and west, and by Highway No. 4 running north and south.

Crosby county, lying immediately west of Dickens county, has voted road bonds for the stretch of the new highway, and has been promised state aid on the project, and this is true also of Lubbock county, to bring the highway into Lubbock.

Hearings to Be Held
Hearings are to be held in Austin within the next two weeks on various stretches of the highway west of Benjamin, and it is expected that work will be started this summer on some of the counties.

Coming eastward toward Fort Worth from Seymour, the grading has been completed between Seymour and Olney, and it is expected

that contracts will be let immediately for the surfacing of this stretch.

With the completion of Highway No. 24 from Olney westward to Lubbock, there will be nothing to stop construction of a new air-line road from Olney to Jackboro, which will reduce the present mileage between the two towns by about 17 miles and close a gap in the proposed highway, according to Beck.

The new road from Fort Worth to Jackboro will reduce the distance between these two towns by about 22 miles, although the present road to Jackboro by way of Mineral Wells is being improved, also. The present 10-mile stretch of dirt road in the Jackboro-Mineral Wells system is being reggraded now, and will be surfaced immediately, providing another all-weather road out of Fort Worth by way of Perrin and Salesville.

Graham-Mineral Wells Next
When all of these projects have been started on the road to completion, the next to receive the support of Fort Worth will be a new road between Graham and Mineral Wells, thus completing a network

that will serve the best interests of all that section of Fort Worth's trade territory, Beck said.

Highway No. 23 which is a part of the proposed Canada-to-Gulf Road, will connect with Highway No. 24 at Seymour, and runs north through Wilbarger county. The Wilbarger Commissioners Court has asked that the State Highway Commission seek federal aid in completion of the road through their section, and this project will also receive the support of Fort Worth, Beck said.

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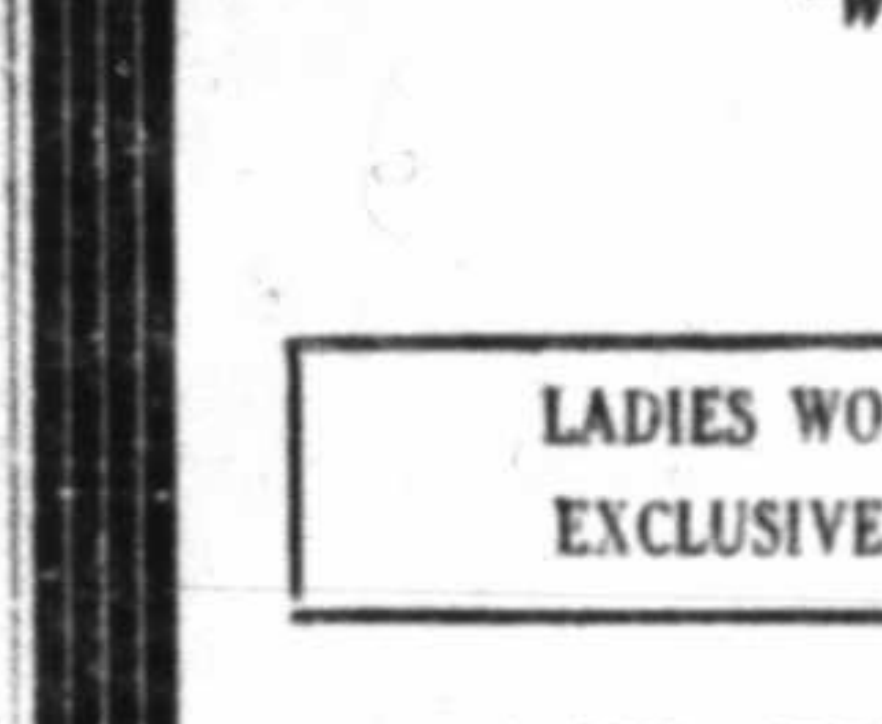

WILL INCOME TAX RATES BE HIGHER NEXT YEAR, WORRY TO WASHINGTON

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, June 20.—Washington is wondering if income tax rates are to be higher next year. Prospective expenditures for the next fiscal year are already estimated to exceed the total government revenue expected within that period. From present indications, in fact, the nation faces the threat of a deficit on July 1, 1937.

The one per cent reduction in taxes on incomes of 1936, those paid this year, was a temporary measure only. It took the form of a joint congressional resolution, instead of the usual tax revision measure, and unless action is taken to prolong its life, the rates on incomes of 1937 will revert to the level of those of 1936.

Treasury officials are watching the situation closely, but decline to express an opinion on whether the

reduction can be extended. A final decision will be reached in the fall. In his budget message of last December, President Hoover estimated the fiscal year 1937 would close with a surplus of \$122,788,966. Since then, the Spanish War pensions bill, approved over his veto, has added \$76,000,000 to prospective expenditures and the expenses of the farm board now are set at \$108,000,000 more than was then expected.

The total government revenue was then figured at \$4,225,008,080 for the fiscal year. Already congressional appropriations for the year, although they have not been totaled officially, are said to exceed that amount.

Police said the woman claimed Patmore turned over to her his restaurant papers and instructed her to sell the business and keep the money. He told her he would not return, she said. She told police Patmore had a mother and sister living in Quebec, Canada.

WAXAHACHIE, June 20. (AP)—The injunction suit of Joe Thompson, Waxahachie barber, against state and county officials to prevent enforcement of the state barber license law has been postponed from June 20 to June 27, on application of the defendants.

CANDIDATES ARE BUSY IN ADDRESS TOUR

SENATOR LOVE, YOUNG, MAYFIELD AND JIM ON ENGAGEMENTS

(By Associated Press)

WICHITA, Kan., June 20.—Senator Thomas B. Love of Dallas, candidate for governor, in a speech prepared for delivery here last night said one of the hardest fights he ever waged was to "prevent Texas from being disfranchised in the democratic primary election because the voters generally and overwhelmingly against turning the Tammany tiger into the White House in 1928."

He aimed his attack at Senator J. C. Small of Wellington, West coast, also seeking the gubernatorial nomination.

"Repeated efforts were made last year to pass laws which would provide for disfranchising every man and woman in Texas who voted as a voter in the 1928 election," he said.

"The hardest and most unusual thing about this contest was that the senator from Collingsworth county and some other senators whose districts voted overwhelmingly against the A. Smith election in the presidential race were among the hardest fighters for the passage of this legislation."

"FARMER JIM" SPEAKS FOR "MA" AT CLEBURNE

CLEBURNE, June 20 (AP)—Speaking for the candidacy of his wife, Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson, for governor, former Governor James E. Ferguson addressed a public mass meeting here last night.

He denounced the policies of Governor Dan Moody of State Senator Thomas B. Love and Ross S. Sterling, chairman of the state highway commission, and urged his hearers to "vote for a real democrat."

"Farmer Jim" attacked the proposed \$300,000,000 road bond issue and declared that road commissioners should be elected and not appointed.

YOUNG ATTACKS LOVE IN ATLANTA ADDRESS

ATLANTA, June 20 (AP)—Jim Young, candidate for governor, speaking to a crowd from three counties Thursday advised Senator Thomas B. Love of Dallas, one of his opponents, "to leave politics alone for awhile and go to Washington for a conference with his friend, Herbert Hoover, about prohibition."

He pointed out that President Hoover had announced his support of Dr. H. H. Marrow, United States senator from New Jersey on a platform favoring repeal of the 18th amendment.

"Senator Love can do more good for prohibition in Washington with President Hoover, the man he helped elect, than in Texas," Young said, adding: "When I was defending democracy against Love's attacks two years ago, Mayfield spoke in his tent and Ferguson never opened his mouth in defense of the party they now ask to honor them."

MAYFIELD SPEAKS ON TAXATION

CARTHAGE, June 20 (AP)—Earle B. Mayfield, former United States senator, addressed a Panola county gathering here last night, in the interest of his candidacy for the democratic gubernatorial nomination.

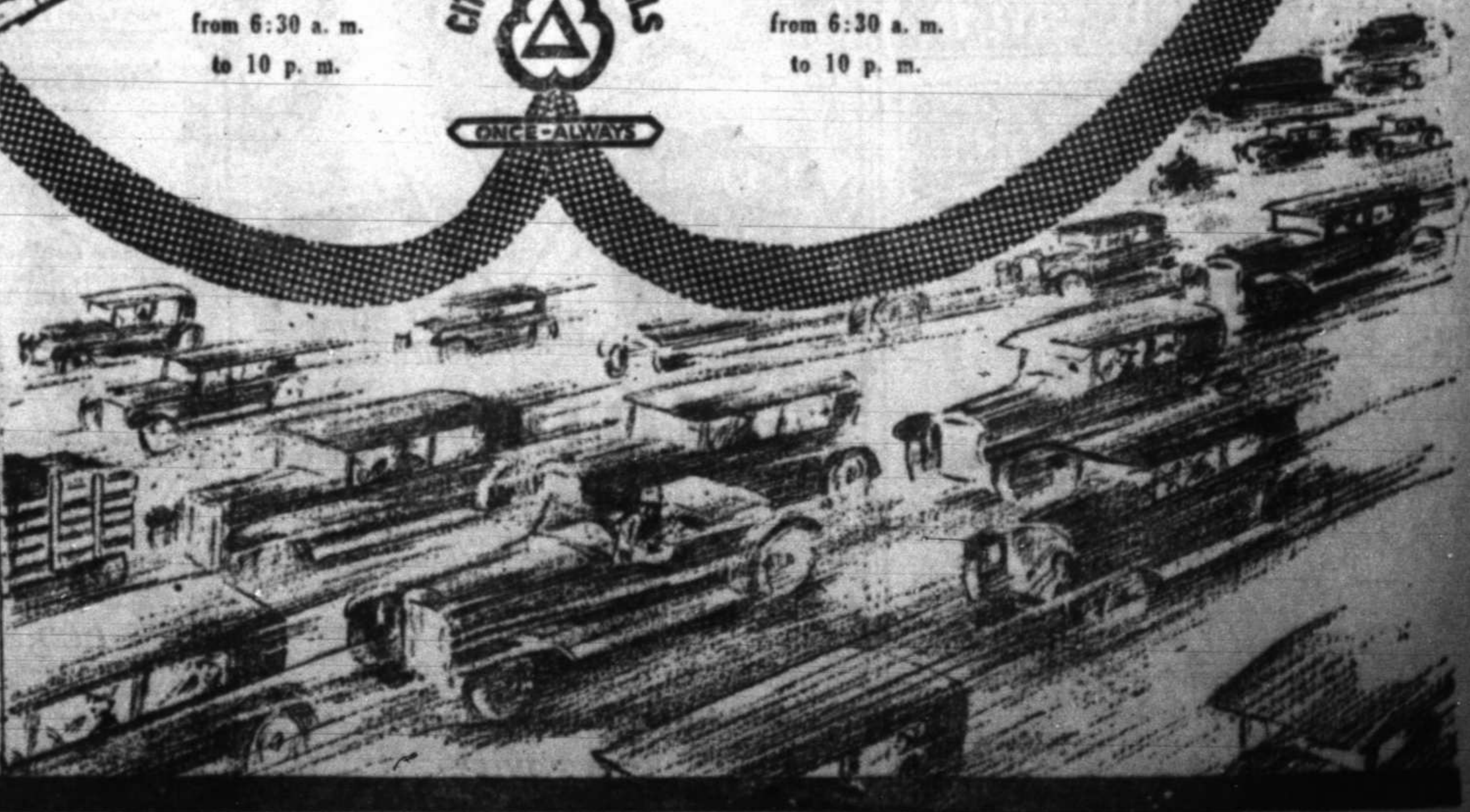

NEW BILLS IN EFFECT TODAY

LEGISLATION PASSED AT FIFTH CALLED SESSION ACTIVE

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, June 20.—Texas Legislature passed at fifth called session of the 41st legislature in effect today:

Senate bill 10: Revising the duties of the Commission of Appeals.

Senate bill 19: Authorizing the board of trustees of any county to incorporate with an independent school district on petition of majority of property owning voters.

House bill 37: Giving board of

trustees of common school districts right to contract for services of superintendent, principals and teachers for term of three years and independent school districts with population of 5,000 students right to contract with superintendents, principals and teachers for five years.

Senate bill 17: Creating the 113th district court of Harris county.

Senate bill 20: Amending barbers law by prescribing qualifications of class A and B barbers.

Senate bill 71: Authorizing the formation of oil royalty companies.

House bill 75: Revising method of giving notices of assessments for public works.

House bill 128: Providing for permanent certificates of exemption from the payment of poll taxes to all persons legally exempted.

House bill 135: Revising land title limitations statute.

House bill 39: Compelling prompt payment of automobile license fees to highway department by tax collectors.

House bill 19: Placing gross receipts tax on certain corporations.

House bill 7: Placing occupation tax of from \$5 to \$75 on theaters.

Senate bill 35: Regulating pipelines and common purchases of oil.

House bill 41: Placing tax of one per cent on gross receipts from sale of textbooks.

House bill 116: Making petroleum tank cars subject to tax at domicile or office of Texas operators.

Senate bill 75: Limiting the salary of county commissioners in counties with a population of 8,000 to not more than \$500 per year.

Senate bill 44: Providing for payment of three fourths of salary of county commissioners from road and bridge fund.

Senate bill 39: Placing land surveys of T. and P. Railway Co. in archives of land office.

Senate bill 37: Cancelling lease on Travis county court house.

Senate bill 30: Providing for election of school trustees in counties with a population of less than 75,000.

House bill 10: Improvement of the prison system through expenditure of \$575,000.

House bill 40: Creating 117th district court from Nueces county.

House bill 39: Limiting the time for filing notices for a new trial to thirty days and requiring a decision on the motion within 45 days from filing.

Senate bill 58: Making it mandatory for motorcycle officers to wear blue or gray uniforms in making arrests for speeding; towns of less than 10,000 population exempted.

Senate bill 82: Providing for condemnation of land for highway purposes.

Senate bill 27: Amending confederate pension law to give married veterans \$50 per month and unmarried veterans and widows \$25

SOUCEK FAILS TO SET MARK

FLIER'S ALTITUDE IS 76 FEET SHORT OF THE NEEDED MARK

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, June 20.—Lieutenant Apollo Soucek, U. S. N., was credited Wednesday with exceeding his previous seaplane world altitude record in a recent flight, but the new mark will not be recognized as an official record.

The National Aeronautic association today said the calibration of the barograph carried aloft by Soucek last Friday registered 39,140 feet, which lacked 76 feet of setting a new mark. New rules of the Federation Aeronautique Internationale, governing body in sporting aviation require that the old record must be surpassed by 200 meters, or 656 feet.

Blocker, Juarez.

attempt to escape. The men were on their way out of the Asuncion country when surrounded and captured by rurales. Major Orozco reported. Accused of murder and robbery of McIntyre it is said the trio confessed guilt. Robbery was said to have been their motive.

KEEPING RECORD IS GOOD METHOD

(By Staff Correspondent)

LAMESA, June 20.—Keeping ac-
curate records on the amount of
feed put into a cow and the amount
of milk you take out of a cow,
pays in the long run, take it from
Sam Stamps, Borden county farmer
of Gail, says Sam says he knows.

Some time ago Mr. Stamps bought
more cows to add to his herd until
he has 122 animals. Of these, 14
were registered Jerseys and the rest
good grade cattle of the Jersey
strain.

Mr. Stamps began to keep a record
of his feeding. He bought some
scales and weighed all of the feed

he gave the animals. He also bought
a milk weighing outfit. "Cost me
about \$7.50 and was the best \$7.50 I
ever spent," he declared.

By watching his record, Mr.
Stamps soon found out which of his
cows were boarders and which were
producers.

"I started the test with 122 cows,"
he explained to a group of Dawson
county farmers at a dairy meeting.
"Now I am milking but 51 head."

"Twenty-five per cent of the cows
I sold as beef. They brought me
about \$40 to \$60 a head. They were
shipped to Fort Worth markets and
sold."

"The other 75 per cent I sold as
milk cows in and around Gail. I
got around \$80 a head for them."
Mr. Stamps says he has found
that the weighing of the feed and
the milk "almost becomes second
nature to you."

AVIATORS TO SEEK RECORD

**BROCK AND SCHLEE TO
ATTEMPT NEW MARK
FOR FLIGHT**

(By Associated Press)
JACKSONVILLE, Fla., June 20.—William S. Brock and Edward P. Schlee, who Wednesday completed the fastest round trip trans-continental flight ever attempted, announced today that they would make another west-to-east hop within the next ten days.

day in a telegram addressed to the editor of this paper.
Friends Not Surprised
Close students of West Texas politics were not surprised at Senator Parrish's decision. He had considered making the race several months ago but at the end of his consideration announced flatly that he would not be a candidate. His close personal and political friendship for Senator Small was also taken into consideration and friends of both men felt Senator Parrish's decision to refrain from running and to support his Wellington colleague was inevitable.
Considerable pressure has been made to push the Lubbock column into the race, due to his acknowledged popularity over the state and his ability as a vote-getter. His record in the State Senate, while serv-

ing part of his first term, stamped him as a leader and raised his state-wide political status to a high point.
West Texans, who see in Senator Small's candidacy an opportunity to place a West Texan, as well as a new political figure in the executive chair at Austin, were expected to day to cheer Senator Parrish's decision. Fear that he and Small would split West Texas votes were both to make the race was paramount during the indecisive days and that fear doubtless would have been realized.

Senator Parrish was a longtime citizen of Crosby county, where he served several terms as county judge. Moving to Lubbock six years ago he was elected mayor in 1923, serving one term and not asking re-election. He was sent to the State Senate from the Thirtieth Senatorial district in 1928 and during his tenure of office thus far has accomplished one major task, that of revolutionizing the Texas fee system in public office. He has also been active in various other legislation, the support of Texas Technological college and has been one of the bulwarks of the Moody administration.
His close friendship with Gover-

nor Dan Moody is attributed to some extent Senator Parrish's failure to enter the gubernatorial list this year. He waited for several months for the Governor to make up his mind as to his third term candidacy and by the time the Governor did make up his mind it was too late for the Senator to make a campaign.
Following his election to the State Senate Mr. Parrish drew a long term tenure in that office and has more than two years yet to serve.
